

ZELAYAN ARMY ON VERGE OF DESERTION

COL. JUADAMUZ AND A HUNDRED
MEN LEAVE FEDERAL FORCES
AT BLUEFIELDS.

HOLDS INFORMATION VALUABLE TO REBELS

Revolutionary Situation in Nicaragua
Takes Serious Turn, and Whole-
sale Desertion is Thought
to Have Been Planned.

Bluefield, Nicaragua, Dec. 3.—Col. Juadamuz and a hundred soldiers deserted the Zeayan army here today, and it is thought to be the beginning of a wholesale desertion, which has been carefully planned.

Juadamuz possesses information concerning the federal army and defense, which will prove valuable to the rebel forces. The revolutionary situation changed considerably when it became known that Juadamuz and a hundred men had formally declared against Zelaya.

PLAN NOT DOOMED.

Harvard Said to Be Discussing Means
For Improving It.

Boston, Dec. 3.—Denials have been made by the Harvard University authorities of the report that the elective system of studies built up by President Eliot is to be destroyed by President Lowell.

The Harvard faculty has been discussing for some time a rearrangement of the elective system, looking to a better adaptation of it to the needs of the students, without foregoing the advantages of a high degree of variation.

Although nothing is ready to be announced, and nothing will be announced until the discussion now in progress is completed, it is said that nothing is contemplated that could in any way be described as a destruction of the elective system.

In his inaugural address President Lowell emphasized his belief that the college student should learn one subject well and should also be acquainted with a wide variety of subjects, and it is to adapt this idea to the elective system as it now stands that the faculty is holding the present discussion.

THOUSAND NEW FARMERS HERE MORE COMING

More than a thousand farmers have entered the territory adjacent to San Angelo during the past three years and are farming on tracts of land ranging under and above 80 acres, in the estimation of George Hagelstein, the veteran participant in the work of cutting up of big ranch lands into farming tracts.

"The day of the big ranchman is about to end in West Texas," says Mr. Hagelstein, who, in explanation thereof said that he did not mean that the cattle raising would be eventually stamped out, but it would not be carried on on such a large scale individually as heretofore.

"There'll be many more stock farms in West Texas, but there will not be many big ranches soon," continued the land man.

"The rate on which the big ranches in Western Texas are being cut up into farms, is increasing every year, and pretty soon all these lands will be fertile farms, with prosperous families located on average tracts of 100 acres.

"No less than a dozen ranches, each containing between 25,000 and 100,000 acres each, located in the vicinity of San Angelo, have been opened up to farmers during the past four years, besides the numerous smaller ranches, and the thousand farmers have been located upon them."

Mr. Hagelstein named some of the large ranches which were "subjected to the knife" during that period. They belonged to J. W. Johnson, J. A. Newman, T. K. Wilson, Concho Land Company, Lee Brothers, George Hagelstein, which included the Pan Creek ranch, the Old Allen ranch, and C. & G. Hagelstein, including the B. & M. ranch, of the Middle Concho and the Colorado River ranch, which likewise now farming lands.

"We always sell 'in,' never 'out,'" said Mr. Hagelstein. That is, they never try to sell their land to parties already located in this section.

"What we want is to keep what capital we have in this section, and to bring other capital in here, and that is my motto," hence the statement above.

COTTON MILLS LOW EBB.

None in England on Full Time—Price
of Raw Cotton Exorbitant.

Manchester, Dec. 3.—In response to a communication printed here, in which there is recorded the general disbelief in the United States that the cotton mills here are being put on short time and instancing in support thereof the large takings of the raw material by the spinner, it is pointed out that these takings can not be cited as a gauge of the actual consumption.

The fact is, the reduction in the consumption has been enormous. It is well established that Liverpool cotton brokers are now reselling cotton orders for spinners' accounts owing to the general paralysis of the industry in the cotton using countries due to "the exorbitant price of the raw material."

It is entirely untrue that a big section of the English mills is being put on full time.

Affair Grows Out of Recovery of Opium
From E. J. McLaurin, Held in
Connection Bank Robberies.

Dallas, Dec. 3.—The federal authorities here are reticent regarding the arrest of E. V. Griffin at El Paso, Thursday on suspicion in connection with the recent smuggling of large quantities of opium into the United States. It is known, however, that the deputy sheriff made the complaint and the arrest grew out of the recovery of opium from the possession of E. J. McLaurin, who was arrested here in connection with the recent search for bank robbers. The men are associated, it is alleged.

DIGGING IN JERUSALEM.

Syndicate of Englishmen Searching
for Treasure and Crown.

Jerusalem, Dec. 3.—In an effort to find King Solomon's treasure and the crown of David, a syndicate of Englishmen, led by the Earl of Motley's heir presumptive and a near relative of the Duke of Fife, are excavating at the pool of Siloam, near the spot where the "stairs of the City of David" wind up over the conduit that brought water to the temple.

Two members of the Turkish parliament are continually present, this being one of the conditions laid down by the authorities before permission to begin the excavation was given, and great interest is manifested in the work.

Large sums of money have been spent in obtaining the permit, in purchasing land and in carrying on the work. At present more than sixty men are engaged at a weekly expense of more than \$40,000. Most authorities believe that when the temple was destroyed King Solomon's treasure was looted and carried away, but this only adds mystery to the present strange quest, as neither influence nor money is lacking in the enterprise.

JOHNSON'S BODY FILLED WITH SHOT

Ambushed on Country Road, Abilene
Man Found Friday and Will
Not Survive.

Abilene, Dec. 3.—Jeff Johnson was found unconscious Friday afternoon, three miles north of town, with his head, neck and body peppered with buckshot. He was brought here to the hospital, where it is believed he will die. Officers here are now suggesting the identity of his assailant.

MANY HUNTERS KILLED.

Wisconsin and Michigan Sport Claims
28 Victims for Season.

Milwaukee, Dec. 3.—The hunting season has been the most fatal to hunters since 1907. So far twenty-eight have been killed and twenty-seven injured. There are still three days of the season, and more fatalities are expected.

Of the twenty-eight dead, nine were killed while bird hunting before the deer season began. Most of the others were mistaken for deer by other hunters.

In 1907 fifty-one were killed, but the majority of these were shot while duck hunting.

Among the prominent persons who lost their lives are Dr. John R. Moore, a well-known surgeon for the United States Steel corporation at Ironwood, and H. L. Bacon, another well-known doctor of New London. One woman was fatally wounded at Calumet, Mich., by the careless handling of a gun by a hunter. Milwaukee's victim was John G. Hoelzel, a prominent real estate man.

PUGILISTS AGREE TO GO 45 ROUNDS JULY 4TH NEXT

New York, Dec. 3.—The final details have been arranged for the Jeffries-Johnson bout and all the papers have been signed by the principals.

The men will battle forty-five rounds on the 4th of next July in either California, Nevada or Utah. Both the pugilists are satisfied with the contracts they signed and each is confident of victory over the other. The bids of "Tex" Rickard and Jack Gleason were accepted. They guarantee the two pugs \$101,000 and two-thirds of the profits from the moving pictures.

When Johnson whipped Burns in Australia last winter for a \$35,000 purse, of which Burns received \$30,000, it is said the gross receipts exceeded \$100,000, although Promoter McIntosh never gave out the official figures.

Next to this affair the Corbett-McCoy fake fight in Madison Square garden is supposed to have drawn the biggest gate, but there is some doubt even about that. While it is generally thought that \$75,000 was taken in at the box offices, it is stated semi-officially that \$57,000 was the real amount.

Aside from this affair the largest purse ever fought for in this country was \$69,715, the result of the first Gans-Nelson battle at Goldfield, Nev. Jeffries and Sharkey fought for \$67,000 at Coney Island, while Jeff and Fitzsimmons mixed it up for \$63,000 at the same place. Corbett and Jeffries drew \$62,340 in San Francisco, a record for the Earthquake City, where other fights have drawn big money, as follows:

SUFFRAGETTES POWERFUL IN UNITED STATES

GOVERNOR OF COLORADO PRE-
DICTS GREAT THING FOR
WOMAN'S MOVEMENT.

SUFFRAGE WILL SWEEP THE NATION

In New York Address Shafroth Said
Women Would Have Their
Rights Here in Very
Few Years.

New York, Dec. 3.—Women's suffrage, now struggling in European countries, England mostly, for their rights, and with some representation in the United States, will be universal in this country before many years, according to Governor Shafroth, of Colorado, who addressed a gathering here today and elicited some applause.

Governor Shafroth's state is practically the center of the movements of the suffragettes in America, and the women have a greater hold on that state, practically, more so than any other in this country.

The governor even predicted greater things in America for the women suffragettes than those in England, whose most recent act of note was the public thrashing of Winston Churchill, ever hope to gain.

"Women's suffrage will prevail all over these United States," he told his audience a great many more times than once, and each time he expressed it as though he really believed it.

CATTLEMEN RETAIN OLD HEADQUARTERS

FORT WORTH BOARD OF TRADE
AGREED TO PAY BACK RENT.

Fort Worth, Dec. 3.—The retaining of the headquarters of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association here was assured this afternoon when the Board of Trade agreed to pay back the office rents next week. If this is done the proposition of removing the headquarters to either San Angelo, San Antonio or Dallas will not be presented at the December meeting of the executive committee.

Long Nyl was removed to the county hospital and may recover.

ing suffer the flings and sorrow of
outrageous designation. He can muster
the cold and conscienceless sci-
entists and holding them in full view
of his tormenting critics, declare that
his inertia, lassitude, inaction and
energyless behavior is due to the new
worm with the prefixation of hook.

When a man's wife takes in wash-
ing, censure not the man because
forsooth he spends the day whittling
soft pine drygoods boxes into fine
splinters. That man is not lazy. He

cuits and in other ways demonstrates

spend her time either lounging on the
bed or rocking in the easy chair, com-
menting occasionally upon what a
divine dancer Charley is, or what a
good candy buyer Henry is, while her
ma sweeps the seven rooms, hangs
out the week's washing and then turns
in and makes a cake and some pecan
sandy for the girl's beau, who is
scheduled to show up at 8:15 o'clock
that evening, don't, oh please don't
censure or call this young miss to
account. She is a sufferer from hook-
wormitis.

And when you observe a lad just
out of school pitch his books over the
fence and make a break for the dis-
tant spots where there are boys galore
all bent on having fun as only boys
can have fun, wholly unmindful of the
fact that his pa has to bring in the
coal, chop the wood and wipe the dis-
hes that ma washed, don't censure this
lad. He is a hookworm victim.

The Press-News has little sympathy
with the hookworm. The Press-News
cannot help believing that the discov-
ery of the hookworm will work great-
er harm than good for the average
American. We shall become too prone
to build up lame excuses for our short-
comings and to lay upon these poor
hookworms the responsibilities of our
indolence.

The Press-News believes that the
best treatment for hookworm, if the
victim is in the spankable age, is
sound leather applied to the seating
parts. If above the spankable age, the
vagrancy law should be invoked.

The Press-News believes in calling
a spade a spade when it is necessary
to do so in order to make a meaning-
ful plain. Words that make the down-
ward way more sloping still are words
freighted with horror and are bound
to breed greater horror. The only
regret The Press-News has is that the
word "lazy" is not harsh enough. In-
stead, however, of making a lazy per-
son feel good over his downright in-
activity by pleading that he has the
hookworm, we ought to dab him with
a name that would cause him to get
and strike a stride that would land
him somewhere except the poor house.

These scientific fellows will get us
all locked if we don't watch out. The
hookworm may not be a myth. But
all folk who are lazy are not hook-
wormers, even though all hookworm-
ers are lazy.

No nation ever rode upon the wings
of chance and achieved greatness.
Material growth is a matter of studied
care and unflinching action. He who
trusts to the fates for inspiration is
a poor builder and is not a person

BUSTLING BRONTE IS AS BUSY AS BEES NOW

Editor Bentley, Who Is Also Mayor, Dilates Upon the Real Advantages of That Growing Place.

C. H. Bentley, mayor of Bronte and editor and owner of the Enterprise, who arrived in the city Friday, states that the little but rapidly growing city whence he comes is progressing at a very rapid and substantial gait.

Bronte has in the last two months, according to Mr. Bentley, been grasping at and clutching every business enterprise that has come in evidence around that part of Texas. No sooner had the Orient railroad opened its office for traffic than the citizens began work to secure an oil mill. The mill is badly needed by the town, as there is such a vast amount of cotton grown around that place. Mr. Bentley states that the prospects for building the oil mill are increasing in brightness every day. He knows, in fact, that the diligent citizens of Bronte are going to get it.

"The oil mill is a great thing," he said, "but what we are working for now is a water works system. All the towns in this part of Texas are voting bonds for a water supply, and we are going to follow suit. With the assistance of the Orient railroad, which has been assured us, we can establish one of the finest waterworks systems in West Texas at Bronte. Our water will be pumped from the Colorado, which is about two miles from town. Counting the distance that the river is away from the town, and the amount of piping that will be laid on the start, we figure that it will take about \$35,000 to do what our plans designate.

"I am very confident that we are going to get the waterworks system. We certainly need it. I can not say when the election for voting bonds will be held. I trust it will not be many days, however.

Like all other earnest, diligent, upright, assiduous and sane citizens of the west, Mayor Bentley spoke words of commendation for the West Texas Development congress.

"When you start anything in San Angelo that is good for the west, you can always depend on Bronte as being one of the ardent workers for its success. You see, Bronte and San Angelo are a little chummy; at least, that is the way I look at it, and any move started by this city for the development and upbuilding of West Texas is good for Bronte.

"I am not sure, but I believe all the business men of Bronte will be here for a few days during the congress. As to myself, well, if the Enterprise can spare my pen for a few days, I will be here among the boosters."

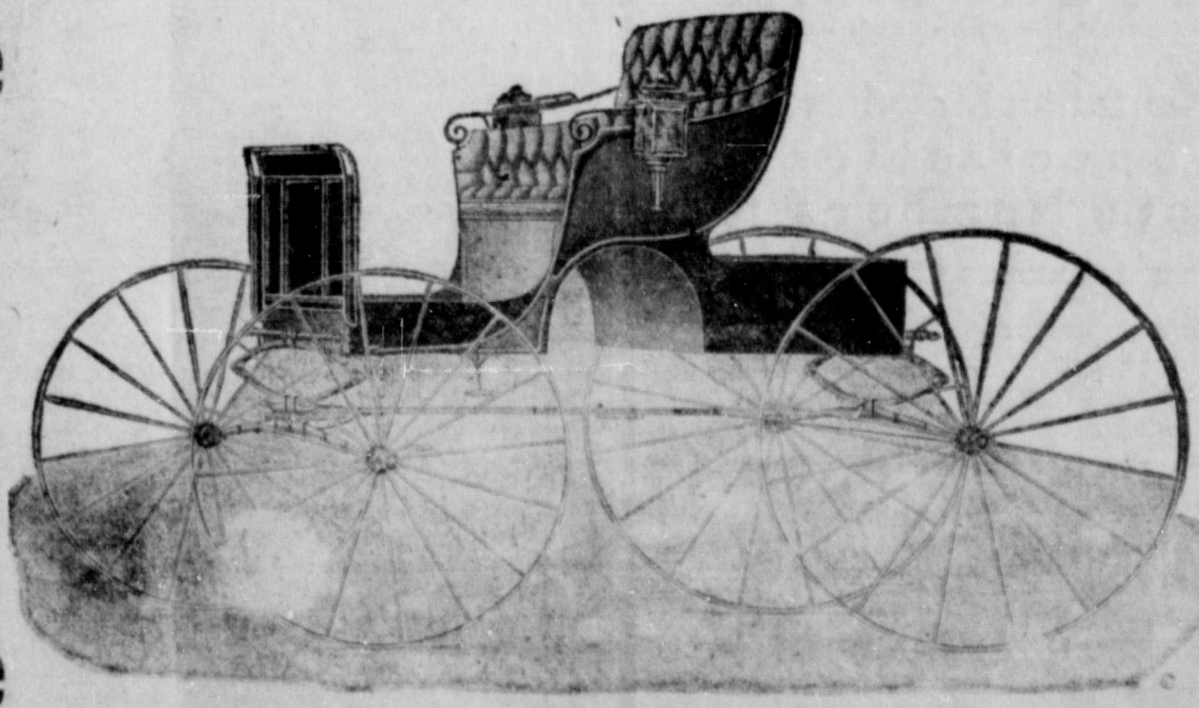

EGYPTIAN BREAD.

The Sun-Cooked Article is Used for Furniture and Many Purposes.

In the land of the pyramids, whenever coffee is brought in to a visiting guest, the sun-cooked bread sheeting is always served therewith. It looks like so much chamois leather and is of a sweetish taste, being compounded solely of flour and the pressed pulp of Sultana raisins. It is cleanly to handle, and can be crumpled up in the hand without fracture.

This bread sheeting is a most important article of interior commerce, per camel caravans, among the Asiatic kalfats and bazaars. It had for thousands of years been their combined bread, cracker and cake all in one.

The bread sheeting is used in the countries of origin as minor articles of furniture and furnishings, just as the natives of the tropics made a bewildering variety of uses of the coconut palm and its products—as sun blinds, awnings, lanterns, cabiers for holding papers, and so on through a dozen uses. In their dry climate these uses are practicable, but in rainy seasons the goods, if wetter, collapse like paper.

Even in Manhattan among the Italian bakers you see the peculiar trellis work hardtack bread (made in big ringed sheets about a yard square), made to do duty as temporary sheltering. It will not stand much weight, but is used for drying out light articles as the air strikes the objects both from above and below.—Baker's Weekly.

in the naval battle off Santiago, has not refused positively to take the prescribed physical endurance test requisite for retention on the active list, he has not taken the test yet, and the indications are that he will decline to do so if questioned by the navy department. Admiral Wainwright left Washington for Philadelphia and his views on the subject were not obtained. He has a month within which to comply with the regulation.

According to what was said by naval officials today, Admiral Wainwright and several other officers who have not taken the test may be excused from doing so. Secretary of the Navy Meyer is considering a suggestion that officers carried on the list as "extra numbers" shall be exempt from the test. These "extra numbers" are officers who are advanced for conspicuous services in war and Admiral Wainwright is one of them. The suggestion is based on the ground that the retirement of these officers will not create vacancies and they could be exempted from the test without blocking the promotion of other officers.

POLICE TAKE SHIRT FROM BACK OF MAN

He was engaged to introduce a certain brand of whisky to the public of Los Angeles, and the more unique his method the more effective the advertisement, as he had figured it out, judging from his statements at the police station.

Buckley devised an ingenious contrivance which, when he pressed a button in his trousers pocket, blazed in fire red letters two inches high the name of the "goods" right across his shirt front. It was a long name, and in order to make room for it Buckley wore a full dress suit with a top hat and cane.

At Fourth and Main street he stepped in front of a venerable old lady, who at first saw in him only a foppish sort of middle-aged man, with a little bunch of spinach under his chin and a Mephisto look. As the good old woman dropped her eyes she saw a bright red glare right in front of her, and as she looked again she saw, spread out in huge letters of fire the name of a more or less popular brand of booze.

With a scream of dismay the old lady staggered back, and the policeman on the corner came up on the run. Buckley went to jail.

"You'll have to leave that shirt here as evidence," announced Desk Sergeant White, after booking the prisoner.

"What, take off my shirt," exclaimed Buckley in dismay. "Never. This shirt is a valuable patent. I will put up any amount of bail you wish, any bond up to \$1000, but I will not take my shirt off. I will stay with my shirt and I will fight this case to the end, to the bitter end. Do you understand?"

worth it," and he thrust his thumb over his shoulder in the direction of the reporters who were expected to proclaim to the world the name of the particular brand of liquor he was advertising.
