ANGRY FLORIDA MOB LYNCHES NEGRO

Legislature in Position to Dispose Of Two Primary Issues

COLORADO TAX PAYMENT BILL IN LINE

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 — The Texas legislature reconvening Monday, has jockeyed itself into disposal of its five major issues. Revision of interest and penalties on taxes paid by next March 1 and senate adoption of a compromise bill. The house has already passed the bill by a two-thirds majority.

Senate sponsors propose to bring it up Monday. They were hopeful of a two-thirds majority vote. Final passage in the house of the Colorado river bill, calling for appropriations for the completion of Buchanan dam will place that bill in a favorable position next week.

The Brazos river bill, calling for a \$5,000,000 appropriation for a state and federal project, the first major bill passed, had not been sent for the governor's approval.

GAS COMPANY TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE MONDAY

All Cisco people are invited to attend the opening of the Cisco Gas Corporation Monday evening of this week, when the company will open its doors and ask the people to inspect their huge plant which has been made ready to serve Cisco with natural gas from wells in this section according to the informal information of R. L. Ponsler, in charge of Hickok operations in Texas.

Those attending will have the services of experts who will explain all about meter reading, and will be shown the big egg-shaped apparatus that detects the least defect in a meter before it is placed, he said. Some 725 meters have been set and more than a hundred have been connected. Within the next week or so others will be set and all connected, Mr. Ponsler announced.

Mr. Ponsler further stated that over \$200,000 had already been spent in plant construction, pipelines, materials, salaries and other items. He also said the company contemplated the further expenditure of many more thousands in this section, one item of which was a carbon black plant to utilize gas now going to waste.

The woman said the negro grabbed her by the throat, dragged her into some bushes near a lumber company and attacked her.

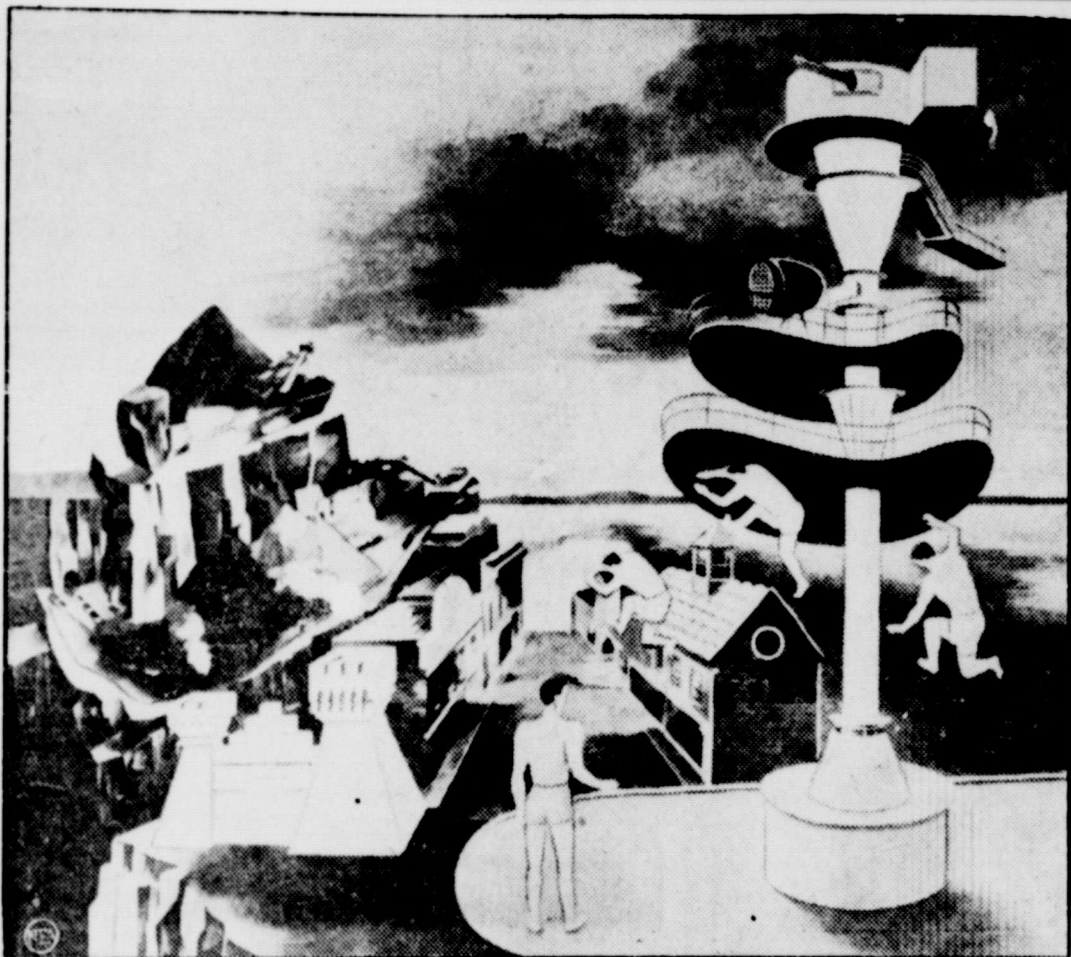
Five Shots And Stick Kill Goose

BUSINESS IN TEXAS SHOWS AN INCREASE

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 — A group of business indications mostly cheerful, was issued here today by the bureau of business research at the University of Texas.

Dr. A. B. Cox, cotton expert and bureau director, reviewed stocks, consumption and other factors to arrive at a calculated price for middling spots on the New Orleans cotton exchange of 14.41 cents per pound.

Widening margins indicated a better demand for American cotton, Cox concluded.

Shipments of livestock in September from Texas to Fort Worth yards were greater than those of September, 1933, although the total fell below that of August, when government buying boosted the shipments to a peak.

Building permit reports from 36 Texas cities indicate a marked rise over September a year ago, but a decline.

Johnston had been hunted since Wednesday night after he and a companion kidnapped a farmer and forced him to drive to near Haskell, in the edge of the Cookson hills.

Lubbock Man Named County Judge Head

FORT WORTH, Oct. 27 — County Judge E. L. Pitts of Lubbock, formerly of Palo Pinto county, today was elected president of the County Judges and Commissioners association of Texas in a surprise outcome of the balloting.

Reversing earlier predictions, the convention in closing its session, elected Judge Pitts over Judge Dan Brooks, Kaufmann county, who earlier had been considered the probable next-term president.

ANTILERS, Okla., Oct. 27 — Officers who threw out a fruitless search for Raymond Hamilton, Texas desperado, drew it in today and went about their usual business.

Reports that Hamilton and a companion actually had been captured and were in jail here kept officers busy answering the telephone and explaining for an hour last night.

The total assets were listed at \$1,007,804.63, and deposits for this call were announced at \$901,520.81. This represents a gain of \$77,990.40 over the \$824,121.41 deposits for the last call.

"Only once before, when there was a large deposit of a transient nature, have the bank's assets reached the million mark," Mr. Spears said. "This time it represents a steady gain."

SALLISAW, Okla., Oct. 27 — Hundreds of friends and curious strangers passed by the casket of Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd as it lay in the front room of the family home.

A member of the family kept out newspaper men and suspicious-looking strangers. The gunman's mother is bitter toward newspapers for printing stories about her son when he turned outlaw and for making pictures of his body when he was killed.

Funeral services have been set for 2 p. m. tomorrow at the Baptist church at Atkins, in the Cookson hills northeast of Sallisaw.

Ground Is Broken For Narcotic Farm

FORT WORTH, Oct. 27 — Construction of a \$4,000,000 federal narcotic farm and hospital here began with a ground breaking service taken part in by L. W. Roberts, assistant secretary of the treasury.

The project, when completed, will be one of the two large narcotic farms constructed by the federal government. The other is in Kentucky.

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 — Approximately 300 operators have been disconnected from pipelines for failure to file oil reports required by oil and gas conservation statutes, Olin Culbertson, chief of the railroad commission's gas utilities division, said today.

Several weeks ago Culbertson warned that pipelines would be disconnected at the wells of operators refusing to file their reports.

MA SAYS COMMON FINALLY SAW LIGHT

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 — Governor Ferguson today congratulated the railroad commission on "finally seeing the light."

She reminded newspapermen at a press conference that last May a year ago she had advised Federal Oil Administrator Harold Ickes and President Roosevelt that in her opinion the present Texas commission would fail and a call for aid from the federal government would be necessary.

"It will not be forgotten that the very persons now calling for federal aid to stop hot oil are the ones who hooted at the idea then," former Governor James E. Ferguson said.

CANADIAN IS CHARGED WITH SLAYING FIVE

QUEBEC, Oct. 27 — The bodies of five relatives of J. Rosaire Bilodeau, former mail carrier, were found Thursday night in woods near St. Therese, a few hours after the man had been placed in jail, charged with shooting and killing an official in the postoffice here.

Police expressed the opinion that Bilodeau had become suddenly insane and committed the crimes.

At the postoffice Octave Fiset, divisional postal superintendent, was mortally injured by a burst of shots Bilodeau fired in a conference room.

Postmaster J. B. L. Morin was struck and gravely wounded before police cornered Bilodeau in a telephone booth.

Two Sisters Slain

Two of the five bodies found in the woods were those of Bilodeau's sisters. Another was that of his sister-in-law and two of those slain were male relatives of Bilodeau.

The three women were killed in a small patch of woods a considerable distance from the highway. The bodies were cold when found, indicating, authorities said, the women had been dead since at least mid-afternoon.

Authorities said Bilodeau apparently had gone to the postoffice soon after leaving St. Therese-de-Laval.

Began Firing at Once

At the postoffice he demanded to see Fiset and he was directed to the superintendent's office. On entering the room Bilodeau immediately pulled a pistol from a pocket and started firing, the first shots being directed at Postmaster Morin.

As the postmaster fell Fiset and another man rushed at Bilodeau. Fiset was killed by bullets in the neck and body, while the other man was struck but not seriously injured.

INSTITUTE OF BUSINESS TO BE HELD HERE

A three day institute of business will be presented in Cisco beginning Nov. 5 under the direction of H. W. Stanley, nationally known authority on economics and business administration, according to an announcement issued by chamber of commerce.

This business course, which is being offered without charge to the local merchants and salespeople, is a service that is given by the Trade Extension division of the Dallas chamber of commerce. Through this unusual opportunity to study modern business methods, a new chapter in trade development of the southwest is being written.

The institute will be held at the chamber of commerce building, each evening beginning Monday from 7:30 to 9:30 o'clock.

Men and women in the business world here, having a selling or advertising problem, will be interested in this series of lectures and will obtain valuable information on business administration and salesmanship, merchandising and public contact.

Each day will be spent by Mr. Stanley in visiting local merchants and business men where individual store problems will be discussed.

For the last ten years Mr. Stanley has conducted similar institutes in the larger cities of the south and west and has gained an enviable reputation as an analyst of business conditions in this part of the nation.

Commenting by letter on the course which is to be presented here R. L. Thornton, president of the Merchants National bank in Dallas, and president of the Dallas chamber of commerce, has explained how it is possible for the Dallas wholesale market to offer such a comprehensive service without cost to the local merchants.

SLAYER SHOT AND DRAGGED BEHIND CAR

MARIANNA, Fla., Oct. 27 — The body of Claude Neal, 23, negro, confessed attacker and slayer of a white girl, swung from a tree on the courthouse lawn here today, the victim of an enraged mob.

A large crowd of men, women, and children silently gazed at the body, nude except for a sack reaching from the waist to the knees. The negro had been shot at least 50 times, burned with red hot irons, and dragged through the streets behind an automobile.

Sheriff W. F. Chambliss, speaking from his home two blocks from the courthouse square, insisted he knew nothing of the lynching.

A description of the scene and the body was furnished by Allison White, employed of an automobile concern near the square. White saw the body and the crowd on his way to work.

Neal, who told officers yesterday he beat Lola Cannaday, 20, to death, after criminally attacking her on her father's farm near Greenwood, Fla., last week, was brought to town shortly after midnight.

The body trailed through the dust at the end of a rope behind an automobile and saw swung dead from a tree. A mob of at least 5,000 gathered on the courthouse lawn.

FOUR ARE HURT AS AUTOMOBILE HITS CULVERT

One person is in the hospital and three others have been treated for injuries as the result of a wreck on the Cisco-Eastland highway at about 11:30 p. m. Friday, E. A. Winters of Eastland is suffering from a compound fracture of the left arm, contusions and abrasions, attendants at Graham's sanitarium reported.

Mrs. Dolores Woodall, who was driving the car when it overturned a mile east of Cisco, returned to her home in Eastland today. She suffered severe lacerations of the forehead and face. George Key of Eastland was treated for lip lacerations and J. W. Wilson of Cisco for neck lacerations. Coe McLeary of Cisco, owner of the car, was uninjured.

The car, a Plymouth sedan, was badly damaged when it struck a culvert at the foot of the hill east of Cisco. As it struck it swerved back into the road, demolishing the top and one side.

Disappearance Tale Is Branded False

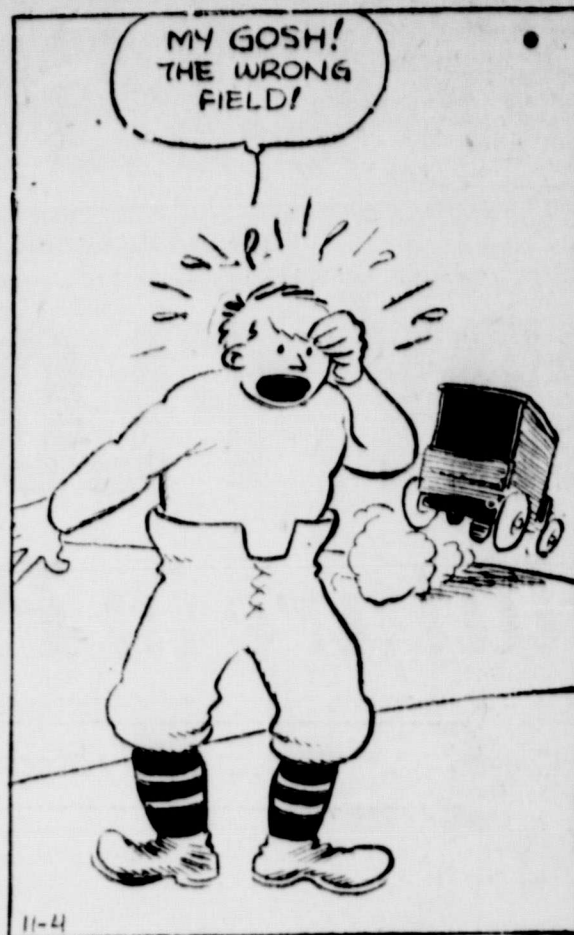

Poking Along at Sixty

Yes, the world is moving along at, we would say, from sixty to ninety miles an hour on the surface, but anywhere up to four hundred miles an hour in the air. That seems to be the speed of our high-powered automobiles and fastest airplanes.

But, in the language of the streets, "We haven't seen any thing yet." A young man and his sister in California seem to have invented a puddle-jumping automobile that can navigate all kinds of ditches—sometimes making a leap of fifty-one feet safely, and to be almost entirely free from danger of being overturned. The tryouts are still in the primitive stage but present trials seem to point to a perfected car that eliminates all danger from rough roads and ditches. The embankments that cause us to turn turtle now will cause us no inconvenience with the new model.

With danger from overturning eliminated, what will the new models offer us in the way of speed? Already we read of the vast sums being spent by General Motors and Henry Ford in their work of getting ready for the new '35 and '36 models. A speed of one hundred or even one hundred fifty miles per hour does not appear to be unreasonable within the next year or two. With present braking efficiency, it is much easier to stop from a speed of sixty miles per hour than it was a few years ago at thirty miles an hour.

If you care to imagine a little in the light of accomplishments during the past few years, you may easily see yourself darting about the country at airplane speed—spend the weekend in California or Florida—back to work in Cisco Monday as usual.

Finding Happiness on a Farm

A tract of ten to twenty acres in a good neighborhood, convenient to schools and markets, will afford an ideal existence if conducted in the right spirit and in a thrifty manner. The Federal Government is committed to the plan of financing such projects, lending ample capital for the purchase of land and equipment and allowing time to reach a money-making stage before requiring repayment.

In all earnestness I can recommend farm life to those who have suffered misfortune in town, provided they will curb any possible ambition to acquire more than twenty acres or to get wealthy in a hurry. Unemployed families can locate in a community of their own choosing and where they will have much greater advantages than settlers on the frontier knew. They will escape the hardships of frontier life through liberal financing by the Government.

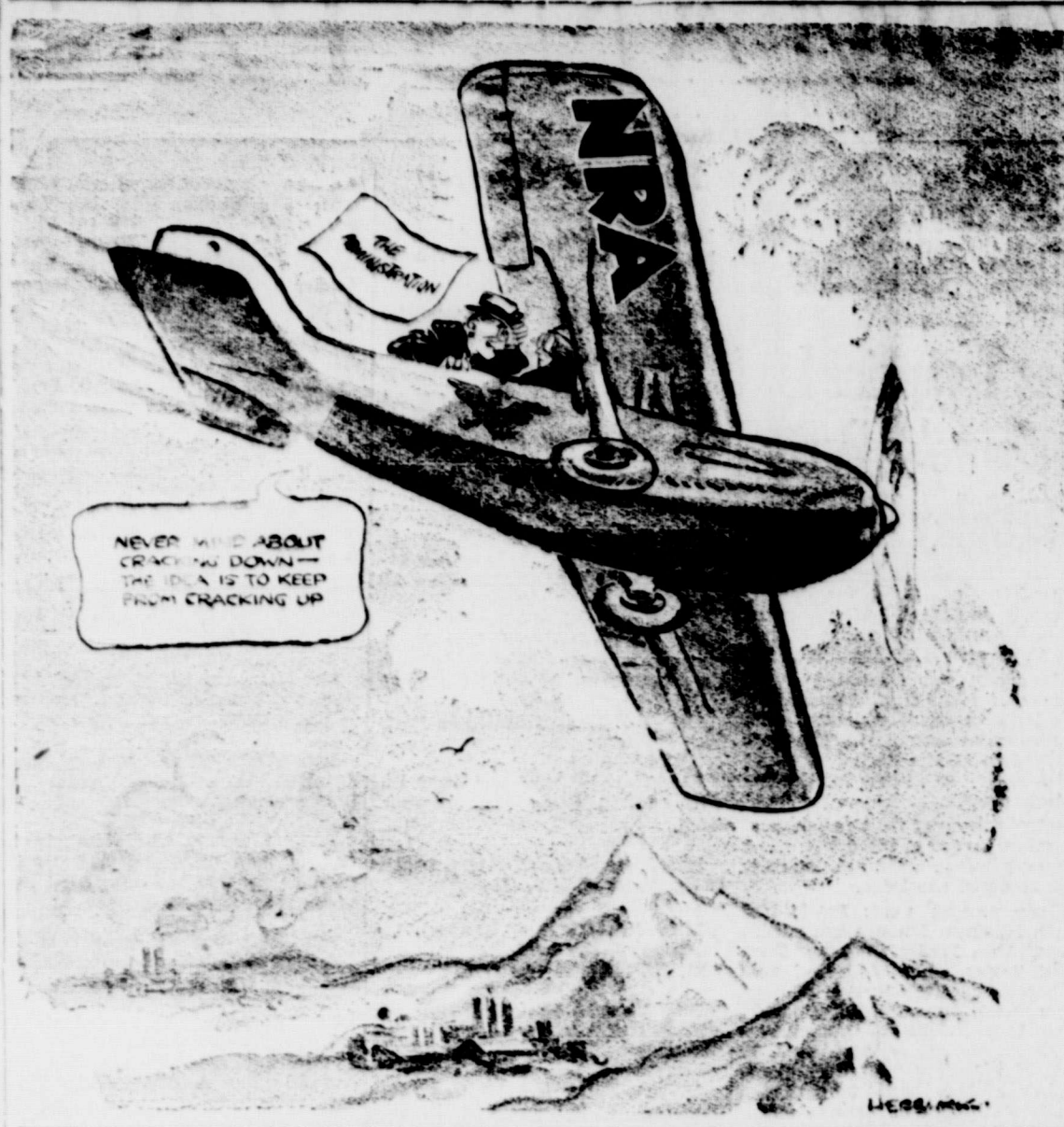
If it seems better to have only one or two cows there may be a few hogs and sheep. With the right kind of effort and thrift, money can be saved the first year. The amount will grow year by year. I can bring plenty of testimony that six small cows and a small flock of poultry will return \$1,000 a year, leaving all other products for family use of additional savings.

Celery, asparagus, tomatoes and strawberries are among the reasonably sure crops.

Potatoes, cabbage, peas and beans do not bring so large a return, but they pay reasonably well. Some garden products grow two crops in a season, for example peas, lettuce, onions and spinach.

The Government is aiding farmers to regulate production in various lines, but it will never interfere with the natural right to raise a good living for the family. The owner of a little farm can tell before he begins whether he can sell certain garden and poultry products or not. He can market by

How they got the job; 3. Present cross-currents between the United States and Mexico, with special reference to property in Mexico owned by United States citizens; 4. What is planned by the present dominating element in Mexican government for the country. This is the second article of the series.

Mexico today the writer found seem prosperous.

Regardless of the many revolutions, very costly revolts at that, to the people of Mexico, there is a new Mexico under Aztec skies.

In the cities and towns of Mexico labor is thoroughly and aggressively organized. In the rural sections of Mexico the agrarians are organized. In the politics of Mexico in recent years these handworkers as well as white collar workers have been co-operating with the rural organizations and they are all powerful at least on the surface of things, and are the power behind Gen. Calles and his four lieutenants in a political sense. They are responsible for the constitution which was adopted since the coming of Calles as the political ruler of Mexico.

Flaming youth (speaking of students of Mexico) is having its fling. Thousands of Mexicans who invaded the United States to better their economic fortunes in a few days

of the world war and the wild gambling era that followed in the wake of the war when the depression came, returned to Mexico. They are found everywhere in Mexico. They were promised homesteads and homes by Gen. Calles and his followers. It is said that more than 300,000 Mexicans who had gone to the States in world war times, on their return to the land of their nativity made haste to identify themselves with the powerful organizations directed by Calles. These "native sons" during their years in the States received a thorough American education. They spread the knowledge among their fellow workers or fellow farmers at home.

Mexico For The Mexicans
In recent years the slogan has been "Mexico for the Mexicans." It has been a popular slogan. There are very clever propagandists at the elbow of the very wise politicians who are shaping the so-called new departure in the land of the Aztecs.

"How they got their jobs," speaking of the leaders of today of the forces in control, is a tale easily told.

Madero came in. He was a patriot. He was sincere, but he was not a soldier. He was assassinated. Huerta, a soldier, a warrior, was the head of the army. Woodrow Wilson was president of the United States. Huerta, who had become dictator-president, was given the cold shoulder by the Wilson administration. He died in prison. Carranza came. He battled for the presidency and all the honors that go with that high office in any country. Carranza filled a bloody grave. Zapata, a bandit king, ruled one section of Mexico. Villa, another bandit king or free-lance raider, ruled

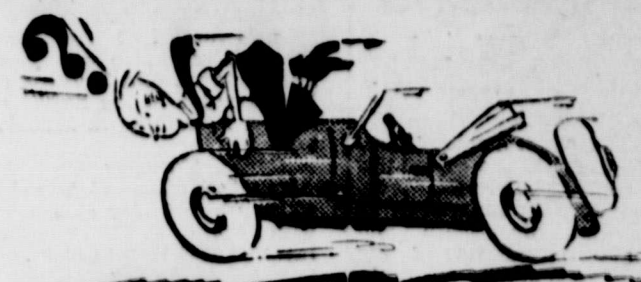

Writer Finds Mexico Today Is Prosperous

cers of the army as well as of the rank and file. In days of revolution trained soldiers had to forage in Mexico and pay day did not come often.

Then the young intellectuals who were out of jobs during the revolution and saw no future, had their mining. They declared that the petroleum wealth of Mexico in development and disposition of money values had passed into the hands of foreigners, leaving little of the wealth developed for the people of Mexico or in taxes for the support of the government and the maintenance of schools and other departments of government. They called for the partition of the great ranches of Mexico. They called for a new constitution for Mexico.

Drastic Laws Against the Church

They called for drastic laws against the Catholic church and its institutions. They said that more than 125,000 priests of the church were active in Mexico in church work and interference with the politics of Mexico. They advised their countrymen that the hour had come for tax supported public schools for the education of the children of Mexico and the absolute withdrawal of clerics from the activities of public affairs and for the complete separation of church and state in the political and law-making life of their country. All those who were for a new deal Mexico for Mexicans rallied to the standard of Plutarco Elias Calles and his close advisors and lieutenants. They are said to have made their pledges to the heads of the labor organizations, the farm organizations, the religious and civil liberty champions of a new order of things in Mexico, speaking of the spiritual side of affairs. And thus it is that Calles became the leader of the forces which are in absolute

control of government in Mexico today. Foreigners who are residents in Mexico admit that the old order has passed away, that it will not return, that a new race as well as a new social order under the leadership of Calles and his advisors is on the way and that following the inauguration of Lazaro Cardenas as president in the coming month of December the Mexican congress will hold one of the most significant sessions ever held by a lawmaking body in the work of enacting or rejecting the principal plank of the legislative new deal which will be submitted by the new executive with the approval of the dictator of Mexican policies and governmental affairs—who happens to be a Warlock without a crown but whose hand is ever in evidence in latter day activities in the politics of the republic lying south of the Rio Grande.

BERLIN, Oct. 27—Though Leonardo da Vinci's famous "Last Supper" is fast decaying, an exact copy of it in mosaic has been made in a Berlin Mosaic shop from a masterful reproduction of the original by Robert Richters. Thus this famous masterpiece of the immortal Italian will be preserved long after the original painting has perished.

Italian shops have long excelled in the ancient art of mosaics, but today they are buying from Berlin shops glass cubes of certain colors. Berlin Mosaics are fast becoming famous for the variety and splendor of their colors, numbering 1,500 different shades. Mosaics produced in Berlin have been sold to churches and buildings all over the world, some of them costing as much as \$20,000. Specimens of German mosaic can be seen in the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church in Berlin; in the Minister in Aix-la-Chapelle; in the Ascension Church in Jerusalem; the Trinity Church in Berlin; and in many luxurious homes, bath, ocean steamers and numerous other places.

Mosaic setting is one of the most ancient arts. Thrones of Egyptian kings were inlaid with ivory cubes. In ancient times marble was often used but the predominant material in ancient as well as modern mosaics is glass; for glass is impervious to the reaction of ordinary acids, withstands atmospheric corrosion and is well nigh indestructible, it was pointed out.

The present tendency in Germany toward monumental architecture is

conductive to the use of mosaics for they are not suitable to a small scale of design. The center of this delicate art is Berlin-Treptow.

The ingredients used in the production method adopted by shops there are sand, lime, oxide of lead, and alkalies. The metal oxides differ according to the color desired and are mixed and melted in a special oven. The mass of molten glass is poured on a flat iron table, pressed into slabs, mosaic cakes, and then allowed to cool very slowly. Then they are broken by hand into fragments 1-2 inch thick and assorted according to color.

For a model the mosaicist uses a painting which he recreates. The paper on which he assembles the glass cubes is an exact copy of the model, reversed. Each worker has a small anvil on which he shapes his fragments. An expert takes one week to execute one square meter and needs but two tools, the clipper and the awl. Though the process itself is simple, it requires perfect coordination of mind, hands, eyes and fingers.

When finished, the set picture is carefully pressed into a layer of concrete stucco. The paper, with the design now on top, is then removed.

The German mosaics display the same splendor of color, a jewel-like brilliance, and stately grandeur of form, so characteristic of the famous Byzantine period, especially of the 5th and 6th centuries, authorities say.

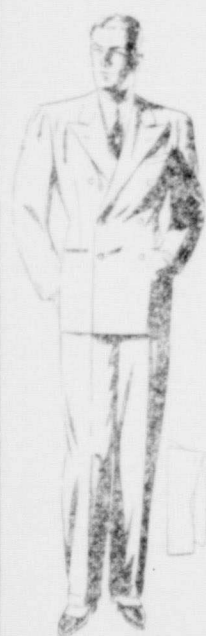
