Alleged rape investigated

A 30-year-old Colorado City woman was allegedly abducted at gunpoint and taken to a county road where she was raped at about 3:30 p.m. Tuesday.

The victim said she saw what appeared to be a woman with a baby in her arms walking east on I-20 and stopped to offer assistance.

The victim realized that the suspect was a man as he took out a gun and entered her car.

She said she was forced to drive to County Road 204, where she was sexually assaulted at gunpoint.

She was then instructed to lay down in the back seat and to count

as high as she could. When she sat up, the suspect had fled on foot.

The victim then drove to a friend's home, contacted the sheriff's department and was taken

to Mitchell County Hospital where she was examined.

Her assailant has been described

as approximately 30-years-old, 5'8" to 5'11", either white or Hispanic, with eyebrows that seemed to go all

away across. He was clean shaven and slurred when he spoke.

He was also wearing a straight black wig, white or light blue shirt and blue jeans.

Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs said the department feels that the assailant was from out of town and possibly a transient.

Investigators have questioned three subjects about this case, but have come up with no definite suspects.

High-speed chase results in one dead

A high-speed chase at about 7:20 Wednesday evening involving the Mitchell County Sheriff's office, the Nolan County Sheriff's office and the Sweetwater Police Department ended with the death of an 18-year-old man from Pennsylvania.

According to Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs, an off-duty DPS officer observed a Toyota Camry weaving through traffic at a high speed and called in a possible DWI.

The subject, who has been identified as Jason Paul Alhouse, exited the interstate on Business I-20 and entered Colorado City limits.

"One of our deputies stopped him on Second Street and as he was exiting his vehicle the guy just took off," Toombs said. "At the time we didn't know why."

Toombs added that Alhouse was wanted in Nevada and New Mexico for questioning about DWI.

City Council okays sale of revenue bonds

Members of the City Council voted unanimously on Tuesday to approve resolutions and publication of sales for revenue bonds and certificates of obligation.

Water works and sewer system revenue bonds series 1994 A will be issued in the amount of \$580 thousand and series 1994 B for \$4 million.

Tax and waterworks and sewer system surplus revenue certificates of obligation series 1994 will be issued in the amount of

\$3,080,000. Sale of the bonds are being handled by the brokerage firm of First Southwest Corporation.

According to City Manager Steve Shutt the municipal utility bonds offered will be tax exempt.

The bonds will be offered at \$5 thousand increments each and will most likely be bought in blocks by large investors.

Investors in these bonds will earn tax exempt interest.

Escaped prisoner recaptured

An inmate from the Wallace Unit who escaped earlier this week while on furlough was re-captured in Tucson, Ariz. early Thursday morning by Tucson police.

Details on his capture were not available when this story went to print. However, Assistant Warden

Jackie Edwards speculates that he may have had an accomplice in his escape.

Joe Wayne Williams, 43, was on furlough to Levelland when he did not return to the work camp in Big Spring on Tuesday. He was expected back by 5 p.m. and when

he did not return was listed as an escapee.

Williams had been in prison since December 1, 1987 for burglary of a habitation in Hockley County. He had been serving a 25 year sentence and had received a furlough in 1989.

Trauma center rep congratulates hospital

At a meeting last Thursday at Mitchell County Hospital, Texas Department of Health Program Administrator for Trauma Facility Designation Terry McCormack told the staff, "I am very impressed with your facility. You have gone to every effort to meet the criteria for a Level IV Trauma Center."

She pointed out that there were so many strengths at the hospital that there was not enough room on her evaluation form to write them all. Those mentioned were as follows:

- cooperation between medical staff, administration, nursing staff and pre-hospital care (ambulance service), ensuring continuity of care;
- radio communication system;
- excellent continuous quality improvement process;
- excellent medical records documentation—care is clearly documented, even in disaster situations;
- useful trauma registry;
- clear evidence that patients are transferred expeditiously;

• impressive nursing staff; • educational offerings for staff. Limitations of the physical plant were noted, suggestions for emergency room expansion were expressed and there were no essential

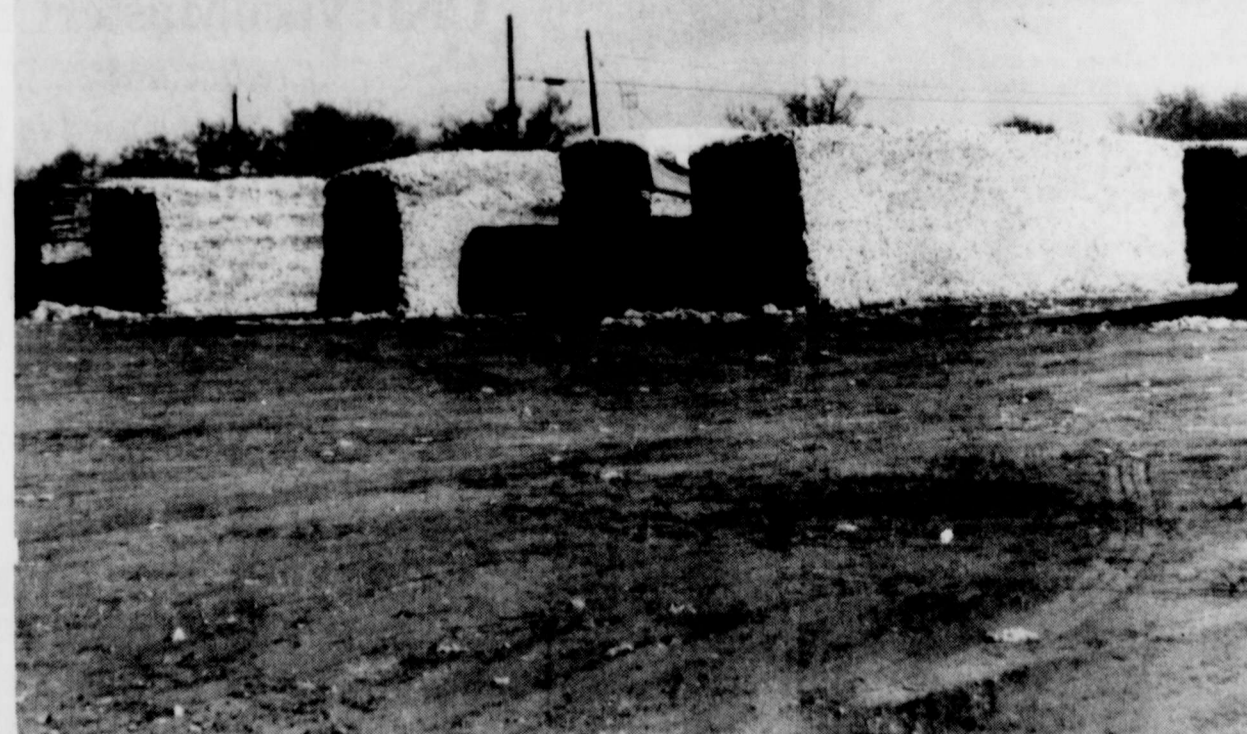

stolen vehicles, the automobile he was driving was registered as stolen from New Mexico and that he was absent without leave from the Navy.

The license plates displayed on the car driven by Alshouse did not match the car itself. After running a check on the vehicle it was determined that it was stolen, he said.

As Alshouse left Colorado City, Toombs said his speed increased to 125 mph. According to figures, it took the subject approximately 17 minutes to reach the outskirts of Sweetwater city limits.

"He was passing vehicles at a high rate of speed and sometimes he would go by two vehicles side by side by passing on the median," he said.

It was his two-vehicle passing strategy that resulted in his death.

"He tried to pass two vehicles side by side, went into the median, came up on a bridge, hit the guard rail and went off between the two bridges there," Toombs said.

The car traveled approximately 30 feet through the air and the drop-off was about 20 feet down, he added.

Colorado City Police and Federal Mail Inspectors may proceed with filing a case against a Colorado City woman on possible mail fraud, theft or forgery charges.

According to Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery, the suspect was sending away for catalogue merchandise from the Fingerhut mail order company by using someone else's name and account number without the person's knowledge.

Montgomery said if mail fraud charges are pursued then she would face a federal trial. However, if investigators choose to pursue theft or forgery charges, the case will be handled on the state level, he added.

Because a monetary loss has been determined and certain merchandise cannot be recovered the suspect will more than likely have to face charges on some level, he said.

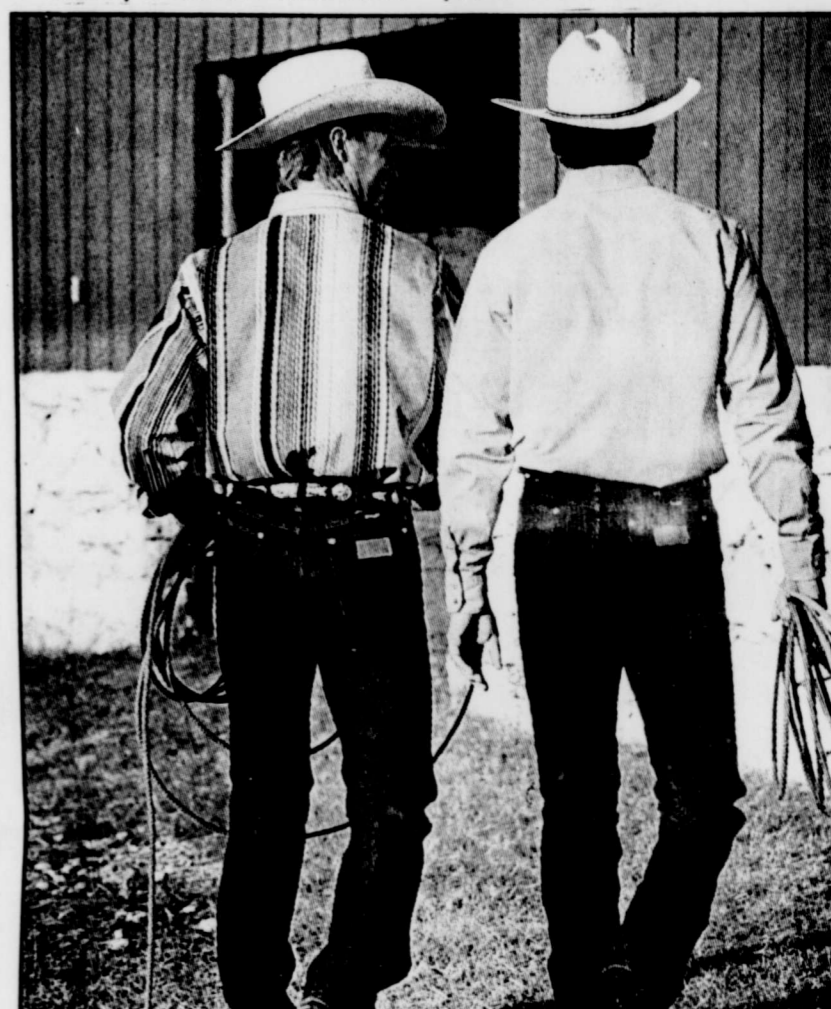

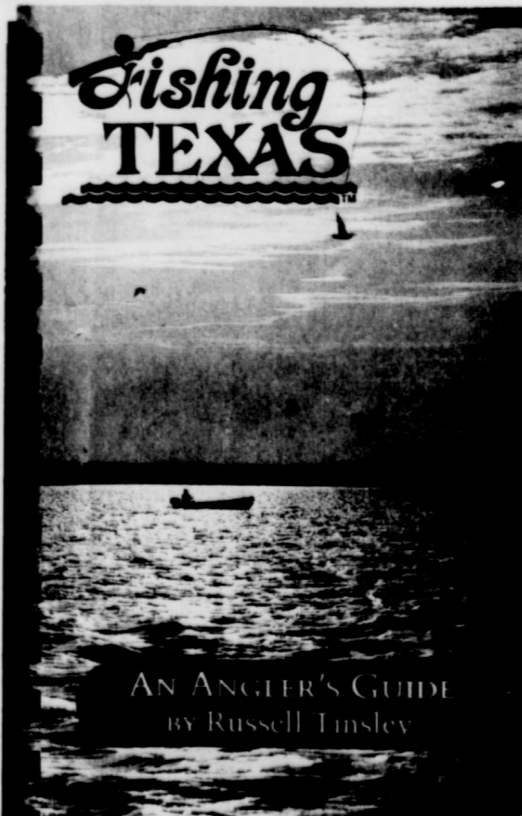

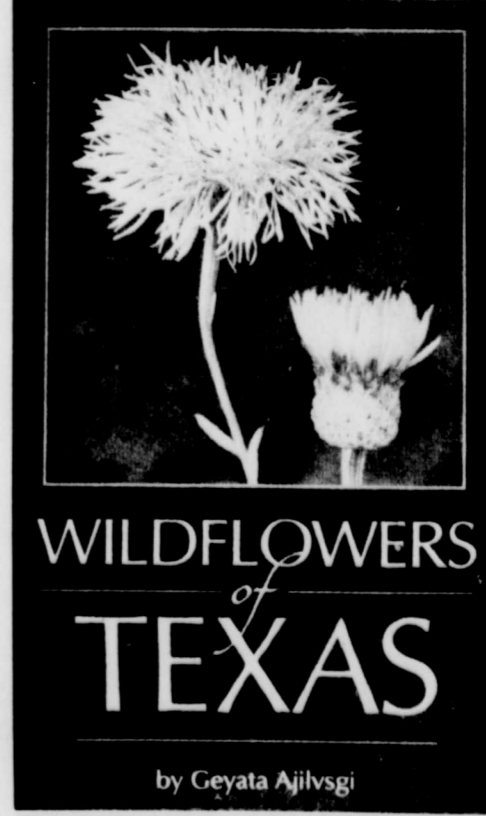

COUNTY OIL & GAS NEWS

Two developmental wells are planned by Parker and Parsley Development Co. of Midland in Mitchell County's East Iatan Howard Field, about nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

The wells will be known as the No. 290 and No. 291 Mary Foster. They will seek production at total depths of 3,225 and 3,220 feet, respectively.

Locations are in a 3,840-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey.

Trend Exploration Co. has revealed plans to drill an 8,550-ft. wildcat in Mitchell County. The

well is in an 80-acre unit in the Lavaca Navigation Co. Survey. The operator has designated the venture as the No. 6002 Sterling Family Trust. Drillsite is four miles northeast of Vincent.

After bottoming the hole at 7,900 feet, Blue Ridge Oil and Gas Exploration has temporarily abandoned a new field wildcat in Mitchell County.
