The fact that so many people have come to admire the tree makes it worth all the work and trouble, and we're sure the Starrs are pleased with the reception. It's all fine contribution to the season.

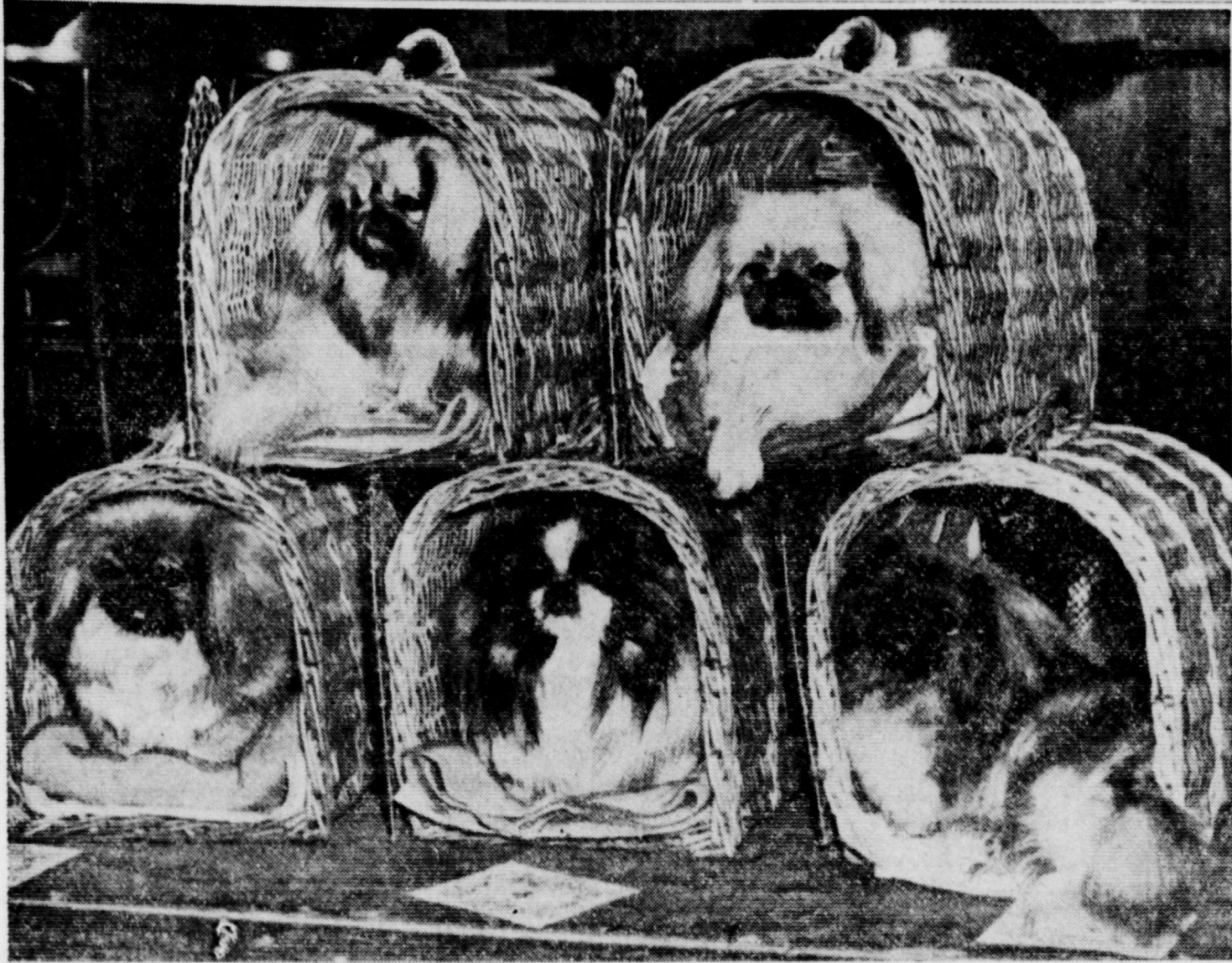

Judge Davenport Will Retire From 91st Court Bench

District Judge George L. Davenport of the 91st Court in Eastland County will lay down his gavel and retire from public office on Wednesday, Dec. 31, after 33 years on the same bench.

The veteran jurist, who did not seek re-election in last summer's voting, was honored recently when some 70 persons gathered in Eastland at a dinner sponsored by the Eastland County Bar Association.

Judge Davenport has been judge of the 91st District Court since it was created in Eastland County in 1920. He was appointed to the office at that time by W. P. Hobby, former governor. Admitted to the bar in 1899, Judge Davenport was elected Eastland county attorney in 1900 and held the office for two terms.

In 1906, Judge Davenport moved to Stamford and practiced law with his brother, the late B. P. Davenport, until 1918. He returned to Eastland County in 1918, opening a law office in Ranger at the peak of the oil boom in that area.

Since his appointment to the 91st court, Judge Davenport has won re-election regularly, many times without opposition.

WHEAT ACREAGE ABOUT SAME, CROP OUTLOOK IS BELOW 1952

A seeded winter wheat acreage in Texas for harvest in 1953 equal to that of last year but considerably below the 10-year average is in prospect, according to the December report of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. The estimated 5,021,000 acres sown and to be sown for 1953 is 17 percent below the 6,049,000 acres sown for harvest in 1951 and 10 percent below the 1941-50 average of 5,706,000 acres. The indicated seedings this year and last are the lowest since the 1944 crop but are higher than for any year prior to 1944 with the exception of 1936, 1937, and 1938.

Production is indicated at 25,105,000 bushels by conditions on December 1 and assuming about average growing conditions after that date. The indicated crop is 27 percent less than 1952 production, 58 percent below average, and except for the very short crops of 1950 and 1951, is the smallest since 1936. Yield per seeded acre is indicated at 5.0 bushels compared with 6.9 bushels in 1952 and the 10-year average of 10.1 bushels.

Conditions for getting wheat seeded and up to a stand this fall probably were the most unfavorable of record. Prolonged drought continued in the northern high plains and the northern rolling plains until the last week in November when rain and snow brought some hope. The moisture received was just sufficient to bring the crop up, particularly

in the high plains, but low temperatures have delayed emergence.

Low rolling plains areas have received some additional moisture since December 1 but the high plains continue in an extremely precarious situation. The moisture supply in most of the northwest probably is sufficient to start wheat, but not enough to carry it very long nor to permit additional seedings. Considerable intended acreage remained to be seeded after December 1 and a large part of that already sown had not come up to a stand. In the north Texas area rains came earlier in November and in progressively larger amounts to the east. Moisture is fully adequate at present in the northern blacklands.

Rye seedings for all purposes this fall are estimated at 106,000 acres, compared with 102,000 acres last fall and 62,000 acres the 1941-50 average. Condition of the crop on December 1 is reported at 60 percent of normal compared with 62 percent a year ago, 47 percent two years ago and the 10-year average of 74 percent. Most of this crop is used as a pasture and cover crop and as a nurse crop for vetch, with only a small proportion being harvested for grain.

Callahan County Due To Receive Two Farm Roads

The Texas Highway Department has announced two farm-to-market road projects for the Putnam area of Callahan County, according to information here Saturday. Both projects are due for completion during the coming year.

The projects were listed as follows:

1. From the end of FM 1832, six miles north of Highway 80, to Highway 183, south of Moran, a distance of approximately five miles.

2. From FM 880, five miles south of Putnam, east to the Eastland County line, a distance of about 3.6 miles.

Specifications call for the farm roads to be hard-surfaced, two lane thoroughfares. Callahan County will be required to provide right-of-way for the roads.

LOBOES WORKOUT SATURDAY TO PREPARE FOR AREA TOURNEY

Coaches V. C. Overall and Jay Williams put their Cisco High School Lobos through a stiff drill Saturday in preparation for their first game in the Howard Payne annual invitation tournament to be held in Brownwood Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Some of the leading teams in A, AA, AAA and AAAA are entered in the tournament and Cisco has drawn San Angelo of District 1-AAAA as their first opponent. The game is scheduled for 5 p. m. Monday. There are 16 teams entered in the tourney, including Cisco, Comanche and Stephenville of District 2A-10. The next home game for the Lobos is on January 6 when they play Clyde at the community gym.

Eastland Youths Are Injured In Accident

Three Eastland youths were injured last Wednesday night when their automobile overturned on Highway 80 east of Cisco. The young men, Carol Massengale, Gerald Poe and Johnny Honea, all of Eastland, were given emergency treatment at Graham Hospital.

The boys received cuts and bruises. They told investigators that they were forced to pull off the highway to avoid a collision, and their car turned over five times. The auto was demolished.

Crop Prospects Are Improved In Much Of Texas

Wheat, oat, cover crop and winter pasture prospects in the low rolling plains, eastern plateau and counties eastward across the state were further improved by additional mid-week and light weekend rains. Wet fields stopped field work over most of that area.

Only light scattered showers fell above the Cap Rock and in western plateau and trans-Pecos areas. Small grains in eastern plateau and northern counties continued to make good development and the midweek rains in those areas provided adequate moisture to maintain growth. In the high plains low temperatures further delayed emergence of wheat, and the moisture situation continued critical.

Conditions were favorable for active harvest of commercial vegetables in all sections. A light movement of tender vegetables continued from scattered areas in the lower valley that escaped serious damage from the previous week end frosts. Tomatoes moving from the Laredo section were shed stocks and the season for that area is over. Hardy type vegetable supplies increased further with quality good.

Planting of additional hardy type vegetables for later season harvest was practically finished. Planting of the early spring tomato crop in the lower valley continued. Most of the seed is on hand for the small acreage of early spring potatoes in the lower valley and planting is started. Moisture was still ample for most growing crops in the non-irrigated sections of the coastal bend and Raymondville areas.

Additional moisture will be needed soon in the coastal bend, however, for satisfactory progress to be maintained. Crops in those areas, particularly onions, are later than usual because of the early season dry weather but temperatures have been very favorable for growth since planting was completed. Some onion acreage was still being set out in the Laredo section and transplanting was well along in the Eagle Pass section. Most of the Winter Garden acreage was set out a little earlier than usual.

Small grain, winter grass and weeds were coming along and supplying some feed over the eastern half of the state. Moisture is now adequate in that area and with a few days of warmer weather green feed should soon be available. Dry range feed continues critically short in the west and heavy supplemental feeding was necessary to maintain stock.

Most Business Firms Will Close January 1

Most Cisco business firms will observe a holiday on Thursday, January 1, 1953, in keeping with a decision reached recently on holidays for next year, according to a survey Saturday. January 1st will be the first of six holidays planned for 1953.

The business firms voted for the six holidays at a meeting of the membership of the Merchants Credit Association early in December.

January 1 is a legal holiday as far as the Post Office is concerned. City and county offices also plan to be closed on New Year's Day.

Other holidays planned in 1953 include May 30, Memorial Day; July 4, Independence Day; September 7, Labor Day; November 27, Thanksgiving Day; and December 25, Christmas Day. The 1953 Christmas Day will fall on Friday.

Business firms were preparing to begin taking year end inventories Saturday. This annual task is usually done in most stores during the week between Christmas and New Year's. Most firms have reported good business for December.

Christmas Day was quiet in Cisco and Eastland County, with most residents enjoying holiday gatherings with friends and families. City and county police reported little or no activity. No serious accidents marred the yuletide celebration in this area.

A long range weather forecast has indicated that this area can look for comparatively mild weather through New Year's Day. A prediction of probable showers had been amended to partly cloudy Saturday.

Area activities will return to normal on Monday, Jan. 5, as city schools resume class work.

SHEPPERD PLEDGES EFFICIENCY AS STATE'S ATTORNEY GENERAL

AUSTIN, Dec. 27. — Attorney General-elect John Ben Shepperd pledged Saturday that citizens of Texas may expect "efficiency, economy and integrity" from the Attorney General's office during his tenure.

Shepperd pointed out that he would not have to "look around and find something to do." In addition to the tidelands problem, the office faces a full workload of pending cases, many of which are of extreme importance to the state. He mentioned the gas gathering tax and school land suits as being most critical at the present time.

The Attorney General is the legal representative of the People of Texas in approximately 2,000 cases each year, legal advisor to 200 state agencies, and handles suits involving citizens' rights and millions of dollars in state funds and property.

Shepperd announced that a plan for reorganization of the department is now being studied along the lines of his reorganization of the Secretary of State's office which resulted in economy of personnel and considerable savings of operating funds while maintaining efficiency.

He plans to cooperate with Governor Shivers and the Department of Public Safety in enforcing the communist control law passed by the last legislature. He warned that all of the injunctive and investigative powers of his office will be aimed at organized gambling and that efforts of organized gambling syndicates to obtain a foothold in Texas will be strenuously opposed.

"Violations of our state's anti-trust, tax, narcotic, liquor, gambling and other laws will be vigorously prosecuted," he declared, "but law-abiding businesses and citizens will be just as vigorously protected."

"The office will not assume nor will it develop a prosecution complex. It will not be used by any pressure groups to stifle the American system of freedom of opportunity of enterprise," he said.

Shepperd further pledged the full aid of his administration to the incoming 53rd Legislature. He has already appointed a Special Legislative assistant "to achieve a high degree of cooperation" with the lawmakers.

He stated that he will appoint special assistants with primary duties of studying water, election, usury and foreign corporation tax problems.

He said that he considered water the number one state problem and stated that all of the resources of his office will be available to help solve it.

Shepperd, 36 year old former Longview attorney, is former Secretary of State and former National President of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Before his election as Attorney General, he was a member of the law firm of Kenley, Sharp, Shepperd and Ritter and a former president of the Gregg County Bar Association.

THE YOUNG FARMER

The young farmer of today with ordinary ability and the proper respect for work can get established, Virgil P. Lee, president, Production Credit Corporation of Houston, said recently at Texas A. and M. College. Speaking at the Second Annual Texas Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers, Lee pointed out that "Success in helping to get these fellows established in the farming business depends almost entirely on the sort of young man we have to work with." He cited several case histories to prove his point.

More than 150 commercial bankers of Texas were given down to earth information on the technical and scientific end of farm problems, from soils to the feeding of poultry, by A. and M. staff members.

Said W. H. Kelley of the Victoria National Bank, "This information brought out by this school gives the lending officer of a bank a better approach to the problem. It serves to bring bankers up to date on all phases of agriculture."

A basic consideration for production of any crop, Dr. J. E. Adams, head of the Department of Agronomy, A. and M. System, told the bankers, is "use best land for crop with high production cost and highest sale value; fit the crop into balanced farming program and be certain that land allows water to penetrate rapidly and has enough holding capacity to prevent water stress for the particular crop."

Other points which go to evaluate the borrowing power of the farmer and rancher were those brought out by Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, head of A. and M.'s Poultry Husbandry Department, who said, "we are now observing a shift away from the farm flocks and an increasing interest in commercial broiler, turkey and egg farms."

The use of fertilizers came in for this comment from Dr. J. B. Page, professor of agronomy, in charge of soil physics investigation at A. and M.: "Use of fertilizers does not guarantee high yields, but where lack of nutrients is limiting crop production, properly applied fertilizers give a return of from three to six dollars for each dollar invested."

Dr. Vernon A. Young, head, Department of Range and Forestry, said, that "according to the range specialists, much Texas grass land has suffered a 50 per cent reduction in its original grazing capacity because of overstocking, mismanagement and droughts. As a result, every year millions of dollars are lost to the ranchmen and others associated with the livestock industry."

He declared that "of the 169 million acres of land in Texas, more than 93 million are native grass lands and roughly 10 million are abandoned cultivated lands which are slowly being inhabited by grasses of low forage value."

As to the farmer customer seeking a loan for the purchase of a tractor, a hay baler, or a cotton picker costing thousands of dollars, Fred R. Jones, head of the Agricultural Engineering Department, told the bankers, "It is

quite logical and appropriate that you be in a position to analyze the need and use of the machine involved from every standpoint. You should know the crop and acreage involved, the adaptability of the machine to the specific crop the ability of the purchaser to properly operate and service it, the probable need for the machine in future years and the reliability and stability of the dealer to provide service."

Dr. J. C. Miller, Head of the Department of Animal Husbandry said that as of January 1, 1953, the estimated number of beef cattle is at an all-time high of 55,000,000 or 10 per cent above that of January 1, 1952. There are approximately 22,000,000 beef cows, two years old and over, he pointed out. "Any kind of successful beef enterprise must provide year around roughage in the form of pasture, cured dry roughage or silage," Miller said.

In 1943, Texas farmers saved more than four million pigs; in 1952, reports indicate that about 1.8 million pigs will be saved, Fred Hale, professor of animal husbandry said. "This shows the extremes in Texas hog production caused by the in-and-out producers in the state. About four million hogs are required to feed the eight million people in Texas. We are importing into the state about 50 per cent of the work consumed annually in Texas," Hale declared.

"Twenty-five excellent dairy animals may easily be more profitable than 100 animals with poor producing ability," R. E. Leighton, associate professor of dairy husbandry, told the bankers. He said that Holsteins are increasing in popularity in Texas "because the milk pricing schedules in most of the state tend to favor cows which produce large volumes of milk."

The Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers was lauded by Tommy Tomlinson of the First National Bank of Cooper "as one of the greatest services offered the banks."

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

The season for returning Christmas gifts to stores for exchange is now upon us. Most business establishments are as cooperative as possible about this annual American pastime, but before getting into any arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look at the legal situation involved. You may find that persuasion is more in order than demands for adjustment.

Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds and exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so — not because they are required to, according to the State Bar of Texas.

However, a promise to refund or exchange merchandise made by the store or the salesman should be honored. Similarly, if a store misrepresents the quality of certain goods or if the goods are defective, you are justified in expecting a satisfactory adjustment. But you have no more legal right to expect a store to refund or exchange because you change your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask you to give back the goods that were sold to you because it didn't want to sell them after all.

Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the difference, any more than he could make you pay the difference if he discovered that a competitor offered the same coat at a higher price than he had charged for it. Usually the seller is permitted to set his own price, but ceiling prices and other regulations restrict this right in some lines.

Much the same rules apply to the refund of deposits. Unless it is the policy of a store to refund deposits on articles, or at least apply the amount on the purchase of some other item, the buyer is obligated to go through with the terms of the contract, even though he has changed his mind about the purchase.

When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the remainder of the purchase price, the seller can take legal action against him, according to the terms of the contract.

The same principles apply to a trade-in allowance on used merchandise towards the purchase of a new article. Such a trade-in allowance is considered the same as a deposit.

HEALTH TALKS

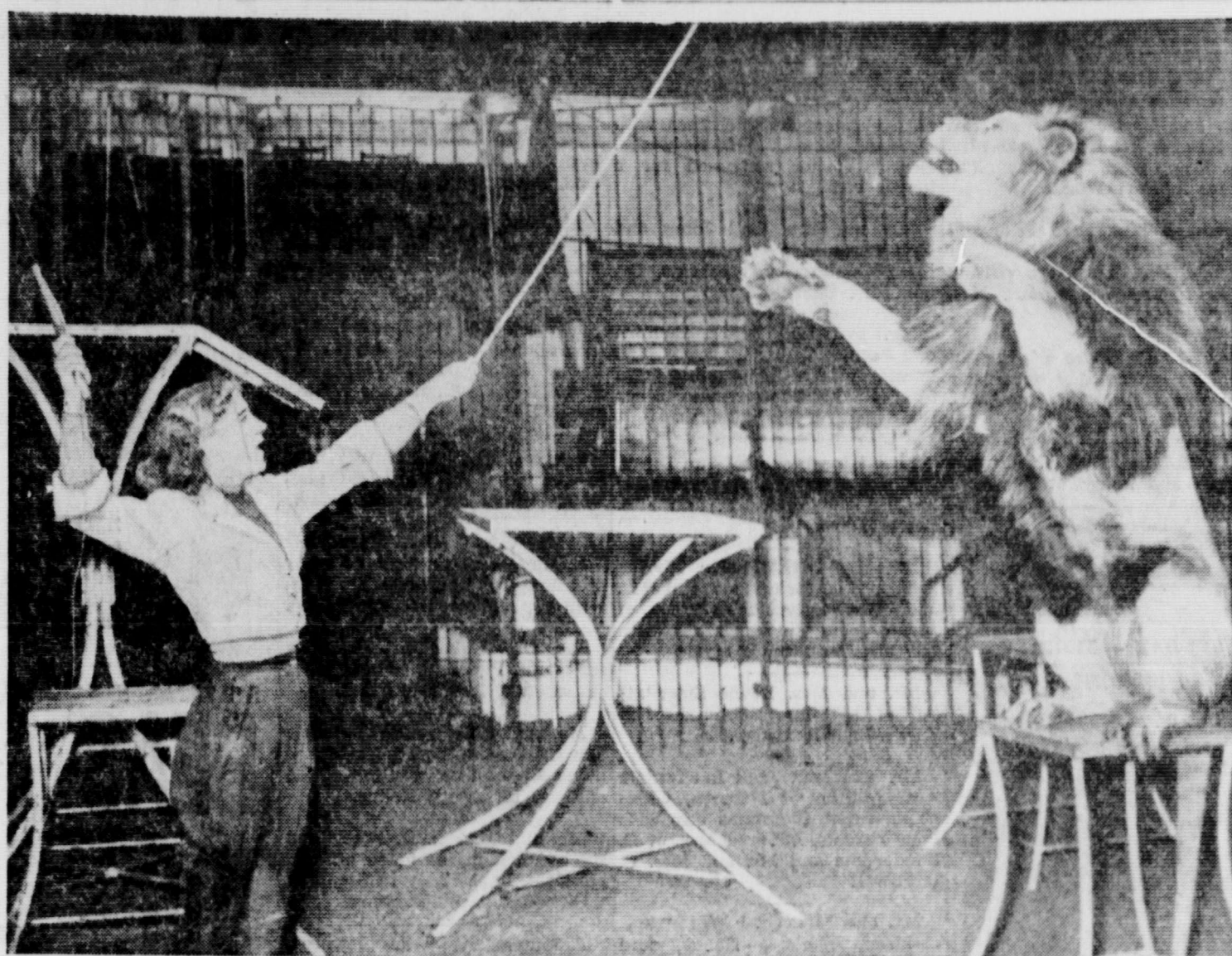

"Merry Christmas, everybody!" You might almost say those are famous last words. Before Father picked up the carving knife and the kids and Mom rolled up their sleeves to get down to the business of eating, a few moments may have been directed to prayer. After that, it seemed to be every man for himself. It may be that people eat too fast or just too much, but it's funny how many complaints of indigestion, heartburn, or stomach ache you hear after a big holiday. It's a time when attention is forcefully centered on the old tummy.

A bad taste in the mouth is not usually a symptom beginning with the stomach. More often it is caused by bad teeth or infection in the nose, throat, or sinuses. Neither is a coated tongue usually a stomach symptom, in the main being the consequence of local conditions. However, a bad taste and a coated tongue might possibly result from mistreating the stomach.

One form of indigestion, "gas on the stomach," isn't a very accurate term. Very little gas is produced there. This form of discomfort may result from swallowing air and possibly is relieved a little by belching. There is no such thing as "gas around the heart," however, and someone who has pain around his heart should have a careful medical examination to be sure he doesn't have heart trouble.

Heartburn is an uncomfortable feeling which seems to start in the stomach, under the breastbone and work up. It has nothing to do with the heart; more than likely it is due to something like food or stomach juices which stretch the lower end of the food tube (esophagus) leading from the throat to the stomach. Sometimes a little material may find

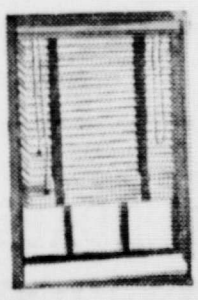
