## 1ST. LIEUT. JOHN W. BLOCKER, JR. HONOR GRADUATE FAMED NAVY SCHOOL

NAVAL AIR STATION, NEW ORLEANS, March 15.—HONOR GRADUATE in a class at the Navy's famed School for Primary Flight Instructors here, was 1st Lieut. John W. Blocker, Jr., of Stanton.

The young Marine combat veteran was awarded a Certificate as a qualified flight instructor by Commander Charles T. Fitzgerald, USN, commanding officer here. In making the award the Commander stated: "Lt. Blocker utilized well his vast flying experience and aerial knowledge to establish an unprecedented record here. Now, as a flight instructor, he has the

important job of training our future combat flyers. We are confident that he will do a good job in this field."

Lt. Blocker recently returned from 13 months combat duty in the South Pacific. He was awarded the Presidential Citation for action against the Japanese forces at Bougainville Island. He was a member of a veteran Marine Dive bombing squadron.

He is the son of J. W. Blocker of Stanton. He is a graduate of Texas Tech., where he received an AB degree.

Lt. Blocker has been assigned to train aviation cadets at the Naval Air Station in Norman, Oklahoma.

## TECH. 5 PAT KELLY'S FORMER REGIMENT SIGNALLY HONORED

WITH THE 2755TH ENGINEERS COMBAT BATTALION, SEVENTH ARMY, FRANCE —The 591st Engineer Boat Regiment, many of whose members are serving with the 2755th Engineer Combat Battalion, has been awarded the Meritorious Service Plaque with Star in recognition of the regiment's outstanding achievements in the North Africa Theater of Operations. The award was earned during a period from January 1, 1943 to February 29, 1944 and again as indicated by the Star from March 1, 1944, to September 30, 1944.

Units of the 591st Engineer Boat Regiment, one of the first American units to be sent to the European theater, served in five major amphibious operations: namely, the landing in North Africa, Sicily, the initial landing in Italy, the landing at Anzio and the landing in Southern France.

The citation accompanying the plaque is quoted in part:

"The superlative performance of this regiment and the outstanding devotion to duty shown by its members contributed greatly to the success of the operations in this theater and in the combined Allied effort in the prosecution of the war."

For their individual contribution to the regiment's success each member is entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Insignia, a golden yellow wreath and star on his right sleeve.

## Red Cross Faces Greatest Task in Fourth War Year

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Facing the greatest task in its history in serving American fighting men on advancing war fronts overseas, their families at home, their buddies returning to the United States after discharge, and the American people in emergencies on the home front, the American Red Cross will launch its third War Fund campaign March 1.

That the American people will respond with overwhelming generosity to the appeal for \$200,000,000 to carry on this world-wide program is already indicated in the nation-wide determination to meet all its war needs and to bring the five-year struggle to an early and successful conclusion.

In every invasion during the past year, Chairman Basil O'Connor of the American Red Cross said, Red Cross workers have either gone with the troops, or have followed within a very short time. Red Cross field directors were with General Eisenhower's men in the great amphibious invasion of France, and with General MacArthur's forces when they returned to the Philippines.

Ten thousand men and women wear the Red Cross uniform overseas, serving in every theatre of war and with every command. They work in leave clubs, clubmobiles, rest houses, hospitals. Red Cross men attached to fighting units are with those outfits even in actual combat. Red Cross girls dispense snacks at air fields, along trucking supply routes, behind front areas and in liberated cities.

Many, both men and women, are on duty at scores of isolated outposts throughout the world, and give aid to wounded men in hospitals and on hospital ships, planes and trains. Away from the battle areas, thousands more serve at military and naval installations within the United States.

Red Cross service on the home front has expanded with the ever-increasing demand upon it, Mr. O'Connor said. In addition to collecting more than ten million pints of blood for plasma since the beginning of the war, the Red Cross has met requests of the Army and Navy for whole blood shipments to European and Pacific battle areas. Ten centers on the East and West coasts already participate in the collection of Type O whole blood, while others stand ready to join in that program as military needs warrant.

At four packaging centers, manned by volunteer workers, more than 20,000,000 food parcels have been turned out in a steady stream for shipment to prisoners of war and civilian internees in Germany and the Far East. Surgical dressings—775,000,000 of them—were prepared in the past year alone for front line and hospital use. Production workers in hundreds of communities have continued the never ceasing program of making warm garments for destitute civilians in war-torn countries overseas, and in those countries the Red Cross has assisted the Army in caring for refugees and homeless people.

Nor has its service to the armed forces on a global scale caused any relaxation on the part of the Red Cross to carry out its traditional service to the American people in time of disaster. More than 200 domestic disasters—floods, high winds and fires—have found Red Cross workers on the job to relieve stricken families and to aid in the rebuilding of communities.

"The need for Red Cross services in the coming year will be greater than ever before," Mr. O'Connor said. "In fulfilling the Red Cross appeal for \$200,000,000, the American people will indicate its wholehearted backing of men in the front lines."

## PLT. LEADER LT. EDGAR POE WOODARD DESCRIBES DEMOLISHING GERMAN TANKS

WITH THE 14TH ARMORED DIVISION OF THE SEVENTH ARMY IN FRANCE—It was one of those terrible, heartbreaking, holding actions in northern Alsace when Jerry, frustrated in the Ardennes, was going all out to bring the border province into the control of the Reich. Riding with the initial punch of the offensive, units of the 14th Armored Division had taken positions in an Alsatian town where they turned to hold the German tide now threatening to engulf Haguenau, Strassbourg and all the Allied gains of November and December.

Day after day reports from the little town would read: "Enemy attacks thrown back with heavy losses," as the defending forces took the steam out of the Nazi blows, filling the landscape with the wreck of the armor he had counted on to sweep the Allies back through the Saverne Gap and give the victory-starved German people a last major triumph to cheer.

One bitterly cold morning early in January the 1st Platoon of A Company of a Tank Battalion was given the mission of supporting the infantry holding the town. Before the day ended a major Boche attack, supported by 16 tanks had been thrown back and the 1st Platoon had accounted for nine enemy tanks, an assault gun, a personnel carrier loaded with troops and a motorcycle.

"Our five M-4's took up positions just in front of town," Platoon Leader Lt. Edgar Woodard, Stanton, Texas, describes the action, "and just waited for the attack we knew was coming."

"We didn't have to wait long. Six German tanks began moving along the railroad tracks to the left. They didn't see us sitting there on their right, so we let them get within 600 yards before we let them have it."

"A Mark IV was leading the enemy advance. The first tank in the section of our platoon opened fire and before the krauts knew what was coming off had poured four direct hits into the steel hull. The battered tank went up in flames."

"Meanwhile, our tanks opened up. In four or five minutes we got all six of them. Every kraut tank went up in flames except one, and he got so many rounds into him that he was completely knocked out."

"They were so damned surprised, they never did a shot back at us."

"About an hour later we caught another tank. This guy must have forgotten his basic training, for he came right out of the woods and tried to make a run for his lines."

"He burned up. After that the krauts sort of gave up the idea of an attack. But we weren't finished yet. It was getting dark and though tanks aren't good night fighters, we planted our tanks along the Jerry supply line and settled down to wait."

"We could hardly see, but finally we noticed a German personnel carrier loaded with krauts rolling along the road. One round of HE and the carrier blew up—and all the krauts with it."

"The next thing that came along was a motorcycle, and we took care of that with a 30 calibre machine gun."

"Then a medium tank started to sneak into town on our left. We got him. Another tank had managed to get to town, but he made the mistake of poking his nose out and two of our tanks started him burning."

"We picked off a command car on the road a little later and finally finished the party with a blast of fireworks—we nailed a self-propelled gun and he must have been loaded with ammo, for when we hit him, he blew to bits with a terrific blast."

At the end of the day the news report went out: "Enemy repulsed with heavy losses."

## Martin County Wins Grand Champion Calf At Amarillo Show

A Martin County calf, bred by Loving and Glasscock, ranchers of Martin County, and fed, cared for, and shown by L. R. Shoemaker, a 4-H Club boy, won the grand champion of the Amarillo Stock Show last week. And to win that award at a show that is a "hot bed" of Hereford breeders, as well as the pioneer Herford section in West Texas, is a decoration of a brilliant plume in the hat of Junior Shoemaker.

On the auction block the calf brought \$1.25 a pound, topped by ten cents the price paid at the Amarillo show last year. The same buyers, Pinkney Packing Company, that bought the grand champion calf last year bought the Martin county calf. The packing company gave the calf to the Welfare League for resale.

An Amarillo newspaper said: "L. R. Shoemaker, exhibitor of the grand champion calf, was 16 years old Tuesday when Judge D. Burns placed his calf first. As it turned out he got a blue ribbon and \$1.35 per pound for his calf as a birthday present."

Under a picture of the calf and its feeder, L. R. Shoemaker, Jr., carried in the Amarillo paper these lines appeared:

"L. R. Shoemaker, Jr., Martin County 4-H Club boy, is the proud exhibitor of this senior calf which was better than anything else in the show. This calf simply illustrates what careful illustration can do to a properly bred calf. Corn and milo were the basis for the feeding ration. This combination gave the calf a smooth fleshing over the back and loin and over the ribs. The only criticism D. Burns, judge, made of this calf was lack of firm flesh over the ribs."

## Bible Thoughts

"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" 2 Tim. 2:15). Not only should we study the Word of God but we should know how to study the Bible. I shall offer a few brief suggestions:

1. Study with an open mind. The Bereans "received the word with all readiness of mind." They did not reject the doctrine preached by Paul on the grounds that it was different to what they had believed, or to what their kinsmen and friends had believed. But they "searched the Scriptures daily to see whether these things were so" (Acts 17:11).

2. Study the Bible for yourself. The Bereans after hearing Paul examined the Scriptures themselves. The preacher can't do all of your studying any more than he can do all of your praying and worshipping, or can you gain a first-hand knowledge of the Bible by confining your investigation to what men have said or written about what they think the Scriptures teach. Jesus said, "Search the Scriptures" (Jno. 5:39).

3. Find out by whom, to whom, when, and why a passage was written. Failure to follow these simple rules leads to many misinterpretations. For example, many have concluded from the words of Jesus to his apostles, "Take no thought how or what ye shall speak" (Matt. 10:19), that the preacher today has the same guidance that the apostles had. But Paul told Timothy to study. We can see that the guidance as Christ promised the apostles was not to continue indefinitely. More suggestions to follow. ## FIRE DESTROYS ANDREWS NEWS' BUILDING AND PLANT

Fire, which originated when an electric light bulb exploded igniting gasoline and gas fumes, completely destroyed the building and equipment of the Andrews County News and residence located in the rear of the same building Saturday evening.

Charles Roberts, Jr., was cleaning up the Linotype and installing new parts on the machine when he accidentally dropped an 150 watt light bulb which exploded near a gasoline soaked rags and machine parts. He stated that the explosion set the entire room on fire in an instant, and that it was impossible to try and extinguish the fire.

The linotype, printing press, job press, casting box, motors, type and 10 year set of files were all destroyed. All the house hold goods with the exception of a frigidaire, washing machine, radio, two mattresses and a few clothes were all burned up.

The loss was placed at approximately \$5000 with many pictures and keepsakes that were irreplaceable. Fortunately no one was injured.

Plans are underway for the construction of a new building to house the printing plant, and a new residence will be erected as soon as possible. The News will be published at Seminole until building and equipment can be provided.

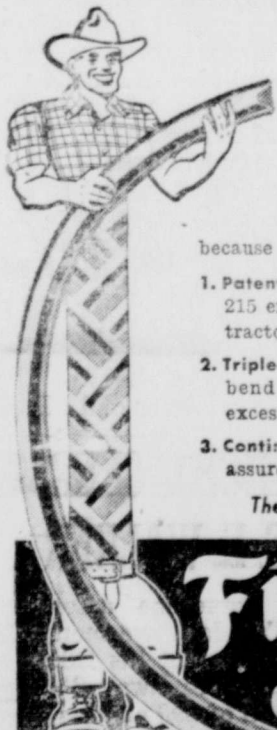

## Army, Navy Leaders, Others Endorse Red Cross War Fund

WASHINGTON, D. C.—In answer to President Roosevelt's appeal to the nation on behalf of the American Red Cross to fulfill the \$200,000,000 Red Cross War Fund goal for 1945, America's foremost military and naval leaders, the press, and educational, religious, fraternal, industrial and labor groups pledged unstinting support.

Secretary of War Stimson expressed his gratitude to the Red Cross for discharging its responsibilities to the Army "with efficiency and humanity" throughout the war.

Chief of Staff General Marshall added: "The Red Cross has kept pace with the growth of the Army by enlarging its services to meet soldier needs both in this country and overseas."

Secretary of the Navy James V. Forrestal, citing Red Cross war contributions of blood plasma, prisoner of war food packages and civilian war aid, said, "In the blackness of war, the Red Cross stands as a beacon of mercy of which we can all be proud. Never has money been put to better use."

## LOCAL MAN'S ARTILLERY OUTFIT PLAYS VITAL ROLE IN CAPTURE OF KEY ITALIAN TOWN

(Special to Reporter)

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—S/Sgt. Gordon E. Wise, Section Chief, son of Mrs. Ader Wise, Route 1 Stanton, is a member of the 916th Field Artillery Battalion whose big guns recently played a vital role in the capture of Livergnano, key Italian town before the Po Valley.

It was the 916th's blasting of Livergnano, and its flanking hills that enabled the doughboys to take the village for the first time and, when they had been expelled from it, to reenter and hold the town.

The 916th has fired more than 134,000 rounds at the Germans since it went into the line at Velletri, Italy, last June 3. The battalion fired a German gasoline dump near Grosseto to light the way for attacking doughboys, smashed river boats on the Arno, breached the Gothic Line at Futu Pass and participated in capture of Pietramala, Monghidoro and Loiano of Highway 65.

The 916th is part of the 361st Infantry Regiment, 91st "Powder River" Division, Fifth Army.

Recently passing its 173rd day in combat, its 105-millimeter guns have fired as many as 4400 shells in a single day, reaching this peak performance during the assault on the Gothic Line.

The 916th advanced on Highway 7 and passed through Rome June 5, carrying doughboys on its trucks.

The artillerymen moved rapidly up to the Arno River, changing gun sights as often as four times in a day.

Having knocked out three river boats in a single day of action along the Arno, the 916th went into the battle on the Gothic Line. Operating in the face of heavy artillery and mortar fire, the battalion pulverized concrete fortifications until a segment in the formidable defense system had been erased.

Lieutenant Colonel James E. Shaw, Jr., Grenada, Mississippi, commands the battalion.

Recently the McMorries, received a French medal from their son, Pfc. Melton McMorries, who is a paratrooper with the 501 Paratrooper Division and who has participated in three major invasions, France, Holland, and Luxembourg.

(Dallas Morning News)

A heartwarming sign that the civilization we have known so long is still hanging on is the weekly newspaper. It is holding its own. From 1938 to 1943, a very trying time for newspapers as well as people, only 454 of them went out of business. Maybe some of them became dailies. Maybe others boarded up for the duration. But there are still nearly 11,000 over the land, doing their bit for folk in the valleys and hills.

A few years ago there were those who forecast the death of the weekly. It could not withstand the radio. The drain to the city, the rush for defense jobs and call to arms would mean its doom. But the prophet did not know the small community. Neither did he know the love one develops for running a small newspaper. Even though the

life is less glamorous than that on a metropolitan daily, it has its own deeply-rooted charms. It is hard to forget the lie-lot tune of the press on publication day. It is a rare experience to know that she is out again, to remove the forms, redistribute the type and mail her out to appreciative customers. It is a place where the back office is close to the front and the whole is diffused with an atmosphere that is hard to put behind and leave.

The little towns are still our strongholds. There we find devotion and affection for community life. Folks may be complacent at times, but they feel they are a part of their environment, not little saplings in a dense woodland. It is comforting to know that their institutions are still rooted, that they are weathering one of the great crises of history and will live to carry on a great heritage.

## ROPEVILLE PROJECT HAS PROVED TO BE A SUCCESS

Those, who a few years ago, called the Ropesville Farm Project in Hockley County a "noble experiment" are in for a jolt this week when the first of the 76 former share croppers and farm tenants pay off his government loan in full and becomes an independent landowner. The distinction of being the first man to make his final payments to the Farm Security Administration goes to Douglas Jones, 35-year-old farmer who is paying out his place 38 years ahead of schedule. Five of his neighbors will pay within the next few days, according to J. W. McDermott, FSA Supervisor.

This is proof that adequate financing hard work and a little good luck in the form of production and prices, is all that the industrious tenant needs to become the owner.

Ropesville Farms Project was bought by the government in 1934 from the Elwood Estate. The mesquite and native grass were grubbed out and the 16-230 acres divided into individual farms. Families from Hockley County and surrounding counties moved in and began farming in 1935. All of the property was deeded to the 76 individual farmers in 1943, the approximate sale price being a little more than \$500,000 or approximately 33 per cent of total sale price collected.

The average net worth per family at time of moving to the Project was \$1,339. Today it is \$8,349 or an average increase of over 600 per cent. — Anton News.

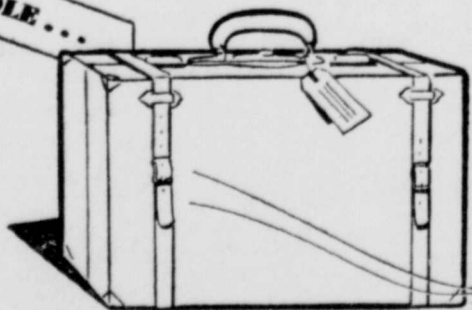
