NEWCOMERS START MONDAY

Registration Schedule
Revealed for Schools

Newcomers in Colorado City will be in grades seven through 12 at this fall will register Monday. The newcomers' registration at Colorado High and Colorado Junior High will be first of a series of pre-school registration dates in August. Monday's registration will be from 9 to 6 p. m. with grades 7 through 9 at Junior High and grades 10 through 12 at Colorado High. However, this early sign-up will be only for those students in the top six grades who are new to the district and entering the local school system this fall. Full registration for Colorado High students is scheduled Aug. 19, 20 and 21. It was erroneously reported in Thursday's Record that seniors would register Aug. 12. Here is a complete calendar for students and parents to check as a school registration guide: Monday, Aug. 10 — 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. registration of students new to Colorado City who will enter top six grades; 7th, 8th and 9th grades at Junior High and 10th, 11th and 12th grades at Senior High. Aug. 19 through 21 — Full registration and scheduling of students at Colorado High, beginning daily at 8:30 a. m. Seniors — Aug. 19; Juniors — Aug. 20; and sophomores — Aug. 21. Aug. 26 — Orientation for teachers. General session at 1:30 p. m. in Colorado High Auditorium for all faculty members. Facilities meet in respective buildings at 3 p. m. Aug. 27 — Fourth, fifth and sixth grade students register from 8:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. at Hutchinson Elementary School. Those new to the school are asked to be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Aug. 27 — Ninth grade registers for schedule at Colorado Junior High from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. Aug. 28 — First, second and third grade students — according to SCHOOLS Pg. 6

AT LONE WOLF MEETING

Coop Speaker Blasts
Legislative Trickery

The lawyer who represents Texas Electric Cooperatives in Austin told members of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperatives Inc. here Tuesday night they must inform themselves, then fight. That is, if they expect to keep their own coop in the long run. Tom Reavley, who doesn't hesitate to tag himself as a prospective candidate for state attorney general, spoke to approximately 1,600 persons. His audience was the membership family of Lone Wolf gathered in their annual meeting in Cooperatorium on State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee). In the same meeting the Lone-Wolf members re-elected three directors to new terms — Gwan C. Strange of Westbrook, representing Area 4 and serving also as the coop board's secretary; treasurer, Martin Murphy of Dunn, representing Area 6; and Linden Solomon, of Cuthbert, representing Area 9. Reavley took verbal aim at the "burial in committee" of House Bill 3 during the last regular session of the Texas Legislature. The Austin attorney said the bill had two major objectives: (1) In rural areas to allow any farmer or rancher to join a coop if he desired and if the cooperative was there. (2) In those cases where electric cooperative, or part of it, is annexed by a town, to let that city decide whether to give the cooperative a franchise to operate only in that area already served by the coop. AFTER EUROPE, ISRAEL TOUR

Next Stop for Bermans: Moscow

A tour which even world travelers dream about is about entering the final stage for Mr. and Mrs. H. I. Berman.

The Colorado City couple, who have been in Europe and the Mediterranean area all summer, are now touring Vienna and Moscow.

After their visit to the Russian capital, they will go to Amsterdam for three days, then to England, where Aug. 20 they will board the luxury liner Queen Elizabeth. The Bermans expect to be back in Colorado City about Sept. 3.

Highlights of their trip were recounted for the Record in a letter this week by Berman, who wrote from Jerusalem a few days before leaving for Vienna and Moscow.

Riviera, Capri Are Lures

"We have seen so many places and things," Berman wrote, "that it would be impossible to list everything in a short air mail letter, but we have had a wonderful time and many experiences."

"In a lot of the countries the people take pride in their ancient historical landmarks, while in others we were shown the amount of progress that has been made since the last war."

"We have seen art galleries with famous paintings and sculptures, have learned much of ancient and medieval history. And, of course, we have also taken in several night clubs, casinos and other entertainment."

At Nice, France, the Bermans relaxed for a few days swimming and "taking in the sunshine on the Riviera." This was followed with more of the same on the Isle of Capri.

Audience With Pope in Rome

"In Rome we had an audience with the Pope," Berman reported, "and for a July 4th celebration we were entertained by the U. S. Ambassador in Paris, France, when he hosted a reception for American tourists."

Something different was entertainment at night by a group of Swiss yodelers high in the scenic mountains of Switzerland.

Change in pace and purpose came in London when the Bermans joined with a group of American rabbis and laymen in a pilgrimage to Israel. However, before

the pilgrimage they attended for a week the 11th Biennial, World Union of Progressive Judaism, where they met distinguished Jewish leaders from over the entire world.

Biblical Places in Israel

"In Israel we are studying the progress that this nation has made in the short time of its existence," Berman informed the Record, "and visiting many places of Biblical interest."

"We saw King Solomon's Mines, Lake Tiberias, Nazareth and many other places mentioned in the Bible. Here in Jerusalem we saw King David's tomb and the room where Jesus held the Last Supper."

There was this one note of apprehension in the Berman's report as they prepared to leave Jerusalem for Vienna and Moscow.

"We have taken 39 rolls of 8mm movies which I hope at least part come out fair. As I'm only an amateur photographer, I'm very skeptical about the pictures."

ON HERBICIDES LAW

Quarantine Chief
In County Parley

Mechanics of state law governing sales and use of hormone-type herbicides will be explained here Monday to Mitchell County Commissioners Court.

Traveling here for the conference will be Charlie Chapman of Austin, chief of the Division of Plant Quarantine, Texas Department of Agriculture.

The conference is scheduled for 10 a. m. in the Courthouse.

Chapman is coming to Colorado City as the result of inquiry made by the court through County Judge Elmer Martin to State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Inquiry concerning local application of the state herbicide regulations came after several complaints about the use of 2-4-D and 2-4-5-T hormone type herbicides in some crop areas of the county.

The state law, now approved by Commissioners Courts for applications in approximately 100 counties of Texas, has special provisions for handling the hormone type herbicides producing physiological change in plant tissue without burning.

These regulations include general requirements, specifications for equipment, requirements for spray operations, types and concentration of

herbicide, rules for dealers and applicators, plus penalties for violating the law in counties where it applies.

The court has made no decision in regard to herbicides regulations. And the conference here Monday is to supply the commissioners with informational data.

YOUR LOCAL

Gardener's Almanack

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles prepared especially for The Record's readers by Colorado City Garden Club in the interest of a more attractive community.)

Now is not too early to plan for winter potted plants.

Cuttings root much better in hot weather than in cool.

Make cuttings from healthy plants, plant them in sand or sandy loam, water them well and they will make strong healthy plants for repotting for winter.

Four inches is a good length for cuttings. Do not water enough to make them soggy.

When tomato plants slow down with their crop, don't pull them up. Instead prune them down to within a few inches of the ground, give them a well-balanced plant food and a good soaking.

New shoots will form and bear tomatoes until frost.

Keep okra pods cut so the plants will keep bearing. After the seeds form and ripen, the plant stops bearing.

Trim the tops off annuals,

so they will bloom better. Cut blooms from crepe myrtles before they go to seed to keep them blooming.

Set the lawn mower blades higher from the ground for mowing during August. Keep the lawn watered and fertilize spots where the grass is thin.

Cut the stems off phlox plants. Give the lateral stems a chance to bloom.

Feed Chrysanthemums liquid manure every 10 days or two weeks.

Our great expectations are now centered in the bed of mums, about to steal the show with their stellar burst of blooms. After the pinchings—back they have been given during the summer, they now have a good spread and will bloom on their

many branches. Many varieties will not send forth crown buds until the second or third week in August. To produce prize-winning blooms, pinch all in-cipient shoots just below the crown buds.

Bells of Ireland have finished blooming and have dried on their stems. Scatter the tiny seeds inside the "bells" and water the ground in which they have been planted.

The little seedlings will thrive all winter and have an early start in the spring.

Rose lovers must be especially vigilant in using proper sprays.

The worst plague is black-spot disease. This is caused by a fungus rather than an insect.

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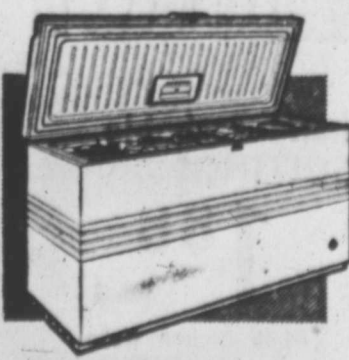


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FOLLOWING MARRIAGE

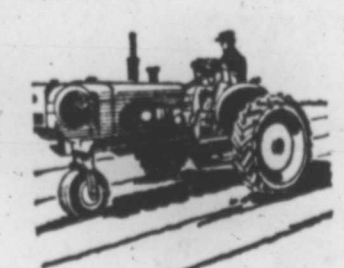

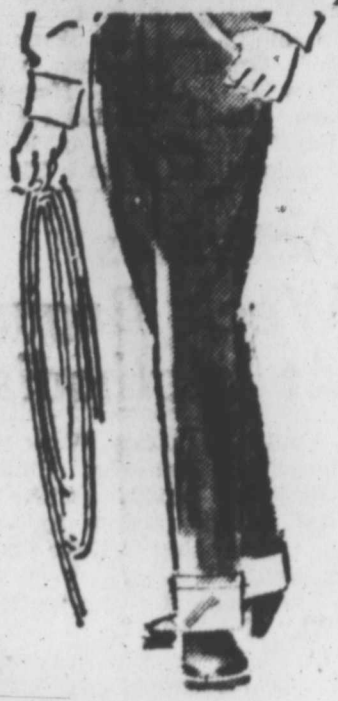

County Files For Cash; Buys Grader

County officials have filed necessary request for approximately \$23,544 in surplus lateral road funds from the state.

Cash from the surplus account is made available each year to counties, subject to request.

Commissioners Court okayed the action in a recent meeting and County Judge Elmer Martin has forwarded necessary papers to Austin.

The money will be available as of Aug. 31.

Commissioners Court has approved purchase of a newly rebuilt Gallion motor grader from Patton Equipment Company of Abilene.

Cost of the machinery is \$9,750. However, trade-in value of \$2,000 for a used grader makes the difference of \$7,750 in the deal.

The attorney said he objected to the "burial" of HB 3 both from a standpoint of fairness within the legislature and also in regard to pressure from power companies.

"I object strenuously," he declared, "for the legislature

meeting any state issue with maneuver, parliamentary trickery and delay.

"All I ask is for the legislature to hear us, then rule on the merits and what is best for the state."

"Especially, do I object to this," the lawyer said, "when those same companies refused to electrify the farms in the first place."

Reavley said all power companies can work together and there was no reason for each to bite and accuse the other.

"But if we are to keep our cooperatives in the long run," he admonished, "our members have to be informed on matters such as these—like HB No. 3, and stand up for our rights."

IN MITCHELL FIELDS

Bollworms Remain Threat to Cotton

(Editor's Note: Following report was prepared for the Record by Texas Extension Service.)

Infestations of most of the cotton insects did not increase to a marked degree over those of a week ago.

While some increases were reported only scattered plantings required control measures in most localities.

Aphids continued to damage late planted cotton in some fields although infestations were generally reported lighter than during the previous week.

Fleahoppers were present in all fields and were reported in heavy infestations in some plantings in Hale, Hockley, and Howard Counties. Heavy infestations were generally found on older cotton.

Bollworms were reported in somewhat larger numbers than a week ago. The worms were present in light infestations in a majority of the fields.

Light to medium infestations were reported in Cochran, Bailey, Dawson, Lynn, Mitchell, Scurry, and Yoakum Counties. Light populations were reported elsewhere.

Since bollworm moths generally prefer tender growth for egg laying, cotton which has been recently irrigated should be checked for eggs and newly hatched worms.

Cabbage loopers and eggs were present in increased numbers in some fields while populations decreased in others. Disease is reducing infestations in some localities while loopers in other plantings show little mortality.

The information contained in the Cotton Insect Situation release has been compiled from reports received from county agents, voc. agri. teachers, personnel of Texas A&M College System, branches of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, commercial cotton inspectors, chemical companies; and others.

Snyder Pastor In Revival at Buford Church

Rev. Mack Cole, pastor of Snyder's First Baptist Church and who just recently returned from a preaching mission in England and a tour of Russia, will conduct revival services this week at Buford Baptist Church.

The revival opens Sunday and will continue through Aug. 16 with services daily at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

Cole, a native of Texas with degrees from Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, served two years in Marine Corps and pastored five other churches in Texas before becoming First Baptist pastor in Snyder.

In 1955 he traveled to Jamaica, British West Indies, for an eight-day evangelistic crusade that resulted in 150 conversions. The same year he visited mission fields in South and Central America.
