MOTOR RUNS AS SMOOTHLY AS AT FIRST

Plane in Air 120 Hours; Refueled 13 Times.

FORT WORTH, May 24. —After thirteen successful mid-air refuelings and 120 hours in the air, Robbins and James Kelly, Fort Worth endurance aviators, were down on showers at 11:30 a. m. today with the engine of their reconditioned plane hitting as smoothly as when the fliers took off early Sunday.

After flying through rain clouds during the night, the plane passed a 118th hour of continuous flight at 1:33 a. m. The ship was refueled at 6:15 a. m. The motor of the old, reconditioned plane, was still functioning perfectly. The "Fort Worth" if still going, will pass the Question Mark in 33 or 34 hours.

The plane passed the Graf Zeppelin 112 hours. Germany-torpedoed flight at 3 a. m. today. At 11 a. m. it had been in the air more than the ill-fated French plane, Dixmude. The Dixmude was in the skies 118 hours on a record-breaking cruise over the Mediterranean sea.

Part of "Juarez" Leaves Cisco Today

A large portion of Cisco's "Juarez" has departed today, leaving behind a small group of married and unmarried. And they departed with more ease than one might load up his automobile and drive out of the city upon the highway. A Texas and Pacific freight engine simply backed up to a string of cars, coupled on and pulled the entire outfit out of the city to a new destination.

For several weeks the Texas and Pacific work train with its track surfacing and dressing gangs engaged in laying new steel on the railroad's main line, had been located in Cisco. The 125 people in the contingent lived, ate and slept in their cars, setting temporary steps from the doorways, buying their provisions from a commissary which in turn purchased from a local wholesale house, the entire community of these nomads of the railroad presided over by a chief in the person of the Mexican foreman. This foreman lived with the train and operated a cook car for the benefit of such of the laborers who possessed no wives. He was a Mexican because experience has proved that Mexicans will not work satisfactorily under the direction of an American.

The train is being moved to a point on the Rio Grande division of the railroad which begins at Baird. Laying of the new 110 pound steel has been completed past Baird.

Moody Will Not Submit Civil Service Bill to Second Session of Texas Legislature He Says

AUSTIN, May 24. — Governor Moody will not submit civil service legislation to the second session of the Texas legislature. Instead he will sign the bill passed at the first called session establishing the office of state auditor-efficiency expert.

"This bill accomplishes all that civil service would do," Governor Moody said this morning. "In some respects it is better. The efficiency of each employee will be reported under it to the department head, the legislature and the governor. The bill is the best one passed by the session which has just ended."

The governor said he had not decided whom he will appoint to the post created by the bill. It pays \$7,500 a year. Under the bill the governor predicts the state will save \$100,000 a year.

The governor announced also that he will let the board of education bill and two others with faculty captions go without signature in the expectation that the second called session will correct them.

Governor Moody this morning signed the bill increasing the prestige of state auditor-efficiency expert and providing that three members and providing that three members shall automatically become eligible for a parole after serving minimum sentences with good conduct.

MINISTER IS NEAR DEATH IN ACCIDENT

Five Other Persons Also Injured at Breckenridge.

BRECKENRIDGE, May 24.—The Rev. E. P. Roe, pastor of the Oklahoma City Washington Avenue Baptist church, was in a serious condition in a local hospital today, suffering from a fractured skull and internal injuries sustained in an automobile accident near here late yesterday.

Five other persons who were accompanying the minister, also were injured, some seriously, when the car overturned twice in a ditch.

Rev. Roe's father, Rev. R. W. Roe, retired minister of Snyder, Texas, received severe cuts and bruises. Mrs. N. J. Talley, sister of the young minister, received possibly serious internal injuries, as did Mrs. E. P. Roe. Two children escaped with minor bruises.

The party was en route to Oklahoma City from Snyder when the accident occurred.

BOY, 6, TRIED ON CHARGE OF MURDER

PAINTSVILLE, Ky., May 24. —His childish mind unable to grasp the seriousness of his case, Carl Mahan, 6, returned to court today while arguments continued on whether he must go to the reformatory to serve 15 years for killing his playmate, Cecil Van Hoose, 8.

Carl shot Cecil with a shotgun after the two engaged in a quarrel over a piece of scrap iron. Cecil died with 17 shots in his small body.

Yesterday a jury decided that the 6-year-old boy knew what he was doing when he ran into his home, climbed up on a chair and took down his father's shotgun to shoot his chum. Accordingly the jury recommended that Carl be found guilty of manslaughter.

NEW BRIDGE OVER BRAZOS TO BE ASKED

The Texas Truck Owners association, according to a letter to the Cisco chamber of commerce, is instituting a movement for the construction of a new bridge on highway No. 1 over the Brazos river just west of Mineral Wells.

The letter was written by William T. Wheeler, vice-president and general manager of the association, who said that the bridge has been declared in a dangerous condition by George Wickline, bridge engineer of the state highway department. Wheeler said that the department is taking every precaution to safeguard the bridge by limiting the loads over it.

He also said that Mr. Wickline explained the condition of the crossing to be such that it is impracticable to strengthen it and that the engineer will recommend the construction of a new 30-foot bridge.

CLEMENTS PARDONED

According to a dispatch from Austin this afternoon Governor Moody issued a pardon to H. A. (Cork) Clements today. Clements, a former Ciscoan and a brother of Joe Clements of this city, has already served two years of a five-year sentence imposed upon him for a crime of which he was falsely accused.

SAYS SENATE ACTION MOVE TO INTIMIDATE

WASHINGTON, May 24. — The action of the senate rules committee in barring the United Press from the senate floor was in reality an attempt to intimidate the press associations and Washington correspondents, the Washington Star, published by Frank B. Noyes, president of the Associated Press, said editorially.

"The senate committee on rules has confused what it considers a matter of courtesy with the right of newspapers to publish legitimate news," the Star editorial said. "If its course is persisted in, it is a first step in censorship. Its action in denying a press association and its correspondents floor privileges is in reality an effort to intimidate; to throw the fear of the senate into the news-gathering organizations and the press galleries."

The senate rule does not undertake to punish a newspaper which publishes an account of the secret proceedings of the senate. Such an effort would, indeed, be a clear violation of the right of free speech and free press in this country.

WORK IS BEGUN ON ROADBED OF HIGHWAY NO. 23

RISING STAR, May 24. —Following an agreement reached with the highway commission the past week the work of scarifying the roadbed from Rising Star to a point one mile north of Romney on highway No. 23 is to be done under the supervision of Commissioner Tom Poe of this district. This according to Mr. Poe was done on account of the fact that the state did not have the proper equipment available and also to expedite the work of re-surfacing the road as rapidly as possible.

The big scarifier in charge of the precinct road crew began work this morning and the work will be rushed to completion.

Mr. Poe said that the road would not be closed only possibly a mile at a time and that the lateral roads were now in such condition that it would be little inconvenience to the public to make the short detours necessary.

BIG WHISKEY CATCH

AMARILLO, May 24.—More than five hundred gallons of whiskey, a large quantity of beer and mash, and a 250 gallon still in full operation was seized by federal officers in a raid on an oil driller's shack northwest of Borger. Three men were arrested.

HOLD UP BANK MESSENGER ON MAIN STREET

Escape After Exchanging Shots With Police.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 24.—Three bandits, operating with old time frontier daring, today held up a bank messenger in a main street of Oklahoma City, robbed him of about \$80,000 and escaped out of town after exchanging several shots with police.

C. H. Dowell, the bank messenger, was driving in a motor car from the branch of the Federal reserve bank to the American First National bank, carrying a bag of money, when the robbers crowded him to the curb. They, too, were in an automobile.

In suppressing Dowell and getting the money pouch, they shot him in the arm. Dowell was taken to a hospital.

The attack and robbery occurred at a busy downtown street intersection, the holdup men sweeping down on the pay roll car with all the dash of earlier bad men who once rode in from the hills in Oklahoma and Indian Territory to harass and rob the citizenry.

Dowell said the trio attacked him viciously before they grabbed the money and started their escape.

Deputy sheriffs in a police car followed the bandits for several blocks through city streets. They fired at the fugitives, but so far as is known none of the shots hit their mark. The officers continued their chase but an hour after the robbery, which occurred at 10:15 a. m., they had not overtaken the trio.

Negro Walks Calmly to Electric Chair

HUNTSVILLE, May 24.—Walking calmly to his death, Silas Jarman, 17-year-old negro, was electrocuted at Huntsville prison shortly after midnight for the brutal attack on Mrs. R. A. Hassenflug in Cooke county on Oct. 8, 1928. Prison officials pronounced him dead at 12:18 a. m.

Before starting on the death march, Jarman bid goodbye to seven other prisoners in the row. As he took his place in the chair he admitted striking Mrs. Hassenflug with a knife and stealing her \$100.

Jarman was convicted in Grayson county on a charge of robbery with firearms and given the death penalty.

CROSS PLAINS, May 24.—Members of the towns of Cross Plains and Rising Star have completed the organization of the "Phil-pe-co Country club" midway between the two places. These will be seeded out as they grow and placed in the lake to replenish those caught. There are many ducks on the lake almost the year around and great sport is promised the hunters in the fall.

Sand is being hauled and an artificial beach made on the south-east side of the lake. Bath houses will be constructed within a very short time.

The club has also completed two double tennis courts and are laying off the grounds for croquet courts. The professionals of Coleman and Sweetwater have been secured and are spending their time in the lake giving instructions to new members. The golf course was laid out and the work supervised by Harry H. Nichols, golf professional of Coleman.

The club is incorporated under the name of the "Phil-pe-co Country club" and its name so chosen because of the courtesy of the Phillips Petroleum company in granting a lease on its property which includes a 65 acre lake, a boosting station, and a refining plant.
