Hospital Open House Planned Next Wednesday

Community Council To Sponsor Showing Of Facilities

An open house from 4:00 until 9 o'clock next Wednesday afternoon and evening will be staged at the new Ozona hospital. The purpose of the open house, under sponsorship of the Crockett County Community Council, will be to give the people of Crockett County an opportunity to see that has been accomplished to the final realization of a community hospital in Ozona and to show them what little additional equipment will be necessary to make the hospital a reality.

Everybody in Ozona and Crockett County is invited to visit the hospital between the hours of 4:00 and 7:00 o'clock next Wednesday. Community Council members, their husbands and wives, will be on hand to show visitors the facilities already installed and discuss with them the plan for future development.

Most of the necessary furniture and much of the needed equipment already have been delivered and installed in the hospital. Attractively finished throughout, with bright colors, different in each of the private rooms, and equipped with the finest furniture available, the hospital, though small, would rate at the top for attractive interior and convenience arrangement.

With a 17-bed capacity, the hospital has five private rooms, three wards, with operating room, doctor's lounge room, two rest rooms, rest rooms, ample set and storage space and a large and well equipped kitchen. All the furniture, bedding, kitchen equipment and a large quantity of hospital equipment have already been purchased with funds donated by citizens for the purpose of completing the hospital. The building itself was converted from a combination office building of hospital by the county. Oil companies and individuals have contributed enough for the building's elevator and the equipment already installed, the elevator to be installed within the next few weeks.

The kitchen equipment, including two ranges, refrigerator, dishwasher and garbage disposal unit, was donated by the West Texas Utilities Co. The venetian blinds were donated by the Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Co., and a large quantity of hospital equipment, such as ice caps, bed pans, hot water bottles, etc., were given by the South Texas Lumber Co. Kitchen utensils necessary have been donated by the South Texas Lumber Co. and Alfalfa Hardware Co. will furnish. (Continued on Page Four)

Alfred Tijerina Draws Suspended Term In U.S. Court

Ozonan Charged With Embezzlement Of Postal Funds

Alfred Tijerina, formerly employed as a clerk in the Ozona post office, was sentenced Tuesday afternoon by Judge William H. Atwell in federal court in San Angelo to a six-month probated jail sentence for two years, for embezzlement of postal funds.

Tijerina entered a plea of guilty to the charges filed by postal inspectors in federal court. He was charged with stealing postal funds amounting to \$26.17 on November 26, 1948, and January 27, 1949, from the Ozona post office.

Four Ozonans were summoned to the federal court session for possible petit jury service. They were J. P. Pogue, Dempster Jones, Roy Parker and John Childress.

Ozona High School's Lions battled the undefeated Menard Yellowjackets to a 13-13 tie in the Menard stadium Friday night. The favored Menard eleven suffered the first mark against its record in district play, tie games in the district counting as a half game won and a half game lost. As a result, the undefeated, untied Iraan team stands at the top of the heap in 6-B district play.

The underdog Lions got the jump in the first quarter after recovering a fumble on the Menard 25. Gaining a first down on the 11, Kenneth Perdue skirted the Menard right end for the first touchdown. Lee Armentrout made it seven points via the placekick route.

Menard came back in the second with two touchdowns and one conversion point to make the score at the half 13 to 7 in Menard's favor. Dick Cannon ran 70 yards for the first, and the second came after an Ozona fumble was recovered by Menard on the 39. Cannon carried to the 10 and in three tries the Jackets had their second touchdown, Zimmerman carrying the final thrust.

Moore To Drill Half Wildcat In Western Crockett

Two New Tests Slated For Vaughan Field; New Producer

Moore Exploration Co. of Midland has scheduled a 4200-foot combination tool wildcat in Crockett County, seven miles southeast of Iraan.

To start at once, the firm's No. 1-65-A H.M. Half estate will be 450 from the north, 1,090 feet from the east lines of section 65-1-I&GN survey.

Cummings, Berger and Smith of Fort Worth have completed a producer and staked another location in the Vaughn field. Pumping 71 barrels of 28 gravity, pipeline oil in 24 hours, the firm's No. 4 Shannon estate has been finished in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 500-1.

Pay was topped in 1,434 feet in drilling to 1,458 feet with 7-inch casing at 1,402 feet. The section had been acidized with 1,500 gallons. No. 4 Shannon estate is 330 from the north, 990 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 5-UV-GC&S.

The Fort Worth concern has filed application for permit to drill No. 6 Shannon estate, 330 feet from the north line of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 5-UV-GC&S and 660 feet west of the same operator's No. 4 Shannon estate, a producer.

Swimming Pool Recreation Bond Issue Planned

\$85,000 Issue Sufficient To Provide Recreation Facility

With the general floor plan and size approved, the Crockett County Community Council in meeting Monday night, launched plans for bringing to a vote of the people of Crockett County the question of issuing bonds in the sum of \$85,000 to build a modern swimming pool and recreation hall for use of the community on water works hill.

A petition asking the Commissioners Court to call the election to decide the bond issue question is now being prepared and as soon as it is completed, it will be circulated for signatures of qualified voters. As soon as the required number of signers are secured, the petition will be presented to the Commissioners Court and an election date will be set by that body. Terms and interest rates of the bonds and tax necessary to retire the issue will be set out in the court's orders when preliminaries are completed so that voters will have full knowledge of the proposed issue.

Architect's drawings and floor plans were secured by the Council Committee. The swimming pool is to be constructed in rectangular shape inside the present circular tank which will be filled and surfaced with concrete walks. This plan of construction will be much more economical than making an excavation for the pool, engineers have advised.

A pavilion will be erected on the west side of the pool to provide shade for swimmers and spectators and the entire surrounding area between the pool and the proposed recreation hall will be surfaced with concrete to provide sunbathing area and entrance to the recreation hall. The pool will be modern in every respect, with circulating and chlorinating system to meet all health requirements.

The proposed recreation hall itself will be constructed on the east side of the pool. The general floor plan approved by the committee will provide a central hall or assembly room, suitable for citizen gatherings of all kinds, 45 by 80 feet in size. On each corner of the building will be 20 by 30 foot rooms, one for use of ladies in club meetings, lounging or games and another for men, with rest rooms provided adjoining each. One of the other corner rooms will be a kitchen and the other a game room.

Architect's estimates of cost for the swimming pool was placed at approximately \$32,000 and the recreation building at approximately \$44,000. Estimates of the necessary \$85,000 bond issue includes complete furnishings for the recreation hall and a fund for contingencies to assure completion of the project.

It is estimated that a bond issue of the size proposed can be retired in ten years at a nominal tax rate, which would provide a considerable saving in interest over a 15-year or longer term of bonds. Interest rate will be determined by the court on the basis of information from the present bond market requirements.

(USDA)—Most southwest farm products brought steady to higher prices during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Cattle receipts increased sharply last week over the week before. Texas sheep receipts increased, but other markets fell off.

Cattle were steady to strong at Fort Worth, Denver and Chicago, and some classes gained at other markets. However, heifers, calves and feeders showed some weakness at Kansas City.

Slaughter lambs and ewes sold steady to a little higher for the week at Texas and Colorado markets. Feeder lambs and yearlings showed weakness.

Wool trading remained at a standstill in the southwest. Mohair remained firm.

Wholesale dressed meat prices at New York were unchanged Monday from a week earlier on cow beef, veal and mutton.

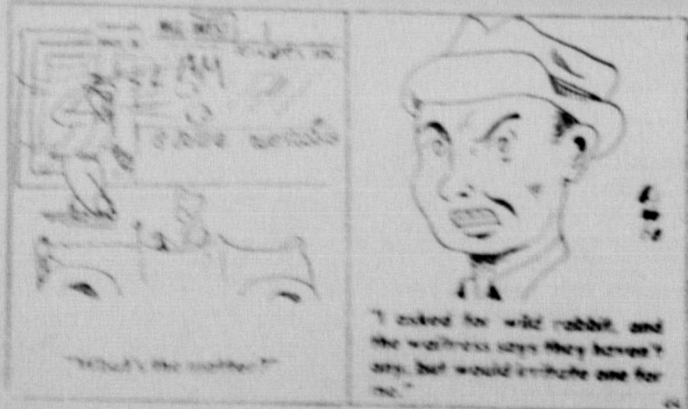

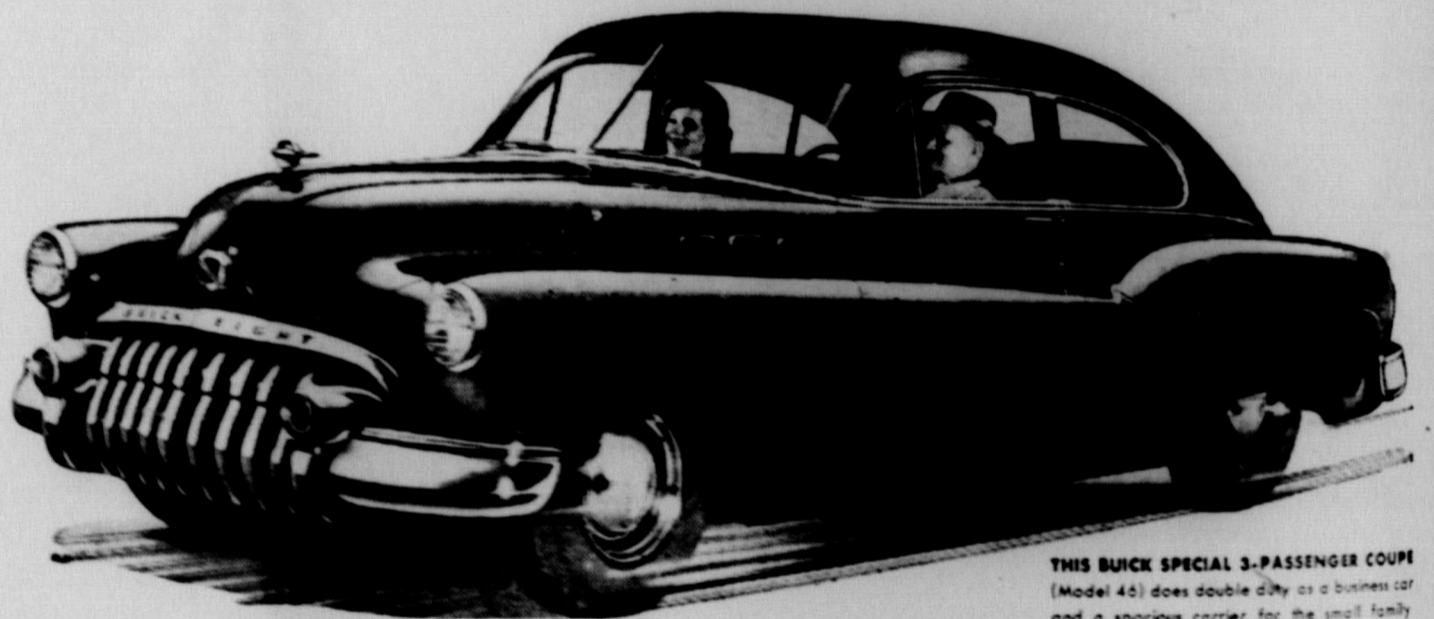

ish needed occasional furniture for the hallways, for the convenience of visitors and relatives of patients. Local doctors, who have offered to take a short term lease on the hospital and who plan to employ a manager and a competent staff to operate it, have already purchased an x-ray machine and installed it in the x-ray room on the second floor, or doctor office floor, where it will be used in connection with the hospital if the lease is made.

A general drive to raise the balance of funds necessary to complete the hospital has been launched under sponsorship of the Community Council and a number of local clubs have pledged their help in putting over the campaign.

Any person who might care to make a donation to the hospital completion without solicitation, may do so by leaving a check at the bank or at the hospital on open house day.

OST May Become Safeway Highway Across Continent

Organization Pushes Plans For 4-Lane Highway

Plans for a proposed trans-continental super-highway from the Atlantic to the Pacific, skirting the Gulf of Mexico and the Mexican border, were outlined here today by a representative of the recently organized Atlantic, Gulf & Pacific Safeway Association.

E. H. Ramsey, Jacksonville, Fla. secretary of the Association, said the super-highway would afford an all-year route, free of snow and ice when other routes are blocked or are hazardous, as a result of low temperatures. It will also be virtually a 'sea-level route' with a minimum of heavy curves and grades. Mr. Ramsey conferred here with County Judge Houston Smith.

The slogan of the organization is "The Safeway Speed Way Coast to Coast."

In addition to serving possible all-year military needs, Ramsey said the highway plan contemplates a modern, high-speed trans-continental highway from Jacksonville to Los Angeles to meet current traffic needs.

Secretary Ramsey is visiting each of the eight states along the proposed route, assisting in the setting up of local and state organizations to assist in bringing the super-highway into actuality.

Florida, he said, has already taken an important step. Its legislature, at its last regular session initiated a unique movement to obtain federal aid for the project. It memorialized Congress to authorize the Federal Bureau of Roads to cooperate with the eight affected states by making \$250,000,000 available, in addition to regular road allocations, to be expended in cooperation with the states.

Funds would come from federal gasoline taxes, estimated at \$560,000,000 for 1949, or \$100,000,000 in excess of the amount presently allocated by the government for road construction.

Federal matching aid for highway construction has been a long

time policy and this is the first time that direct appropriation by the Congress for a particular highway, valuable as a military route, has been sought.

States traversed by the projected four-lane safeway would be Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Four-lane highways have been completed or are under construction on the eastern, central and western part of the route through Florida; in the vicinity of Mobile in Alabama; the central part of the route through Mississippi; both east and west of New Orleans, and in western Louisiana; at several points in Texas; and one-fourth of the route through Arizona and more than one-fourth of the route through California.

Ramsey said the original trans-continental route of the "Old Spanish Trail," blazed through the wilderness in colonial days, required a span of more than 200 years. The present highway, known as the "Old Spanish Trail," required approximately 15 years for completion.

The active and enthusiastic cooperation of interested persons along the proposed route of the "Safeway Speed Way Coast to Coast" he said, indicates its completion in a relatively short time.

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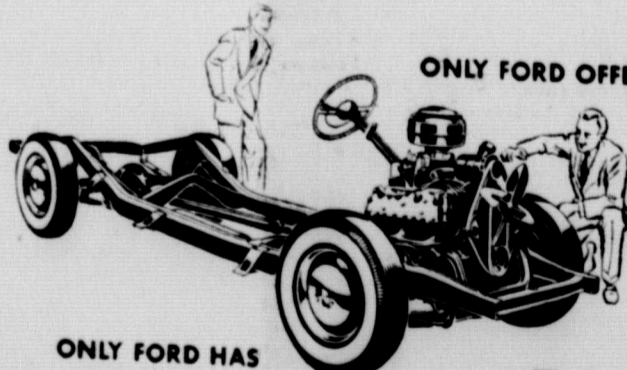
