

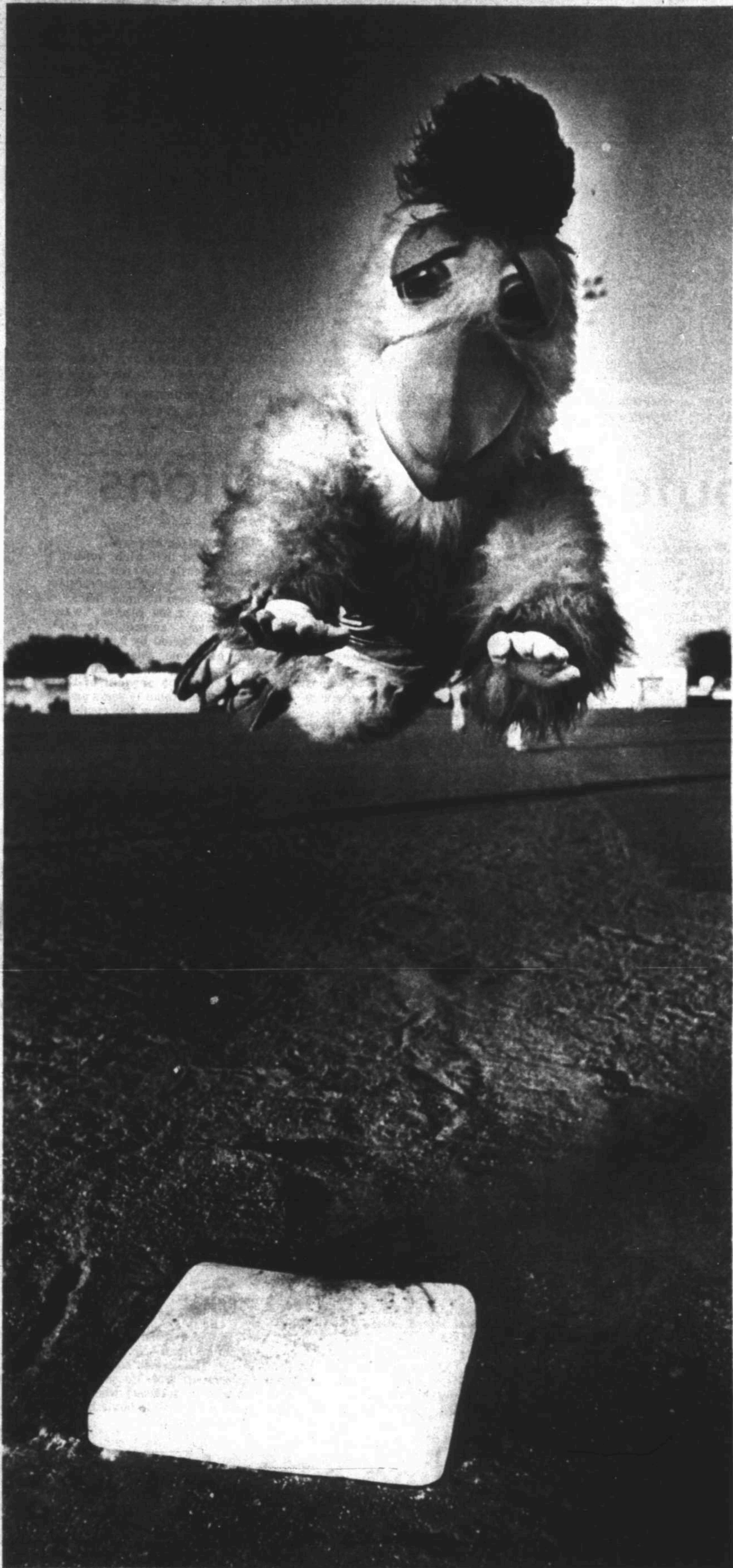

## 125 killed in India train derailment

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A packed passenger train that toppled off a bridge Saturday left at least 125 people dead and several hundred missing, a railway official said today. An Indian news agency said the train derailed when it braked suddenly to avoid hitting a cow, the animal held sacred by India's Hindus.

"The train had a capacity of carrying 500 passengers and only 83 were rescued," national railways spokesman S.G. Purohit said. "The coaches were fully used and some people were travelling on the roofs."

The chief minister of Bihar State, Jagannath Mishra, said the accident was the "biggest and worst in living memory" in India.

Purohit said navy divers had recovered 125 bodies from the rain-swollen Bagmati River near Mansi, 248 miles northwest of Calcutta, where seven of the train's nine coaches plunged Saturday night. Only one of the seven coaches had been located, he said.

The United News of India said injured passengers reported the train toppled into the river when the engineer braked suddenly in a windstorm to avoid hitting a cow on the rusty tracks of a bridge.

The railway minister gave a different explanation,

saying the train was "blown off" the bridge by a fierce gale. The Railway Ministry denied reports that the old 1,464-foot bridge collapsed and tumbled the train into the river.

"There has been no damage to the bridge or the tracks," said the ministry.

The train was en route from Samastipur to Banmash. The United News said the engineer fled after the disaster.

The Press Trust of India news agency said rescue workers had not reached six cars that were carried downstream.

Seven cars plunged into the river, while the locomotive and one coach were left hanging from the bridge, Pande told reporters.

Local authorities asked the army and navy to rush cranes and other salvage equipment to the scene in Bihar state.

Reports from the scene said more than 10,000 people went to the bridge, many of them weeping, to inquire after relatives. Authorities set up tent camps at the site to feed and shelter the crowd.

## Israelis hit Iraq reactor

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli warplanes attacked and destroyed Iraq's nuclear reactor outside Baghdad on Sunday, the Israeli military command announced today.

There was no immediate confirmation of the report from Iraqi authorities in Baghdad.

The French-built, 70-megawatt research reactor, said to be ready for completion this summer, had stirred controversy because its fuel could be used to make nuclear weapons.

The Israeli military said it would not explain the reason for the extraordinary action, carried out by Israeli warplanes against a target 600 miles from Tel Aviv.

"We don't wait for the reactor to be completed to destroy it," a military spokesman said.

Some 100 to 150 foreign experts were working on the reactor and reportedly were on a Sunday day off when the Israeli planes struck, the command said. It said all the Israeli planes returned safely, but it did not say how many took part in the attack.

The surprise attack against the Arab nation came during a period of heightened tensions in the Middle East because of Israeli objections to the presence of Syrian anti-aircraft missiles in Lebanon.

Last Sept. 30, a week after the outbreak of the Iran-Iraq war, the Baghdad atomic facility was attacked — but reportedly not damaged — by warplanes bearing Iranian markings. One report at the time said the planes were Israeli; but this was never confirmed, nor did Iran acknowledge that it staged the raid.

The Israelis said today the French reactor was scheduled to be completed in July or September.

If it was not yet operational and there was no fuel on the site, 12 miles east of Baghdad, Sunday's attack presumably did not spread radioactivity in the Iraqi capital. A smaller Soviet-built test reactor on the site was already in operation, but it could not be learned whether it was hit by the planes.

The \$275-million, French-built Osirak reactor has been under construction since the mid-1970s at the Tammouz Nuclear Research Center. The Israelis have long demanded that France cease its nuclear aid to Iraq, and last summer an Israeli Defense Ministry official said that if diplomacy failed to block France's shipment of weapons-grade uranium shipments to Iraq, Israel will be compelled to "consider its next step."

## Bicycle routes top survey suggestions

Midlanders had a chance to voice their desires for recreation and the Parks and Recreation Department heard a few surprises. But as a result of a park survey, residents could get some of their priority items as soon as next year.

The survey that was mailed out in water bills several months ago came back to the Parks and Recreation Department in the thousands — about 2,500 by the time the last ones straggled in to be counted.

This survey was designed to help the department in updating the master plan. It also will be used to budget for the next fiscal year, readjust the priority capital improvements lists and encourage the citizens to become more aware of the city's parks and recreational facilities.

By the time all the check marks beside the suggested activities were tallied, the top ranking need was signed bicycle routes throughout the city.

Wayne Kohout, director of that department, explained he was surprised by the fact that 56 percent of the 2,500 respondents, or 1,385 persons, requested the bicycle paths. "I thought the No. 1 priority would be the 20-acre recreational lake."

BUT HE'S NOT ignoring what the people requested. Already, the money for putting up the

signed paths has been included in the next fiscal year's proposed budget. And if the council approves, these paths could be completed next year.

"It would cost \$15,000 to get the signs," said Kohout, and city labor would be used to erect them. "That's not much money. It's a cheap way for the council to show they are responding to the people's wants."

Next on the priority list came paved surfacing around neighborhood parks with 54 percent of the people listing this on their survey. This, too, is being added to the department's proposal for 1981-82 money. He claimed that none of the parks has such paving, and the first request is for Grafa Park.

Kohout, who said the respondents totaled 1,332 for this item, explained this paving means sidewalks or asphalt trails circling the park several feet from the curb. The pavement can be used by numerous recreation buffs, including walkers, joggers or skaters.

Next on the list came a full-time park police patrol, which gathered 1,314 responses, or 53 percent of the vote. This, too, will be another item in the proposed budget. "People definitely are miffed about what goes on in the parks," said Kohout.

LOOKING AT THE RESULTS, Kohout said he thought

## Police continue investigation into motorcycle accident

Investigators for the Midland Police Department this morning were continuing their investigation into a mysterious Sunday afternoon traffic accident in Midland that claimed the life of 19-year-old Michael Wayne Wilhite of 5144 Daventry Place.

When officers arrived at the scene of the crash in the 3500 block of Andrews Highway about 2:20 p.m. Sunday, they found Wilhite lying on the ground north of Andrews Highway, being treated by emergency medical personnel. Wilhite was taken to Midland Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced dead about 3 p.m. by Dr. John Gillett, according to police reports.

The accident reportedly occurred at 2:18 p.m. Wilhite reportedly suffered major head injuries in the accident. He also suffered abrasions to the right side of his body.

Initial investigation results indicated Wilhite was riding his motorcycle on Andrews Highway when he apparently lost control and struck the curb. But additional information caused investigating officers to question whether Wilhite was riding the motorcycle alone at the time.

Investigating officers said this morning they are continuing to try to determine whether Wilhite was operating the motorcycle at the time of the collision, whether he was a passenger or whether another vehicle was involved.

## Reagan pledges U.S. cooperation with Mexico

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan welcomed Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo to the White House today, pledging a relationship of "mutual respect and cooperation" between their two countries.

"The good will between Mexico and the United States is a blossom whose beauty we meet here to cherish and protect," Reagan told Lopez Portillo.

The Mexican president told Reagan in an arrival statement that "we will talk things over without arrogance." This seemed to allude to Mexican sensitivity based on longstanding differences with the United States over Central America.

The two men met briefly in the White House before boarding helicopters en route to Camp David, Md., the presidential retreat where talks were scheduled today and Tuesday morn-

ing.

The welcoming ceremony on the White House South Lawn was scaled down from earlier official welcomes for foreign leaders. A U.S. Marine Corps band played the two nation's anthems, but a customary review of troops was eliminated.

Lopez Portillo left his limousine and met Reagan with an "abrazo," a traditional embrace afforded friends in Latin America. Lopez Portillo's failure to welcome President Carter with such an embrace several years ago in Mexico City reflected the difficulties of the U.S.-Mexican relationship in recent years.

"I welcome you today with the pledge that this administration will sincerely and diligently strive to maintain a relationship of mutual respect and cooperation between our two nations," Reagan said. "Decl-

sions affecting both sides of our border will be made only after the closest consultations between our governments."

Lopez Portillo, in an apparent reference to differences between the two nations over the conflict in El Salvador, said "we are ... immersed in a regional contest that shades our relationship."

"We want to be understood and in turn we want to understand you," the Mexican president said.

State Department officials said they could not recall any recent instance in which an American president has devoted as much time to a visiting foreign leader.

The lengthy discussions with Lopez Portillo are in recognition of Mexico's importance not only as a neighbor but as an emerging oil power and the No. 3 trading partner of the United States,

U.S. officials said. Besides trade and energy questions, the issue of Mexicans who reside illegally in the United States was certain to come up, they added.

In a speech last week, Thomas Enders, the assistant secretary-designate for Latin American affairs, outlined the administration's objectives in its relations with Mexico.

He said the administration seeks with Mexico "a relationship of cooperation and mutual sensitivity consonant with Mexico's exceptional role in our affairs and in those of the world."

"In human terms, no country has a greater effect on the U.S.," Enders said, adding he is hopeful that the "resentment, fears and antipathies" of the past can be replaced by a relationship of "equality, harmony and trust."

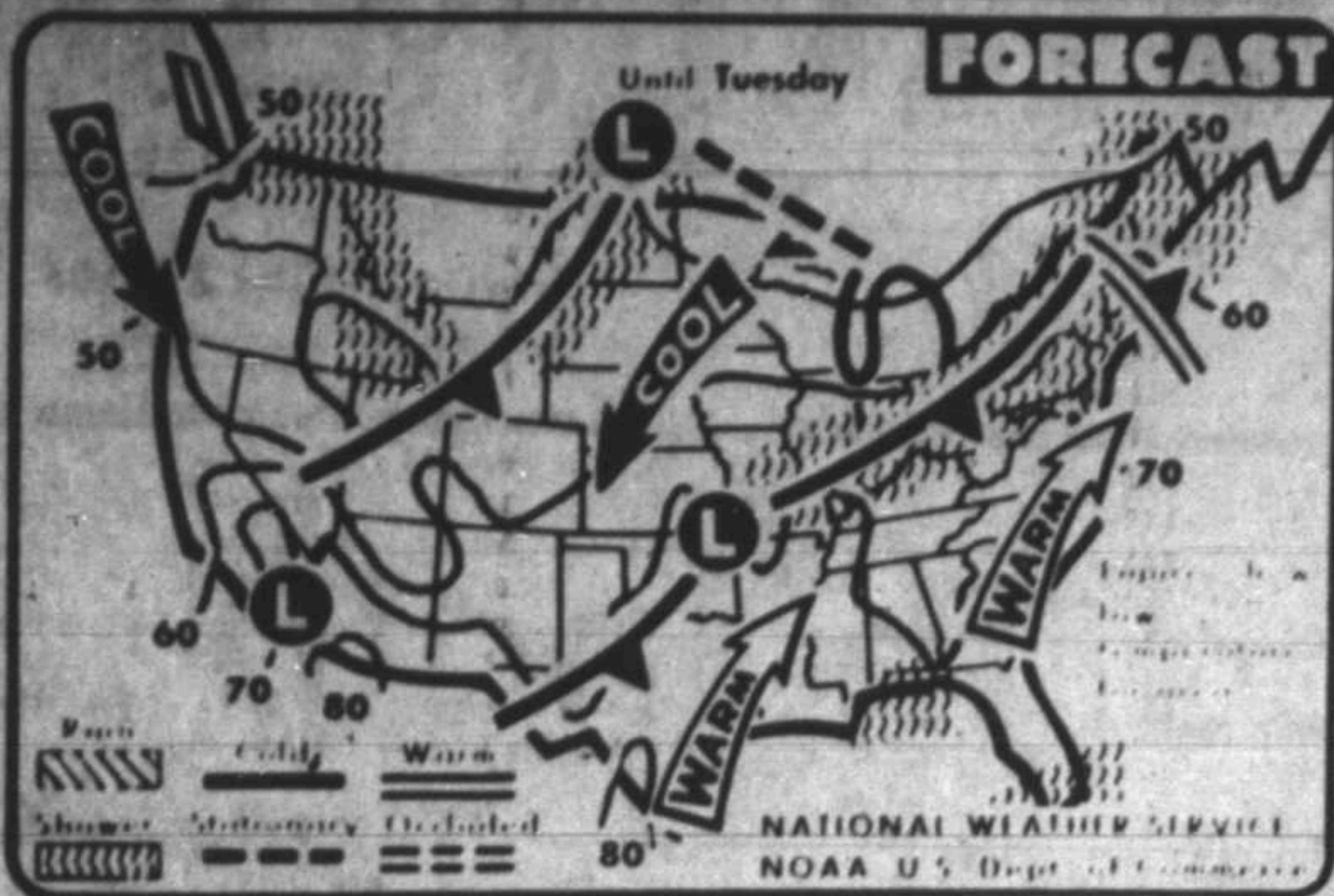

# Reagan, Democrats competing for votes on tax cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, whose intense lobbying paid off with victory for his budget blueprint, has his work cut out for him in trying to lure Democrats to his side as Congress begins writing a tax cut package this week.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., the top-ranking elected Democrat in Washington, is conceding nothing to the president this time and is injecting a more personal tone in the rhetorical battle by charging that Reagan doesn't understand the working class "because he doesn't associate with those types of people."

"Right now, we have the votes," O'Neill said Sunday. "Can he (Reagan) take them away from us? Let's see."

The House Ways and Means Committee, which initiates tax legislation in Congress, begins drafting a tax bill Wednesday. But, as with the budget resolution adopted last month, the

real battle will come on the House floor.

The committee is almost certain to reject Reagan's plan and send to the floor a Democratic proposal for a two-year reduction in personal tax rates.

Democrats hold a 2-1 edge on the committee, but just 27 Democrats voting with all Republicans on the House floor would give Reagan a victory.

As with the spending plan, the president and Democratic leaders are competing for the votes of 47 conservative Democrats, some of whom already are in Reagan's camp.

Those members of the Conservative Democratic Forum who are backing Reagan's plan for a 5 percent cut in personal income tax rates over three years already have drawn the anger of Democratic leaders.

A senior Democrat in Congress, who insisted that he not be quoted by

name, said House leaders were caught by surprise when several of the conservatives agreed to back Reagan.

The lawmaker indicated Democratic leaders also were angry when Reagan embraced a revised bill, scaling down his original proposal for a 30 percent cut and adding several new features. He insisted the leadership was still trying to negotiate with the White House at the time.

O'Neill said Sunday on ABC's "Issues and Answers" that "I don't think we've lost 10" conservatives to the Reagan camp.

"If the vote were tomorrow, we could win it," the Massachusetts Democrat said. "The quicker we can get to the floor, the better off we're going to be, to be perfectly truthful, because I know the power of the presidency."

O'Neill learned about that power in the budget battle after Reagan's personal lobbying campaign helped draw 63 Democrats to vote with unanimous House Republicans and seal a victory for the administration.

James A. Baker III, the White House chief of staff, acknowledged Sunday that "the budget fight was tough but doable. We think that the tax fight is tougher but nevertheless doable."

Speaking on CBS's "Face the Nation," Baker disputed O'Neill's head count. "We have, according to the

counts of the members of the Conservative Democratic Forum, some 15 to 20 members of that group who are firm for the president's tax package," Baker said. "I think in the final analysis we will prevail."

Baker added, however, there are 10 to 15 Republicans in the House whom "we will have to sit down with and explain the program to and work with in some detail."

Baker also said the administration is willing to compromise on details of its slimmed-down business tax cut proposals, which were criticized last week by business lobbying groups who want to restore \$50 billion in reductions dropped from Reagan's original plan.

"I don't think the final details of the program are frozen," Baker said.

O'Neill, whose leadership has been criticized by some of his fellow Democrats, turned up the rhetoric Sunday by assailing Reagan as having "no concern, no regard, no care for the little man of America."

"The president truly in my opinion doesn't understand the working class, middle America, what it's all about and what they go through because of the fact he doesn't associate himself with those types of people," O'Neill said.

Calling Reagan's tax proposal "a complete windfall for the rich," O'Neill said: "I think that he has very, very selfish people around him...people of only the upper echelon

of the wealth of this nation, and they are his advisers. I think he'd do much better if he had brought in some people close to him who are from the working force of America, who have suffered along the line, not those who have made it along the line and forgotten from where they've come."

White House counselor Edwin Meese III, responding on NBC's "Meet the Press" Sunday, called O'Neill's comments "absolutely untrue" and added, "I don't think the speaker really believes what he's saying."

"The president himself is probably the best example of a working man — a man who came as a child from absolute poor circumstances, low economic circumstances, who worked his way up into a very sizeable income from his own hard work, a man who has suffered all of the kinds of the things that the speaker was talking about," Meese said.

"He has people around him who have been working people ourselves all of our lives, people who've worked in iron works and have done day labor, as I have," Meese added.

## James to head group

WAGONER, Okla. (AP) — Don James, managing editor of the Wichita Falls (Texas) Record-News and Times, has been elevated to president of the Associated Press-Oklahoma News Executives Organization, succeeding Jack Willis, managing editor of the Muskogee Daily Phoenix and Times Democrat.

James, who had held the title of president-elect, took over the organization's reins at the conclusion of this week-

end's annual business meeting and awards banquet at the Western Hills state lodge.

## Pilot sets unofficial record

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — With six gallons of gas to spare, the sweat-soaked pilot of a small, home-made airplane set an unofficial world record when he landed in the West Indies after a 30-hour non-stop flight from Anchorage.

Pilot Dick Rutan of California touched down on Grand Turk Island

late Saturday after covering about 4,500 miles in 30-hours, 6 minutes. He left Anchorage at 4:23 p.m. Friday. His flight shattered the 2,900-mile non-stop record for aircraft under 2,200 pounds set in 1972.

Bad weather over the Midwest forced him to cut about 600 miles from his planned flight to Barbados, further south in the Caribbean Sea.

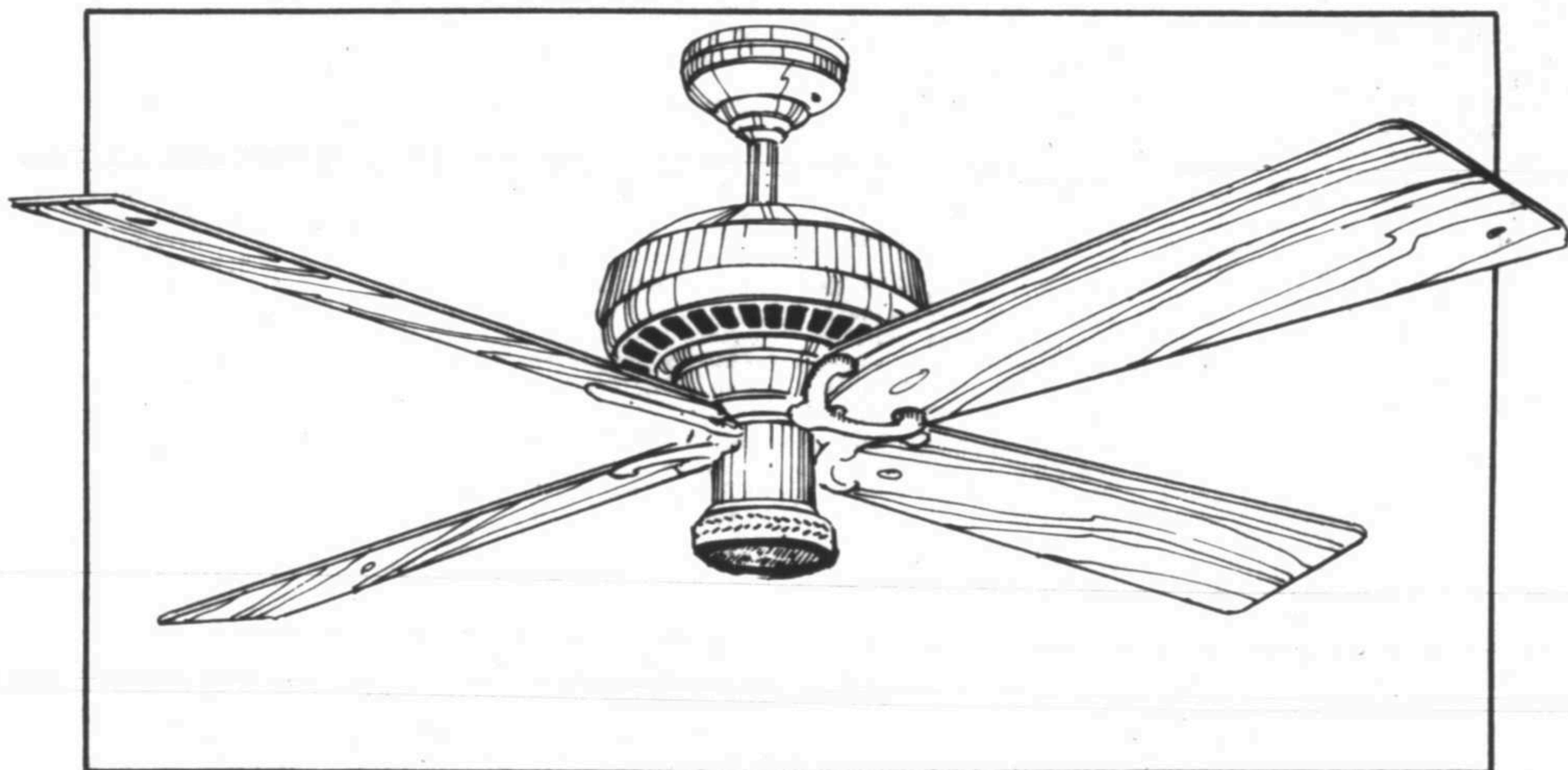

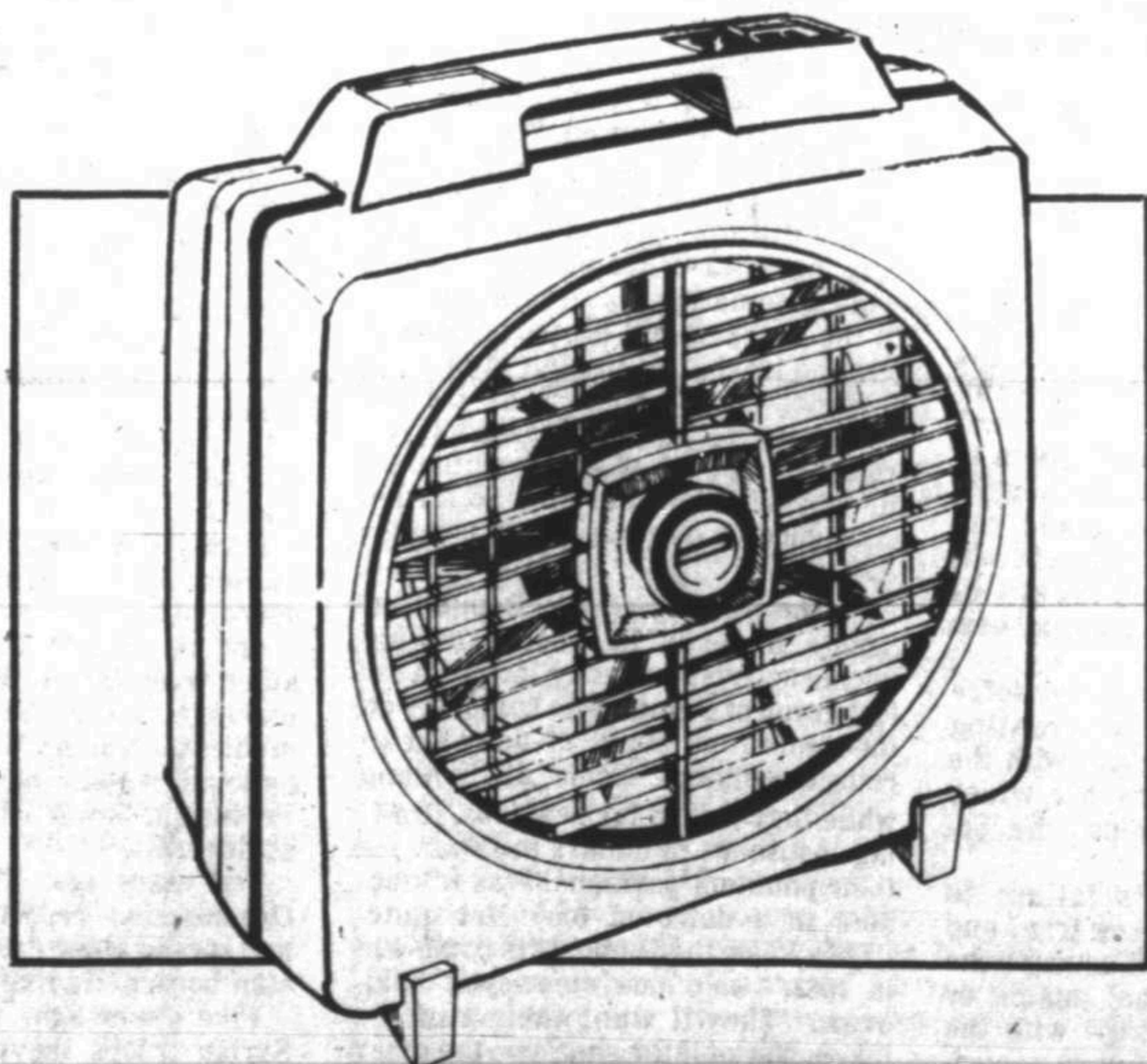

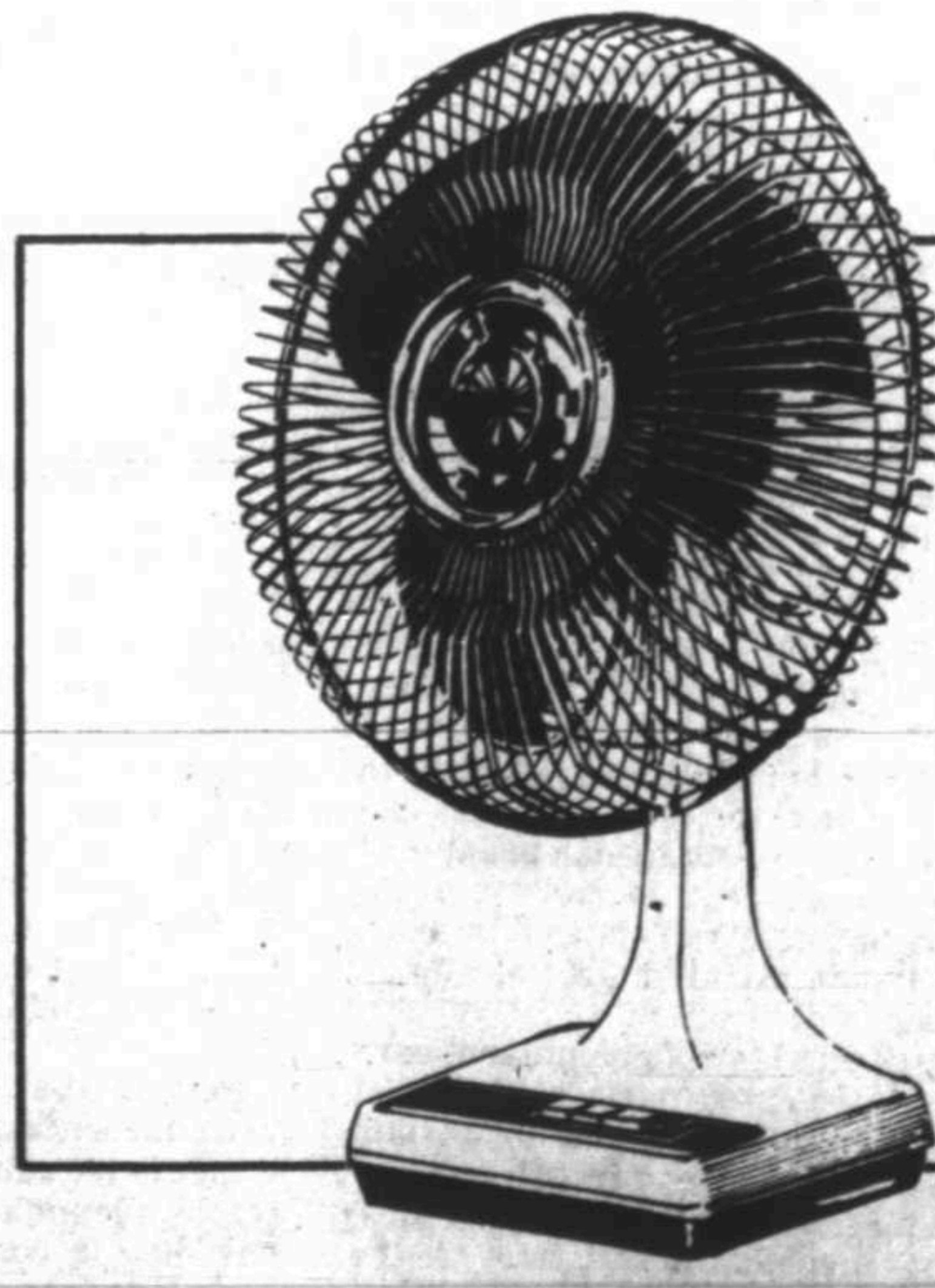

## Time to join hands

Ever since President Jimmy Carter cancelled plans to help Mexico build a natural gas pipeline to the United States because he felt it would not be consistent with U.S. energy policy, the relationship between the two nations has been strained.

The Camp David meeting today between President Ronald Reagan and Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo can be the vehicle for positive change.

There are numerous topics for discussion, topics that touch the lives of virtually every person not only in the United States and Mexico, but Canada as well. Immigration policy, trade relations, fishing agreements, cultural bindings, tourism, energy and industrial development concern all three nations. All of those topics present challenges to the nations.

And there are other challenges, too. World events during recent years underline the importance of friendship between the nations. While it has been obvious that all three nations are understandably adamant about maintaining their

sovereignty and that Mexico and Canada are wary of too close a relationship with the United States for fear of being swallowed up, it's also obvious that enhanced security would be one valuable benefit of a closer relationship between the three nations.

On a smaller scale, the United States and Mexico have enough to discuss in the area of fishing agreements, immigration policy and the enmeshing economic considerations.

Last year President Lopez Portillo observed that, "Where there is no respect, relations become very difficult." Both he and President Reagan, we're sure, will be attempting to establish an understanding of mutual respect in today's meeting.

That's as it should be — and, if accomplished — will result in greater understanding in future years. Expanded to all three nations, the relationship can become one of tremendous mutual benefit.

That is what the leaders should work toward.

## Credential con game

In the aftermath of the Pulitzer Prize scandal in which a Washington Post reporter was found to have written about a non-existent child, it was discovered the reporter had also fudged her own life story, giving herself two phony college degrees when she applied for her Washington Post job. The incident seemed to confirm something about her particularly dishonest bent and therefore about the uniqueness of the whole affair.

However, when the Chronicle of Higher Education checked with the National Credential Verification Service, a private Minneapolis outfit that employers can hire to investigate the college credit claims of job applicants, it found that faking college credentials is something of a national pastime. About one in three claims that National Credential investigates turns out to be fake.

National Credential's founders say their business was inspired by people claiming Yale degrees who had never been to the university. The registrar at Harvard says she comes upon three or four fake alumni every month.

Usually what's involved is sim-

ple misrepresentation, but the Harvard registrar says that once or twice a year she runs across a truly elaborate fraud — something like what happened to a small, New England college a few years ago when a non-student managed to create an entire transcript, several term papers and a senior thesis and get them all filed under his name in the college's records office. Several faculty members wanted to grant him a degree in recognition of his sheer imagination and initiative.

Now their ersatz graduate, too, looks considerably less unique. And while the National Credential Verification Service has been flooded with business since the Pulitzer Prize debacle, the unmasking of false achievers will probably be less profitable for the rest of us. What we gain in self-righteous indignation we will lose in illusions about everyone else's honesty.

**BIBLE VERSE**

## Israel's 'tragic dilemma' will remain after election

JERUSALEM — Arik Sharon, hero of the bloody 1973 war with Egypt, is convinced that Israel's voters are moving toward full acceptance of Prime Minister Menachem Begin's militant settlements policy on the West Bank, a key element in the national security issue that underlies the bitter Israeli political campaign.

If he is right, Begin will continue as prime minister in the June 30 election and set the stage for new confrontations with the U.S. Begin's aggressive settlements policy is anathema to Arab states now being courted by the U.S. for help in halting Soviet aggression in the Persian Gulf region. Thus, it undercuts President Reagan's policy with the Arab states. Many politicians here think the two policies are on a collision course.

To reinforce his conviction, retired Gen. Sharon has developed a unique campaign plan. By election day, he told us, some 400,000 voters — at least one quarter of the expected vote — will take the "Sharon trail" from Israel proper to view the new settlements across the green line that separated Israel from Jordan before the 1967 war. Voters ride in state-subsidized buses. "When they see what we have done," Sharon told us, "they understand there is no other way. I campaign not by kissing babies or taking flowers but by showing the settlements."

Planting Jewish settlements on the West Bank has been the great passion

largely ignored in the campaign debate because it is so lethal, is this: How can autonomy, much less self-determination, ever work for 1,300,000 Arabs in the West Bank and Gaza if Israeli Jews populate their land?

There is a wide gap between Begin's policy and the far milder settlements policy of the Labor Party headed by Shimon Peres. It makes a contradiction as great as that between Begin's settlements policy and Reagan's strategy to enlist anti-Soviet help from Arab states that insist on self-determination for Palestinian Arabs.

Peres and his high command warn that if populated parts of the West Bank are not returned to Jordan under the elusive "Jordan option" plan that Peres is pushing, the Palestinians eventually will have to be offered Israeli citizenship or Palestine will be converted into a garrison state. But if the Palestinian Arabs ever do get the vote here, they will soon threaten the Jewish state with an Arab majority. Begin opposes any and all "Jordan options."

Old-line Labor leader Abba Eban, slated for foreign minister if Peres wins, told us: "Under Begin's settlements plan, we will either have to give the vote to the Arabs and we become a Jewish Lebanon (where the former Christian majority has been submerged by the faster-growing Moslem population) or we don't give them the vote and we are 'another South Africa.'"

Because security is always the underlying issue here and because the

## SBA minority help program fraud-riddled

WASHINGTON — Ex-President Jimmy Carter transformed the Small Business Administration into a social agency whose main function was not to serve small businessmen but to help minority businessmen get established.

The Carter administration granted easy credits and non-competitive bids to minority contractors under the "8A" program, which became plagued with fraud, waste and inequity. Much of the money was squandered on the undeserving or the politically well-connected. As one SBA official described the minority program succinctly: "It stinks."

Yet this same official said the evils of the 8A program are the price that must be paid if minority contractors are ever going to get a fair shake in the business world.

The hot-eyed Puritans in the Reagan administration, however, disagree with this "necessary evil" approach. They are determined to see that the program is made to work in such a way that both the minority recipients and the taxpayers get their money's worth.

It's a tall order, though: The SBA is \$500 million in the red. It makes loans to "paper" companies that have no equipment, no employees to speak of — and a demonstrated inability to pay back what they borrow. Loans and contracts are awarded on the basis of expediency or political pressure. Non-minority contractors get government help under the 8A program by using minority firms or individuals as fronts.

Here are two examples of what's wrong with the minority contract program. They were found in the SBA's own confidential documents by my reporter Judy Grande.

— William Roberts is a businessman who is also a Denver city councilman. His request for a \$300,000 loan

under the 8A program was turned down by two SBA officials.

The first loan officer noted that Roberts' company lost \$20,000 in 1979 and \$242,000 in the first half of 1980. "Based on the earnings record of this company, this debt cannot be retired in a satisfactory manner," the official wrote.

"Mr. Roberts has no business location, machinery, equipment or any of the normal trappings of a business," wrote another official.

The same official then went on to say that Roberts was bidding on a number of contracts and was about to be awarded one under 8A that would be worth as much as \$14 million. Of the requested \$300,000, the official wrote: "It is a sensitive loan from a political standpoint, and there is no question that any negative decision would be appealed."

SBA higher-ups overruled the loan officers' refusal, even though the FBI had determined that Roberts had once forged his ex-wife's signature on an old loan. In fact, the councilman's firm was given a \$325,000 loan; the extra \$25,000 was to cover an earlier \$24,000 SBA loan to a defunct Roberts enterprise.

Roberts denied that his firm had no equipment or employees at the time of the loan application, and though he admits signing his wife's name to close out a loan, he said he did not

think he had done anything wrong.

— Another Colorado firm, Boulder B&M Quality Dry Cleaners has had 12 years of 8A contract support. In January, it got its seventh SBA loan, even though it had no collateral, has never shown a profit and owes the government taxes as well as payments on the earlier loans.

Boulder's largest outstanding loans — for \$125,000 in 1975 and \$160,000 in 1977 — were approved by SBA's regional office over the strong warnings of loan officers. In another, more recent admonition, loan officers wrote that "management has a proven record of ineffectiveness" and "any further assistance would be a clear gamble supported only by the faintest glimmer of hope."

The company's latest loan application asked for \$57,000; it was given \$97,000. Sources tell me the loan was later rescinded after someone in SBA protested, but the agency would not confirm this, citing confidentiality. A company official would say only that Boulder is considering legal action against SBA.

Records on these and other minority contract cases have been sent to the Senate Small Business Committee for study.

The elevators were made automatic three years ago, so all the operators do is spare passengers the trouble of pushing their own buttons. Along with Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., Jepsen has introduced a bill that would eliminate the jobs on the Senate side. So far he has signed up only nine co-sponsors.

— The penny-pinching Republican Senate majority has been showing uncharacteristic charity toward a select group of Democratic holdovers on the committee staffs of defeated or retired senators. Some did nothing while they looked for new jobs, drawing thousands of dollars in salary for their phantom positions. Was it kindness to a defeated foe? Not quite. "They know the Democrats could win in 1982," said one clear-eyed hold-over. "They'll want their staffers taken care of if the shoe's on the other foot next year."

## Understanding terrorism easier with common sense

The New York Times recently ran a long piece on terrorism in which they quoted a lot of those famous government sources. The gist of the Times article was that nobody knew just exactly what Secretary of State Alexander Haig meant by terrorism nor were these sources sure that the Soviet Union really supports terrorism.

Well, there is a fairly easy way to distinguish between a terrorist and a genuine guerrilla. All you have to do is look at the people they kill. If the victims are civilians and chosen at random, you are dealing with a terrorist.

Even though the State Department cannot bring itself to say it, it is easy to establish that the Palestine Liberation Organization, for example, is a terrorist group, not a guerrilla or national liberation army.

A guerrilla army — or national liberation army, if you prefer to use the propagandist term — is engaged in war against a government. The goal is to overthrow that government and replace it with another. Such a group might assassinate government officials, attack government offices, ambush army patrols, and blow up key transportation and communications centers.

Even a guerrilla force occasionally resorts to terror, that is, killing or harming civilians, but in such cases, it is always done for the purpose of furthering the general war effort. For example, to intimidate the population into supporting the guerrillas. Fidel Castro's revolutionaries, the Viet Cong, and Mao Tse-tung's Red Army are examples of guerrilla forces. In

all three of these examples, the irregular soldiers operated within the borders of the country whose government they were fighting.

Now, let's look at the PLO. Who are its targets? Babies in nurseries, children in playgrounds, tourists, athletes, shoppers, people waiting for a bus. As I have pointed out before, Israel is a small country with a relatively large army. It is not difficult to find Israeli soldiers or government officials or government buildings, yet in well over 1,000 incidents, all but a few of the targets have been innocent civilians chosen at random.

That, my friends, is terrorism, not a war of national liberation. Nothing the PLO has done has in any way weakened or even harmed the Israeli government.

Furthermore, the PLO does not base its operations within Israel, despite the fact that there are a million Palestinian Arabs within Israel's borders, if you count those on the West Bank and in Gaza. It operates from Lebanon and has to insert its teams into Israel or fire across borders.

That fact alone should tell you a couple of things. One, even though the PLO claims to speak for the Palestinian Arabs, it cannot find shelter among them. Israeli intelligence is good but it is not so good that if the PLO enjoyed universal support among Palestinian Arabs Israeli forces could flush the terrorists out. Two, the Arabs within Israel are obviously not as hostile toward Israel as you would think from foreign news reports and PLO propaganda.

After all, when Menachem Begin, the Israeli prime minister, led the Irgun — a Jewish underground group fighting the British and the Arabs — he operated in Israel for years despite the fact that 85,000 British soldiers, a million Arabs, and at times, even the Jewish majority, were looking for him. Why could he do it and Yasser Arafat can't? Arafat tried it once and just barely escaped after only a few weeks on the West Bank. That's because the majority of Arabs know that Arafat is a terrorist, not an Arab patriot.

The terrorist organization, though it covers itself in political rhetoric, is nothing more than a criminal organization. It murders people, robs banks, collects extortion money. It is a threat to civilians but not to governments. If it serves any useful political function at all, it is to create instability and to publicize a cause.

That's why the Soviet Union supports terrorism in the sense of supplying arms, offering training, and probably some logistical help in terms of forged documents and, perhaps, safe houses. It is to the Soviet Union's advantage that all non-communist countries suffer as much instability, from whatever cause, as possible. You can note that none of the world's terrorist organizations has ever once struck at a target in a communist country.

Perhaps if all of these "sources" in the U.S. government would worry less about semantics and apply a little common sense, they wouldn't be so confused by Secretary Haig's speeches.

# Pope makes brief appearances before Vatican crowd

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Saying "I wanted to be with you," convalescing Pope John Paul II made two brief appearances before the Sunday throng at the Vatican.

The pontiff leaned on a balcony rail at the back of St. Peter's Basilica as he spoke to an applauding crowd of 20,000 people at the end of a two-hour Mass for Pentecost.

"I wanted to be with you," he said. "It is with great affection for all the faithful that I give the benediction."

His left ring finger, wounded in the attempt on his life May 13, was still in a cast. His voice was tired but stronger than it has been since he was shot.

After Mass, the pope

returned to his apartment in the Vatican Palace and leaned out of his third-floor window to bless the exuberant crowd of 80,000 in St. Peter's Square. Then he led the crowd in the Queen of Heaven prayer.

Two taped addresses by the pope were played Sunday.

A 32-minute homily was played during the Mass in St. Peter's, which was celebrated by 250 cardinals and bishops from around the world gathered for an ecumenical conference.

A 30-minute taped address was played later at the conference, which was attended by Greek Orthodox, Lutheran, Methodist and Anglican

representatives as well as Roman Catholics.

Every Sunday since the shooting, the Vatican Radio has broadcast a taped message from the pope to the crowds in St. Peter's Square. After he was released from the hospital Wednesday, he appeared briefly at the

window of his apartment but did not speak.

John Paul needs another operation to reverse the intestinal bypass doctors performed after he was shot. The operation will probably be performed in about a month, his doctors have said.

A Turk, Mehmet Ali Agca, 23, has been charged with shooting the pope and two American women who were near him at the time. He escaped from a Turkish jail in 1979 and later was convicted in absentia of murdering a journalist and sentenced to death.

# Archbishop appointment seen as breakthrough for the pope

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II appears to have scored a major diplomatic breakthrough with his appointment of Monsignor Dominic Tang as Roman Catholic archbishop of Canton, the fourth largest city in China.

Vatican spokesman Romeo Panciroli indicated that China's Communist government agreed to the pope's appointment of the 73-year-old prelate who was freed last year from 22 years in a Chinese prison. It was the first papal appointment to the Chinese mainland since 1955.

Peking's apparent decision to acknowledge the papal authority to name bishops in China represents the first concrete result of the Vatican's decades-long effort to regain a foothold in China. Vatican circles also see it as a sign of growing tolerance of religion among the Chinese Communists and another move by them to isolate the Nationalists on Taiwan.

The Holy See maintains diplomatic relations with Taiwan. This is likely to remain a barrier to normal relations with Peking. But Vatican analysts said the Vatican and Peking apparently reached an understanding patterned after the Shanghai Communiqué of 1972 in which the United States acknowledged "there is but one China and...Taiwan is part of China."

On the roster of prelates attending a Vatican conference on ecumenism Sunday, Tang and Archbishop Matthew Kia of Taipei, Taiwan, were both listed under China.

The sources said they expect Tang to act as an intermediary between the Vatican and the Peking Patriotic Catholic Association, a pro-government organization with no ties to the Vatican that appointed the bishop of Peking and other prelates without Vatican authorization. The Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Agostino Casaroli, said this was "illegitimate" but not necessarily illegal.

Tang was appointed bishop of Canton by Pope Pius XII in 1950 and by the Peking association after his release from prison in 1980. He is the only bishop recognized by both the Holy See and the Peking association.

Il Messaggero, Rome's largest newspaper, said the Vatican apparently has decided to approve the nominations made by the association in return for a pledge that the Chinese hierarchy in the future will abide by the doctrine that only the pope can appoint bishops. The paper said the pope will also consult the Peking government and the association before naming prelates, a practice the church has used in dealing with other communist countries including Poland.

John Paul has repeatedly made overtures to Peking since his election three years ago. During his Asian tour last February, he said China should forget about the past and re-establish the ties with the Vatican that were broken after the Communist victory in 1949.

Unofficial contacts began two years ago when two Chinese-born priests traveled to China. They were followed by Cardinals Roger Etchegaray of France and Franz Koenig of Austria. The Holy See also reduced its representation in Taipei to the level of charge d'affaires although Taipei still keeps an ambassador in Rome.

John Paul was asked on his way back from Asia in February if the Vatican would consider severing its ties with Taipei in order to establish normal relations with Peking.

"For the Holy See," he replied, "diplomatic relations do not have the same significance as with other nations. The Holy See never broke relations with China. China just expelled our apostolic representatives."

Italian commentators said Tang's appointment cleared the way for the pope to visit China — to see his flock led by a bishop named by the Vatican. In a speech to the Chinese community in Manila in February, he said he would like to go to China to pay his respects personally to the Chinese people.

# China to support struggle

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — China will "firmly support" Pakistan's "struggle to oppose foreign aggression," Foreign Minister Zhao Zi-yang says.

He spoke at a banquet here Monday night after his first round of talks with Pakistani President Mohammed Zia ul-Haq.

A diplomat who attended the talks but asked not to be identified said the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan, Pakistan's neighbor, "topped the list of issues on which the two leaders expressed extreme concern."

# Luxembourg pilot first to arrive

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A 32-year-old pilot from Luxembourg was the first to arrive from Paris in the first international, round-trip, trans-Atlantic race for private planes.

Robert Stoll, piloting a single-engine Cessna Centurion, arrived at Sikorsky Memorial Airport Sunday at 9:38 a.m. and was to take off for Paris today. Competitors must remain in Bridgeport 24 hours before returning to Paris.

Seventy international aviators are competing for a \$10,000 prize.

Because departures for the race, which is associated with the annual air show at Le Bourget Airport in Paris, are staggered over three days, the first arrivals in Bridgeport weren't necessarily the fastest.

The contest was billed as a Paris-to-New York-to-Paris race, but organizers chose Bridgeport as the U.S. landing point after failing to find a New York field able to handle the traffic.

The winner of the race will be determined using a formula that takes into account the time of flight, the number of stops for fuel and the relative speeds of the planes, which range from a 1935 DeHavilland to modern Beechcrafts.

Prizes will be awarded to the fastest single-engine plane, the fastest twin-engine plane and the fastest plane weighing more than three tons.

# Psychologist discovers people can remember details of own birth

SAN DIEGO — Is it possible to remember your own birth? Complete with details such as what nurses and doctors said during the delivery, which obstetrical instruments were used, how your mother reacted to your arrival and what it felt like to be held upside down by the ankles and whacked on the behind?

According to clinical psychologist David Chamberlain, who has completed an extensive study on birth memories elicited under hypnosis, people can indeed remember their own births in extraordinary detail. And their reports can be corroborated by information from their mothers.

In summarizing 100 cases of birth and womb memory for a forthcoming book, "Birth and Before: What People Say About It in Hypnosis," Chamberlain claims that newborns really do know what is happening to them. Many of his subjects, he claimed, when returned via hypnosis to the day of birth, complained bitterly about being separated from their mothers, resented the rough manner in which they were handled and were sometimes psychologically damaged by remarks or actions of adults around them at birth.

"... a lot of pressure pushing down on me. I'm pushed around... I don't dare push with my feet — that makes it hurt more — so I try to make myself smaller so it doesn't hurt. I feel pressure on my head like somebody's trying to push my head down and it won't go... I'm stuck! I can't move my shoulders. The doctor's pulling my head. My jaws hurt — he's squeezing them, pulling them! Oh, my mouth!... The doctor is pulling and I can't get out!... 'Push,' he's yelling to everybody. 'Push! Push!'... The opening is as big as it will go and my mom's crying and pushing. She's not relaxed at all. She's tight — I'm tight and the doctor is really becoming angry because I'm not coming out like I'm supposed to!... He says I need to breathe soon... My shoulder is out... Whew it's not as tight. He's not pulling as hard... They kept saying I needed to come out faster and faster and I couldn't; I was caught!... The doctor's concerned that I'm not extended — I don't know what that means..."

Chamberlain first became interested in birth and womb memories in 1975 when one of his clients surprised him by tracing a problem back to birth, recapping the event step by step under hypnosis. Two months later Chamberlain came across an article by San Francisco obstetrician Dr. David B. Cheek, describing nearly 20 years of cheek's work with people recalling their births under hypnosis. In the memories they had tracked the origins of common problems to difficulties in the birth process:

headaches originating with rough handling with forceps, asthma provoked by panic at delivery, digestive problems resulting from refusal or inability of the mother to breast feed and a long-term neurosis triggered by a damaging remark of a doctor at birth.

Chamberlain decided to test Cheek's theories with two clients he'd been treating — unsuccessfully — for specific phobias.

"One of the cases was a flight phobia that just would not resolve," he recalls in his home here. His initial work with the client had focused on her trauma in airplanes.

"I made the suggestion that perhaps something happened earlier and set the stage for this to be a problem. What she remembered, then, under hypnosis, was being born and being dropped in the delivery process. So the first thing she experienced in life was a crash and that had been there sort of latent through 14 years of her life until she actually flew in a plane and the difficulty developed. Once she

# Psychologist finds people can recall own birth

located the true beginning of her phobia she was rid of it. It simply disappeared. She took a flight, was happy and had no problems with it.

"The other case involved a person who was afraid of elevators. Again, it was traced back to her first bad experience with elevators when she was 6 or 7, but she wasn't cured after recalling it. When I suggested that something previous might have happened to sensitize her, she said, under hypnosis, that she was being born and the part of the birth that had gotten to her was being put in an incubator and fearing that there wouldn't be enough air to breathe. She reported in panic, 'They're putting me in a box. They're putting a top over the box.'

"So that was behind her fear of elevators, not the elevators themselves. Again, as soon as she made this discovery, she was free of her phobia. No further problem. We can't help but pay attention to that kind of dramatic turnaround in therapy."

In his book, Chamberlain writes that after the elevator and flight phobias cleared up he needed no further convincing that birth memories were possible or that recalling them might be necessary for

success in difficult cases. "I began to think about birth itself and the wonder of hearing about it first-hand. It seemed an incredible thing to be listening to a 'baby' talk about being born — a baby grown up, of course, who could talk about it in everyday language I could understand. Was everyone carrying this sort of information? I was curious to find out."

In Chamberlain's documentation of 100 subjects' birth and womb memories, 20 of those cases were studied extensively: 10 sets of mother-child pairs whose hypnosis-induced memories were compared for verification or contradiction.

In nine of the 10 mother-child pairs, Chamberlain found the memories matched at many points (as few as six and as many as 19) and that contradictions were few (four pairs had no conflicting information, four had one contradiction, and one pair had two contradictions. Contradictions generally involved minor details such as whether the mother or the child left the delivery room first).

In one of the mother-child pairs there was no matching information and four separate contradictions were recorded. So Chamberlain tested the daughter of the pair a second time under hypnosis

and when he inquired if it would be all right for her to have the memory of her birth, he received a firm, "No, it would not be good to remember." Chamberlain concluded that the daughter's initial contradictions were the result of a subconscious motive to shelter herself from the truth.

Chamberlain is aware that his findings, and those of other researchers of such memories, are controversial. "The fact that a child's mind is actually working at birth upsets a lot of theories," he says. "This forces us to change our view of what we're dealing with. Obviously, we're not dealing with the brain at all. Professionals have always said, 'There's no brain or there's an inadequate brain or it would take the brain several years to get to a place where it could comprehend this.' And so they have concluded that birth and womb memories are fantasy, hallucination."

"Well, that's just an error in interpretation. I don't think that birth memory has anything whatever to do with the brain. What we're dealing with is mind. It's a non-physical aspect of ever person. And mind has an all-or-nothing quality. It doesn't develop cell by cell over the years so that it's competent to do something at six years that it can't do at two. It's just not that way."

## Forest service selling obsolete lookout towers

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Smokey the Bear has discovered the airplane, and as a result, the Texas Forest Service is selling 65 fire lookout towers.

The 100-foot angle iron structures, located chiefly in the East Texas, are going to the highest bidder.

Pilots now handle all the fire spotting for the Forest Service, says James B. Hull Jr., associate director of the agency headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Although about a dozen of the towers already have been sold for prices ranging from \$100 to \$600, Hull says problems in moving them may force the Forest Service to sell them for scrap.

Some towers have been purchased by landowners — all sites were leased — who want to keep them as landmarks.

Two have been sold to states that still use towers for fire control, Nacogdoches bought one for its fire department to use in climbing practice and a Dallas man erected one as a security tower for his flea market.



# Deputy premier begins talks to avert Polish strike

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — After delivering a sharp warning to the independent labor movement, Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Rakowski began negotiations today to try to avert Poland's first strike in almost three months.

Rakowski said the Communist Party has exhausted the number of "reasonable compromises" it can reach with Solidarity, the independent labor federation.

"The limit on the patience of our allies has also been exhausted," he warned in a speech Sunday to a party meeting in Bydgoszcz, 140 miles northwest of Warsaw.

"Those who want to weaken our rule should bear in mind that they take the responsibility for what is going to happen to our state, to our nation. We are nearing a dangerous

frontier and it is necessary not to strike."

A West German television network reported the Soviet Communist party's Central Committee had sent an "ultimatum" to the Polish Central Committee. It said the Polish committee would meet Tuesday to discuss its response.

There was no confirmation of the report in Warsaw or Moscow. PAP, the official Polish news agency, said the Polish committee would meet Tuesday to discuss plans for the party congress in July that is to accept or reject proposed political and economic reforms.

The Soviet media has recently devoted more and more space to criticisms of the growing liberalization movement among the rank and file of the Polish party and the efforts of

party leaders to come to terms with the reformers. This has again raised the prospect of Soviet military intervention to crush the reform movement, just as a reform movement in the Czechoslovak Communist Party was crushed in 1968.

Rakowski, the government's chief labor troubleshooter, was scheduled to meet with union leaders today to try to get them to call off a two-hour warning strike Thursday in the Bydgoszcz region.

The strike was called to pressure the government into issuing a report on its investigation into the police beating of three union members in Bydgoszcz on March 19.

The government expressed its regrets because of those events," said Rakowski. "... Two (provincial) governors were recalled, and the security

of the union and its activists was guaranteed."

He suggested that Solidarity was raising the issue again to "harass the authorities, weaken them and bring them to their knees."

The meeting adopted a resolution saying "the fact the Bydgoszcz events were allowed to take place by the authorities was a political mistake." But it appealed to Solidarity for restraint and called for a negotiated solution.

The beatings occurred when Solidarity members refused to leave a municipal hall after officials abruptly adjourned a meeting with them. The next day there were regional warning strikes by some 500,000 workers, and a week later there was a nationwide warning strike. A nationwide protest strike of indefinite duration was

called for March 31 was averted at the last minute by an agreement between

Rakowski and Solidarity leader Lech Walesa.

## Progress reported in talks

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Weekend negotiations between the striking Writers Guild of America and major motion picture and television producers went a long way toward ending the eight-week-old strike, spokesmen on both sides of the dispute say.

However, still to be resolved when talks resume Tuesday are the difficult home video provisions of a new contract — the major stumbling block to a settlement so far.

But Writers Guild spokesman Gary Ellingsworth said negotiations were "going very well," and Billy Hunt, who represents the producers, was

even more optimistic.

"With any luck we'll have it (the strike) resolved this week," he said.

A breakthrough with the writers could reduce the likelihood of a strike on July 1 by the powerful Directors Guild of America, which currently is in negotiations with producers.

The major issue in the writers walk-out, which began April 11, has been the residuals to be paid for made-for-TV shows, videocassettes and discs.

The writers had been asking 4.5 percent of the sales of pay TV shows after producers recoup certain costs.

# Arab League diplomats seek peace in Lebanon

BEITEDDIN, Lebanon (AP) — With Saudi Arabia and Kuwait mediating, Syria and the Lebanese Christians and Moslems resumed negotiations today on a peace plan for Lebanon calling for a nationwide cease-fire and removal of heavy arms from the major cities.

The Arab League emergency committee, made up of the Saudi, Syrian and Kuwaiti foreign ministers and the league's secretary general, began the peace-making effort Sunday at this Lebanese mountain resort in an attempt to end fighting between Syrian troops and Christian militiamen in which more than 644 Lebanese have been killed since April 1.

A lull in the fighting was reported Sunday as the peace effort got underway.

Sources close to the

conference said the leaders of Lebanon's Moslem and Christian factions responded favorably when Arab League Secretary-General Chadli Kleibi proposed the plan in 14 hours of talks.

Beirut Radio quoted Lebanese Prime Minister Shafiq Wazzan, a Moslem, as saying the ministers were giving top priority to efforts to arrange a cease-fire so the talks could continue in "complete security and stability."

The Christian Voice of Lebanon radio said a peace plan under discussion called for a cease-fire, the removal of heavy weapons from the major cities and discussion of Syria's role in Lebanon.

But reports from Lebanese sources said the Syrians posed a crucial problem for the Christians by demanding they publicly break their ties

with Israel.

Bashir Gemayel, commander of the Christian Phalange Party's militia, made no mention of Israel after speaking with the mediators Sunday, but he did say he was optimistic.

"It is a new opportunity for us to resolve the crisis. We accept it and are willing to come to an understanding," he told reporters.

Walid Jumblatt, leader of Lebanon's leftist Moslem coalition, said the success or failure of the talks depended on the right-wing Christians' willingness to break with their Israeli backers.

"National entente now hinges on one matter," Jumblatt said. "This matter is a pledge by the Lebanese (Christian) Front to sever all ties with Israel."

The Jewish state has become a prime weapons supplier to Christian

forces and has pledged to protect them against Syria's air force.

Israel said it was backing up that pledge when it shot down two Syrian helicopter gunships on April 28, claiming they were attacking Christian militia positions near the Christian city of Zahle in eastern Lebanon.

Syria countered by rolling anti-aircraft missiles into Lebanon and kindling the missile crisis that has been simmering ever since, with Israel threatening to knock out the missiles unless Syria removes them.

Damascus claims the Israeli-Christian alliance poses a direct threat to its security by opening Christian territory in Lebanon to an Israeli invasion of Syria. Syrian sources said it was Christian efforts to expand their military posi-

tion in east central Lebanon near the Syrian border that prompted Syrian troops to attack them on April 1.

The Christians charge that the 22,000 Syrian troops in Lebanon are an occupation army and Syria plans to annex Leb-

anon into a Greater Syria. The Syrians say they are in Lebanon to enforce the armistice that ended the 1975-76 civil war between the Christians and Moslems.

U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib

spent 20 days on a Middle East diplomatic shuttle last month trying to defuse the missile crisis. While his initial mission brought no public breakthroughs, it did reduce tensions and kept Israel and Syria from going to war.

# Business good for some in France

PARIS (AP) — "Business is just fine," said Frank Klein, managing director of the Ritz Hotel. "The Ritz always does well, no matter what political changes occur."

The stock market plummeted and the franc sank following the May 10 election of a Socialist president, Francois Mitterrand, who promised massive increases in social benefits and nationalization of a number of major companies including the remaining private banks.

Despite the fears of the well-to-do, however, expensive restaurants are still booked weeks ahead and some other luxury establishments are faring better than ever.

Owners and managers in the luxury fields are sanguine.

"About 30 percent of our guests are American, and they came even when the dollar was way down," said the manager of the Ritz. "Now, of course, they get more for their money. We're nearly fully booked for months to come."

Last week the government increased the basic minimum wage 10 percent, from \$2.71 an hour to \$2.99. But "the Ritz's wages are already well above the new minimum wage," said Klein. Nor does the possibility of increased taxes on profits and resulting higher prices for the guests bother him.

"If you're paying \$100 or so for a room, a \$10 difference probably won't ruin you," he observed.

"Like all people in government here, the Socialists like to eat well. They're among our best customers," said Claude Terrail, owner of the three-star Tour d'Argent restaurant.

"We've got a new 'Bureau of Free Time' with the new regime. But whatever you call these things, they're promoting enjoyment of France, so I don't see them treating us badly."

The fashion industry is also optimistic. Says designer-magnate Pierre Cardin, who recently bought a majority interest in Maxim's restaurant: "Without our luxury goods and services, France could hardly survive. So we expect the government to treat us well. After all, France without its couture, its perfume, its hotels and restaurants would be unthinkable!"

Jacques Mouclier, president of the Franche

fashion and other artisanal syndicates, is elated.

"I'm not a Socialist," he said, "but if this government comes through with their promises, our industries will benefit. They are planning to reduce social security and other charges by 30 percent to artisanal business, like the couture. I've been agitating for this for years."

"I can't see governments discriminating

against the artisans. Collective turnover for our luxury industries is 40 billion francs (\$7 billion) whereas metallurgy is only about 27 billion francs (\$4.7 billion).

"Don't let's dramatize. Things will calm down."

"After all, Mitter-

rand's minimum wage rise, compared to inflation rates, is somewhat less than Valery Giscard d'Estaing's increase seven years ago.

"It was time for a change, and a breeze of socialism can't upset this country. France is still France."

# Doctor's efforts yield hope for kidney patient

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP) — Sylvia Smith was sent home from a hospital in her native Bahamas in March with a bottle of pills and what doctors here say was a virtual death sentence from kidney failure.

The 45-year-old mother of six lost 50 pounds and was no longer able to work selling fruit from her little stand on Nassau's Market Street before she fled to Florida where she has been given expensive dialysis treatments despite her inability to pay.

Doctors at Nassau's Princess Margaret Hospital didn't tell her that without dialysis to cleanse the poisons from her blood, she would not survive more than a few weeks, her Florida doctor says.

"It was my impression that she was not supposed to know about the treatment — that she was supposed to die quietly," said Dr. Robert Levinson, a Hollywood kidney specialist who took up Ms. Smith's case with officials at Princess Margaret. "A better candidate for dialysis would be someone with political influence."

A nursing supervisor at the Nassau hospital, who declined to be identified, said Sunday she knew nothing of the case and no one was at the hospital who could comment.

A nurse at the Nassau hospital told her about dialysis, and Ms. Smith left her island homeland for South Florida in search of treatment — a common practice among residents of many Caribbean and Latin American countries, according to officials at public hospitals here.

Ms. Smith checked into Memorial Hospital in Hollywood on April 17 and was examined by Levinson. After a week's stay and three dialysis treatments, her condition improved.

But her visa expired and she had little money. Until last week, she didn't believe that she would qualify for dialysis when she returned home, despite a letter-writing campaign launched by Levinson.

The doctor argued that as a relatively young mother with no other health problems, Ms. Smith was a good candidate for dialysis. John M. Gardella, associate administrator at Memorial, contacted the State Department to request that the Bahamian government qualify the woman for treatment and consider paying her \$8,500 hospital bill here.

In late April, the Bahamian Ministry of Health promised the case would be reviewed, but more than a month later, no decision had been made. The Nassau Tribune publicized the case, but still there was no government response.

As late as Wednesday, Levinson was still discouraged. "I have a sick feeling that the Bahamian government will continue to stonewall us," he said then. "I have no hope that they will relent."

But on Thursday Ms. Smith's sister, Nathalee Bonimy, was told by an official at Princess Margaret that her sister would be accepted for a new form of dialysis — a type that does not require a kidney machine.

"It sounds encouraging," said Levinson, who is familiar with the procedure.

Ms. Smith now spends her days in a cousin's home in the Liberty City area of Miami, reading her Bible and watching television.

"It sounds good — if they do what they say they will," she said. "I just hope they do what they say."

The official Bahamas News Service said it could not confirm that she had been accepted for treatment. Meanwhile, Gardella said the Bahamian government "has made absolutely no expression" that it might pay the woman's medical bills at Memorial, which amount by \$150 each time she receives dialysis treatment as an outpatient.

He said her family made a deposit and has made one payment toward the bill, "but it doesn't begin to cover the costs."

Levinson said he plans to forget money Ms. Smith owes him. "She's going to need every penny she has," he said.

Gardella said his hospital never considered denying Ms. Smith the life-saving treatment. "We don't have the same policy as the Bahamian government," he said.

# Rostenkowski's training under test

WASHINGTON (AP) — All of Dan Rostenkowski's training as a student of Richard J. Daley in the Chicago school of politics and a veteran of 22 years in Congress is being tested in the battle over President Reagan's tax-cut plan.

As chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, the heat is on Rostenkowski to keep Democratic leaders from suffering the same kind of defeat as when 63 of their members broke ranks to vote for Reagan's budget blueprint earlier this year.

Just how much he can accomplish is unclear, with liberal Democrats adamant against Reagan's proposal for an across-the-board tax cut and the possibility that Southern conservatives might bolt again to the White House position.

But those who know the 53-year-old Rostenkowski say he is well-suited for the role.

"He has a tremendous amount of political savvy," says former Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., the longtime Ways and Means chairman.

Rostenkowski, a husky 6-foot-4 with piercing eyes and a large jaw, "is a natural leader," Mills says.

Big, bluff and at times gruff, Rostenkowski looks down from the chairman's seat on the raised platform of the Ways and Means Committee with a tangle of hair straggling down his forehead, his lower lip jutting outward in seeming defiance. His fellow lawmakers, says a Republican congressman who asked not to be identified, "like him very much and I think they're afraid of him...They genuflect."

But Rostenkowski also puts a premium on loyalty and is ever willing to help, or at least console, a fellow politician in the hour of need.

When the House was in the process of expelling Rep. Michael Myers for his Abscam bribery conviction last year, the Pennsylvania lawmaker sat alone in the chamber. Rostenkowski strolled in, sat next to Myers and threw an arm around him.

"Danny Rostenkowski doesn't care what you or any other reporter writes about him," Common Cause President Fred Wertheimer once said. "What he cares about is how he stands with his peers."

"He works hard, he talks to people, he gives people a sense of confidence and reassurance and the protection of a group," Rep. Richard A. Gebhardt, D-Mo., says.

New York Rep. Barber Conable, the senior Republican on the Ways and Means Committee, attributes Rostenkowski's skill to his background in Chicago politics.

"He came up through a very tough political organization and it reflects his training," Conable says. Rostenkowski was born into politics. As his father and grandfather were before him, he is Democratic committeeman of the ward on Chicago's North Side where he grew up.

His father, Joseph P. Rostenkowski, also was a member of the Chicago City Council.

With such lineage, Rostenkowski was steeped in politics early on and also was helped in his career. He went to the Illinois Legislature in 1953, two years after his graduation from Loyola University, and arrived on Capitol Hill in 1958.

Immediately, he became a favorite of Mayor Daley. "He was Daley's pet," Mills says. "Daley

gave him all the advice and training you could get from a really good political leader, and Daley was one of the best."

Rostenkowski first popped up on the nation's television screens at the 1968 Democratic National Convention. With Daley's police fighting antiwar demonstrators in the streets and delegates growing rebellious in the hall, Daley ordered the towering and forceful Rostenkowski to take the gavel from diminutive House Speaker Carl Albert, D-Okla., and restore order.

Order was restored, but Albert never forgot. In 1970, Rostenkowski was stunned when he was ousted as chairman of the House Democratic Caucus by Rep. Olin "Tiger" Teague of Texas.

But Rostenkowski bounced back into the party leadership a few years later as chief deputy whip. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. has paid homage to him as a master at counting votes. Last fall, with the defeat of Ways and Means Chairman Al Ullman, D-Ore., and Majority Whip John Brademas, D-Ind., the Chicago congressman had his choice: chairman or whip.

# UT students form statewide committee

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Some University of Texas students are launching a statewide committee to help finance campaigns of legislators who have displayed "sensitivity to the problems faced by students and young professionals."

John Taylor, a UT junior, said in a statement Sunday registration forms for PROPAC — Progressive Political Action Committee — would be filed with Texas Secretary of State George Strake's office this week.

Taylor said PROPAC is affiliated with the Washington-based national committee of the same name. The national committee was formed by congressional Democrats, he said, in response to the release by NCPAC — National Conservative Political Action Committee — of a "hit list" of congressmen in the 1982 elections.

"Rather than a 'hit list' we will release a 'Ten Hardest-Working' legislators' list, and go from there," said Taylor.

He said PROPAC would evaluate legislators' votes on issues such as the proposed college tuition increase, the student regent bill, student services bill and campaign ethics bill that were before the 1981 Legislature.

"We are targeting candidates for victory rather than defeat," said Taylor.

# Leukemia victim still seeking his identity

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Although a recent ruling blocked efforts to open his adoption records, a man stricken with leukemia says he will appeal the decision and continue attempts to identify relatives who may provide a life-saving bone transplant.

"I'm wasting so much of my life fighting the state of Missouri," James Grant George, 33, said Sunday in a telephone interview from his home in Miami. "And I don't know how much time I have left. But, yes, we're going to appeal."

George, who was born in Kansas City, is trying to open his adoption records, which are sealed under Missouri law unless "compelling circumstances" can be shown. He wants to locate his mother, father or half sister on his mother's side for a possible bone marrow transplant.

His effort was thwarted last week when a Jackson County circuit judge ruled the situation is not "compelling to the proportion which would require overriding the birth mother's right of confidentiality," said Judith Sharp, George's Kansas City lawyer.

Sharp said she would file for an expedited appeal with the Missouri Court of Appeals in Kansas City.

Michael Curley, the attorney representing George's mother, said the woman does not want her identity revealed largely to protect her ailing daughter.

Curley said the half sister probably does not know she's related to George, who has chronic myelocytic leukemia, a disease doctors say is usually fatal in three to four years. He said George's father also has cancer, and another half sister died of the disease before she was 20.

Following Martin's ruling, the mother issued a formal statement through Curley saying she has felt a great deal of pressure, to the point of almost suffering a nervous breakdown.

"While I am grieved that he has leukemia, and hope he finds a cure through a bone marrow transplant, I do not feel he is my son," the statement said. "I never saw the baby and never held him....I never felt like I had a 'son' somewhere."

Last week, George turned down an offer in which his mother and her daughter offered to undergo an anonymous test to determine if they had compatible bone marrow. The agreement stipulated that no other relatives on the mother's side would be contacted and pursuit of the identification petition be dropped.

"That gives me nothing," George said. "Even if they matched, there was no guarantee that they would donate any marrow." He added that he wants the records opened so he can appeal to several relatives, as well as make a direct plea to his mother.

George, a computer systems consultant with a wife and two children, said he first wrote the Jackson County Circuit Court for his birth certificate and adoption papers almost a year ago when he discovered he was ill. He said his reply was a form letter saying he needed a court order. When he asked for a court order, he said he received another copy of the first form letter.

"That's a terrible thing to do to people," George said. "Those kind of screw-ups are really annoying. It's aggravating, the power that a court clerk holds over my life."

# Doctor being sought after treating plague victim

GALLUP, N.M. (AP) — New Mexico health officials and Colorado authorities today were trying to locate a vacationing doctor who was exposed to a pneumonic plague victim.

Dr. Mark Hauswald, chief of emergency medicine at the Gallup Indian Medical Center, was believed to be on a camping trip in southern Colorado, possibly in the Silverton-Ouray area.

Hauswald helped treat a 28-year-old Cuba, N.M., man who later died from pneumonic plague, the contagious form of the disease. New Mexico health officials said as a safety precaution, more than 40 people who came in contact with the unidentified victim were being given antibiotics.

Michael Burkhardt, director of the health services division of the state Health and Environment Department, said the state laboratory confirmed that the victim died last Friday of the pneumonic form of plague at the Gallup hospital.

"Because it was pneumonic, we've done extensive

checking of close contacts and have a number of them on antibiotics as a preventive treatment," he said.

Ray Bayles, chief of communicable disease control at the hospital, said 43 people, including medical personnel and family members of the victim, had been given antibiotics as a preventive measure.

Burkhardt said it's believed the victim contracted the disease from a flea and not from another person. "We know there has been a die-off of prairie dogs in the area. We feel it (the plague) is flea born," he said.

The contagious pneumonic form of plague can develop from bubonic plague, which is transmitted to humans by fleas from infected animals. Pneumonic plague can be transmitted from human to human, "like flu," Burkhardt said.

He said, however, "We're confident at this point that in time that we have the contacts under surveil-

lance, and they are being treated."

The last reported case of plague being transmitted from person to person was in California in 1925, he said.

Burkhardt said the victim was seen at a hospital in Cuba on Wednesday. He was checked into the Gallup Indian Medical Center Thursday about 10:15 p.m. and died Friday at 7:15 a.m., Bayles said.

Health officials from the state Health and Environment Department, the Indian Health Service and the Center for Disease Control in Fort Collins, Colo., were in Cuba and Gallup to investigate the case, Bayles said.

Burkhardt said state environmental personnel have been dusting the area around Cuba with a chemical in an effort to kill fleas. Dogs also were being checked for fleas, he said.

This is New Mexico's third confirmed case of plague in 1981.

# Boy test-tube twin recovering

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Test-tube twin Stephen Mays was showing "very good color" today as he recuperated from heart surgery, a hospital spokesman said.

He was being fed through a tube in his throat and his sister, Amanda, was "breast-feeding beautifully," the spokesman said.

Stephan, who was "born blue," at 1:43 a.m. Saturday, no longer needed oxygen, a medical bulletin said. Doctors operated on him 15 hours after his birth when tests showed two main arteries of his heart were transposed.

Amanda entered the world weighing 5-pound, 5-ounces at 1:45 a.m. without complications and within three minutes was in the arms of her father, Rodney Mays, 33.

Both she and the twins' mother, Radmila, 31, were doing well, the hospital said.

The twins were delivered two weeks before term by Caesarean sec-

tion and placed in incubators at Royal Victoria Hospital.

Mrs. Mays had tried for eight years to get pregnant before doctors implanted two test-tube fertilized eggs in her womb nearly nine months ago.

The twins' grandmother, Joan Mays, said today she and her husband Allan had "prayed and prayed for the best" for the world's first test-tube twins.

"At first we were just excited and thrilled about the births," Mrs. Mays said. "But the bottom fell out of world for awhile when we heard that Stephen had a heart problem. We're feeling so relieved now that he's come through it all so well."

Stephen will have to undergo corrective surgery in 6-to-12 months, but his prospects for a healthy life afterward are good, doctors said.

He is mentally alert and there is no evidence of brain damage from his lack of oxygen at birth, they said.

Dr. Carl Wood, head of the hospital's team specializing in test-tube procedure, said he did not believe Stephen's heart defect was related to the unorthodox method of fertilization.

"We have discussed this already and though we can't be absolutely sure, it's unlikely," he said. "The heart doesn't form until long after the child is growing in the mother's body."

However, he said the team would look closely over the next year to see if a baby's sex is a factor in healthy deliveries. Out of six test tube babies born at the hospital, five of them girls, only the boy had trouble.

"By the time we get 30 babies born, sometime next year, we should have a better idea whether the boys are not as robust as girls in this program," Wood said.

The test-tube technique, called "in-vitro" or in-glass fertilization, was devised by two British doctors, Patrick Steptoe and Robert Ed-

wards, for couples unable to achieve natural conception. It involves extracting an egg from the mother's womb, fertilizing it with the father's sperm in the laboratory and returning it to the womb.

A 70-year-old woman, also from Cuba, was diagnosed in May as a plague victim. She recovered, Burkhardt said.

A 25-year-old rancher from southern Otero County, died Feb. 12 in an El Paso, Texas, hospital of plague. Health authorities said the young man, a part-time trapper, contracted the disease from skinning a bobcat.

# FBI shows pictures to families

ATLANTA (AP) — The mother of one of the 28 young blacks slain in Atlanta says she recognized a photograph shown to her by FBI agents as a man who had offered her son a job not long before his disappearance, a newspaper reported today.

However, the families of six other victims did not recognize anyone in a group of pictures presented to them by the FBI, according to the story in the Atlanta Constitution.

Relatives of two of the victims said the FBI told them that one of the photographs showed a 22-year-old black man who was questioned in the case last week, the Constitution said. FBI agents and Atlanta police questioned the man Wednesday and Thursday but no charges have been filed.

Police have kept the man under intense surveillance since then, posting uniformed officers and plainclothesmen in front of his north-west Atlanta home and following him in a convoy of police cars when he leaves the brick house.

Helen Pue, mother of 15-year-old Terry Pue, said that when an FBI agent showed her the photographs, "I pointed that 'I had seen that one.'"

Mrs. Pue said that two weeks before her son's body was found Jan. 23, she went to the West Lake train station to pick up her husband.

"I saw Terry talking to him. I asked what he said, but Terry said he just was talking," she said, adding that the man appeared to be in his late 20s and that he was "not black and not white, just a brown color."

The man she identified in the photo "just sat there in a green station wagon, talking to Terry," she said. "Terry got away so quick when he seen me. The only thing he told me was that the man wanted him to work for him. I told Terry he wasn't going to work for him."

Mrs. Pue said that when she told the FBI agent about the man she recognized, the agent "shook my hand and said, 'Are you sure, Mrs. Pue?' I said I was."

Pue's body was found

beside a road in suburban Rockdale County, east of Atlanta and about 25 miles from his home. He had been strangled.

FBI spokesman Dick Berry said Sunday he had no comment on the photograph.

The mothers and other relatives of victims Curtis Walker, Clifford Jones, Eric Middlebrooks, Christopher Richardson, Larry Rogers and Patrick Rogers said agents also had shown them photos but added they had not recognized any of the subjects.

Hood said the FBI "came back twice in one week with those pictures. They came Monday and then they came back Wednesday."

The man under surveillance held a news conference Thursday in which he said the FBI considers him a "prime suspect" in at least some of the slaying. He denied any wrongdoing.

No one has been arrested in connection with

the cases. The first two bodies were discovered in July 1979.

According to a source close to the probe, however, FBI agents have believed since last Wednesday that they have sufficient evidence to arrest the man they questioned.

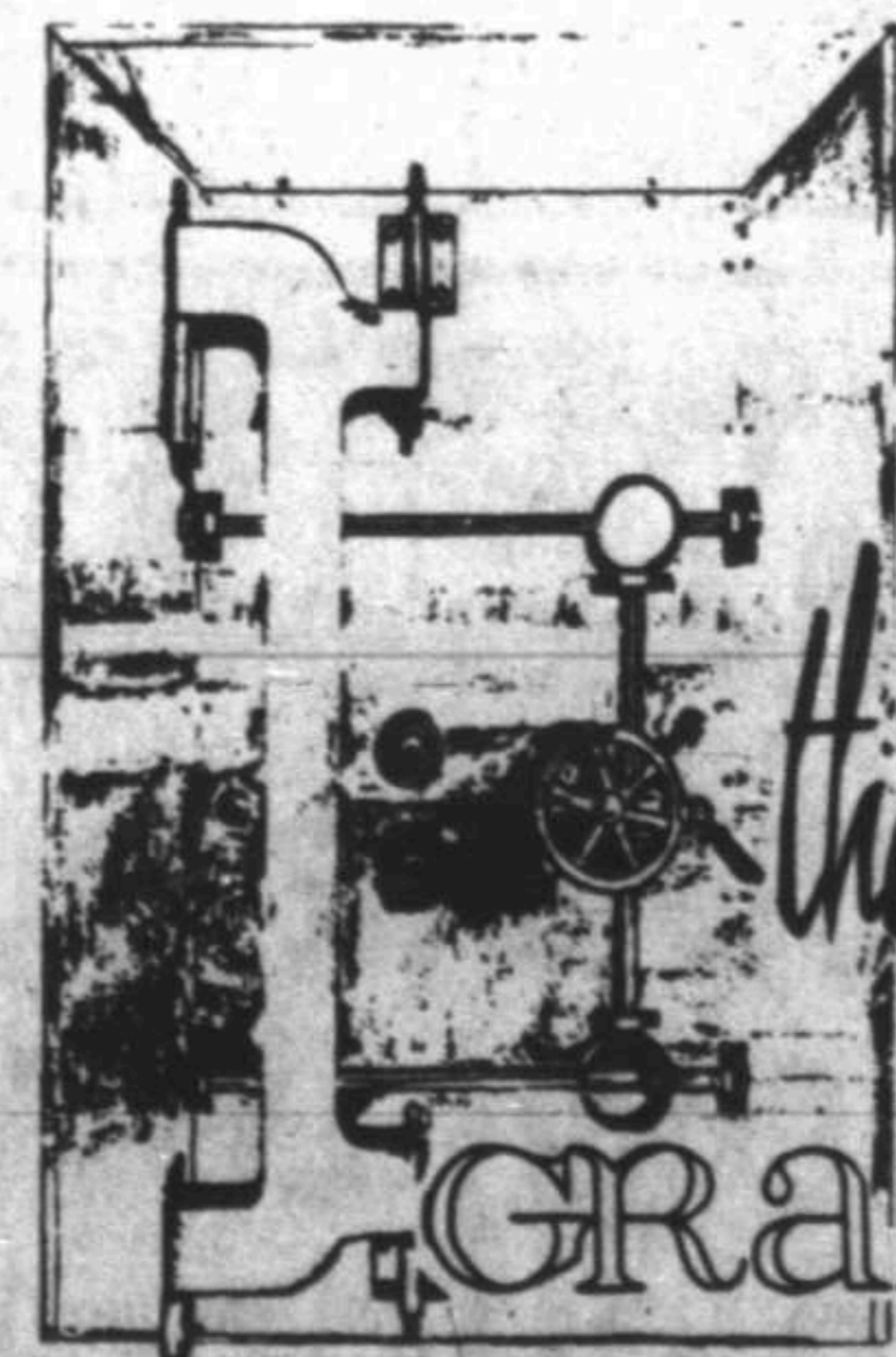
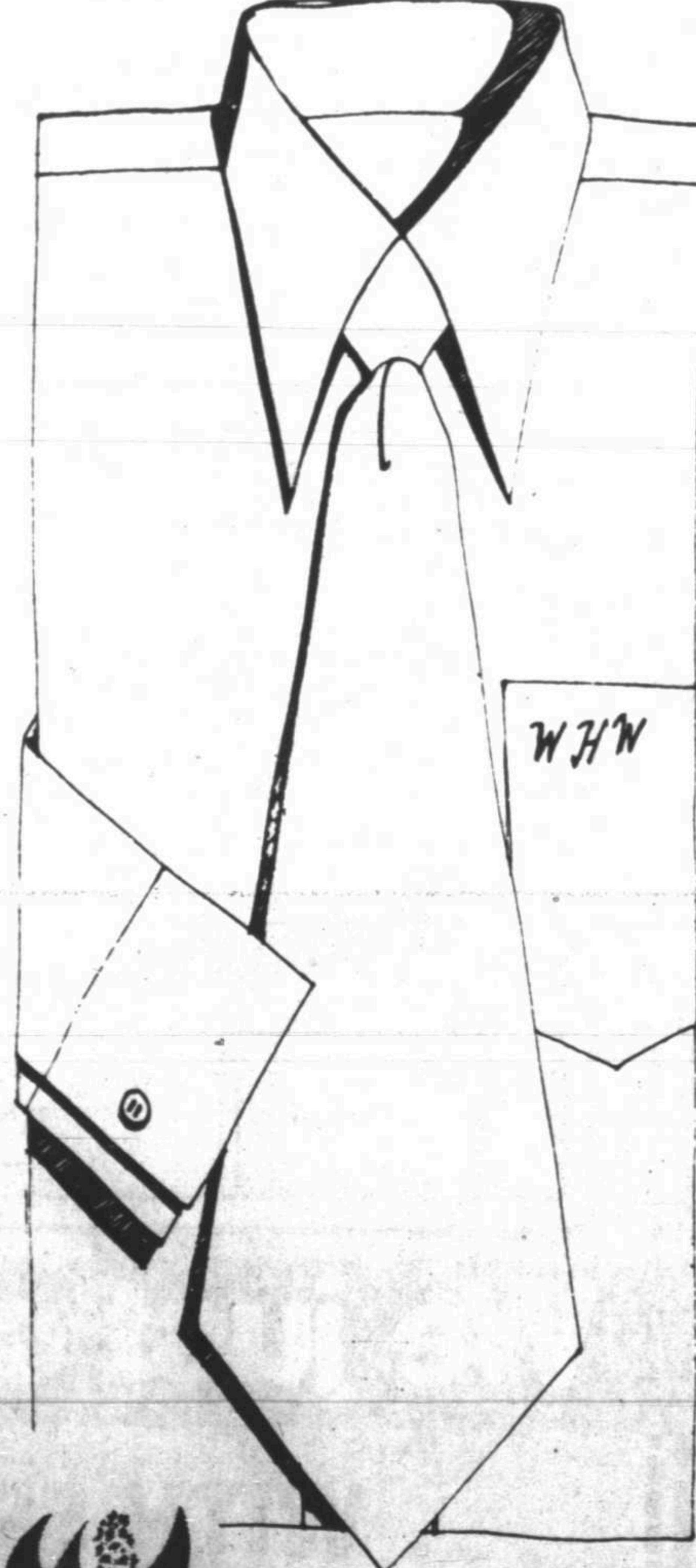

Psychologist fights for short people

NEW ORLEANS — Don't call him "Shrimp."

Or "Peanut," "Shortie" or "Midgit," if you please.

A clinical psychologist who is rather, er, uh, compact himself has struck a blow against "sizeism" on behalf of every boy who has ever stuck cardboard in his shoes or hung by his heels at night in his bedroom.

Short people have an uphill battle in a society that values Big Macs, big cars (or used to) and tall, dark and handsome men, said Jerome Brodrie in a special lecture to the American Psychiatric Association called "Growing Up Short."

Even Jimmy Carter had to watch out for sizeism, making sure he stayed away from tall people and monumental backgrounds during his campaign, according to Brodrie. (A little-known fact: the taller of the candidates has won every presidential election since 1900, except two.)

Boys have it the worst, since their self-esteem is more dependent on being of at least average height as they're growing up. Brodrie said research on how short stature affects self-esteem has been neglected, although it doesn't take a great deal of study to apprehend that some short people work like crazy to compensate and others turn angry, withdrawn and uncompetitive.

At 5-foot-7 Brodrie knows whereof he speaks, and besides that, has conducted some informal surveys.

Of 41 short but successful people, he said, 36 had worried about their height in early life; 32 felt they had been driven to succeed in compensation for being markedly short (under 5-foot-7 for men, under 5-foot-1 for women).

With this theory in mind, a reporter went right to the top for confirmation: Dr. Daniel X. Freedman, renowned psychiatrist and president-elect of the APA.

Dr. Freedman was non-committal. "Very interesting," he said with a wide grin. Dr. Freedman is 5-foot-3.

Brodrie cited a number of studies to illustrate his accusations of sizeism: Researchers found that 100 graduates of the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Business received starting salaries that rose in correspondence to their height. That is, those under 6 feet averaged \$701 per month; 6 feet even, \$719 per month; 6-foot-1, \$723 per month; and 6-foot-2 or over, \$788 per month (this was 13 years ago).

development or shortness. The girls, though, tended to be more objective when asked to compare their height with that of their peers.

He said deviations from normal growth rates during the teens can cause failure to work up to capacity, non-participation in sports, and feelings of inadequacy, hostility and isolation.

Short boys have a far more limited field of potential girlfriends, and if you think women's liberation has changed this, Brodrie has a study on this point as well.

Twenty years ago, a survey of what each sex thought constituted an ideal mate included the requirement that the man be taller, by several inches. Thinking that young women today would be less concerned with having a "dominant" — i.e. taller — man, he surveyed a college class entitled "Psychology of Women."

Blind woman uses Braille to read stories to kids

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) — Virginia Baker is blind. She's also a favorite "reader" among the day-care preschoolers at the Downtown YMCA's Prime Time Center.

Accompanied by her guide dog, Mugsy, and using the Braille method to read, Mrs. Baker entertains the children every Thursday morning.

"I love to read. I love children, too," she said. "I get magazines especially for this. If there's anything I think they can't understand, I explain it to them."

Mrs. Baker, 65, began going to the Prime Time Center in 1979. She had been a widow for 2½ years since her husband DeWayne died.

And she was lonely.

"I just lost interest in living after he was gone," Mrs. Baker said. "I would just cry. Even two years after he was gone, I'd come upon something of his and I'd just start crying."

Several months after venturing to the Prime Time Center, Mrs. Baker suggested that the children and the elderly in separate programs could benefit from a story time together.

Being with children has helped ease the emptiness she sometimes felt from not having children of her own, she said.

The toddlers also remind her of her last memory of the sighted world, when she was 2 years old. "My mother had gone up to the attic for something. I toddled up, too, as children do," Mrs. Baker said. "Then someone came to the door. She hurried down and I hurried down after her and went crashing down the stairs."

The fall damaged her optic nerves and her sight deteriorated.

"I could see light until I was about 22, then it went, too," she said.

Mrs. Baker said she tried to help the story-time children understand about blindness.

They are fascinated by her guide dog and by the way Mrs. Baker reads with her fingers, sorting out the Braille dots.

"I told them when I first started out that I read altogether differently than their mummies read because I can't see to read," she said. "I tell them being blind is like being in a room with the light on — and your mother turns the light off and it's completely dark."

HINTS FROM HELOISE

Furniture cleaning suggestions

DEAR HELOISE: I use a cloth and warm water to dust my furniture, vinegar and warm water to wipe off my wood kitchen cabinets. My husband feels I am dulling the furniture and cabinets by using water on them.

However, I do not like a build-up of wax and I do not like to dry-dust because I feel this just spreads the dust around and is not picked up.

I very much would like an answer to this question and would appreciate any help you can offer in this matter. — Wondering

Although washing wood furniture and cabinets with warm soapy water occasionally, followed by a thorough drying and then waxing, is recommended by furniture and cabinet makers, excessive use of water is not.

The use of a mild solution of water and plain vinegar is also recommended to wipe smudges off cabinets, but also should be followed with a coating of wax.

If you don't like to use wax polish often or each time you dust, try spraying your cloth with a dust magnet.

These do a super job of picking up dust with no dulling film left behind. — Hugs, Heloise

Decorate for better sound in home media room

One result of the current proliferation of home electronics equipment is that for some people the concept of a home entertainment center is no longer merely academic.

Some families already own large-screen projection TV sets, videocassette players and a library of TV games as well as stereo equipment for listening to and recording music.

These people have the basics of a home entertainment center. It remains only for them to organize their listening and watching environment for greatest convenience and enhancement of their equipment.

According to one components manufacturer, the living room is usually the place where the equipment is used. Decorating decisions made there can serve either to enhance or to detract from the sound and viewing quality of the room.

The basic requirements for a good listening room are two, according to Del Eilers, audio technical service manager for 3M Co.

First of all, you have to make sure that the parallel surfaces contrast hard and soft materials. And second, it is important to break up the boxiness of the typical square-ish room with a variety of surfaces off which the sound can bounce.

The soft surfaces will absorb the sound, while the hard surfaces will cause it to reverberate into the room. So a combination of these surfaces at various angles will create the richest sound.

The ceiling and the floor present the most obvious example of the principle. By carpeting the floor and leaving the ceiling bare, you have made a decorating decision that conforms to good acoustical practices.

To provide soft surfaces on two of the remaining four walls, draperies, textured wall coverings and fabric-covered walls are possible choices. It is not necessary to cover the entire wall surface. Approximately 75 percent to 80 percent coverage is adequate, said Eilers.

Today's popular diagonal room arrangements

can contribute to good listening since a bulky mass set on the diagonal breaks up the parallel surfaces. The three-panel screen is another decorating device that can improve the sound in your room. A screen placed on the diagonal in one corner of the room provides a new surface for the sound to bounce off.

In general, highly textured materials such as tweed and linen are better for acoustics than smooth, slick materials such as vinyl and silk. On the other hand, don't opt for a totally fabric-swathed room. This leads to a condition of sound deadening in which all the sound is "swallowed" by the furnishings, said Eiler.

Good acoustics enhance all activities in a room, including television viewing. But if you're thinking of installing a large, projection TV set, you will need an area of at least 9 feet by 12 feet, according to Tom DeVesto, Kloss Video Corp., a manufacturer of projection television sets.

The receiver should be installed at least nine feet from the screen and

viewers should be seated at least 10 to 12 feet away from the huge, movie-size screen, he said.

Requirements include carpeting or an area rug in front of the screen to absorb light reflections in the room that might otherwise reduce picture brightness.

To minimize the decorative distraction of a large, blank 6-foot television screen in the room, mount the screen in a bookcase wall behind shutters, blinds or curtains, suggested DeVesto.

Home entertainment centers should be furnished for comfort, so opt for easy-care fabrics and sturdy furniture that can be rearranged. Planning ample storage room for records, cassette tapes and other accessories should be simple if a wall storage system is used. The storage systems on the market today provide many options and usually can be designed to accommodate any sort of equipment on the market.

Adequate ventilation at the rear and some method of distributing the wires and of access for inevitable repair are factors to consider when choosing wall system components.

Today's electronics equipment is proliferating so that it seems as if it would soon outrun the

space available to store it. But one manufacturer noted that help is on the way.

Electronics equipment is getting smaller. Improved electronic chips which can store huge amounts of information and perform more tasks are making it possible to reduce the size of individual components, said Harry Horning, director of training for Bang & Olufsen, producer of stereo components.

A single high-fidelity stereo unit that fits in a small space makes a fine FM receiver, a turntable and a cassette deck on one chassis that measures only 28 inches by 3 1/2 inches, he said. In the past, it would have been necessary to mount each part separately and take almost three times the space used in the compact unit.

According to Horning, the development of thin screen technology will eventually make it possible to combine projection capacity into the thin-screen television set, thus eliminating the requirement for a separate projector with large-screen TV sets.

Television discs that are now 12 inches in diameter may be reduced to 4 inches. And someday, you may be able to listen to all nine of Beethoven's symphonies on a tiny, cube-shaped record.

Beware of spinal cord injuries

NEW YORK (AP) — For some teen-agers and young adults, the summer of 1981 could be their last as healthy, active individuals, warns a physician at New York University Medical Center's Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine.

The incidence of spinal-cord injuries, which claims its highest number of victims in the 15 to 22 age bracket, rises dramatically in the summer, says Dr. Kristjan Ragnarsson, who is project director of the New York regional spinal-cord injury center.

Once the spinal cord is injured, the patient becomes paralyzed and is probably doomed to a lifetime in a wheelchair, he points out.

"Each year we see some 80 to 100 new spinal-cord injury patients," says Ragnarsson. "The sad part is that these healthy, active persons need never have been injured. Spinal-cord injury is entirely preventable." Diving accidents produce a higher percentage of quadriplegia than any

other injury, he notes. Yet other forms of summer sports — surfing, roller-skating, bicycling, rock climbing, motorcycling or even riding in a car — can result in irreversible spinal-cord damage.

Ragnarsson offers the following suggestions on how to avoid spinal cord injury:

—Know the depth of any water before diving in. Be wary of ponds or lakes that may have submerged rocks.

—Familiarize yourself with the ocean tide schedule. Remember that sand bars can shift location.

—When climbing, wear proper safety equipment for protection if you fall.

—When engaging in a sport, know the rules, wear proper safety equipment and be aware of your own limitations.

—Always wear a safety belt when driving.

—Don't drink before driving or participating in sports.

# 'Amadeus' and '42nd Street' chosen best play, musical

NEW YORK (AP) — A storybook show business fable and the haunting tale of a man obsessed with another's talent grabbed Broadway's highest honors at the 35th Tony Awards presentation.

"42nd Street" was named best musical and "Amadeus" was chosen best play of the season during the nationally televised awards ceremony Sunday night. "The Pirates of Penzance," a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta, won a Tony for best revival.

Of three actresses better known for movies or rock singing, Lauren Bacall won an award and Elizabeth Taylor and Linda Ronstadt didn't.

Miss Bacall won as best actress in a musical, playing a TV newswoman in "Woman of the Year."

Miss Ronstadt is the ingenue in "The Pirates of Penzance." Miss Taylor, who presented the Tony for best musical, said during the evening's last awards presentation that appearing on Broadway for the first time in "The Little Foxes" is "the most exciting experience of my life." She added, "This isn't an acceptance speech," and giggled. She giggled again about mispronouncing some of the names of producers of nominated musicals.

"Amadeus" was the night's big winner. Peter Hall won for directing it, Ian McKellen for playing court composer Salieri, and John Bury for designing sets and lighting. Author Peter Shaffer said, later in the evening, "The play is

about a man's great, obsessive desire to be an artist — a composer. I mean Salieri; Mozart was an artist. It's to Mozart I bow my head tonight. I've been privileged to be able to celebrate in a play something that cannot pass away, the wonder and consolation of Mozart's music."

Shaffer said he got the idea for the play from the rumor that Mozart, on his deathbed, accused Salieri of poisoning him. Winning the Tony, Shaffer said, "is enormously encouraging. I just want to get back to a desk and start another play."

Kevin Kline, swashbuckling as the pirate king in "The Pirates of Penzance," won the Tony for best actor in a musical. The show's director, Wilford Leach, also won a Tony.

Jane Lapotaire, making her Broadway debut in "Piaf," portraying the late French singer Edith Piaf, won a Tony as best actress in a play. She said "Piaf" started in a theater in England which "seats 120 people in plastic chairs." Brian Backer, youngest winner this year, at 24, also making his Broadway debut, won a supporting actor Tony for what is considered "the Woody Allen part" in that writer's "The Floating Light Bulb."

Swoosie Kurtz won the supporting actress Tony for her role as a would-be recording star in "Fifth of July." Musical supporting actress and actor awards went to dancer Hinton Battle in "Duke Ellington's Sophisticated Ladies" and Marilyn Cooper, a frumpy housewife in "Woman

of the Year." That musical also was named as having best book, by Peter Stone, and best score, by John Kander and Fred Ebb.

Gower Champion, who died the day "42nd Street" opened last August, was named best choreographer by the 618 members of the Broadway theater community eligible to vote for Tonys. Gregg Champion, his brother Blake with him, accepted their father's Tony.

"42nd Street," based on the movie classic, is about an aspiring actress who is elevated from understudy to stardom when the show's leading lady breaks a leg.

Willa Kim won a Tony for costumes, evocative of Cotton Club shows, for "Duke Ellington's Sophisticated Ladies."

A special Tony went to Lena Horne, now performing a one-woman show on Broadway, "Lena Horne: The Lady and Her Music." Smiling radiantly, she said, "I'm just so happy I'm getting all these flowers while I've still got my teeth." Another special Tony, for the Trinity Square Repertory Company, was accepted by director Adrian Hall. He said they began 17 years ago, thinking a permanent ensemble presenting plays might be possible, based in Providence, R.I., and touring.

The Tony Awards are presented by the League of New York Theaters and Producers. They are named for the late Antoinette Perry, who was chairman of the American Theater Wing during World War II.

## Fans pick favorite country music singers

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Country music fans get their chance to pick their favorite singers tonight in the 15th annual Music City News Cover Awards.

The show will be syndicated live to most of the country's television markets from the Grand Ole Opry House from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. CDT. These awards are the only country music awards voted by fans.

Winners in the 14 categories are picked in two rounds of voting by readers of the Music City News, a Nashville-based monthly music publication.

Marty Robbins, who has resumed his career after suffering a heart attack earlier this year, has led the balloting so far by reaching finalist standing in seven of the 14 categories.

He is a finalist for male artist of the year, musician of the year, top comedy act, best album of the year for "With Love" and best single record for "An Occasional Rose." The Marty Robbins trio is a finalist for vocal group of the year and the Marty Robbins band is a finalist for band of the year.

Other finalists for top male vocalists are George Jones, Eddie Rabbit, Conway Twitty and Don Williams. Up for female vocalist of the year are Emmylou Harris, Loretta Lynn, Barbara Mandrell, Anne Murray and Dolly Parton.

## HBO to air history of radio

NEW YORK (AP) — "We did 'Dracula,' and it seemed to me that during 'Dracula,' I had high hopes that people would react as they do in a movie of that kind," a troubled Orson Welles said not long after CBS' "Mercury Theater of the Air" triggered mass panic with a show called "War of the Worlds."

"And I don't know that they did," Welles told reporters. "So I had given up. ... You have no idea how many people are listening, or what they're thinking."

"War of the Worlds," based H.G. Wells' science fiction classic, was broadcast Oct. 30, 1938. In the program, the actor had simulated a radio newscaster reporting an invasion from outer space.

The broadcast demonstrated, more clearly than any other previous program, the reach and impact of radio.

"People ran into the streets and armed themselves against the invading Martians that millions believed were actually here," Dick Cavett recalls in a segment from "On the Air," a Home Box Office presentation on the history of radio in America.

The program, the second in an HBO series called "Remember When," will be offered subscribers of the pay-cable network five times in June, beginning tonight.

"Since its very beginning," says Cavett, host of public TV's continuing "Dick Cavett Show," "radio had been filling the theater of our minds with word-pictures of real-life disaster. We knew they were real — and when Welles presented his invasion from Mars in newscast format, we believed that, too."

Welles, Guglielmo Marconi, David Sarnoff, Dr.

Frank Conrad, William S. Paley — they're among the stars of this hour-long tour through 80 years of American broadcast history.

Assembling film for the "On the Air" production was a mammoth task that fell to Nancy Kapitannoff, senior researcher for Bruce Cohn Productions and the "Remember When" series.

"In the earliest days," she says, "everyone was excited about the new medium, and everyone wanted to take moving pictures of radio people at work. It didn't take them long to lose that kind of interest, and that's where our problems began."

Ms. Kapitannoff and her staff went to all of the conventional sources — the National Archives, the Library of Congress, the New York Public Library — and in many cases, located material that they could use. A good deal of film came from the old newsreel companies — Fox-Movietone, Paramount, Pathe — she says, as well as from the broadcast pioneers — radio station KDKA in Pittsburgh, NBC, CBS, and private collectors.

Often, however, the pursuit of film led the researchers through some curious twists and turns.

The "unsinkable" Titanic played a significant role in broadcast history, for instance. Young Sarnoff — who would create the communications empire called RCA — was the operator on duty for the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co. the night the distress call came from the sinking liner.

# Cameras capture magic moments

Going away for a vacation? Even though the main reason for the trip is probably a well-deserved rest, if you intend to take your camera with you, here are a few things you might want to think about.

First of all, keep your camera handy from the beginning of the trip to the very end. While there are certain to be very exciting shots at your final destination, you're also very likely to see some pretty interesting sights going to and from that destination.

Vacations don't usually come as a surprise, so if you haven't done any picture taking for awhile, dust off your equipment and shoot at least one roll of film before you go. A look at the results will quickly tell you if all the camera's mechanical and electronic components are doing precisely what they're supposed to be doing.

If your camera or light meter uses batteries (and most do these days), consider installing new ones before you leave home.

While you're on location, you probably have some idea what you're going to be doing. Choose your film accordingly. If old building interiors and dingy side streets are on your itinerary, a fast film (probably 400 ASA) would be in order. If beaches, boating or other wide open spaces are on the agenda, then a slower film (ASA 64 or ASA 100) would be appropriate.

Remember in the beginning of this column I urged you to use your camera all through the trip - well, each time you go somewhere there is always a beginning and an ending. As you re-live the trip or attempt to share the experience with someone else, it's especially nice to be able to remember the entire trip. Everything just seems to fit together better when the story is complete.

Maybe you're the kind who is uncertain about where to look for photographable subjects. When you get to your destination,

look for a souvenir stand - they surely will have several racks of picture postcards taken in the same place you're visiting. Someone has already done much of the research for you.

People are always an important part of travel pictures, and whenever you can, they should be included in your photographs. Not the stiff, formal "watch the birdy" type of shot, but relaxed, unposed people doing everyday things.

There are, however, times when you'll come face to face with a person who, for some reason, doesn't care to be in one of your pictures. The reason could be religious or it could be personal - in any event, I would strongly recommend you comply with their wishes. Remember, you're a guest in a strange country with local customs and taboos.

Travel is most enjoyable when you plan carefully and have a mission. It doesn't really matter too much what the mission is - exploring old churches, tasting wines, locating antiques, sampling native cheese or visiting historical sites.

## Getty presents grant to Texas Tech

Lubbock — A \$25,000 grant from Getty Oil Co. was presented to the Texas Tech University College of Engineering recently to purchase laboratory equipment for the Petroleum Engineering Department.

Petroleum Engineering Department Chairman James T. Smith accepted the check from Getty representatives Don R. Greenwalt of Tulsa and Raymond W. Blohm and Joe E. King, both of Midland. Engineering Dean John R. Bradford also attended the presentation.

The College of Engineering is conducting a \$1.5 million fund-raising drive to equip a \$4 million expansion of Texas Tech petroleum engineering drive. Construction on the new building will begin in the fall.

The Getty contribution brings to more than \$350,000 the amount collected in the Texas Tech petroleum engineering fund drive. Smith said dramatic increases in petroleum engineering enrollments have strained Texas Tech's existing facilities. This past fall the department

had 434 majors, compared to only 55 majors in the fall of 1970. When completed, the expanded petroleum engineering facilities will provide 61,350 square feet of additional space for classrooms, teaching laboratories, research facilities and faculty offices.

Texas Tech has the only accredited petroleum engineering department in the Permian Basin region, one of the nation's major producers of oil and gas. "The gift from Getty Oil will be used for equipment in the under-

graduate laboratory of our new facilities," Smith said. "Through the cooperation of Getty Oil and others in the petroleum industry we will be able to upgrade our facilities and better serve the industry through our petroleum engineering graduates."

Greenwalt is engineering manager, production department, of Getty's central exploration and production division. Blohm is Midland district production manager for the central exploration and production division. King is Midland district engineer for Getty.

## DOE grants to develop alternative fuel sources favor large corporations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Department grants to develop alternative fuel sources have been biased in favor of large corporations, with more than one-third of available money funneled to companies with assets of more than \$5 billion, the General Accounting Office charged today.

In contrast, the GAO said, only 15 percent of the energy money went to small firms. The congressional accounting agency said the department's selection process was consciously weighted against small businesses.

The GAO study was released today by Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton, D-Mo., who said he was shocked by the favoritism shown for big business.

"It amounts to nothing less than a backdoor rebate of the windfall profits tax," Eagleton said. The windfall tax was imposed on the extra revenues taken in by oil companies after decontrol of oil prices.

Eagleton conceded that large companies would have to be relied upon to develop alternatives to oil and natural gas, but he added, "These are the companies least in need of a federal handout to get the job done."

"That's what we are paying those high gasoline and oil prices for," he said. "The companies said they need those huge profits so that they can invest in new energy sources. They didn't say anything about Uncle Sam being their banker."

Energy Department officials could not be reached for comment over the weekend.

The GAO studied Energy Department grants last year totaling \$298.1 million that were intended to develop alternative fuels other than alcohol. Of the total, the agency said, 82 per-

cent — \$243.6 million — went to large corporations. Only 15 percent — \$44.4 million — went to small corporations, defined as independently owned and operated and qualifying under Small Business Administration criteria.

The other 3 percent, or \$10 million, went to other entities, including Indian tribes, governmental bodies and international ventures.

Of the total, the GAO said, \$120.1 million went to corporations with assets of more than \$5 billion and \$73.5 million went to corporations with assets between \$1 billion and \$5 billion.

Over half the federal grants were given to corporations on the Fortune 500 list of the largest U.S. industrial firms, the GAO said.

The agency said the Energy Department was biased in favor of big business both in the selection process and in the views of department evaluators.

The selection process was based entirely on written proposals, the GAO said, with outside discussions and visits to proposed project sites forbidden.

"Large corporations, who are more likely to have considerable proposal-writing resources and experience to draw upon, had an advantage over small business proposers," the GAO said. "In addition, according to several small business proposers we spoke with, the cost of preparing a highly detailed proposal, as was required on this competition, can be burdensome to small businesses with limited resources."

The agency said department evaluators frankly admitted their bias for large corporations, arguing that those companies were more likely to be successful in developing a commercially successful fuels plant.

The well is producing 7,700,000 cubic feet of .604 gravity gas through 2.250 choke from Devonian perforations at 18,559 to 18,710 feet which had been acidized with 50,000 gallons.

Drilled to a total depth of 22,293 feet with 5 1/2 inch casing at 21,875 feet, it was plugged back to 18,900 feet.

## Contract approved because wives nagged UMW members, miner says

**CABIN CREEK, W.Va. (AP)** — About an hour before today's shift began at Cedar Coal Co., Ernest Rose and his father arrived at work together — the first time since the United Mine Workers strike started eight weeks ago.

Rose, a 32-year-old East Bank coal miner, was headed back to his job as an electrician at the Kanawha County mine. His father, Ford Rose, 56, a maintenance foreman, worked during the union strike that began March 27.

The rank and file overwhelmingly approved a new contract Saturday with the Bituminous Coal Operators Association and many mines reopened with the "hoot owl" shift at 12:01 this morning.

"I don't like it, but I got to go with it," the younger Rose said, referring to the newly approved accord. "There's not enough money for them."

He said many miners shared his views but "went ahead and voted for it anyways because they wanted to

get back to work." "Because their wives is nagging them. I know mine nagged me," Rose said.

His father, saying, "I'm company," declined to comment on the specifics of the agreement.

"That contract has come a long ways since I worked in the mines," said the graying senior Rose, a miner for 38 years. "They've got a whole lot in it we didn't have."

His son said there weren't any management and labor quarrels at home about the contract. "He's got his job to do just like I got mine," he said.

Charles Perkins, a security guard at the mine, said about 90 men were expected for the early shift. A steady stream of cars and pickup trucks drove quickly through an opened gate to the mine.

"We had some pickets and some glass breaking during the strike, that was all," the guard said, waving to friends.

Ken Duff, 36, of Charleston, leaned against his car and said, "It's good to be back to work, I guess."

He said he expected it to be a "rough adjustment." "We've been out for two months," said Duff, who drives a coal truck. "It takes some getting familiar, a couple of days."

He tossed a lighted cigarette, smiled, and said, "I'm nervous. I'm always nervous. After dark, anything can go wrong." Changing the subject, Duff added, "I'll be glad to see my friends."

## Fertilizer trade with Soviet Union resumes

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Occidental Petroleum Corp. has shipped its first load of superphosphoric acid to the Soviet Union since President Reagan lifted a year-old trade embargo imposed following the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan.

The Oxy Trader, carrying 30,000 metric tons of the liquid fertilizer, left Jacksonville Saturday, company officials said.

Occidental has a \$20 billion deal to ship 500,000 tons of the liquid fertilizer to the Soviet Union by year's end.

The Oxy Trader is the first of three integrated catamaran-type tug-and-barge vessels specially built to carry superphosphoric acid. The Oxy Provider will also carry the fertilizer to the Soviet Union, company officials said.

President Jimmy Carter banned trade with Moscow in January 1980 after the Soviets intervened in the south Asian nation.

# UMW miners return to work

With a new contract in hand, thousands of union miners resumed digging coal today, ending a 72-day strike that halted the nation's coal production.

"The men are anxious to get back. They want to get caught up on their bills," said Elwood Maples, a United Mine Workers official in Rainelle, W. Va. "They're glad it's all over."

"It went real well," said Russell Bennett, a worker at a Pittston Coal Co. mine in Meadow Bridge, W. Va., where miners returned to work at midnight. "They were kind of happy, just glad to be back at work."

There had been fears that mine construction workers, who are still on strike, would set up picket lines and prevent miners from returning to work. But UMW officials said widespread immediate picketing was unlikely and a settlement of the dispute might be near.

Mines in Eastern and Midwest coal states, where the UMW is strongest, resumed operations at midnight after union and company safety crews conducted inspections. Many UMW locals offered their members refresher courses in safety at meetings before the start of the "hootow!" shift.

"We have cautioned them to be very careful," Maples said. "It's been some time since they've been in the mines and we cautioned them to look out for themselves and their miners."

UMW safety officers warned last week that mine accident rates traditionally rise after a strike.

"We've been out for two months. It takes some getting familiar, a couple of days," said Ken Duff, who returned to work at a mine near Charleston, W. Va.

The UMW's 160,000 miners voted by a 2-1 margin Saturday to

accept a 40-month contract with the Bituminous Coal Operators Association that will give them a 38 percent hike in wages and benefits. That would raise pay to about \$111 a day by the end of the pact.

The pact retains a provision from earlier agreements that requires coal companies to pay royalties into the union benefit funds for every ton of non-union coal they process.

That provision was not included in an earlier contract proposal that was rejected by a 2-to-1 margin by the rank and file shortly after the walkout began. Miners feared that the union would be weakened if the royalties were dropped and mine operators were encouraged to use non-union coal.

UMW President Sam Church and BCOA President Joseph Brennan signed the new contract on Saturday night.

"About 70 percent of (miners) found it acceptable. I believe that may be the largest percentage ever," said Jack Perry, president of the Charleston-based UMW District 17, the union's largest, and a member of its union bargaining team.

The strike was far from the longest in UMW history. A strike in 1977-78 lasted 111 days.

UMW construction workers are seeking a new contract with the Association of Bituminous Contractors.

J.B. Trout, a construction workers leader in Kentucky, said, "I think they'll give them some time, a week or two weeks, to work out something on the (construction) contract without picketing out the miners."

Sheldon Dawson, president of a construction workers local in Illinois, said his members had agreed not to picket mines.

Dennis Saunders, president of UMW District 29 in southern West Virginia, said, "The last word I got from the (construction) negotiators was that they were real close to an agreement."

# Baby boom may be result of Allen

**BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP)** — Local hospitals say Hurricane Allen's full effect is being felt now — nine months after the storm's winds and rain left the area in the dark.

Hospital births records for the week of May 17 were the highest in five years during the same period.

The date was 41 weeks after the major storm lashed at the South Texas coast before losing power and coming ashore on the sparsely populated rangelands of the King Ranch.

A normal pregnancy term is 38 to 42 weeks.

"Just looking at it across the board, that would give some credence to a cause-and-effect relationship with the hurricane," said Dudley Stephens, obstetrics department supervisor at Brownsville Medical Center.

Stephens said hospital records showed a record high for deliveries during May 17-23 with 24 births.

City birth records for the period are incomplete. Brownsville

Medical Center reported 52 births in May and Valley Community Hospital had 82 that month, but only 81 are listed on municipal records.

Midwives deliver a high percentage of local births and those may not be recorded for several months.

"We may not be able to tell the full impact of the hurricane on births until the middle of June," Stephens said. "We would look for most births to occur in May, but there may be some carryover."

"Our busiest time was from May 15-27," said Richard Sanchez, head labor and delivery nurse at Valley Community Hospital.

Sanchez said some expectant mothers heard hospital staffers joking about the "hurricane babies."

"They didn't appreciate it. They thought they had better things to do during the hurricane. And they didn't want it said that's why their babies were born," he said.

# Vet talks break, eviction threat looms

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Veterans camped out at the Wadsworth Veterans Administration Hospital to protest the quality of health care prepared for the possibility of eviction after two discussion sessions with a VA attorney ended in impasse.

Robert Coy, the Veterans Administration's acting general counsel, said Sunday night that no decision has been made on whether to evict those camping on the hospital lawn and sitting inside the lobby.

But he said he told veterans representatives after a four-hour discussion session Sunday night. "The clock is ticking, and it's obvious that a decision has to be made" on removing them. Hospital doctors say patient care has suffered because of the protest, which began more than two weeks ago, Coy said.

Michael McCarthy, a spokesman for the protesters, reaffirmed the veterans' pledge to continue their non-violent protest until their demands are met or until they are forced off the property. McCarthy also said that since President Reagan has not agreed to meet with them, representatives will take their demands to Washington. No specific plans have been made yet for such a trip, he said.

McCarthy said if eviction does come, some of the protesters will leave on their own, and others will submit to arrest.

"I would beg them to leave peacefully," Coy said of the growing number of hunger strikers and their supporters, and the "Inside Six" who have staged a 17 day sit-in in the hospital lobby. No more meetings between him and veterans spokesmen are

planned he said.

"Talks cannot accomplish anything under the present confrontation format, where they (the veterans) are constantly changing leaders and changing around their suggestions," Coy said.

He said that major legislative action from Congress would be needed to meet the protesters' demands for research and examinations for veterans exposed to toxic herbicides in Vietnam, and for medical screening for 4.2 million Vietnam veterans. The response of the VA to one other demand was satisfactory to the veterans - that the VA investigate the Wadsworth and Brentwood VA medical facilities and policies, with attention to the case of veteran James Hopkins, who died of an apparent drug and alcohol overdose. His death precipitated the protest.

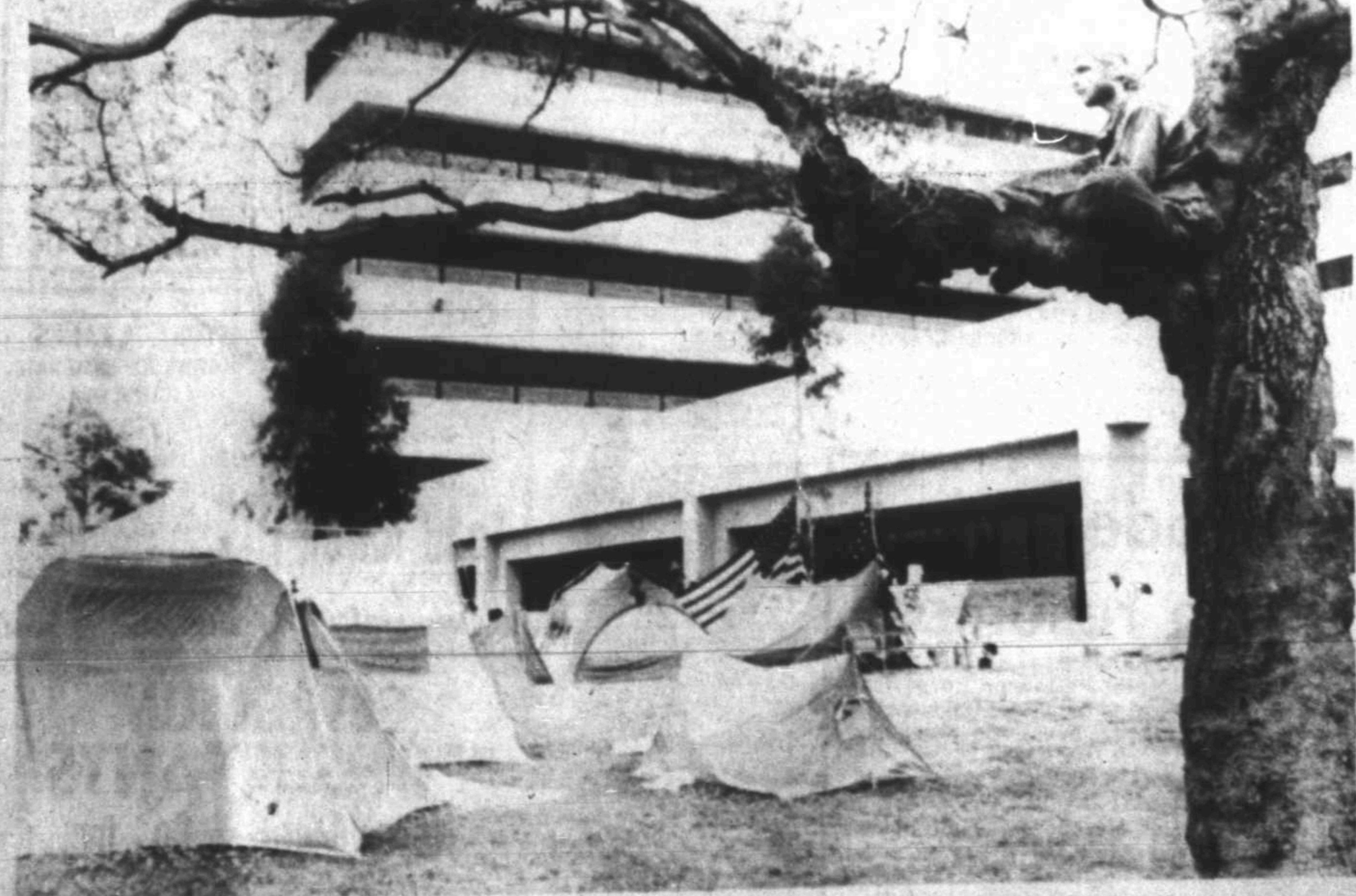
Coy had planned to leave Saturday night after talks proved unproductive, but he decided to stay when he heard a group of motorcyclists would drive in for a rally Sunday.

Biker Tony Dale said he had brought 100 riders Sunday, and would bring thousands more in the next few days.

"There are a lot of bikers who are veterans," Dale said. "We're trying to fight the same thing."

Coy later said he felt the presence of the bikers was "totally inappropriate" and was "obviously an escalation of what was a low-key, peaceful expression."

Also appearing at "Veterans Village" were actors Robert Walden and Jack Bannon of the "Lou Grant" television show.

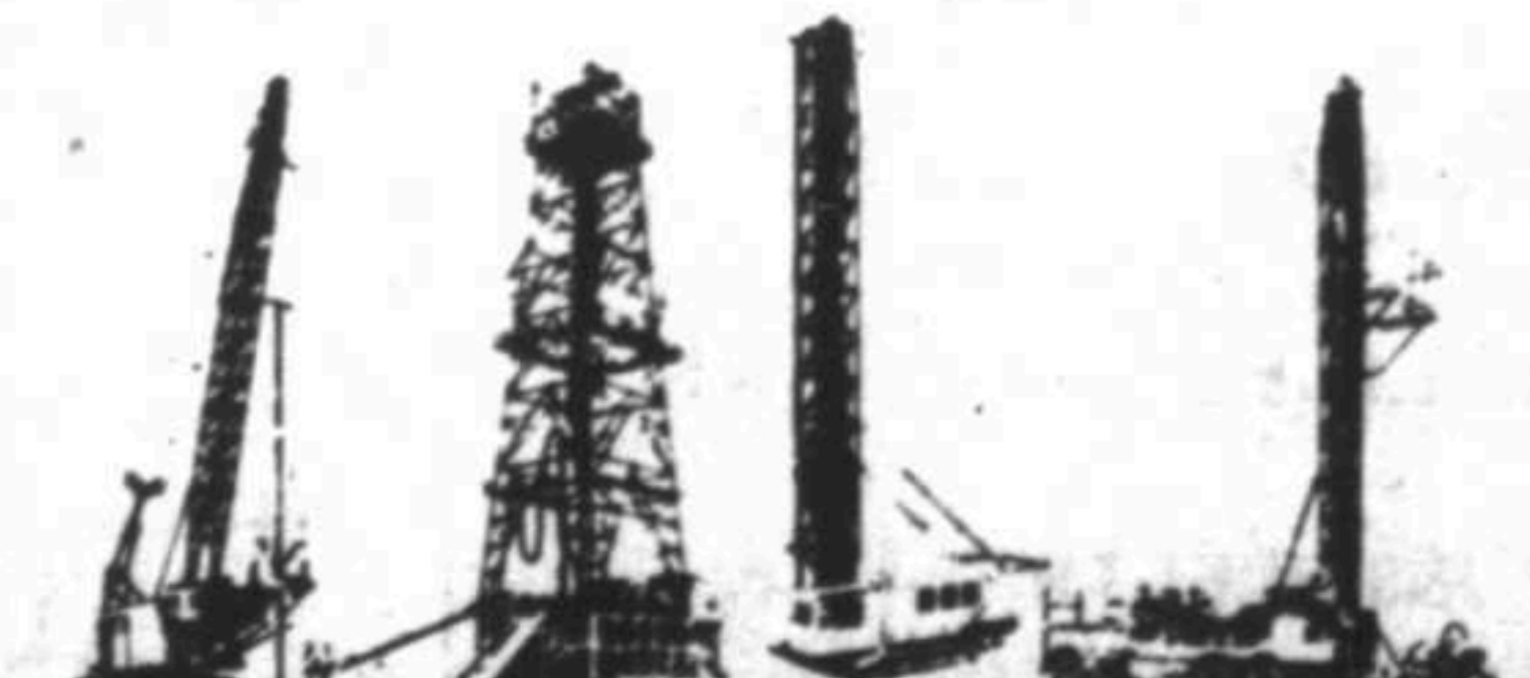

# Baseball dynasties? '60-70 Cubs among greatest

When the talk turns to great baseball dynasties, the 1927 Yankees not only come to mind, but the Yankees of that whole period from the '20s to the '40s to the mid-'50s. You not only think of the Gas House Gang of the Cardinals of the '30s but the great Cardinal teams they spawned thereafter. One thinks of the 1947 Jackie Robinson Dodgers or seigneur. You might say greatness feeds on itself. Witness the remarkable Oakland A's of the early '70s.

And, then, of course, was one of the greatest of them all — the Chicago Cubs of the late '60s and early '70s.

Stop banging yourself on the side of the head. You heard me. The Cubs were undoubtedly one of the greatest aggregations ever put together — certainly one of the greatest ever put asunder.

**WHAT DO you mean, you don't believe it?** Listen, have you ever heard of a better pitching staff than Ferguson Jenkins, Ken Holtzman, Joe Niekro, Steve Stone? And that's only for starters. You want to talk about relief? How about Bruce Sutter? Bill Hands? Phil Regan?

Do you know how many Cy Young Award winners we're talking about here? Three. Pretty good for one team for

one decade.

In the era we're dealing with, the Cubs' lineup could have presented Ernie Banks, 1B, Manny Trillo, 2B, Don Kessinger, SS, Bill Madlock, 3B. And the outfield? Well, how about Lou Brock in left? All-time major league base stealer, all-time leader for lifetime (938) or one season (118), one of only 15 guys to get 3,000 hits lifetime. A sure Hall of Famer. Could he play leftfield for you? Could he play leftfield for the 1927 Yankees?

In rightfield, you want Dave Kingman's 276 home runs for 10 years in the big leagues? Of course, you've got Billy Williams, too — 2,711 lifetime hits, 426 home runs. You got Greg Gross and Jose Cardenal and Johnny Callison around as "caddies." The catching is perfectly OK, Randy Hundley.

**WHAT HAPPENED** to this great team? How come we don't hear of it in the same breath with the Ruth Yankees, the Gas House Gang, the Oakland A's?

Well, the Cubs tried to improve upon it is what happened. First of all, they traded Lou Brock to the St. Louis Cardinals for a sore-armed pitcher, Ernie Broglio, who was to win seven games and lose 19 for them over the next three seasons. St. Louis, on the other hand, went on to

win three pennants with Brock.

The Cubs next turned their attention to Ken Holtzman who had only pitched two no-hit games for them and had won 74 games in six years. They shipped him off to Oakland where Holtzman proceeded to win 77 games and three world championships for them in four years.

Ferguson Jenkins, who had won 20 or more games six years in a row, the Cy Young Award, was dealt off to Texas as "all through." He only won 110 games in the new league where he still is.

Thus heartened by their heady successes in the open market, the Cubs took Bill Madlock, who had won two batting championships for them, and sent him off to San Francisco for Bobby Murcer and a player who is now playing for the Seibu Lions of the Japanese league and a pitcher named Andrew Muehlestock who nobody knows where he is. They traded Joe Niekro to San Diego for a pitcher named Dick Selma. They traded Manny Trillo to Philadelphia with outfielder Greg Gross and catcher Dave Rader for Jerry Martin, Barry Foote, Teddy Sizemore and two pitchers named Henry Mack, not to be confused with Connie, and Derek Botelho, not to be confused with anybody, much less a pitcher.

**THEY LOST** Steve Stone to free agency, but there is no record they put up much of a fight to save him although he had won 20 games in two years for them. They probably thought it was a case of, easy come, easy go. All they gave up for him in the first place was Ron Santo. All Stone did was win 25 games and the Cy Young Award for the Baltimore Orioles. They gave up Bruce Sutter for an outfielder, a third baseman, and a player-to-be-named-later to St. Louis. Bruce Sutter (pronounced "Sooter") is only the second relief pitcher in history to win the Cy Young Award and may be the best relief pitcher who ever lived. Plus, you don't even give up a cloak-and-sunder for a player-to-be-named-later.

The Cubs traded Ferguson Jenkins for Bill Madlock, but, since they ultimately traded Madlock for Bobby Murcer, whom they ultimately traded to the Yankees for a pitcher named Paul Semall, whoever he is, the books show they lost F. Jenkins, for one P. Semall.

Connie Mack used to break up the old Philadelphia Athletics because he needed the money. The Cubs do it just out of the goodness of their hearts. They probably should be carried on the books as a kind of complicated league charity, and their profits should be tax-exempt. If there are any, that is.

# Cubs take 2 from Dodgers

It felt so good the first time, the Cubs did it again, sweeping a doubleheader from the overbearing San Antonio Dodgers 12-11, in eight innings, and 12-5 at Cubs Stadium Sunday night. That ties the series 3-3 and sets up a rubber game at 7:30 p.m. tonight with the Texas League West leaders.

Manager George Enright, who is now 3-2 as Midland manager, will send lefty Craig Lefferts, 5-6, against the Dodgers' Rusty McDonald, 1-1, in the concluding game of the home series.

Midland unloaded an unseemly six-home run barrage with Carmello Martinez powering three off the premises while Mel Hall hit a pair and lefthander Mike Thompson came within one out of a shutout in his Cub debut in the second game.

**BUT IT** was a long night and seemed to be headed for an eternity despite the presence of the San Diego Chicken to liven up proceedings. The Cubs had lost a double dip Saturday night and appeared on the way to another night of indignities at the hands of the Dodgers, who led 9-4 going into the home sixth. And the way the Cubs have hit Dodger pitching this year, it looked like 90-4.

However, in the face of adversity, the Cubs may have taken heart from the Chicken, who showed up without his usual \$5,000 worth of props when the airlines failed to load them on a Denver stopover on the trip from Spokane.

The fans in the stands probably

never noticed. Ted Giannoulis was as impertinent and impossible as ever, at one point so besmitten by Pam Postema he wrestled the lady umpire to the turf in a mad fit of passion. It was all in good fun, however, Ted's fun.

**BUT BACK** to the wild wind up in the first game as the Cubs routed starter Mike Glinastis with four runs in the sixth. Martinez' three-run homer was the big blow which inched the Cubs to a 10-8 deficit going into the home seventh.

Drama, it was dripping all over the place. Jeff Burton's infield hit, Jack Upton's single and Fritz Connally's sacrifice put the tying run on second. Randy LaVigne then lined back to the box and Orel Hershiser scrambled after the shot to tag LaVigne and hold the runners. With two out, J.W. Mitchell, who has wondered most of the season where his next hit was coming from, delivered when it was needed most, bouncing a single through the right side for two runs. Dave Sax fell down trying to field the ball and it rolled to the fence. Mitchell could have won it right there, but tripped heading over first and had to be satisfied with third on the error.

San Antonio scored in the eighth on singles by Ross Jones, Steve Sax and Tom Beyers. But the Cubs had tasted blood and weren't about to be denied. Mike Shepston walked and with one out Hall singled to left. After Burton grounded into a force, Upton walked and Connally dumped the game-winning two-run single into center.

**AS IT** turned out the Cubs were to score in nine of the night's last 10 innings and make Thompson's chore easy in the nightcap. A couple of walks and Martinez' run-scoring single gave the southpaw who reported this week from Hagerstown, Carolina League, a 1-0 lead. Burton doubled and scored on an error for a 2-0 lead in the second and a four-run third made it look easy.

The Cubs unloaded three homers, Hall and Martinez hitting back-to-back one out homers and then, after a Connally single, LaVigne put one over the scoreboard to finish off starter Butch Wickenschmeier, 2-2.

In the fifth, LaVigne double home two more runs and Mitchell singled Randy across the plate. In the sixth, Martinez hit his third homer of the night with two out after Mike Diaz had doubled to lead off and Upton doubled and eventually scored on a passed ball to give the kid from Teaneck, N.J., a 12-0 lead.

four innings, got credit for the victory. Ron Reed pitched the final three innings to earn his fourth save.

Gaylord Perry, 5-4, seeking 295th career victory, was the loser.

**ELSEWHERE** in the National League, Dusty Baker slugged a two-run homer and a double to back the six-hit pitching of Bob Welch as the Los Angeles Dodgers snapped a four-game losing streak with a 7-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Gene Richards crashed a three-run homer and drove in another run with a single as the San Diego Padres downed the St. Louis Cardinals 5-1 behind Chris Welsh's eight-hitter.

Right-hander Bruce Berenyi tossed a one-hitter and allowed just two base runners in pitching the Cincinnati Reds to a 2-0 victory over the Montreal Expos.

Bill Madlock cracked a solo home run in the sixth inning to lift the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-2 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

Mike Scott and Neil Allen combined on a six-hitter and Scott knocked in a run with a seventh-inning sacrifice fly as the New York Mets beat the Houston Astros 3-1 and handed Bob Knepper his first defeat of the season after five victories.

**IN THE American League**, three Yankee pitchers combined on a six-hitter and Aurelio Rodriguez drew a bases-loaded walk in the fourth inning

to snap a 1-1 tie as New York edged the Chicago White Sox 3-1 and posted their seventh straight victory.

Milt Wilcox fired a five-hitter and Tom Brookens had a pair of hits and scored the first run in Detroit's three-run seventh inning as the Tigers defeated the Minnesota Twins 3-0.
