

County Deposits Increase \$10 Million

Bank deposits in Lamb County are up over \$10 million dollars over the same period last year.

Bankers say the increase reflects a number of economic factors including higher yields and prices for the '72 crops, the cattle industry, continuing inflation and a reluctance to spend money.

The six banks in Lamb County, Littlefield Federal Savings & Loans and Security State Bank in Anton showed

combined deposits of \$58,389,617 at the end of the second quarter in 1972. On June 30 this year, the eight banking institutions' deposits totaled \$68,247,176, up \$9,857,559 from this date a year ago.

Loans and loans and discounts are up over \$3 million over the past year. Loans and discounts totaled \$35,605,510 at mid year in 1972. For the first six months in 1973, loans and discounts totaled \$38,766,714, an increase of \$3,161,204.

At the three Littlefield banking and

borrowing firms, deposits are up over \$6 million.

Security State Bank had deposits of \$13,628,093 last June 30th. On June 30th this year, deposits totaled \$16,938,053, an increase of \$3,309,959. Loans and discounts are up \$1,690,561 from L&Ds of \$6,576,663 last year to \$8,267,225 for the end of the second reporting period this year.

First National Bank of Littlefield

shows an increase of \$511,875. Deposits for this time last year totaled \$5,286,986. Deposits for the end of the second quarter this year totaled \$5,798,861. Loans and discounts are down \$424,609 at FNB, from \$2,692,838 to \$2,268,229 this quarter.

Littlefield Federal Savings and Loans deposits are up \$2,258,646 over the same period a year ago. Deposits at the end of June totaled \$17,493,636 compared to \$15,234,990 last year. Loans are up

\$802,528 from \$11,324,184 in '72 to \$12,126,712 at the end of June 1973.

Deposits at Olton State Bank totaled \$9,292,864 last summer. Deposits totaled \$11,610,814 on June 30, an increase of \$2,317,950. Loans and discounts are up \$883,346, or from \$7,633,232 to \$8,516,578.

At Citizens State Bank in Earth, deposits are up \$898,958. Deposits totaled \$3,372,187 at the end of June last year, and were up to \$4,271,145 this year. Loans and discounts are up slightly, from \$2,590,859 to \$2,621,764, an increase of \$30,905.

The First National Bank in Amherst had deposits of \$4,657,069 last summer. This reporting period showed \$5,363,253, an increase of \$706,184. Loans and

discounts at the Amherst bank are up \$84,695, or from \$1,748,904 to \$1,833,599.

Deposits at the First National Bank in Sudan are down due to the county depository being changed to Security State in Littlefield. Deposits at Sudan totaled \$3,929,299 on June 30, 1972. This year's total was \$3,835,133, down \$94,166. Loans and discounts are down slightly at the Sudan bank, from \$1,623,480 last year to \$1,604,684, a decrease of \$18,796.

At Citizens State Bank in Anton deposits and loans were off slightly. Deposits totaled \$2,988,130 in June 1972, down \$51,848 from '73 deposits of \$2,936,282. Loans mid-summer last year totaled \$1,415,350, down \$112,573 from this year's \$1,527,923.

Man Jailed On Marijuana Charge, SWPS Broken Into, Tills Tapped

Sheriff's officials recently confiscated some marijuana plants and a couple of the larger plants are on display in the sheriff's office for the benefit of persons who want to know what marijuana looks like.

As a result of that display, a citizen recognized some marijuana plants this week, tipped authorities, and Ellis Hagerty, a 23-year-old Littlefield man is in jail charged with possession of marijuana.

Head county deputy Jerry Collins and James Cox, Littlefield chief of police obtained a warrant. Johnny Gregg accompanied the two officers in a search of the Hagerty back yard at 1025 W. First Street about 2:45 p.m. Wednesday. Eighty small marijuana plants were found and Hagerty was arrested.

The plants were growing in coffee cans and various containers in a pan on top of a dog house. At press time Hagerty remained in jail with bond set at \$1,500.

Till Tappers hit three Littlefield service stations Friday afternoon to the tune of \$141. A young Latin American man, two women and a child in a white car with New Mexico tags were seen at all three service stations.

They are suspected of taking \$90 from the cash register at Leroy and T. J.'s Gulf, \$30 from Ken's Texaco across the street from the Post Office, and \$21 from Conal Norried's Fina station. The hits were all made between 12:30 and 1:20 p.m.

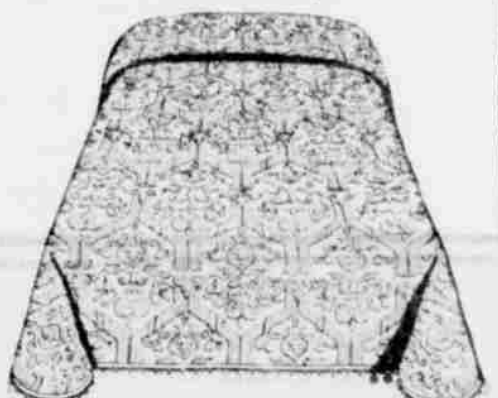

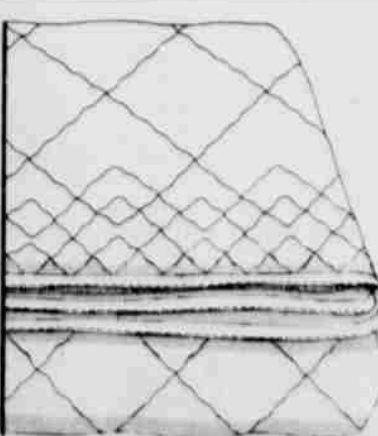

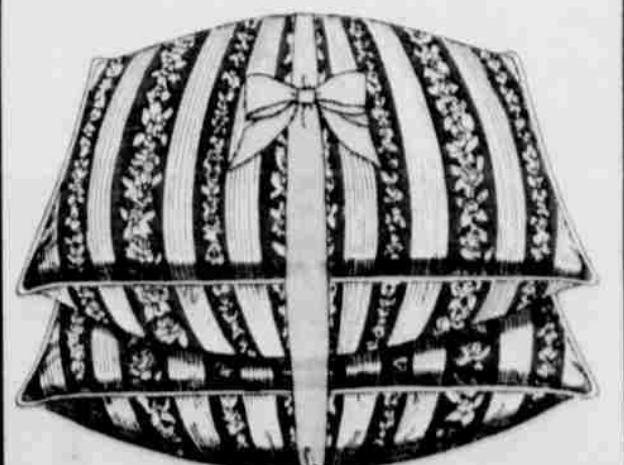

EDITORIAL

Bus Bill Passes

THE 63RD LEGISLATURE passed a bill setting new standards for certification of Texas school bus drivers but failed to pass several other bills relating to traffic safety.

Effective with the 1973-74 school year, Texas school bus drivers must begin training in order to be certified and must undergo an annual physical examination. In addition, their past driving record must comply with standards to be set by the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

THE LAW, passed in the closing days of the legislative session, brings this portion of Texas law into compliance with Standard 17 of the National Highway Safety Standards, dealing with pupil transportation safety.

The Legislature failed to pass another driver education bill, HB 222, which would have made driver education available as an elective to all high school students by placing its financing under the Foundation School Program. Since 1968, the Office of Traffic Safety Administration (OTSA), using federal funds, has subsidized \$20 per student trained in driver education. The remaining \$40-\$45 often must be paid by the students or their families.

OTHER TRAFFIC SAFETY-RELATED bills which did not pass include:

*Senate Bill 267 which would have allowed blood, urine, and other body fluid tests to be used to determine degree of intoxication in lieu of the Breathalyzer. The Breathalyzer requires supervision by a trained chemist and therefore is not available to many communities. The bill also would have required testing the blood-alcohol concentration in the bodies of all drivers and adult pedestrians killed in traffic accidents within four hours of the accident to determine the extent of the drinking driver problem.

*Five bills submitted by the Traffic Court Study Committee to revise the traffic court system. Among other changes, the bills would have provided for traffic cases to be tried in courts of record by judges who are qualified attorneys. The study committee, financed by OTSA, included members of the House and Senate and representatives of law enforcement and judicial agencies.

*A bill to standardize the accident reporting threshold at \$250.

THE LEGISLATURE did pass a resolution making "Drive Friendly" the official state traffic safety slogan.

IF IT'S ANY comfort, meteorologists say you can blame most of this wacky weather on the jet stream. That's that 150-mile-wide river of cold air that zips from the Pacific to the Atlantic at speeds up to 300 miles an hour.

Well, the polar stream, out of Alaska was a month late this year. And, while nobody will come right out and say so, most of the experts have a hunch that's what's behind this topsy-turvy weather.

Now we are officially entering the hurricane season, and forecasters are bracing themselves for more fun and games on the Eastern coast. Nobody ever underestimates the power of THOSE women.

Alice was first on the scene, but she came and went without much fuss. However, hurricane watchers in Miami have worked up a "disaster potential" warning system for her sisters (Brenda,

Christine, Delia, etc.). If and when they blow in.

Even the hurricane business is all mixed up. Last year, for instance, a rare combination of low sea temperatures and crazy winds made 1972 the quietest season in 42 years. There were only four—and three of them died at sea.

But then there was Agnes, and she was a whole season unto herself. Or, as an army engineer put it, "the greatest national disaster in our history."

Agnes swirled in with floods that killed 122 people, destroyed 5,000 homes and damaged 11,000, left 400,000 homeless, and did nearly \$3.5 billion in property damage. (So much for the "quietest" season.)

The boys with the weather charts are pretty philosophical about it all. "Everything comes out even," says a New York meteorologist. "If it's raining on you, the sun is shining on somebody else."

KING COTTON'S HEART (cottonseed) was overlooked producers during the 1972-73. Prices received by farmers were \$56.50 per ton for the 1971-72 and \$48.60 for 1972-73. At the same cottonseed meal prices paid by and ranchers averaged \$100 and \$135 in 1972-73. Wholesale F.O.B. Fort Worth on May 18, 1973.

Depleted stocks and growing demand for high-protein animal have pushed prices of cottonseed higher and higher.

Factors contributing to the demand include the virtual cessation of fish meal production in Peru, failure of the anchovy fish catch year.

Other factors were the purchase of million bushels of U.S. soybeans by Soviet Union last summer, and transportation and fuel problems damaged and disrupted 1972 and cottonseed supplies.

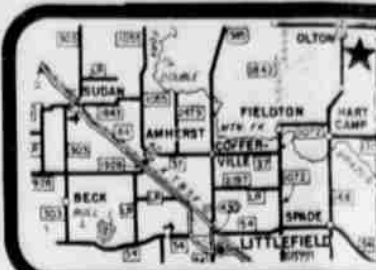
Early the next morning all eight scouts set out for the return trip across the rugged

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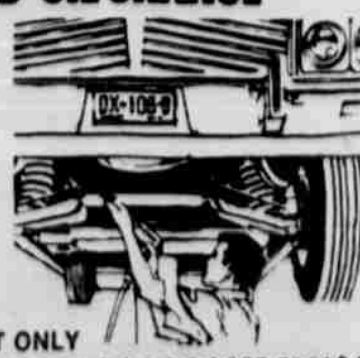

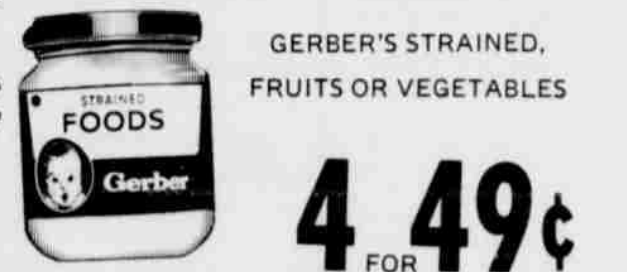

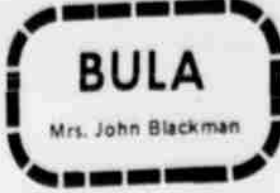

Homemaking Tips

BY Lynn Bowermon

Over a lifetime a great deal of money is spent on appliances. Therefore, it is only smart to check them thoroughly before buying them. Here are some of the questions to ask before buying used appliances.

Where do I go to buy a good used washer or dryer?

To a dealer who handles the brands you are interested in. Many trade-in washers and dryers are reconditioned and sold by the dealers, or to a utility. Some utilities are also dealers and sell trade-ins. Many utilities place appliances in schools for educational use and then sell them as used appliances after one or two years.

If you are very knowledgeable about appliances, or if you are able to recondition and repair appliances yourself, you may spot a good buy from an individual in the want-ads.

Things to check before buying a used appliance: If purchased from a dealer, will he be able to service the appliance if required? If purchased from a dealer will he deliver and install the appliance? What is the warranty offered by the dealer? Can the manufacturer furnish the do-it-yourselfers or serviceman with a parts manual and

readily available parts? What is the reputation of the manufacturer concerning dependability and long life?

Compare the basic procedure of washing and/or drying of the used appliances you are considering with that of new models of the same brand. This comparison will determine whether or not the used appliance can properly care for today's fabrics. Is the same basic procedure of washing and/or drying used?

Has the appliance been inspected, reconditioned and shop-tested? Does the appliance show signs of rusting? Tops of automatic washers and dryers should be porcelain enamel. Other surfaces should be acrylic paint. Is the finish in good condition?

Specific things to look for in automatic washer: Do hoses and electric cords appear to be in good condition? Does the tub spin as it drains? If not, dirty wash water can be strained back through the clothes. Are there holes in the washbasket allowing for removal of sand, grit, and heavier-than-water soil?

An automatic shut-off switch prevents "walking" and excessive vibration in the event of a heavily unbalanced load. Does the washer have an unbalance control switch? Metered fill, pressure fill or positive fill is not affected by

fluctuations in water pressure in either wash or rinse. The washer have this type level control?

What to look for in buying a used wringer: Are wringer rollers in good condition or will need to be replaced?

A few wringer washers powered by gasoline, most whether you can use one which uses electric or gasoline. Does it have electric motor or gas engine? What is the cost of the tub or agitator? Is the agitator fit snugly in place yet can be removed for cleaning of the sediment underneath the agitator?

What to look for in buying a used portable washer? A square one tub has more capacity, one with rounded bottom, the dimensions of the tub, small, yet the capacity of washbasket at least 3 gallons? Is the washer roll in any direction? castors? Is there a main of two impellers on the bottom?

What to look for in buying a used dryer: Is dryer electric or gas? Is dryer regular size or portable? Is the dryer a control or electronic control? Is the filter located in the so that 100 percent of the passes through the fine filter?
