Could a man possibly have done the neurotic hysterical trick that Dr. Virginia Alvarez Huxley did? Huxley, to police that she had supplanted her husband, Lindsey Huxley, with "the other woman," that she had shot him in that woman's presence, dragged his body into a swamp, and shrieked at the woman, "You can have him now!" But the next day the husband and the woman were found, very much alive. To be sure, it is an obvious pathological case. But even so, men rarely turn pathological in just this way. Privately by them more than anything else, even when unbalanced.

JUST AS BAD
Though perhaps the quiet casual way in which Max Bodeheim pursued his course with school girls is no more to male credit than Mrs. Huxley's exploits to female. Though how absurd to make others too typical of their sex in all. There is real tragedy, though in the two little 18-year-old entangled in the Bodeheim publicity, one of them dead. One can imagine their awe at touching the hem of the garments of a "real author." There is always something pathetic about the floundering of youth feeling the artistic urge and having not the slightest conception of how to go about it. We need more vocational guidance help in this country.

WOMAN'S CITIZENSHIP
If you are a woman you may suddenly find yourself at several nationalities or more. To women who are not ardent feminists, this information from Doris Stevens, U. S. representative at the Inter-American Commission of Women appointed by the Pan-American Union, may seem a bit startling. The facts really are that in some countries a married woman takes her husband's nationality in all cases. In some countries she loses her nationality upon marrying a foreigner only if she goes to her husband's country to live. In some countries after losing her own nationality by marriage she may regain it if that marriage is dissolved. In other countries she may not.

In other countries after the dissolution of marriage to a foreigner she can regain her own nationality only by returning to her own country as a foreigner and becoming naturalized. In some countries a woman may choose which nationality she wants, her own or her husband's and sign a statement to that effect.

In some countries the naturalization of a man automatically naturalizes his wife and children. But the woman's naturalization of course, never effects that of her husband and children.

GOOD OR BAD?
Most of these laws seem hopelessly out of date, of course. The wife at a day when the woman was the man's possession. A woman's citizenship should be a personal individual thing no more affected by her marriage than her religion or her club membership. Still there are arguments on the other side—the possible establishment of a home divided against itself, the citizenship of the children, etc.

Society Takes The Air—Mrs. Haskin
Finds Work Better Than Social Whirl

NEW YORK Aug. 8.—It is quite the thing nowadays for bored society debutantes to escape to aviation as one way to escape ennui. But one society matron has taken the air in a more useful way.

She is Mrs. Helen Coghill S. Haskin, of Virginia, Washington and New York, who traces her ancestry back to British nobility in the 14th century, has belonged to the social world spelled with a capital S all her life but who has abandoned all that to become a radio lecturer.

It's Fun to Please!

"I'm really interested for the first time in my life," Mrs. Haskin said, in a soft, contralto voice that bespoke her native state. "I am crazy about my work. Do you know why? Well, you see, for the first time in my life I am giving something to people. I no longer receive languidly the service of others which is so demoralizing a thing in our leisure class. I have to please. And do you know I find it positively thrilling having to put myself out to do it."

Mrs. Haskin believes that the world of radio offers tremendous educational values to women both as listeners and as leaders of art, music, and home life. Incidentally, Mrs. Haskin has a peculiar technique in her radio "appearances." When interviewed, she was most modestly gowned in a stunning black crepe Elizabeth, with a chic hat smugged down over her sun-burn hair, and with a necklace of antique beauty and matching earrings her only ornaments.

"My costume when I am lecturing to the unseen audience of the radio," she said, "is just as important as if I were on a theatre stage before thousands of critical eyes. Of course one might say it is not important because no one save the lone announcer sees me. But to myself it is imperative that I am well groomed."

"An inappropriate gown or a soiled pair of gloves would undermine my confidence in what I am saying. The radio is a very sensitive medium and would transmit the least inflection of embarrassment or self-deprecation to the audience."

The education of women in the home through the radio is the dream which has inspired Mrs. Haskin to abandon her social round and work 11 to 12 hours a day to perfect lectures on modern child psychology, music and gardening. Having traveled all over the world she is able to give first hand information on the habits of the world, the old masters, folk lore in India, women's problems in China. Her weekly repertoire over a wide range of descriptive and educational from the preparation of the latest hot-weather refreshments for a party to the scenic beauties of Hungary.

From a fine old Southern home, "Lothian" at King George, Va., Mrs. Haskin acquired those intimate, gracious hospitality and that fine knowledge of super housekeeping that is invaluable in lecturing on home-building. From a daughter now in her teens and an adopted son, now grown, Mrs. Haskin learned to know what things interest the mother-heart.

"This is the age of children," Mrs. Haskin said. "I find that the large percentage of my fan letters deal with mothers' problems about their children. I am asked to help pick schools for them; routes abroad for clothes for prep school; books for adolescents; finishing courses for girls; business ones for boys. 'Next to children and the home, I think America is more interested in foreign travel, judging from fan letters. Art, music and literature follow.'"

Once before Mrs. Haskin gave up the social world for work, during the war.

"I probably was bitten with the bug for work then," Mrs. Haskin admitted. "I never seem to have enjoyed loafing since. But this

time I know what I want. I really believe every woman should have some work."

Camp Fire Girls
Are Sent Letters
Concerning Camp

Preparations for Summer
Encampment Told To
Groups; Registration
Blanks Are Available.

Relative to preparations for the summer encampment of Lubbock Camp Fire girls in Ceta Canyon, near Happy, August 16 to 24, about seventy letters have been sent out by Mrs. W. B. Price this week. With the letters are application blanks and medical certificates to be filled out along with general instructions pertaining to the camp.

"Although efforts were made to secure the names of all Camp Fire girls in the city, lists were incomplete due to the absence from the city of several guardians," Mrs. Price said yesterday. "For this reason some girls may not receive letters. These may be secured by calling on the cashier at the Minter-Gamel store."

A registration fee of one dollar is to be paid to the Minter-Gamel cashier immediately, according to Mrs. Price, and this amount is to be deducted from the total expenses of \$5.50 per week. Information concerning transportation is to be given at the time of registration.

Some knowledge of the camp activities is gained from the letters which read in part:

"The camp director is assisted by a very capable staff, consisting of craft counselors, a musical director, a recreational director and a camp nurse."

"Each night there is a program around a huge camp fire. This program consists of songs, dramatizations, stunts, etc. These evening meetings and a day's well-ordered program, and are planned by the girls. A council fire is held at the end of each camp session and honors are awarded."

Registration for the camp will close when 50 girls have signed up and the camp director reserves the right to cancel these registrations. To admit girls who have not already been to camp or for other reasons.

Those who attend camp are urged to bring costumes for the stunt programs, ceremonial gowns and head bands and musical instruments in order that they may promote the enjoyment of the encampment.

BRIDGE MADE EASY

by W.W. Wentworth

THE RULE OF ELEVEN—Simple in its application and readily learned, the rule of eleven is of immeasurable value at no trump play. Understanding it thoroughly will effect surprising improvement in your playing. Succinctly stated, it is as follows:

Subtract from eleven the number of the card that is led. The result is the total number of cards, higher than that which is led, held by three remaining players.

As an example of this principle, the following hands are depicted, the declaration being no trump.

Dummy holding—clubs J 8 3.
East holding—clubs A 10 6.
Declarer holding—Diamonds K 7.

West holding—clubs Q 5 4 2; leads clubs 2.

Leading the fourth card from the top (the usual lead against a no-trump declaration) west plays clubs 2. Subtract two from eleven and the result is nine. There are, therefore, nine cards higher than the club 2 held by the dummy east and the declarer. The dummy being exposed, east and the declarer both observe that it contains three cards higher than the club 2. That leaves a total of six divided between east and the declarer.

Hazard, Charley Holland, 23 and J. B. Pierce, 22, are farmer youths, were alleged to have taken the Bankhead girl out for an automobile ride Saturday night, July 21. It was charged that the three youths also picked up Christine Gammage, 17, of Gorman, and took her with them.

Attacks Claimed.

It was claimed that after proceeding some distance on the highway the youths halted the automobile and dragged the Bankhead girl from the car after which two of them attacked her. Later she was returned in a hysterical and fainting condition to the car and they drove along a short distance further, it was said.

It was charged the automobile again was stopped and the third man assaulted her and Hazard, who was the member of the trio alleged to have harmed her first, again mistreated her.

The Gammage girl was charged with being a confederate in the crime. She was arrested and formally charged with this unusual charge against a female, it was pointed out, was filed in order that the state might fix a bond heavy enough to hold her as a material witness. On Monday the charge against her was dismissed by the state, but in default of bond she still being held in jail here.

Rising winds were reported from Lakeland, 15 miles west of Winter Haven.

Meanwhile, reports trickling from the country between the new storm front and the Atlantic told of half a dozen towns and communities visited by damage from the storm.

Kissimmee experienced a 60-mile wind this afternoon, wrecking two residences, unroofing several buildings, breaking plate glass in store windows and uprooting trees.

Houses Unroofed.
Meager reports from St. Cloud, about 10 miles east of Kissimmee, there and that portions of the town were inundated by waters blown out of Lake Tohopekaliga by the force of the winds.

Okeechobee, at the northern tip of the great lake of that name, suffered several thousand dollars damage in the storm last night. Unofficial reports were that 18 inches of rain had fallen there. Lake Okeechobee rose two feet and tributary streams were said to be piling out of their banks, carrying flood menace to thousands of acres of crops.

All of the affected towns, as well as those hit last night by the hurricane, were dark tonight because of the disruption of power lines.

Damage Mounts

Damage Mounts Into Unestimated Millions
JACKSONVILLE, Fla. Aug. 8. (AP)—The Florida West Coast prepared tonight for advent of the West Indian hurricane that has ravaged a 200 mile strip of the East Coast before turning inland toward the Gulf of Mexico.

Approach of the disturbance was heralded in the south central interior by falling barometers, rain and sudden gusts of wind. With what intensity the storm will strike on the west side of the peninsula was not known, but emergency warnings were broadcast to the interior, and shipping held to harbors on the prediction of 50 to 50 mile gales.

Five Million Damage.
Unestimated damage was done along the East Coast last night from West Palm Beach and Vero Beach to Titusville, with three cities, Stuart, Fort Pierce and Vero Beach bearing the brunt of the toll with estimated property damage of \$5,000,000. West Palm Beach and Palm Beach escaped the full force of the storm but suffered considerable loss of trees and shrubbery.

the requests made in the resolutions. I will approve all of the resolutions with the exception of No. 6, which reads as follows:

Resolution No. 6
"Be it further resolved by the Democrats of Lubbock County now

in session, that it is the sense of this convention, that all candidates for office, county, state, and national, from the president of the selves up to the question of supporting the party nominee to each office, from the president of the United States down to the precinct officers in this county, and that we further request that the Democratic executive committee of this county leave off the names of all candidates for office on the Democratic ticket, who refuse to subscribe to said pledge, to support all candidates as herein above set forth.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be handed the chairman of the Democratic executive committee with a request that he and his committee comply with the sense of the convention herein set forth.

"I wish to state that I would not be a party to taking away the franchise of the free born or naturalized American citizens in casting their ballot according to the dictates of their own conscience which the constitution and laws of the United States give them.

"For that reason I have declined to approve the resolution as stated above. Lubbock county has as fine a citizenship as there is anywhere and I wonder how many of them would like to have someone dictate to them how they shall vote.

"I certainly hope the day will never come when that condition will prevail. I certainly hope that every legal voter will turn out and go to the polls on the 23rd day of this month which is run-off primary day, and cast his or her ballot according to the dictates of their conscience.

"And again at the general election in November. There is no moral or implied obligation on any voter on account of the pledge on the primary ballot to support the nominee for president.

"If the voters will turn out and vote in the elections we will have cleaner politics and a better government and much better conditions in governmental affairs. I hereby extend to the members of the county convention my kindest regards, but I shall have to decline to approve their resolution No. 6, as stated above.

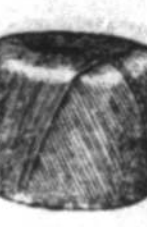

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Police War On Traffic Violators

Thirty Lubbock Motorists Handed Tickets By Luce, Traffic Officer Here

It costs \$3 to run an amber traffic light in Lubbock. That fact may be proven by asking any of the thirty motorists who were given tickets yesterday for traffic violations by the city's new traffic officer, C. W. Luce, former captain of the Amarillo traffic department of the police force of that city.

An intensive war is being waged by Chief of Police John Lemond against traffic violators. Twelve violators, some rate and others peaceful, paid fines of \$3 each in the city police court yesterday afternoon on a charge of running an amber light. The others are scheduled to report today.

For the past several days no special effort has been made to prosecute the offenders but yesterday with the instructions of Chief Lemond to "give tickets," Luce is handing them out to the violators so fast that he says he misses some.

"It is necessary for the driver to stop if the bell starts ringing before he reaches the street intersection," Luce warned. Several of those given tickets objected to paying their fine and practically all were "already in the intersection when the light came on," but they had to shell out the three bucks.

The day's trade news was mixed in character. The optimistic tenor of the weekly steel trade review, which stressed a resumption of railroad buying was offset by predictions of a decrease of probably 100,000 tons in the July tonnage statement of the United States steel corporation to be published Friday. An increase in crude oil production also slowed up buying in the oil shares.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—Facing an estimate that surplus wheat in export countries this season will total 315,000,000 bushels more than last year, wheat values collapsed today. Steers were steady, the stock 10c to 25c lower, and calves 25c to 50c higher. Steers old from \$9.00 to \$10.50, cows \$7.00 to \$8.25 and calves \$12.75 to \$14.00.

Hogs were steady. The top was \$11.25, with the bulk selling from \$8.75 to \$11.15. Sows sold from \$8.50 to \$9.00 and pigs \$7.00 to \$7.50. In the sheep market, yearlings were 25c higher and fat lambs steady, the latter selling from \$12.30 to \$14.00.

In talking of the fair, J. A. Merritt, president of the association, remarked, "Due to intensified diversification by the farmers this year, we shall be able to show to the people more and better samples of our farm products. Miss Davis reports that the Home Demonstration exhibits will be much larger and better this year than formerly owing to the great interest that has been manifested by all in the work."

Snyder is expecting large crowds and many visitors of other counties every day and welcomes all with a glad hand. She will be prepared to show every one something worth while as well as a "rip-roaring" good time.

Rains of Benefit To Farms, Ranges

Agriculturists and Stockmen Alike are Optimistic Over Prospects for Year At Big Spring.

BIG SPRING, Aug. 8.—Recent rains have caused both the stockman and the farmer to be optimistic over the future prospects for an abundance of good pastures and crop yields. 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ARE GIRLS TO BLAME?

Discussing recent roadside tragedies that resulted disastrously for young women accepting rides in automobiles with young men whom they did not know, the Sherman Democrat suggests that while the men should be given the limit in punishment when tried and found guilty, "every girl should make it a rule of life to stay out of automobiles driven by men about whom they know little or nothing." Following is the text of the Democrat's editorial:

Governor Moody has offered a reward of \$250 for the arrest of a young man in South Texas who is wanted on a charge of murder in connection with the death of a young girl who was found with her skull crushed on the highway. It is charged that she was thrown from an automobile. And now a Sherman girl is in a serious condition after an experience of the same kind, which is said to have occurred in Collin county. Every girl ought to make it a rule of life to stay out of automobiles driven by men about whom they know little or nothing, and juries ought to give such men the limit when they are tried and found guilty.

Before the editorial appeared in print dispatches brought news of another incident of a similar character at or near Houston. Two young women had accepted invitations from men to ride in automobiles and later were found on the roadside, where they had been thrown, one with a fractured skull and the other suffering from a stab wound and internal injuries. Both are in a hospital as a result of their indiscretion, while police are searching for their assailants.

We concur in both statements of our contemporaries as to the punishment that should be inflicted on the men and advice to girls to "stay out of cars." Were the counsel generally heeded no young woman would be subjected to the brutal treatment that is rapidly getting to be a common occurrence. And it is strange that girls, having knowledge of the unfortunate experience members of their sex have suffered while joy riding with young men, will deliberately accept invitations and thereby place themselves in position to be similarly misused.

This new freedom about which we hear so much has brought with it a moral laxity that bodes no good to either sex. The old ways and the old customs with respect to associations between the sexes may and do excite ridicule of the younger generation; but the restraints parents and society then imposed were a protection and shield not afforded under present conditions. We seek not to excuse or condone the males for their brutal offenses, but the truth can not be escaped that women, in the main, are responsible for the barriers being lowered.

TREADMILLS

When depressed with the hum-drum of life, the endless routine, one should remind himself that he must be willing to work earnestly at his job, whatever it is, else he will not be a factor in world progress. The laggard, the quitter are enemies of success devoted to a losing game—the game of retrogression.

However, we should not make the mistake regarding a cheerless rut as preparation for success. Seriousness and studiousness must be tempered with levity and recreation because play is a partner of work. Through the influence of recreational forces fatigue is effaced, ambition renewed and determination fostered. But in recognizing value of play one should not overdo the thing and make a hobby of idleness. The latter is a great evil when carried to extremes. The lethargic person is not a builder but an exponent of decadence.

Life really is fruitless without service. One should remember this when tempted to ignore duty or to give up entirely. We have no excuse for our tenancy here if we have not deeds of kindness, sacrifice, of skill and pertinacity to our credit. The world has many advantages for those who are willing to seek and accept them.

It takes energy and determination to gather these splendid fruits, but once hav-

ing acquired the habit of serving others as well as accumulating worthily for ourselves, we find it interesting. The reality is joy in achievement. The realization that success has crowned one's ardent efforts brings satisfaction. The manifestation of others' gratitude for favors extended them creates joy. And even when there appears no tangible reward for efforts exerted one can be sure such earnestness is a stepping stone to betterment, and the knowledge that one has done his best is satisfaction in itself. As long as we have such a record we are rising even though failures may afflict us.

In devotion to advancement one should not make the mistake of converting himself into a veritable machine. There are examples, of course, where persons have gained fame and fortune by spurning all pleasure in the name of business, but their success is not ideal by any means, because by the time they have reached the height of their ambition they are worn out under the terrific strain. Hence, it can be seen that super-seriousness is a scourge and that we all are entitled to our playtime.

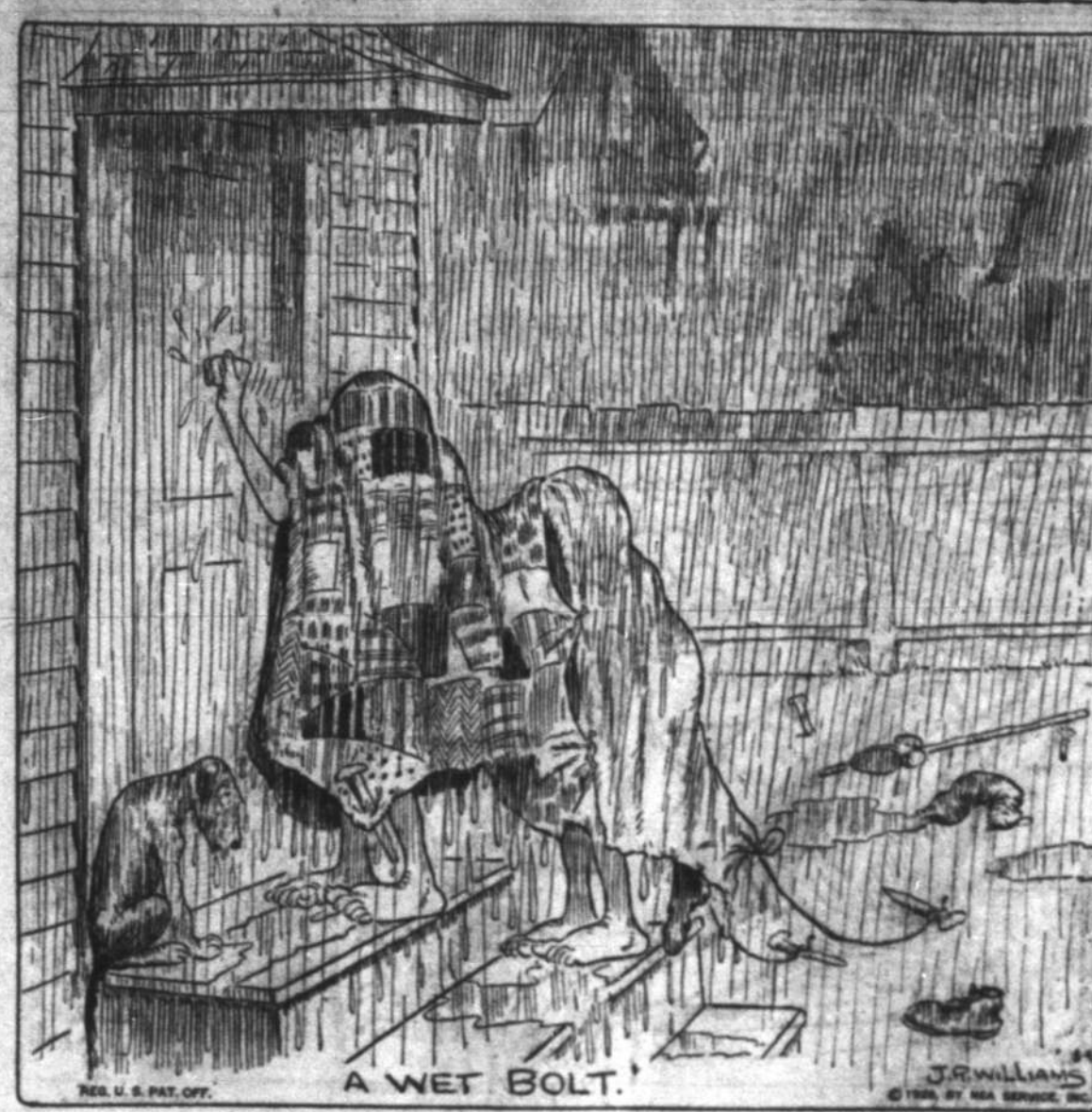
A great quantity of idleness is a scourge but a bit of it is a valuable investment. It rests us and provides a new viewpoint. It permits us to reassemble our thoughts and to discern our ideals and ambitions clearly. It brings us to the conviction that life is far more beautiful and satisfying than we ever dreamed it was while we had our noses to the grindstones.

COURAGE AND SAFETY

Two eminent Britons, in recent public utterances, criticized—directly or by implication—the familiar slogan, "Safety first." To be lived successfully, life must be lived dangerously, Sir Arthur Keith told a gathering of savants in London. Addressing the graduating class of a famous English boys' school, John Buchan, M. P., was more specific: "There is not a more odious or detestable watchword for youth than 'safety first.'" The speaker explained that he did not mean to counsel foolhardiness, however, and he added: "You must be prepared for an honorable gamble in life; you must play long game and not the short game." Let it be borne in mind that the phrase which the accident-prevention campaigners are hammering on continually is susceptible of double interpretation. According to the circumstances and the motive involved, it may be the counsel of either prudence or cowardice. To illustrate, safety considerations would dictate that the indifferent swimmer keep out of deep water but such thoughts should not deter him from attempting to rescue a fellow swimmer threatened with drowning. To be sure—as the author of Ecclesiastes wrote—life is ruled by chance. One is beset by hazards on every hand in a world where nothing is certain save death. Indeed, the safety workers' underlying theory is acceptance of that elemental truth. There are so many risks in this life at best that none should be taken needlessly, out of mere bravado or in the pursuit of idle pleasure. Of course, when he admonishes his hearers to live dangerously, Sir Arthur did not mean that they should go out and "step on the gas," or engage in any of the foolhardy stunts by which wayward youth now seeks a thrill. All that he meant to convey was the obligation to face the facts of life with courage. That is to say, he was pointing to intellectual and moral courage as indispensable elements of right living. These qualities are akin to physical valor. Columbus was brave when he sailed his little fleet out upon the unknown Atlantic and discovered a New World. Copernicus was equally fearless when he announced his revolutionary theory concerning the nature and structure of the solar system. Mankind owes all its material, mental and moral progress to risks such as these men took. The martyrs of the First, the explorers of the Sixteenth century, lived dangerously. Charles A. Lindbergh lived dangerously on that dramatic flight of his; but so did old Roger Bacon in his cloister, among test tubes and retorts. Whichever may be judged the most noble. It frequently happens that intellectual or moral courage is harder to exercise than physical courage. Woodrow Wilson, in a notable address, emphasized that distinction:

"War . . . is a dramatic symbol of a thousand forms of duty . . . There are some things just as hard to do as go under fire. I fancy that it is just as hard to do your duty when men are sneering at you as when they are shooting at you. Men who are brave enough, steadfast enough to go about their duty with regard to their fellow men, whether there are hisses or cheers, 'meet with triumph or disaster and treat those two imposters just the same.' The cheers of the moment are not what a man ought to think about, but the verdict of his conscience and the conscience of mankind. The man who lives and acts according to such a standard must live dangerously. He must be prepared to follow where his exalted guide may lead him, even into untrodden fields and danger-bet ways. If a man voice, by word and deed, the faith that is in him, he will face ridicule or persecution and even may hazard life itself. To follow such a course to the end without fear or hesitation is, as The Master taught, to save one's life. To take the cringing contrary course is to lose all.

YOUR HEALTH

At this season of the year mothers worry particularly about measles. When children get out of doors and mingle with other children, they are more easily exposed to infection.

The exact cause of measles has not yet been determined, although it has been definitely proved for this disease, as for infantile paralysis, that the condition is infectious.

Some investigators have found bacterial organisms which they believe are responsible, and others have asserted that the cause is a virus smaller than the ordinary germ. None of these organisms or viruses has been accepted by the majority as representing the specific cause of measles.

Seek Preventive Measures
In the meantime, various methods of prevention are being sought, since the condition is widespread and since the bacteria are in some cases more serious than the disease itself. One of the means of prevention involves the same technique that is recommended in the control of infantile paralysis; namely, injection of a serum obtained from the blood of a person who has recently recovered from the disease. When a person has an infectious disease, he builds up in his blood materials for opposing the disease. When he recovers, this material remains, and it is for this reason that a person ordinarily has measles, scarlet fever, or other infectious diseases only once.

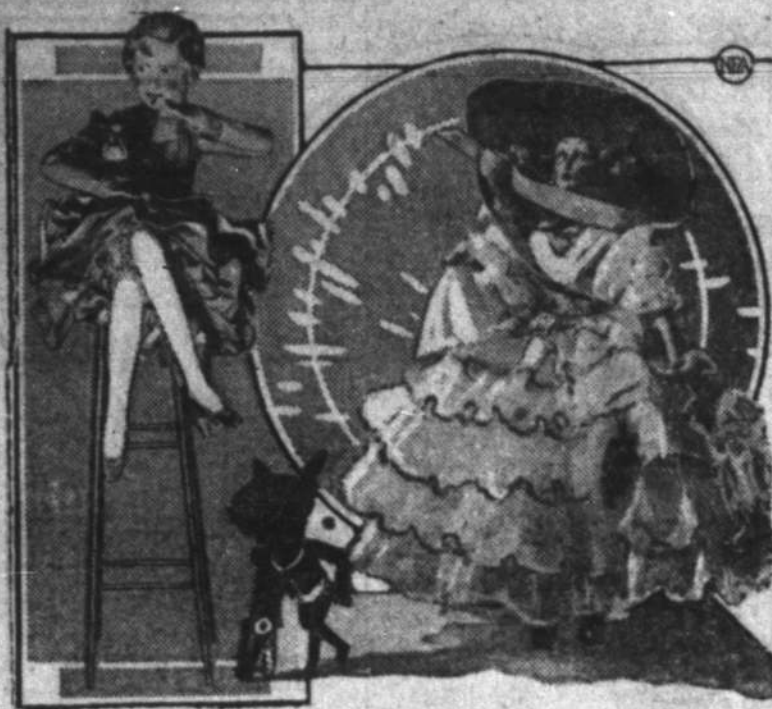
CROP ESTIMATED

Last Season's Yield Was
14,443,934 Bales

NEW ORLEANS, La., Aug. 8 (AP)—H. O. Foster, of the New Orleans cotton exchange announced today the total commercial cotton crop in the United States last season was 14,443,934 bales valued at \$1,440,514,000.

Last season's crop, although 4,702,000 bales less than the previous year, brought \$210,000,000 more to the growers, the report said. The value of the crop in 1926-27 was given as \$1,290,512,000 and the year before \$1,590,811,000.

Poor Condition Held Cause For Showing of U. S.

Manager of British Olympic
Team Declares Prizes
Were Evenly Distributed
At Amsterdam.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—J. F. Wadmore, manager of the British Olympic team, which just returned from the games at Amsterdam, told an interviewer today he welcomed the allocation of the next Olympics to the United States but thought the plan of holding them on the Pacific Coast was impracticable.

"If American authorities don't change the venue to some where on the Atlantic Coast, I'm afraid they are going to be very disappointed with the representation at the next games from the British as well as many other nations. Los Angeles is too far away."

Wadmore expressed satisfaction with the British team's showing and added "I think results have proved that the time when one nation dominated proceedings has gone. Almost every country had its share of successes at Amsterdam this year."

"As regards the United States team, I've been talking to some of their athletes and I think there's the impression that the strain of their intercollegiate championships, their national championships and tryouts for the Olympic games proved just a shade too much. In other words, I think there's a suggestion that the United States athletes were not in too good condition."

Feminism Issue War Against Veil In Persia

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (AP)—An insult to a queen has opened the way to feminism in the Far East said Mrs. F. Evelyn Schopflocher of Montreal, on her return from an airplane tour of the east in the interest of women's movements.

The incident occurred when the Queen of Persia attended a Mosque unveiling and was insulted by Mullas who failed to recognize her, declared Mrs. Schopflocher, who said that as a result of the Shah, Riza Khan Pahlavi, has become a leader in the movement to liberate the women of the east from enslavement to Oriental customs. The Shah, she said, became

so aroused over the insult to his queen that he rushed into the crowd with drawn sword and wounded several persons. As a result of the Shah's interest in the feminine movement, she said, Persia has obtained representation in the international council of women, being the first oriental country to do so.

Abandonment of the veil has become less of a stigma and she predicted that the Shah was not through yet.
