Train Crash Kills Three, Injures 60

Motor-Driven Passenger, Freight Collide Near Childress

CHILDRESS, Nov. 28. (AP)—Three persons were dead and more than 60 injured, six seriously, as a result of a head-on collision between a Fort Worth & Denver South Plains motor-driven passenger train and an F.W. & D freight train ten miles west of here today.

The two-coach passenger train burned after the collision exploded diesel oil in its fuel compartment. Shepard, 56, of Childress, brakeman, and Bruce Hendrickson, 40, of Lubbock, mail clerk, burned to death.

A passenger, Mrs. E. Z. Wilbanks, about 60, of Vernon, died in a hospital tonight.

Seriously injured were Wharris O'Quinn Willie Lubbock, drafted en route with 12 others to Fort Hill, Okla., for induction into the army; Walter Edward Hinson, Lubbock, another drafted; Tom Huggins, Childress, conductor on the passenger train; Mrs. J. W. Spain, Childress; Ross N. Funk, Hugo, Okla., and Surrelda Carey, Corsicana.

Fifty others received hospital treatment and several others with lesser injuries did not require medical attention.

H. M. Tutt, Childress, engineer of the passenger train, said his train was rounding a curve, east-bound, when the westbound freight loomed up. He and H. M. Cunningham, engineer of the freight, leaped before the crash, and escaped without serious injury.

Eastex Oil Ruling Taken To Court

AUSTIN, Nov. 28 (AP)—The railroad commission's order setting up a water-oil ratio for the East Texas field was challenged in court today by a group of operators from the west side of the field, who contended the order was confiscatory and a violation of the due process clause of the constitution. An injunction restraining the commission from enforcing the order was sought in 98th district court by the Knowlton Operating Company and others, and Judge J. D. Moore set a hearing for Dec. 4.

San Antonio Leads In Store Sales

DALLAS, Nov. 28 (AP)—San Antonio led big Texas cities in department store sales for the week ended Nov. 21, the federal Reserve Bank of Dallas reported today. San Antonio's gain over the same 1941 week was 45 per cent; Fort Worth was next with 42, Dallas third with 28 and Houston fourth with 17.

Night Club Blaze Fatal To Scores

BOSTON, Nov. 28 (Sunday) (AP)—A swift-moving fire flashed among Saturday night merry-makers in the Coconut Grove night club in the Back Bay district and caused deaths which Fire Commissioner William Arthur Rellio early today estimated may reach 150. Bodies still were being removed.

Two hundred or more were injured, and Dr. James Manary of City hospital, which reported 150 persons admitted, said deaths were occurring so rapidly they could not be counted immediately.

Flame burst in the Malady room, a basement lounge, just as the orchestra was preparing to play the Star Spangled Banner for opening of the floor show.

Mickey Albert, orchestra leader, said he was sitting at a table on the main floor, and "was holding up my baton for the national anthem when the flames roared up from the lounge below."

Eyewitnesses told of patrons in the flaming one-and-a-half story club making their way to the roof and jumping to the street, many landing on top of parked automobiles.

All branches of servicemen pitched in with police and firemen in removing the bodies from the twisted wreckage. One by one the victims were carried to the street as voices shouted: "Gangway. Here's another body."

They were carried in almost a steady stream across the mesh of fire hoses that littered the streets and placed under gray blankets in a garage across the street which was employed as a makeshift morgue.

Shoeless feet could be seen protruding from the blankets as the lifeless forms were placed row upon row.

BANKERS TO MEET
HOUSTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—More than 200 bankers in forty counties will attend a meeting here Monday afternoon to discuss how South Texas can do its part in the treasury department's \$9,000,000,000 war financing program.

Offices will be opened on Tuesday morning, Dec. 1, on the sixth floor of the Petroleum Building for the federal rent control program in Big Spring and Howard county, Charles N. Sullivan, attorney-examiner of the area, announced Saturday.

Big Spring will be a sub-office of the San Angelo rent control area, which opened on November 1 under the direction of James W. Stovall.

Rents on all housing property including houses, apartments, rooms, tourist courts and trailer camps automatically should be cut back to the level of March 1, 1942, for rents coming due on December 1 and thereafter. Two major premises allow an increase in rents—a major capital improvement which adds to the rental value of the property and a change in the accommodations

Axis Loses Supply Ships Allied Assault Mounting

LONDON, Nov. 28. (AP)—Nine more axis supply ships, including a tank carrier, have been sunk in the Mediterranean by British submarines fighting attempts to rush men and provisions to German and Italian troops now forced back within 15 miles of Tunis.

Announcement of this destruction of axis ships and supplies urgently needed by the nazis defenders of Tunis and Bizerte came from the British admiralty at the same time that enemy sources described the mounting scale of the allied assault on the North Africa siege ports.

To the west of the battle scene, Radio Morocco reported 'enormous quantities' of men and materials were being disembarked at Casablanca.

In addition to the nine cargo vessels sunk, the British reported they had damaged three other supply ships and an Italian destroyer of the Trione class that was escorting the relief convoy. The date of the sinking was not given.

Among the ships sunk was a large twin-tunneled passenger liner which was intercepted off the coast of Sicily. Another was a small tanker laden with benzene. A second tanker which previously had been damaged by aircraft was found burning and was sunk by torpedoes, the admiralty said.

The tank-landing craft, of medium size, might have been trying to reinforce Marshal Erwin Rommel's Africa corps at El Aghella. It was torpedoed off the coast of North Africa near Tripoli and burned for 24 hours before sinking. Others of the sunken ships were loaded with food stores.

Interception and destruction of the large supply fleet left no doubt that Hitler was exerting every effort to build a formidable defense in Tunisia against the powerful British first army rolling in from the west.

While allied headquarters did not support the announcement from enemy sources that the main allied assaults was under way, an American communique reported a Nazi counterattack at Tebourda, only 15 miles west of Tunis, repulsed with the loss of 10 enemy tanks.

"The enemy is generally on the defensive in the Tunisian area," the report continued. "In an effort to delay the progress of our troops the enemy is attempting to blow up bridges, roads and railway lines."

Although weather conditions and muddy airfields were said to be hampering air activities, allied night fighters were reported to have shot down four axis bombers that attempted to raid Algiers last night.

The Paris radio had reported earlier that British, American and French forces of the army enveloping the last-ditch axis garrisons in Tunisia were attacking violently and had driven several wedges into the nazis defense lines.

The broadcast also said the allies had infiltrated into axis lines in the Meles El Bab region, a tactically important communications point outside the main Tunis-Bizerte fortifications.

Both the German and Italian communiques mentioned only limited local fighting, neither confirming last night's report from Algiers that the allies had "left their defense lines" and had launched their big blow to wipe the axis from Tunisia.

**Air School Troops
Pass In Review**
Hundreds of men were at their military best Saturday when Col. Sam L. Ellis, commander of the Big Spring Bombardier School, reviewed his troops.

The commandant, aided by Maj. A. B. Partridge, quartermaster, Maj. Paul S. Dewell, commanding officer of the 365th air base squadron, and Capt. J. W. King, adjutant, inspected all the assembled troops.

Then with the band leading the way, all of the units, including the squadrons and the recruit detachments, marched and marched by the reviewing staff. It was the first general inspection Col. Ellis had ordered for his men since Oct. 17.

Kilday Loses His State Job

AUSTIN, Nov. 28 (AP)—James Kilday of Houston today was replaced as chief of the Texas railroad commission's important motor transportation division to clematex a shake-up involving several officials appointed by Jerry Sadler when he was elected to the body.

Commission member Beauford Jester announced that Wallace Hughston of McKinney, former Collin county attorney and state senator, would succeed Kilday Dec. 15.

"Our political viewpoints are not reconcilable, and I am so informing him in a letter," said Jester, who defeated Kilday and others in the democratic primary for the post which Sadler had held.

Kilday was the center of a sharp political controversy following the resignation of Sadler to enter the army a few hours before the deadline for filling for a place on the democratic ticket.

With Kilday the only candidate filing within the time originally specified, the deadline was extended by the state democratic executive committee, and a big field of contestants jumped into the race.

Jester's victory was followed by his interim appointment to the post, which was contested by Sadler in court. Jester also won this bout.

Surgeon Is Slain As An 'Impostor'

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 28 (AP)—Three bullets—fired by a woman apparently under the delusion she was slaying an impostor—today killed Dr. Marion L. Klinefelter, noted St. Louis bone specialist.

"Well, Mr. Mad Man, how are you?" muttered a woman identified as a former patient as she fired across the specialist's desk on the fourth floor of the Missouri Baptist hospital.

"Now, Mr. Wilder, you're exposed," she continued as the 60-year old physician, wounded around his left ear, slumped dying in his chair.

Detective Walter Latture disclosed Miss Florence Ferrara, 29, had been arrested. Police said the real Dr. Klinefelter died in 1934 and a man named Wilder had impersonated him.

Tire And Tube Quotas Hiked

DALLAS, Nov. 28 (AP)—Southwest regional OPA officials announced today expanded passenger car tire and tube quotas for December to meet needs in the first month of mileage rationing—a plan under which virtually all passenger cars become eligible for needed recapping services or replacement tires.

The quota of passenger car tire recapping services for December, however, has been reduced moderately, since large quotas in October and November are believed already to have provided recaps for a large portion of the tires in need of them, the officials said.

A quota of 115,630 grade III tires, a new category under the tire rationing regulations, has been set for December. This grade, which includes used tires, recapped tires and new tires made of reclaimed rubber, is for necessary replacements on cars with a mileage ration of 500 miles or less.

Tire and recapping quotas for the southwest OPA region in December have been set at 288,602 compared with a December quota of 170,849.

Tire and tube quotas for Texas for December follow:
New Grade I tires, 7,712; New Grade II tires, 16,617; Grade III tires, 41,973; recapping services, 39,803; tubes, 16,880.

**Fuel Oil Rations
To Go Unchanged**
WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Household fuel oil rations throughout the 30-state rationed area will be unchanged for the next five weeks, the Office of Price Administration announced tonight, but warned that reductions might be made later which would entail heating temperatures below the 65-degree average.

The announcement, good news to householders after persistent reports that a cut was imminent, means that during the second heating period, residential consumers' coupons will continue to be worth ten gallons each, while apartment and commercial coupons will be valid for 100 gallons each.

SANTA IN BUGGY
McKINNEY, Nov. 28 (AP)—What with gas rationing, it will be an old-time Christmas parade Dec. 11 here.

Santa Claus will ride in a buggy, pulled by a Shetland pony. The parade will be motortless.

Japs Continue To Punch At Islands

More Ships Move
On Guinea; Bases
Blasted By Yanks

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, Sunday, Nov. 28 (AP)—Blasting the deadly bombs of General Douglas MacArthur's planes, a Jap naval force again is maneuvering off the New Guinea coast near Buna where their ground forces have been pinned against the sea, the high command announced today.

The communique, one of the briefest in recent days on the bitter struggle for possession of all northeastern New Guinea, gave no indication of the naval force's intent but previous naval sorties have been for the purpose of landing reinforcements.

For the second straight day, Japanese counterattacks were reported to have been repulsed, adding strength to the growing picture of the enemy determination not to yield until crushed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—American aircraft, striking heavily at Japanese bases in the northwestern Solomons, were reported by the navy today to have destroyed all buildings in the Munda area of New Georgia island and blasted the Kahili air-drome on the island of Bougainville.

Ground operations around American positions on Guadalcanal island were limited to local skirmishes. In a series of these actions our patrols killed 50 Japanese and captured a number of machine guns Friday about six miles west of the American airfield, a communique said.

Two enemy bombers made the third straight night nuisance raid on American positions on the island Friday night. They dropped bombs near the mouth of the Lunga river but caused no damage.

In contrast with this greatly curtailed enemy activity, the result of smashing blows dealt the Japs in the Solomons earlier this month, was a report made here today by a marine combat engineer on the first two months of the American occupation of Guadalcanal.

Capt. Walter R. Lyts said the airfield was repeatedly and accurately bombed while he was there, although damage was quickly repaired; that day and night aerial attacks and night naval bombardments were frequent and that the Japanese on land were constantly punching at the American lines so that the engineers completing and extending the airfield sometimes had to fight all night and then work all day.

Today's communique, like all others issued in the last two weeks, indicated that the Japanese have been entirely on the defensive, except for nuisance activity, since their greatest effort at reconquest of the southwestern Solomons was crushed by American air and naval power or two weeks ago.

That they are collecting for another big push, however, is generally accepted in high naval quarters here, and it is this fact that gave special significance to the destructive aerial attacks on Munda and Kahili—bases which the Japs would use in gathering their ships.

**School Groups Buy
Heavily In Stamps**
A two day campaign with the sale held on Wednesday of this week at the high school netted \$990.90 in stamps and bonds sold to students and teachers. It was reported Saturday. The high amount of sales which exceeded expectations of all, has resulted in plans made to make every Wednesday bond and stamp day at the high school.

Great Victory Is Claimed In Fresh, Surprise Assault

MOSCOW, Sunday, Nov. 28. (AP) — The Russians announced today that a surprise offensive on the northwest front had killed 10,000 German troops, routed five divisions, "liberated more than 300 populated places" and broken wide gaps in German fortifications less than 90 miles from the old Latvian border.

A special communique issued by the Soviets said that the Red army had broken through to a "strongly fortified defense zone of the enemy" and that in the area of the town of Velikie Luki, which is 90 miles from Latvia, "the German front has been broken over a distance of 30 kilometers (about 20 miles)."

The Russians have, in fact, pushed on to the west of Velikie Luki, for the communique said the rail line between Velikie Luki and Novosokolniki, 25 miles to the west of that city, had been broken, as well

as the line from Velikie Luki to Nevel, 35 miles southwest of Velikie Luki.

The Russians, who usually broadcast their communiques without fanfare, announced this one with jubilation and singing.

All programs were interrupted. The radio announcer then repeated several times that "this is Moscow calling" in a particularly triumphant tone and followed it by reading the recital of victories slowly and emphatically.

Songs were sung over the radio after the text was read.

The Germans already have broadcast that heavy operations were in progress on the northwest front but the Russians kept silent until the paean of triumph early today.

In sum, the Russians announced these victories in their new offensive while the Red army was cutting deeper into the German lines in the Stalingrad fighting:

About 10,000 enemy dead left on the battlefield;
Four infantry divisions and one tank division of the Germans sent reeling in utter rout;
More than 300 populated places liberated;

Three key rail lines broken; the line from Velikie Luki-Novosokolniki and Velikie Luki-Nevel lines and the road from Rishov to Vyasma, 75 miles south of Rishov;

The German front blasted over a distance of 30 kilometers (about 20 miles) in the area of Velikie Luki;

The enemy front broken in three places west of Rishov, which is 125 miles northwest of Moscow and 140 miles east of Velikie Luki; and

An advance in all indicated directions over a depth of from 13 to 30 kilometers (8 to 20 miles).

The offensive is an effective companion piece to the Stalingrad drive. It was launched several days ago, the special communique said, and since then the Russians have repeatedly broken the German strong points.

(Velikie Luki is some 130 miles northwest of Smolensk, key Russian city held by the Germans. There is the possibility that the Red offensive, if it generates sufficient power, might sweep down behind Smolensk in a great enveloping maneuver designed to force the Germans back out of that vital sector.)

For an operation of such magnitude, the Russians announced the capture of only about 400 prisoners. The communique said material captured included 138 guns, 110 mortars, 505 machine-guns, 3,592 rifles, ammunition dumps, stores of provisions and supplies.

One hundred and six guns, 180 mortars, 300 machine-guns and 50 tanks have been destroyed, the special communique added.

The regular Soviet communique issued shortly after the special victory announcement reported that the defenders of Stalingrad have "entirely recaptured the factory area" of that battered city.

"Our troops in the area of Stalingrad overcame enemy resistance and continued their offensive in previous directions," the regular war report said.

The communique said that the Russians had recaptured 15 populated places and a railroad station. There was particularly bitter fighting northwest of the city, the Russians said, and the axis left many hundreds of dead on the field after trying in vain to hold up the Russian sweep by counter-attacks.

TO NAME PRESIDENT
MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Nov. 28 (AP)—Uruguayans will elect a new president tomorrow in a tense race in which pro-democratic candidates are conceded an edge over an isolationist opposition.

Emergency Gas Ration Program Is Announced

FORT WORTH, Nov. 28 (AP)—Texas OPA director Mark McGee issued emergency instructions today to all county war price and rationing boards in Texas, designed to relieve a "bottleneck" in the issuance of gasoline ration books in time for the start of mileage rationing next Tuesday.

By telephone and telegram he advised them: "If you cannot process all applications for transport, fleet and official ration books by Dec. 1, please see that all such applicants in your county are advised immediately by radio and newspaper that pending the issuance of their ration books, such applicants may obtain necessary gasoline by signing OPA form 4-55 at any filling station."

McGee also instructed the boards to advise all filling stations that where the proper OPA form is not available, needy truck operators

and operators of fleets of passenger cars can obtain gasoline by signing their names to any sheet of paper on which is stated the license number of motor vehicle and the amount of gasoline obtained for it.

In a statement McGee appealed to Texas business men to come to the assistance of county war price and ration boards quickly, so they can get the job of rationing registration done promptly and get gasoline rationing started by December 1.

"Regardless of our personal feelings in the matter," he urged, "our commander-in-chief, President Roosevelt, has ordered that gasoline rationing as a rubber conservation measure be put into effect without further delay. We must get the job done. We're as much under orders as soldiers wearing the uniform."

'My Sister Eileen' Is Gay Comedy On Ritz Theatre's Program Today-Monday

A picture based on an outstanding stage success (one which still is running on Broadway) and said to be even an improvement on the stage play is the Ritz theatre's offering for today and Monday, "My Sister Eileen." Rosalind Russell, Janet Blair and Brian Aherne are featured in what is termed a thoroughly enjoyable comedy.

The story of the play and the substance of Ruth McKenney's stories from The New Yorker have been preserved, but the film version uses the best of this material and adds some new situations of its own.

The plot involves two girls, one a would-be writer and the other with acting aspirations, who leave Columbus, Ohio, to make good in New York. They take a basement room in Greenwich village in a house run by an eccentric artist. Their adventures thereafter are concerned with the strange assortment of characters they find in the village and the writing girl's acquaintance with an editor, the Portuguese merchant marine and sundry other curious characters. The girls' basement room becomes a veritable parade ground for assorted groups and individuals, to add to the hilarity of the story.

Rosalind Russell, as Ruth Sherwood, gives one of her finest performances, and is a happy choice for the role which calls for high comic touches. Newcomer Janet Blair scores a distinct hit as the younger sister, Eileen. There is a steady running fire of amusing sequences and fast dialogue, with gags hitting a high in humor.

Bennett Retires As Clinic Director, Beadles To Serve

Two and a half years as director of the Big Spring free venereal clinic will close for Dr. M. H. Bennett December 1st, when Dr. R. O. Beadles will take over the post.

An impressive record of 6808 blood tests made during the two and a half years has been recorded by Louise Horton, nurse, who assisted Dr. Bennett.

Although at the beginning of the clinic it was necessary to educate the public to use the clinic services, the treatments have been given to 141 white persons, 63 Mexicans, and 103 negroes since the opening of the building.

The clinic averages about five new patients a month, the records show and some 120 persons have been cured or discontinued treatment during the time the clinic has been here.

The clinic, which is federal, city and state supported, had few patients in its first months of operations but issuing of health cards for domestic health soon brought many more in for the certificates.

During the time the clinic has been running the doctor has treated a 21-month-old child as the youngest patient and a 60-year-old man as the eldest.

Temporary Gas Rations May Be Issued Trucks

H. F. Robbins, chairman of the Howard county war price and ration board, announced Saturday that the board may issue temporary gasoline rations to truck operators pending the issuance to them of ODT certificates of war necessity, or until December 31st, while such certificates are being corrected.

Otherwise, he said, the county rationing board must follow gasoline ration figures set by the office of defense transportation, in "tailoring" transport mileage ration books.

"We would like to make it plain that farmers and other operators of commercial vehicles, who are now engaged in transporting farm commodities and supplies should make appeals through the county agricultural agent or directly to the county U. S. department of agriculture war board. Under the procedure set up the USDA board will review individual cases and send its recommendations to the ODT district office for correction," Robbins said.

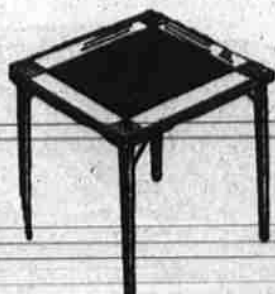

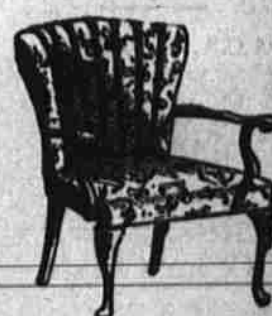

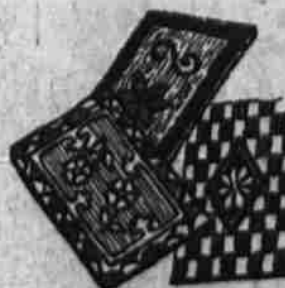

OPA Has A Say In Packaging Of Yule Gifts

DALLAS, Nov. 28.—With Christmas shopping season in full swing in the Southwest, regional OPA officials today summarized OPA's regulations applicable to gift packaging and gift wrapping by retailers.

Where the seller packages or wraps the commodity at or after the time it is sold, or offers to do so, the following rules are applicable:

1. Gift packaging or wrapping can always be discontinued by the seller without any reduction in price. The packaging or wrapping is a mere "frill" and not a substantial portion of the consideration.

2. If gift wrapping or packaging was given free or without extra charge during the base period, no charge can be made for it now.

3. Where an extra charge has been made for the packaging or wrapping during the appropriate base period, the charge may still be continued at no higher than its ceiling price if the wrapping or packaging is continued. If the packaging or wrapping is discontinued, the charge must also be discontinued.

4. In cases where the seller had not definite practice with respect to packaging or wrapping during the base period the result depends upon whether he offered the service free or for a charge during the particular selling season next preceding the base period. The offer the seller made during the next preceding season with respect to packaging or wrapping service will be deemed, in the absence of specific evidence showing a different offer between such last selling season and the end of the base period, to have been in effect during the base period.

Rules for determining maximum prices which retailers and wholesalers may charge for the hundreds of thousands of articles especially packaged for Christmas sale have also been laid down by OPA. These regulations apply only when the special packaging is done by the manufacturer or producer. They classify the holiday packages into two main groups:

1. Those in which the packaging consists primarily of paper or ordinary cardboard or both and in which the article or articles are regularly sold by the vendor in seasons other than Christmas time (such as cigars, ties, socks, handkerchiefs, etc.). The maximum price for the contents and the packaging in this group is the maximum price which normally would apply to the contents without the special wrappings.

2. Those in which the packaging consists of material other than paper of ordinary cardboard and is of a type which normally carries a combined price higher than the price charged for the contents without the special packaging; or those in which the package contains an article or articles, all or any of which are not regularly sold by the vendor in seasons other than the Christmas season.

When a package falls within the second classification it may be treated as a single commodity and the maximum price for it determined by the formula in Section 3 (a) of the general maximum price regulation.

And Likely There's More To Come Rationing Starts In Earnest; Coffee Today, Gas On Tuesday

Things may come to the point where tailors will have to put an extra pocket on men's suits and an extra space in women's purses for those all important ration books. Mr. and Mrs. Average Citizen have only two now to worry with, the sugar and gasoline books, but there are more to come.

Rationing, which is the one part of war economy that affects every citizen, shows that December is going to be a turning point for carefree American buyers. Gasoline, coffee, meat and probably other items will join sugar for rationing.

Coffee sales, which have been frozen all week, will be available Sunday with sugar stamp 27 pinching in for a coffee ration card. This stamp will entitle the holder to one pound of coffee for a five week period.

Sugar stamp 9, which is the current stamp will be good until December 15th when stamp 10 will go into effect.

Passenger car owners and motorcycle car owners who failed to take advantage of registering yesterday at the city hall will have to wait until after December 9th to receive their basic "A" mileage ration book from the war price and ration board.

In the new realm of gasoline rationing for the midwestern states, Big Springs will find the gas rationed out to them December 1st. Stamps will be good for four gallons a week but motorists, if they feel inclined, can purchase their first two months supply all at one time. After that they cannot buy more gasoline until the next two month cycle, the last of January, the last of January.

Motorists can apply for supplemental gas at any time, there is no deadline for this, and those who have already applied for extra gas permits will be notified by the ration board when to come in for their books if the board approves the request.

Meat rationing may be just around the corner, probably in January, and meantime through the agencies of the county home demonstration and county agents, a "share the meat plan" is to be tried.

What comes next on the ration list is anybody's guess but in the near future a man will be judged not by his pocket book but by his ration books.

With the advent of gas rationing, the tire ration board will base its number of tires to be issued according to the actual number of miles which the vehicle travels as designated by the type ration book of the motorist.

In other words, an "A" book holder will not be granted new tires in preference to a "C" or "D" card holder whose business depends upon his transportation. However, the amount of tires to be issued is subject to the local board quota.

Reemployment Of Religious Group Ordered By President's Committee

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP) — Seven members of Jehovah's Witnesses who lost their jobs in a glass plant after refusing to participate in a flag-raising ceremony were ordered re-employed today by the president's Committee on Fair Employment Practice in what it called "an unprecedented action."

The committee directed the Pittsburgh Plate Glass company of Clarksburg, W. Va., to reinstate the seven and ordered two labor unions there to "maintain effective control" over any union members "who may be inclined to molest these reinstated men." The unions were the Glass, Ceramic and Silica Sand Workers of America (CIO) and the Window Glass Cutters League of America (AFL).

The company discharged the men last December, the committee said, when their refusal to participate in the flag-raising on religious grounds "aroused the antagonism

of fellow employees."

The company "admitted that the seven discharged Jehovah's Witnesses were satisfactory workers," the announcement said, "but claimed that it had been warned by its two unions that it would be impossible to control other employees who might seek to inflict physical injury on these men or might refuse to work with them, thus paving the way for a walkout or shut-down of the plant."

"Declaring that management and labor organizations have an obligation and responsibility to protect employees who are persecuted because of their religious convictions, the committee ruled that threatened violence or work stoppage to obtain the dismissal of capable employees whose religious convictions are unpopular with their fellow employees does not constitute a valid reason for such dismissal."

Leaders Plan Action Before GOP's Get In

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP) — Apparently at the urging of President Roosevelt, congressional leaders decided today to push legislation authorizing executive suspension of tariff and immigration laws in war emergencies before the next session brings increased republican strength.

Speaker Rayburn announced after a conference of senate and house leaders that the ways and means committee would go ahead Monday with consideration of the bill, introduced in both houses after the president requested emergency powers in a message Nov. 2.

Chairman Doughton (D.-N.C.) said war department officials would be called to testify Monday morning before an executive session of a subcommittee but made it plain that unless some compromise could be reached which would eliminate controversy, enactment by this congress was doubtful.

"We are going to see if we can trim this bill down to something we all can agree upon," Doughton told reporters. "If we can't do that, I don't see any chance of getting it through. There would be a fight all the way and we would all be working for nothing."

Chairman George (D.-Ga.) of the senate financing committee said it would await house action before considering the bill, adding that whether the measure was passed before January depended upon what kind of a bill came out of the ways and means committee and how soon the house acted.

Rayburn's announcement of intention to push the measure apparently carried with it abandonment of tentative plans for a Dec. 15 adjournment.

Rayburn said the time element required to complete congressional action had been canvassed carefully at the meeting, also attended by senate democratic leader Barkley (Ky.), George Doughton and Reps. Cooper (D.-Tenn.) and Reed (R.-N.Y.).

Rayburn disclosed he had discussed the measure with President Roosevelt Thanksgiving Day. While he would not comment on the President's attitude, other legislators said they understood Mr. Roosevelt was insisting on immediate consideration.

Called the world's greatest saxophone player, Danish-born Sigurd Rascher will present several concert numbers. He is the only saxophonist to extend the range of the saxophone to four octaves, nearly twice the previous greatest range.

Cadet James W. Bunker traveled a long way for his training. His home is in Balboa, Panama Canal Zone. Another cadet, William Rose, Concourse, N. Y., was stationed in Dutch Guiana before entering cadet training.

Two cadets have special reasons for wanting to defeat the axis. Paul R. Parante, San Bernardino, had a brother on Bataan. The brother is officially listed as missing. An airplane crash three months ago killed the Ensign brother of Cadet Robert L. Burton, Arkansas City, Kansas.

Richard W. Asher, Jeff, Ky., lists the largest number of relatives in the army. He is the twenty-first to enter the service from his branch of the family. Twenty cousins preceded him into the service.

New York again leads the states in the number of representatives and Brooklyn leads the individual cities. Texas, California, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana were also high in the number of men listed for the new cadet class.

This is the fourth class at the Big Spring Bombardier School, the third class in the 1943 graduating class. The first graduating class will receive its wings in mid-December.

Cottonseed Of Better Quality

A relatively dry season is believed responsible for the improvement in the quality of cottonseed received this year over last year, Manager M. E. Allen of the Big Spring Cotton Oil Co. said yesterday.

Not only is the quality improved, but the seed is being secured in much larger quantities. For the first time, seed is being purchased on a government grading system, and all oil and linters are sold to the government on a contract. The later is shipped directly to plants where it is used in the production of gun powder.

Oil yield from the seed is about normal, Allen stated, but prices are considerably higher this year than last. Starting at \$37 last season, the price fell as low as \$37 near the close of the season. The lowest price this year has been \$46, and the market has been rather steady from \$47 to \$50.

Misunderstanding On Rubber Holds Up Local Scrap

A misunderstanding between the city salvage committee and the Big Spring Iron & Metal Co., purchasers of the scrap collected in the salvage drive, is holding up removal of the junk from schoolyards and city streets, Chairman B. J. McDaniel advised Saturday.

Purchasers understood that scrap rubber on the piles was to be included in the deal for the material at \$5.25 per ton, but members of the committee thought they had made it clear the rubber was to be separated and to bring the ceiling price for that type of material.

So far, only tin scrap has been removed from the schoolyards, and other arrangements probably will be made for disposition of the material, it was reported. Action is pending a decision by the salvage committee.

More Mileage Promised For Farm And Ranch Operators

Possibility of relief from farm vehicular mileage restrictions under rationing was seen Friday in a letter received by L. H. Thomas, chairman of the Howard county Agricultural War Board and the motor transportation committee, from John W. Reed, district manager for the Office of Defense Transportation.

Thomas had written to Reed, calling attention to "prima facie inequities which would all but put some farmers and stockmen out of business. Some farmers were being allowed only 1,800 miles per year for the operation of their pick-up trucks in connection with running of their farms, he pointed out, whereas passenger cars performing unnecessary work were allowed 240 miles a month or 2,880 miles a year.

The district ODT manager declared that under rules any applicant has the right after 30 days,

to appeal to his district office and give such office all the facts and figures to substantiate his request for additional miles for his necessary farming or ranching operations. Presumably, worthy cases would be rewarded with such mileage as was necessary.

Reed said he would like to "make it clear that the Office of Defense Transportation does not have the intention to stop necessary farming and ranching operations." On the contrary, he said, it was the intention to conserve equipment in order that necessary operations can be carried on.

"I do not feel that any farmers or ranchers should even consider discontinuing their operations on account of the mileage reduction program which is being carried on by the ODT," said Reed. Reasonably timely relief may be had by appeal to the district office, he added.

County Must Buy Over \$6,000 In Bonds Monday To Meet Quota

Howard counties have a war job to clean up Monday. For the first time in several months, they're let bond investments fall behind schedule — and Monday is the last day they have to meet November's quota.

The tentative figures, as gathered from the local issuing agencies, show that more than \$6,000 will have to come into the treasury's till during the day. As compared with the November allotment of \$50,800, sales through Saturday amounted to \$33,661.

Ira Thurman, chairman of bond sales, voiced confidence that patriotism and good business sense

would assert itself sufficiently Monday for the county to go over the top again and keep its record clean.

Meanwhile, Thurman's committee and special volunteer workers were mobilizing for an impressive all-out answer to Pearl Harbor when the first anniversary of that event rolls around — December 7. On Monday of next week, Big Spring will be made war-bond conscious as it never has before, with the hope that \$50,000 in war bonds will be chalked up before the day is over.

One of the major attractions of the day will be free jeep rides for

every bond purchaser. Arrangements have been made with the bombardier school to furnish the army vehicles, and these will be stationed at a downtown point throughout the day. A group of service club men headed by Doug Orme will handle the traffic situation and see to it that every bond buyer gets his ride.

There'll be plenty of opportunity to get the bonds. No less than 15 women's clubs have agreed to have members act as salesladies at as many downtown booths from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. on the 7th. Residents of most of these units were at a meeting Friday night to pledge full support.

The Pearl Harbor anniversary program really gets underway next Sunday, when teams from the service clubs compete in a quiz event to be broadcast over KBBT. During the course of the program, the bonds will be sold over the radio, with purchasers who phone in their subscriptions being announced over the air.

The school children are coming into the Pearl Harbor Day event, too. A poster contest will be announced in all grades Monday, and winners will get a free ride in the jeeps, army men going to the various school houses to pick up their honored passengers.

New Finance Group Keeps Talks Secret

AUSTIN, Nov. 25 (AP)—Extraordinary action of the senate's newly-named finance committee in barring reporters from its initial session left the public virtually without information on what actually was the 48th legislature's first bout with the state's acute financial situation.

It was in sharp contrast with the full publicity that Governor Coke Stevenson and other state officials concerned about dwindling revenues have given the fiscal outlook, what has been done by the executive department and how it hopes to present the legislature with a balanced budget.

Likewise, Lieutenant Governor-elect John Lee Smith in announcing his reasons for unprecedentedly naming the committee in advance of the session, frankly stated he hoped it would be able to expedite processing of appropriations bills, and effect economies.

But the committee itself did not issue a promised communique after its first meeting, held incidentally the morning of the day when Texas and Texas A. & M. met in a football game at Memorial stadium.

Such committee meetings, dealing with non-personal matters of keen public interest, are customarily wide open to the press. As a rule, reporters are made welcome except when appointments are considered by the state senate.

In the absence of an official version of what the committee did, Chairman R. C. Lanning of Jackboro was reliably reported to have said that he would appoint subcommittees to study appropriate

Civilian Air Raid Warning System To Get Statewide Test On Dec. 7

AUSTIN, Nov. 25 (AP)—Governor Coke Stevenson announced today that many local defense organizations over the state plan practice drills simultaneously with the statewide test of civilian air raid warning communications Dec. 7. Sometimes during daylight hours that data, army information centers at Houston and San Antonio will give a series of test calls to each of the 23 district warning centers. These centers, under the direction of the Texas department of public safety, will send the warnings to 100 sub-district centers from which they will be transmitted to approximately 900 local control centers.

Next is the red warning, signifying that an air raid may occur in five minutes and that immediate action in regard to air raid precautions is to be taken. When the red warning is received by local control centers, the sirens and other air raid warning devices are used to notify the public and to have air raid wardens, auxiliary firemen and policemen, medical service staff, and all other units of the defense organization report to their designated posts of duty.

When all danger has passed, the white or "all clear" signal is given.

rice will it take to get an adjustment. If ODT shows no more speed than it has shown wisdom in cutting farmers and ranchers to far less mileage than we convenience riders here in town, everything on the farm may starve before relief comes.

represents the United States government and has been designated to see that both the tenants and the landlords get what is coming to them.

No eviction of tenants can take place in a defense-rental area without first notifying the area rent office. The only grounds on which eviction can be granted will be for non-payment of the legal rent which is the rent which was charged for the same accommodation on last March 1.

Tenants have been advised that any collusion with landlords to evade the rent ceilings is a violation of the federal law and the tenant and landlord are equally liable to the penalties.

Rent officials have indicated that registration of houses, apartments, duplexes and flats will start about the middle of December. At that time there will be no question in the minds of tenants what their legal rent should be because landlords will make statements to the government covering all points about each unit they are either renting or offering for rent and either a violation, evasion or attempted evasion of the federal rent regulations and registration carries a penalty of \$5,000 fine or a year imprisonment, or both.

Until this registration is held, the Office of Price Administration rent officials said that beginning December 1 the legal rent for housing accommodations in Howard county can be no more than was charged on March 1, 1942.

Ike And Ike, They Were Alike—But One Went Off To Africa



"BIG IKE"

TACOMA, Wash.—Big Ike and Little Ike always ran together in their boyhood home back at Abilene, Kansas.

So Big Ike—now Atty. Edgar H. Eisenhower, a leader in civic circles here the past 28 years—was duly proud of Little Ike—Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander of the American forces invading North Africa.

"Dwight could never get enough history," his brother recalled, as the story unfolded of our African operations. "That's one trait that, I think, led to where he is today."

Looking back to their youth, Edgar Eisenhower said there were five brothers, Arthur, Milton, Earl, Dwight and himself. Arthur was the oldest.

"I came next," he recalled, "and then Dwight. When Arthur went off in the world, Dwight and I ran together."

"We went through grade school and high school together; played all the games, fought all the battles together. I was Big Ike and he was Little Ike. The kids called us Ike to abbreviate Eisenhower, which was too much a mouthful to yell across the street."

The family had no military tradition. It had moved a couple generations ago from Pennsylvania to Kansas as pioneers. If their father had not been short

of money with which to educate his big family of sons, Dwight Eisenhower might not be leading the American forces today.

"It was simply that Dad didn't have the money to send us all to college," Attorney Eisenhower said. "Dwight wanted an education and he found he could get it at West Point. So there he went."

Both Hearty Men

There is only a year's difference between the two brothers. Friends here who knew the general when he was stationed at nearby Fort Lewis say they are alike as "two peas in a pod." Both are hearty men, love a laugh and activity and shun any semblance of snobbery.

Mrs. Ida Eisenhower, their mother, a spry, active lady although now 83 years old, came from Kansas to visit her Tacoma son in August. Their father died last March at Abilene.

The brother, Milton, is chief assistant to Elmer Davis, administrative head of the Office of War Information. Arthur is vice president of a Kansas bank and Earl is an electrical engineer at Pittsburgh.

Edgar chuckled when he recalled what their high school class historian, a girl named Cecil Curry, had predicted for Dwight.

It was that he would become a history teacher. Instead—"He became a history-maker," said Mrs. Edgar Eisenhower.

Cotton Crop About 80 Pct. Harvested

With an estimated 23,200 bales ginned to Saturday night, the 1942 Howard county cotton crop was around 80 per cent complete.

At the current rate of gathering bulk of the crop could be out of the way by Christmas or before the end of the year, although a scarcity of pickers made it apparent that gins would be operating well up into January of 1943.

Saturday evening five Big Spring gins showed a total of 10,451 bales, which, based on the factor of 45 per cent of the county's total ginnings being handled here, would account for more than 23,200 bales. Ginnings probably will end up in the neighborhood of 29,000 bales although there will be a few thousand of the amount out-of-county cotton.

Benefits from the sharp frost a week ago began to show up at gins past mid-week, both in the amount of cotton coming in and in the grade on snaps—which constitute the majority of offerings now. Bolls were cracking nicely and samples were brighter, but even so snaps were averaging only 16.50 and all going into the loan because the government differential was not so sharp on lower grades as the open market. The few picked bales brought offers around 18.50. Seed continued their steady decline, sagging to a flat \$47.

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Rice Bumps Off Baylor; Nix Leads Frogs To Win

Bruins Lose Second Place In 20-0 Loss

HOUSTON, Nov. 28. (AP) The hard-charging Rice Owls today defeated, 20 to 0, a strong Baylor team that was trying to win second-place honors in the Southwest conference after their hopes for a championship were blasted by Texas' victory over Texas A&M Thanksgiving.

The game, which was played in a drizzling rain at the start and a downpour at later intervals, was witnessed by nearly 7,000 spectators.

It was near the end of the first period before either side could move into scoring position. Dick Dwelle and Ed Cain moving to a first down on the Baylor 15. Then Wendell Williams, who sparked the Owls to last week's 28-0 defeat of Texas Christian, came into the game for Cain and Rice moved to a quick touchdown.

In three running plays Williams made a first down on the Bruin one. The Baylor line held for three line plays but on fourth down Dwelle plunged the remaining inches, and Bowen kicked.

Rice scored its other two touchdowns in the third period. Don Stephens racing 11 yards through center for one, and Ted Scruggs, an end, recovering a blocked punt behind the goal line for the other.

Stephens' score was set up when Milton Crain, Baylor fullback fumbled, Bob Tresch recovering for Rice on the Baylor 40. Virgil Eikenberg, Rice tailback who was leading ground gainers of the day with 60 yards, moved to the Baylor 26 in two plays. Three plays later he went nine yards off tackle for a first down on the Baylor 11 from where Stephens went over. Stephens fumbled the wet ball on the snapback for the attempted kick for extra point.

A few minutes later a wave of Owls blocked Bert Edmonson's punt, the ball bounded behind the goal and Scruggs pounced upon it for the score. Bowen kicked for extra points after the first and second touchdowns.

O'Neill Named Tiger Pilot; Baker Out

DETROIT, Nov. 28. (AP)—The Detroit Tigers announced today the dismissal of Del Baker as manager and the appointment of Steve O'Neill, former Cleveland Indians pilot, as his successor to head an entirely new board of strategy.

General Manager Jack Zeller said that O'Neill would be assisted as coach by Al Vincent, former manager of Detroit farm clubs, who replaces Mervyn Shees, dismissed with Baker. Charley Gehring, other Detroit coach, is to enter the nation's armed service this month, and his post will not be filled immediately.

Zeller's announcement said: "Del Baker has been notified he will be given his unconditional release at the Chicago meeting (major-league sessions) and that officials of the club will give him any desired assistance in making a favorable connection elsewhere. Terms with O'Neill were not disclosed."

Baker, who guided the Tigers to an American league pennant in 1940, was associated with the Detroit club for 14 years as minor league catcher and manager, and as coach and manager here. He succeeded Mickey Cochrane as Tiger pilot in August, 1938, and in four full seasons his teams finished fifth twice, tied for fourth one and won the 1940 pennant in an astonishing upset.

Year's Quail Crop Large

AUSTIN, Nov. 28. (AP)—A bumper crop of pump blue and Bob White quail in West Texas and an ample supply of the game birds elsewhere ripens this year the same day gasoline rationing becomes effective, leaving most hunters holding an empty bag at home.

William J. Tucker, executive secretary of the game, fish and oyster commission, estimated that only 10 per cent of the greatest quail population in many years in the west could be taken, even hunters had abundant gasoline, new ties and plenty of ammunition.

Quail season opens Tuesday, Dec. 1, and closes Jan. 16, except in some counties where special laws vary the open season.

Field men of the game commission report that natives claim there are more quail, both Blue and Bob White, in the region extending through the Panhandle to the vicinity of San Angelo and possibly farther south than they have seen in over 25 years.

Seahawks Trounced By Ohio Staters

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 28. (AP)—A powerful Ohio State football team with abundance of speed and deception outclassed the vaunted Iowa Seahawks 41 to 13 today before 27,289 shivering fans.

From the second play of the game, when Paul Sarringhaus slipped through the star-studded lineup of Lt. Col. Bernie Bierman's Navy officers for 68 yards to the Seahawk 12, the Bucks were on top and never in peril.

Passes Bring 14-6 Victory Over Ponies

DALLAS, Nov. 28. (AP) Emory Nix returned to the firing line today to pass Texas Christian to a 14-6 decision over Southern Methodist in a Southwest conference game.

It happened with rapidity in the second period as Nix regained his pitching eye to spark the Frogs to two touchdowns, one as the result of his passes and the other as a direct consequence.

T.C.U. surged 65 yards in its first score with Van Hall and Ralph Porter cracking the line and Nix flipping passes to Trotter Adams and Hall.

Southern Methodist started pounding at the Frog goal, driving once from its 48 to the T.C.U. three and another time to the six but the staunch purple line rose up to halt each surge like a brick wall.

But the Mustangs were not to be denied and the third time they launched a drive it paid off. It was on Abel Gonzales' passing that S.M.U. dented the Frog goal.

First Gonzales, the offensive star for the Mustangs both with running and passing, lined one to Hardy Miller and it gained 34 yards to carry to the Frog 25. Gonzales then pitched to Clarence McMin for 12.

Alford came charging through to toss Gonzales for a 12-yard loss on his next passing attempt but the Methodist star crossed the Frogs up on the following play by running right and for eight. Then he took aim and let fly to Miller for a touchdown. Clyde Flowers blocked Ed Green's try for point.

For the past few weeks Nix faded into obscurity on the T.C.U. team after being the early-season sensation. Today he was the X of old. Not only was his passing great but his running matched.

Georgia Will Make Trip To West Coast

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 28. (AP)—After triumphing over Georgia Tech 34-0 here today, the University of Georgia accepted an invitation to play in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 next.

The Bulldogs went into the game with invitations from the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans contingent upon a victory.

A few minutes after the game a vote was taken in the dressing room and the Georgia players overwhelmingly decided to accept the Rose Bowl invitation.

It will be the first visit of the Bulldogs to the Pasadena classic. Georgia Tech played in the Rose Bowl Jan. 1, 1929, defeating California 8 to 7.

Head Coach Wallace Butts announced Georgia's acceptance of the Rose Bowl invitation after the victory over Tech and the vote of the players.

There was no announcement of Georgia's plans regarding the date of departure and preparations for the classic with a west coast team yet to be decided.

Georgia lost only one game this season, to Auburn, 13-27, after winning nine straight games and being ranked the nation's number one team for two weeks in a row.

Today's conquest was the one which Georgia was thinking about, when Auburn came up on the blind side for an upset. Today Georgia was going to win, and nothing Tech threw in the way could stall that drive.

Georgia was leading, 7-0, before 10 minutes had elapsed; piled across two more touchdowns to gain a 20-0 advantage by half-time.

From there on there was no question of the outcome. Georgia put across a fourth touchdown in the third quarter and added a fifth on a pass-interception to round out the worst beating suffered by Tech in their series since 1931, when the Bulldogs won, 37-7.

All-America Frankie Sinkwich, playing his last regularly-scheduled game for Georgia, took the spotlight from Tech's freshman plint o'magic, Clint Castleberry, as Georgia's line clamped down on the fleet-footed southpaw and held him to a net of eight yards rushing.

BC Victim Of Shocking Upset

BOSTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—Holy Cross' thrice-beaten and once-topped Crusaders provided 1942's topsy-turvy inter-collegiate football season with its most shocking upset by overwhelming previously undefeated Boston College, 55-12, today before an overflow crowd of 42,000 at Fenway Park.

That score is an all time high in the 40-game series played by those traditional Jesuit rivals.

The spirited Crusaders, rated as 4-1 underdogs, despite the fact they can be relied upon to hit their season's playing peak against Boston College, took full advantage of the wide openings that resulted when their opponents kept throwing fast charging seven and eight men lines against them throughout the entire contest, which became ridiculously one-sided shortly after the opening kick-off.

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Georgia Tech Asked To Dallas Classic

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A decision by Georgia Tech officials will not be made before tomorrow as faculty permission must be obtained for the team to play in a bowl game.

In this Tech is similar to the University of Texas, champion of the Southwest conference, which was automatically invited to be host team but has yet to obtain faculty permission.

A decision on the Texas invitation will not be forthcoming before Monday.

Georgia Tech, always one of the most colorful teams in the nation and one time Rose Bowl victor, has been defeated once—today's 34-0 kicking by Georgia. The latter thus earned the right to go to the Pasadena classic.

Texas has lost two games—a 3-0 decision to Northwestern and 13-7 to Texas Christian.

Season Of Upsets Ends With Some Of The Biggest Ones

By HERB BARKER

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (AP)—Boston College and Georgia Tech, the nation's top-ranking football teams, went down to humiliating defeat today—a fitting climax to the most spectacular, unpredictable season in memory.

Boston College, hailed as the East's most powerful outfit and rated No. 1 in the last Associated Press weekly poll, was shelved into submission by Holy Cross 55 to 12. Georgia Tech was subdued by Georgia, 34-0, in a game which clinched the Southeastern conference title for Georgia and earned for the Bulldogs a berth in the Rose Bowl as well.

Both Boston college and Georgia Tech were unbeaten and untied, going into their final games and both apparently were headed for important bowl engagements. But Holy Cross and Georgia changed that.

Holy Cross annually plays its greatest game against its bitter rival but a victory over Boston College's all-star 1942 array seemed to the Crusaders' most ardent followers to be beyond reach. But from the start, Holy Cross ripped through Boston College's defenses, never gave the Eagles a chance to get started, and kept the pressure applied while the score mounted steadily. Johnny Bessemes and John Grigas were the Holy Cross stars in this sensational upset. Mike Holovak, Boston College's star back, was thoroughly shackled.

Georgia's victory over Tech could be classified as no upset but the margin the Bulldogs rolled up was a complete surprise. Frank Sinkwich, Charlie Trippi and Van Davis were the Georgia stars in this game, played before 45,000. Clint Castleberry, Tech's freshman ace, played well but Tech never really was in the ball game.

The final big Saturday of the campaign produced one big upset after another, one of the biggest being Navy's 14-0 conquest of an Army team which had been favored heavily in the betting. Played at Annapolis under war-time emergency conditions that held attendance down to less than 15,000, the service classic was a walk-away for the under-rated Midshipmen. Conquering play from the start, Navy scored in the second and third periods and held full command to the finish. Two freshmen, Joe Sullivan and Ben Martin, scored the Navy's touchdowns, Martin's coming on a pass from Harold Hamberg.

Ohio State, which probably will battle with Georgia for top place in the final Associated Press ranking poll next week, completed its great season with a convincing 41 to 12 defeat of Iowa Pre-Flight, with Les Horvath and Paul Sarnghaus scoring twice each. North Carolina Pre-Flight was upset by Fordham's Rams whose fullback, Steve Filipowicz, plunged over for a first period touchdown that won the game, 6-0. Georgia Pre-Flight rolled over Alabama, 35-19.

Michigan wound up its Big Ten season with a 28-14 victory over Iowa to gain third place behind Ohio State and Wisconsin. Indiana rolled up a 51-0 count on Fort Knox, and Illinois tripped Camp Grant, 20-0. Michigan State and Oregon State played a 7-7 draw and Oklahoma A & M subdued Detroit, 32-6. Kansas State sprang a big surprise in beating Nebraska, 19-0, knocking the Cornhuskers in to third place behind Missouri and Oklahoma in the final Big Six standings.

Rice whipped Baylor, 20-0, and Texas Christian won from Southern Methodist, 14-6, in Southwest conference games. Villanova trounced Temple, 20-7, in their annual clash.

In the South, Auburn rolled over Clemson, 41-13, and Jacksonville Naval conquered Duke, 13-0.

The University of Miami completed a successful season by beating West Virginia.

A tremendous crowd of 25,000 largest of the season, saw Notre dame whip Southern California, 13-0, at Los Angeles as Angelo Bertelli threw two touchdowns passes to Creighton Miller and Bob Livingston.

Stanford's Indians, just about the hottest team on the west coast in recent weeks, walloped St. Mary's Pre-Flight, 25-13. It was the first defeat of the season for the Pre-Flighters.

Notre Dame-USC Game Winds Up In Free-For-All

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28. (AP)—Notre Dame beat Southern California, arch football rival, in a rough and bruising game today that ended in a free-for-all between some of the players and a large group of spectators.

The final score was 13 to 0, the Irish counting on two sharp passes from the talented right arm of Angelo Bertelli, the first in the opening period, the other in the second.

The game was marked by several fistic exchanges on the field—some of the players were chased by the officials—and as the final gun fired, spectators and players milled around, trading punches near the Southern California bench.

The biggest gridiron crowd of the year, 65,000, must surely have been disappointed in the game as an exhibition of football.

The first touchdown, a 48-yard pass and run, Bertelli to Creighton Miller, was the bright spot in an otherwise drab contest.

Joseph B. David, president, made the announcement a couple of hours after Boston College, red hot favorite until mid-afternoon today, was knocked out of all consideration by a storming 55-12 defeat by Holy Cross.

Tulsa went through a great season undefeated in ten games while Tennessee, returning to the Sugar Bowl for a second appearance, lost 8 to 0 to Alabama and was tied at the beginning of the season 0-0 by South Carolina, and won its eight remaining games.

Tulsa's nomination to follow Missouri to the Sugar Bowl met an immediate favorable reaction here, and is believed will provide a powerful stimulus to ticket sales which have been lagging somewhat due to uncertainties of the war, and the current season with its many upsets.

Joseph B. David, president of the Sugar Bowl, said Tulsa had agreed to meet any team selected for the ninth annual renewal of the classic in which Fordham beat Missouri in a furious downpour last New Year's day.

Tulsa authorities accepted the bid as the highest honor ever to come to the little school with the great big football team, and Coach Henry Frka said the bid was "a signal tribute to the talent and spirit of as fine a bunch of athletes as I have ever seen."

"It is an honor to them and I believe I'm fair to the Sugar Bowl committee when I say the boys will be an honor to its New Year's day classic."

Middies Hand Out Surprise

ANNAPOLIS, Nov. 28. (AP)—Putting the final whacky touch to an Army-Navy game that was like no other service scramble in history, Navy's "completely outclassed" footballers all but chased the Cadets out of this ball park and into Chesapeake Bay today and rolled up a smashing 14 to 0 surprise triumph.

A crashing, crushing line that was a credit to Line Coach Rip Miller and a classy collection of young backs, notably the 160-pound Arkansas atom, freshman Harold Hamberg, produced the surprise package which not even Navy Head Coach John E. Whelchel thought the Middies could pull out of the hat.

Giving the Middies a string of four straight victories over the Army for the first time in the half-century history of this ancient classic, the astonishing Navy performance was put on for the entertainment of a mere 11,700 spectators. Only residents of a ten-mile area around Maryland's state house were permitted to buy tickets. Since the Cadets couldn't come, half of Navy's student battalion cheered for Army—although not very loud.

Hillenbrand Leads In 51-0 Triumph

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 28. (AP)—Paced by highly-publicized Billy Hillenbrand's running and bullet passes, Indiana romped to a 51-0 victory over Fort Knox today before 5,000 fans.

Hillenbrand completed 11 out of 18 passes, two for touchdowns, and was the sparkplug in a speedy, deceptive offensive that kept the heavier Armorers on the defending end most of the game.

Bulletin Here For All Coffee Retailers

Later on the retailer will be required to register with the ration board but not until he has filled out and handed in his bulletin to his wholesaler.

Municipality's Gas Applications Get Approval

Among those listed were pilot Officer W. F. Ash, 24, of 3211 Oliver street, Dallas, Tex.; Lieutenant Colonel A. P. Clark, 29, whose address is given as care of Colonel A. E. Wilbourn, Fort Sam Houston, Tex.; and pilot Officer G. C. Daniel, 25, of Skiatook, Okla. They were said to be behind barbed wire at prison camp Stalag Luft 8.

Tuberculin Tests For Students To Start Monday

Statistics compiled by the national Tuberculosis Society show that the danger age for the disease is between 15 and 19 years of age, high school student ages. As a result of such findings, every effort is being made by the society to educate high school youth about tuberculosis.

The Howard county Tuberculosis Society will begin Monday morning, a skin test clinic for all freshmen and seniors in the high school, an annual undertaking.

Dr. J. M. Woodall will have charge of the tuberculin testing campaign. The society declares that "Tuberculosis must go—but not to school."

Death rates from the disease in 1940 in Texas show that 281 youths between 15 and 19 died that year from tuberculosis as compared with only 71 deaths among children from 10 to 14 years of age.

Funds to carry on the tuberculin skin tests in the high school which locate, prevent, and educate young people about tuberculosis are derived from the annual Christmas seal sale now being conducted by the society.

Toni Jo Clutches A Crucifix As Death Comes In The Chair

LAKE CHARLES, La., Nov. 28 (AP)—Clutching a tiny crucifix symbolic of the Catholic faith with which she had consoled herself, Mrs. Annie Beatrice (Toni Jo) Henry, 26, was executed in the electric chair here at 12:12 p. m. (CWT), today for the cold-blooded murder of a man who had befriended her.

Her last request was that the crucifix be left in her hand when she is buried, probably in Potter's field. No relatives appeared to claim the body of the slim brunette woman from Shreveport, La., who was a prostitute at 13, a drug addict at 16, and a killer at 23.

Mrs. Henry, though nervous and admittedly afraid, was calm as she went to the chair set up in the parish jail here. She had cried when told her head must be shaved and after it was clipped instead, she covered it with a bright shawl as she was led to the execution chamber.

She had mustered a brief smile as she came into the chamber with Father Wayne Richard at her side. She was barelegged, wore black pumps and a simple black dress.

"I believe not," she replied when Deputy Sheriff Kenny Reid read the death warrant to her in private and asked her if she had a statement.

During the night she had written a final letter to her husband, Claude M. (Cowboy) Henry, serving a 50-year term in the Texas penitentiary for murder. She was permitted to talk by telephone with him yesterday.

She died for the slaying of J. P. Calloway, Houston, Tex., salesman, who had given her and a companion, Finner Burke, a ride at Orange, Tex., on St. Valentine's Day, 1940. She admitted shooting Calloway to death as he knelt in a rice field praying a few hours later, after she had forced him to disrobe at pistol point. He begged her for mercy.

Humble No. 1 Newman, Scurry county wildcat nine miles north-west of Snyder, in section 292-97-H&TC, had reached 3,083 feet in chart, making only two feet in some 24-hour periods.

Lee also spudded No. 1 Margaret Gray, scheduled 2,400-foot rotary wildcat in Borden county C SW SW 275-97-H&TC, eight miles east of Gail. Lee No. 1 J. A. Phillips, wildcat 15 miles south by southwest of Gail, C SW NE 15-52-SN-T&P, had passed 2,980 feet in lime and anhydrite.

The 'Pass The Ammunition' Boys Are Those In Ordnance Company

"Praise the Lord and pass the ammunition."

Radios and juke boxes have echoed those words across the nation. The song has become the sensation of World War II. So popular has it become that at Big Spring Bombardier School one of the soldier outfits has become known as the "Pass the Ammunition Boys."

The title fits, too, for they are the men of the 862nd Ordnance company and the title describes their duties. They are the men who pass the ammunition to the cadet bombardiers.

In a battle zone, the ordnance company would load giant bombers with two ton headaches for Hitler. Their duties at Big Spring

Bombardier school are less sensational, not less important.

They store the empty bomb cases. Then when the call comes they see that a batch of bombs are ready. They fill the empty cases with gravel and sand and then spot them with the black powder that gives the giant blue bombs their explosive power.

Then training ships take bombardier cadets over the range and the bombs are dropped on targets, practice targets now but soon to be real enemy objectives. Sometimes the bombs are duds. They plop to the ground but there is no explosion. That means that a live bomb is on the field, dod in dropping but still alive. Again the call goes to the ordnance company. A squad is sent to explode the duds.

This dangerous job is done in one of two ways. Electrical charges are used by the detonating squad or dynamite is used. The crew that does the work looks on it as routine, thinks nothing of the danger that could come from the explosion of one of these bombs which, though they are practice missiles, are nevertheless dangerous enough.

More bombs must be made though and again the ordnance company has a part to play in the task of salvage. Bomb particles, bits of metal scattered by the blasts, are collected, hurried for salvage where they will be made into new metal equipments and supplies, all designed to make the axis uncomfortable.

Commanding officer of the ordnance company is smiling First Lieut. Edwin C. Helkila, a Finn from Brooklyn. His adjutant is Chicagoan Second Lieut. Eugene C. Cashman.

Passing the ammunition is not the sole duty of the ordnance company, however. They operate the sheet and pistol ranges at the post, repair small arms and give instruction to officers and men in the use of the pistol.

In addition to this, Lieut. Herbert S. May acts as motor maintenance officer and Lieut. Alvin H. Walter is assigned as the man who keeps the powder dry, the ammunition officer.

It's an important task that the ordnance company has been assigned. Passing the ammunition to cadet bombardiers at Big Spring teaches those men how to pass trouble to Tokyo and Berlin.

Hog Killing Is Underway

Howard county farmers are pretty well taking care of their own pork supplies if the volume of butchering this early in the season may be taken as an indication.

Bugg's Wholesale Meat & Refrigeration plant butchered 27 hogs the first three days of last week and about a dozen the week before, although ideal butchering weather has really not yet arrived. Butchers expect the real rush to start after a week or two of continued cold weather, unbroken by unexpectedly warm days. Risk of losing the meat is then at a minimum.

In addition to farmers, most of whom are raising their own meat and other food supplies in greater quantities this year than ever before, many market men have been butchering to supply the local trade. Practically all farmers are doing their own processing. A few, however, are engaging commercial processors to grind the sausage.

Marcus Earl Woods, who is stationed with squadron 15-B at the U. S. Naval air station at Corpus Christi, has been assigned to new duties as a "checker" for seven or eight libraries at the station. He will be shifted from place to place to check out books in the various libraries. Marcus will be serving under the chaplain's office in this capacity.

Tubeless Tire Gets Trial Here

Big Spring had an introduction to "tubeless tires" Friday.

With no more attention than that of curious station attendants and instructions from Henry Byers, West Texas motor transportation manager for Continental Oil Co., tires on the Continental car of Dan Yarbro, Forsan, were changed to the tubeless variety.

There was no changing of castings, merely a removal of the tube and substitution of a valve stem being necessary. John Nutt, who made the installation, said that the castings were inflated with 80 pounds, about 20 pounds more than normal, and would be left that way for about three days. The heavy pressure, he said, would tend to seal the tire against the rim and automatically seal small holes in the casing.

None of the castings inflated had lost any pressure several hours after the substitution was made. Because the fourth tire and the spare each had too many nail holes, the experiment was held to three castings.

Metal valve stems with a tight fitting rubber washer below and above the rim held the air in. Valve cores had to be removed to get in a sufficient amount of air to hold the casing against the rim and thus start inflation. Once the tire was held firmly in place the valve core was replaced.

After a few days, the tire pressure will be reduced to normal, said Nutt. Continental is conducting a series of tests over West Texas on the "tubeless tire."

The name of Prince Rupert, western terminus of the Canadian National Railway, was chosen in a price contest in which 15,000 participated.

Soil Conservation Will Help Boost War Production

Our country is in an emergency and the farmers and ranchers of the nation all desire to render the best contribution possible. For some that has meant joining the armed forces but as a rule the most important contribution is increased production and a guarantee that our agricultural plant will not break down in the middle of this emergency. All production goals set by the president must be met. These goals include ships, guns, tanks, planes, and agricultural production.

Industrial production goals are being met by careful selection and conversion of factories to war needs. Selective service in industry reduces waste and speeds production.

Selective service in agriculture is of major importance in producing crops that are needed most and at the same time conserve the basic resource of the farm and ranch.

Industrial production cannot be separated from agricultural production.

The men and women who work in the nation's war plants will need 14,000,000 acres of food crops in order to put forth their best efforts in producing these industrial goods. Again, "We cannot separate industrial from agricultural production."

Sad experiences in depleted soils and "dust bowls" after the past war have taught us a lesson that should not be forgotten in this time of emergency.

In the last great emergency, 20 odd years ago, we had a vast acreage of unfilled land available. We used that in meeting the emergency and created another, the "dust bowl". We do not now have the new lands to open. There is a shortage of farm labor. New farm machinery and equipment cannot be had and we can scarcely get repairs for the machinery we now have. The only means available for increasing agricultural production and avoid the danger of a break down is the application of the needed soil and water conservation practices.

A lot has been learned during the last 20 years. Sandy soils that are not properly protected with stalk, stubble and other measures will blow excessively and become unproductive. We know that water will run off of land even though the land is apparently flat. We know that range land will produce more pounds of beef if properly stocked than if too many cows are expected to secure food to live, produce calves and put on weight. We know also that an overstocked range is more seriously damaged during a drought than one that is properly stocked.

Our experiment stations and many farmers and ranchers have proven that the installation of good conservation practices will

maintain the productivity of the soil and will definitely increase production of crops and livestock. The present emergency challenges agriculture to adopt a widespread use of conservation practices and overcome, to some extent, the labor and machinery shortages that threaten to prevent meeting the goals set for agricultural production.

Meat Sharing Plan To Be Explained By Victory Councils

Plans are being completed this week by the Victory Councils for carrying the plans for meat sharing to the farm homes of the counties. This week, Nov. 30 to Dec. 5, neighborhood leaders are to visit their groups to inform them of what the government expects of them, and secure their pledge to cooperate in sharing the meat. Many incorrect reports are going the rounds. Farm people are asked to learn the truth from their Victory leaders, before passing judgment on this meat rationing plan; and before forming any plans related to it. If your leader does not visit you during next week, you should contact one of them.

Here Are Tips For Saving Your Sugar

Here are a few tips for making the most of your sugar. Perhaps you are trying to save back some sugar for Christmas cooking.

First: Serve desserts hot whenever possible, because hot food tastes sweeter than cold.

Second: Add a tiny bit of salt to bring out flavor and sweetness.

Third: Save every bit of juice from canned fruit and use it to sweeten and flavor fruit drinks, or in puddings and gelatin desserts.

Fourth: Be sure all sugar is completely dissolved.

Now for some family desserts that call for little sugar. Old fashioned short cake made with biscuit dough is popular at this season. With it use lightly sweetened fruit—fresh, dried, or canned.

Use cream if you like. Fruit cobbler is also economical with sugar. Bread-crumbs puddings are also sugar-saving desserts. Dried fruits have so much natural sugar that they need little sweetening. Also, sweet fresh fruits can do their bit. In making fruit cup, save sugar by combining a sweet fruit with a tart fruit. Custard desserts, cornstarch pudding, and cottage pudding may all be made without any sugar. They can be made with honey or syrup. Congress Distrust Of Bureaucrats Unfortunate Situation In Wartime

There is a growing feeling in Congress that certain bureaucrats in Washington are using the war as an excuse for requesting more powers than the federal government needs or should have. This feeling is based on the suspicion that some persons in high places

are more interested in exercising power for its own sake than they are in winning the war.

The situation is unfortunate, because it creates mutual distrust between the executive and legislative branches of the federal government at a time when there should be a complete confidence between them and it may have the

unhappy result of causing Congress to be slow in granting or to withhold completely certain specific powers that the executive actually requires to carry on the war effectively.

On November 2, a day before the election, President Roosevelt sent to Congress a message in which he recommended "early enactment by the Congress of legislation to the extent required for the effective prosecution of the war, the free movement of persons, property and information into and out of the United States." To achieve an all-out war production effort, declared the President, we must implement and supplement the steps already taken by the Congress and the President to eliminate those peacetime restrictions which limit our ability to make the fullest and quickest use of the world's resources.

The President wound up his message by saying: "It is my judgment that the program can best be dealt with by giving the President for the duration of the war, but no longer, the power to suspend selectively and flexibly all laws, regulations, orders, decrees, executive orders or any such laws, in such a way as to meet new and perhaps unforeseen problems as they may arise, and on such terms as will enable the chief executive and the government agencies to work out in detail parallel action in other countries."

It is hard to see, if this message means what it says, why anybody interested in winning the war would object to this request. Yet many members of the Congress, both Democrats and Republicans, objected very seriously to granting the request, which can mean only one thing, namely, that they do not believe the message means what it says. Members of Congress offered several different theories as to what was behind the request.

Of course, many took the position that the President meant exactly what he said and merely wanted additional war powers. Others suspected that the President realized that there might be objection in Congress to giving him more power of this kind and therefore he asked for a lot with the hope of getting a little. Still others, however, thought they smelled a rat; they suspected, from experience in the past, that a group of inner-circle men, perhaps without the knowledge of the President, were back of the movement and were trying to get powers for carrying out their post-war planning schemes, for they pointed out, the "duration of the war" limitation really means little, since the administration in power at the time when the war is over regardless of when actual fighting ceases.

There were those who insisted that the President as commander-in-chief of the army and navy has all the powers, under existing war legislation, necessary to set aside the restrictions he spoke of. But on this point the President, in his message had said: "I have already exercised by executive order the power granted under the first war powers act to extend to the government procurement agencies the authority granted to the secretary of the navy to make emergency purchases abroad of war materials and to enter them free of duty. This has measurably assisted our war effort, but it only partially eliminates the obstacles prescribed by law which I have already mentioned."

Bill to implement this presidential request for more war powers were introduced in the senate by Chairman George of the finance committee and in the house by Chairman Doughton of the ways and means committee. But apparently these enabling bills were written "up town" and they were introduced in the senate and in the house "by request," which generally indicates that the two committee chairmen did not wish to assume responsibility for the language of the bills and which is reminiscent of the old New Deal days. These bills, if enacted in their original form, would in effect give the president blanket dictatorial powers over all immigration, tariffs, foreign communications and related matters. Some members of congress pointed out that with this power the president could, if he saw fit, regulate all tariffs and scuttle the immigration laws, suspend all quotas and let into the country or bar from it whom he pleased.

Attorney General Biddle, Undersecretary of War Patterson, WPB Director Nelson, Undersecretary of the Navy Forrestal, Chairman Land of the Maritime Commission and Milo Perkins of the Board of Economic Warfare all appeared before the house ways and means committee in closed session and urged favorable action on the bill. At first the committee was reluctant to approve the measure; it decided to hold open hearings on the proposal, scrutinize it from every possible angle and then to draft a bill according to its own notion. The mood on Capitol Hill now is to give the president only such legislation as he is willing to ask for
