Lamesa Federal Building Be Completed In March

Post Office Will Move To New Quarters In April

G. C. Pylant, superintendent for the Algeron-Blair Contracting Company, reports that construction work on the new Lamesa Postoffice will be 75 per cent completed by the end of this week and that the building will be completed the first week in March, although postal officials state it will probably be April 1, before the postoffice can be moved into the new quarters.

The construction work on the new federal building has been underway only 96 days, and with an average of thirty employees, the project has made rapid progress.

The one-story structure and basement will afford postal accommodations for Dawson county for years to come. The basement will be divided into office space for the county agent, and storage space for the steam heating system.

The workers are practically through with the brown coat of plaster on the interior, and plan to start on the white coat before the end of this week. When the inside walls have been finished, work of installing the mill work and finish work will be started. In other words the building will be completed by the first week in March, Mr. Pylant stated.

Pouring of the concrete for driveways has practically been completed and forms for the side walks are this week being laid. When the drives and sidewalks are completed, all that remains to be done on the exterior is grading of the grounds and preparations made for the planting of grass and shrubs.

The Golden Tornadoes basketball team has won two of their league contests on the road and will begin their home play on the Lamesa court Friday night at 7:30, with the Tahoka Bulldogs furnishing the opposition.

Slaton Tigers will appear here on Tuesday night, January 18, and the Post team will come to Lamesa on January 20, for the last game of the championship series for the South Half of District 5-B.

Lamesa's game with the Slaton Tigers was a close one, the Lamesa boys winning on a score of 14 to 15 last Thursday night. The Tornadoes won from Tahoka more decisively on Tuesday night. The Lamesa faculty team lost by a small score to the Tahoka faculty team. The faculty team is composed of Messrs. Gregg, Dean, Spraberry, Norris, Powell and Huddleston, with other men teachers serving as substitutes. The fast going Snyder team has been booked for a game here on Thursday, January 27.

The boys basketball team after defeating Slaton on Thursday night, took off for Colorado Friday morning to take part in the annual tournament at that place. They brought home the fourth place trophy to add to the basketball collection. They lost to Abilene in the semi-finals and to Plainville in the race for third place. Abilene won the tournament. The Golden Tornadoes get some needed experience and saw some strong teams in action. Their local followers were glad of their showing in the tournament which was attended by several of the strongest teams in West Texas.

Dawson County Cotton Oil Company To Make Many Improvements

Checking over the city's business firms we find true to their past, two seasons operations, the Dawson County Cotton Oil Company are planning another expansion program, according to their manager, J. Fred Smith.

In this connection, in order to meet the demands of this, the cattle feeder in this section, they are to install a new Four Hydraulic Press equipment at their present location. This will give them two distinct units, one giving to the public a 43 per cent protein feed also their present product of Wholepressed Feed, which is a 28 per cent protein.

Definite dates of the beginning of improvements will be announced later.

ONLY \$14,342.57 IN 1937 TAXES PAID TO DATE

According to reports coming from the office of R. W. (Buster) Herndon, county tax assessor-collector, the total 1937 county taxes on the tax roll is \$43,400.85, and up until January 1, there has been collected only \$14,342.57 of this amount or about 33 per cent, which means that a large amount of taxes will be paid through the remainder of this month.

The state tax law provides that taxes must be paid by January 31, or an additional 1 per cent penalty will be added each month until July 1, and on July 1, taxes will become delinquent and must be added penalty and interest until taxes are paid, Mr. Herndon stated.

To date 881 poll taxes have been paid, which leaves about 2769 to be paid by January 31, if all the voters, who cast ballots two years ago pay their polls this year.

Voting poll tax receipts are issued through January 31, and can be paid without paying real or personal property, but real and personal property tax cannot be paid without paying poll tax if polls have been assessed.

Young folks who are 21 years of age on or after January 1, 1937, are entitled to a free vote, thus if a young man for instance, was 21 years of age the day before an election was held, he would be entitled to vote.

People who were 60 years old before January 1, 1937, are entitled to an exemption certificate and a free vote. For all others the poll tax cost is \$1.75. The exemption certificates are issued by the tax assessor-collector.

WORK OF PAVING HOUSTON STREET TO START SOON

The City Commission has authorized the paving of Houston Street, beginning at South First and running to North Fourth, stated Mayor W. L. Marr, in an interview this week.

Mr. Daugherty, of Big Spring has been given the contract to supervise the street work, with W. S. Thompson getting the paving contract.

Mr. Marr stated that the city had adopted a new type of paving, the same as the City of Big Spring had been using. The new type is called a three-course inverted penetration asphalt pavement with a seal course. Six inch concrete curbs and 18-inch concrete gutter, on a 6-inch calciche base will be constructed.

According to Mr. Marr, the citizenship of Houston street is enthusiastic about this paving project, with practically every one already signed up.

Actual work on the street is hoped by City officials to be started within the next week or so.

The first half of the school year closes Friday, January 14, with the largest enrollment of white pupils in the history of the Lamesa Public Schools. Mr. G. M. Roberts, principal of the Elementary School, reports that 1008 individual enrollment cards have been placed in his files. Monday, January 31 Date Set For Election

At a meeting of the City Commission Thursday morning an order was passed calling for a city election to vote bonds to the amount of \$8,000 for the building of a new sewerage disposal plant for the City of Lamesa, with Monday, January 31, being the date set for the election.

The plans and specifications for the new project call for a \$10,000 plant, with the Works Progress Administration furnishing approximately \$2,000 the city will have to vote bonds for their part of the project, Mayor W. L. Marr stated. The plans drawn several weeks ago by Harvey C. Allen, local architect, have been approved by the State Health Department and have been turned over to WPA officials for their approval, which is thought will be made as soon as the city has made arrangements for their part of the needed funds, the mayor said.

The approved plans call for a new and modern plant, and one that is large enough to take care of Lamesa's needs in the years to come. The City of Lamesa is greatly in need of this new disposal plant as the one now in use is inadequate in every respect.

Officers appointed to hold the election are M. Hatch, Arch Heffernan, Wade Bartlett, and J. R. Flaniken. The voting will be carried on at the City Hall as in other elections, with the polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 6 p. m.

POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW GAIN OF OVER \$4,500.00

An increase of more than \$4,500 was shown in postal receipts at the Lamesa postoffice during 1937, according to figures obtained from postoffice officials this week.

Postal receipts for 1937 were \$27,327.34 as compared with \$22,785.97 for 1936 making an increase for 1937 of \$4,541.37 or approximately a 20 per cent gain. The best year preceding 1937 and 1936 was 1929, but the proceeds for this past year exceeded that year by \$5,002.33.

The December quarter, (October, November and December) at the local office, 1937, gross receipts were \$10,161.85, while for the same period in 1936 the receipts were only \$7,723.41, an increase of more than 31 per cent.

During 1937 the office issued 23,429 domestic money orders, an increase of more than 18 per cent over 1936, when 19,843 such orders were sold.

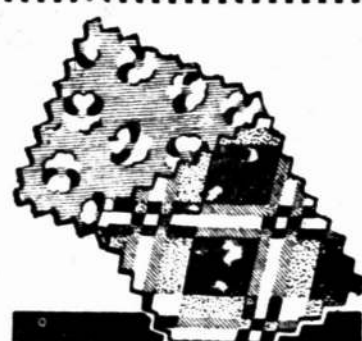

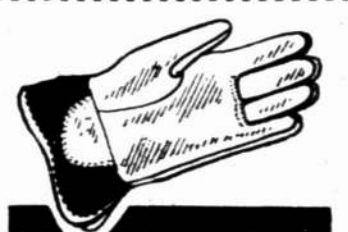

**Federal Farm Loan
Association Meets**

More than 30 members of the Lamesa National Farm Loan Association and their friends heard Secretary-Treasurer J. E. Barron and the Board of Directors of the association report on the association's progress during the past year at a meeting held at Lamesa on Jan. 11. Reports showed that this cooperative lending institution has made available to landowners in this community loans for more than \$26,700,000 since its organization in 1918. Other reports showed that net worth of the association to be \$105,781.82 with 704 Federal Land Bank loans outstanding totaling \$1,914,600.00 and 293 Land Bank Commissioners Loans outstanding totaling \$465,650.00. Condition of Federal Land Bank Loans as of Jan. 10, 1938 showed 25 loans delinquent in the amount of \$2270.59 current installments and that extensions granted borrowers had been reduced in 1937 approximately \$26,000.00. The reports showed the association to be in excellent condition.

Mr. F. T. Collins read a communication from A. C. Williams, president of the Federal Land Bank and General agent of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston, which outlined the work done by the Federal Land Bank in 1937, and discussed briefly the set up of National farm loan associations and the essential factors to be considered in making farm mortgage loans in serving Texas agriculture during the past twelve months. This institution made 1513 Federal Land Bank Loans totaling \$5,375,500.00 and 2234 Land Bank Commissioner loans amounting to \$3,540,100.00—a total of \$8,915,600.00 in land mortgage loans to Texas farmers and ranchers. At the close of the year there were 69,729 land bank loans totaling \$211,102,132.27 and 31,479 Commissioner loans in the amount of \$53,956,011.34 outstanding.

Mr. Williams pointed out that both the Land Bank and the Commissioner are interested in making new loans on a sound basis to enable worthy farmers to purchase farms. These loans are being made at the lowest interest rate in Land Bank history, and special consideration is given to qualified farmers who wish to buy farms of their own.

Speakers at the meeting included: Carl Rountree, J. C. Williams, county agent and F. T. Collins, district supervisor San Angelo district.

Mr. Barron reported that C. M. Burton, W. C. Speck, J. P. Gibson, W. V. Baker and C. A. Barron were elected directors of the association and that they in turn have elected W. V. P. Baker president of the association, C.

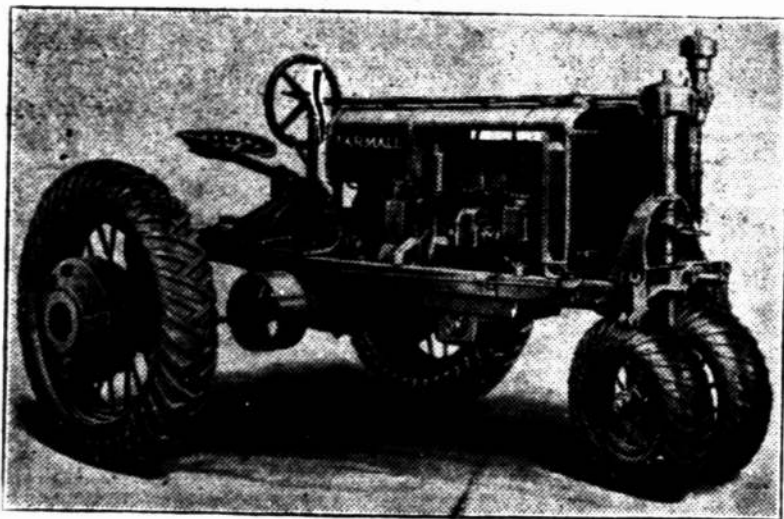

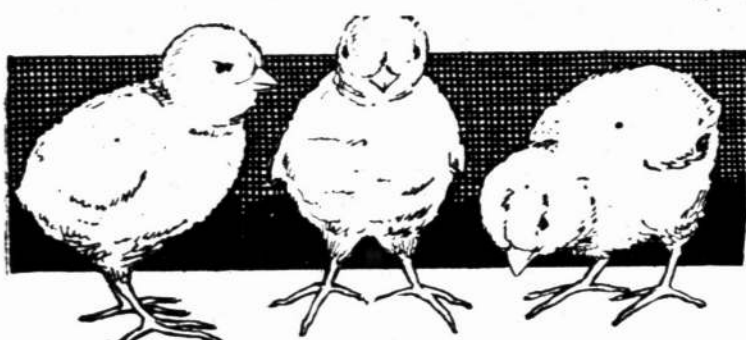

BRIEF HISTORY OF CENTRAL HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB

The Home Demonstration clubs over the county began organizing in the early part of 1934. At that time the farm women of the county were recovering to some extent from the depression and drought.

The clubs were organized under the leadership of Miss Madeline Cox, our Home Demonstration Agent.

The Central club was organized June

30, in the Court House at Lamesa with eight charter members. There were Mesdames, Bernie Stewart, Gus Schmidt, T. B. Moore, J. H. Adkins, E. A. Tweed, Claud F. Gowen, W. K. Crawley, and J. Edwards.

The following officers were elected at this meeting: Mrs. Bernie Stewart, president; Mrs. Gus Schmidt, vice-president; Mrs. T. B. Moore, secretary; Mrs. J. H. Adkins, treasurer and Mrs. W. K. Crawley, reporter.

A profit of \$10.00 was made by the club members on election day when cold drinks were served. The proceeds, and this was used to help defray the expenses of Mrs. J. M. Ransom as a delegate to the A. and M. Short Course at College Station.

Mrs. Gus Schmidt was chosen wardrobe demonstrator for that year.

On June 1, 1935 Miss Cox resigned and Miss Mattie Phenix now enters the history of the club.

Mrs. Claud F. Gowen was appointed 4-H Pantry Demonstrator and was awarded second place on her pantry, and sixty-five club members inspected her pantry during a two day tour.

During the year of 1935 the club met eighteen times with a total attendance of 95 per cent, and forty-five cents was collected on educational fund, and council attendance was 100 per cent.

Still gaining in membership, the club met in November 1935, and elected the following officers: Mrs. J. H. Adkins, president; Mrs. Gus Schmidt, vice-president; Mrs. Claud F. Gowen, sec-

retary; Mrs. J. M. Ransom, treasurer; and Mrs. L. A. Sasser, reporter.

Mrs. Sasser was appointed 4-H pantry demonstrator, and also was sent as a delegate to the A. and M. Short Course.

Cold drinks and ice cream was sold in a stand and \$5.00 was cleared and another \$5.00 was added from the educational booth at the Dawson County Fair.

The club met ten times during the year with a total attendance of 90 per cent with council representative standing 100 per cent.

The following officers were elected at this meeting: Mrs. Jack Walls, president; Mrs. E. A. Tweed, vice-president; Miss Vida Adkins, secretary; Mrs. Ama Davis, treasurer and Mrs. L. A. Sasser, reporter.

The first meeting in January, Mrs. E. A. Tweed was elected council delegate and at the second meeting Mrs. Claud F. Gowen was appointed program chairman; Mrs. Gus Schmidt, exhibit chairman; Mrs. J. H. Adkins, recreational chairman; Mrs. Jack Walls wardrobe demonstrator; Mrs. Justice Walls, expansion chairman.

On May 19, Mrs. L. A. Sasser resigned, and Mrs. Elmer Walls was appointed reporter in her place.

Mrs. E. A. Tweed was elected as a Short Course delegate from the Central club and Mrs. Thorp from Klondike club and Mrs. Earl Temple from Bartlett.

Fourteen dollars and twenty cents was made by the club from selling subscriptions for Hollands Magazine, and eighteen dollars and seventy-five cents was earned from securing subscriptions for the Lamesa Reporter.

The club purchased a \$25.00 share in the Dawson County Fair.

Five dollars was given the council to help defray the expenses of the delegates to the San Antonio convention.

The club has met twenty times this year and has tripled in membership and our attendance has been around 95 per cent. We are 100 per cent in council attendance and 90 per cent in reporter attendance.

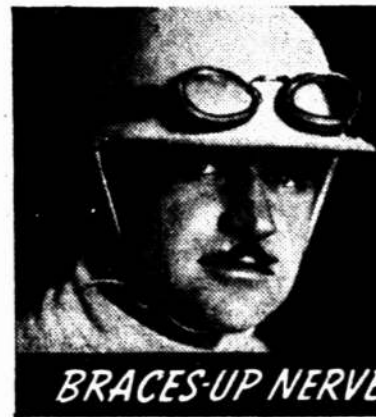

FIRST HALF

known to be awaiting the second semester for entering the Lamesa schools in order to start with the beginning classes.

The scholastic census for this school year was approved for 1243 white children. The enrollment in the schools has exceeded the census by 258 pupils or slightly more than twenty per cent. The dropping out of pupils has been lower than in former years, which leaves the schools with the highest net enrollment in local history, a number slightly under 1400.

Five class rooms on the first floor of the high school building are now being used for primary grade pupils. Even if this were a satisfactory arrangement, the space is needed for high school purposes. A need for additional space is also reported for the elementary building. The requirements for additional space for the younger children and the need for room space to meet the requirements of the Physical Education and Health law, is receiving attention of the Lamesa School Board. The Board finds itself unable to provide additional room space for

the growing schools without action on the part of the voters of the district in conferring upon the board authority to issue district bonds to finance construction. It is reported as likely that petitions for such an election will be circulated in the near future, requesting the School Board to order an election upon the subject of additional school rooms.

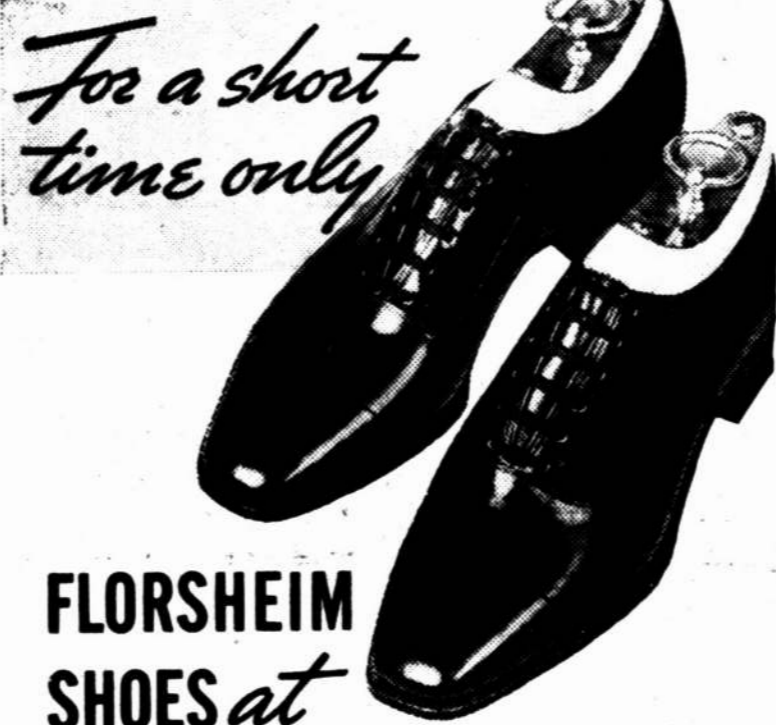

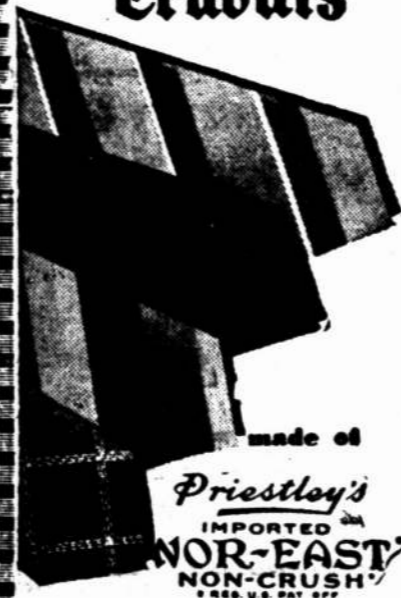

The points that denote a good layer are a soft pliable abdomen, the pelvis bones should also be soft, thin, pliable, and wide apart. The distance between the pelvis bones should be about three fingers width and between the hiel bone and pelvis bones should be about four fingers. A good layer will usually have a broad back and deep body. A fairly short head and bright eye. The coloring in beak and legs begins to fade as the hen gets in high production and continues until entirely bleached out if she is an efficient layer.
