## City, County sales tax elections Saturday



THE NEW SWIMMING POOL at Ruddick Park has been getting plenty of splash this summer during its first full year of operation. Attendance has been running between 150 to 200 per day, plus there have been swimming lessons, exercise classes and lifesaving courses offered. Closing date of the pool has not yet been set.

### To reduce property taxes; Voting places listed

Citizens of Colorado City and Mitchell County are called to the voting polls Saturday, August 8, to cast their ballots in the separate elections proposing to levy a new 1/2 percent sales and use tax.

In both elections, this new sales tax is to be used to reduce the property taxes by an equal amount generated by the sales tax. In proposing the elections, City and County officials felt that this tax will provide some tax relief to property owners and spread the tax load over a wider base. No formal opposition has developed locally as of early this week. In other areas considering the tax, opponents express concern about greater fluctuation of gross sales and that the reductions gained by large, non-resident property owners would be made up by higher tax on local residents.

If approved by the voters, the collection of the additional 1/2 percent sales tax would begin on January 1, 1988. Amounts collected would then be applied

against the 1988 property tax rate.

Very little interest among local voters has been shown thus far, and as of Tuesday thirteen absentee ballots had been cast at the Courthouse and just eleven ballots at City Hall. Absentee balloting closed out at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 5.

Residents of Colorado City will be allowed to vote in both the City and County elections.

## County still adjusting budget

Mitchell County Commissioners Court, meeting in special session Tuesday morning, gave final examination of the County's 1988 budget, received some purchase figures for a new copier, and discussed program changes desired with representatives of a computer software firm.

In the examination of the budget, a small change amounting to \$37.50 per month was made, since the 5% salary increase had been overlooked for part-time remuneration received by the County Judge's secretary. Also County Clerk Joan Beach renewed her request to budget for a full-time deputy to replace a retiree next year. In recommending that the Clerk's office begin

utilizing the computer system, the Court approved funds for an hourly-wage replacement and trial period, rather than a third deputy.

Final approval of the \$2,702,440 budget and formal setting of the tax rate, which is anticipated to be 39.07 cents per

\$100 valuation, the same as last year, will be at the public hearing at the Regular meeting of the Court on August 10.

County Auditor George Griffin reported to the Court that Stephens Office Supply of Snyder had offered a new model 1025 Zerox copier under two different options: (1) \$2,420 for the copier and optional sorter, with a \$500 trade-in allowance, out-right purchase. Two different service contracts are available—\$925 per year for full service or \$375 per year for standard service, plus service call charges. (2) Lease arrangement of \$175.27 per month for 24 months. The monthly lease fee includes \$80 per month for full service maintenance. Total costs comes out fairly close with either option, but the Court requested a demonstration of the equipment before making the purchase decision.

Representatives of the Davis Kinard & Co., software firm from Abilene, were on hand to discuss changes requested for the programs used by the County Treasurer and Tax Assessor-Collector offices. It was indicated that most of the changes could probably be incorporated on or before December 1.

The Court also authorized County Judge Bill Carter to begin taking applications for Courthouse Custodian, to replace Robert Bracy who is retiring August 31. Applications will be taken until Tuesday, August 25.

All members of the Court were present for the meeting.

## New phone directories mailed today

Southwestern Bell Telephone will begin distributing the new 1987 Colorado City directories today.

Jim West, area manager-external affairs, said more than 3,750 directories, which include 28 white pages of listings and 49 pages of Yellow Page listings are being distributed. For additional copies, customers can call the Southwestern Bell Telephone office.

The new directories will feature artwork which depicts Texas as the "Center of the Universe". Texas artist Ross Edwards' cover artwork, "Telecommunications Possibilities" will appear on more than 9 million Southwestern Bell directories throughout Texas in 1987.

Local distribution of the directories is expected to be completed by August 14. The Colorado City directory includes listings for Westbrook and Loraine.

## Football team prospects will gather today

Colorado High School football player prospects have been called for their first team meeting of the year today (Thursday) at 5 p.m. at Wolf Stadium Field House.

All players from ninth grade through twelfth should attend the meeting, head coach Tom Ramsey said.

## City, County get liquor tax rebate

Colorado City has received \$304.72 from \$2,377.78 in taxes collected by the State from mixed drink revenues; and Mitchell County has received \$356.08 off \$2,848.61 taxes collected for the second quarter of 1987.

The state collects a 12 percent tax on mixed drinks. Texas cities and counties each receive a 12.5% share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries. State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks out last Friday to 219 counties and 430 cities totaling \$10.9 million. The state collected \$45.3 million in mixed drink taxes for the second quarter, compared to \$0.7 million during the same period last year. The state's share of \$34.4 billion for the quarter goes into the general revenue fund.

Revenues in Colorado City and Mitchell County come from private clubs, since liquor by the drink has not been legalized here. The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

## Local 'Truck Task Force' tickets traffic violators

A Truck Task Force, conducted Saturday night by Mitchell County Sheriff's Office and Texas Highway Patrol, aimed at slowing truck traffic on Interstate 20 in Mitchell County, resulted in the issuance of 53 tickets and 41 warnings to drivers of all type vehicles.

Ten officers from the two units conducted the "Task Force" from about 6 p.m. to midnight.

Sheriff Wendell Bryant reported that of the 53 violations,

2 were for DWI, 23 for speeding, 13 for seat belts, 1 for equipment, and 14 other violations.

Warnings were given for 11 speeding violations, 19 for seat belts, 4 for equipment, and seven others. There was one motor assist.

Violations by the truckers resulted in 15 of the tickets and 11 warnings.

## Two accidents occur Monday

Two traffic accidents, resulting in small damage, but no injuries, were investigated by City Police Monday.

At 7:50 a.m., a 1981 driven by Wanda Hill Banks, 45, and a 1983 Chevrolet Pickup driven by Ofelia Cantu, 40, collided at the intersection of Highway 80 and Hwy 208 south.

At 5:51 p.m. Monday, a 1981 Granada driven by Lavada Belcher Jones, 66, and a 1985 Buick driven by Amy Caresse Beinhaur, 19, collided at Walnut and 6th Streets.

## Forty-four more farms sign-up for land reserve

In the fifth signup period for the Conservation Reserve Program which ended July 31, forty-four additional bid applications were filed with the local ASCS office, Executive Director Don Stewart has reported.

Under the conservation program farmers can place highly erodible land into permanent grass for a 10-year period with no grazing or harvesting. The government will pay half the cost of planting the grass, then the farmers submit bids on what they will accept in payment per acre. In previous bid sessions, the government has not accepted bids of more than \$40 per acre. Of the 44 that signed up last month, all were under the \$40 per acre bid, but the bids have not yet been accepted or approved.

The additional 44 signups would bring the current total to 113 farms in Mitchell County that are participating, and encompasses a total of approximately 22,000 acres. Under the program a maximum of 25% of the crop land can be included, which would be 49,500 acres.

Stewart said he anticipated a sixth signup period to be announced this fall.

Another program, Agriculture Conservation Program, has been opened for applications between August 10 and 14. This program involves government aid for various conservation practices such as terraces, ponds, waterways, livestock, etc. If applications are approved by the Soil Conservation Service the government will pay 50 percent of the costs. Such funds are currently available, Stewart said.

# Veterans' questions answered

Editor's Note: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q - Has a law been passed recently that expands veterans education benefits?

A - On June 1, 1987, President Reagan signed the Montgomery GI Bill into law. The new law, named after Rep. G.V. (Sonny) Montgomery (D-MS), chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, makes permanent a

New GI Bill which was started July 1, 1985 as a three-year test program. In return for monthly salary deductions, active duty members earn educational assistance payments for use after separation. Reserve and National Guard members also can earn eligibility under the new program.

Q - I am a veteran with a service-connected disability rated at 50 percent. I have received an injury which is not service-connected, but which will require a prosthetic appliance. Will the VA supply this needed appliance?

A - Yes. Any veteran with a service-connected disability of 50 percent or more may be provided with necessary prosthetic appliances for any medical condition.

Q - My application for a VA pension was turned down several years ago because my income was too high. There have been some changes in my health and income over the last few years. Should I apply again?

A - Entitlement to pension is based on your countable income which can be reduced by medical and certain other expenses. Also the income limitation is raised each year and your income may not have increased at the same rate. You should check with your local VA office to determine if you are now eligible to receive a pension.

Q - I am rated for a service connected disability which makes it difficult for me to obtain life insurance. Can the VA help me?

A - If you apply within one year of the date you are notified that you have been granted a service-connected disability rating and are otherwise in good health, you may obtain Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance issued by the Veterans Administration.

### Don't be a vacation victim

Vacation time is here and many Texans will be leaving their homes in search of fun in distant places. There is always the possibility that you may find serious problems when you return if you fail to take certain precautions before you leave on your trip.

**Safety Checklist**  
The following checklist is suggested as a vacation crime-prevention measure.

1. Check with your local police if you plan an extended vacation trip; many police forces offer a "close patrol" of homes where persons are known to be away on vacation. You will need to tell them what cars or persons, if any, will be making authorized visits to your home.
2. Avoid mentioning to casual acquaintances or strangers that you will be on vacation. Also, avoid telling your newspaper society editor of your trip until you have returned.
3. Stop mail, newspaper and other delivery services.
4. Have someone come by every few days and pick up any circulars that might accumulate.
5. Leave a few lights on or buy an automatic timer that will turn certain lights on and off after dark. The newest timers on the market can switch on and off at different times each night.
6. Cut your lawn before you leave, and if you will be gone for a long time, make arrangements with someone to have it cut periodically during the course of your vacation.
7. Lock all windows and doors securely. A sliding glass patio door can be more securely fastened by wedging a stick or metal instrument at the top or bottom of the door.
8. Leave blinds, shutters or curtains open or partially open. Windows that are tightly covered all day, every day, are an indication no one is home.

9. Tell a neighbor or your apartment manager that you will be gone and ask them to keep an eye on your place for you.

10. Before leaving, engrave all valuables in your home and those you will be taking with you in the car with your driver's license or Social Security number. Some police forces will lend you an engraver to mark your belongings, so register your number on their master list and they will give you a bright sticker for a window or door which shows that you are protected. This may discourage burglars from taking your goods, and it will make identification of recovered items much easier.

11. Keep a list of all items of value with an estimate of their cost. Many insurance companies suggest this be done and that photographs be taken of the valuables as well. This can be of major importance if you have to file a claim for loss with an insurance carrier. Your insurance agent can provide you with information on how frequently such lists should be updated.

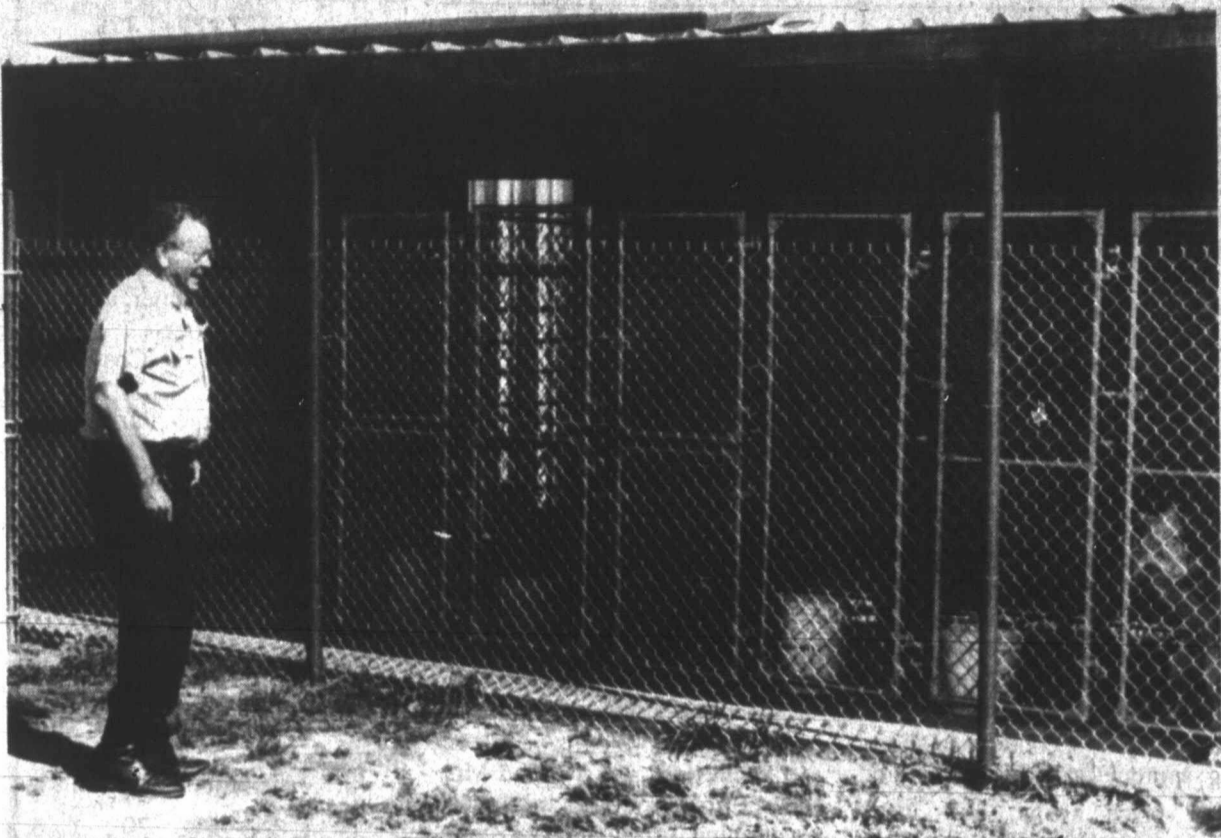



## Tax hike said largest ever

To balance the \$38.3 billion 1988-1989 biennial appropriation bill, the Texas Legislature adopted tax increases for the next two years totalling an estimated \$5.7 billion—reputedly the largest STATE tax increase in U. S. history, according to the Texas Research League Bulletin on Texas state finance.

These increases are contained in two separate tax bills. HB 62 repeals the scheduled August 31st expiration of the "temporary" 5 cents-per-gallon gasoline tax increase adopted last Fall, and makes permanent the current 15 cents-per-gallon motor fuels tax rate—producing an estimated \$900 million in additional revenue over the next two years. The remaining \$4.8 billion results from the passage of HB 61. OMNIBUS TAX BILL

The so-called "omnibus tax bill" (HB 61) includes increases in the sales, motor vehicle sales, franchise, cigarette, hotel occupancy, and insurance gross premiums taxes, as well as increases in a number of professional license fees.

Sales Tax Rate. Beginning October 1, the state sales tax rate will be 6%. The combined 8% state, municipal and transit authority tax rate that will be in effect in Houston, Dallas and Austin will be the 4th highest in the country. Cities and Counties that are also levying the 1/2% property tax offsetting sales tax will also be at the 8% sales tax level.

Sales Tax Base. Although a comprehensive broadening of the sales tax base to include virtually all services did not pass, a number of selected services were made taxable either by adding them to the base or by removing current exemptions. Some of the more significant provisions are listed below.

Added taxable services include credit reporting, debt collection, data processing, information, insurance, security, real property repair and remodeling, and certain real property services. In addition, the definition of "taxable amusement services" was expanded to include private club memberships. Data processing and real property repair become taxable January 1; all others become taxable October 1 of this year.

Each listed service is defined in the bill to specify exactly what become taxable. For example, "real property repair and remodeling" does not include residential structures. "Insurance service" does not include coverage for which a premium or commission is paid. Taxable "real property services" include landscaping, surveying, pest control, garbage collection, lawn care, and building or ground cleaning.

Current exemptions for long-distance telephone calls and basic local exchange telephone service are removed. Correspondingly, the present telephone gross receipts tax applied to basic local exchange service is repealed.

A number of other exemptions are removed including, among others, utilities used by restaurants, repair parts for common

carriers, food purchased by common carriers for service to passengers, solar energy devices, and motion picture films.

Sales Tax Exemptions. Two important exemptions are added to the sales tax law. (1) The sales tax on manufacturing machinery and equipment purchases will be phased out over a five-year period at 20% a year beginning in 1991. (2) Intercorporate services, defined as transactions among affiliated entities that file a consolidated federal income tax return, are not taxed.

Sales Tax Administration. An annual \$25 fee will be charged for the issuance of a sales tax permit for the first time. Also, the 1% that retailers are allowed to withhold for collecting the sales tax is reduced to 1/2%.

Detailed provisions are added in an attempt to tax mail-order sales which now escape taxation because of federal court decisions. Also provisions are included to treat services just like tangible personal property for taxation purposes. Use of a taxable service is defined as "the derivation in this state of direct or indirect benefit from the service."

Franchise Tax. For tax years 1988 and 1989 only, the franchise tax rate is increased from \$5.25 to \$6.70 per \$1,000 of taxable capital; the minimum tax rises from \$68 to \$150. The additional tax paid by banks will be retained by the state. (Proceeds from the existing bank franchise tax are remitted to local governments to offset revenue lost when bank stock was exempted from the property tax.)

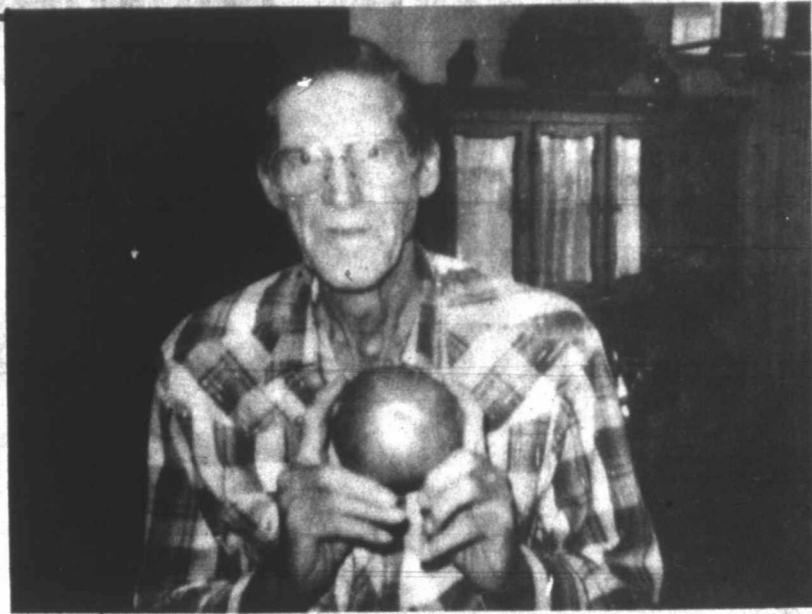

Perhaps no other domestic program has been obscured by myths as much as the Social Security program.

The simple truth is that Social Security was born in myth, sold to Congress and the American public as an insurance program in 1935. Each worker received an account number with an implication that his or her taxes, at that time referred to as contributions, went into a bank-type account invested for retirement. In fact, Social Security has operated for many years as a pay-as-you-go system - today's workers pay for today's beneficiaries, yesterday's workers paid for yesterday's beneficiaries, and tomorrow's workers will pay for tomorrow's beneficiaries.

The biggest myth about the program that still exists is that Social Security is going broke.

While Social Security was in serious financial shape a few short years ago, it is no longer. Today the program is operating on a solid financial basis. In fact, the trust fund reserves are scheduled to increase significantly over the next several decades to ensure that monies are there to finance the benefits of the "baby boom" generation when they retire.

Another myth that persists is that some workers have paid in hundreds of thousands of dollars into Social Security and will never get their money's worth out of the program. Again, that is not true. In fact, a 65-year-old worker who has paid taxes on the maximum amount of covered earnings throughout his or her career has \$23,239 in Social Security taxes through 1986. If that worker would have invested that portion of his tax money used to finance the retirement program at the same interest rate payable to long-term U.S. government bonds, he would have accumulated \$52,216.95. And if retiring this year, that worker could expect to recover that tax contribution and the interest in only 5 1/2 years. And based on average life expectancy at age 65, the retired worker could expect to continue receiving monthly benefits for another 10 to 13 years beyond the point where all contributions and interest have been recovered. If the worker has a spouse who never worked at all, the payback would be completed in about two-thirds of this time. And, of course, that does not take in account valuable disability and survivor's insurance protection nor Medicare coverage that the worker and his or her spouse receive at age 65.

Another common myth about Social Security is that is a full national retirement system - guaranteed to keep persons at the middle income level throughout their retirement years. But Social Security was always intended as only a partial replacement for lost earnings - a foundation for retirement planning. It was designed to be supplemented by private pensions and personal savings.

Another myth is that Social

Security trust fund monies have been used to finance such diverse government functions as wars, foreign aid and highway projects. Of course, that too, is not true. This confusion arises because of misunderstandings about the Social Security trust fund investment procedures. By law, any reserves not used for the payment of benefits or operational expenses are invested only in U.S. Government securities and earn prevailing rate of interest. The government uses the money it has borrowed from Social Security, along with other money, in its general fund, to finance many programs and projects. But the federal government has always repaid its obligations to the trust funds, with interest.

Why is the Social Security program so shrouded in myth and misunderstanding? Perhaps it is because of its size, or maybe because of its pervasive influence on our economy and social well-being. But whatever the reason, it is my intention to continue educating the American public on the true facts about this important social program called Social Security.

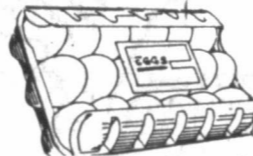

spring and early summer, one toad is likely to eat 10,000 insects; of these, 2,000 will be cutworms.

Because of their bug lust, it has been estimated that a single toad is worth \$50 a year to a farmer! Toads and frogs are found on every continent except Antarctica. There are 2,600 known species of the two, 90 of which can be found in North America. Nearly 20 species of true toads live in this country. Toads and frogs are both tailless amphibians. Although they are similar, they have their own distinct characteristics. Frogs have moist, smooth skin and long hind legs. Their bodies are streamlined. They are excellent jumpers. Toads have dry, warty-looking skin and thick, clumsy bodies. They are hoppers. Frogs have teeth; toads do not. Both feed primarily on insects and swallow their victims whole! One important difference is that adult frogs stay close to water, while toads set up housekeeping in lawns, pastures, forests and gardens.

**Enduring Native Plums**

There are native plums in every part of Texas. Although plums are not the only native fruits in Texas, they are certainly prominent because of the good taste and the beautiful springtime blooms.

As anyone who has lived through a Texas summer will say, the climate is harsh. The ground cracks, the sun bakes, winds howl, dust chokes—but native plants endure. They have grown accustom to the Texas climate. Native fruits produce more reliably and with less care than non-natives.

It would only be fair to point out that the native varieties are subject to the same ills as any other; they have learned how to resist them better, however.

The Mexican Plum, *Prunus*

*mexicana*, is perhaps the best known. It is a single-trunk tree, growing to 25 feet, with striking pinkish-white flowers in very early spring. In late fall, you will have large, purple fruit averaging about 1 1/4 inches in diameter.

Then there is the Oklahoma Plum, *Prunus gracilis*, which, contrary to its name, prefers the dry sandy soils of Texas. This type of plum forms a thicket, so it is best in an unmanicured part of the yard. Depending on your pruning practices, it can mature anywhere from 2 to 15 feet and is an excellent landscape plant.

The Flatwoods Plum, *Prunus umbellata*, blooms in early spring, like the Mexican Plum. And, like it, the Flatwoods Plum does not form a thicket opting to be a large shrub, or a

small tree, topping out at 20 feet. The fruit is on the smallish side, about 1/2 inch in diameter, but has an excellent taste and makes terrific jellies and preserves.

The Wild Goose Plum, *Prunus munsoniana*, (shown) is a thicket-forming plant growing to 25 feet under excellent conditions. The showy, white flowers are followed, in late summer, by a distinctive, thin-skinned, juicy plum.

Rounding out the native plums is the Hog Plum, *Prunus rivularis*, one of the common plums, often found as a thicket along creekbeds and fence rows. The plum reportedly got its name because even a hog would not eat it. But the fruit and foliage are beautiful, resembling large cherries.

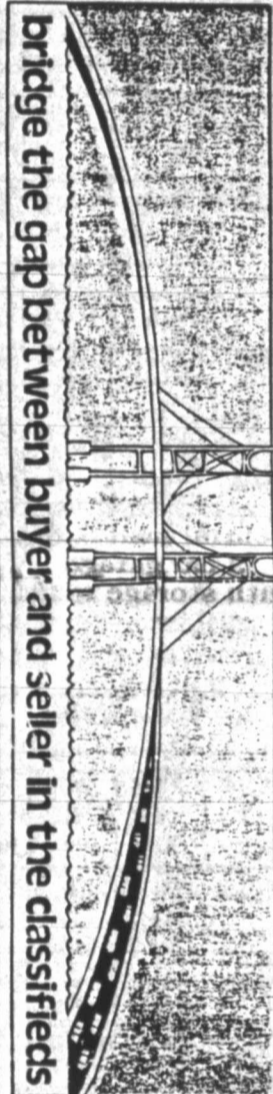

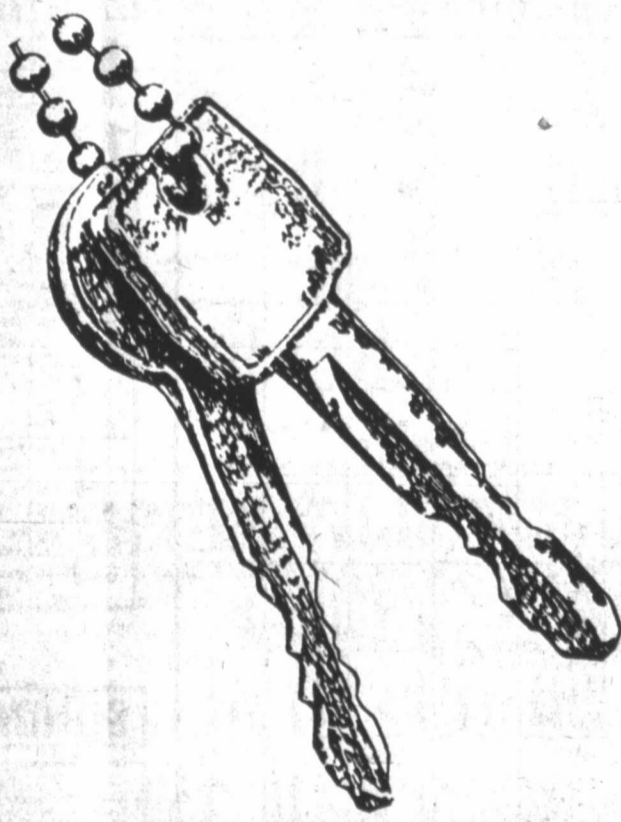
