Rains and Winds Damage in Kansas

WICHITA, Kans., June 3.—Terrorful rains and tornado-like winds swept this section of Kansas during the night causing heavy damage. Airplanes and buildings were wrecked at two Wichita airports and a loss estimated at \$200,000. Rains, which were general, caused damage to the record wheat crop. The municipal airport and the Swallow Airport were the hardest hit.

HIGH WIND AT MILES DOES SLIGHT DAMAGE

High wind at Miles last night did some damage to property in town and north of town. The roof was blown from a shed adjoining the ice plant and cut several lines belonging to the West Texas Utilities Company and broke one pole. Many houses and sheds were blown from their foundations north of the city with some damage to crops, but no loss of life or injuries were reported. A check of the damage was not obtainable this morning, however.

Samples of New Bills Are Received Here

Four bills of the new size money were on display at the Ledger office this morning by E. D. Walker of the Ballinger State Bank. These bills were in denominations of ones to tens, including a two dollar bill. These bills are smaller than the old ones and measure six and one-eighth inches by two and five-eighths, as compared to seven and three-eighths by three and one-fourth inches on the old bills. The new ones are one-third smaller than the old ones, and carry several features not included on the old ones.

These new bills will go into circulation the first of July and the old ones will be called in as soon as possible. All members of the Federal Reserve System have received samples of the new currency.

KIDNAPPING CASES ROUSE WRATH OF THE FRENCH

PARIS, June 3.—The next American millionaire who "kidnaps" his own children in France will find himself in trouble.

Justice withheld action when Frank O. Woodward, American jelly king, drove up to a private school in the Paris district, picked up his son and daughter, and rushed them back to New York, where he intended to sue for divorce.

Where he succeeded Professor Jean Coret, a Frenchman, has failed. Not only were his two children kidnapped by Mme. Coret in London, where he had taken them, but the professor was sentenced to default to eight months imprisonment and fined \$800.

Woodward merely used the direct method of taking the children and depending solely on speedy transportation to carry them out of the country.

Prof. Coret was more intriguing. Foreseeing that Mme. Coret would give pursuit when three hirelings snatched the children from her on the sidewalk he had a woman friend decoy the wife by coming up with an automobile and offering to help her.

Mme. Coret kept up the chase, broke into her husband's house in London with two detectives, took back the children and returned with them to Paris where she preferred charges.

NEW SIAMESE TWINS HALE AND HEARTY

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 3.—Despite the handicaps imposed on them by Mother Nature, Juanita Fae and Wanda Fae, "Siamese twins" born April 30 to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lenz, who live on a farm twelve miles southwest of this city, are hale and hearty and now are expected to live and grow, providing disease does not cut them down.

The twins, the second example of the Ischiopagi type to survive birth, according to records of the American Medical Association, are patients at the Methodist Memorial Hospital here and are being given every care. Nurses are at their bedside constantly and local physicians are giving freely of their time to insure their continued healthy growth.

A prominent Mattoon physician predicts they will live.

The only other pair of twins like the ones born here, as far as research through musty files of the American Medical Association discloses, to survive birth, were a pair born in South Bend, Ind., in 1926. One of these twins died at the age of 4 months after contracting pneumonia and the other twin died a few hours later.

J. Lonberger Davis, chairman of the Board of the Security National Bank of St. Louis, says:

That the present credit situation, which is being discussed throughout this country and the rest of the world is puzzling because the fundamental principles are not kept in mind.

Money is only a symbol. People really borrow things. If one borrows a thing which he uses productively and profitably, the use of credit is legitimate. If, however, one borrows a thing which he cannot or does not use productively and profitably, credit is abused. Most of the present credit strin-

gency and high rates of interest are due to the hope of speculators that they can borrow securities and sell them later at a profit which will be sufficient to pay high carrying charges and leave to the borrower riches which he has not earned.

Tulip speculators in Holland, commodity speculators in 1920, gamblers in Florida lands during the boom two or three years ago, all suffered from the same delusion.

We are told by hopeful security salesmen that "we are living in a new era," but, whether we are or not, laws of gravity and of supply and demand still operate.

In the long run, wealth is created and riches are received by those who produce what society needs and wants. It is only by work that wealth is produced and one can consume only what he produces unless he is a parasite or a lucky gambler.

America offers limitless opportunities for those who are willing to use their brain and brawn—a faithful servant will be rewarded but a gambler usually rides even credit waves for a fall.

Many Comedy Situations in "The Donovan Affair." Talkie at the Palace for Three Days

Comedy, usually more or less neglected or at best forced in the average mystery picture, is well represented in Columbia's 100 percent talking thriller, "The Donovan Affair," now playing at the Palace Theatre. This detective story, one of the best to reach the screen, is full of amusing incidents that develop logically as part of the action.

Much of the comedy is supplied by Hank Mann and Ethel Wales as the Dr. and Mrs. Lindsey. Hank Mann is one of the original Keystone Kops of Mack Sennett comedies. In addition, he served in the capacity of gag man for such well-known comedians as Eddie Cantor, W. C. Fields and Chester Conklin. He is therefore well versed in the art of clowning. In "The Donovan Affair" he takes the part of a stuttering doctor. Miss Wales is his talkative wife. Her loquacity is an embarrassment to the rather retiring physician. Between them they provide many hilarious situations.

Further comedy is introduced by Fred Kelsey, who has become famous through his delineation of the "book" detective in "The Gorilla." In "The Donovan Affair," he is cast as Carney, a detective, who is never quite sure just what his superior, Inspector Killian, played by Jack Holt, wants, or when he wants it. His blundering, blustering, clumsy manner results in one drollery after the other.

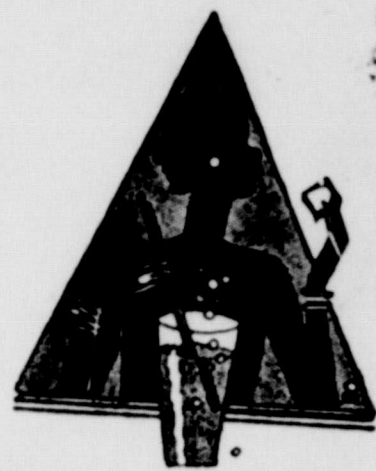
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EDUCATION SECONDARY WHEN POTATOES WAIT

Tourists Find Improvement in French Hotels

PARIS, June 3.—American visitors to France this summer will not be obliged to grumble too loudly at the inconveniences of French hotels in small as well as large centers.

Such great improvement has been made within the last few years that their comfort and efficient management may now be envied by many other countries. There is not a town of 80,000 or more inhabitants in France now that has not its first-class hotel on which large sums of money have been spent in bringing it up-to-date.

The celebrated Hotel de la Cite at Carcassonne, one of the finest in Europe, housed 18,000 people last year, although the minimum price is five dollars per day and there are many small but clean hotels in the village. One at Tours registered 35,000 and another in Avignon 23,000.

It is interesting to notice that in recent years, French hotels which were formerly mostly run by foreigners, are now chiefly in the hands of Frenchmen who are learning the psychology of hotel-keeping and how to please every nationality which comes to them.

French women read far more than the men, according to recent observations made in the Paris subways. At the midday and evening business rush-hours, almost every woman has her eyes in a book, usually carried in a fancy leather protector and she reads it unceasingly all during her underground journey. These books are generally good literature, the works of Anatole France, Paul Bourget, or a modern author such as Andre Maurois. One is sometimes surprised to see an apparently superior type of woman breathlessly following the pages of a cheap novelette.

The men, almost without excep-

tion are reading newspapers, even the conductor, who picks up his journal between stations.

Other observations in the "metro" show that the Parisian is not as neat as he ought to be, and that only eight passengers out of one hundred throw their used tickets in the wire receptacles intended for them. About forty-four of the same number let them drop anywhere around the waste-basket and the remainder of the hundred wait until they get to the streets and scatter them about.

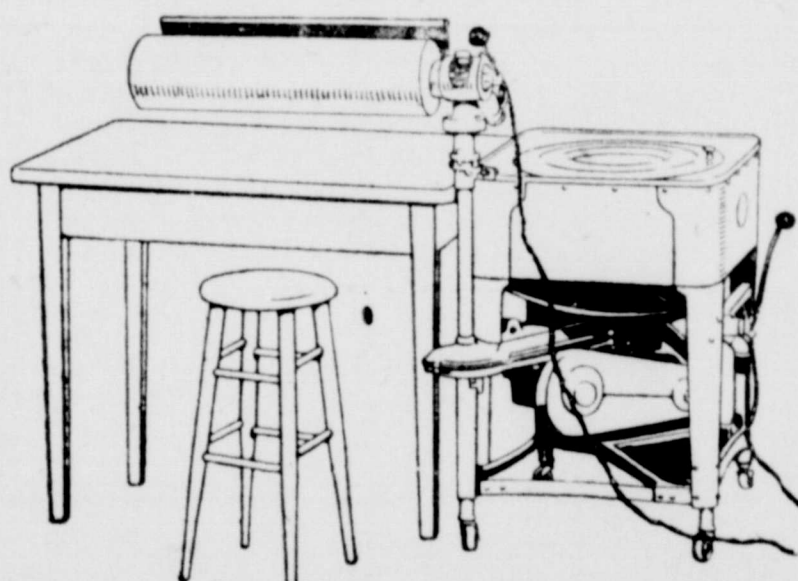
