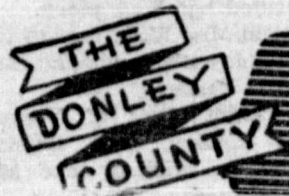

## LOCAL POSTMASTER ATTENDS CONFERENCE

Mike McCully spent Wednesday of last week at a ZIP Code Conference held in the Childress Sectional Center. The Conference was conducted by department officials for the purpose of instructing the postmasters in this area on the mechanics and advancement of the ZIP Code or Zone Improvement Program.

McCully is of the opinion that the ZIP Code is here to stay. This being the case, the general public will get an extensive educational program on the purpose and correct use of the ZIP Code. The time is coming in the very near future when all mail will be required to have the ZIP Code affixed and in the proper position. The proper place is two spaces or approximately two-tenths of an inch behind the name of the state and on the same line as follows:  
Clarendon, Texas 79226

The ZIP Code is not something totally new or something someone just dreamed up. This system is already in operation in Germany, and a staff from the Post Office Department has made a study of their operation. It does require the cooperation of all postal patrons, but in time, it will show a marked improvement in your mail service as well as eliminating a lot of missent mail. Further instructions will be run in this paper from time to time. Postmaster McCully urges that you start using your ZIP Code in your return address, and start collecting the ZIP Codes of your usual correspondents.

## Comparison Of City Governments

The following comparison of city governments has been compiled as a community service through public information by the Clarendon Jaycees:

### City Commission Type

1. Number: Two commissioners and Mayor
2. Term of Office: two years; major elected on alternating years; two commissioners elected on other year
3. Salary: Commissioners — \$50.00 monthly salary which is set by State Law; \$15.00 travel expense which is controlled by city commission and is unlimited; 10,000 gallons of free water which is controlled by the city commission and is unlimited; Mayor — \$100.00 monthly salary which is set by State Law; 10,000 gallons of free water which is controlled by the city commission and is unlimited.

### Aldermanic Type

1. Number: Any number, usually a city the size of Clarendon has five aldermen and mayor
2. Term of Office: two years; two aldermen and mayor elected on alternating years; three aldermen elected on other years
3. Salary: alderman — unlimited; set and controlled by mayor and aldermen; mayor — unlimited; set and controlled by mayor and aldermen

Listed below are some advantages and disadvantages of the Aldermanic Type of City Government as recorded by the study of other communities with either the Aldermanic or Commission Type:

### Advantages

1. Six men would be recognizing and understanding the need of your city instead of three.
2. Three men would always remain in office with past experience and knowledge. Under the Commissioner Type there is the possibility of only one experienced person remaining in office.
3. Aldermen and Mayor can run on token salary platform. Example: \$1.00 per meeting, per alderman as in other cities with Aldermanic Type of government. With this arrangement more dedicated men would be serving your community.

### Disadvantages

1. Unlimited salary for aldermen and mayor.
2. Getting men dedicated enough to serve with only token salary has been a problem in smaller cities than Clarendon but not in cities of the same size or larger.

The Jaycees are not endorsing, as an organization, either of the above types of City Government. This article is compiled in the interest of public information and the Jaycees ask that each of you individually check into the two types of city government yourselves before going to the polls on March 17th, but above all, to go to the polls on March 17th and vote for the government of your choice.

# An Editorial

On Friday, Feb. 6, a petition was presented to the officials of the City of Clarendon asking for an election to determine whether the city form of government be changed from the commission form to the Aldermanic form. An election for this purpose was called for Tuesday, March 17.

In sizing up an issue of this type, it is a hard matter to say whether it will work or not. Upon checking on a number of towns with the Aldermanic or we should say "Council" form of City Government, we have found some that are working very smoothly but the majority are not, especially in the smaller places. The Council form is succeeding in towns where they have highly paid city clerk or man of equal authority to direct the affairs of the City.

In a majority of towns where this form of government is falling down, they report that it is a harder job to get out a quorum than it is to run the city. In our case it would be six men meeting at one time instead of the present number of three.

The petition that was presented to the City asked for an election. No definite plan was set out although it is presumed that a city clerk or strong mayor type would be used. That question can only be answered in one way: whether the city could afford it or not. It seems foolish in a sense to vote a change in any form of government where a definite plan is not presented to the people along with a petition. As it now appears, the actual question at hand is whether the people of Clarendon want to elect five men or two men along with a Mayor, for a city clerk is just as workable under the commission form as it is under the Council form. The Aldermanic or Council form will allow five men to PASS THE BUCK whereas the commission form is shouldered by only two men who have little or no opportunity to pass the buck.

As in many instances, there have been various rumors and misleading statements in regard to the two types of City government concerned in this election. To clear up a few points, we would like to quote from Vernon's Civil Statutes of the State of Texas:

**Salary — Commission form Article 1164 — Commissioners shall receive \$5 per day for each regular meeting and \$3 per day for each special meeting. Shall not receive pay for more than 5 special meetings in any one month. May fix salary not to exceed \$1200 per year for mayor and \$600 for Commissioner.**

**Article 1010. Council form — At first meeting of year, Council to fix salary and fees of office of the mayor and fix compensation to be paid to officers elected or appointed.**

It is true that our present City Commission and Mayor are receiving the maximum but on the other hand, with the Council type of government, there is no limit to salaries or compensation. The council could ruin a city within a year's time if they were of mind to do so. In both types, commissioners or councilmen can serve on a token basis.

Clarendon voters should bear in mind the fact that the City of Clarendon has been operating almost entirely with funds derived from the City Water Department. With our present tax structure, tax money is already spoken for to pay off bonded indebtedness. In case we should experience a wet summer, which has happened in the past, the city would be short of money and could not pay a high salaried clerk-manager.

If a high priced city clerk is used to run the City and money falls short, there is only one avenue to take and that is RAISE TAXES.

In regard to having six men serving instead of three and having experience in office, we would like to say this: Under the Council form, you would always have three staying on the Council. If you, the people were unhappy with their actions, just how long would it take to clean house and replace a council when new members could be influenced very easily through their ignorance of duties and soon become a part of the same machine. With the commission form, you can do a house-cleaning every two years if needed.

There are men who will serve the city on a token basis with either form of government.

The Council or Aldermanic form of government was used in Clarendon from the beginning of the town to the early 20's at which time it was changed to the Commission form. Two attempts have been made through elections to change back to the Council form within the past twenty years but failed both times. As the old saying goes, "It is much easier to watch one man than two." In this case, it will be easier to watch three men than six.

Naturally, we want to see Clarendon have the type of government that will work the best and regardless of the outcome of Tuesday's election, we shall always strive to assist the progress of our city in any way. The main thing is to cast your ballot the way you think is best. Don't stay at home and let the other fellow do all the saying on how your city government will be operated.

## Road Bond Election Called For April 11

County Commissioners, in regular session Monday of this week called a \$100,000 Road Bond Election to be held Saturday, April 11th. A petition signed by B. M. Hicks and 130 other persons had been presented to the court asking for the election.

The election will be to determine whether bonds of Donley County shall be issued in the amount of \$100,000 bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 4% per annum and maturing not to exceed 20 years; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said county sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds are to be expended primarily for the purchase of right-of-way from the easterly city limits of Clarendon to the Donley-Hall County line along U.S. Highway 287. A similar election regarding the above mentioned was held several weeks ago but was defeated as a 2/3 majority was necessary for it to carry.

**LABOR IS REQUIRED FOR TEXAS BEEF**

COLLEGE STATION — How many hours do you spend annually caring for your beef cows? This information should be helpful in determining how to better use your labor next year, says Tom Prater, farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Operators who have other enterprises competing with their beef program for labor, and those that work off the farm or ranch will be especially interested in knowing how much time they spend with their cows, he says. A recent USDA report indicates that about 12 hours of labor were required annually per cow on beef operations in Texas, says Prater. This amounts to about 3.6 hours per 100 pounds of beef produced, he adds. The hours required per cow beef operations, Prater says.

will vary on each operation depending on management, and other factors of production. Texas studies indicate that 18 hours per cow annually are needed on the Blackland farms of the state, 14 hours on Grand Prairie farms, just over 18 hours on the Northeast Texas farms, and some West Texas ranches indicate labor requirements of about 10 hours, according to the specialist.

In comparison, in the Mountain States such as Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, and Nevada, about 10 hours are required per beef animal, with 2.4 hours needed per 100 pounds of beef

produced. The Delta States of Mississippi, Arkansas, and Louisiana require 15 hours per cow and in the Southeast States of South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Alabama, 14 hours are needed.

This shows that Texas compares favorably with other beef producing states in the amount of labor required per cow for

**Notes From City Hall**

Accomplishments for the past year:

1. We have collected approximately \$4,224.50 in delinquent taxes.

2. We have purchased a 3/4 ton fire-fighting truck for use outside the city limits which saves using our heavy equipment and which is appreciated by our neighbors residing outside the city limits.

3. We have purchased approximately \$1,500.00 worth of two-way communication apparatus for the fire department and is also used by the City Engineer and City Marshal.

4. We have found a way to finance and pay for the moving of the railway water tank to the southeast part of town where the water pressure is very low. This creates among other things a fire hazard because of this low pressure. We are installing two large pumps which will keep both tanks full at all times and we are laying four blocks of new 6" line in the west part of town that will never accumulate any corrosion. We will install one 250 gpm booster and one altitude valve on the relocated water tank and two check valves on the 6" lines coming back from the west part of town. One is to be located at 5th and McLean and the other at 7th and Bugbee. This will equalize good pressure in the newer section of town.

5. We seal-coated the road from Highway 70 to the Adair Hospital and all roads leading to the hospital.

6. We installed a street divider, a traffic light, and traffic signs in front of the Post Office which has helped alleviate traffic jams.

7. During the last big snow we cleaned and washed the streets within 24 hours after the snow had fallen.

8. We have paved two alley intersections.

9. We have a flag pole installed at the City Hall.

10. We have purchased two IBM typewriters and one Burroughs adding machine to help speed up office work.

11. We have purchased a new garbage unit and had the old one overhauled and repainted which will give better pickup at all times. The sanitation department of this City has to be maintained in good order for the health of our City.

12. We are purchasing a new two-ton truck with dump body trading in an old 1954 which is equipment we have been needing a long time.

13. Also, we are purchasing a 12 E street motor grader. We are trading in an old grader which for the past 3 years has cost us \$11,500.00 in repairs. If we should keep using the old grader, there will be another \$1,500.00 repair bill immediately.

14. As soon as the weather permits, we have contracted the repair and re-roofing of the City Hall.

15. In the making is a project to move the Fire Department recreation room and the City Library to the second floor, and move the City offices to the ground floor.

16. Consideration is under way for retirement benefits for the City employees.

17. The Green Belt water dam election carried by a large majority vote. We made numerous trips to Austin to help secure the damsite location within 10 miles of Clarendon's City limit. While in Austin, we were advised to

As so many of the really important things it has and will continue to be a long drawn out fight for every one to even except the fact that there is even such a thing as good mental health habits much less that such habits have to be practiced and taught to your children.

There are several new books in the library on the subject.

R. Frederick West writes about a minister and mental health. Quoting from his "Light Beyond Shadows": "One day I found myself in strange company. It was like waking during a horrible nightmare. Only, the weird dream really came true. It was that sudden and startling."

"These were the feelings of Dr. Fred West, the beloved minister of the Hillyer Memorial Church, on waking to find himself in a mental hospital without any memory of how he got there. At that time his case was considered by some to be not merely serious, but hopeless. Now, back at Hillyer Memorial Church and having taken up his life anew, Dr. West tells the story of one man's return to normalcy."

"Light Beyond Shadows" is a deeply moving, personal account of a "nervous breakdown." It is a many-faceted story, involving not only the strange world of the mental patient in the wards, but also the other world — wife, children, friends. In and through it all is the ultimate struggle to rediscover God."

Another memorial gift has been given in memory of Mrs. C. B. Morris.

AUSTIN — Courts are making the news these days.

Texas Supreme Court will hear arguments in an important test case which will determine whether holders of paid political offices can run for the Legislature during their present elective or appointive terms.

Truman P. Kirk, Abilene lawyer and legislative candidate, is trying to keep 104th Dist. Atty. Tom Todd off the Democratic ballot. Todd's term as D.A. runs through December 31, although he has resigned effective November 1.

Present office holder is Rep. Allen Glenn of Abilene.

Court's decision will affect many local officeholders over the state similarly seeking legislative places this year.

In earlier action the State Supreme Court lost little time in polishing off an attempt to ban, from jury service, all who saw telecasts of the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald.

High court refused a request, by Jack Ruby's attorneys, for permission to file a petition for mandamus to force Dallas Trial Judge Joe B. Brown to accept two televiewers as defense witnesses.

A day later the Court turned down another motion for leave to file a mandamus pleading. This was from Leroy Roach of Brownwood. Roach has tried unsuccessfully to get his name on the 64th District ballot as a leg-

islative candidate. Area includes Brown, Coleman, Comanche and Runnels Counties.

Roach's application arrived after the filing deadline, and was not sent by registered or certified mail. So the Democratic county chairman rejected it.

James M. Bushnell, convicted of robbery in Orange County nearly 20 years ago, finally won a new trial. Court of Criminal Appeals said he was entitled to one under the recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling that every indigent person charged with a felony must have a court appointed attorney. Bushnell had no lawyer at the original trial.

**PARTY LEADERS MEET** — Both Democratic and Republican state executive committees held meetings here on March 9.

Required business was certifying candidates for statewide primary ballots, selection of party convention sites and the place of May 12 meetings to canvass the May 2 vote.

Scene-stealer at the Republican meeting, however, was the decision on whether (and how) to hold a presidential straw vote in connection with the first primary. The GOP also got a look at its statewide candidates and heard an address by its only gubernatorial contender, Dallas oilman Jack Crichton.

Both party committees may see a little action, too, on a proposed liquor-by-the-drink referendum, which reportedly is get-

ting some backing from unexpected places.

**FIRE INSURANCE** — Texas cities with low insured fire losses are to be rewarded by lower rates. State Board of Insurance has set new fire insurance rates to take effect April 1.

Property owners in cities with high insurance losses, however, will have to pay more for insurance in the year ahead.

System allows discounts as high as 25 percent from regular rates for property in cities which have been successful in holding down fire losses. Cities in which high losses have been suffered are charged as much as 15 percent above regular rates.

Board also revised extended coverage rates in the Galveston and Pelican Island areas, and promulgated an optional \$250 deductible applicable to homeowners' policies and standard fire policies.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED** — Appointments by the dozens have been announced by Gov. John Connally.

San Antonio lawyer John Peace, a native of Wharton County, was named to the Texas Public Safety Commission, succeeding C. T. McLaughlin of Snyder.

Connally selected three committees — one of 73 members, another of 21, and a third of five.

The five-member group will study development and use of Texas bays. Members are Dr. Carl J. Lind, Jr., of Houston, Barry Richburg of Pasadena, Stone Wells of Houston, Charles Sowell of Houston, and John Clegg of Port Lavaca.

Judge Herman Jones of Austin was appointed chairman of the 21-member Citizens Advisory Council on Mental Retardation to help with a new state-federal planning program which will bring a \$30,000 grant to Texas.

State Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales is chairman of the steering committee of the Governor's 73-member Committee on Aging.

**DROP-OUT STUDY** — Texas Education Agency will begin the first of a projected series of five pilot programs for school dropouts in the Corpus Christi School District.

District will work with Earl Martin of TEA in (1) direction and planning of special courses for dropouts; (2) assisting in developing part time employment possibilities for pupils who need work to stay in school; and (3) organizing a program of consultation to meet the dropouts' needs.

**TOURING TEXANS** — Two Texas tourists got home from Germany with high hopes they have been successful in interesting Germans in touring Texas.

Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales and Walter Meyer of San Antonio made the trip as official goodwill envoys. They got to Dusseldorf in time for Meyer to ride in a carnival parade in full

cowboy attire. Richter said many German children wear cowboy suits, and they hope to capitalize on their interest in cowboys to perk up Texas tourist business.

**TAX PICTURE BRIGHTENS** — If U.S. Treasury Department slide rule forecasters are right, the federal income tax cut will ease in the revenue raising pressure on the next Legislature.

Treasury department officials say the income tax cut will put more money in circulation, which will mean more spending — and thus more sales taxes.

Furthermore, the federal tax cut is seen by state economists as "encouraging industrial construction and having "an invigorating effect" on the Texas economy in general.

Overall effect could be to drastically alter the state and local tax picture in 1965.

**NEW SCENIC ATTRACTION** — State Highway Commission, which has authorized more than \$128,500,000 worth of road construction in the burgeoning Houston area, discovered a new tourist attraction when a Comal County delegation asked for a 13.9-mile farm-to-market road to connect Interstate Highway 35 with Natural Bridge Caverns and Canyon Dam.

There is no road to Natural Bridge Caverns now. But the delegation elicited excitement from highway commissioners Herb Petry, Jr., of Carrizo Springs, Hal Woodward of Coleman and Jack Kultgen of Waco when they saw natural color photographs of the "live" formations in the caverns, including some "fried-egg" formations.

Commission approved a proposal to build a 9.6-mile farm-to-market road to serve the new Sanford Dam and Lake area in Hutchinson County.

**SHORT SNORTS** — U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough has opened Austin campaign headquarters with Emerson Stone, Jr., of Jacksonville as his statewide campaign manager. Don Yarborough, Democratic candidate for governor, also opened a campaign base here, naming Bill McIntyre of Navasota as his state operations manager. Governor Connally answered State capitol reporters' protest on closed door sessions of his Committee on Education Beyond the High School by saying he doesn't believe in government secrecy, but he defended the right of the committee to hold private meetings. State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported the state spent \$2,300,000,000 in fiscal 1963, and wound up with a net balance of \$219,300,000 Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr said judgments totaling \$493,400 now have been entered against operators of alleged start-hole oil wells. Securities Commissioner William M. King reported securities permits valued at \$28,179,411 were issued in January. Attorney General Carr ruled that a state law (Article 3930) prescribing fees of county clerks is constitutional; but Article 3930-A — covering clerks in counties of 1,200,000 population — is not.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

**Windbreaks**

The purpose of windbreaks are to protect soil resources, control snow deposition, prevent wind damage to farmsteads, to provide shelter for livestock, and food and shelter for wildlife. Field windbreaks are planted in crop fields to help control wind erosion and lessen the drying effect of wind on the soil. They conserve snow moisture needed in low rainfall and high soil areas. Because of the large amount of "edge" in relation to acreage, field windbreaks are especially valuable in providing wildlife cover. They create homes for insect eating birds close to cropland, where they can do the most good. Farmstead windbreaks are planted around farm buildings to protect them from winter wind and snow. Two kinds of windbreaks are used in various parts of the United States. In the prairie areas, shrub-hardwood windbreaks are common; in formerly forested areas, pine windbreaks are used. Both kinds are usually planted at right angles to the prevailing wind. To prepare the ground for planting you should plow and harrow it in the fall, and then harrow it again in the spring. In the Great Plains, you should summer-fallow a year ahead of planting.

Shrub-hardwood windbreaks usually consist of from 4-12 rows. In 4-row windbreaks, the outer 2 rows are shrubs and conifers and the inner 2 are hardwood trees. Windbreaks containing 8 or more rows should have shrubs or conifers in the outer 4 rows.

You should protect all windbreaks from fire and grazing at all times. They should be cultivated regularly the first 2 years in the East and for at least 5 years in the West.

The Donley County SCD will be glad to plan with you on any windbreak plantings or management.

**GCPD in Donley County**

Donley County has vital need for conservation practices such as brush control, range seeding, ponds, terraces, and diversion terraces. This work can be handled quite economically through the Great Plains Conservation Program. Through this program work can be scheduled and organized in respect to the landowner's desires and the land needs.

Work will be cost-shared on the basis of from 50-80% aid depending on the type of practice. The following cost-share rates are available: Grass Seeding - 80%, Terracing, 70%, Wells and Troughs - 50%, Cross Fences 50%, Ponds - 50%, Brush Control - 50%, and many others.

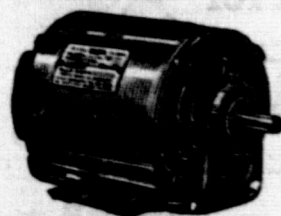

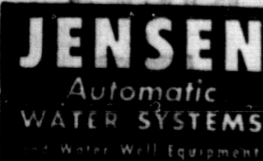

## Cotton Release

Wednesday, March 4, was the last day for farmers to request extra cotton or to release any cotton they didn't plan to plant. 787.1 acres were released by producers in our county. This will be reapportioned in the very near future along with any cotton which may be sent to us from the State Office. Revised notices will be mailed very soon to all who requested cotton.

## 1964 Feed Grain Program

The final date for signing an "Intention to Participate" in the Feed Grain Program is March 27. The program is voluntary and producers participating will be eligible for price support on all the feed they produce. You can divert as little as 20 percent of the feed grain base or any amount up to 50 percent or 25 acres whichever is larger. If as much as 40 percent is diverted, the entire diverted acres payment will be made at the high rate. In addition to being eligible for CCC loan, you will receive a price support payment on your planted grain sorghum. The grain does not have to be placed in the loan to be eligible for this payment. You may use the grain in any way you wish. You can participate on one farm and not participate on another farm — as long as you do not exceed the feed grain base on the non-participating farm. You are not required to stay with your wheat or any other allotment in order to participate in the feed grain program. If you so desire, you may receive one-half of the diversion payment at the time you sign up. If you have any questions concerning the program, please come in and talk with us.
