Ochiltree County To Vote On Beer Question May 27

COUNTY-WIDE ELECTION ON BEER ISSUE

Commissioners Call Election On Presentation of Petition By Eligible Voters

Election On Saturday

Eligible Places and Judges Named For Each; Voting in All The Precincts

Voters of Ochiltree County will go to the polls on Saturday, May 27, to decide whether legal beer shall be authorized in the county, or whether the county remain in its present dry status. Judges and alternates have been appointed to hold the election in the precincts in the county.

The County Commissioners Court ordered the election in response to petition signed by eligible voters Ochiltree County, numbering at least ten per cent of the total vote in the last general election. The polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m.

Paul's Sincerity of Purpose

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for June 4
Text: Acts 21:40-22:4; 24:14-16;
26:19-23

IN bidding farewell to the elders of the church of Ephesus at Miletus, the seaport, Paul said, "Behold, I go bound in the spirit unto Jerusalem, not knowing the things that shall befall me there, save that the Holy Ghost witnesseth in every city, saying that bonds and afflictions abide me (Acts 20:22, 23).

A certain prophet, Agabus, had also taken Paul's girdle and bound with it his hands and his feet, symbolic of his prediction of what was awaiting Paul at Jerusalem.

It was under these circumstances that Paul made his great declaration of purpose, "But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God." These predictions had been fulfilled. Enemies of Paul made unjust and untrue accusations against him, saying that he had defiled the temple at Jerusalem, and had aroused the mob against him. He was in danger of his life, when he was rescued by the Roman chief captain and a detachment of soldiers. It was under these circumstances that Paul, having been permitted to speak by the Roman captain and making his defense to the people, gave the address of our lesson—one of the great autobiographical statements upon which we depend chiefly for our knowledge of the details of

Paul's life and for the clear conception of his religious experience, his outlook and purpose. Along with this is a passage from a similar defense of Paul before King Agrippa, when he told the experience of his conversion on the way to Damascus and described the course of his life and his innermost purpose as obedience to the Holy Spirit.

IN these addresses there stands forth above all things the sincerity of Paul, the intensity of the experience of the new life that had come to him, his deep love of the Christ who had saved him from an attitude of bigotry and hostility to his fellowmen and had given him the vision of a kingdom of truth. There is in all his defense no suggestion of hatred of those who are persecuting him, for Paul had learned above all things the deep lesson of Jesus that a Christian must love his enemies.

These addresses of Paul have a very intense meaning for our own time. Though Paul was following essentially what he believed to be the reality of truth and the religion of his fathers, he was accused of being a sectarian and a heretic. If one would learn the lesson of Paul's life and experience, he must learn to regard all sincere men with reasonableness and tolerance and with appreciation of their conscientious convictions. The story of Paul's life ought to make us unready to call any man a "heretic." The man whom we fail to understand may be the sincere apostle of the new and important emphasis on truth.

Beaver Pioneer Dies

J. W. Couch, age 82, Passed Away At His Home in Beaver On Wednesday, May 17

J. W. Couch, Beaver county pioneer and resident of Beaver, passed away at his home in Beaver Wednesday, May 17, following an illness of six weeks.

He was born in Milan, Missouri, July 7, 1857 where he grew to manhood and married Mary Elizabeth Davis in 1876. To this union were born seven children: Willie, who died in infancy; Cora Long, Wichita, Kansas; Nora Ford, Boyd; Jim Couch, Beaver, Flora Kaup, Riverside, California; Dora Wigton, Troutdale, Oregon; and Grant Couch of Boyd.

"Uncle Joe," as he was familiarly known, was prominent for many years in politics and held the position of state committeeman of the Republican party for several years. In 1883 he moved with his family to Harper county, Kansas, and in 1884 at the opening of the Cherokee strip moved his family into that section. Later in 1900 he moved back to Kansas and in 1906 came to Beaver county where he has resided since that time.

Uncle Joe had many close friends and neighbors in Beaver and in the county and his presence will be missed greatly by all.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at the Beaver Baptist church and interment made in the Beaver cemetery. — The Herald-Democrat.

DUMAS AFFAIR ON MAY 26-27

DUMAS TO FEATURE PIONEER DAYS IN BIG PARADE AT ITS CELEBRATION ON FRIDAY-SATURDAY

Dumas—Following a motorcade trip last week to Amarillo, Whitteer Panhandle, Pampa, Berger and Stinnett, where Dumas boosters were met with enthusiastic promises of huge delegations to their celebration May 26 and 27, final plans were being worked out here for a gala two-days.

Found in the line of march for the big opening parade, scheduled for 11 a. m., Friday, May 26, will be chuck-wagons, pack - trains, and mounted riders from some of the oldest ranch outfits of West Texas and New Mexico.

Prominent in the parade will be a huge Dalhart delegation, which will include all the pageantry and colorful trappings of the XIX, moving to stirring music by the big Dalhart High School Band. Determined to out-do Dalhart, will come Amarillo, under the personal leadership of Milton Cox, Tri-State Fair Secretary. Both Cox and John Colquitt, of Dalhart, President of the XIX Association are on the spot, as the losing leader is pledged to take an icy bath in a public dipping vat in Dumas at the end of an exciting day.

Visiting delegations are urged to plan an early arrival in Dumas on the morning of Friday, May 26, in order that the mile-long parade marshals may properly assemble the big, colorful spectacle before the 11 a. m. scheduled start.

A full three-hour program of stern competition for heavy contestant money will feature the rodeo from 2 to 5 p. m. on May 26 and 27. Top flight cow hands from the entire Southwest are entering the list daily. They will have their hands full with a tough aggregation of out-law horses, Brahma steers, and calves. Specialty trick riders, ropers, and clowns, will fill the performance with a varied repertoire of fun and amusement.

Competition will be keen for the cash prizes offered for visiting bands, best chuck-wagon outfit, and best dressed cow boy and cow girl. At night Mid-Way entertainers will compete with Old Settler's Square dances, and a grand frontier dance, staged nightly on the streets to the music of Hetrick's Rhythm Clowns of Amarillo.

Check Aerial Maps

Less Than Ten Per Cent of Maps Were Found to Be In Error By State AAA Official

W. E. Moore of the state office of the AAA at College Station was in Ochiltree county the past week checking over the aerial maps for errors made when obtaining the maps.

It was found that less than 10 per cent of the maps taken in this county were within 1 per cent of accuracy. In most cases they were as accurate as could actually be drawn by actual measurement.

County Agent E. W. Thomas states that the maps were used in checking compliance of county farmers in the 1938 Farm Program. This year was the first time aerial maps were used in Ochiltree county and proved very satisfactory and economical.

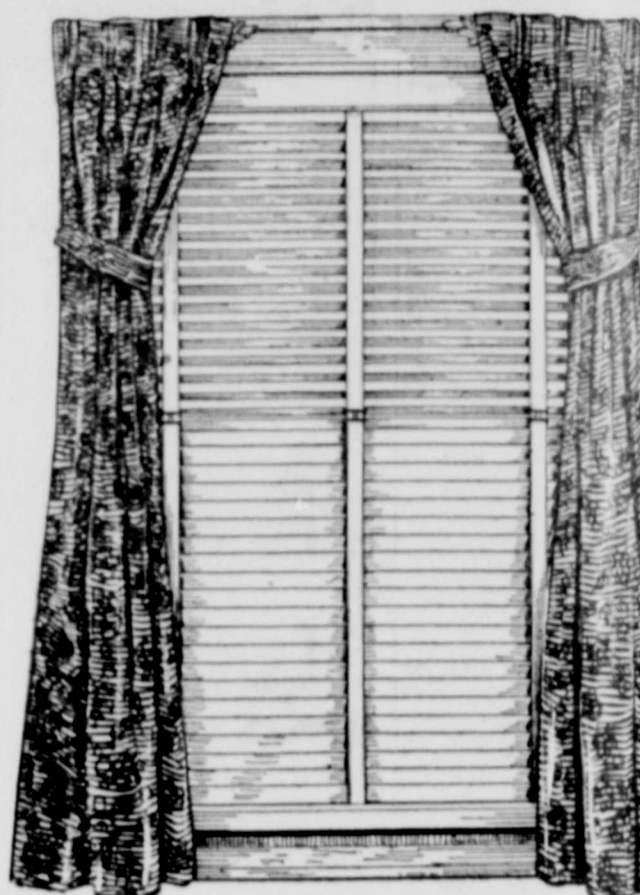

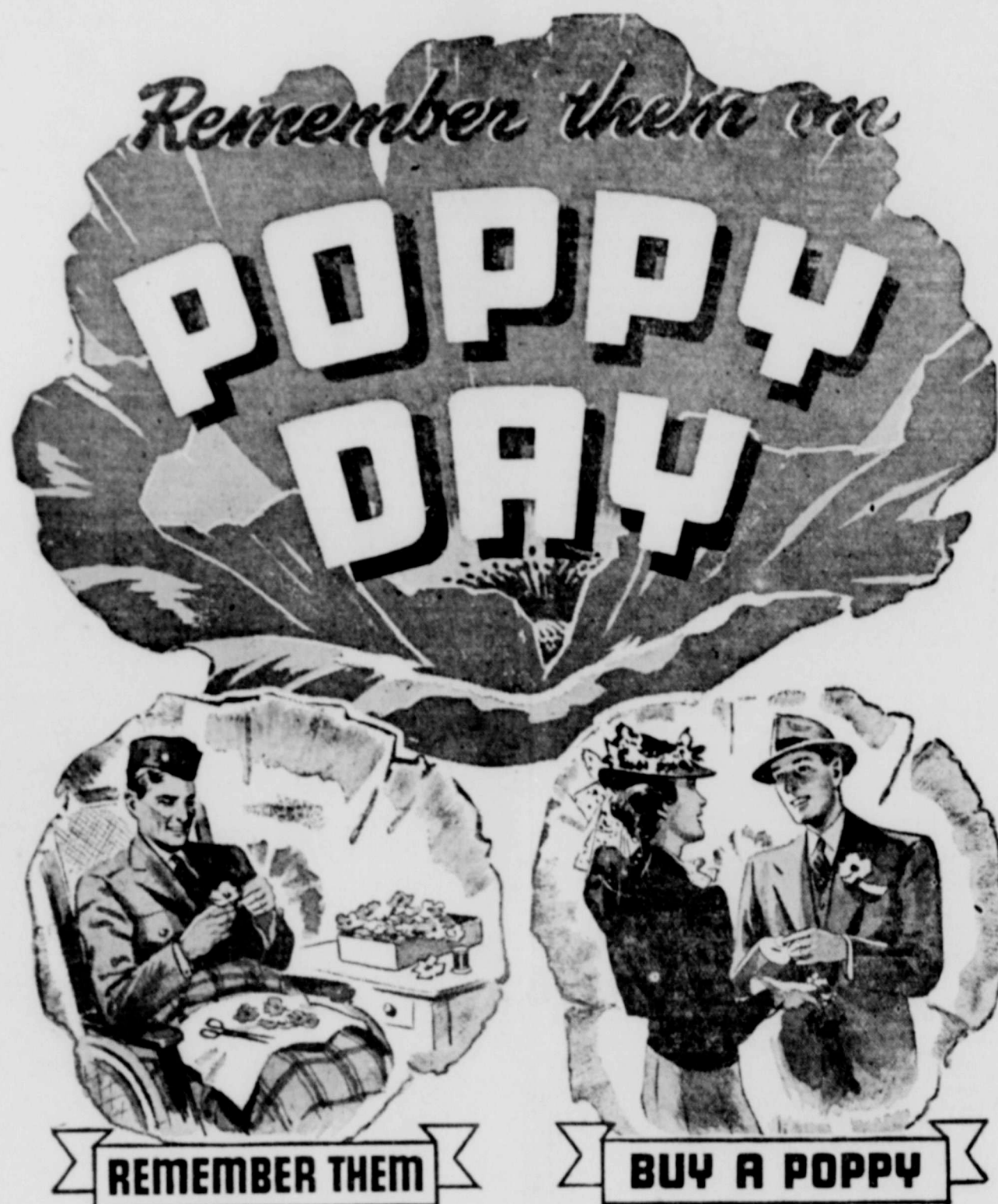

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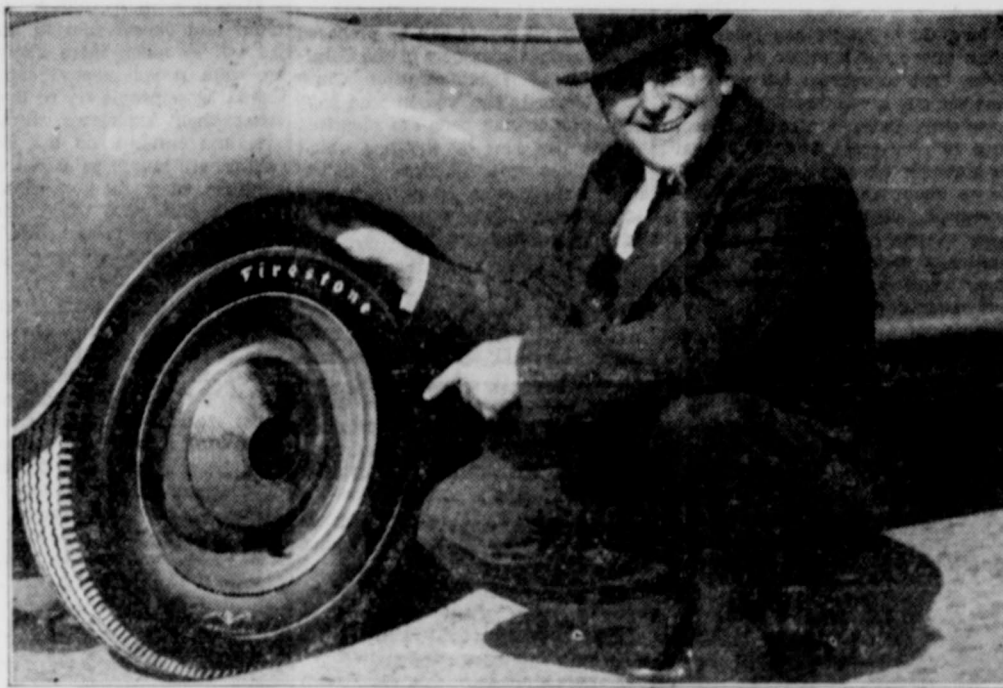

Cuttings Take Root

Home Demonstration Club Members Are Successful With Cutting Beds Here

Almost all plants can be prepared from cuttings, members of the Ochiltree Home Demonstration Club have learned. The women who have made the cutting beds are surprised at the per cent of cuttings which have taken root. All types of plants have been rooted. Ninety per cent of the cuttings placed in the bed have taken root.

Plants placed in the beds include those suited to this country, and many others which members are experimenting with. Chinese elm, lilac, cedar, forsythia, spirea, privet, mahonia, althaea, flowering willow, buck brush, arbor vitae, roses and many other plants have been successfully rooted. As soon as the plants have good roots, they will be removed to permanent places in the yards.

Most of the beds are tied with tin cans. They are filled with coarse sand and are protected from the drying effect of the wind and direct sun. Properly made cuttings are placed in beds about four inches deep and several inches apart.

Fourteen cutting beds have been made. The Missouri Avenue Home Demonstration Club leads with six.

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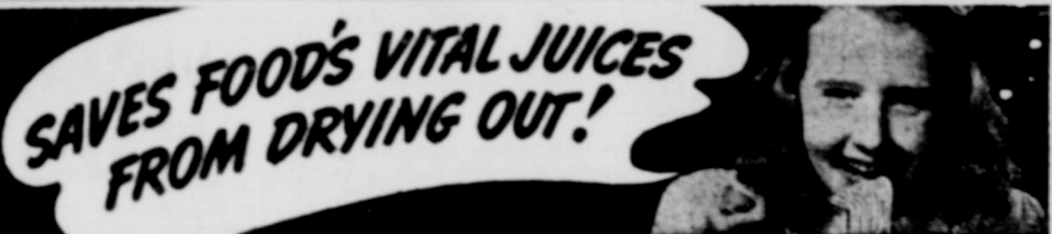
