PLAINVIEW (Special) --The sponsor an air show at the Hale County Airport in Plainview, Sept. 8.

Social Security Service Offered For Abernathy

Abernathy will have local social security service on a regular basis once a month. Maudie King, social security officer in charge in Plainview, has announced.

A representative from the Plainview social security office will provide assistance and information in the City Hall in Abernathy Tuesday morning of Sept. 17 and regular service will be provided there during the morning of the third Tuesday of each month thereafter. The service and information will be comparable to that rendered in any social security office.

Three Counties

Abernathy is about 30 miles from the Plainview social security office which serves all residents whose addresses are in Hale County, as well as Floyd and Motley Counties. Since the post office in Abernathy is in Hale County all people who receive their mail through Abernathy, even those who actually live in Lubbock County, in town and on rural routes, are served by the Plainview office.

Residents of Petersburg who want to avail themselves of this service will save several miles on a trip for social security help.

The regular service in the Plainview office will not be restricted because of this extended effort to reach the people more effectively. Anyone who prefers to go to the Plainview office may drop in at any time from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday, except national holidays. The address is 1401-B West 5th St.

GROUP FORMS IN SUPPORT OF D. STRICKLAND

A group of Democrats, Independents and Republicans, at an organizational meeting Tuesday, announced plans to help elect DeJuan Strickland of Plainview to the State House of Representatives. A campaign headquarters will be opened in Plainview at 600 Broadway Thursday to coordinate the campaign activities. A brief program will be presented at 8:00 p.m. The public is invited.

Herman Graham, an Independent, and an area businessman, was elected as chairman of the non-partisan organization. He said DeJuan would be "an effective spokesman who understands the problems and needs of our district."

"I am concerned about our country's need for law and order and responsible government spending," said Herman Graham. "If we want a change, we must actively support men like DeJuan Strickland who are not part of the current political machine."

Strickland, who is running for the 78th District seat, pledged a vigorous grass-roots campaign to meet the citizens of the district.

"Effectiveness in the Legislature is based on the ability of a man to work for his district's best interests and be independent to vote his convictions," said Strickland.

"Most importantly, we must watchdog our state's spending, so that the citizen's paycheck is not whittled away by an unnecessary tax burden."

"Inflation is hitting everybody hard, and there seems to be a genuine feeling that we're going to have to budget within our means to avoid further tax increases, such as the sales tax hike effective in October."

"The Legislature must develop priorities on spending. I'm particularly concerned about developing water resources, industrial growth and improvement of education."

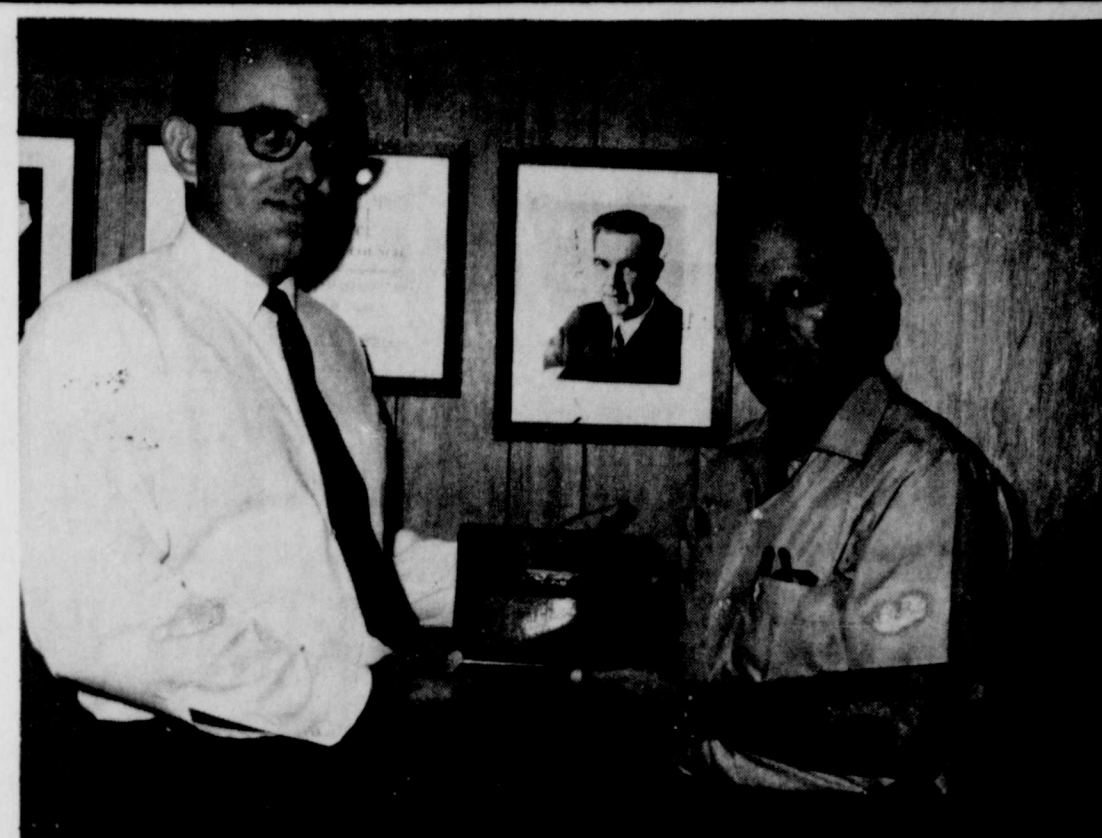
"I belong to no cliques or party machines."

Strickland, 34, farms in Hale and Floyd Counties and is a graduate of Lockney High School. He attended the University of Minnesota and Wayland College in Plainview. He is a veteran of the army with two years of service.

A high school football star in the 1950's, Strickland is past president of the Plainview Toastmasters. He is a member of the Community Concert Association and is a Kiwanian.

Strickland is a member of the Board of the Hale County Noxious Weed Program and was selected as the "Outstanding Weed Control Farmer Of The Year" in 1965.

He and his wife, the former Judy Graham, have three children, Michael DeJuan, 4; Karen Gail, 2 and Deidi Ann, 2 mos. They live at 1405 Zephyr in Plainview.

Atwood To Be Speaker At WBC Dedication

J. L. Atwood, president and chief executive officer of the North American Rockwell Corp. is to deliver the address in ceremonies dedicating the Haral Memorial Auditorium on the Wayland College campus Sept. 8.

Atwood is the son of a former president of Wayland College, the late E. B. Atwood, president from 1918 until 1923.

The \$500,000 Haral Memorial Auditorium will be dedicated in ceremonies starting at 2:30 p.m. The program will be the first in a series of four gatherings during the week of Sept. 8 marking opening of the auditorium provided with funds donated by Mrs. John L. Haral, Abernathy, former student and former faculty member at Wayland.

Attended WBC

Atwood was a student at Wayland while his father was president of the college. He did three years of high school study at the college and then finished the two years of junior college study.

The Wayland alumnus, for the past several years a resident of California, has distinguished himself in the field of aviation and has had numerous honors conferred upon him.

In 1960, Atwood received the Distinguished Engineering Graduate Award from the University of Texas. Prior to that time he was an airplane engineer with the Army Air Corps and design engineer with Douglas Aircraft Co. in Santa Monica, Calif.

HAVENS RESIGNS POST AT RALLS

Richard Havens, formerly of Abernathy, in mid-August tendered his resignation as editor of the Ralls Banner to become a special agent for Farm Bureau Insurance in Crosby and Dickens Counties. Havens will work out of the Farm Bureau office in Ralls. The Havens family will continue to reside four miles west and two miles north of Ralls, on an acreage where he is in the hog raising business.

On August 31, Roy Craig of Stamford, owner of the Ralls Banner, sold the newspaper to Afton E. Richards of Jayton, who will be the publisher. Richards was publisher of the old Anton News, now defunct, before going to Jayton. Mrs. Vicki Havens will continue working in the Banner office until the Richards family becomes acquainted with operations of the Ralls newspaper. Richard Havens is a former editor of The Review, and was employed at Tuco before going to Ralls about three years ago.

Atwood joined North American Aviation, Inc., in 1934 as chief engineer and vice president, became assistant general manager in 1938 and first vice president in 1941. He was elected president of North American Aviation in 1948. He received further promotions before being elected president and chief executive officer of North American Rockwell Corp. When that organization was formed by merger of NAA and Rockwell Standard Corp. in 1967.

He is a director of the Los Angeles Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, Pacific Indemnity Co., Times Mirror Co., the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States and the California Chamber of Commerce.

He has received numerous honors, among them the Presidential Certificate of Merit for contributions of World War II effort and the National Urban League Equal Opportunity Day Award.

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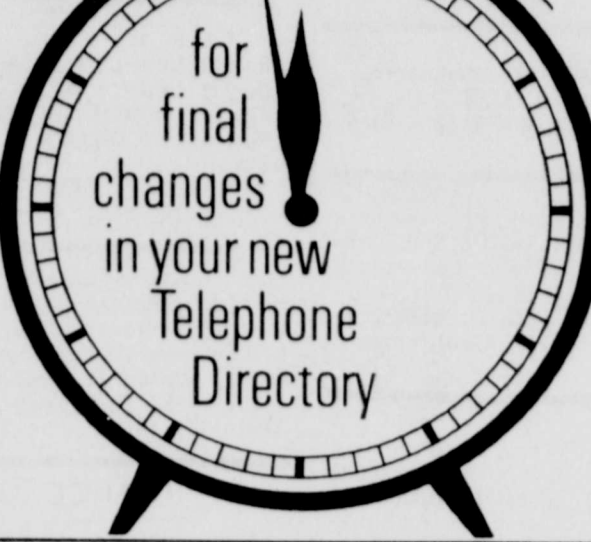

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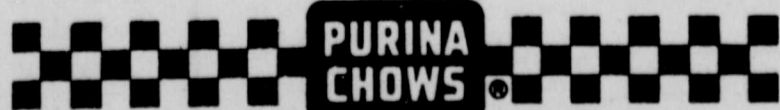

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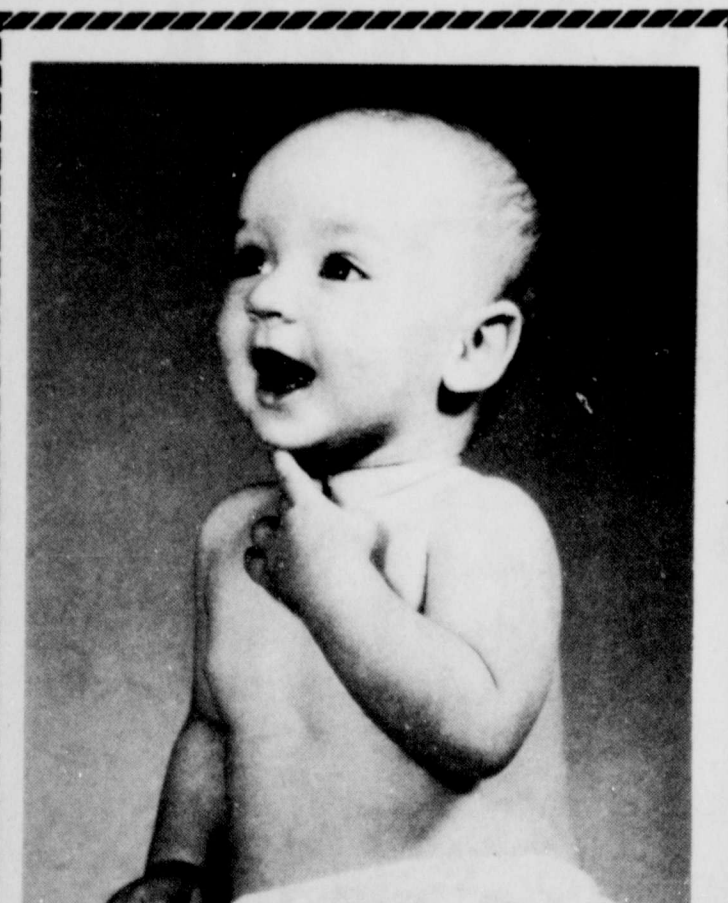
