'Hart Day' Planning Continues



DRIVEN BY MOTHER NATURE - Saturday's wind, rain and hail storm was accompanied by an apparent tornado which lifted this combine from the drive of the Duane

Clevenger farm home east of town. Dumped into the bar ditch, it was "rescued" Monday morning with the assistance of Tom McLain's heavy machinery.

Storm Hits Clevengers

Fourth of July 1981 won't be remembered for its fireworks by one Hart family, Duane and Marie Clevenger and sons, Gary and Scotty Scoggin and their cousin, Chris Clifford. They will, instead, recall the awesome display that day by Mother Nature.

When Saturday afternoon's storm cloud reached Hart- about 5 p.m. -the Clevenger family was scattered. Duane and Marie had been in the field and were watching the approaching storm system from their pickup. Scotty was at work making a pig pen ready for his new animal project. Chris was in the house, unaware of what was about to happen. Gary, at his grandparents' barn, was also unaware of Mother Nature's wild plans.

"We decided we'd better get to the house," Duane remembers. They didn't make it soon enough. Stopping by the row of trees back of the Clevenger home, they were rocked and bounced by the wind which seemed sure to overturn the pickup. Whipping torrents of rain and the assault of hailstones made it impossible to hear the "train roar" that Marie listened for and expected. Both remembers the feeling of pressure.

At the pig pen, Scotty was holding onto the fence to keep from being blown down. He turned loose and was

blown back into the pen where he again held on tight.

Chris, looking out the window, was able to see glimpses through the rain of the pickup "jumping about."

When calm again prevailed, Scotty came to the house looking "like a drowned rat," recalls Duane with a chuckle. "He was covered with mud and there was not a dry thread on him," remembers Marie.

"I was upset and mad!" says Scotty. In front of the house, a combine which had been parked some 100 yards or so from the highway had been lifted and dumped into the bar ditch in the opposite direction of the wind. Surprisingly, its damages are not bad.

"We'll just have to straighten some sheet metal and such." Further explaining their thankfulness that crop and property damages were no more serious than they were, Clevenger said, "I was glad to get the rain. I got two inches in my guage and I figure another one outside the guage."

He said he believed the storm must have contained a tornado since the combine was lifted and dropped against the wind and corn growing near the house was blown in different directions.

"It was a circular pattern sort of around the place. Some on one side of a

ditch (in the field) looks real good and on the other side it's all messed up.

Trash barrels were dumped and tree limbs broken. Still another family member, Theodore, could tell quite a story, Duane believes, if only dogs could talk.

Apparently sleeping under the combine before the storm, Theodore's tracks were found after the storm. Deep paw prints seem to indicate the dog's efforts to "hang onto" the ground.

"About 45 minutes or so after the storm, we saw Theodore coming out of the sunflowers (in a field further east)," Scotty says. "He was about as wet and muddy as Scotty," adds Duane.

"I sure would like to hear his story," Duane says.

The Company Store, west of the Clevengers, had their radio tower blown down. Had it not been for high line wires which broke its fall, it would have toppled onto the store's office building, said Neoma Wall.

Jimmy Ray Davis also received damages north of Hart and reports one inch of rain.

Weldon Davis reports .70 rain and no hail or wind damage. Southward, the David Nelsons got "just a shower."

In Hart, guages varied with reports of one to three inches. The official guage, at Farmers Grain, recorded no rain.

Two Young Girls To Be Crowned

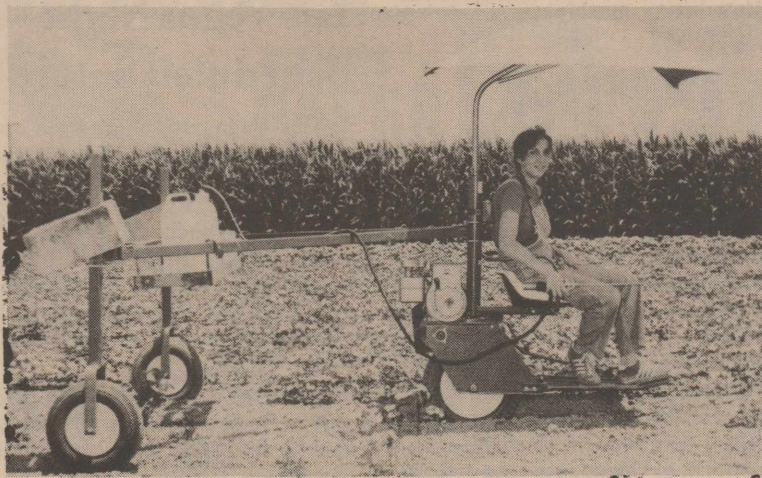

A pretty garden at the James Russell home proves that the homemaker's talent as a green thumb. Gardening - both outside and in - is a hobby of Emmie Russell.

A favorite cake recipe for pumpkin cake is shared with Hart Beat cooks. Emmie says the moist and delicious treat is a good freezer and is good to have on hand. She also shares recipes for a delectable chocolate cherry pie and tasty German potato salad.

PUMPKIN CAKE

3 1/2 c flour
3 c sugar
1 c cooking oil
1/2 t salt
1 1/2 t soda
1 t cinnamon
1/2 t nutmeg
2/3 c water
2 c pumpkin
1 c pecans
1 c coconut

Beat eggs, sugar and oil together. Add water and pumpkin. Sift dry ingredients and add. Fold in nuts and bake in greased oblong baking dish. Bake in 325° oven about 50 mins. or until firm to tap.

HOT GERMAN POTATO SALAD

6 med potatoes
3 T bacon drippings or shortening
1 med onion, peeled and minced
2 T flour
1 c water
1/4 c cider vinegar
1/2 t dry mustard
salt, pepper to taste

Scrub potatoes and cook in their jackets in boiling water until tender, about 25 mins. Drain, peel and chop or slice. Meanwhile, heat bacon drippings in small skillet or saucepan and saute onion until tender. Mix in flour and cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually pour in water, continuing to stir. Add vinegar, mustard, salt and pepper. Cook 1 min. While still warm, put potatoes in large bowl and mix them with onion sauce. Sprinkle with parsley and serve. Serves 6 to 8.

CHOCOLATE CHERRY PIE

CRUST:

1 1/3 c vanilla
wafer crumbs
1/4 c margarine, softened

FILLING:

1/2 c margarine softened
3/4 c sugar
1 square (1 oz.) unsweetened chocolate melted and cooled
1 t vanilla extract

2 eggs

2 T chopped maraschino cherries

Whipped cream

Whole Maraschino Cherries

Preheat oven to 375°. Combine crumbs and 1/4 c margarine. Press onto bottom and sides of an 8 or 9 inch pie plate or heart shaped pan. Bake at 375° for 8 mins. Cool.

Cream 1/2 c margarine and sugar. Blend in chocolate and vanilla. Add eggs one at a time beating 5 mins. after each addition. Stir in chopped cherries. Spread in pie shell. Chill 4 hours. Top with whipped cream. Garnish with Maraschino cherry flowers, made by splitting cherries eight times from stem end almost through to opposite side. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
