Public Housing Approved

Contractor To Be Here Next Week

Approval has been received on final plans and specifications dated November 17, 1972 for construction of low income housing for the elderly in Colorado City.

With this approval, Dennis Walding, Executive Director of the Housing Authority of Colorado City is authorized by the

Dept. of Housing and Urban Development to proceed with construction of 26 units which will include a community building.

According to Walding, the contractors when contacted, Tuesday, said they planned to start moving in equipment the first part of next week, so construction should start very soon.

Much time and effort has gone into this project and after working closely together, D.M. Merritt, chairman of the Board of Commissioners and Walding are proud to announce the approval.

The bid proposal for this government project was made June 6, 1972 and approval received on March 27, 1973.

The cost of construction will be \$415,900 and sites for the duplex units are scattered throughout the city.

"These sites were picked so that those living in the units would be able to walk to places of business, the Community Building will be a real asset to Colorado City and will be available for meetings and needs of the people of our city," stated Walding.

Belco Construction Company, Inc. will construct the project and the plans were drawn for

the projects by the firm of Fitch, Holdredge, Blisone, & Holcomb Architects of Houston.

The locations as pointed out by Walding will include the following:

On West 6th between Walnut and Oak - 4 Duplex units or 8 apartments.

On West 5th and Oak Street, The Community Building will be constructed.

On East 5th and Elm (north side of street) one duplex, (on south side), two duplex dwellings.

East 4th and Vine - Two duplexes.

On East 7th between Chestnut and Elm, 4 duplexes.

This includes:

Two Duplex units with four apartments will have zero bedrooms which actually is a living and bedroom combination

plan; 20 with one bedroom and two with 2 bedrooms.

Walding said there has been a great demand for this type housing and it has been impossible to meet the demand for the applications on hand. This will help relieve the local situation to a great extent.

Applications are made through the Housing Authority Office and the income limits for admission which are fixed by the Housing Authority are posted and available at the office.

Applicants must be 62 years of age or older; also disabled persons may apply.

Also members of the Housing Board of Commissioners are, R.B. Baker, vice chairman; L. L. Thomas, Commissioner; Wayne Griffin, Commissioner; and Sefton Pickens, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce of Colorado City.

J.A. Sadler, Jr., City Manager presented a letter to the Council which he had written to the Texas Department of Community Affairs listing the inventory of the needs for the Colorado City to comply with the standards set by the Texas Traffic Safety Plan, 1972-77.

The inventory includes stop signs which will cost an estimated \$9,609.95. This is for materials only.

Sadler stated that a 100 percent Federal Grant for this equipment is being requested.

Earlier this month, Mrs. Shamburger asked Mitchell County commissioners to assume operation of CAP but her request was denied.

The council went into executive session following the awarding of bids for a budget study.

\$18,379.47 Sales Tax Record Sales Tax Check Received

Colorado City has received its largest sales tax check since voters voted decision to pay the penny tax in 1970.

Tuesday, the city received a check for \$18,379.47, for the October through December 1972 quarter, more than \$2,000 more than was received for the previous high amount of \$16,197.17 which was received for the first quarter of 1971, the first period for which the tax was in effect.

The sales tax revenues is one of the best total indicators of the local economy. Along with bank deposits, which soared to all-time highs late in 1972, sales tax revenues reveal the economic situation of a community.

And judging from both these indicators, Colorado City has an extremely healthy economy.

Local leaders had predicted

that sales tax revenues would be good during the final quarter of the year, but the \$18,000 plus received - was beyond anyone's expectations.

The \$18,379.47 for the final quarter of 1972 compared to \$15,523.97 received for the final quarter of 1971.

Reasons for the increase in the sales tax included record sales by Colorado City merchants as well as a jump in sales by local car dealers.

Record sales have been attributed, in part, to the all-time high agriculture income of some \$11 million for 1972. Part of that record crop income was a bumper cotton crop.

The sales tax is expected to continue to climb as compared to previous years and quarters during the January through

March quarter as several new businesses have opened here and existing merchants have continued to have good sales.

Business during the first part of 1972 was slow with only \$14,913.39 collected during the first quarter of 1972 compared to \$14,617.05 for the first quarter.

During the third quarter, sales tax showed a healthy gain with \$15,608.74 being received which was more than \$1,200 higher than had been received

CAP May Get More Money

The Mitchell County Community Action Program (CAP) will find out tonight (Thursday) if it will receive additional funding to prolong any activities past its scheduled closedown date of April 30.

The Taylor County CAP, the parent agency for the local organization, received notice Tuesday that it would receive a \$205,861 grant to operate its agency for six months after the scheduled closedown date.

President Nixon has disassembled the Office of Economic Opportunity, the parent organization of CAP, in a move to save money.

The grant received by the Taylor CAP was to enable the office in Abilene to continue operating for six months so that it could be shut down properly.

The directors of the Taylor CAP are to meet tonight to make decision on the use of the new grant.

Mrs. Bob (Jon) Shamburger, executive director of the Mitchell County CAP said she hopes that the local organization will receive from the Taylor CAP funds to operate at least another month.

Earlier this month, Mrs. Shamburger asked Mitchell County commissioners to assume operation of CAP but her request was denied.

Mrs. Reed Speaks To Maranatha Club On Christian Life-Style

The Maranatha Study Club met in the Reddy Room of the Texas Electric Company recently with Mrs. R.M. Reed, president, presiding.

During the business session new officers were elected. They are: president, Mrs. John Henry; vice president, Mrs. Margaret Bullock; secretary, Mrs. Woodrow Crabtree; treasurer, Mrs. W.A. Helm; historian-reporter, Mrs. Wilfred Fox; and parliamentarian, Mrs. R.M. Reed.

Miss Nancy Easley and Nancy Henderson, visitors from Big Spring, spoke to the group about the new RSVP volunteer program for retired persons.

The group was told that the program was a volunteer program for retired citizens who had time to help out in different places in town such as the Mitchell County Public Library, the Root Valley Fair Lodge, the Claxton Nursing Home and the Mental Health Clinic.

The program topic was "Would Jesus Drive A Cadillac?" presented by Mrs. Reed in the absence of Mrs. Elmer Martin.

"Two men were talking - one asked the other, 'would Jesus drive a Cadillac?'" she began.

"He was trying to ease his puritan conscience prior to purchasing a Cadillac for himself. 'The other man replied that he wasn't sure Jesus would drive a Cadillac, but that he sure would if he could afford it."

"Is there an authentic Christian life-style and are there life-styles not permitted a Christian and where do we draw the line?"

"The two friends were trying

to test the limits of authentic Christian life-style. They were in that gray area where the Bible doesn't guide us specifically. The Bible doesn't say a Christian can drive a Cadillac - on the other hand it doesn't say that he can't.

"An awful lot of the stuff which makes up our daily lives is in that gray area. Not prohibited - not approved.

"So, can a Christian drive a Cadillac? Sounds like a frivolous question, but it isn't.

"How well is a Christian permitted to dress? In very expensive clothes or plain ones. It seems to me that man's life style is a surface reflection of what he really believes. That's why it's important to decide what is and what is not permissible to the Christian.

"We would as Christians have to find the authority for our life-style in Jesus wouldn't we? But how?"

"One way would be to imitate Jesus' life-style as closely as possible. Some people do this. The hippie types who don't go to a barber and live in communes and go around preaching peace and love and share everything with their fellows probably come closest of anyone to imitating Jesus' life-style.

"Yet, nothing infuriates standard-bearer, middle-class Christians so much as the sight of an unshorn hippie. But they love the Sunday school pictures of Jesus with long hair and beard but they don't like for their sons to look that way.

"Jesus never said we had to imitate his life-style. It isn't forbidden to Christians but it isn't commanded. And there is good evidence that Jesus accep-

ted as followers people who practiced a very different kind of life-style.

"Should we then seek to derive our life-style from the teachings of Jesus? I think we should follow the teachings of Jesus.

"I have observed that what many Christians do is to fashion their personal tastes and habits into life-style and then call it Christian. 'Unchristian life-style' then becomes what other people do that I don't care to do.

"Should you drive a Cadillac and let people go hungry for the want of food they don't have the money to buy?"

"You figure it out for yourself. Read and study the Bible," she concluded.

Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.

You can get the most value from
your electric range by following these tips.



Use flat-bottomed pans

The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily

Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.



Use minimum amount of water

The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods

can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.

Cook and freeze

Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at about the same temperature.



Thaw before cooking

Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

Beef Demand Increases

A growing population of Americans and a steady increase in beef cow numbers are explaining factors that affect supplies of cattle and beef.

Demand for beef has been increasing dramatically in recent years and this gain can be attributed to several factors, including the County Extension Agent Lemons.

The first is an increase in the population of Americans. In 1972, American consumers are spending a share of their total income on food—but a larger total amount, and personal prices for more meat, especially beef, are on the rise.

Disposable per capita income in 1960 was \$1,937. That jumped to an estimated \$2,400 in 1972—a gain of 97 percent—says Lemons. He adds that per capita consumption of beef moved from 85 pounds in 1960 to 116 pounds last year.

Of course most consumers are concerned with the price of beef. However, many factors in cattle supplies by factors such as feed, seasonal needs and cyclical changes play a part in determining beef prices.

The agent points out that the availability of feeder calves has an indirect effect on beef prices. Usually this availability is determined by breeding season, weather conditions and the profitability of cow-calf operations.

Rules For Kite Flyers

Young kite flyers are urged to follow a few simple rules for their own safety, according to B.B. Hardee, company manager for Texas Electric Service Company.

Hardee warns them of the danger of electric power lines.

"If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company," Hardee says. "Someone will be sent to get it down for you."

Hardee recommends the following safety rules for kite flying: Always use dry string, not wire or anything metallic; always use wood and paper in your kite, not wire or metal; always fly your kite on days when there is no rain; always avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.

Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a snagged line; always fly your

kite far from electric or power lines; always fly your kite away from TV and radio aerials.

"Posters containing these safety rules have been distributed by the company to all schools," Hardee said, "so youngsters will get more fun out of flying kites and at the same time keep from getting hurt or losing their kites."

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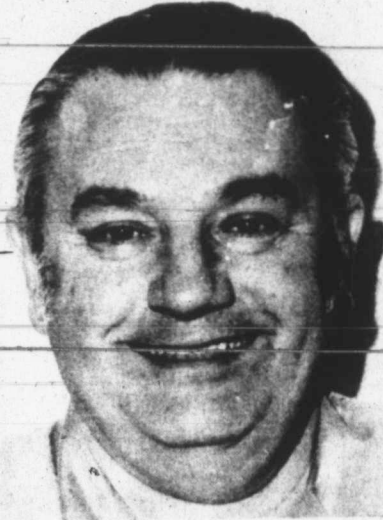

They will also be in Abilene to compete in the State Qualifying Contest April 14, sponsored by the Gooch Packing Company. April 21 the group will be in Lubbock for the State Qualifying Contest judging cotton, poultry, dairy cattle, meats and livestock.

Superintendent Tom Harkey and High School Principal L.R. Dunn have returned after attending the annual State Teachers Association in Houston last week.

Many school problems and changes were discussed at the meeting. Among them were changes in dealing with personnel and curriculum which are being proposed.

The boys and girls tennis team will be in Sweetwater Monday.

The LHS group will present their one-act play Wednesday in Snyder.

Snyder will be the scene of the track meet Wednesday in which LHS tracksters will be participating.

Legislation Of Interest

Representative Elmer Martin of Colorado City said this week that the House of Representative Agriculture and Livestock Committee, of which he is a member, had several bills and resolutions pending before it which would be of special interest to Mitchell County citizens.

Martin explained that House Bill 825 would amend the present statutes concerning the methods of treatment of certain diseases for certain animals.

"This bill," Martin said, "will allow submerging of livestock in a vat, spraying livestock, or any other sanitary treatment of livestock as may be determined by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

"Another bill which has definite effect on Mitchell County Martin said, "is H.B. 765 which adds the insect known as the Boll Weevil into the statute chapter pertaining to the control and eradication of the pink bollworm."

"H.B. 765 was passed out of the Agriculture committee after

testimony was heard from several reputable sources which included Herman Propst, of Stamford, the current President of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association, as well as representatives of the Farm-Bureau, Farmers Union and the Texas A&M Entomology Department.

The boll weevil bill authorized the Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White to deal with the pest insect (boll weevil) much in the same way he has dealt with the pink bollworm.

"We also passed from committee Thursday a resolution which requested Agriculture Commissioner John White to STUDY livestock identification laws, or the laws concerning branding," Martin said.

"The resolution established an advisory committee to STUDY the identification laws in other states and make a comprehensive report back to this legislature concerning itself with whether Texas laws are adequate or not," Martin said.

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
