PANTELLERIA SURRENDERS TO ALLIES

RUSSIANS STAGE COME BACK AFTER HARD FIGHTING NAZI BREAK RED LINE AT ROSTOV

Speculation was that this might be the forerunner of an intensive German summer campaign to break the hold of the Reds

LONDON, June 11.—In what appeared to be a serious threat to the Russian gateway to the Caucasus at Rostov, thousands of Germans smashed advance Red lines Thursday, in a sudden push by tanks and planes, but the Soviets regained the situation, Moscow announced early today.

The Germans used a full regiment, from 3,000 to 5,000 men, in this attack which temporarily overran Soviet out-post detachments, but the midnight communique said they were later thrown back by a Red army counterblow and lost 300 men, five tanks and two planes.

There was no immediate indication whether this was a forerunner of the expected large-scale German summer offensive which is considered overdue. The action occurred somewhere between Rostov and Taganrog, thirty-five miles to the west. It is in this area that the Germans hold their deepest penetration inside Russia. The sector also is important as a supporting operation for those German troops still clinging to the Kuban bridgehead of the Caucasus, across the sea of Azov from Taganrog.

A German radio commentator, Lt. Gen. Kurt Dietmar, said Thursday night in a Berlin broadcast that German troop dispositions in Russia now offered a platform for operations of offensive tendency.

Front Puts on Fat
In this was an obvious hint that the German now had stabilized their lines, filled in gaps with replacements and moved up equipment.

"The front in the east has put on fat again" was the way he expressed it—meaning that both sides have gained needed rest from the exhausting winter campaigns and probably intend to deal a big blow under the most favorable conditions.

Air warfare by both the Germans and Russians continued. A Moscow broadcast said large forces of Russian bombers inflicted heavy losses on the enemy in attacking five German airdromes Wednesday night and acknowledged a German raid there on Yaroslavl, 150 miles north east of Moscow, the same night in which an undisclosed number of casualties occurred and dwellings were destroyed.

Earlier the German high command had said its planes left large fires at Yaroslavl on the

INFORMATION ON SALVAGE OF SCRAP GIVEN

Mayor J. J. Kelly has assembled some information with reference to the salvage of scrap of various kinds, as furnished by the War Production Board and presents it here for the convenience of the citizens of Ranger.

Scrap Iron

The efforts of the country as a whole last year brought the mills supply of scrap iron up from a bare three day supply to a reasonable safe position at the present time. There is not now any definite plans on gathering of scrap iron except that in connection with the Army's salvage program. The Army is now sending out salvage units over the state, and we want to give them our full co-operation when they are in our community.

Copper, Brass and Bronze

These metals are at the top of the list of critical metals necessary to the War Production Program. We understand at the present that there will be a nationwide copper drive, within the next thirty days. Full plans are now being prepared and you will be notified of the date. At that time we ask your full cooperation.

Tin Cans

The tin can collection program has not been definitely outlined yet, but a consistent method of saving your old cans, so that they can be picked up when the program is under way is very desirable. Tin cans are used for the production of copper, and in as much as copper production is 25 per cent short of the requirements of the war production program, you can see that it is going to require our best efforts. It is possible to make up 10 per cent of this shortage in copper production with tin can salvage. A ton of cans will produce enough copper to manufacture a Flying Fortress.

Waste Household Fats

The waste household fats program, is still far from satisfactory. Recent reports show that we have done only a 40 per cent job in Texas. Texas cannot and will not be satisfied with a 40 per cent job on anything connected with winning the war. We most earnestly appeal to you housewives and butchers to religiously save your waste fats. If every housewife saved a tablespoon full of waste fats each day we could salvage 200,000,000 pounds of waste fats in the U. S. each year, which would eliminate our glycerine shortage.

Silk and Nylon Hosiery

This material is urgently needed, and at this time it seems likely that we will be compelled to conduct a special week for gathering such materials to meet the most urgent needs of the War Production Program, using these materials.

Collapsible Tubes

Many requests have come in for information as to where to ship collapsible tubes such as tooth paste tubes, etc. These should be shipped to the Tin Salvage Institute, 411 Wilson Ave., Newark, New Jersey, in minimum shipments of 5 lbs., transportation charges collect.

The Above Information Has

been passed to us by the War Production Board, and we urge that you put every possible effort into the conservation of all the above metals and materials in order to be sure last our factories continue to produce the ammunition and other equipment which must be furnished to our fighting forces, in order to win the war at all, and let us remember that the sooner they have this equipment the sooner the war will end.

LABOR UNIONS, RECORD SALE OPERATOR OF PLANT SCORED

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UP)—Sen. Harry S. Truman Thursday condemned both labor and management at the Sunflower Ordnance Plant under construction near here and said his worst fears had been confirmed regarding inefficient and costly construction practices.

"There has been some shooting in the back of soldiers," he said, "and the War Department has accepted my recommendation that all contracts there be renegotiated."

Truman's caustic comment followed a two-day hearing of his investigating committee which ended Wednesday.

At the hearing it was brought out that the ordnance works, which originally was to have cost an estimated \$48,000,000, was actually costing \$129,000,000.

Truman also chastised many Army engineers on duty at the project, saying: "I don't think the army did their duty."

Honor Roll of War Workers Is Being Displayed

An attractive Honor Roll is being displayed in the window at the Red Cross Surgical dressings room on Main Street and lists all the workers with stars to indicate the number of hours put in at the room.

Blue stars indicate workers who have given a hundred hours to the work and smaller red stars indicate each 25 hours of work. Nine workers have worked at least 100 hours.

FIRST SUCH FORMIDABLE OBJECTIVE TO BE TAKEN BY ALLIED AIR POWER

PAY AS YOU GO APPROVED BY THE PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The long-fought over pay-as-you-go tax bill has received the signature of the president and will go into effect July 1. Announcement of the signing of the bill came on the heels of the president's request for an additional 16 billion dollars in revenue for this year.

The measure approved by the President is the compromise worked out by Senate and House after Mr. Roosevelt announced he would not sign the Senate's Ruml-like bill granting abatement of a full year's taxes to virtually all of the nation's 44,000,000 individual income tax payers.

The new law grants no relief from the quarterly tax installment due next Thursday on 1942 tax liabilities. It does, however, give 75 per cent to 100 per cent abatement on either 1942 or 1943 taxes, and sets up a 20 per cent withholding levy against wages and salaries, starting July 1.

The Treasury was reported to have presented to James F. Byrnes, War Mobilization Director, a comprehensive program covering Mr. Roosevelt's sixteen-billion dollar request. Informants who did not wish to be identified said the program centers on a spending tax and includes excise levies and suggestions for increasing individual and corporate income taxes.

Byrnes met with Randolph Paul, Treasury counsel; Harold D. Smith, Budget Director, and Fred M. Vinson, Director of Economic Stabilization.

The abatement section of the bill provides:

1. Each taxpayer owing up to \$50 in taxes for the one year (1942 or 1943) in which he had the smaller taxable income will get 100 per cent abatement.
2. Persons whose abatement year tax bill is between \$50 and \$66.67 get a flat \$50 abatement.
3. All taxpayers with an abatement year bill over \$66.67 receive a deduction of 75 per cent, with the remaining 25 per cent to be paid half on March 5, 1944, and half March 15, 1945, in addition to current taxes. Similarly the taxpayers in the class between \$50 and \$66.67 pay off their remaining small obligation in two installments.

In all cases the abatement occurs in the one year (1942 or 1943) in which the taxpayer had the smaller income, and if 1943 is the abatement year, the 1942 obligation becomes the liability for 1943.

Miners Protest \$1 A Day Fine

WASHINGTON (UP)—The United Mine Workers, threatening a new strike in protest against the \$1 a day fines for last week's stoppage, still hope to negotiate a settlement of their dispute with mine operators on the basis of the tentative agreement with Central Pennsylvania operators, a union spokesman said today.

House Adopts The Anti-Strike Bill

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House today adopted a drastic anti-strike bill which, if enacted, would make it legally possible to send John L. Lewis to jail in event of another coal strike.

Fall of island inspires President Roosevelt to call upon Italians to oust dictators, get out of war

Reduced to impotence by nearly three weeks of aerial bombardment, the Italian island fortress of Pantelleria surrendered to the Allies today, the first case in history of an objective so formidable being knocked out by air power.

The capitulation of the Mediterranean island inspired President Roosevelt to call again on the Italian people to overthrow the Fascist dictators and get out of the war.

In London the surrender was hailed as demonstrating the overwhelming superiority of Allied air power in the Mediterranean and confirming the belief that the morale of the Axis forces in that area has deteriorated.

Pantelleria's surrender gave the Allies a new springboard to Sicily and the continent. As soon as the Italian garrison raised the white flag, Allied ground forces began the occupation of the island.

MINERAL WELLS, Texas

June 10.—With high-ranking Army officials and industrial leaders in attendance, a new \$100,000 steel plant designed to convert scrap metal collected from the public into high-grade steel bars for essential armament will formally open Friday.

Newscam cameramen will be present to shoot films of the ceremony and to trace the process by which an old cook stove is transformed from a junk heap item to a finished bar of steel.

The plant, erected west of Mineral Wells, will be operated by the Bateman Steel Company, of which W. W. Bateman, local civic leader, is president. In construction of the plant, local capital was augmented by a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation after leading Mineral Wells citizens had interested Chairman Donald Nelson of the War Production Board in the project.

Scrap to feed the plant was collected by the salvage collecting detachment from near-by Camp Wolters.

Heading the Army delegation to attend the opening ceremonies will be Major Gen. Richard Donovan, commanding General of the Eighth Service Command at Dallas. Officials of North American Aviation, Inc., also of Dallas, also will take part in the program.

The program may be heard locally over Station KGKO P.M. Worth and Dallas from 2:15 p.m. to 3 p.m. Exalted Ruler E. F. Arterburn of Ranger Lodge No. 1373 in discussing The Salute to the Elks asked that all members and their families listen to the program which will originate this Sunday from Station KECA at Los Angeles, California.

The subject of the discussion will be, "Is Time on Japan's Side?" The speaker will be Major General Paul P. Malone, radio commentator and international authority on the Far East; "Singapore Joe" Fisher, celebrated Far Eastern lecturer and former member of the Singapore Defense Council, and Major Alexander P. DeSeversky, author of "Victory Through Air Power."

RABAU RAIDED THURSDAY BY ALLIED PLANES

Allied Headquarters in Australia, June 11 (UP)—Rabaul, New Britain felt the sting of Allied attack Thursday, when forty tons of bombs were loosed by bombers on the air base and ship ping base held by the Japs.

The raid on the base which is situated on the northern tip of New Britain, and 500 miles north east of the Allied base of Port Moresby, New Guinea, lasted for three full hours.

Many resultant fires were believed to be burning. Hits also were scored on ammunition dumps in the raid, made just before dawn.

It was the heaviest raid on Rabaul since one on March 23 when fifty-four tons of bombs were dropped on that base.

Friday's communique also reported that a Liberator flying over the MacCuer Gulf of Dutch New Guinea bombed a 4,000-ton Japanese cargo ship, damaging it and leaving it motionless.

The ship was entering Kokas Harbor when near mines by 500 pound bombs were scored off its stern.

The tonnage dropped on the Rabaul sector included high explosives, fragmentation and incendiary bombs, lakuna, Vunakana and Rapopo airdromes were the targets. One thousand pound bombs caused violent explosions which indicated hits on ammunition dumps. Some of the fires started could be seen for fifty miles away.

THERE is much more than meets the eye in John L. Lewis's application to take the United Mine Workers back into the American Federation of Labor, and perhaps the only man in the country who really sees all the implications is John L. himself, who hasn't missed a trick in the last three months of his intricate play for the highest of stakes.

Informed labor politicians who keep close track of the involved ins-and-outs of the labor movement see in this latest Lewis move the boldest bid for power, the most spectacular card ever thrown on the table in the last 10 or a dozen years.

The obvious items of significance have already been pointed out:

It is a play to strengthen the hand of John L. Lewis.

It is a move to make the A. F. of L. the dominant labor movement in the country.

It offers an opportunity for the retirement of William Green as president of the American Federation of Labor.

An attempt has been made to build up a case of political significance from this move, by charging that Lewis, a Roosevelt supporter, might try to swing the A. F. of L. into the Republican camp.

THE real significance of the Lewis move back into the A. F. of L. is really twofold:

1. This marks the renewal of warfare between Lewis and the C. I. O.
2. It presents the opportunity to clean house and get rid of the fringe of racketeering labor leaders who have cluttered up the A. F. of L. directorate for years.

With regard to this second point, it has been generally forgotten that the tremendously strong Machinists' Union has signified its desire to withdraw from the A. F. of L. and is now conducting a poll of its membership on this question. The poll will be completed within the next few weeks. While the result is problematical, the underlying reason for the machinists' desire to withdraw has been dissatisfaction with the leadership in other A. F. of L. unions and the questionable policies which they have countenanced and encouraged.

WARFARE between Lewis—with the A. F. of L. at his back—and the C. I. O. may become extremely bitter. Some few labor leaders will even go so far as to say that the reunion of Lewis with the A. F. of L. will mark the end of the C. I. O. That is doubtful.

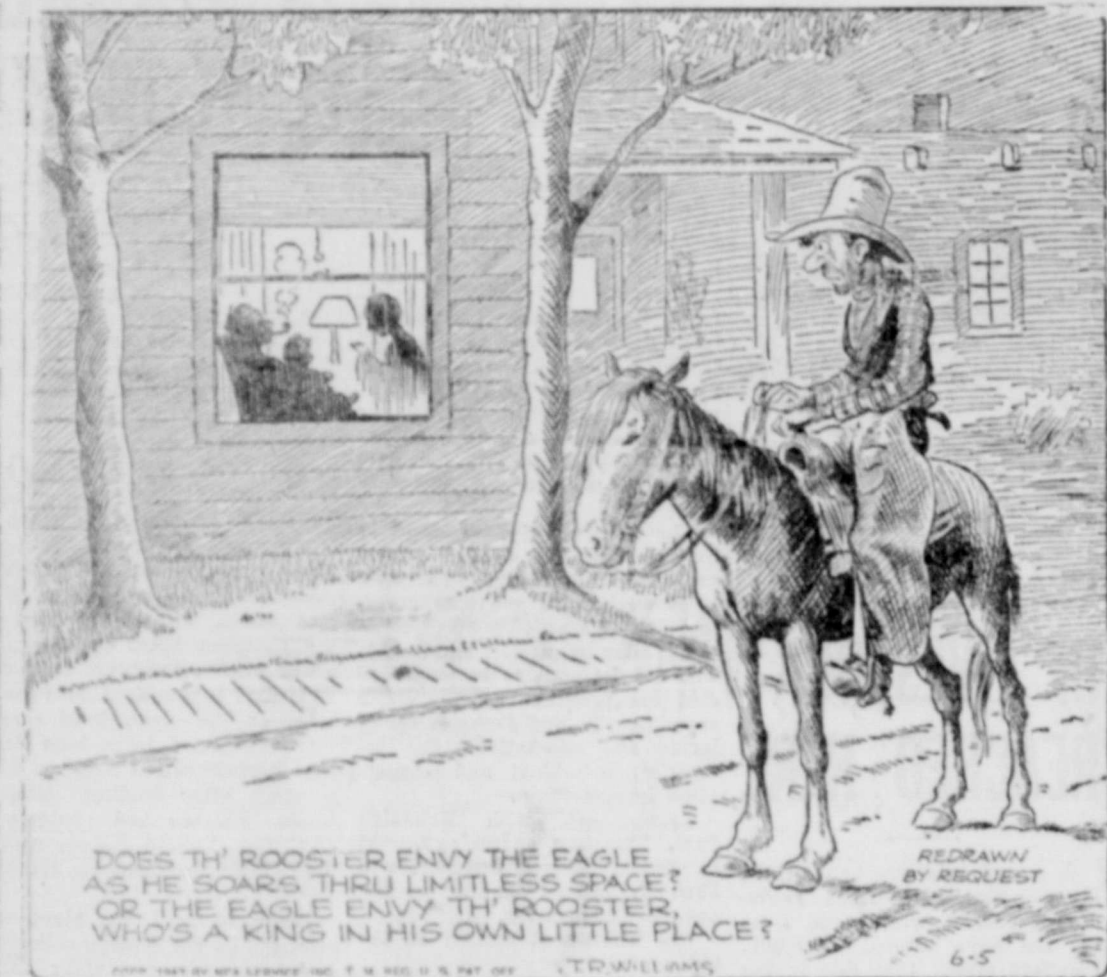
What is not generally known, however, is that within the C. I. O. leadership there is a strong element which is still loyal to John L. Lewis, the man who founded their movement and set them up in business. The older leaders in the U. A. W. have not forgotten that it was Lewis who won them their original big gains.

Loyal C. I. O. leaders fear and hate Lewis, and denounce him bitterly. But if other of the original C. I. O. unions should decide to follow Lewis and the Mine Workers back into the A. F. of L., the C. I. O. might be seriously weakened. It might conceivably develop that the A. F. of L. would emerge with a membership of some ten million members, giving it dominance. That way also might the eventual labor organic unity and peace. With a throne at the top reserved for "peace-maker" John L. Lewis, of course.
