Fireman Of Year Award To Gentry

Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department Friday night named Kent Gentry fireman of the year.

The department's coveted award was announced at the annual Christmas dinner for firemen and their guests in Civic House.

Fire Chief Pat McKinney Jr. cited Gentry, manager of Higginbotham - Bartlett Company, for outstanding devotion to duty and service to firefighting day and night.

Accepting the plaque for Gentry, who missed the annual Christmas party, was First Assistant Chief Dale Mathis; who received the award last year

and could not be present then to receive it.

Approximately 100 volunteer firemen, their wives and guests attended the dinner.

Special gifts were presented by Frank Marsh, representing the annual gifts committee, to Chief McKinney, First Assistant Mathis, Second Assistant Chief Charles Ezell, James Bobo, secretary for the fire department; Mrs. Louis Schafer, dispatcher; Fire Marshall Virgil Eaton plus James Spott and Bob Craig, drivers. Assistant Chief Bobo presented to volunteer firemen the checks which represented accumulated pay for all fire calls during the year.

Three retired firemen--Hank Bryant, A. G. Ballard and Leonard Henderson--were introduced. Not in attendance but recognized also were three more retirees -- Eual Henderson, Dick DeLaney and A. L. Maddin.

Bert Gannon, safety coordinator for Texas Electric Service Company in Fort Worth, presented a demonstration in mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Invocation was by Lon Robertson, fire department chaplain.

Cash Wheat Bonus

Approximately 270 Mitchell County farmers are getting a surprise Christmas bonus.

It is a supplemental wheat set aside payment mailed Friday by the local Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service Office.

Total sum being paid out in Mitchell County is \$16,476, according to Don Stewart, head of the ASCS office.

The checks will range from \$5 to \$400 per farm. Many will average between \$80 and \$100 each for small farms.

The payment is in accordance with the 1970 Agriculture Act, which provides for a foundation price for wheat (\$120 per bushel). If the price of wheat drops below the foundation level, then supplemental payments are provided for all pro-

ducers who participated in the wheat program.

In Mitchell County the supplement amounts to 43 cents more per bushel for participating wheat producers.

\$228,040 To State Park

Federal Share For Phase 1 Construction

A \$228,040 federal grant in aid has been announced for Phase 1 construction and development of Lake Colorado City State Park.

The funding is the federal portion of a \$500,000 Phase 1 project for which the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will provide matching money.

Announcement of the federal grant came in Washington from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Department of Interior, through the offices of Congressman Omar Burleson and Senator John Tower.

It assures that development of the park will move ahead in 1971 as originally planned by the State Parks & Wildlife Department and outlined in special public hearing here last spring.

Congressman Burleson's office told The Record by phone Saturday that the Department of Interior grant was for the major projects already being finalized by architects and in preparation for bids.

Included in the construction list with the federal funding, according to Burleson's Washington office, are picnic sites, camping sites, fishing pier, swimming beach, mini bike area, playground equipment, boating piers and ramps, headquarters building, restrooms, roads, parking areas, utilities and landscaping.

It is expected, with the fed-

eral action, that construction within the new 574-acre park will be underway by early summer.

After the architect's final plans are approved, the state must appropriate funds to match the federal grant, call for construction bids and then award contract.

When hearing was conducted here last April, the state had hoped to call for construction bids this fall, but with a change-over of park department administrators the schedule has been slowed several months.

Included in the original Phase 1 development and construction plan for the park are head-

quarters building with office complex, 3.5 miles of new paved roads for access to various park areas (in addition to the paved loop in the old city park area), 2,000 square yards of parking areas, 30 picnic areas with shade shelters, 500-foot long fishing pier with lights crossing the first cove inside the lake park, 35 multi-use camp sites

with electricity, 2 restrooms (one with showers) each with hot and cold water, ceramic tile floors and walls, butane system and underground sewage.

In addition, the plan provided for swimming beach, boat launching site with ramp and parking space for about 30 trailers.

The tournament got underway Thursday and the Wolves earned the right to play for the tournament championship by defeating Post, Littlefield and Roosevelt of Lubbock.

The Slaton tournament is serving as a preview of the Lone Wolf tournament scheduled for Colorado City next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

A number of powerful teams are to participate in the tournament here.

In addition, two opponents faced by Colorado City will be their opponents in regular play next week.

The Wolves started the Slaton tournament Thursday afternoon by defeating Post 81-61. The Wolves A&B teams will host Post in a game at the gym here Monday night at 6:15 and 8 p.m.

Then Tuesday night, the Wolves A team will travel to Slaton. Colorado City defeated the Slaton team in a close battle last Tuesday night at Wolf gym by the score of 87-72.

In the game against Post Thursday afternoon, Jerome Hopkins led the scoring for the Wolves with 29 points.

Others scoring for the Wolves included Melvin Jackson with 21 points, David Matthews with 12 points, John Ridge with 5 points, Bob Benson with 4 points, Welvin Ross and Skeet Kimbrell with 3 points each and Sonny

High School Cited Keeps Association's Accreditation

Colorado High has been continued as an accredited school by the Commission on Secondary Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The action was approved at the annual meeting of the association this week in Miami Beach, Fla., according to Supt. Loyd E. McKeel.

Membership in the association is official recognition that a school is committed to school improvement through the accreditation process.

Each member school periodically conducts a thorough self-study and is visited by teams of competent educators who

help determine the school's strength and indicate area needing improvement.

Planning and carrying-out the evaluation program here for all Colorado City schools was over a period of 2 years and concluded last school term.

Only those schools which voluntarily enter into these self-improvement programs and commit themselves to compliance with accepted educational standards are admitted to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

"The regional accreditation program has been in operation for 72 years and has demonstrated, by concrete educational achievements, that the process is of value to students, teachers, parents and communities throughout the South," according to John Guyer, chairman of the Texas State Committee for the association.

The Southern Association, one of 6 regional accrediting associations in the nation, served 11 states and American Schools in Latin America.

Volunteer "walkers"--each with an information kit and name tag--will call on citizens Monday from 4 p.m. until 7 p.m. for contributions.

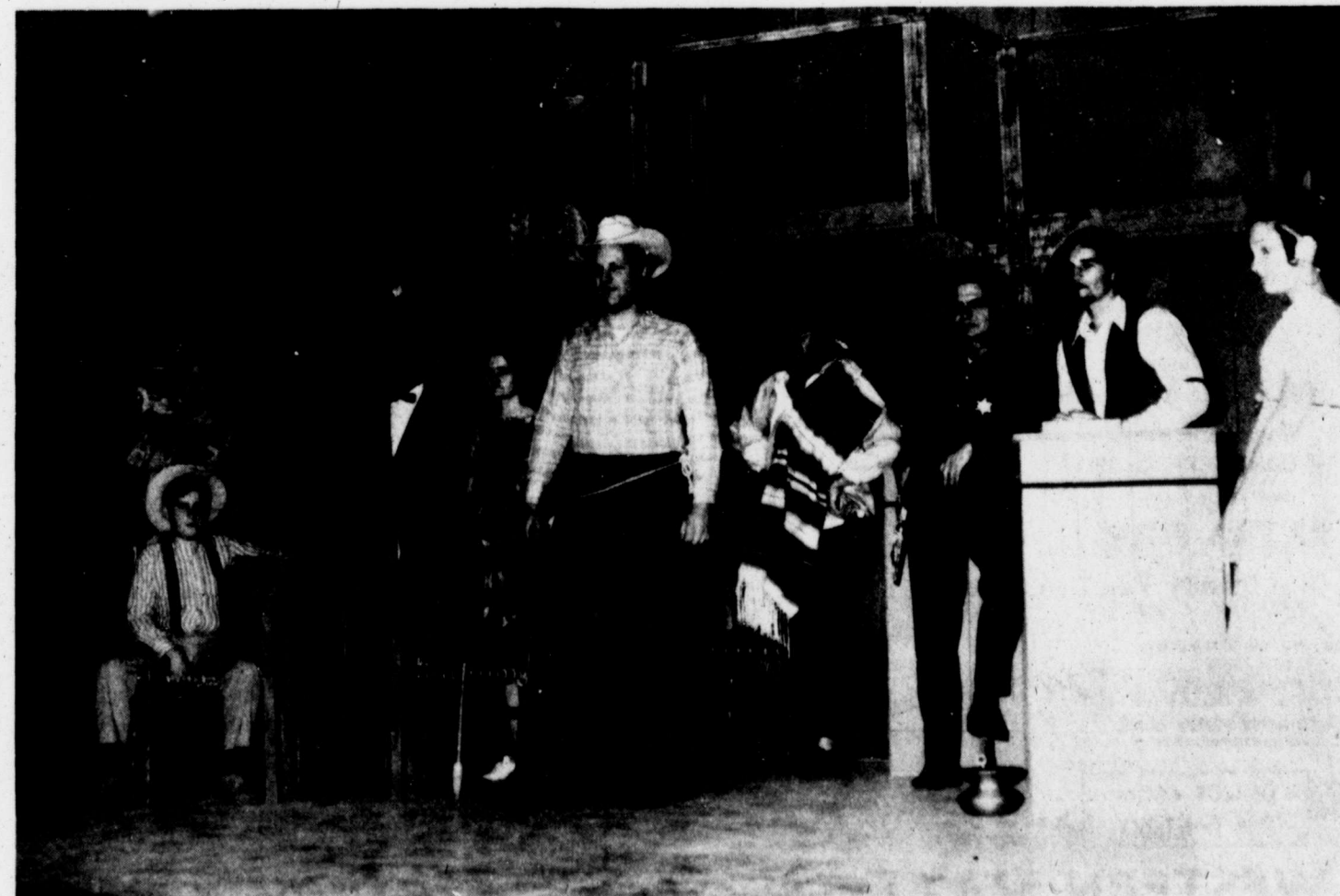
