Cotton Meet Will Be Held Sept. 20th At Hotel Lubbock

Local agriculturists are reminded of the hearing which will be held in Lubbock Wednesday morning, September 20 at 9 a. m., at Hotel Lubbock, pertaining to the establishment of wage ceiling regulations for cotton picking in this area.

A survey was made in this county last week, and Lee R. Pool, local county agent, states that an unofficial report indicates that 51 per cent of the farmers have signed petitions showing that they favor setting up ceiling prices for cotton picking.

County agent Pool states that everyone is invited to the meeting Wednesday at Lubbock, and reports that a group will go from this county. If the cotton program meets the approval of the farmers at the meeting, the price ceilings on cotton pulling and hauling will go into effect immediately thereafter.

Plans For V-Day Ceremony To Be Made Wednesday

At a meeting which will be held Wednesday, September 20 at 3 p. m., in the local Chamber of Commerce office, plans will be formulated for a program to be held in Dawson County upon the surrender of Germany to the Allies.

Preachers of Lamesa and Dawson County, County Judge Kilmer B. Corbin, Mayor Charnell Jobe, and American Legion Post Commander, E. W. Renner will be present at the Wednesday meeting to plan a significant ceremony for V-Day.

Details and plans for the V-Day program will be carried in the next issue of the paper, after features for the event have been worked out by the group placed in charge of the ceremony.

'B-3' And 'C-3' Gas Coupons Invalid After Sept. 30th

"B-3" and "C-3" gasoline ration coupons will be invalid for motorists after September 30, the District Office of Price Administration announced today.

At the same time "T" coupons marked "3rd. qtr" will expire for commercial motor vehicle operators.

Filling station operators will have through October 10 to turn them in to their supplier for gasoline or exchange them at their local War Price and Rationing Board for ration checks. Distributors will have until October 20 to deposit these coupons in their ration bank accounts.

Holders of invalidated "B-3" and "C-3" coupons which were issued for use beyond September 30 may exchange for valid coupons at their local board.

New 'A' Gasoline Coupons To Be Endorsed In Full

New "A" gasoline ration books now being issued to motorists for use beginning September 22, have two new safety features, according to Ely Fonville, District OPA Rationing Executive.

"A" coupons will now have serial numbers useful in spotting stolen coupons. When issuing the new books, War Price and Rationing Boards record the serial numbers of the coupons along with the name of the person to whom issued.

Another safety feature is that new coupons are printed on a special kind of safety paper which responds to a secret test known only to Government identification experts. Counterfeit coupons on imitation paper may look the same to the untrained eye, but will show up the minute this secret test is applied, Fonville pointed out.

Endorsement of the coupons is a safety feature, though it has been required all along. "If not endorsed, coupons are invalid and may be revoked," he said. "As long as it is necessary to ration gasoline, it is important to guard against the misuse or counterfeiting of the currency that assures each citizen a fair share."

Golden Tornadoes Triumph Over Tahoka 7 to 0

In the opening game of the 1944 football season, the Lamesa Golden Tornadoes eked out a 7 to 0 win over the highly touted, hard charging, and plucky Tahoka Bulldogs here last Friday night. An estimated crowd of 2,500 fans were on hand to witness the season opener, and were highly pleased with the results of the game, and future prospects of the Golden Tornadoes in coming games.

The lone score of the game came in the third quarter, after the hard-fighting Bulldog aggregation had kept the Tornadoes in check throughout the first half. Dan Boone determined, hard charging Tornado fullback smashed and slashed his way over for the tally from the seven yard strip, and Bizzell, who plays guard, booted the ball over for the extra point.

The Tornadoes took to the air in the third quarter, with Rhoades doing the passing. Three quick heaves from Rhoades to Hoffman, Hawkins and Self paved the way to the ultimate score for the Lamesa eleven. The passes moved the Tornadoes from their own 42 yard line to the Bulldogs 25, and from this point, Rhoades, Hoffman and Boone plowed and smashed through for rest of needed yardage.

This game marked the debut of two new Lamesa coaches, "Gob" Fitzgerald and "Choc" Sanders, who were rewarded with a well earned win by their Tornado eleven. "Seabiscuit" Caraway, of the Bulldogs gave a brilliant performance for the Tahoka team, until going out of the game with injuries late in the game. The Bulldogs playing hard, down to earth football, were hard to stop throughout the entire battle.

In their greatest chance to score inside the 10 yard strip, the Bulldogs failed with three hard-smashing stabs at the Tornado line.

Tahoka held a margin in first downs and yardage gained from the line of scrimmage.

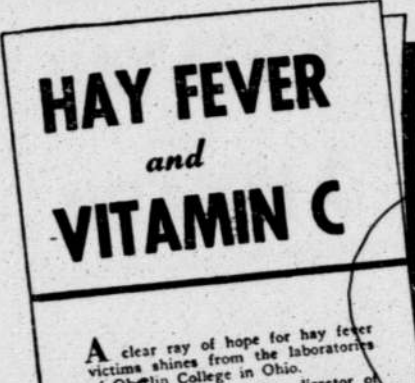

Digging World's Deepest Hole Is A Boring Job

NEW YORK — The world's deepest hole, 15,279 ft. (almost three miles), an oil well near Fort Stockton, Tex., has just been completed after several years' work.

Down there it is hot, 240 degrees Fahrenheit. The pressure on the oil at the bottom is 2,800 pounds a square inch, which is about 200 times the weight of the air at earth's surface.

At that depth rocks become brittle. It doesn't take much of a blow to cause them to snap.

This well is 20 inches in diameter at the top and 7 3/4 inches at the bottom. It brings the oil up in a five-inch pipe.

After the well was sunk, and the steel pipe lowered a thousand sacks of cement was placed, by pumping, around the lower end of the pipe to seal it firmly into the surrounding sand, which is really rock, except for the technical name due to the porosity.

Finally, a 30-foot long gun was lowered down to 15,268 feet. This gun was studded on all sides with small openings filled with steel jacketed cartridges. An electrical connection discharged them, to

penetrate both the pipe, the concrete around it and 15 to 20 feet back into the oil sands. Oil enters the well through these holes.

Bonita the Miracle Sorghum Yields High Production

Bonita, the new combine sorghum scarcely two years in production, is

making something of a record in Runnels County this year as a drought-resistant feed. According to County Agricultural Agent, J. A. Barton 60 adults and 30 members of boys' 4-H clubs planted demonstrations of an acre or two up to 15 acres each. Early reports from scattered demonstrators indicates

that the crop is standing up well under extremely dry weather but it appears, Barton says that it will make a better bundle crop than one for combining.

Cecil Patton, the first to report, obtained a yield of 1,200 pounds an acre combined, compared with 600 pounds from his regular combine Martin maize. Louis Loika of the Bethel community states that his Bonita, planted almost simultaneously along side a field of hegar, will yield more than double the number of bundles expected from the hegar and a corresponding excess in production of grain.

Another example of success with the new type sorghum is reported by Herbert Wilde, one of the veteran grain sorghum producers of the county. He reported to Barton that he is cutting a considerable portion of his crop for seed and estimates that it will thresh 1,800 pounds an acre. This compared with 1,200 pounds of other varieties on his place. Jasper Drake of Winters believe his Bonita will thresh about 3,000 pounds an acre against an estimated yield of about 1,500 pounds for combine maize.

Tom Moreland of Ballinger plans to bundle his Bonita for milk cows and J. B. Estes of the Hatchel community intends to use his for feeding out his sheep this winter. Both farmers reported that Bonita stood up much better under the dry weather than other grain sorghums.

Bonita was developed at the Chillicothe substation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Super-

intendent J. Roy Quinby of the substation who had a leading part in its propagation, defines its origin as a selection from a cross of hegar and chiltex. Chiltex is one half kafir and one half feterita making Bonita, according to its parentage one half hegar. Quinby explains that the cross was made to see whether a hegar could not be produced which would be less erratic in production than the common variety.

NEW BRAKE BREAKS SPEED QUICKLY

NEW YORK (AP)—A new brake that stops a one-eighth horsepower motor traveling at 16,000 revolutions a minute in less than six turns has been developed by Chester I. Hall, General Electric Co. engineer.

The edge of the rotor which this brake stops is moving at a speed of about 62 miles an hour. Stopping it in six turns is the

same, in distance, as would be bringing a mile-a-minute auto to a dead stop in 273 feet.

The brake is an ordinary shoe, as the curved part of a brake is known, made of cork. It does the stopping by ordinary friction.

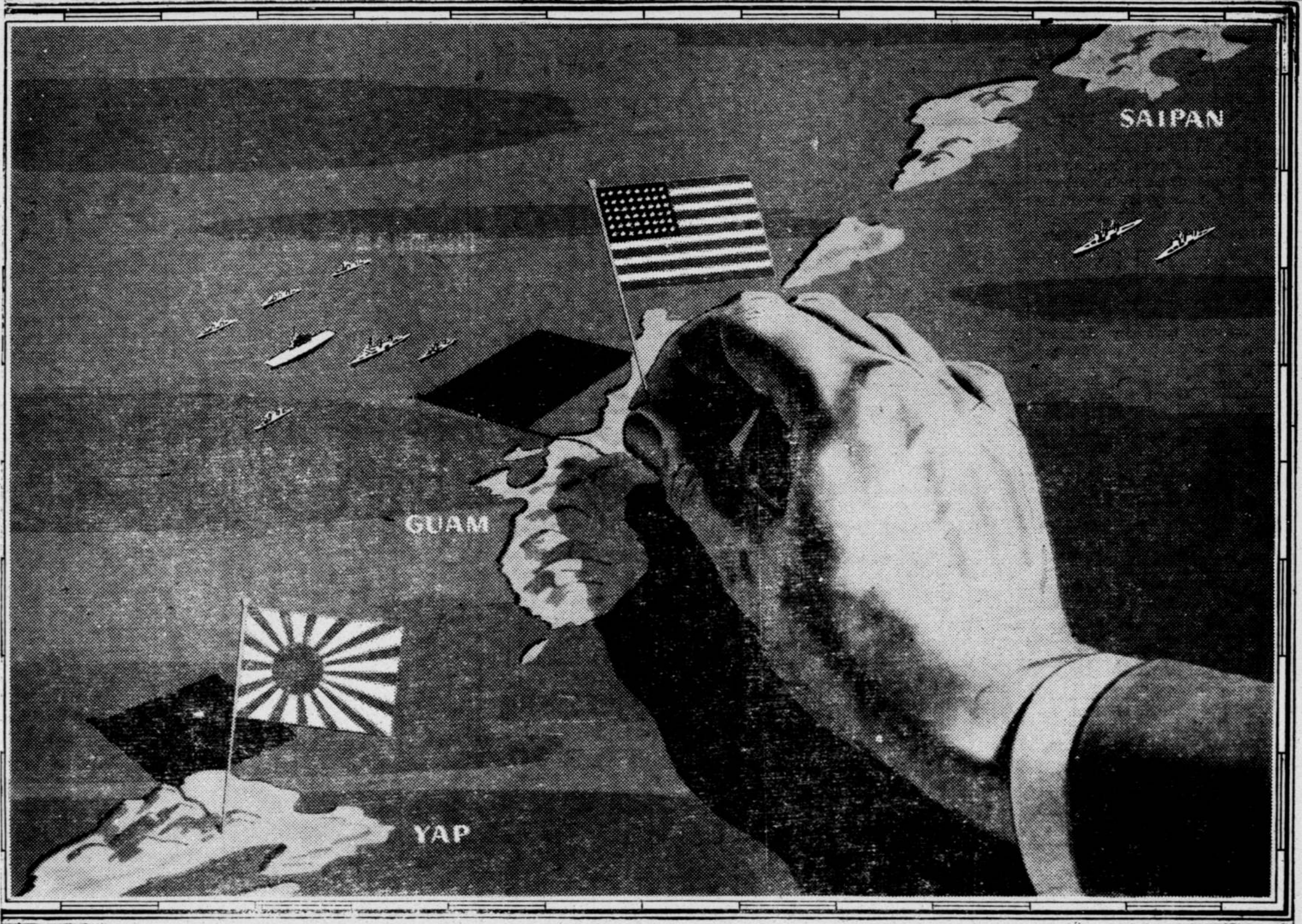
