Officiating was Rev. J. W. Jackson, pastor of the Burkburnett Church of God.

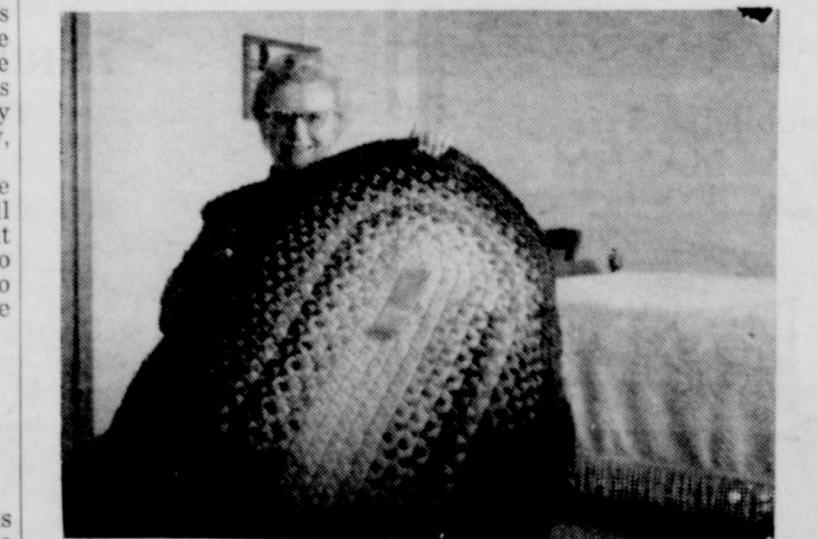
Burial was in Burkburnett Cemetery.

BIG WINNER

Delta Nu Alpha is the national professional transportation fraternity, with 175 chapters. Its "Transportation Man of the Year" award was recently given to President William B. Johnson of REA Express (the comparatively new name for the old-fashioned Railway Express Agency.)

He received this coveted award for his "outstanding contribution to the advancement of the traffic and transportation profession." And his citation stressed an extremely impressive list of achievements: Innovation and improvement of domestic and international transport methods; leadership in overcoming the apathy of industry toward its needs for professional traffic and transportation personnel; support of greater interest in the teaching of transportation subjects in higher education; and progressive measures preventing serious inroads of nationalization in the transportation industry.

This, obviously, was a thoroughly deserved award. Not so long ago there was talk about the express company going out of business, because of heavy operating losses. Then reorganization was undertaken and new and more flexible policies laid down. The results are found in a vast and continuing increase in the quality and extent of its services.

And the big winner, when that sort of thing happens, is the public at large.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

While a chap like Newton Minow, currently head of the Federal Communications Commission, may throw out all kinds of smoke screens to scare the broadcast industry into devoting hours upon hours to pumping out the propaganda for whatever line government



This was made apparent in a recent nationwide poll conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business.

In fact, an analysis of the returns could well indicate nation's independent business and professional people are of the opinion there is a lot of "mar-lapine" going on.

By an overwhelming 88% the nation's independent business people express approval of the measure by Sen. Javits which gives Congress power to veto any trade deals entered into by administration, which actually means State Dept.

In the same ballot, the nation's independent businessmen also by a majority of 90% approved a bill by Sen. Curtis to permit business to discharge wildcat strikers, and by a vote of 95% approved a bill by Sen. Tower to prohibit unions from forcing on employers union rules prohibiting use of time saving methods of production, or new equipment designed to save production costs.

Somewhere around 100 years ago, a famous U. S. President said "You can fool all the people part of the time, part of the people all the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time."

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**WHOOPING
COUGH**

If your child get sick with
cough or has signs of a cold,
keep him away from other
children and notify the
doctor at once.

The doctor can do much to
relieve the sick child's suffering
if treatment is begun early. He
will advise you what to feed the

sick child and about the amount
of rest, exercise and fresh air
needed.

The sick child needs simple
prepared, nourishing energy-
giving foods—for example: soft
boiled eggs, cream soup, milk,
toast, custard, cooked whole
grain or enriched cereals, and
green leafy and yellow vege-
tables.

If vomiting is severe, small
amounts of food may be given
immediately after a spell of
vomiting.

It usually takes three or four
months for the child to develop
the protection against whoop-
ing cough after he has been
vaccinated. The vaccination is
given in three injections, usual-
ly a month apart.

Whooping cough is spread by

discharges from the throat of
sick persons with the disease.
These discharges containing
whooping cough (pertussis)
germs get into the throat of
healthy persons and causes
whooping cough.

Whooping cough has a slow
and gradual onset. It begins
with a cough much like a com-
mon cold. This cough usually
lasts about two weeks before
the whoop develops. The whoop-
ing stage of the disease lasts
several weeks to a month or
six weeks.

Whooping cough is catching
during the early period, before
the appearance of the whoop,
and until the sick child is free
of all symptoms of the disease.
Since it is difficult to recognize
the disease before the whoop
begins, many children spread
it. A few may not whoop. They

can spread the disease the same
as those who whoop.

Do not let the child who has
had whooping cough return to
school or vigorous play, even
when he seems to be well, until
the doctor has said he is able
to do so.

A severe case of whooping
cough may lead to other serious
sickness. It may leave the child
run down and subject to other
diseases, especially lung compli-
cations. Have your family doctor
give your child a thorough
going over before and after his
illness.

Periodic health examinations
by the family physician or in

GUMS

The major cause of tooth decay in adults is not cavities, but periodontal conditions (diseases of the gums).

Here are some tips for healthier gums: Massage your gums with your toothbrush. Place the bristles at a 45° angle against the gums and gently vibrate towards the teeth.

Bleeding gums are a warning sign. A dentist should be consulted. Be careful of toothbrushes and dental floss. Vigorously forced against the gums they can cause damage and eventually periodontal disease.

A mouthwash should be used after brushing. A teaspoonful of table salt in warm water is fine to mechanically cleanse the teeth and gums of food particles.

However, to remove potentially harmful bacteria in the mouth, a new antiseptic (germ killing) and anesthetic (pain killing) mouthwash called Chloraseptic is now available in drugstores.

Found to be more effective than iodine as an oral germ killer, this medication relieves pain from sore throats as well as irritations in the mouth.

But remember, the most important advice: SEE YOUR DENTIST TWICE A YEAR.

In a medium-size mixing bowl, cream butter; add sugar gradually. Blend until light and fluffy. Add flour, salt, mince meat, and pecans. Blend thoroughly. Cover and chill 1 to 2 hours in refrigerator. Cover rolling pin with stockinette and lightly flour. On a lightly floured cloth-covered board, roll out chilled dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with 2-inch cookie cutters in various shapes. Place one-inch apart, on aluminum foil-covered cookie sheet. Add 1/2 teaspoon jelly in center of each cookie and top with pecan half. Bake in hot oven (400°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Remove immediately from cookie sheet and sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

Most repairs are simple if the right tools and methods are used. Farm Facts

Homemakers now demand built-in maid service in the food they buy and it costs them more.

These services include more grading, packaging, processing, storage, and other operations. They have nearly doubled since 1940, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The USDA says at least half the cost of meals is for preparation and service of food. This includes cost of meals not eaten at home—now at the rate of about one out of every four.

Housewives, of course, are buying freedom from kitchen chores—food with less waste and requiring less trimming, sorting, or washing.

Three ready-to-serve meals, costing \$6.70 for a family of four, could be prepared in the home kitchen for \$4.50.

It would take the housewife about 5 1/2 hours to prepare the home-cooked meals. She would need only 1 1/2 hours, however, for the ready-to-serve meals.

In many cases, furthermore, convenience foods save money as well as time.

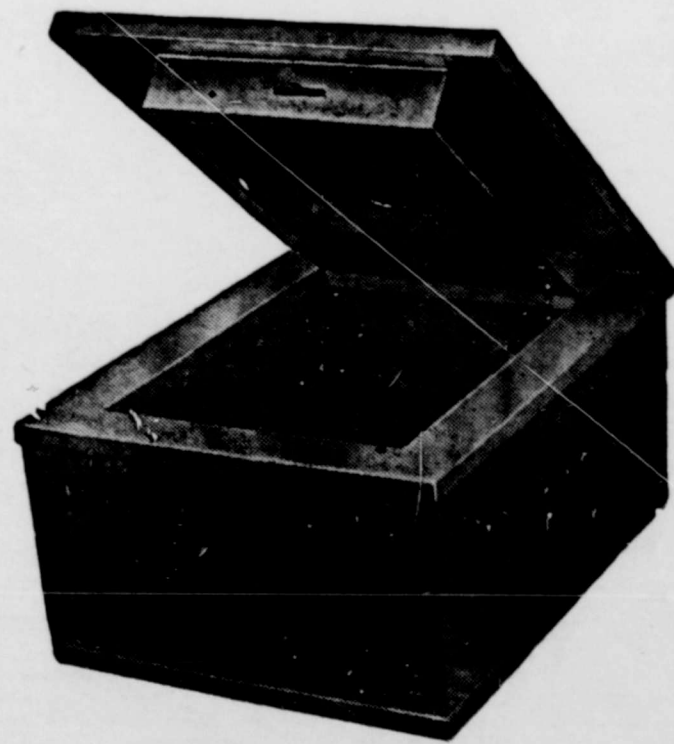

School Problem



Q. Why can't pinworm control be started in schools? I have spent a small fortune on medication and now the doctor tells me that my children can become infected again. I dread to send them to school. What can I do to start a control program?

A. Recently developed drugs are highly effective and, with proper hygiene, will clear up pinworm infestation in short order. However, reinfestation can occur at any time. An outbreak among school children does present problems unless every parent is willing to cooperate. Don't become overly alarmed, but should you encounter more difficulty why not discuss the matter with the school nurse or principal? We realize that it is a delicate subject, but with a tactful approach, you may accomplish a very worthwhile educational endeavor.
