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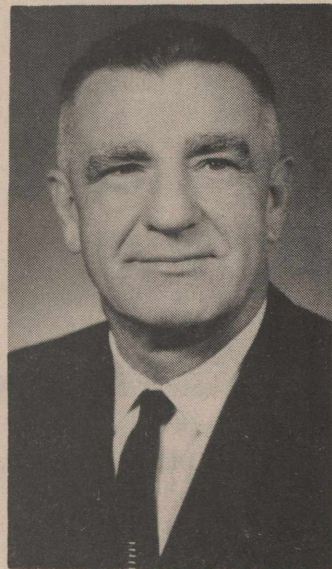

## C-CA Banquet To Feature Coach

Berl Huffman, Director of Public Relations for the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association, will be the speaker Feb. 23 for the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet in the school cafeteria.

Known to most people as Coach Huffman, he first joined the Texas Tech staff in 1935 as a freshman football coach and head coach of basketball and track. His coaching career was interrupted by a four-year tour of duty with the Air Force during World War II. Returning to Tech, he served as assistant football coach and head basketball coach.

In 1947, Huffman became head coach at the University of New Mexico, remaining there until 1952 when he became manager of Albuquerque, N. M.'s Chamber of Commerce. He later was director of the New

Mexico Economic Development Commission and the Almagordo New Mexico Industrial Development Corporation.

Huffman rejoined the Tech coaching staff in 1961 as freshman football coach and head baseball coach. He remained on the Tech coaching staff until his appointment with the Ex-Students Association in January 1970.

The Ex-Students Association Council unanimously approved Huffman's honorary membership in the Association at Homecoming in 1968. He is a graduate of Trinity University. This is the highest award the Association can bestow on a non-alumnus. Huffman is only the fifth person to have received the honor in the Association's history.

Another highlight of the annual affair will be the naming of the Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year. Also honored this year will be the Conservation Farmer of the Year.

## Hospital Board Reveals Plans

Members of the hospital board met Monday night at the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture office for a business meeting in which they discussed plans being made for acquiring medical facilities for Olton.

Those attending were G. H. Bley, Earl Spruiell, James Cowart, Dr. Mike Smith, Eldon Franks, Basil Sherman, Melvin Rape, Fred Thompson, Melvin Rape, Fred Thompson and O. J. Neeley.

Thompson is serving as temporary president of the board, while Spruiell is acting as vice-president and Smith as secretary.

The board has plans to call for an election in the near future to confirm the hospital district. The boundaries of the district were approved by the legislature in 1969. A map of the district will appear in The Enterprise within the next few weeks.

Voters will be asked in the election to say "yes" or "no" to the district as approved by legislature. The election will not be for the purpose of taxation but strictly for confirming the establishment of the boundary lines.

This would prevent Olton

from becoming a part of some other tax district in the future, providing the district is approved by the eligible voters in the district.

Following the approval by voters, the district would be declared "Olton Hospital District" by the board members and four current directors would serve terms of one year with the remaining three to serve two years.

Many residents have expressed their desire to contribute to a fund for the hospital and efforts are now being made to set up a foundation

for the purpose of such gifts, which would be tax deductible. Persons interested in making such contributions may contact any member of the hospital board.

All board members agreed that this would be the ideal financing of a hospital in the event that one is built. However, they stressed that the upcoming election is NOT for a bond issue, but simply the designation of a certain part of this county for a hospital district.

### Rep. Bill Clayton Praises Benton

Representative Bill Clayton in contact with Senator Benton Monday, was advised of the senate committee appointments. Clayton said "A new senator has already shown the respect he has won from his colleagues by the committee to which he has been assigned. The Texas Panhandle and South Plains area can consider itself very fortunate that Lloyd Benton has been appointed to the Public Works committee of the Senate. That committee not only has jurisdiction over highway and other public facilities, but most important has jurisdiction over water development which is of main concern over this part of the state. We all know the strong support Sen. Benton has pledged to the development of the area, and now, as a member of Public Works Committee is in a position to work effectively in this field. The senator thought an appointment to the agriculture committee, but Clayton considered the Public Works appointment of even greater importance to agriculture and water resource development to the area.

### Dr. Van Brimhall To Speak At Conference In Houston

Dr. Van Brimhall, will be one of the featured speakers at the third annual Southwestern Animal Health Conference to be held in Houston, Jan. 29-30.

The conference, designed for livestockmen and persons interested in public health from the states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico, is one of the most extensive in the nation.

It is co-sponsored by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and the College of Veterinary Medicine of Texas A&M University. Annually it draws leaders from the field of veterinary medicine and public health to conduct the seminars.

This year, 70 speakers are scheduled.

Dr. W. L. Anderson of Dallas, president of the TVMA, noted that in 20 years the United States will be feeding one-fourth to one-half of the world's population.

"Our nation will feed the world only if animal health is maintained," Dr. Anderson said. "Many of the disease and parasite control techniques are known and can and are being adapted to local needs. However, we need to do an ever better job. We feel the Southwestern Animal Health Conference is designed to help us do this better job."

## 1976 Farm Income Estimate Shows \$10,714,000 Increase

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Lamb County should be more than \$44,734,000 by the end of 1976, according to Buddy C. Logsdon, county agriculture agent.

This will be an increase of more than \$10,714,000 from 1968-69 figures with cotton and livestock contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than one billion dollars.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Lamb County are presently about \$34,020,000 says Logsdon. The most important ones are cotton, grain sorghum, corn

and livestock. They are expected to account for about 90 percent of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the South Plains Development Program (SPD).

The projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee; after

separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Lamb County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976," says Logsdon.

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## SENSING THE NEWS

The history of America is deeply involved with the struggle for religious liberty -- freedom to worship and to teach religious principles. The French Huguenots in South Carolina, the Maryland Catholics, the Pilgrims who established Plymouth Colony and many other religious groups settled on this side of the Atlantic because they believed they would find true religious freedom. Today, however, this freedom is in jeopardy because of recent action by federal tax authorities.

A number of independent, fundamentalist schools and colleges are in danger of losing the tax exemptions they have long enjoyed as part of religious liberty in the United States. Americans of all faiths have reason to be concerned about this development, for, if small, underfinanced denominational groups are deprived of such exemptions, the larger denominations in time are likely to feel government pressure.

Indeed, churchmen with no sympathy for the beliefs of the fundamentalists should be keenly aware of the religious liberty issue at stake in the pressure on the independent religious schools and colleges.

Last fall, a number of small religious schools and colleges received notice from the Internal Revenue Service that they will be stripped of tax exempt status if they do not declare they have racially non-discriminatory admissions policies and that they widely publicize this fact in the news media.

Some of these religious educational institutions believe that they cannot, in good conscience, make such a declaration. They believe that alteration of their established admissions policies would violate Scriptural truth. These institutions are prepared to lose their tax exemptions rather than make a concession unacceptable in terms of their religious beliefs.

It is tragic and shocking that the federal government would make such a demand of these religious institutions. These aren't public schools. The admissions standards aren't the product of secular views. On the contrary, the policies stem directly from deeply-held religious convictions.

One may disagree with these convictions and regard them as incorrect or even

hurtful. But the fact that they are religious in character should shield them from governmental pressure. The federal government, after all, honors religious convictions in the case of conscientious objectors. Why can't it honor the beliefs of the small Bible colleges?

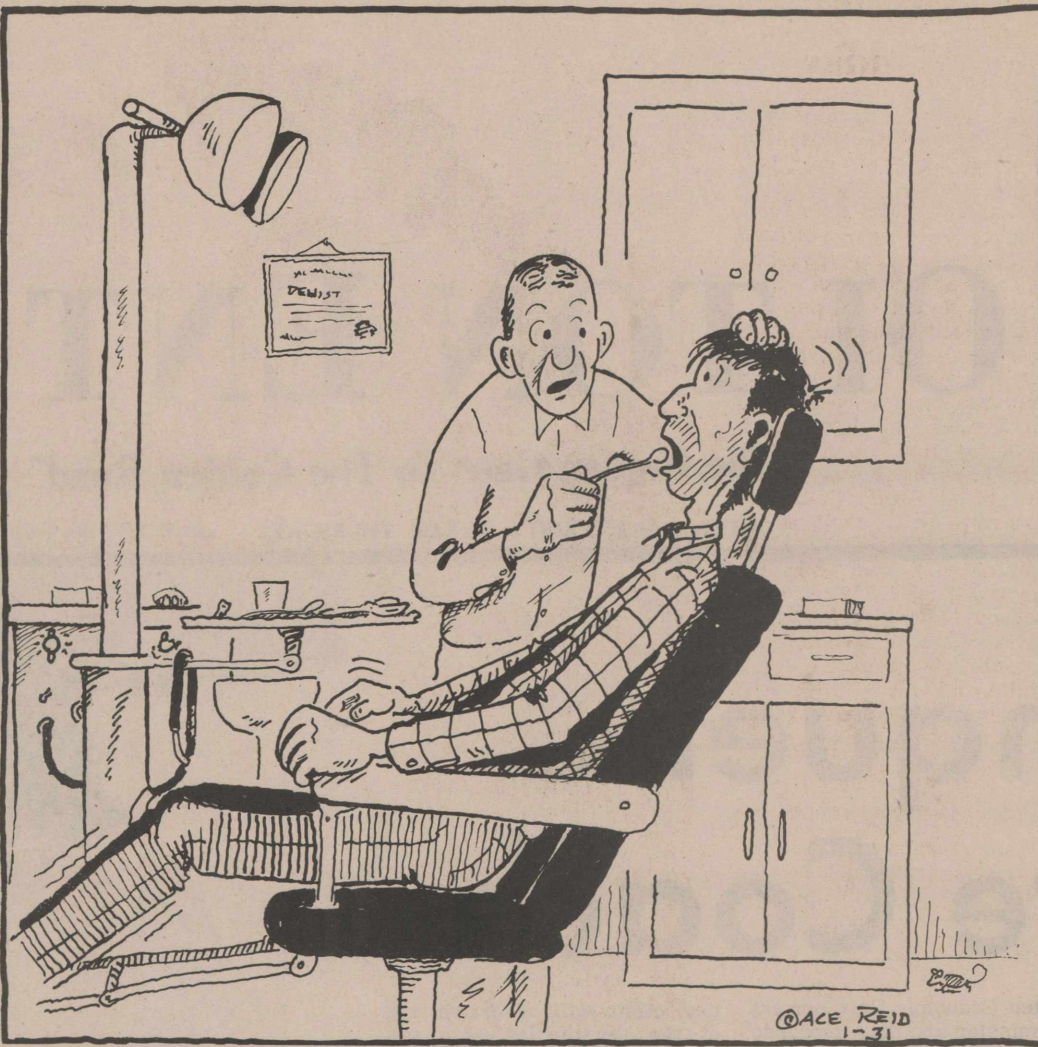
Religious educational institutions should not be required to submit to a political test. If a fundamentalist institution isn't allowed to keep its tax exemption, because it has its own admissions policy, how can a tax exemption be given to the schools and colleges of major religious groups which have special criteria for admission? Certainly, no responsible citizen wants an Episcopal seminary to be compelled to prove that it is non-discriminatory by recruiting quotas of Baptists, Presbyterians and churches of other faiths, Roman Catholic institutions such as Notre Dame and Fordham should have an undisputed right to maintain admissions policies that favor Catholics. Yeshiva University's right to continue to serve as a Jewish theological seminary should be maintained without any question by tax authorities. It would be absurd and unjust to compel it to admit quotas of Mexicans, Puerto Ricans and other minorities.

The public may well ask: "Why this pressure on the small Bible schools and colleges? They train law-abiding citizens. No riots take place on their campuses. They aren't bomb factories. Moreover, tax authorities aren't bringing pressure on major universities which have given extremists free rein. Last year, for example, Yale University provided aid and comfort to Black Panthers and their sympathizers gathered in New Haven, Conn., to protest a trial of Panthers accused of murder. Yale has not been denied the benefit of tax exempt status though a number of university activities seem injurious to the well-being of the public.

Something is wrong when small, fundamentalist schools and colleges are singled out for extraordinary pressure. Fair-minded citizens are likely to regard these threats of removal of the tax exemption as a form of public pressure incompatible with American tradition. No religious educational institution should be penalized on account of its beliefs as evidenced in its admissions policies.

## Bill Clayton Appointed To Committee On Counties

House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher announced Thursday the appointment of State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake as Chairman of the House Committee on Counties.

The Springlake Representative is one of only five House Members who will serve as both a Chairman and a Vice Chairman of House Standing Committees. The Committee on Banks and Banking will have Clayton as its Vice Chairman. Mutscher said that 8-year veteran member will return to two committees on which he served last session: State Affairs and Conservation and Reclamation. He has also been asked to serve on the Rules Committee.

The 21-member Counties Committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to Counties, their creation, organization, boundaries, government and finances, and the com-

and duties of their officers.

"The Committee system is the heart beat of the Legislative process. It is at this level that the citizens of Texas have an opportunity to express themselves concerning legislation," Mutscher said. "This 62nd Legislature will be faced with many difficult challenges and I feel fortunate to have Mr. Clayton in the leadership of these two important House Committees."

Mutscher was recently re-elected unanimously to the Speakership, and he is one of only five Texans to be so honored with a second consecutive term.

## Tax Man Sam Sez:

Beginning January 1, 1971, recipients of annuities or pension payments may voluntarily have income tax withheld from their pension or annuity payments. The United States Civil Service Commission has sent annuitants (former Federal employees) a letter telling them that they can furnish a Form W-4P. The specific dollar amounts requested shall be at least \$5.00 per month and shall not reduce the net amount of any annuity payment received by the payee below \$10.00. Social Security, Veterans Administration pensions, and Railroad Retirement payments are tax exempt, and are not covered by the voluntary plan. All other payers of annuities and pensions are required to withhold during 1971 upon the receipt of Form W-4P.

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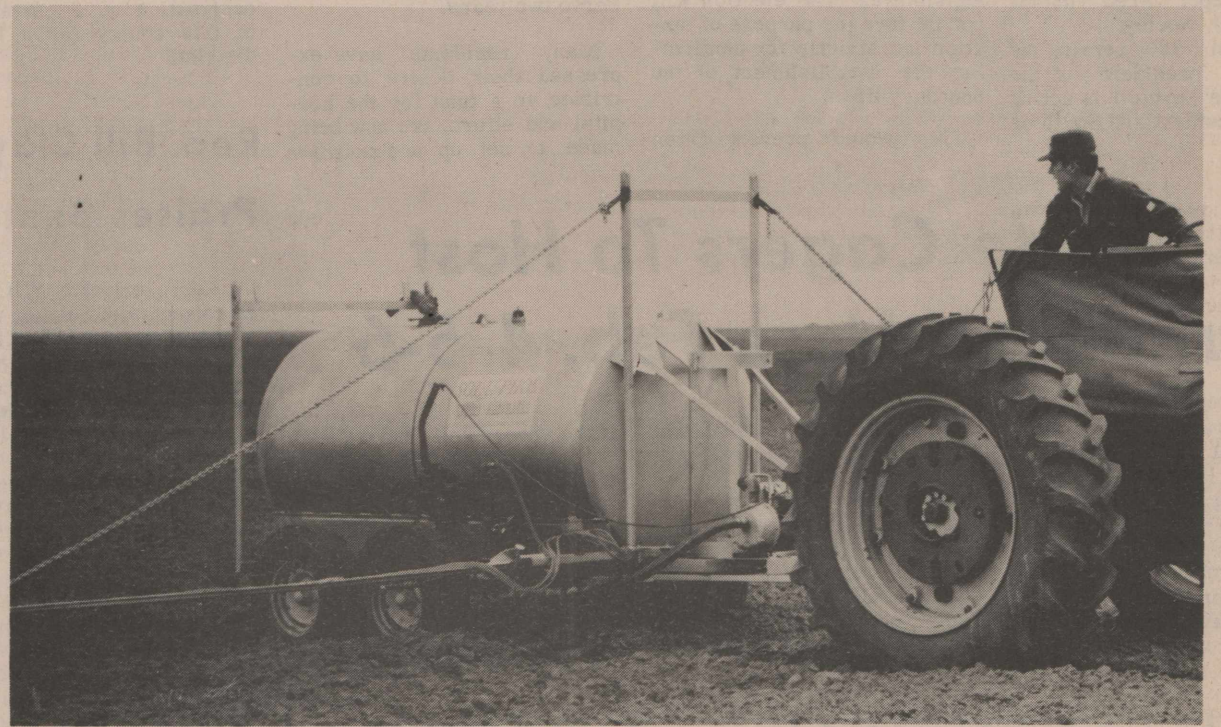

Cool in cold water. Then add 1 tsp. vanilla and 1/2 cup cocoanut.

#### COLA ICING

1/2 c. softened butter  
3 T. cocoa  
1/3 c. Cola (Coke)  
4 c. confectioner's sugar

Combine all the above ingredients in a small mixer bowl, beat until smooth. Spread on Cocoa and Cola Cake (Optional: after beating, stir in 1 cup chopped toasted pecans. Pecans may be toasted while oven is preheating.)

3 c. raw peanuts  
3 c. sugar  
1 c. White Karo  
1 c. water  
1 tsp. vanilla  
3 drops red food coloring (if desired)

Cook all ingredients, except vanilla, together until mixture forms medium to hard ball when dropped in cold water. Beat until thick, add vanilla. Pour into greased muffin tins or drop by spoon onto greased foil. (Use butter to grease tins or foil).

#### COCOA AND COLA CAKE

1 c. butter or margarine, softened  
2 c. flour  
1 3/4 c. sugar  
3 T. cocoa  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
1/2 c. buttermilk  
1 c. carbonated cola beverage (Coke)  
1 1/2 cups miniature marshmallows

Combine all ingredients together, except Coke and marshmallows in large mixer bowl. Blend at low speed of mixer; beat 1 minute at medium speed. Add Coke, blend well. By hand, stir in marshmallows.

Pour batter into greased 13" x 9" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes

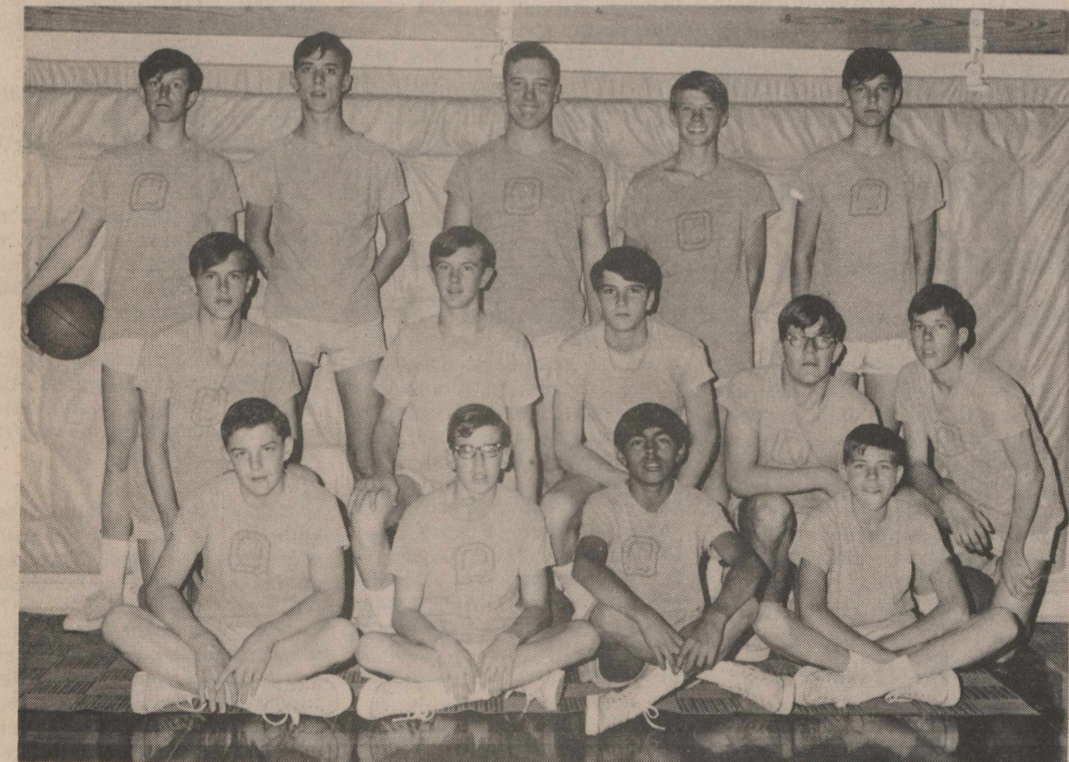
