

## Youth Camp For Baptists Will Be Held at Big Spring

The Baptist Youth Camp for boys and girls nine years of age and up will be held at Big Spring during the week of June 19 to 23.

Local boys will leave Monday, June 19 for the camp and will return Wednesday afternoon. The meeting will convene at the First Baptist Church at 9 o'clock. Ways will be provided for all who wish to attend.

The girls will meet at the Lamesa Baptist Church at 2 Wednesday afternoon, June 21, to go to camp at Big Spring and will return Friday afternoon.

This camp is for all boys and girls from this district. Those desiring to go must register with Miss Everitt Whitlock, at the First Baptist Church here, sometime this week.

## Bible School To Be Held June 26-30

The First Baptist Church will meet in a Vacation Bible School at the East Side Mission on June 26 to 30, with classes each morning from 9 to 11:30. The school will be directed by Miss Everitt Whitlock.

All boys and girls four years of age and under 17 living in this section of town are expected to attend the school.

In the evening of the same week of June 26 to 30, the First Baptist Church will provide a vacation Bible School for the colored boys and girls at the Colored Baptist Church. This will begin each evening at 8:30.

## Men Charged With Violating OPA Rules

In federal court in Lubbock this week Judge T. Whitfield Davidson heard eight cases involving alleged violations of rationing and price control regulations filed by the Office of Price Administration.

Ralph Roberts, James R. Allison, and Laverne Jones, negro, were given sentences of from six months to one year in federal prison in Texarkana for violation of gasoline and tire rationing regulations.

John E. Hall, Jr., charged with illegal possession of gasoline coupons, and F. A. Stephens, negro, charged with tire regulation violation, were fined \$25 each.

Imposition of sentence was withheld against Marvin Chester Harper, who plead guilty to violation of the gasoline rationing regulations.

Will Clay, negro, plead guilty to charges of illegal transfer of tires and was fined \$50.

Having been held in jail seven weeks pending trial, Earl S. Stahler was dismissed after pleading guilty to illegal possession of gasoline coupons.

## Army Trucks To Be Available For Some Farmers

Charles Tarter, administrative officer at the AAA office here, recently received a telegram stating that several hundred army trucks are now available for farmers. These trucks which are located at Ft. Bliss, Ft. Sill, and Ft. Brown, are to be secured through the procurement office at Ft. Worth.

Tarter states that the army trucks are to be bought through a dealer, who must have a letter of recommendation for the farmer from the ACA committee, as well as a letter of recommendation from the dealer.

These trucks are only for farmers.

## Plan Now to Fight Flies and Other Dangerous Pests

Two dangerous public enemies, the housefly and the mosquito, are abroad. They spread diseases and annoy persons, and should be destroyed wherever found.

According to Mrs. Bernice Claytor of the A. and M. College Extension Service, families should not delay in protecting their homes from these harmful pests. People have an added responsibility this spring because they will have to make their protective fight with the material they have on hand. This applies principally to screening for porch, windows and doors. New metal screen generally cannot be bought, and probably will not again be on the market until after the war.

As the first line of defense, screens should be guarded carefully against damage and deterioration. Mrs. Claytor, who is the specialist in home improvement, advises seeing to it that all frames fit doors and windows tightly. Galvanized screens should be dressed once yearly with a thin paint or an approved paint, and as a preservative, paint the frames at the same time. During this annual renovation patch any holes or rips and when the screens and doors go into winter storage they should be protected against accidental damage.

It's a good idea, the specialist says, to put a strong spring on screen doors so they'll close quickly, have them well equipped with hooks and latches, and the lower portion protected with a guard.

Carrying the fight to the flies, Mrs. Claytor suggest attacking their origin. Destroy all breeding places; keep the yards clean; use sprays; have a sanitary toilet and, lastly, have every member of the family trained to use the swatter instinctively.

Many of these suggestions apply to controlling mosquitos, especially the use and care of screen and use of sprays if the insects slip through the guard. Oil of citronella is effective. Attacking the source, the specialist recommends draining pools and waterholes, if practical; pouring oil on water where mosquitos might breed; guarding rain barrels, cisterns and wells, and screening chimney flues during the mosquito season.

## T-5 Earl Ballew Is Radio Operator And Is Based In Italy

ALLIED FORCE ADVANCE PRESS HEADQUARTERS, Italy—Technician Fifth Grade, Earl C. Ballew, field radio operator, son of Mrs. J. R. Bailey, 112 Cleveland Street, Lamesa, Texas, is with the radio section of an Allied Force Signal Regiment in Italy capable of sending 500,000 words a day to points anywhere in the world where Allied troops are operating.

The regiment brought 400 tons of radio equipment to Italy shortly after the Salerno landings, set up within German artillery range and sent the first direct radio messages from Hitler's European Fortress to the United States. Using the very newest types of equipment, including radio teleprinter, the unit has frequently sent 350,000 words a day, equivalent to seven average length novels.

Approximately 2,000 were present for the bond rally held in this city Saturday night, June 10, at the opening feature of the Fifth War Loan Drive, which extends through July 8. SPAAF band and members of the South Plains Army Air Field appeared on the interesting program, along with several local men. Carl Rountree, well-known citizen here; J. R. Earnest, chairman of Dawson County's Fifth War Loan Drive, and several WAC's made speeches concerning the campaign, and the necessity of putting the drive over successfully.

Chairman Earnest estimates that thus far, approximately \$40,000 in war bond pledges and actual purchases have been made in the county; thus getting the county off to a fine start, but leaving before them a large assignment. Dawson County has been assessed an \$805,000 quota for the Fifth War Loan quota, and it will take and intensive effort to carry it through to a successful conclusion.

J. R. Earnest reports that further promotional features have been planned for the Fifth War Loan campaign. A parade will be staged Saturday afternoon June 17 in this city. Plans are underway now for the parade, which will include a division to be made up with members of Lamesa band, under the direction of Richard Young. It has been suggested to local stores, according to Chairman Earnest, that on Saturday afternoon they sell bonds exclusively for a 45 minute or 1 hour period.

A bond rally will be held at Sparenberg Friday night at 8:30 p. m., which will include a bond auction, as well as a moving picture of actual battle scenes. The Lamesa band will be at the Rally to furnish the music.

Remember that this is the victory drive—and there are many Dawson County men now in England, in Italy and North Africa, and in other fighting zones, who will need more war implements than ever before. People are urged to back these men up, by subscribing for more bonds than ever before.

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**ANSWERS For  
Victory Gardeners**

**What Are Plant Lice That I  
Hear So Much About?**

Plant lice is the term used commonly when referring to aphids. They are called plant lice because they cling to the plant like lice and live by sucking juices from the tender shoots, leaves and soft bark. They remain practically stationary after they once settle and give birth to young at the rate of 8 to 10 per day. These young are ready to do likewise in about two weeks. You can see how they multiply. Only the fact that nature destroys the aphids in huge quantity prevents their doing untold damage.

**Where Do Plant Lice Come  
From in the First Place?**

Plant lice or aphids have a peculiar way of starting their first generations in the spring. They hatch from eggs which have been hidden away on trash or in other safe places over winter. The first generation that hatches can fly and spreads about on favorite vegetation. The next generations are born

without wings and continue on their host plant, giving birth to new generations.

You can begin to see why we recommend clearing up the garden late in the fall or very early in the spring, burning all trash, leaves and other material that might be used as a hiding place for aphid eggs and other insect carry overs.

**Are All Garden Plants  
Attacked By Plant Lice?**

Just as there are many kinds of butterflies so there are many kinds of aphids—they are even of different colors. Some are black, some rose colored, some green. There is an aphid for almost every plant you will grow in the garden, and every aphid is a heavy eater, or we should say a heavy drinker, for he is a sap sucker and his food is taken in liquid form through his snout, which is especially built for the purpose.

**Is Aphid Damage  
Really Serious?**

Aphids can be terribly destructive. Scientists have counted in the neighborhood of 25,000 individual aphids on a single tomato plant. If you had 25,000 mosquitos sitting on you night and day, constantly drawing blood, it would be a severe

**Is There Any Other Damage  
From Plant Lice?**

The plant louse or aphid, as we have said, operates by sticking his snout into the tender tissues of any part of the plant he can penetrate for the purpose of withdrawing sap. There is in the saliva of the plant louse an irritating substance that will almost ruin a crop.

**How Can Plant Lice  
Be Controlled?**

Black Leaf 40 is death to plant lice, which it kills not only by contact but by fumes which arise under the foliage from the spray. You can spread all the lead arsenate you wish on the surfaces of the plant and yet do no harm to plant lice. They simply drill through and draw the fresh sap from beneath with their snouts. A contact spray is needed.

It makes containers for food, ammunition, blood plasma and countless other war supplies!

people who produce and conserve their own stocks will be best served.

So to the potato patch with Rosborough who says that they can be dug before the tops die but that they should be mature if they are to keep properly. To determine this, press the thumbs against the skin of a few and if it does not break easily the crop may be harvested. In case of excessive rain shortly before digging, small elevated white spots or water blisters, may form on the skin. Delay harvesting until the spots have dried; otherwise excessive rotting may occur.

Handle the potatoes as tenderly as an egg and place them in the shade as soon as dug. A turning plow or middle buster run eight to 10 inches deep may be used for digging. Separate all skinned or bruised potatoes from the others and use them first.

A cool, well ventilated cellar is satisfactory for storage provided it has an overhead vent to allow escape for warm air and moisture. The door and vent should be opened at night and closed during the day. If out buildings or the area under the farm house are used for storage cross ventilation is essential. Avoid spreading potatoes directly on the ground or floor. Provide a slatted false floor with at least four inches of air space. Even spreading them on willow poles or hay will allow air to completely circulate each potato. Air keeps them dry and tends to reduce rot.

## RATIONING CALENDAR

JUNE 1ST TO JUNE 15TH

### SUGAR:—

Stamps No. 30 and 31, Book IV, good for 5 pounds indefinitely. Stamp No. 40, Book IV, good for 5 pounds sugar for 1944 home canning.

### MEATS AND FATS:—

Book IV, red stamps A8 through T8 good for 10 points valid indefinitely. Stamps U8, V8, and W8 valid June 4, good indefinitely.

### PROCESSED FOODS:—

Book IV, blue stamps A8 through V8 good for 10 points each, valid indefinitely.

### SHOES:—

Book III, stamps one and two with airplane pictures, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely.

### GASOLINE:—

(Coupons must be endorsed on front.) "A" coupons, 3 gallons each, with No. 11 expiring June 21. In B-2, B-3, B-4, and C-2 and C-3 rations, the coupons nationally have a value of 5 gallons each. "R" 5 gallons, (valid for bulk delivery only); red "T" designated "Second Quarter," 5 gallons; "D" one and one-half gallon; and "E" one gallon each.

### TIRE INSPECTION:—

"T" book holders every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. Tire inspection record still required to obtain tire replacements and gasoline rations.

## Summary of Food Situation Given

Producers and consumers should not be lulled into a feeling of security by the current favorable situation regarding food, cautions War Food Administrator Marvin Jones in a recent statement received by the A. and M. College Extension Service. A food supply is temporary and must be replenished constantly, he points out.

Just now there is no serious shortage of any kind of food. Eggs and potatoes, for example, are more abundant than consumption capacity, and the production achievements of farmers and livestockmen has made it possible to suspend point rationing temporarily on all meat except beef steak and roasts along with many other food items. Milk, however, is not as plentiful as many other food staples.

"Because we have plenty now it does not necessarily follow that we will have plenty later," Judge Jones says. "Too many persons are prone to take a food supply for granted. It will be even harder to meet our needs this year than it was last."

Citing the tax on American food supplies, the administrator says that WFA at present is buying for war needs 25 to 35 million pounds of pork weekly, and 40 per cent of the major cuts of beef are being set aside for the armed forces.

Among his reason for prophesying greater difficulty in meeting this year's food needs, the WFA

head recalls the delay in spring planting due to unfavorable weather, fewer young men available for the hard work on the farms and deterioration of farm machinery.

Despite the greatly increased feed production and imports of all the feed which transportation facilities would permit, he continues, there still is not enough feed to supply the present livestock population. It will be necessary to adjust livestock and poultry numbers to the available feed supplies. This will necessitate marketing through the year a greater number of cattle, hogs and poultry, and culling dairy herds, thereby leaving more feed for the better producers.

From the Texas viewpoint, maximum production of farms and gardens, conservation of home products and rigid avoidance of waste are the most effective contributions to easing the difficulties ahead.

## Data For Storing Vegetables At Home Given

Early vegetables are coming of age and it soon will be time to dig and store potatoes, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Storage of food articles is going to be an important factor in the home economy this year. Railroad transportation and packaging materials, two vital links in marketing food, are congested and short. On that account he believes that

# ATTENTION HOG RAISERS

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## Poison Insects To Get A Good Yield From Garden

A good yield from a Victory garden depends largely upon the gardener's success in controlling the insects which prey upon young tender plants. A full growth of foliage, especially with potatoes, is necessary because the leaves are the means of conveying food and energy to the roots. Insects damage leaves by chewing or sucking the juices and control should be applied as soon as they appear.

Lead arsenate, used either as a dust or spray, is the most effective poison for potato insects. According to Paul Gregg, assistant entomologist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, it gives a good kill, sticks to the leaves well, and gives protection for two or three weeks unless washed off by rain. Three tablespoonfuls of poison to one gallon of water makes a satisfactory spray and requires less of the poison than dusting. But Gregg suggests that if the latter method is used the plants should be dusted liberally.

Cryolite may be used with safety for controlling cabbage worms until heads begin to form. The poison then should be changed to rotenone, which is harmless to humans. Cryolite may be dusted on the plants or used as a spray by mixing three tablespoonfuls with one gallon of water. Applications should be repeated at weekly intervals.

The first generation of the squash bug is appearing on cucumber and squash vines. As a simple means of control, Gregg suggests picking the adult bugs off the plants before they can hatch another brood. There won't be many and they are easy to catch in the early morning or late afternoon. Then apply Black Leaf 40 according to directions on the bottle to dispose of the young. This should be done without delay the bugs multiply as the plants grow.

County Extension agents who are familiar with methods of control are prepared to assist gardeners with their insect problems.

## Sanitation In Poultry Flocks Pays Dividends

A poultry house swept and visibly clean doesn't always mean that it is sanitary, says Dr. W. A. Boney, poultry veterinarian for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Many disease germs, worm eggs and external parasites may be present but not visible. A house is at its best after it has been scraped with hoe and shovel, scrubbed with hot lye

water, and then sprayed with a good creosote disinfectant after drying.

Sanitation, Dr. Boney explains, is expressed in the effort to keep surroundings and equipment clean in order to prevent disease and losses. Regardless, high death rates sometimes occur in flocks cleanly housed. This may be due to attempting to fit too many birds in to too little space having inadequate equipment. This he believes verifies the adage "it makes no difference how many birds you put into a house, they will die down to fit the house."

Sanitation also involves other safeguards against disease, such as

buying disease free chicks, blood testing flocks regularly for pullorum disease, removing daily all visibly sick birds, and quickly destroying all dead ones.

Good chicks deserve a chance, which means protecting them against disease from infancy. Old stock are the most likely carriers of disease and parasites, Dr. Boney suggest. Isolate the old hens from the chicks and disease hazards not only would be greatly reduced, but many poultry disease problems would disappear. That's the only way roup and colds can be controlled.

Old birds never should be brought in from the outside and placed with the farm flock. The double

hazard in doing this is the possibility of contracting a disease from the home flock, or the likelihood of introducing a disease, especially roup. If old birds have to be brought in they should be quarantined with about six of the home birds for one month. If neither develop disease the addition may be safe. But the best precaution is to get rid of the old birds after the first laying season and replace them with pullets which have been reared separately.

One other big role in sanitation is cleaning brooder houses twice weekly or oftener to prevent coccidiosis. This is the only fool-proof method, Dr. Boney says.

# Hang-Up Girls: Calendar Cuties Are Perential Pin-ups As Shown By Survey of Calendar Industry

Your pin-up girl, sir, is really over 40 years old — she's been hanging around your kitchen for a generation!

Long before soldiers discovered her as a sweater girl she was around the house on the family calendar.

She's worn well, too — is still soft, cuddly and pretty—only more youthful and streamlined. This year, though, she's changed her clothes and is sporting a brand new outfit of red, white and blue.

Patriotic or not, by popular demand a pin-up calendar girl has to be either nude or semi-nude, says Brown and Bigelow who sell a major share of the 75,000,000 calendars used annually.

But the best all-time seller was just a face, the 1924 "Dream Girl" by Ralph Armstrong. Now, his 1944 "Yankee Doodle Girl" is full view and is on the way to hitting the calendar jackpot again with more than 10,000,000 calendars.

### Brunette Again

She is again brunette as she was in 1903, is not tall, only 5 feet 4 inches, weighs 112 pounds, has a 35-inch bust, 34-inch hips, 19-inch thigh, 12-inch calf, 7 1/2-inch ankle and looks 17-20 years old.

Besides pleasing homes, offices and taverns which exhibit calendars, the butcher and baker who advertise have to be satisfied, too. That is why the \$20,000,000 calendar industry offers a variety of calendar art.

The second girl choice is the bathing girl, and the sweet, wholesome fully-clothed type is third. She must always be looking directly at you, wearing red preferably—never lavender.

Once the pin-up girl had a real tussle to keep pinned up. The Quints stole the play from her for nine years with 18,000,000 calendars to their credit — though normally only babies up to one year of age are popular art.

### Best Seller

Another best seller, "At Bay," a landscape with animals, had a heyday, too, for 30 years. Small dogs that can be petted are usually popular—cats never are.

The war created a heavy national upswing in sales for the religious calendar which has always had number 1 popularity in South America.

Art "with calendar" is preferred in lieu of Rembrandt, Picasso or Cellini in 93 per cent of American homes with more than 50 per cent having at least two or more.

And though advertisers prefer their calendars hung either in banks, real estate offices or where monied people congregate, 52 per cent are exhibited in the nation's kitchens or pantries and some 20 per cent in dining or bedrooms.

When you have to look at the same calendar for a year, the art should be good to look at. That's why humor doesn't appeal—people get bored looking at the same joke from January to December 31st.

That's why the pin-up calendar girl is probably here to stay.

## Synthetic Rubber May Stymie Brazil

BEUEM, Para (AP)— Felixberto Camargo, director of the Agricultural Institute of the North, has warned that Brazil cannot compete in the postwar rubber market against U. S. synthetic and far east plantation rubber under its present tapping methods.

Brazilian rubber, which cannot profitably sell for less than 40 cents a pound, he says, must be reduced to a dime a pound to hold its own against the 18-20 cent prewar price of the far east and the rapidly dropping price of synthetic.

He urges Brazil to develop high producing, blight resistant rubber trees — such as he and North American experts are already working on—and create a network of government-subsidized small-land-owners in the Amazon.
