Answer line...

Q. Since the legislature is in special session to consider workers' compensation reform, can you tell me, in simple language, what are the major disputes over workers' comp?

A. Businesses have been hit with increases of 148 percent over the past four years in workers' comp which is insurance purchased by employers to cover medical and other expenses, including some lost wages, of employees who are hurt or killed in on-the-job accidents.

## Gomez grand jury hearing is postponed

A second grand jury investigation into the May, 1988 shooting death of Sammy Gomez has been postponed indefinitely because the Texas Attorney General's office, which is conducting its own investigation, is still awaiting lab tests on the identity of a fingerprint found on a knife at the shooting scene.

Gomez, 27, died after being shot three times by part-time police officer Billy Ray Williamson when officers were arresting Gomez as a rape suspect. Officers said Gomez was shot after he lunged at them with a knife.

A grand jury, convened a week after the shooting, cleared Williamson. However, Gomez family members and the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) have repeatedly asked for new investigations and have charged local officials with a cover-up in the shooting.

A second grand jury was to have considered the case Wednesday.

Ruben Sandoval, a San Antonio attorney representing the Gomez family, said he wants

another autopsy to be conducted and said he plans to request an exhumation and second autopsy because the Dallas County medical examiner cannot physically demonstrate how Gomez was shot.

Attorney General Jim Maddox reportedly told Sandoval that he will back up an order to exhume Gomez' body for a second autopsy.

LULAC officials have said they believe the case cannot be heard fairly in Colorado City and have questioned seven of the 12 jury members' ties to the police department and the city.

Conard said he believes the current grand jury will treat the case fairly, but said the case may be presented to a different grand jury.

LULAC Texas Director John Garcia said the case must be moved out of Colorado City, contending that members of a Mitchell County grand jury will be pressured to vindicate the police department.

## Bank franchise tax allocations received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Monday sent checks totaling \$45,897 in bank franchise tax allocations to six local taxing entities.

The entities and the amount each collected include City of Colorado City, \$9,014; City of Loraine, \$1,313; Colorado Independent School District, \$19,107; Loraine Independent School District, \$2,164; Mitchell County, \$7,937; and Mitchell County Hospital District, \$6,362.

The allocations represent franchise taxes paid by

banks that do business in Texas. Banks must file a report with the comptroller's office by March 15 each year. The bank franchise tax rate is the same as the state's corporate franchise tax rate - \$6.70 per \$1,000 of taxable capital and surplus, with a minimum tax of \$150.

The Texas Legislature authorized the bank franchise tax in 1984, and the tax was collected for the first time in 1985.

### Waterway maintenance urged

With the rainy season upon us, waterway maintenance is very important for keeping a waterway in good working condition according to Glen Killough with the Soil Conservation Service. Well managed waterways are essential for good water quality, and protection of terrace systems, Killough said.

Recommended maintenance generally requires mowing or grazing to a minimum height of four inches, and removing woody vegetation so as not to retard water flow and cause excessive sedimentation in the channel. Sediment which has deposited in the waterway channel should be removed, and eroded areas should

be repaired promptly. This will prevent or reduce further degradation for waterway system. Adequate grass stands should be maintained in waterways to prevent erosion and reduce weed problems. Weeds should be controlled at all times by chemical or mechanical means. Fertilizer should be applied in the spring in accordance with a soil test or an application of 30-40-0.

Livestock should be excluded during wet conditions to prevent damage to grass stands in the waterway and vehicular traffic should be excluded. For more information contact the Soil Conservation Service in the G-Kell Building in Colorado City or call 728-3473.

They blame the present system, which allows disputed workers' comp claims to be appealed to a state district court in a jury trial. In the jury trial, the previous ruling of the Industrial Accident Board is not admissible. Only three states have this kind of system.

But trial lawyers, who represent injured workers in court, and labor organizations blame the increases on greedy insurance companies and stingy employers who fail to provide a safe workplace. Since Texas ranks among the

leaders in job-related injuries and deaths, they argue that reducing the number of injuries will in turn reduce workers' comp premiums.

Businesses also argue that a new system of figuring benefits is needed to provide stability to the system. Employers want an "impairment system" where compensation is based on what part of the body was injured and how badly.

But trial lawyers defend the current system, which is based on the lost wage earning capacity of the injured worker.

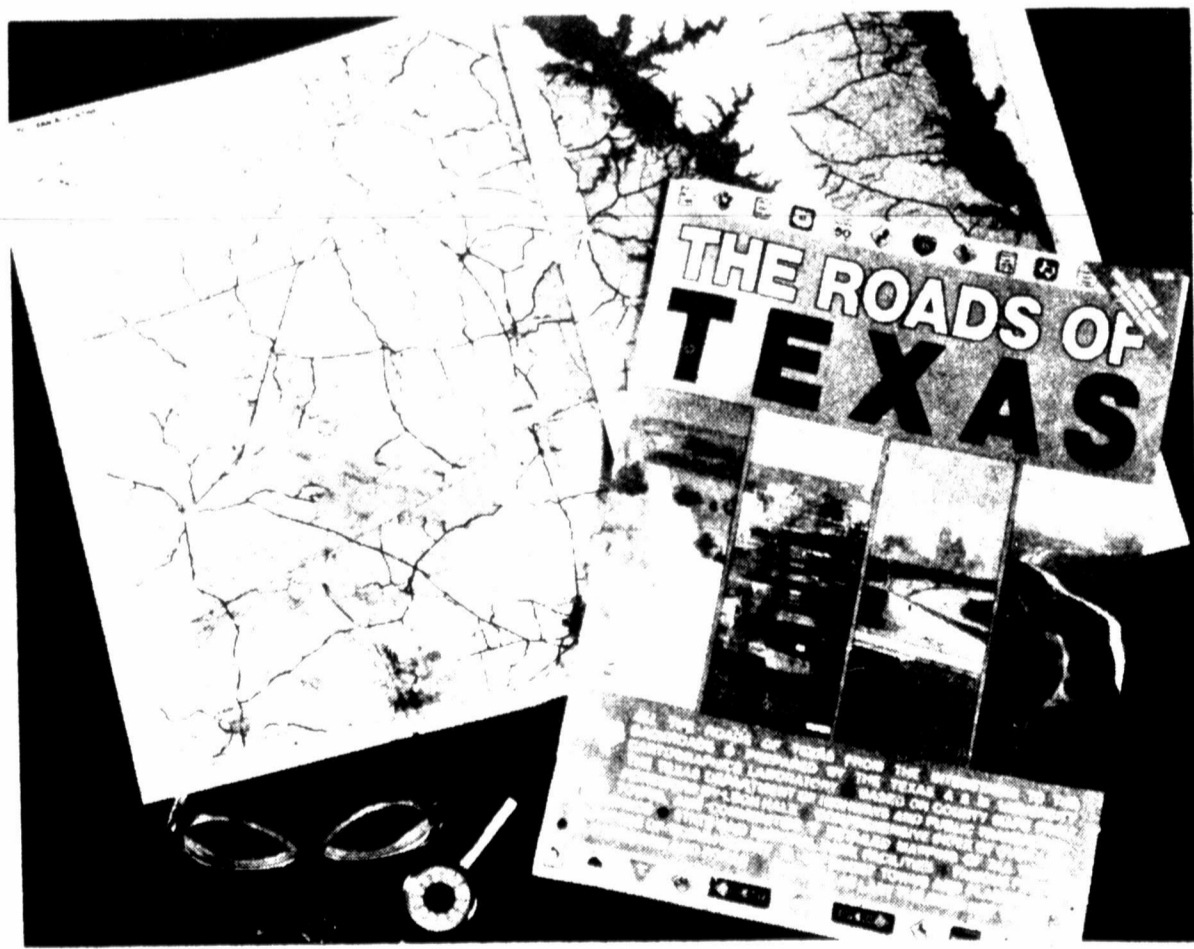

There is a small fee for the photocopy.

My neighbor told me she read about a hotline for senior citizens to call for free legal advice. I think a state agency is running it. Can you tell me more about it?

The Legal Hotline for Older Texans is a service to anyone in our state who is at least 60 years old. The toll-free hotline is staffed by attorneys licensed in Texas with 2 or more years experience.

More than 800 cases have been handled since the hotline became operational in May. Many of those who call are home-bound or in nursing homes and have no way of getting to a lawyer's office.

Callers receive free legal advice on a variety of topics such as Medicare appeals, access to public benefits such as food stamps, information about nursing home rights and help in drawing up wills.

When a situation requires more than a phone call can solve, the caller will be referred to an agency or another attorney who can help.

The hotline is supported by a grant from the American Association of Retired Persons, with additional in-kind support from the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Department on Aging.

The 4-H clothing project is well underway! Mary Redwine is a project leader who recently taught lay-out and cut-out. She also let us sneak a peak at a serger attachment she purchased for use with her sewing machine. She has not yet experimented with it, but I will keep you posted on the success.

The following information crossed my desk this week. Hope it will be helpful to you.

Serger attachments for sewing machines--Several different brands of serger attachments for sewing machines are available.

All brands claim that a standard zig-zag sewing machine will simulate a serger when the attachment is used. However, there are a few things you need to know before buying one.

All serger attachments work in about the same way. They trim the seam allowance as the fabric passes through. This allows the sewing machine to zig-zag over the edge of the narrow seam allowance, just as a serger does. The thread is thrown over a bar in the attachment as the stitch is formed. This prevents the puckered or scalloped edges that often result from ordinary zig-zag stitching over the edge of a fabric.

There are limitations to what these attachments can do, however. They tend to work well on only a few types of fabric. The ones they seem to do best on are cotton-polyester blend durable press top weights such as broad cloth and shirt-weight poplin. They do not work as well on light weight or stretchy fabrics such as T-shirt knit and tricot. Neither do they work well on heavy fabric such as denim.

Serger attachments can put a strain on the needle bar of sewing machines because of the weight. Unless that attachment is used a lot with the machine running at high speed, this probably will not be a problem.

If you plan to do only a little sewing with the serger attachment and will use it primarily for shirt and blouse weight fabric, it can be a good buy--much less expensive than a serger. But remember that it doesn't do everything a serger does.

House OKs Senate provision

Grants to aid rural hospitals

WASHINGTON - The House has agreed to accept a Senate provision in the Urgent Supplemental Appropriations bill to double the number of grants available to aid struggling rural hospitals, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

"The Health Care Transition Grant Program will now provide 160 grants of up to \$50,000 each

to help non-profit, rural hospitals, many of which are struggling to survive these days," Gramm said.

"Specifically, the grant program will provide more than \$8 million that is critically needed so that small hospitals in rural areas can change their method of operation in order to cope with changing demands for services," the senator said.

"I believe that it is vital that we explore every avenue to assure that health care continues to be available in rural areas," he said.

"Many small Texas hospitals have expressed to me their interest in seeking these grants, so doubling the number available will ultimately double their chances of gaining aid," Gramm noted.

The senator also said that his Rural Health Task Force is currently gathering data from across

Texas in preparation for making recommendations to Congress and the administration on the growing problem.

Gramm, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee and the House-Senate conference committee which hammered out details of the bill, said he was particularly pleased that the House had agreed to accept the Senate proposal.

Final action by both houses of Congress on the legislation is expected shortly.

AGRICULTURAL MILESTONES

A recent Texas Agricultural Experiment Station success has been development of a new vaccine for bluetongue, effective against all four types of the disease known to affect Texas livestock.

Bluetongue, an infectious, transmissible, viral disease, has been a problem in sheep for many years, and more recently has become a concern to cattlemen. It is the major U.S. livestock disease that serves as a non-tariff barrier to exporting livestock and livestock products to many countries.

In Texas, the disease is statewide, affecting cattle, sheep and wild ruminants such as elk, antelope, moose and deer.

Bluetongue virus is transmitted by the bite of a gnat and can be transmitted from sheep to cattle, cattle to sheep, and from domesticated species to wildlife. The four-way bluetongue vaccine developed by the Experiment Station has proven safe and effective when tested under laboratory and field conditions using sheep, cattle, goats, deer and mouflon.

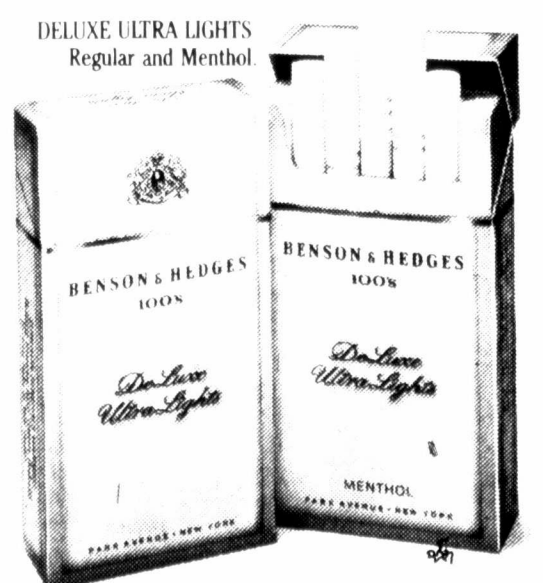


