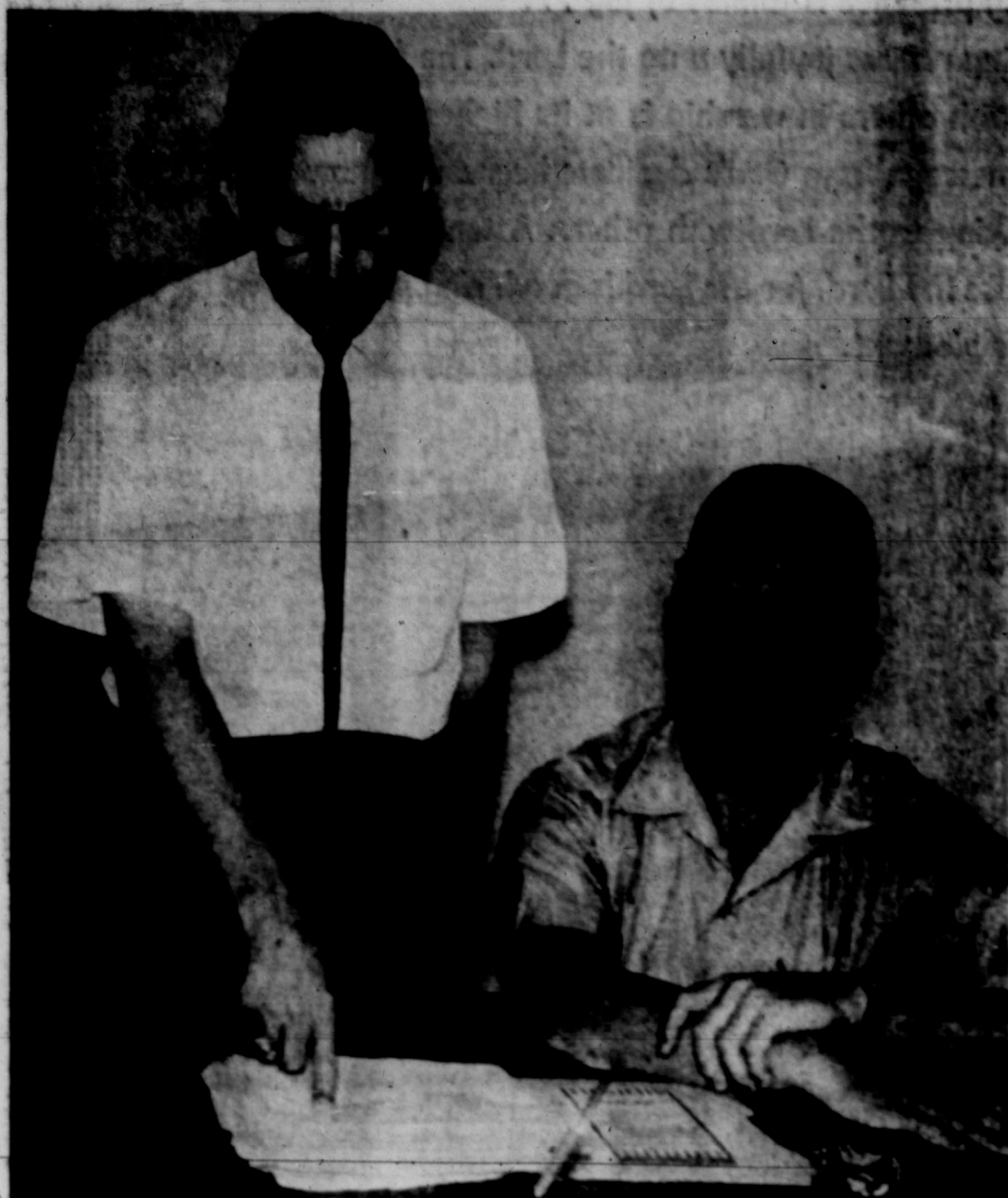




Fairly Close to Fair Time

C-City '63 County Fair Plans Show Progress

ROOT SPEAKS TO LIONS

Pessimism is Termed Town's Biggest Problem

"One of the biggest stumbling blocks to our town's progress," Charles Root told the Lions Club Friday, "is our pessimism."

"True, we have empty buildings, but most are due to business moving to a new building at a different location," he said.

"True, merchants downtown are plagued with the problem of out-of-town shopping due to better highways and better automobiles, plus the new stay-at-home, order by mail and watch television way of life.

"But our population is showing a gradual increase. We have more telephones now than in the history of Colorado City. We have a housing shortage. New business springing up on the highway. Our traffic at both lakes increase every day.

"Our tax rate is low. And still our city and county are in better financial condition than they ever have been. And we do have an ideal location, plus many desirable features for many types of large industries.

"If we stay prepared and keep casting our bread upon the waters we will catch one ... it is very possible that it is on somebody's drawing board at this very moment," Root said.

Root was presented as guest speaker for the Friday noon Lions Club program as spokes-

man for the Colorado City Industrial Team. He is also 1963 president of Colorado City Chamber of Commerce.

He began by telling Lions Club some facts about the Colorado City Industrial Team. It is, he said, "A non-profit corporation organized Aug. 31, 1959 for the purpose of promoting and assisting new businesses to move to Colorado City, to assist existing businesses to expand or enlarge, thereby creating more employment, and to assist with any endeavor that might boost the economical health of the community."

Members of the team at this time are Charles C. Thompson, president; Hallie Norman, executive vice-president; Bill Randle, secretary-treasurer; Bob Robinson, Roy Bates, G. D. Foster, Eldon Mahon, Dr. William S. Rhode, J. Ralph Lee, and Root.

"In the beginning," Root said "the team sponsored and acted as an advisory in the building of an industrial brochure. Information in the brochure is sufficiently informa-

tive to meet the need of any type of industrial inquiry. It is filled with truth and facts and at the same time has a touch of Chamber of Commerce exaggeration.

"Available industrial sites of various types and locations were sought out and are available when needed. Arrangements were made with our city for a 40-acre industrial park and a large, attractive, lighted highway sign was purchased and placed on the highway bypass.

"Since its organization the team has interviewed many false alarms of small and large industrial prospects. When a prospective industry is discovered the Industrial Team has purchased them with diligence, turning every trick that could be thought of."

From that point, Root's speech was a resume of tries made by the team to secure a small industry, a clothing manufacturer in New York employing 100 persons. Colo-

Exhibits and most booths will not be open until Thursday Oct. 10 beginning officially at 5 p. m., but the midway rides and amusement park features will arrive in Colorado City Sunday Oct. 6 and will be set up at the Fair Grounds for operation to begin Monday Oct. 7.

Under contract to provide more, bigger and better rides for the '63 Fair is the Gene Ledel Show, which will be open each day of the Fair, Monday through Saturday.

Fair Grounds this year will be at the site surrounding the Mitchell County Agriculture building.

Bartlett Head Of Ministerial Alliance Here

Ministerial Alliance in Colorado City has a new president, the Rev. H. W. Bartlett, pastor of First Baptist Church.

Election of Rev. Bartlett, who succeeds the Rev. Rusty Barnett, pastor of First Christian Church, took place in the annual election meet.

Named vice-president of the Alliance is the Rev. Alan Conley, vicar of All Saints Episcopal Church.

Secretary-treasurer chosen for this year is the Rev. Kiel Quisenberry, pastor of St. Luke's Methodist Church.

Exhibits will be in the county's Agriculture building itself. Concession stands space is still available in the new larger fair quarters. Booths for concessions must be sponsored by an organization and space may be reserved by a call to the Chamber of Commerce office, Mrs. Sidney Compton said Saturday.

Division chairman named by Bob Reilly, who heads fair plans are arrangements as general chairman, are Jim Kelley, agricultural exhibits; Mrs. Don Benson, arts and crafts; Jeff Taylor, commercial exhibits; Mrs. Ruth Aihart, horticulture; and Mrs. Sidney Compton, women's division.

Out-of-town judges will choose prize exhibits to be awarded ribbons in all classes. Judging will begin at 2 p. m. first day of the exhibit part of the fair, Thursday Oct. 10.

Doors to exhibit building will be opened at 5 p. m. that day.

Another feature added to the '63 Fair for the first time is to be a Live Wolf Life Exhibit. The educational exhibit, featuring wild animals, fish and fowl native to Texas, will arrive in Colorado City Wednesday Oct. 9 and will be set up in time to be shown Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 10, 11 and 12.

Harley H. Berg is director of the Wild Life educational exhibit which will let town and county children view puma, fox, coon, badger, Texas porcupine and live specimen of all the creatures which inhabit Texas lands, waters and skies.

Sponsored the Texas Game and Fish Commission, the exhibit measures 115 feet by 12 feet and should spark interest of citizens of all ages.

Mitchell County Fair is one of the major yearly projects of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce.

Division heads will name their separate committees to assist with entries.

Classes for the various division exhibits will be announced at an early date. Classes for agriculture will include field crops of various varieties, melons, orchard fruits.

Doctor Sees Breakthrough On Leukemia

Dr. Martha Matson, pathologist at the Midland County Clinic, guest speaker of the Mitchell County Cancer Society Thursday night at the Chamber of Commerce office, predicted a breakthrough on one form of cancer, leukemia.

Introduced by R. C. Taylor, district representative of Cancer Society, Texas Division, Dr. Matson outlined the scientific search for cancer cause and cure.

"The virus breakthrough makes it possible to predict that within five years there will be a vaccine for leukemia," Dr. Matson told the local Cancer unit.

Dr. Matson is a Fellow of the American College of Pathologists and holds membership in local, state, and national medical organizations.

Mrs. Charles Castleberry, Midland, member of the state unit certification committee presented Martin Weaver, president, a chapter renewal certificate for the local group. Annual certification will be done in order to maintain high state standards, Mrs. Castleberry said.

58th LEGISLATURE

Frank Ginzel Explains Laws to Kiwanis Club

County Attorney Frank Ginzel, speaker for Kiwanis Club members at their weekly luncheon meet in Civic House, told Kiwanians provisions of both criminal and civil laws passed by the 58th Texas Legislature.

Ginzel highlighted details of a new law making it a criminal offense to fly "any aircraft, dirigible, balloon, while intoxicated ... within airspace of Texas or upon any public airstrip."

Punishment for that offense is to be a county jail sentence or a fine not to exceed \$100 or both," the county attorney said.

The speaker then noted the recent combining of the Texas Game and Fish Commission and the State Parks Commission, along with other peace officers, have the right to arrest anyone for trespassing upon enclosed land of others, by camping, fishing or hunting.

"The old pool hall statute has been repealed," Ginzel

said further, "and operation of billiard tables is now legal in Texas and there is a provision for assessment of city taxes."

Ginzel went into detail concerning speed restrictions under the new higher maximum rate of highway speed which went into effect all over Texas Aug. 23, affecting all Texans.

The new 70 mile by day and 65 mile by night does not apply to pickup trucks, he told Kiwanis Club. It applies to passenger cars only. School bus speed limit is 50 miles per hour, he noted. Vehicles pulling house trailer of gross weight exceeding 4,500 lbs. or with length exceeding 32 feet are restricted to 45 miles per hour.

"Notice the passenger car is defined as a motor vehicle designed for carrying 10 passengers or less and used for transportation of persons," Ginzel said.

"Sixty-five miles an hour by day, 55 miles by night is the limit for any truck, truck trailer, or semi-trailer, of any vehicle pulling a trailer," he pointed out.

There are now minimum speed regulations, the county attorney reminded club members. "No person shall drive at such a slow speed as to impede normal and reasonable traffic movement except where necessary for safe operation or in compliance with law," he noted.

Exceptions include zone roads not under control of the State Highway Commission for speed, and slow-zoned by commissioners court. City councils can also pass speed regulations within speed limits, exceptions to the act for vehicle of the fire department, city police patrols, physicians, ambulances on emergency calls. Cities may by ordinance regulate ambulance speed, too.

Credit card use for defrauding came in for part of Ginzels discussion with explanations of the misdemeanor offenses and the felony offenses. Third conviction of fraud (by use of credit cards) now brings two to 10 years on conviction.

Condominium act, providing for sale of single apartments in multiple apartment houses; the "Lone Shark" act; Safety Responsibility act; burglary, gun shot wounds, worthless checking, conversion by bailer, willfully burning with their interpretation and their penalties for conviction were discussed in turn by County Attorney Ginzels.

Ginzels explained the law about false information concerning a bomb or bombs. Jail sentence is mandatory, on conviction, along with fines of \$50 to \$500.

Small Claims Court jurisdiction has been increased up to \$150 for recovery of money by any person and up to \$200 for wages or salary," he said in conclusion.

"The legislature provided collection agencies can not be assigned the right to collect claims in the small claims court, but the action must be brought by the individual or the legal entity itself.

"There have been material changes in law concerning the property rights of married women, some of which I have discussed with you at the outset. It seems that we men have lost ground."

Tumbleweed Company — not sponsored by the team or lent any money, Root pointed out — was encouraged to move from Cincinnati to Colorado City, Root said. And the team did help to promote Tumbleweed Festival for which Colorado City has "received a coast-to-coast million dollars worth of advertising."

Tumbleweed Company, on the verge of failure, was purchased by a small group of local citizens, Root said. "This city should appreciate their efforts at struggling toward survival. But the company has not asked the Industrial Team for assistance," he said.

"Industrial Team has been active in many civic endeavors. They assisted with the Mitchell County underground water survey, the bond issue for water, sewerage and street improvements.

"At this time we are assisting the city council and county commissioners to find ways and means to improve our museum and library and it looks like a solution is near at hand. At this time we're trying to promote in Washington, the building of access roads on each side of the highway bypass.

"One of the most valuable services of the Industrial Team is that it serves as a hot line to Washington, D. C."

Root termed the team's major aim and concern one "To seek and entice reliable concerns to move to Colorado City." He then named reason such enticement is difficult: it is highly competitive; prospects are hard to find; there are not as many concerns moving as it may appear.

"It is my opinion that the Industrial Team is more important now than ever before. It may not give us the edge over other towns since other towns have teams, too, but we would certainly be handicapped without one. Other foundations could not possibly have better qualified men than we do. We are handicapped with less money — and this should be corrected at once."

Root closed his address with a financial synopsis of the team's funds and expenditures. On hand at this time, he said, is \$4,500.

Lions Club president Bob Rely introduced Root.

President of the association for this school year is Mrs. Larry Kinnard.

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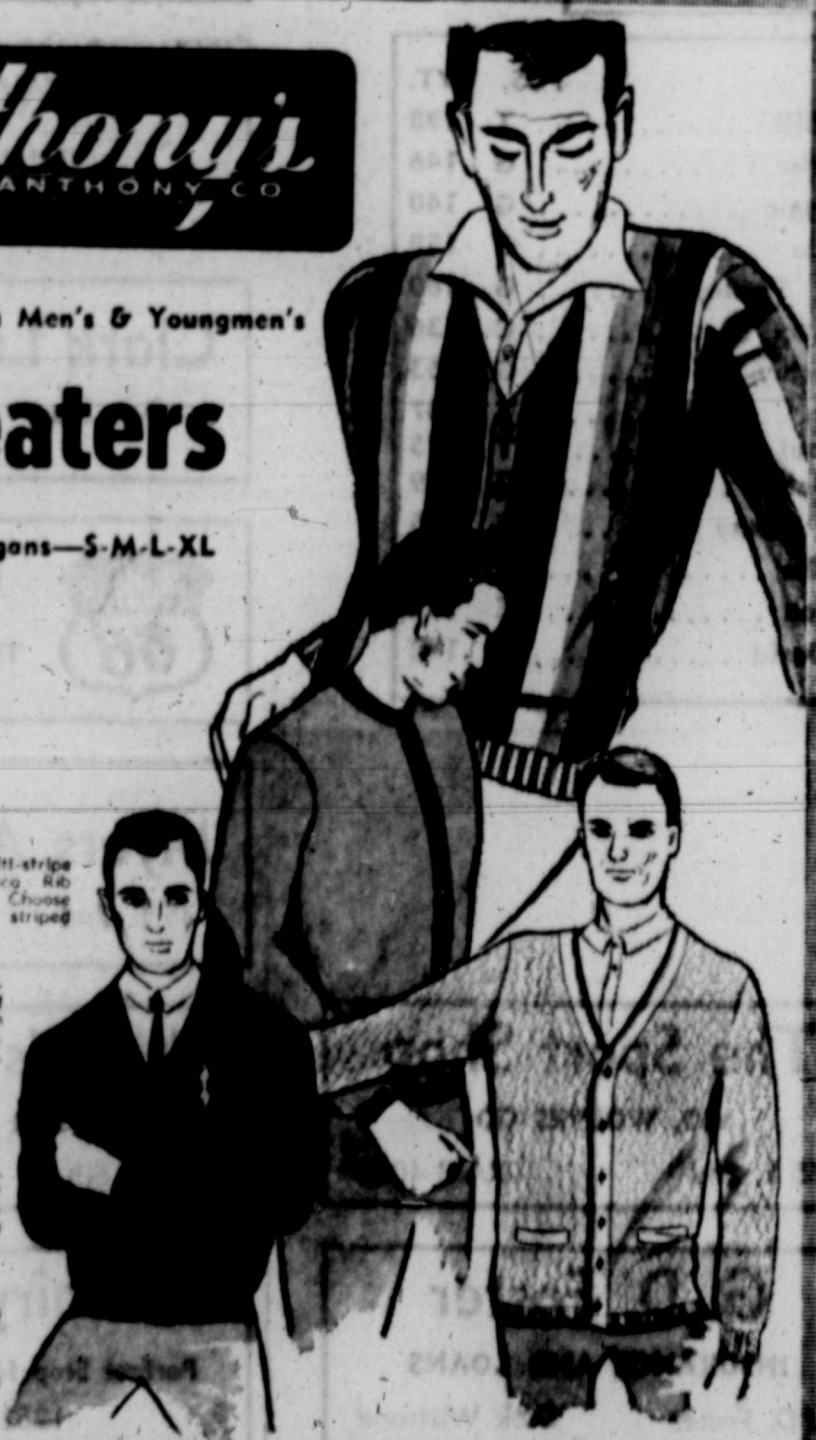
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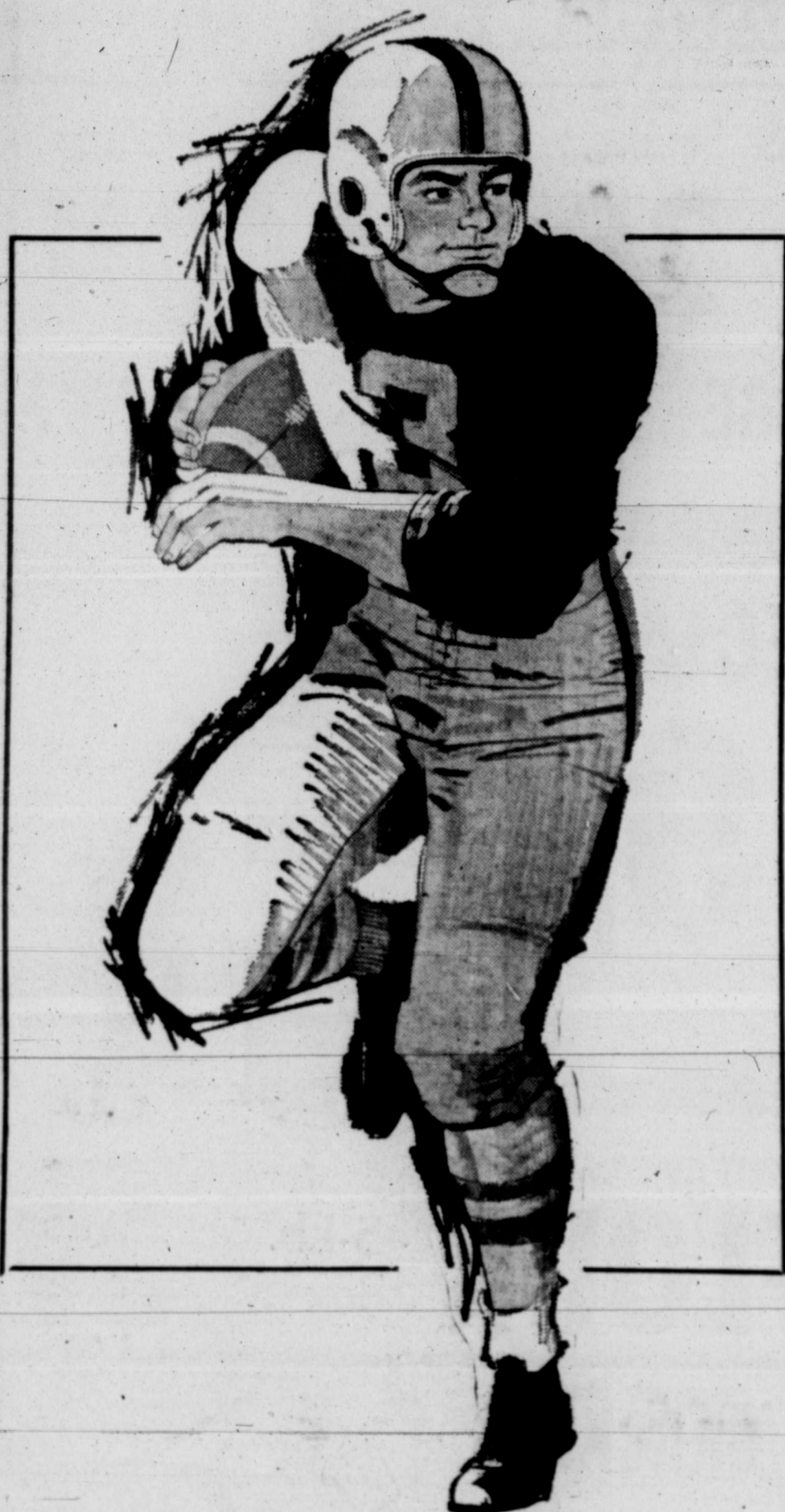
