County Agent Urges Control Of Grasshopper

Grasshoppers have been seen and reported over all areas of Coleman County this spring. The hatch this year, which started some three or four weeks ago, seems to be as large or larger than last year. This being the case, we can expect from light to severe damages on crops as well as range land. At the present the hoppers vary from hatching size up to ½ inch and the larger ones have already begun moving out into the fields and pastures surrounding the hatching areas.

The most critical period in the life of a new grasshopper is at hatching or soon thereafter. An abnormal warm period may appear in early spring and force the hatch prematurely. If the temperature drops to 68 degrees F. and below, it will prevent the general feeding necessary for survival and the number of new hoppers will be greatly reduced. Also, periods of a week or more of continuously cloudy, wet weather are favorable for the development of bacterial and fungal diseases which attack the young hoppers. The length of the wet weather period, and not the total amount of rainfall, is the important factor. As these conditions have not yet prevailed, and chances are very slim for the week of wet weather, chemical control will be the primary means of attempting to control this insect.

If a farmer or rancher plans to control the grasshoppers this year around the fields, pastures, or home, it is recommended that control measures be started immediately. By controlling the hoppers while they are small, it takes less chemical, less time, usually a smaller area to cover and by far a more effective and economical control. Spraying small areas is helpful in reducing initial infestations, but grasshoppers migrating from adjoining areas may reinfest treated areas within a short time.

The usual hatch ground and places to be treated now are fence rows, hedge rows, creek banks, spillways, etc. Chemicals recommended for control of the grasshoppers are Toxephene, Heptachlor Aldrin, and Dieldrin. Either of the chemicals are equally effective if used properly. Contact your local County Agents for recommended dosages and any further information you might need in controlling these insects.

Progress Being Made On Flood Control Project

Steady progress is being made in securing easements for the 10 sites where flood control structures are proposed to be constructed on Mukewater and Hay Creeks. The directors of Mukewater WCID report they hope to have all the easements signed by June 30th.

Provided all the easements are signed by that time, active construction work on the projects could get underway before the end of this year.

During years past, Mukewater and Hay Creeks have been responsible for heavy damage by flooding throughout their drainage areas. With the establishment of the 10 proposed flood retention projects, the flood damage on this watershed will be greatly reduced and the actual value of the property will be increased considerably.

Mukewater Creek could be the first watershed in the county to have a flood control established. If all the easements are secured by June 1st.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Whether and how the state's tax problem is met now depends largely on the Senate.

House members, apparently eager to "get the monkey off their backs," passed out most of the program recommended by Gov. Price Daniel.

Biggest milestone was House passage by a 71-56 majority of the governor's "package bill". As finally passed, it would raise

about \$150,000,000 in two years — only about \$10,000,000 short of the governor's goal.

Included in the "package" would be an increased levy on natural gas, a new franchise tax on interstate corporations and bigger taxes on tobacco, liquor, automobiles, utilities, etc.

Some members bitterly criticized the bill as dangerous to Texas' industrial future and a product of the labor-liberal lobby. But most seemed to agree that it is "the only way to avoid a general sales tax or income tax."

Senators showed no apparent desire to set a speed record on the first money-raising bills sent them by the House. Bookkeeping bill, designed to erase part of the \$65,000,000 deficit by changing the accounting procedure, was sent off for an Attorney General's opinion on its constitutionality.

A bill to increase the corporation franchise tax for one year only — also to ease the deficit — was set aside. Better to wait for the whole program, the Senators decided, than to work at it "peace-meal."

Senate did take one step forward, however, when Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro intro-

duced the abandoned property bill which had bogged down in the House taxation committee.

STITCH-AND-CUT-TEAM

Ten lawmakers — five from the House, five from the Senate — have the difficult task of making one package out of the different spending bills, passed by the two houses.

Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria and Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah head the group. House-passed appropriation bill is more than \$20,000,000 larger than the Senate's. Conference Committee's task will be to cut a little off here, tack a little on there until an acceptable compromise is reached.

In past sessions, this piecing together process has taken several weeks. Even on a day-and-night schedule, this committee will be hard-pressed to finish its job before the present session ends in mid-June.

More than different spending ideas separates House and Senate. Each house used the bill to express its own ideas on how the State Board of Insurance should operate. House says full-time; Senate, part-time. Unyielding views have been expressed on each side.

Other members of the committee are Sens. Floyd Bradshaw, Weatherford; Ray Roberts, McKinney; Crawford Martin, Hillsboro; and Wardlow Lane, Center. Reps. John Huebner, Bay City; Truett Latimer, Abilene; B. H. Dewey, Bryan; and Jesse Osborn, Muleshoe.

ELECTION CHANGES URGED

Study leading toward a complete revision of the Texas Election Code is the goal of a House-passed resolution.

Rep. Harold Parish of Taft is sponsor.

If passed by the Senate, the resolution would provide for a 15-member committee to draft recommendations for the 1961 legislative session.

Making up the study panel would be three House members, three Senators, the Attorney General, the manager of the Texas Election Bureau, three persons named by the governor and four persons named by the national committee members of the Republican and Democratic parties.

ALL ONE JOB

Two House Committees — taxation and appropriations — would be merged under a resolution proposed by Rep. Truett Latimer of Abilene.

One committee of 31, called the House Ways and Means Committee, would replace the

Social Security Credit For Retirement

Explained by Official

"You must have social security credits for a certain length of time in order to qualify for benefits," reminded R. R. Tuley, Jr., of the Abilene Social Security Office.

"Because at one time only six quarters of coverage were required, many persons erroneously believe that only six quarters of coverage are required to insure anyone now and in the future," Tuley said.

Usually, a person will be fully insured at the time of retirement age, total disability, or death if at that time he has a quarter of coverage (earned at any time after 1936) for each two full calendar quarters after 1950. A person can never become fully insured with less than six quarters of coverage; and no matter what his date of birth, he will never need more than 40 quarters of coverage to be fully insured. A quarter of coverage corresponds generally with a calendar quarter of a year.

A special provision applies to persons who reach retirement age or die before October 1, 1960. In these cases a person is fully insured if he has quarters of coverage in all but four of the quarters after 1954.

Since the Colson-Briscoe Act was passed in 1949, the General Revenue Fund has been automatically nicked \$15,000,000 a year for F-M roads. Goal was to build 35,000 miles of all-weather rural roads.

Rep. Richard Slack of Pecos has introduced a bill to take F-M road spending out of the State Highway funds rather than from General Revenue. It would not cut farm road spending, but would reduce the money available to the Highway Department for state highways.

Sen. Neville Colson, Navasota, co-author of the 1949 act, opposes any alteration in the program. Even though more than 29,000 miles have been paved, she said there are still school bus and mail routes that are not "out of the mud."

Farm Bureau opposes, as well as others who say that it will lead to an increase in gasoline taxes to make up the cut in highway funds.

Those favoring the change argue that the farm road program has had creamy spending for a long time, but that with general revenue going \$65,000,000 in debt, it can no longer be afforded.

NOT YET, DOT DECIDES

Democrats of Texas threw a lot of brickbats at U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson at their Austin convention, but stopped short of an open drive against his nomination for President.

State AFL-CIO President Jerry Holleman headed off resolutions, saying "this is not the time."

DOT did agree to change its name to the Democrats of Texas Clubs (DOTC). It had been frequently criticized for having a name that could be confused with the official Texas Democrat Party organization.

Despite their official "wait and see" attitude about presidential nominees, the delegates made their sentiments clear. They cheered when Adlai Stevenson's name was mentioned and applauded criticism of recent legislation designed to help U. S. Senator Johnson.

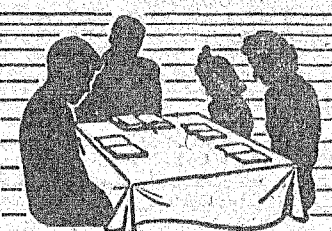

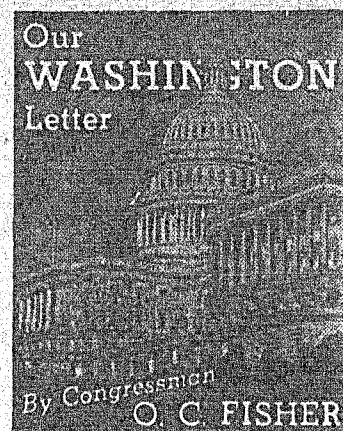

Our WASHINGTON Letter

ECONOMY-MINDED FORCES in Congress received their most severe set-back of the year last week when the House passed a Senate-approved housing bill that will cost \$6 billion — about 90 percent of which will be subsidies which somebody is going to have to pay until the year 2000.

It was a Christmas-tree, bonanza bill with all the trimmings, aside from its good features which include extension of the FHA program.

Among other things, the measure authorizes 190,000 more high-cost public housing units, at a cost to the taxpayers of \$3.7 billion. Under this program, the government builds housing units and then rents them to tenants for a fraction of the real rental value. It was disclosed the other day that over in Boston 353 firemen and policemen, with families, each earning more than \$5,000 per year, live in subsidized public housing projects there. The net average subsidy to each public housing unit throughout the country now amounts to \$40 per month. This is what it costs taxpayers, each month, for every public housing unit that is built — and it goes on for 40 years.

A **PRESIDENTIAL VETO** IS almost certain, in view of the President's repeated expression of interest in economy and a balanced budget. If a veto occurs, it will be sustained by the House.

ANOTHER PHASE in the long procedure to be followed in the advancement of the Diablo dam project on the Rio Grande was realized the other day when the Bureau of the Budget reported its views on Col. L. H. Hewitt's report which he made last fall to the State Department.

In commenting on the Commissioner's report, however, the Bureau complicated the picture a bit by requiring reimbursement to the government by irrigators and other water users for water used from the conservation portion of the project. It had been hoped that the cost of the conservation portion of the dam could be taken care of from revenue derived from the sale of power potential and sale to municipalities.

"The Bureau of the Budget considers," the comments stated, "that operation of Diablo Dam and Reservoir for irrigation and water supply purposes in the U. S. should be prohibited unless local interests agree to appropriate repayment of costs allocated for these purposes."

"FOR EXCEPTIONAL supervisory and administrative leadership of the Soil Conservation Program in a difficult area of the Rio Grande Plains of Texas," an achievement award was presented last week to Mr. Meril G. Carter, area conservationist of Uvalde, in a ceremony attended by 2,000 guests, in Washington. Carter was one of 174 Agriculture employees who were honored.

OUR POPULATION is growing by one person every 11 seconds, by 330 every hour, by 8,000 every day, by one fourth million every month. We now number 175 million. By 1980, just 21 years away, there will be 275 million, and by the 2,000, only 41 years hence, the number will probably be about 350 million—twice the present figure!

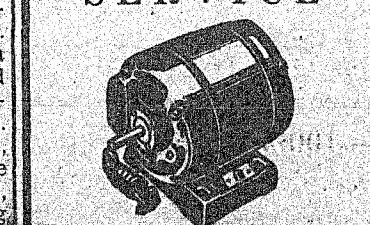
Her fingertip veil was of double tulle, outlined with tiny seed pearls. She carried a bouquet of gardenias in the center of feathery carnations.

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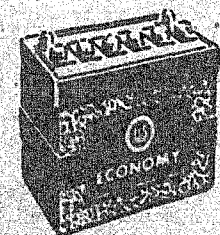

Substitute Eyes

In discussion usually arising from complaints of new bifocal wearers that "the line bothers me," or "I feel like I'm standing in a hole," or "when I lie back on the sofa to watch TV the bifocal is in the way"—we find it necessary to remind the patient that, after all, bifocals or trifocals or just glasses are SUBSTITUTES for loss of natural vision.

In the case of the young single vision lens wearer the lenses substitute for some essential quality or ability that his eyes lack. Wearing them may hinder some of his activities, especially sports, but on the other hand they will help him at his desk or in the shop where he is depending on his accuracy and ability to win the increases in income which will let him care properly for that young growing family of his. If his sports activities are important enough, and he can't achieve at them without his glasses then he can have safety lenses, made in a special frame designed for athletes. Or better still contact lenses which are excellent for athletes.

The "substitute eyes" needed for the person past forty are a little more complicated. The bifocal does have its peculiarities, but millions of people take them in fine adjusting satisfaction.

to the effects of the bifocal which are sometimes new to them.

Certainly the bifocal or trifocal is a substitute. It makes up for the natural near focusing power of the eye lost through the normal processes of aging. The very use of the word "substitute" indicates that it will be in some respects inferior to the real thing — the normal young eye. However, since Dr. Ben Franklin invented the bifocal in 1784 there has been a constant stream of technical, design, and manufacturing improvements which have resulted in the many types of excellent multifocal lenses now available for varied purposes and job requirements. These wonders of modern visual science compare with Franklin's bifocals about like the wooden hulls, built by George Washington and compared with the products of the modern dental laboratory.

When it comes your turn to wear your multifocal, advise bifocals or trifocals, just remember one thing Ben Franklin said about his invention of bifocals. He said: "I had but other defects were as easily and cheaply remedied as the visual defects of old age, it would be worthwhile for friends to live a good deal longer."

The Chiropractic Act of Texas, passed by the Legislature in 1949, specifies that Chiropractors must have finished two years in the basic sciences and four years in a Chiropractic College, whose course of study must be equal to an AB Degree from the University of Texas, making a total of six years of college work.

The Legislature of 1957 added that Chiropractors must take a two-day post-graduate course

each year in order to qualify for a renewal of their license.

Up-Dating of T B Laws Requires Report On Contagious Cases

AUSTIN, MAY 19.—An up-dating of laws pertaining to a disease almost as old as mankind was accomplished today in Texas by the signing of the Texas Tuberculosis Code by Governor Price Daniel.

The bill (House Bill 421) makes plain the enforcement of compulsory isolation upon those who have contagious tuberculosis and who refuse to isolate themselves and protect others. Such enforcement has been had in various parts of Texas for two years, but it was felt necessary for enforcement needed to be clearly spelled out. This act does that.

Also contained in the code is provision for penalty of fine or imprisonment of anyone, physician or otherwise, for failure to report a case known to them as contagious tuberculosis.

Also provided is that premises occupied by the people with infectious tuberculosis shall be disinfected before the property is sold or rented to anyone else.

Draft of the act, sponsored in the House by Representative Don Kennard and Don Gladden of Fort Worth, and Representative Robert H. Hughes of Dallas and Senator Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, was reviewed by various agencies concerned with TB control before its presentation in the House and Senate. Those agencies were the Texas Medical Association, the State Department of Health, the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools and the Public Welfare Department, the Vocational Rehabilitation Division and the Texas Tuberculosis Association, a voluntary agency. The latter, and Texas Medical Association, co-operated to aid the senator and representative in drafting the legislation bringing together all laws having to do with tuberculosis, and during 1958, and making them up-to-date and adequate.

Some Vets Can Apply For Cheaper Insurance Coverage

All veterans whose insurance policy number is preceded by the letters "RS" were reminded today they have received forms to apply for an exchange of policies which will save up to two-thirds in the cost of their GI insurance.

Dr. George T. McMahon, Manager of Veterans Administration Center in Waco, said the application forms have been mailed to all veterans eligible to make the conversion.

All of these veterans, who for the most part fall in the Korean and post-Korean conflict period, now have a chance to exchange their present 5-year term policies at a lower premium cost, due to the improved mortality tables resulting from modern medical advance.

The new policy, however, must eventually be converted to a permanent plan of insurance since it cannot be renewed by the insured past age 50. Veterans who return the applications were cautioned to continue to pay premiums at the old rate until VA notifies them the new type policy is in effect. Any excess payment will be credited to their accounts.

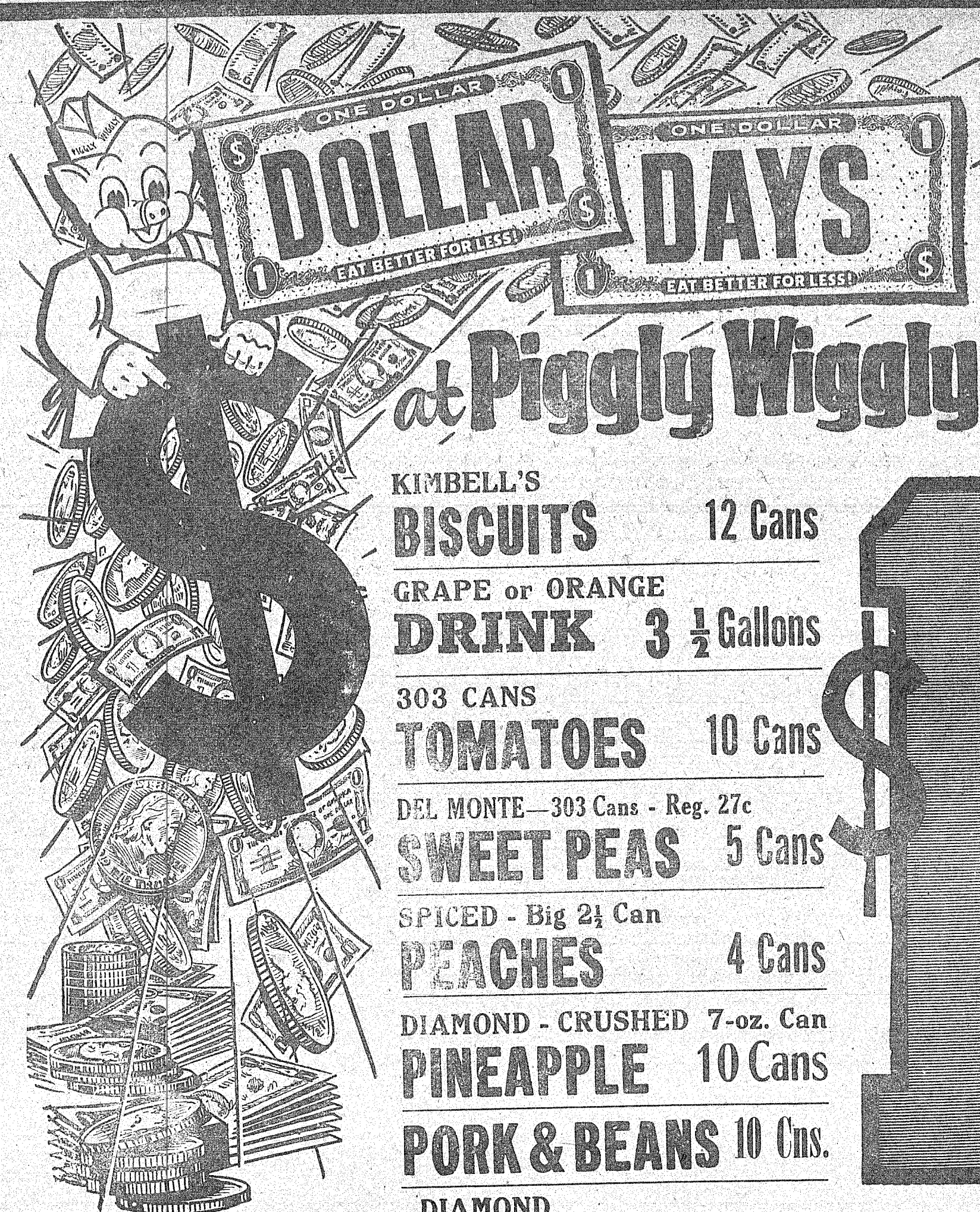
