## Round Top renovation evaluated by Council

The city has assigned a committee of councilmen to evaluate the mechanics of restoring the Round Top which has been described as a landmark of this town and of the West Texas area.

A presentation at Tuesday nights city council meeting requested that the city accept the donation of the property from J. O. Dockrey and provide Motel Tax Funds to begin the historical restoration and preservation of the site.

The S.O.R.T. (Save Our Round

Top) committee has been looking into the possibility of renovating the Round Top which has been described as a landmark of this town and of the West Texas area.

"At present," said Glenna Garrett, "it is little more than an eyesore and it deserves to be more than that because the Round Top is a significant part of Colorado City's social history."

"When it was first built, it was

uniquely structured building that became the gathering place for more than one generation of young people," she said.

"Since we have announced our intentions, many people have encouraged us in this endeavor and shared their memories, making us feel more strongly than before that the Round Top could and should again become a part of Colorado City."

## Chapter II funds budgeted

A public hearing was held by the Colorado Independent School District (ISD) on Monday night to receive input on the use of Federal Chapter II Funds for the 1992-1993 school year.

In order to make application for the funds, Colorado ISD consulted with the parents of participating children, teachers and administrators

of the school system.

The district is entitled to \$10,500 of funds through the Chapter II program, said Curriculum Facilitator Kitten Arthur.

Budget plans for this money includes computer programs for the Gifted and Talented (GT) program, supplies for a humanities course at

the high school, advanced training for teachers and a writing workshop to be held locally.

Computer software for the GT program has been budgeted for three Colorado ISD campuses including Kelley, Hutchinson and Colorado Middle School at a cost of \$500 per campus.

## CISD buys computers through bond program

IBM computers which school board trustees recently approved purchasing for the Colorado Independent School District's (ISD) campuses will be funded through a bond program.

Business Manager Geneva Findley presented the school board trustees with information on a Capital Acquisition Plan that is available to the district as an alternative to more expensive financing.

The \$483,000 purchase is part of the recently approved 5 year

Technology Plan that will put computers at Colorado ISD campuses this next school year.

By funding the computers through the purchase of bonds, the debt repayment will come from the I&S (Interest & Sinking) fund of the tax roll.

The repayment of the bond program will be automatically built into the budget process and will cause the I&S portion of school taxes to be increased approximately 4-cents -- from 7.5 to 11.5-cents.

Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) makes the plan

available for purchases of assets such as computers at a low rate of interest.

The rate to be charged the district for this bond program is 5.12-percent.

Colorado ISD will pay the IBM purchase off over a scheduled 6-year period, according to the plan approved on Monday night.

School board members indicated that it is hoped that the Maintenance & Operations portion of the school tax might be decreased accordingly.

## Tutoring sessions to begin Monday

Tutoring sessions will be conducted at Colorado High School beginning next week for students scheduled to take the upcoming TAAS and TEAMS tests.

The tutorial sessions will be offered free of charge at Colorado High School to any Mitchell County student who will be taking either the TAAS or TEAMS test this summer.

## Interviews scheduled with coach applicants

Interviews have been scheduled by the members of the search committee with 10 of the head football coach/athletic director position applicants.

The search committee has scheduled interviews with the applicants during the week of June 16-20.

From these interviews the search committee plans to present three names to fill the position to the school board, who will make the final decision.

The committee hopes to present their final list to the board trustees before June 30.

The Colorado Independent School District (ISD) committee which was organized to search for a new head football coach/athletic director, recently met to narrow the field of 58 applications which had been received.

Superintendent Don Nimmo said that 71 requests for applications had been received by the Colorado ISD and that 58 applications had been received before the application deadline.

The field of applicants includes coaches with experience in every level of football programs, said Supt. Nimmo.

The range of applicants includes college coaches, college assistant coaches, junior college head coaches, head coaches at class 4A-1A schools and assistant coaches at class 5A-3A schools.

Members of the football coach search committee include Don Nimmo, James McSwain, Jesse Munoz, Larry Blassingame, Roxie Strain, David Woods and Bob Reily.

## Ranch Tour set Friday

The '1st Annual Mitchell County Ranch Tour' will be held on Friday, June 12. The event will be one of the highlights of 'Ranch Month' which is being recognized throughout the month of June.

The ranch tour will recognize the progressive ranch operations in Mitchell County.

Holders of the free Ranch Tour tickets will meet at the Colorado City Civic Center at 7:30 a.m. at which time they will be offered coffee and doughnuts.

The first stop of the tour will be at the Maddox Ranch, where the father-son operation of Joe and Dalton Maddox will explain the ranches history and explain grazing methods which are used at the ranch.

The improvements which have resulted from the use of the intensive grazing systems will be explained and how the ecological system is benefited from the program.

The next stop on the Ranch Tour will be at Bill Everett's '96 Ranch.'

At this stop those on the tour will hear of the history of the ranch.

Also speaking at the '96 Ranch' will be Dr. Alfred Vardeman, who will speak about current animal health issues and David Stubblefield, the county's American Breeders Society (ABS) representative, who will speak about artificial insemination (AI).

## Appraisal Review Board to hear taxpayer appeals

The Appraisal Review Board (ARB) of Mitchell County will meet to examine and equalize the appraisal records and to hear taxpayer appeals.

The board will meet beginning at 10 a.m. on Friday, June 12, to hear and determine appeals concerning minerals and utilities that are on the Mitchell County tax roll.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, June 16-17, the board will convene

to hear and determine appeals concerning real estate and personal property.

The ARB will remain in session until all tax appraisals have been equalized and approved and all timely filed appeals have been heard and resolved.

Members serving on the county's ARB include Bobby Lemons, chairman; Mike Hemphill, vice chairman; and Stanley Hackfeld, secretary.

## BSSH/Mitchell County agreement discussed

Concerns of costly state-mandates and the county's decreasing revenues were expressed by county commissioners in a discussion with a state administrator.

The discussion centered around the current agreement between the Big Spring State Hospital and the Commissioners Court, to provide Mental Health and Mental Retardation (MHMR) services in Mitchell County.

"We're trying to give all the service we can at a reasonable fee," said Commissioner Bill Preston. "The state is mandating expenditures, but not giving us a source to generate the necessary revenue to fund their mandates."

The Mitchell County MHMR facility currently handles an active case-load of between 90 and 100

people, said Davis Wilson of Sweetwater, who is the regional administrator for a five county area that includes Mitchell, Scurry, Nolan, Garza and Runnels Counties.

Budget requirements for the facility which include the staffing and expenses the state provides in support of the unit are in excess of \$150,000 per year, Wilson said.

State guidelines mandate that the county provide 15-percent of the funding for a local facility, he said.

Mitchell County's contributions, which are reported to the state in an annual report of the local MHMR facility include funding of \$13,600, said Wilson.

Approximately half -- \$6400 -- of this funding is considered in-kind and takes into consideration the See BSSH, page 2

## Site based decision making explained

Site based decision making forces people to be responsible for their decisions and is the best thing that could ever happen to a school district, said Curriculum Facilitator Kitten Arthur as she presented a report on the program at Monday's public meeting.

"The system works on the belief that those closest to the problem

have an idea of how best to solve it," said Arthur. "This is a way to really affect education in a positive way!"

Colorado Independent School District (ISD) trustees approved the report at the conclusion of the public meeting and will forward the plan to the state as required.

A district-wide site based

management team put together the plan which involves liaison council groups which discuss problems and recommend actions to an executive council.

The system being used to hire a new football coach/athletic director was cited as an example of site based management, where people from the community join district staffers and school board members to arrive at a decision.

Site based management involves more than one person making a decision that involves many people.

The goals and plans of the program instituted in the Colorado ISD this past year were presented at the hearing.

The state requires that an approved plan be submitted by September 1.

building which the county allows the facility to use for office space.

"We have to work together to save money," said Commissioner Buddy Hertenberger, "it's tough and going to cost money!"

Commissioners said that intangibles are included by the county to cover such costs as maintaining the grounds and repairs to the building were not represented by the \$13,600 and that the true amount would be closer to \$19,000 for the space and utilities which the county provides to the center.

As a result of the discussion Wilson said that he would provide the state with the information of the actual expenses incurred by the county at the facility, will attempt to provide janitorial service at the location and will seek state funding for two phone extensions which are needed at the office.

The county agrees in the 1989 contract to furnish office space, utilities, office equipment and supplies for the center and in return the hospital will provide the staffing required to offer mental health services in Mitchell County.

## SSA should be notified of address

Any current Social Security beneficiary who has changed his or her address and not notified the Social Security Administration needs to do so now in order to ensure that benefits do not stop. Also, if a beneficiary's address has been changed to accommodate the emergency 911 number, the new address must be reported to Social Security.

If mail is returned to Social Security, the agency will make every attempt to locate the beneficiary. If all efforts fail, benefits will be suspended until the beneficiary contacts the Social Security Administration with a correct address.

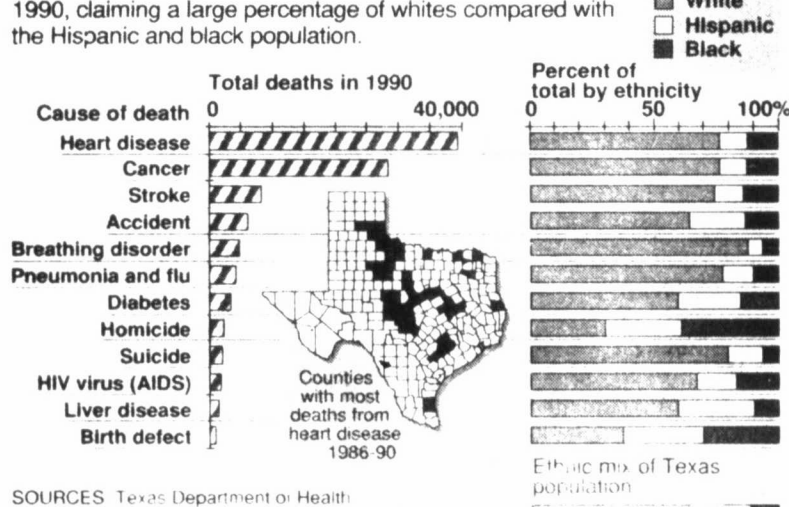

# CHIEF LONE WOLF

Why in the world did the folks in Loraine and Cuthbert want to close the only pool hall in Mitchell County? And did the action prompt Sheriff G. B. Coughran to resign?

The year was 1913 and if you enjoy a good mystery, you'll love this one.

It all began when Sheriff Coughran and others presented a petition to the Mitchell County Commissioners court asking for a special election to determine if pool halls should be prohibited.

The commissioner's minutes reflect that the "petition contained the signatures of more than 10% of the qualified voters of Mitchell County."

But why close Mr. Robinson's pool hall in Colorado (City)? (Sorry, no first name available for Robinson). And, who was this guy Coughran, anyway?

Let's answer the last question first. G. B. Coughran was first elected sheriff in 1908. And he was popular enough to get elected every two years until 1914. Pretty popular fella.

Now, Robinson's pool hall was not a community problem. "The one here has been run in a most orderly manner," the Colorado Record observed. And it was noted Robinson's pool hall was "free from the objectionable features so universally associated with pool halls." (You'll have to use your imagination on that).

The Record concluded "it had never heard one word of complaint against the pool hall except on the most general principals; it diverted money that might go to better purposes."

Hmmm, where have we heard that one before?

Anyway, when election day (November 13, 1913) rolled around, the day passed quietly in Colorado City. The voter turnout was very light.

But, Cuthbert and Loraine flocked to the polls! The proposal to close the pool hall was approved by a combined vote of 96-6 in those two communities. And that was more than enough to settle the issue. The final count was 196-138, a difference of only 58 votes.

The other rural areas joined the Cuthbert/Loraine tandem in condemning the pool hall. (Remember, only men voted in 1913 as woman's suffrage has not yet been approved, but it's safe to assume some of those votes reflected the views of wives).

So, scratch the pool hall. Poor Mr. Robinson indicated he would accept the voters edict.

"He does not desire to conduct his business where the voters say they prefer he would not," was the noble way the Record put it.

The mystery of why Mitchell County's pool hall was closed could end there, but like all good "who-dunits," this real life drama has an unusual twist.

Sheriff Coughran resigned from office seven months later. Did the pool hall controversy play a role in the lawman's departure? In a letter of resignation he said he has "exchanged my property here for property in Ft. Worth."

That really doesn't tell us much. And then he added, "even now I am looking forward to a time when I can return to this county and make my home among you."

Kinda makes you wonder, right?

The complete reason G. B. Coughran resigned after being elected sheriff three times is probably lost with the passage of time. But, read a few more lines from his letter of resignation.

"I have tried to have only one object in view in all my acts as an officer and that is, the enforcement of the law.

"I bear no ill will for those who have opposed me and I only ask that they try to co-operate with my successors, instead of opposing them."

One last thought; it wasn't until 1963 the state of Texas legalized pool halls on a local option basis. If the ban was never lifted locally, and there are indications it wasn't, then to this good day pool halls are still against the law in Mitchell County.

Reckon Mr. Robinson would wanta try his luck again?

## FRESH FRUIT PIZZA

1 (14 oz) can sweetened condensed milk  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1 tsp vanilla  
1/2 cup margarine, softened  
1/4 cup packed brown sugar  
1 cup unsifted flour  
1/4 cup quick cooking oats  
1/4 cup chopped walnuts  
Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

FILLING: In medium mixing bowl, combine sweetened condensed milk, sour cream, lemon juice and vanilla. Mix well. Chill for 1 hour or more.

CRUST: In large mixer bowl, beat margarine and sugar until fluffy; add

flour, oats and walnuts. Mix well. On lightly greased pizza pan or round quiche dish, press dough into 12 inch circle, forming rim around edge. Prick with fork. Bake 10-12 minutes or until slightly brown. Cool.

Spoon filling evenly over crust. Arrange bananas, strawberries, kiwi and pineapple on top. Chill before serving.

## Y. Molina attends LAC meeting

The Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Legislative Advisory Council (LAC), of which Yolanda Molina of Colorado ISD is a member, met May 16 and finalized its recommendations for the Association's Legislative Program for 1993.

The 102-member council, composed of school board members elected from TASB's 20 regional councils, has been working to develop a statewide legislative platform for the Association to use when the Legislature returns to Austin in January 1993.

This winter, school board members from Region 14 elected Molina to represent them on the TASB Legislative Advisory Council. Board members in each of the Association's 20 regional councils met this January and February to finalize their regional legislative programs and to elect their LAC members.

The 102-member LAC was charged with reviewing the regional program and consolidating them into a single, statewide platform for TASB. The result of the LAC's meetings was a series of position statements on education issues ranging from school finance to taxation, school governance to personnel. The group's recommended legislative platform now goes to the TASB Legislative Committee and Board of Trustees in July for final approval.

Once approved, TASB's 1993 Legislative Program will be used by Association staff in developing and reacting to legislation during the next regular session of the Texas Legislature beginning in January 1993.

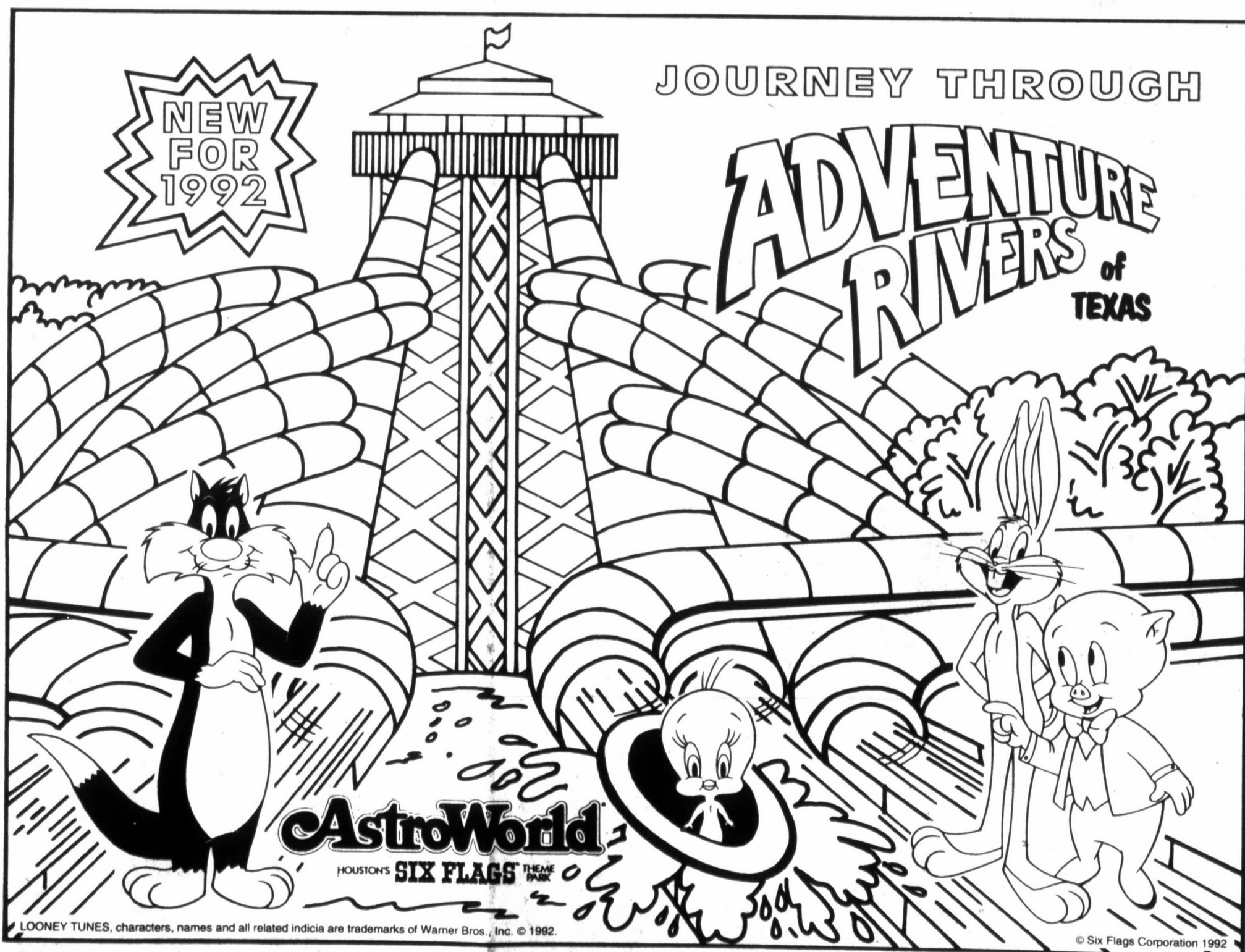

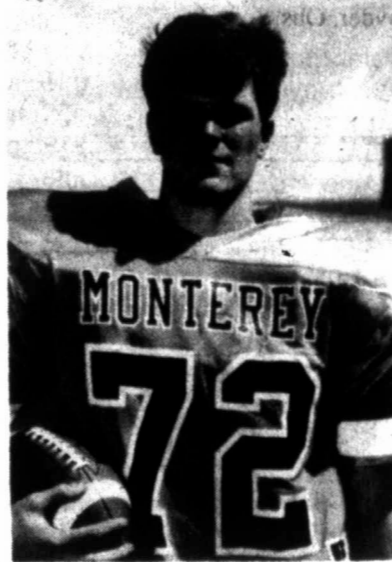

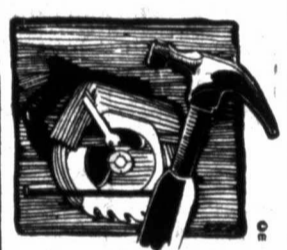

**MONEY TALK**

**Q. Recently, I received a phone call from someone telling me I could apply for a low-interest credit card. Along with other vital information, the caller asked for my bank account number. I was reluctant to give it out and questioned him. He hung up. Could this have been a scam?**

**A. Since most consumers are now wary of telemarketers who ask for credit card numbers, fraudulent telemarketers are now targeting checking accounts. As bait, these con artists use a contest, a low-interest credit card or a free trip - anything that could require an account number. Your account number is imprinted on a**

"demand draft" which is processed just like a check.

A demand draft is used by insurance companies, mortgage lenders and other businesses to collect automatic drafts from your bank account. Since customers have agreed to these withdrawals in advance, the drafts do not require a signature.

To protect your bank account, the Federal Trade Commission and the Direct Marketing Association offer several tips. They suggest you never give out your account number or even a portion of it over the phone or in writing unless you are familiar with the company.

Check your monthly statement for any unauthorized withdrawals. Demand drafts will appear as unnumbered checks. If anything unusual appears on the statement, notify your bank or financial institution immediately.

## State of Texas announces new gambling help line

While May 29, marked the inauguration of the Texas Lottery and the fun and excitement that surrounds this event, it also marks the beginning of new services to assist Texans who may already be suffering from too much of a good thing.

The State of Texas, through the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse (TCADA), will provide services for problem and compulsive gamblers with the launching on Friday of a statewide 24-hour compulsive gambling help line, 1-800-742-0443. The funding for this and other planned compulsive gambling services is made possible by revenue gathered through the Texas Lottery and off-track horse race betting.

The legislation that created the Texas Lottery appropriates \$2 million per year from state General Revenue to the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for compulsive gambling prevention, intervention, treatment, and research programs. Changes to the Texas Racing Act will divert one-fourth of one percent (.25 percent) of simulcast revenues to TCADA for compulsive gambling prevention services. The statewide 24-hour help line is the first in a complement of services to address this addiction.

Bob Dickson, executive director of the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, says Texas has been given the opportunity to lead the nation in programming to help problem and compulsive gamblers. "In one motion, Texas has gone from no state program for this addiction to the largest amount of funding ever earmarked by any state for this purpose," he said. Dickson noted that Texas is one of only eight states to set aside funds for education on problem gambling and/or the treatment of compulsive gamblers.

Dickson noted that the foresight of the Lottery legislation, sponsored by Senator John Montford of Lubbock and

Representative Ron Wilson of Houston, is being recognized nationally, with the two legislators slated to receive awards from the National Council on Problem Gambling at it June 11-13 conference.

Texas' help line for compulsive gamblers will be conducted through a TCADA-funded contract with the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling Inc., a statewide program located in Dallas. Those calling 1-800-742-0443, which will be listed on the reverse side of every lottery ticket, will receive crisis counseling and referral services.

Sue Cox, director of the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling and one of the state's foremost authorities on problem gambling, says the compulsive gambler is already in Texas. "He or she is already betting on legal greyhound racing in the Valley and at Corpus, horses at Trinity Meadows, Manor, Fredericksburg or Bandera, playing bingo, betting on sports with a local bookie and flying off to Nevada or Atlantic City for quick hits at the casinos," Cox said. The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse has gathered survey information to determine the prevalence of problem and compulsive gambling before the Texas Lottery begins. Results of this survey are expected to be available in early Fall.

"The May 29 beginning of the Texas Lottery creates unique

opportunity for Texas," said Texas Comptroller John Sharp. "Not only is the Lottery a chance for fun, the revenue it produces will help the State of Texas finance programs to help people who have needed it."

In addition to the toll-free gambling help line, the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling will promote public awareness regarding the recognition and prevention of problem and compulsive gambling and will develop training for helping professionals. New TCADA regulations regarding licensure of chemical dependency counselors require that they receive compulsive gambling education, a change which should dramatically enhance the state's treatment resources for compulsive gamblers.
