EARTH SHOCKS CLAIMS LIVES IN JUGO-SLAVIA

(By Associated Press)
ROME, June 12.—Dispatches received from Jugo-Slavia today announced sharp earthquake shocks in the Balkans. The messages stated that the most marked effect was in the vicinity of Bosnia and Herzegovina. In that region houses were crumbled to the ground by the shock and there were some casualties.

MR. GRASSHOPPER MEETS HIS WATERLOO

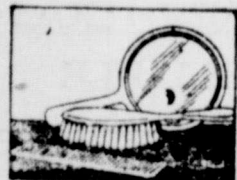
A solution of the grasshopper problem has made itself known in Brown county, according to reliable reports coming from that county, and the new agency of hopper destruction will be made the immediate study of entomologists and if the remedy is not worse than the evil there will be a great demand for a new species of fly in the counties where the hoppers have been destroying the crops. Read the following which appeared in state daily papers this week, and which also appeared in the Brownwood Bulletin:

"Reports from various sections of Brown county are to the effect that a species of fly has showed up in the fields infested by grasshoppers and is making things lively for the hoppers. Farmers, who have paid attention to the matter state that the fly seems to have but one purpose in view and that is to kill the hoppers which is done by stinging the pest just back of the head where the head joins the body and depositing an egg. The meantime the egg hatches and begin to feed on the body of the hopper with the result that the hopper is soon devoured. It is said that billions of these flies have made their appearance and in some localities the ground is covered with dead hoppers that were killed by the fly. This is no joke but is reported as being true in all particulars, and so many of the hoppers have been killed by poison and the fly that as a menace the hopper is regarded in some localities as a factor of small importance."

LAST CALL FOR THE OFFICE SEEKER

Saturday will be the last day in which candidates for county and precinct offices can file applications for a place on the ticket. This is absolutely necessary, and no name can be printed on the ticket unless the application is filed and in due form. The application must be sworn to by the candidate, affidavit must be made as to residence, age, etc.

The county executive committee meets Monday, June 16th, to make up the ticket, and assess fees to cover the expenses of holding the primary election. Candidates will be given until June 23rd in which to pay primary election fees.

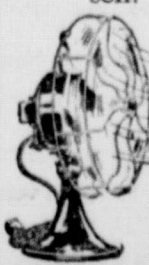

FRENCH TO NAME NEW PRESIDENT

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, June 12.—Paul Painlevé, president of the Chamber of Deputies, received 306 votes and Gaston Doumergue, president of the Senate received 149 votes in a caucus of the parties which met today to select a candidate for president of the French republic to succeed President Millerand, who resigned yesterday.

CLEVELAND, June 12.—President Coolidge was nominated on the first ballot today, receiving one of the largest majorities ever given a presidential candidate. Coolidge received 1,065 votes; LaFollette, 34; and Johnson, 10.

CLEVELAND, June 12.—Riding on a rumbling tide of party enthusiasm, Calvin Coolidge was swept into the nomination for the presidency on the republican ticket today by one of the largest majorities ever given a candidate by a republican convention.

Before the first and only roll call was half completed the story of Coolidge's victory had been told. After the result had been announced a motion was made by Thomas Scott, of Wisconsin, to make the nomination unanimous. S. N. Ray, of South Dakota, also presented the same resolution and there was a long and continuous chorus of ayes. Twenty-eight LaFollette delegates from Wisconsin yelled "no," among the cries of "put him out."

In the roll call Wisconsin gave LaFollette 28 votes, North Dakota gave 6 votes for him, while Hiram Johnson got his 10 votes from South Dakota.

RULES GIVEN TO OVERCOME DANGER OF ELECTRIC SHOCK

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, June 11.—The rules for first aid in cases of high voltage shock are based on the fact that the victim's lungs become paralyzed, and success in saving life depends upon keeping up artificial respiration until normal breathing is resumed. Willis Macleachlan of the National Electric Light Association, told the American Medical Association's convention today.

"Since cases are on record of lives saved after three and one-half hours of artificial respiration, four hours of effort are recommended before artificial respiration is given up," he said. "The rules are as follows:

"The victim is cleared from the current, either by shutting off the current, or pulling him away with the aid of rubber gloves, dry clothing, or sticks of wood, to serve as non-conductors. If it is necessary to cut the wire, a hatchet or implement with a wooden handle should be used and the operator should turn his face away to avoid the flash. The patient is then laid face

down with one arm up and the other supporting his face so that the mouth and nose are free for breathing. Artificial respiration should be begun at once, while an assistant loosens the clothing necessary, holds ammonia to the victim's nose and keeps him as warm as possible. If the victim must be moved, this should be done in a reclining position, and the artificial respiration should be kept up. After he resumes breathing, he should be watched, and if he stops, artificial respiration should be resumed. The prone pressure method is that in which the man applying first aid straddles the patient and presses both hands on the small of the victim's back, releasing the pressure rhythmically every two or three seconds, and imitating his own breathing as much as possible."

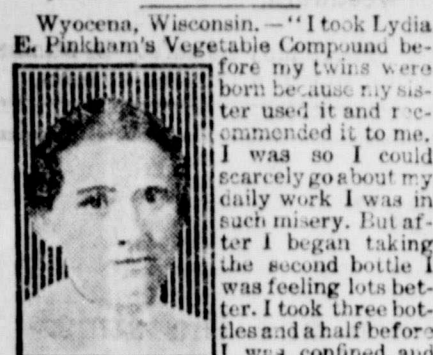

Coolidge Nominated—
Kenyon Leads for V.P.

Kenyon, of Iowa, as the republican candidate for vice-president became a strong possibility shortly after noon today, with the announcement by William Butler, President Coolidge's manager that Kenyon would be acceptable to Coolidge.

The announcement began to spread throughout the convention in session began looking toward consolidation of the divided strength behind the former Iowa senator.

The Kenyon move started at the time when many leaders were declaring that the nomination lay between Judge Kenyon and Sen-

ator Curtis, of Kansas.

CLEVELAND, June 12.—The republican party not only pledged its faith in Calvin Coolidge today as its choice for the presidency, but followed out his wishes that the selection of his running mate be left to the delegates themselves in open convention.

Assembling the convention at 10:40 o'clock this morning to go through the formalities of ratifying Coolidge's nomination, which has been long a foregone conclusion, the convention managers agreed to recess for only one hour and a half after Coolidge's nomination before proceeding with the selection of a candidate for vice-president.

Senator Borah's reiterated refusal to take the second place on the ticket, after he had been selected at an all night conference of the republican leaders, left the vice-presidential situation very much up in the air.

It was agreed that the short recess arrangement would give little opportunity for conferences that might lead to any definite agreement upon a running mate for Mr. Coolidge. It appeared probable that in spite of his attitude, Senator Borah's name would be presented to the convention along with those of at least a half dozen other aspirants. The leaders in the convention foresaw an old fashioned floor fight for the nomination of a vice-president.

The formalities of nominating Mr. Coolidge himself to head the

The honor of placing his name beticket were comparatively simple. fore the convention went to Dr. Marion LeRoy Burton, once a neighbor of President Coolidge in Northampton, Mass., and now president of the University of Michigan. A half dozen delegates from as many different states were allotted time in which to make speeches seconding the nomination.
