A Woodland Clinic was conducted on Billy Joe Mitchell's property north of Pecan Bayou. All FFA Chapters and 4-H Clubs were represented in the various contests.

The Field Day sponsored by the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District has become an annual affair. James E. Pearce, S&WCD chairman stated "This is one of our district's educational activities for school aged youth".

What Sin Does

 Scripture. For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. (Romans 6:23)

Introduction. There is no area of our lives which sin and Satan do not desire to enter. The Bible is a mirror in which the reader can see how sin with its destructive force has moved into every phase of man's life and left a trail of sorrow, suffering, and death, the results of sin is death.

1. Sin Mars The Individual
 When sin captures an individual his life is marred. Sin always scars and damages a life. This is why sin has been called the saddest word in the world. One of the most attractive personalities in the old Testament was Saul, the first king of Israel. He was a tall man of fine appearance. He was outstanding in any gathering. He was moral, courageous, and humble, the kind of man people will follow.

All went well with King Saul until sin moved in to mar his life. He began to depend upon himself rather than upon God. He became proud of himself. When he lost his throne, he became angry. He even turned against his son and his friend, David. Later he was forsaken by his old friend Samuel. Saul turned to witchcraft (1 Samuel 28:9).

Sin does not respect any person regardless of his abilities or his station in life. The rich and poor, young and old, strong and weak are all within the range of sin's attack. Sin also marred the life of one of Jesus' disciples. Satan does not hesitate to march into this intimate circle and strike down Peter (Luke 22:54-62). It was night. A man was seated by a fire. It was Peter who had voiced the great confession in answer to a question which Jesus had asked about himself (Matt. 16:16-18). But now Peter was in the steel grip of sin and he denied his Lord. Sin stalks

every person and will move in to mar and ruin whenever an opportunity is presented. Sin spares no one.

2. Sin Mars A Home

The home is a sacred institution. The influence and leadership of the home reach to the ends of the earth. The Bible tells the story of a home which was marred by the entrance of sin in the guise of murder (Gen. 4:8-15). There is the record of Cain and Abel. The heart of Cain was black with sin of envy. This sin grew as sin always does. Cain became consumed with hatred and he killed his brother to mark the pages of the Bible with murder. Thus it was that in the early part of human history a home was marred by the presence of sin which resulted in the destroying of a life. How well we remember the story Jesus told in (Luke 15: 11-32). Two boys lived in a home with their father. Perhaps all had been well in this home until the sin of selfishness grasped the heart of

the younger boy and he requested his inheritance so that he might go away and live as he desired. The older son remained at home reproved the father for the feast which was given to welcome the prodigal. What was the cause of the friction in this home? The answer is sin. The same is true in many homes today.

3. Sin Mars A Church

Farmers Price Squeeze Tightens

Texas farmers and ranchers are losing ground where it hurts the most—in net income. That's the indication for 1977 from preliminary estimates compiled by county program building committees and marketing specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Although our assessment shows a small increase in cash receipts by Texas farmers and ranchers in 1977, net income will be down," contends Dr. Carl Anderson, an Extension marketing economist. "Cash receipts from crops and livestock should reach the \$6.7 billion mark, up from \$6.3 billion in 1976. But net income should fall below the \$931 million earned in 1976, which was less than half the \$2.1 billion net income in 1973."

Anderson cites the higher costs of machinery, fuel, labor, interest, taxes and other production inputs as the culprit that is absorbing net income. "The total outlay for production items has increased by an

average yearly rate of more than 11 percent since 1970," he notes.

"The financial plight of agricultural producers is even more severe when inflation is taken into account," emphasizes Anderson. "Because of the rapid run-up in the cost-of-living, a dollar of income in 1977 purchased, on the average, slightly less than two-thirds the goods and services it would in 1973."

"Particularly hard hit by the cost-price squeeze during 1977 were crop farmers. Cotton and grain producers, especially those on irrigated farms, suffered the worst income crunch," notes the economist. The plight resulted from a drop in crop prices that was compounded by increasing costs of production. Wheat, for instance, averaged \$2.25 a bushel, down from \$3.16 a bushel in 1976. Sorghum growers received \$3.27 per hundredweight in 1977 compared to \$4.06 the previous year. And cotton farmers saw

the average price of their crop plummet from 69 cents per pound last March to 46 cents in November. Rice was one of the few crops showing some improvement over 1976.

As far as livestock producers were concerned, the cost-price squeeze changed little during 1977, Anderson points out. Texas producers received an average price of 33 cents per pound for all beef cattle, about the same as in 1976. Hog prices slipped from 41 cents per pound in 1976 to 38 cents. Egg prices averaged lower and milk prices were generally unchanged while lamb, broiler, turkey and wool prices were slightly higher.

What does 1978 hold? "It's only fair to say that the cost-price squeeze will continue to plague our agricultural producers," contends Anderson, "causing debts to pile up and driving many smaller operators out of business."

Wildlife Needs You

"Wildlife Needs You" is the theme of the 1978 National Wildlife Week March 19-25.

The conservation endeavor is sponsored by the National Wildlife Foundation with the help of the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, Inc.

Charles VanDeaver, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Clarksville, said his agency is cooperating with the observance by offering publications about wildlife to interested people.

"All of us in SCS have a keen appreciation of wildlife", VanDeaver said. "Wildlife provides esthetic, environmental, economic, and other benefits. Since they need food, cover and water, the best way to help wildlife is to provide adequate habitat."

Most wildlife in Texas inhabits privately owned farms and ranches, VanDeaver said. This land provides hunting, fishing, trapping, and other values inherent in a well-balanced landscape and the fish and wildlife it supports. For that reason, farmers and ranchers play a key role in maintaining wildlife populations.

VanDeaver said the following publications can be obtained from his office:

Invite Birds to your Home—This booklet lists 20 plants that can be grown in conservation landscape plantings in Texas and gives the number of bird species that use each variety. Making Land Produce Useful Wildlife—How to install conservation measures on farm and ranch land to benefit wildlife is the theme of this pamphlet.

Catfish Farming—This USDA publication, written by four SCS biologists, tells how to grow channel catfish, blue catfish, and white catfish in ponds, raceways, or cages.

Conservation Practices—Signs of Good Hunting and Fishing—This pamphlet gives tips to hunters on how to recognize the conservation practices that are signs of good wildlife land.

Russian Olive for Wildlife and Other Conservation Uses—Tells how to grow this small tree that produces food eaten by more than 50 birds and animals; adapted to dry, cool climates.

Autumn Olive for Wildlife and Other Conservation Uses—

New Reservoir Will Be Bass Hot-Spot

Stocking a lake which contains no water may seem odd at first, but to the Parks and Wildlife Department it's just planning ahead.

A soon-to-be-impounded reservoir in East Texas called Lake Fork will flood 140 acres of existing tanks, ponds and lakes. P&WD biologist Steve Smith realized these small bodies of water could serve as "mini-hatcheries" for fish in the meantime.

Lake Fork will cover 27,690 acres and spill into three counties—Wood, Hopkins and Rains. Although it is not on the map yet, it can be approximated west of Quitman parallel to Highway 154.

Construction of the dam will be completed in July, and the lake will begin filling immediately. The Sabine River Authority, controlling agency of the reservoir, estimates the lake will fill in six months to a year, depending on rainfall.

Almost before it completely fills, Lake Fork will be an outstanding bass and catfish lake, said Smith.

Last fall P&WD fisheries personnel with the Sabine River Authority chemically removed all fish from these ponds.

Approximately 75 acres have already been stocked with channel catfish fingerlings and another 62 acres are presently being stocked with Florida bass broodfish.

"These brooders average more than two pounds each, and they will spawn this spring in predator-free ponds," he explained.

Four ponds of bass, however, are adjacent to the reservoir and will not be inundated when Lake Fork fills. The SRA will install pipes and valves to release fish from the ponds into the reservoir.

"These will be permanent nursery areas which can be used in the future if additional stockings are necessary," Smith said.

Besides Florida bass and channel catfish, other species of fish will not be introduced into Lake Fork. P&WD biologists say the lake is ideally suited for black bass and that

VanDeaver said SCS has a small staff of biologists especially trained in wildlife and fisheries that he can call on to help him assist landowners improve their wildlife habitat. Anyone wanting this type of help should call the telephone number listed above.

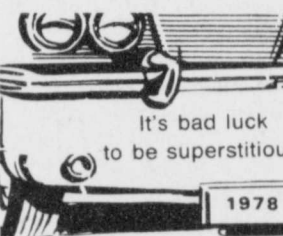

Medicare Disability Paid

Medicare is for people over age 65, but it is also for people who have drawn disability checks for two years from Social Security and for people with chronic renal (kidney) disease. Medicare has two Sections, Part A which covers hospital bills and Part B which covers other medical bills.

The types of services that are covered remains basically the same but the costs keep changing. When you enter the hospital you pay a deductible which is now \$144.00. Then it pays for all covered services through the first 60 days after that an additional \$36.00 per day is paid by the patient through 90 days.

The deductible under Part B remains at \$60.00 per year and then Medicare pays 80 per cent of the reasonable charges. The premium payments keep rising and will go to \$8.50 per month effective 7-1-78. Included under Part B are doctors charges, out-patient hospital services, independent laboratories, ambulance transportation, prosthetic devices and rental or purchase of durable medical equipments.

There are limited services for mental illness, chiropractors, podiatrists and dental care. Radiology and pathology services are covered 100 per cent for in-patient hospital but are counted as regular Part B services for patients outside the hospital.

The Hospitals and Home Health Services are required to file claims for services rendered by them, but for other charges either the patient or the provider of services may file. Time limits on Part B services rendered before 10-01-76 has expired, but you have until 12-31-76 to file for services from 10-01-76 to 09-30-77. The Social Security Offices encourages you to file timely and will be happy to assist anyone with their claims.

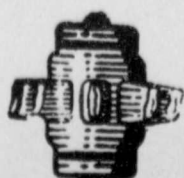

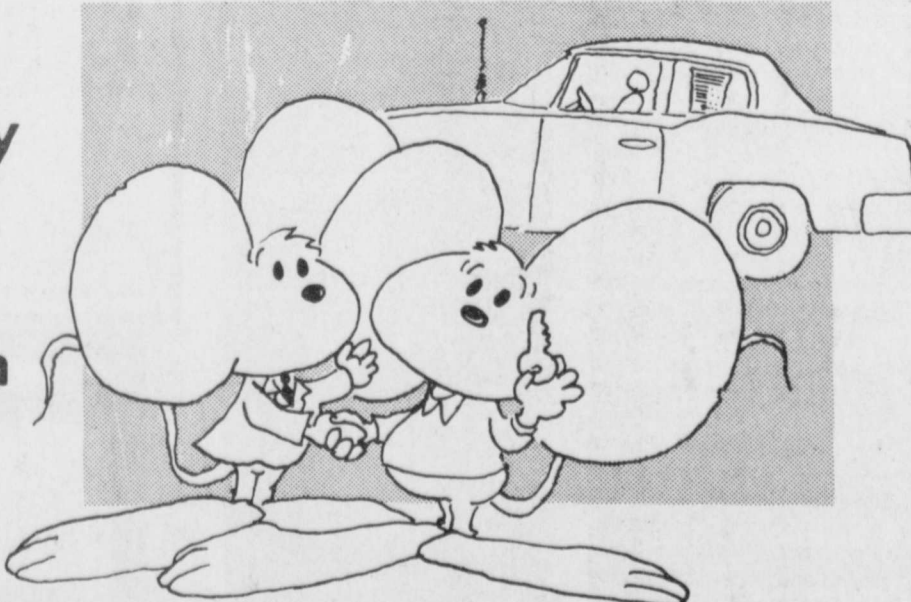
