Final Gauge Due Mt. Vernon Test In Pettit Sand

The L. C. Moore No. 1 near Mount Vernon produced 144.3 barrels of 37.5 gravity oil on a 24-hour test, the Railroad Commission office in Mount Pleasant reported.

Gas-oil ratio was 200 to 1, the office said. Total depth was 7,266 feet.

Final gauge was being awaited Tuesday on East Texas' latest pool opener, a Pettit line find two miles east of Mount Vernon in Franklin County.

The opener is F. R. Jackson S. H. Killingsworth No. 1 L. Moore, Anna Willis survey, which on preliminary testing pumped and headed at the rate of seven barrels of 38-gravity oil an hour.

The oil yield is coming from 7,010-24 feet. Location is on a Gulf Oil farmout, and Phillips Petroleum and Cities Service hold close acreage.

Show of oil and sour gas is being tested in the Snackover at Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Company No. 1 J. C. Burgess, E. T. Jackson survey, two miles southeast of Maud. The swab test is being made through perforations at 9,125-38 and 9,146.54 feet.

Listed as a wildcat failure 1 1/2 miles northeast of Clarksville is James K. Anderson No. 1 Emma Alice Lewis, Henry Stout survey. Depth was 2,200 feet.

Recent failure in the Buzbee pool area a mile southwest of Bagwell was John B. Stephens and R. E. Moore No. 2 Ed Jones, William Becknell survey. Hole was drilled to 1,810 feet.

One Killed, Four Hurt Car Crash

One man was killed and four others were injured in a 2-car crash three miles west of Mount Pleasant Thursday.

Dead was E. L. Flood, 73-year-old Union Hill farmer.

Flood's wife, Nell, 60, suffered internal injuries.

The other three injured, all Mount Pleasant Negroes, were Matthew White 41, his wife, Janice, 30, and Mrs. Esther Ainsworth, 65.

Investigating authorities said Flood, in a pickup truck, drove onto Highway 49 in the path of the car occupied by the Negroes.

Flood's death was the second in Titus County traffic this year.

Forsyth Given 2 Year Prison Term For Swindling

Tyler. — Mayo Forsyth of Mt. Pleasant, pleaded guilty in federal court to a securities swindle Monday and was sentenced to two years in prison, followed by five years on probation.

Forsyth and Rev. Roy W. Adams of Mt. Pleasant were indicted in Tyler Jan. 15 on charges of fraud in the sale of \$275,000 in stock.

The indictment charged that Forsyth bought 27,000 shares of stock in the now defunct Central Finance Company of Mt. Pleasant at about 35c per share. He was accused of turning large blocks of stock over to Adams, who sold blocks of it at \$10 to \$20 a share to Assembly of God ministers.

Both pleaded innocent at arraignment at Texarkana Feb. 14. Adams will be tried there in the October term of federal court. Forsyth pleaded guilty to two counts of the 10-count indictment. Federal Judge Joe Sheehy dismissed the other counts in the indictment against Forsyth.

The indictment charges Adams told purchasers of the stock that in a short time it would be worth five times the purchase price and soon would pay a 20 per cent cash dividend.

Sheep Shearing Delayed By Rain

Sheep-shearing, underway on ranches in the Bogata area last week, was halted by rainy weather. Wet wool cannot be packed in sacks, hence the delay.

A gasoline-powered machine is being used in local shearing operations. With six drops on the machine's shaft, six sheep can be shorn at the same time. Cecil Lockhart of Grandbury, is owner of the machine and seven Mexican laborers from San Angelo and Ft. Worth assist with the work.

According to William Rozell, Bogata banker and rancher, wool yield is good this year. His lambs and ewes are averaging eight pounds each. Prices though are the lowest in several years, being 35c to 40c per pound, according to grade. However, there is a government subsidy of 62c per pound on wool.

Quite a number of local ranchers go in for sheep raising and interest in the industry continues to grow.

"Boy Scouts will clear their camp site and we expect our troop enrollment of 15 to double within a short time," Tietz stated.

Brown said the man, John Clark, shot his wife twice in the back of the head, using a .32-caliber revolver, as she ran down the back steps of their home in Mount Pleasant. He then returned to the house and shot himself in the right temple, the sheriff reported.

Truck Driver Dies In Burning Cab Following Crash

A contract milk hauler from Blossom, 39-year-old James G. Skidmore, burned to death in the wreckage of his Lamar Creamery truck near Idabel, Okla., Thursday.

Highway Patrolman Bob Pogue yond recognition.

The truck ranged off a rural road near Pollard, Okla., 11 miles southeast of Idabel and crashed into a culvert abutment. Fire broke out almost immediately in the wreckage. The cab of the truck, a 1957 International, was completely destroyed and the bulk milk tank trailer it pulled was a total loss.

The refrigerated bulk milk tank was used to pick up milk from dairies in the Idabel area.

Patrolman Pogue theorizes that Skidmore fell asleep, losing control of the truck. Oklahoma REA officials said one of their power lines was lying across the wrecked truck.

Funeral services for Mr. Skidmore were held Saturday in the Baptist Church at Blossom, with burial in Knights of Honor Cemetery.
