

Poetess Taken In Salt Raids By Policemen

Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, Hindu Successor To Gandhi And Tyabji As Leaders In Campaign Under Arrest

BOMBAY, India, May 21. —(P)—Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, Hindu poetess, who succeeded Mahatma Gandhi and Abbas Tyabji as leader of the civil disobedience campaign, was arrested by British police this morning as she directed a raid on the government salt depot at Dharana.

One hundred nationalist volunteers, or Satyagrahis, were injured in a clash with police during the raid. Others arrested were Manilal Gandhi, son of the Mahatma, the Mahatma's secretary, Payarelal, and the Imam Shab of Bwagir, a Moslem fellow worker of Gandhi's.

Headquarters Raided. At almost the same time 300 un-armed police and 50 armed police under high officers raided the headquarters of the All India national congress. All office work, including the president of the local council, Narimat, were arrested.

Ninety-five volunteers starting at dawn from the congress house for a raid on the salt depot at Wadala were asked by the police to dis- perse. They refused and were ar- rested, later being taken to the in- formation camp at Worli, where other leaders imprisoned Monday were held.

Mrs. Naidu, who is of middle age, is the third of civil disobedience leaders to be taken into custody. She was designated by Mahatma Gandhi early in the campaign to follow with Abbas Tyabji to leadership of the campaign when he should be ar- rested, and did so upon Tyabji's arrest, May 12.

Directed Raid. She immediately directed her at- tention to the raid on the Dhar- ana salt depot, announcement of which was believed to have pre- cipitated Gandhi's arrest and im- prisonment at Yeravda, Poona.

Last week she and the nationalist volunteers proceeded to Dharana, but were met by policemen who sur- rounded them but would not lay hands on them, beyond to keep them from proceeding. After remaining all night in this situation the police finally arrested her, removed her from the cordon, and then re- leased her.

Thereafter she took a less active part in the salt raiding and said she would join the raiding herself again unless violence developed, in which event she felt her presence would be called for.

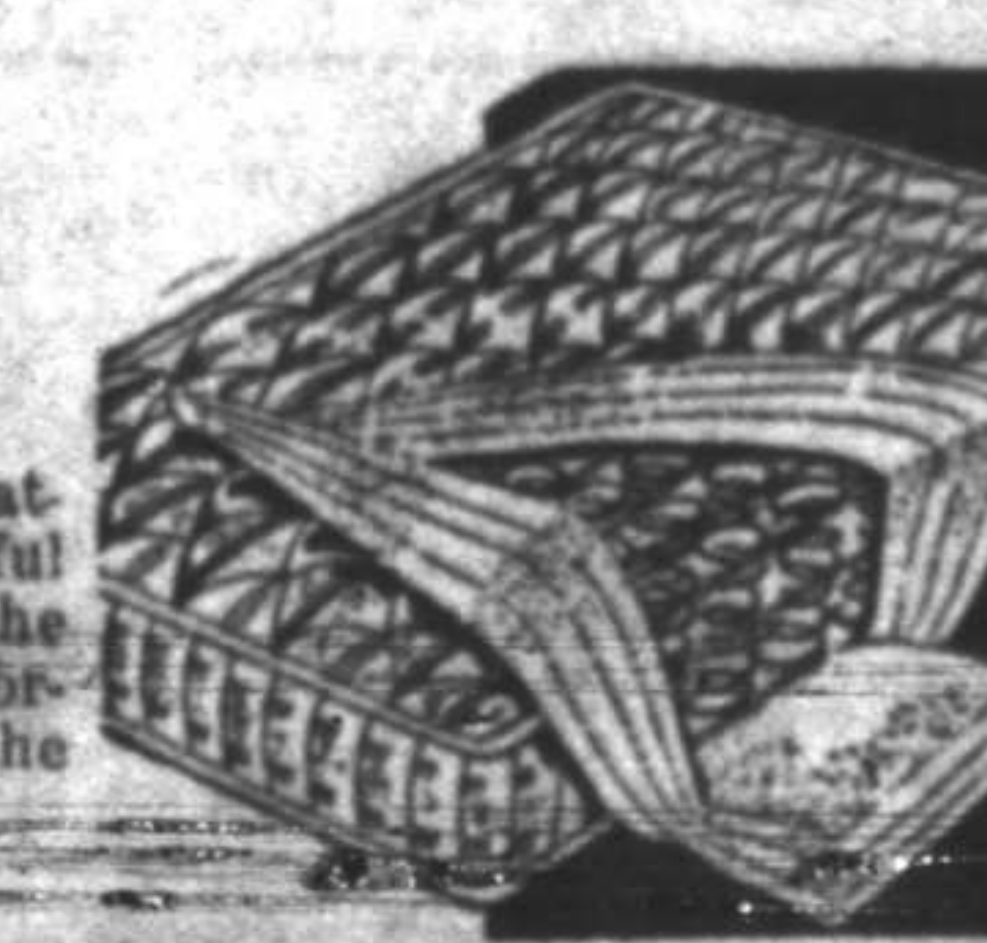

One Arrested In Murder Of W. L. Edwards

Houston Homicide Squad To Hold Prisoner In Connection With "Ride" Slaying Of Aviation Enthusiast

HOUSTON, May 21. (P)—A 31-year-old man was arrested today by the homicide squad in connection with the "ride" murder of W. L. Edwards, prominent Houston aviator and former airport manager.

Police said he was arrested on information that he had brought an automobile in the name of John Beloit, who was charged yesterday with the Edwards murder.

The authorities planned to hold the man arrested. He had told them, Lieutenant George Peyton said, that "a man" had given him \$500 to pay on the machine, telling him to take it out in Beloit's name.

Meanwhile, Peyton said investigations had indicated Beloit's real name was Joe Traposo of Los Angeles, Calif. Beloit, or Traposo, had vacated his little yellow house in the east end when a squad of officers went for him yesterday afternoon. Investigators said they obtained evidence that he left hurriedly, taking his family with him, Sunday night. It was on that night that Edwards' body, perforated with shotgun slugs, was found underneath a crape myrtle bush on a residential street here.

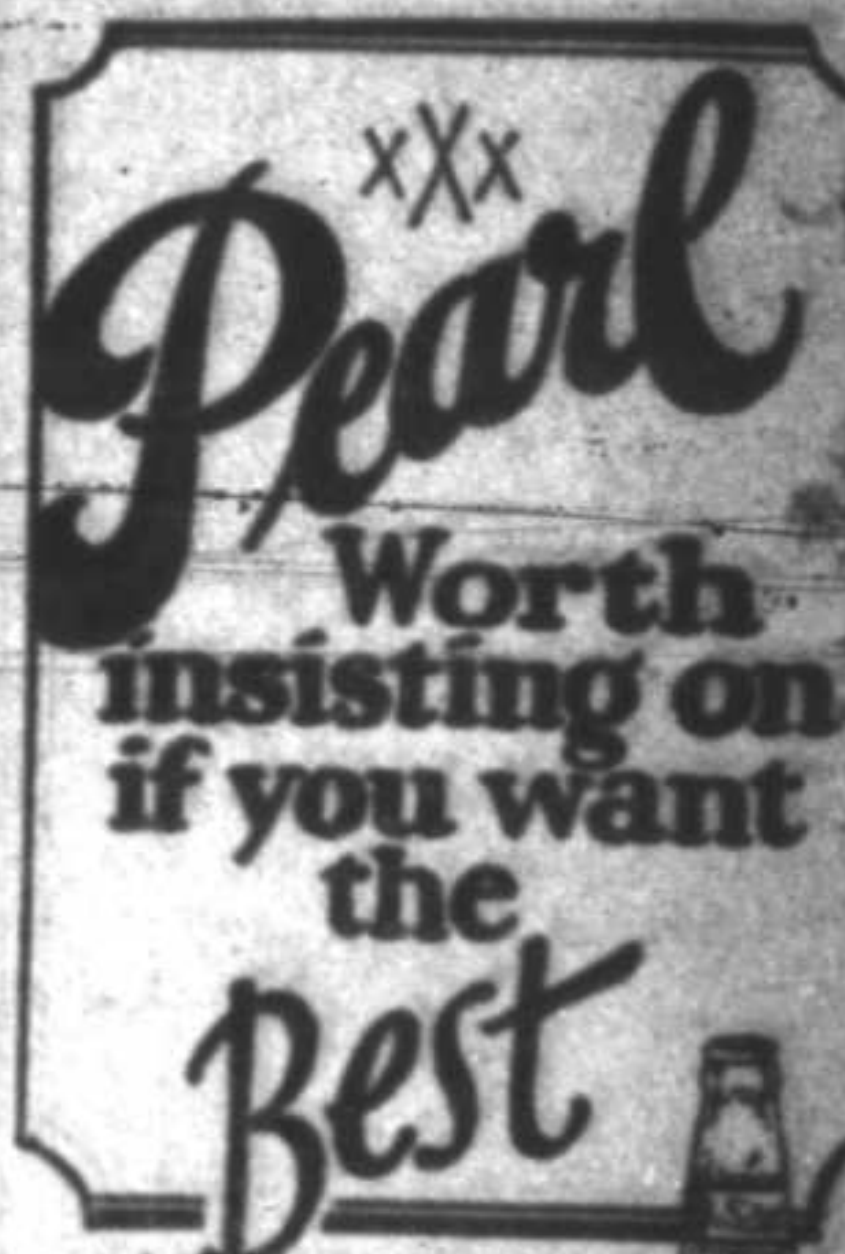
BOMBAY, May 21. (P)—India's battle against the government salt monopoly continued unabated today, but there was no mass violence nor were there any serious clashes with the police.

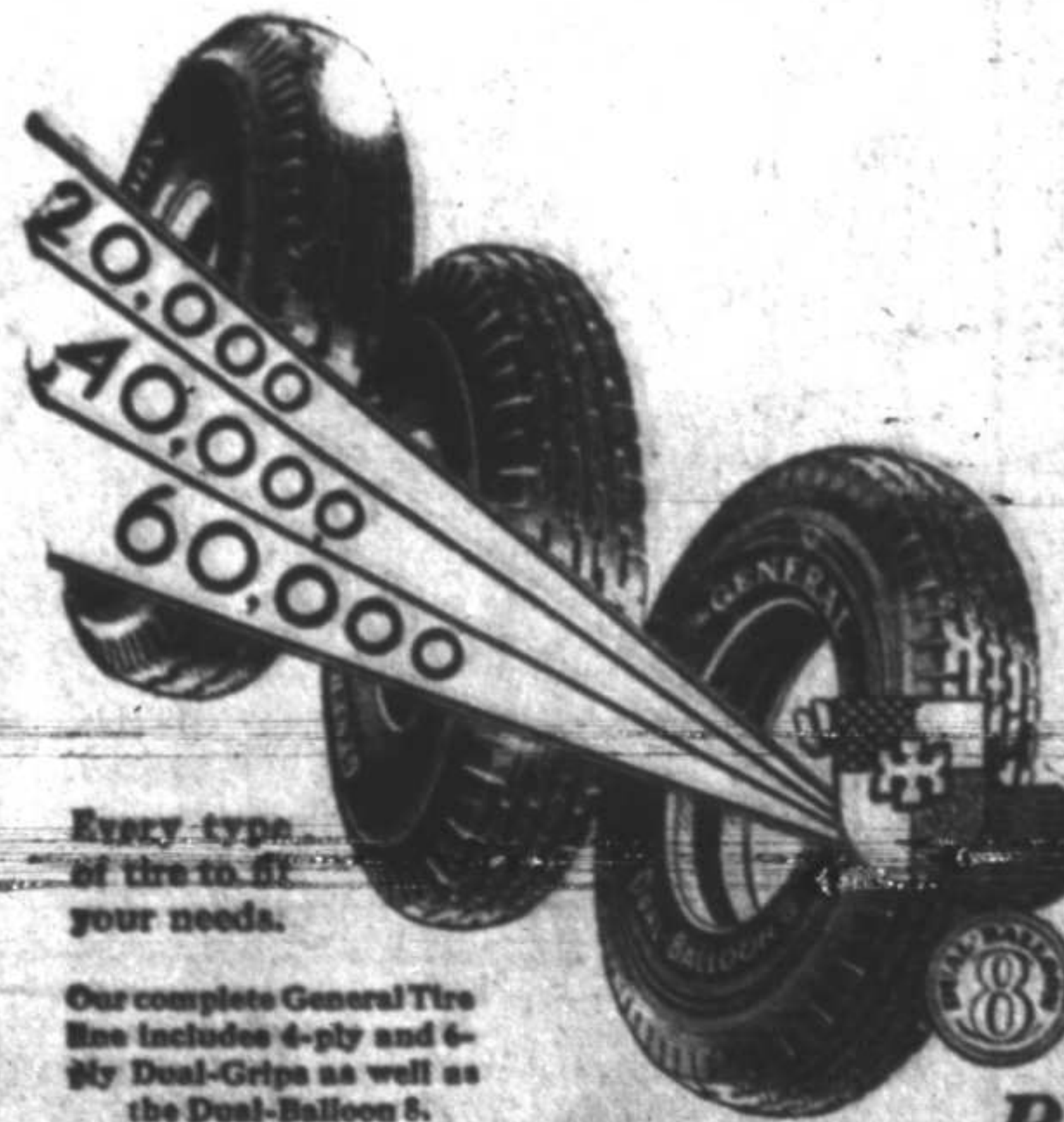

Plans Are Made On Wednesday For Summer Round-Up To Be Held Next Week

Children Who Are To Enter School Next Year Are To Be Given Physical Examination

Physicians And Dentists Will Offer Services Tuesday, Wednesday At Dupre And K. Carter Schools; Transportation Will Be Furnished For All Who Do Not Have Ways To Go

AT A MEETING of the presidents and a number of other P. T. A. workers Wednesday afternoon, plans were made for the summer round-up, which is to be held Tuesday and Wednesday. The meeting was held in the home of the school health supervisor, Mrs. Joe Smith, 1409 Avenue N, with 15 women present. Dupre, George M. Hunt, K. Carter and Sanders P. T. A.'s were represented.

The round-up will be held at Dupre school Tuesday between the hours of 9 A. M. and 4 P. M. and at K. Carter school on Wednesday between the same hours. All parents having children six or seven years of age are asked to bring them for physical examinations on one of these days.

Free Clinic Held
A free clinic will be held on both Monday and Tuesday, and any defects that may handicap the child in life or prevent him from doing his best in school will be pointed out so that parents may have an opportunity to have these defects corrected. Each child will be weighed and measured and have his heart, lungs, eyes, ears, nose, and throat examined. The health supervisor will assist the physicians in making the examinations.

Mrs. R. E. Strickland was appointed chairman of the transportation committee, and all who do not have ways to go to the schools may telephone Mrs. Strickland at 1987, and transportation will be provided.

A large number of physicians and dentists of the city are spending one hour on each of the two days in making examinations.

Purpose Of Round-Up
The purpose of the round-up which is sponsored by the national Congress of Parents and Teachers, is to send to the entering grade of school a class of children 100 percent free from remediable physical defects.

It is reported that the average American child is only 25 percent physically equipped, that 3,000,000 school children have hearing losses of varying degrees, and that in a study of pre-school children, nearly 25 percent were found to be in need of glasses.

Luncheon Club Extends Invitation To Representative Of American Cotton Co-Op Association

(Special To The Avalanche)
LAMESA, May 21.—An invitation to C. O. Moser, of Dallas, representative of the American Cotton Co-operative association, has been extended by the Lamesa Luncheon club to attend a conference in regard to the possibilities of establishing a unit of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association in Lamesa.

Addresses during the meeting were made by O. B. Norman, president of South Plains Bankers association and S. A. Debnam, a representative of the Cooperative. Debnam stated that the quality of cotton produced in West Texas will be improved only on the application of a marketing system which will bring the man who produces cotton the intricate value of his product. Under the existing condition, Debnam said, short staple cotton may produce more per acre than the long staple and the better for the inferior grade does not carry back to the producer but is taken from the man who produces better cotton.

He also stated that the new marketing plan instigated in the organization of the cotton cooperative will so merchandise the cotton

that it will be sold on its merits at a minimum cost and will be so handled that men participating in the organization will receive immediate settlement for their cotton on the basis of its worth.
