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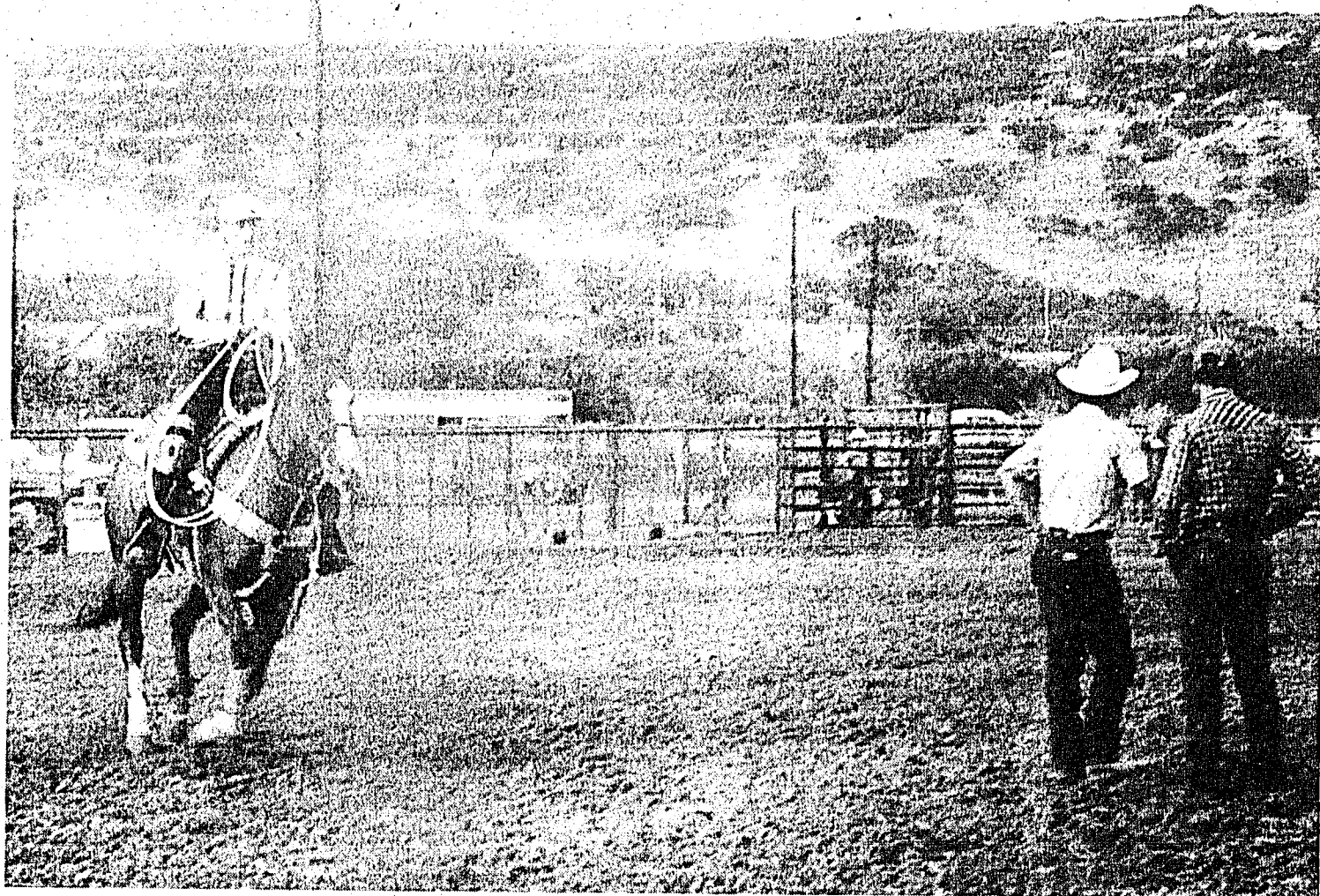

Petitioner Plans To Continue Effort

COLEMAN — A petition drive in Coleman County calling for a liquor election has failed for a lack of signatures.

Gene Webb, operator of Hords Creek Grocery Store, said Tuesday he didn't have enough signatures.

Webb needed 2,134 signatures by Tuesday. He declined to say how many he collected.

Webb had hoped to initiate a vote on the sale of beer and wine

for off-premise consumption countywide. Currently, alcoholic beverages can be sold only in Precinct 1, which consists of part of the city of Coleman and the northeast part of the county.

According to a statement reported by an Abilene television station Tuesday night, Webb plans to continue his efforts to bring a liquor election before the voters of Coleman County sometime in the future.

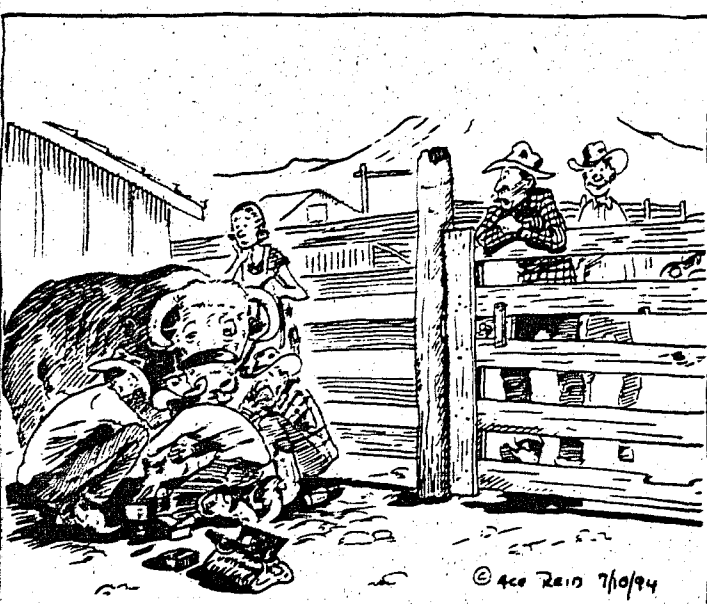

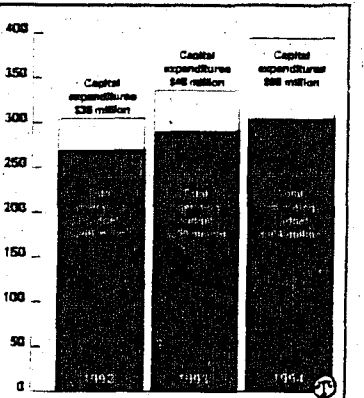

Hamburger Safety Tips

The safety of hamburger meat has been making the headlines recently. More than 400 persons in the Northwest became ill after eating undercooked hamburgers containing E. coli 0157:H7, a rare strain of bacteria which is particularly dangerous to the very young and old. "A number of Hotline callers recently have been asking about the safety of cooking hamburgers at home," says Susan Conley of USDA's Meat and Poultry Hotline. "Raw hamburger must be handled properly because of the potential of contamination by harmful bacteria. Adequate cooking skills bacteria."

The United States Department of Agriculture recommends against eating raw or undercooked ground beef since harmful bacteria could be present. But safe food handling is important in preventing foodborne illness. Here are some hamburger safety tips from the economists at the Meat and Poultry Hotline:

- *At the store, be sure to choose a package that's not torn and that feels cold. If possible, enclose it in a plastic bag so juices won't drip on other foods. Make ground beef and other perishables your final purchase of the trip.
- *When handling raw ground beef, don't let its juices contaminate foods that won't be cooked. Wash your hands with soap and hot water before and after handling ground beef to make sure you don't spread bacteria from raw meats to other foods.
- *Don't reuse any packaging materials. Use soap and hot water to wash utensils and surfaces which have come into contact with the raw meat. When taking hamburgers off the grill, don't put the cooked hamburgers on the same platter which held the raw patties.
- *Avoid the "danger zone". Bacteria multiply rapidly in the "danger zone" between 40 and 140 degrees. To keep bacteria levels low, store ground beef at 40 degrees and use or freeze it within two days. Ground beef kept frozen at 0 degrees

will maintain its quality up to four months.

*Keeping meat cold while it is defrosting is essential to prevent the growth of bacteria. Never leave ground beef, or any perishable food, out on the counter for more than two hours. Thaw it in the refrigerator.

*To be sure, bacteria are destroyed, cook hamburgers to 160 degrees F. or until the center is no longer pink and the juices are clear.

*When cooking out, do not partially grill extra hamburgers to use later. Once you begin cooking hamburgers by any method, cook them until completely done to assure that bacteria are destroyed.

*Refrigerate hamburgers promptly after cooking. Any left out at room temperature for more than two hours should be discarded. After cooking, ground beef can be stored in the refrigerator for three to four days or frozen up to three months.

*When reheating fully cooked patties, be sure their internal temperature reaches 165 degrees F. or they are hot or steaming.

*At restaurants, order your hamburger cooked to "medium" or "well done" and check for doneness when it is served.

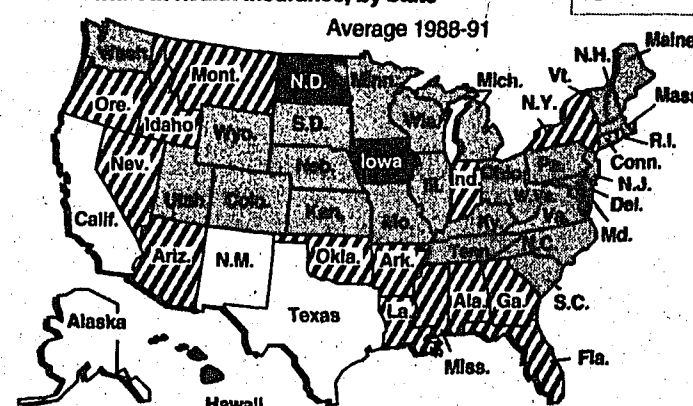

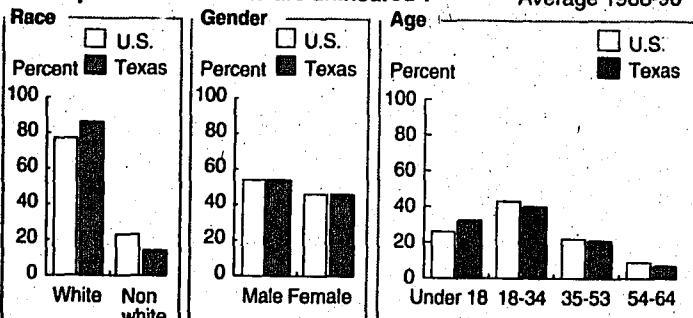
Texas: Highest rate of uninsured

Lemon Law: Relief for consumers

Texas Consumer Association (TCA) receives several letters a month from people with various questions about consumer issues. One of our recent letters read:

Dear TCA:

I purchased a car from a used car dealer six months ago. After many serious problems, I took the car back to the dealer. He traded me into another car that broke down within a mile from the dealership. Can I sue under the Texas Lemon Law?

Maria C.

Not all the information needed to answer this question is included in the letter, so it is difficult to say yes or no.

The Texas Lemon Law applies to new or almost new motor vehicles that are so serious in their need for repair that the manufacturer should refund the money or replace the vehicle.

Serious is defined as something that substantially impairs the use or market value of the vehicle or creates a serious safety hazard. The company providing the warranty must be given a reasonable number of attempts to repair the problem.

Consumers with Lemon Law claims file their complaints with the Texas Department of Transportation and send written notice to the manufacturer, or the company that is the warrantor of the vehicle.

Lemon Law claims must be made within six months of the express vehicle warranty or within six months after 24 months or 24,000 miles of ownership.

To contact the Texas Department of Transportation about Lemon Law requirements, call (512) 465-7611 or write to the DOT in Austin, Texas 78779.

For consumers who purchase used automobiles from dealers, a warranty notice should be posted in the window of the automobile. This notice should provide information about possible warranties provided with the used car, or may state that the car is sold 'as is' to the buyer.

For consumers who purchase used cars with the 'as is' condition, there is little relief for problems. That is why it is so important to research the history of your vehicle and ask an expert to check it out for you.

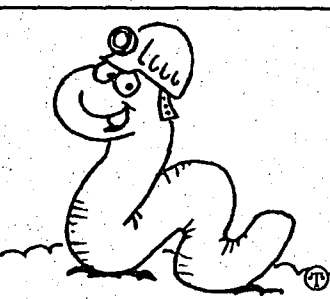

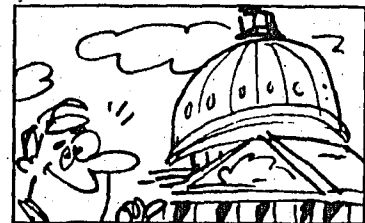

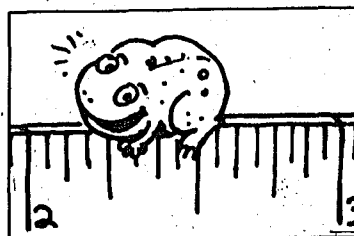
Roundup Arts and Crafts Festival In Mason July 8-9
