BOLSHEVIKI ELEMENT WERE RAMPANT

By Associated Press. Petrograd, July 18.—(Delayed)—By an agreement between the council of soldiers and workmen's delegates and the regular members of the cabinet on the question of replacing the retiring ministers, as well as all questions of policy has been held in abeyance pending the suppression of the Bolshevik element which for 36 hours has kept the city in a turmoil.

The government evidently considered it unwise for the safety of the city to oppose the disorders with violent means until it is absolutely necessary. The government adopted the same course with regard to the socialist Lenin some weeks ago, realizing that the movement had little sympathy with the majority of the population and decided it better not to martyrize the Maximist faction.

MEN ENLISTED HERE FOR SIGNAL CORPS

Lieutenant Noyes of the United States army was here this morning for the purpose of enlisting three men for the Signal Corps. He took on Luther P. Brown, a cook at the St. James, James Powell from the City National Bank and George P. Boase from Fredrick's. The enlistment has been made for the Signal Corps of men specially qualified as linemen, telephone operators, and construction men. Brown was in a cook and such men being in demand, he was duly enlisted.

WORLD WAITS DECLARATION OF GERMAN POLICY

MILITARY OPERATIONS OF MAJOR IMPORTANCE ONLY ON THE GALICIAN FRONT

RESERVES INTO THE FRAY

Germany Throwing Large Forces into This Sector to Stop Russian Onrush

The Associated Press war summary today says: While the world today is awaiting the declaration of German policy which the new imperial chancellor, Dr. George Michaelis is expected to deliver in the Reichstag, the military operations of the belligerents are engaged in military operations of major importance only along the front in Eastern Galicia. Reports from this theater have indicated a lessening in the speed of the Russian drive.

A new field was chosen for an attempt of this sort last night, the first really sharp attack for some time in the field of the great Hindenburg retreat of last march being delivered south of St. Quentin.

The crown prince chose a point nearly twenty miles to the west where the French occupied a hillcock to the east of Gauchy.

General Peletin's forces were taken back at first by the intensity of the drive and some ground was gained on the first line. They rallied quickly, however, and drove the Germans out of the greater part of the gained ground.

The sinking of a German submarine by a Russian destroyer in the Baltic is reported from Petrograd.

He told of the attempt made by the city of Goliad to get the Normal school located there, using the argument that they had fought Mexico valiantly in the old days.

T. B. Smock gave a prize for next week six fruit jars. Mr. Smock mentioned the sickness of Dr. Traylor and suggested that the club send some expression of sympathy to Rotarian J. C. Jones in his present bereavement.

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REICHSSTAG MAJORITY FOR PEACE

The committee of the majority party in the German Reichstag have unanimously decided to move the peace resolution. The committee was divided, two members of the Center and one of the Socialists disagreeing with the majority. The Tagelblatt says that in the Reichstag 221 deputies will vote for the peace resolution.

FOODS, FEE AND FUEL SCOPE OF CONTROL BILL

Washington, July 19.—Confinement of the government legislation in the food bill for food and fuel including kerosene and gasoline was forecasted today when, in what was regarded as a test vote, the Senate rejected 44 to 28 an amendment by Senator Kenyon of Iowa to extend control to iron ore and its products, hemp, binding twine and farm implements and tools.

LOCAL TELEPHONE MEN CALLED FOR SERVICE

P. B. Murphy and J. R. Henderson, employees of the Southwestern Telephone Company leave tonight for Leon Springs where they will join a company formed in Texas for Signal Corps service. The company will be formed of employees of the Southwestern Telephone Company and will be attached to what is known as the Tenth Telegraph battalion.

Mr. Murphy from Wichita Falls will have the rank of sergeant. The men were carefully selected from three times the number of volunteers. They are highly trained, disciplined and seasoned men. They will receive full peacetime pay.

The company making up any difference between the regular civilian pay of the men in the service of the telephone company will be upon their return from the service.

UNITED STATES INVITED TO PARIS CONFERENCE

By Associated Press. Washington, July 19.—The United States has been officially invited by the Allied government to participate in the inter-allied conference to be held in Paris some time this month. It was officially stated at the state department that while this course was followed at present it was not to be taken as an indication of a permanent policy.

The Paris conference was stated in the invitation to be largely military and upon the Balkan situation. The United States at present has no direct interest on that question. It was stated, except as it reacts upon the whole war situation, it was not deemed necessary for this country to interfere in military and diplomatic questions with which it has no immediate concern.

COMPROMISE EFFECTED ON ROCK ISLAND DISPUTE

By Associated Press. Chicago, July 19.—Officials of the Rock Island railroad lines and union have agreed to a compromise. The compromise was effected by the work of putting into effect a compromise of their differences which was brooked by the union and railroad conciliators had appealed to the patriotism of both sides. Wheat closed strong, 4 to 14 cents net higher. \$2.40 for July and \$2.10 for September.

Great Hungarian Munitions Plant Destroyed by Fire. Zurich, Switzerland, July 19.—The munitions factory of the Hungarian Iron and Steel Rolling mills at Engesfeld, Budapest, was completely burned Sunday, according to word received here. The damage will exceed a million crowns.

WOMEN PICKETS ARE PARDONED BY PRESIDENT

Austin, Texas, July 19.—President Wilson today issued pardons for the 16 suffragettes who are serving a 60-day sentence in the workhouse at Occoquan, Va., for picketing in front of the White House. Secretary Tamm says the pardons are for themselves and that the White House will have no statement to make for the president's action.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S RULING ON SERVICE CARS

By Associated Press. Washington, July 19.—It is held by the Attorney General's department in an opinion to the State Highway Commission that rent cars or jitneys with a carrying capacity of 1,000 pounds per wheel or less are not classified as commercial vehicles under the state highway commission law, and cars of this class are to pay a license and registration fee at the rate of 25 cents per horse power, the same as pleasure cars. In the event, however, such passenger or rent cars have a capacity exceeding 1,000 pounds per wheel, then such cars are classified as commercial vehicles and must pay a license fee under another section of the law, that is, a minimum amount of \$20 which is graduated until it reaches \$500. Privately owned trucks carrying a capacity of more than 1,000 pounds per wheel, but not used for carrying freight or passenger hire, are not subject to this graduated tax.

NEED STORAGE FACILITIES FOR SUPPLIES IN FRANCE

By Associated Press. Washington, July 19.—Importance of ample storage facilities at or near sea ports to accommodate great stocks of supplies for American forces in Europe was emphasized today by the National Defense Council's committee.

Expenditures in excess of \$55,000,000 for storage areas at or near sea ports will undoubtedly be necessary, says the statement. "Not a moment should be lost in providing these facilities. The equipment which it is necessary to provide for each soldier going over sea amounts to about 5 1/2 tons. This storage load will be put upon the nation before the end of the year. We must handle it, but to do so will require carefully designed areas, probably 2,000 acres in extent. They must be in operation by January 1, 1918."

With the visiting of the rural communities which will take place this week if the weather permits, Mrs. J. W. Lee, Wichita county chairman of the home food conservation work, will complete her organization of the county. Mrs. Traylor will probably ask the assistance of Mrs. O'Neil, Hughes county canning club demonstrator, in the organization of the rural communities. Organization of the Electra forces with Mrs. A. N. Richardson as chairman and Mrs. B. B. Jones as secretary will be held at the home of Mrs. Traylor, who is much pleased with the response with which the movement has met.

RUSS SOCIALIST LEADER AGENT OF GERMAN STAFF

By Associated Press. Petrograd, July 19.—A letter from General Brusilov's chief of staff states that Nikolai Lenin, the radical socialist leader in an agent of the German staff. The evidence was traced through the confession of Gen. Ermolov, that he was sent to the front with the sixth Russian army to make a propaganda of early peace for Germany.

AVIATION HERO KNOWN TO TWO WICHITANS

This morning's Fort Worth Record published a report of the destruction by Lieutenants Basil D. Hobbs, single-handed, of a submarine and a Zeppelin. This feat, spectacular enough in itself, has added interest to citizens of Wichita Falls, because Lieutenant Hobbs is personally well-known to Frank Kell and John Culbertson, who crossed with him on their trip to England, sixteen months ago.

Mr. Kell said this morning that he got acquainted with young Hobbs on the trip over and found him a very likable chap consumed with an ambition to "do something" for the cause in the great war. He spent a good deal of time with Mr. Kell and Mr. Culbertson, who drew out of him that he had managed to save or borrow some five hundred dollars, with which he paid for a course of instruction in the Wright School of Aviation at Dayton.

This equipped, and with no other qualifications but an intense desire to help, he sailed for England. Mr. Culbertson was able to be of considerable assistance to him with the recruiting officers in London, who, Mr. Kell said, were not disposed to do very much for him.

Lieutenant Hobbs, who is a Canadian, has received a letter of congratulation from Admiral Sir John Jellicoe and a recommendation for the Victoria Cross. Hobbs has certainly "done something."

The Associated Press account follows: Hamilton, Ont., July 19.—Destruction single handed of a German submarine and then of a Zeppelin by Lieutenant Basil D. Hobbs of the royal flying corps, is described in advices received here today by his relatives.

The exploits which have earned him a letter of congratulation from Admiral Jellicoe and recommendation for the Victoria Cross, were accomplished from a seaplane.

DRAFT NUMBERS WILL BE DRAWN AT 9:30 A.M. FRIDAY

1,374,000 MEN WILL BE CALLED FOR EXAMINATION

By Associated Press. Washington, July 19.—Ten million men are registered in the United States for war service—38,000 are needed in the first call for the national army.

Since the average district exemption registration is three thousand and there are 457 districts the average number of men listed for each operation of the drawing machinery will be about 3,000. Provost Marshal General Crowder announced that local boards will be instructed to call 200 per cent of their quota at the first call to provide for probable exemptions. That means that 1,374,000 men will be notified to appear for examination within the next few days.

If more are necessary they will be called on as needed by the local board in the order provided for in the drawing.

In some districts the 100 per cent allotment for exemption may be too large and in others too small but the local board is instructed in every case to continue calling for men until the district quota is filled. Each state government is now allotting to the districts their respective portions of the state's quota.

Secretary Baker and other cabinet officers and members of the House military committees will witness the drawing. Provost Marshal General Crowder counts upon finishing in 11 1/2 hours more than an hour, the entire process which will be the order of stability of appearance before the local exemption board of the men drafted.

Just how the drawing is to be conducted to establish the order of liability for appearing before local exemption boards of each of the ten million men registered for war service was disclosed today for the first time by the provost marshal general's office.

There will be two drawings, one of numbers from 1 to 1,000 and another of from cipher to 10 to form also called master key by which the thousand numbers drawn will reach every man in every district.

There are 4,557 exemption districts with an average of about 3,000 registrants in each. The largest has more than 10,000 registered and the smallest only 100.

In each district each registrant has been given a serial number written upon his card in red ink. For districts with not more than 1,000 registrants the drawing of 1,000 numbers will fix the order in which the numbers are to be drawn. The master key will establish the order in which the 898 added to 1,000, 2,000 and so on up the largest number of thousands in the district shall be placed on the local lists with the number 898.

Out of the 10,000,000 registered 687,000 are wanted now for the war duty. As this is estimated that 50 per cent of the men called before the board will be directed to call double the number of its quota for examination in order that their numbers appear in the district list after the drawing. Originally the master key numbers were fixed at one from cipher to 2 on the opinion that the largest district in the country would have less than 1,000 registrants.

Application of the master key makes it possible to apply fairly each one of the 1,000 numbers drawn to districts with more than 1,000 registrants. As a number is drawn it will be added to each of the thousands in excess of each 1,000 in each district. For instance, if 25 is the first number drawn it will represent 25, 1,025, 2,025, 3,025, 4,025, 5,025, 6,025, 7,025, 8,025, and 9,025.

By applying the master key the numbers which the numbers will be listed in each district will be determined. If the drawing of 10 numbers for the key should result this way, 9, 7, 1, 5, 2, 3, 0, 8, 4, 6, then the drawing of 25 as the first number of the thousand would fix the first men to appear before the exemption board in this order, 9, 25, 7, 025, 1, 025, 5, 025, 2, 015, 3, 025, 25, 8, 025, 4, 025 and 6, 025.

The district with more than 9,000 registrants will thus have 10 of its men assigned at the head of its list with 9,025.

The district having less than 1,000 will have one 25 at the head of the list.

FIFTY DOLLAR FINES ASSESSED FOR SPEEDING

Speeding has now become an almost prohibitive extravagance. Last Monday evening two boys put on a race on Lamar street, with the result that they were fined fifty dollars each this morning in the police court.

The authorities announced this morning that all other apprehended for the same offense would hereafter be assessed the same amount. The officers say that they are determined to put a stop to speeding and racing, and as it was found that the nominal fines imposed heretofore had no effect upon the drivers, fifty dollars has been agreed upon by the city officials as the fine hereafter.

The joy and privilege of getting drunk, however, is at present the same price in the police court. Three drunks were fined the customary five this morning. Whether this adventure will be by and by become as costly as speeding has not so far transpired.

There are surviving the husband, four children, one of them a two weeks old baby, and mother and father, of the immediate family.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones and family have made Wichita Falls their home since January 1 this year and during that time have made many friends, whom the news of the death of the wife and mother comes as a shock and a source of grief. The sympathy of their friends and acquaintances are with the bereaved family.

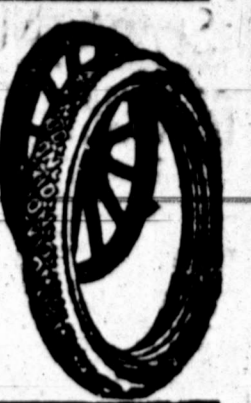

ALLOWANCE OF 30 CENTS A DAY FOR NAT. GUARD

REMAINDER OF EXPENSE OF CAR-ING FOR MEN WILL BE BORNE BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Frank Kell has received a wire from General Hulen stating that an allowance of thirty cents per day has been authorized by the State for the maintenance of the men of the National Guard who shall be accepted by the Federal government; said allowance to be in operation on and after July 17.

From this it will be seen that the Chamber of Commerce has undertaken a very onerous expense in agreeing to look after the men here from the time of their enlistment to the time that the State should take over their charge. The entire burden of the expense has been borne by the Chamber for almost four weeks, and to this must be added the amount of expense over and above the thirty cents per day per man which will be incurred between July and the time of mustering in by the Federal government. The Chamber of Commerce, however, feels that, having undertaken the matter, it must see it through, and that it could hardly find a more patriotic use for its funds.

RAINFALL OF OVER AN INCH ON THURSDAY A. M.

PRECIPITATION GENERAL OVER NORTHWEST TEXAS AND SOUTHWESTERN OKLA.

More than an inch, and a quarter of rain fell in Wichita this morning. The precipitation at 8 o'clock was one and two-tenths inches. Rain was still falling when the gauge was read.

Rainfall was general over northwestern Texas and southwestern Oklahoma, reports received at the railroad offices here indicate. The Fort Worth and Denver had reports from as far as Childress indicating rains over the intervening territory of about the same amount as here.

CHANCES OF ADVANCEMENT FOR ENLISTED MAN

The life, training, and chances of advancement of the enlisted man in the army are clearly set forth in the most intimate, chatty, and unofficial way, in a little pamphlet issued from the government printing office at Washington. The pamphlet is a series of articles, written by C. C. Lyon, a reporter on the staff of the Columbus "Citizen" who enlisted in the ranks for the purpose of telling his experiences. The United States government, however, thought sufficiently well of the articles that they were collected and put into book form, and are being used as part of the recruiting literature.
After the usual description of the physical examinations, the drill, the food (which seems to have been as abundant as the drill), and so forth, Mr. Lyon indulges in some interesting speculation on the value of training from an abstract standpoint—which he apparently considers as important as the concrete. He makes particular mention of the personal cleanliness of the men, and of the necessity of it. Quoting an officer, he says: "The first thing a soldier must learn is cleanliness of body, how to appear neat and soldierly in his clothes, and how to behave himself inside and outside the post." He is emphatic on the fact that in the army, as in civil life, a man gets out of it exactly what he puts into it. He speaks of the bracing, exhilarating effect of the drill, and of the stimulation of the ambition of many of the men, which he thinks

is due to the orderly life, and from the fact that every man is, and must be, constantly working to a appointed end, and improving himself to that end. The end, of course, is the efficient soldier. But there are many grades; and one immediate object is no sooner accomplished than the next looms ahead, urging him on to fresh effort.
Speaking at the end of his paper on the kind of men the army wants, he quotes a high official as saying: "If a young fellow hasn't the stuff in him to justify us in promoting him to the non-commissioned ranks, he'd better quit the army after his first enlistment." The army, he says, is no place for a loafer. The army, like every other modern business, wants only the men who have the interest of the concern sufficiently at heart that they are willing to work hard, to qualify for promotion, and give back to Uncle Sam something for his investment in them. Mr. Lyon does not agree with the view that anybody will do for the army. The army, he thinks, should have the very finest men obtainable. The fellow who is simply looking for a place to put in time can certainly be used in the army; but he will never be much credit to it, any more than he would be to a business house. But the man who is intelligent, ambitious, and hard-working, can hope to become an officer in a comparatively short time—in some cases, two years.
