

Coach Head Speaker Annual Football Banquet

Littlefield Quarterback Banquet is set for Thursday, Dec. 12, at 7:30 in the Littlefield High School Cafeteria.

One of the event will be the Gene Pratt Most Valuable Player Award, the Pete Fighting Heart Award, and the offensive back, defensive lineman and defensive awards.

Coach, assistant football coach and A&M will be the banquet speaker. He is the former head coach of High School where his team

won three straight state championships and set a national and state record still undisputed for AAAA schools with 49 consecutive wins.

This is his first year at A&M where they finished with an 8-3 record for their best season record since 1956. His head coaching record thus far is 141-29.

The coach is a Missouri University graduate where he was an All-Conference football player.

Price for the banquet is \$5 per person, and this amount pays for an athlete's plate too.

Wildcat, Mustang Gridders Picked in All District, All South Plains

These are in for this year's selection of All-District gridders and the Littlefield-Journal has named its selections on the Class AA All-South Plains.

Turner made the team both ways, being named safety on the defensive team, also.

Regional contenders from the Olton Mustangs dominated both of the dream teams, with Mustang fullback Joe Alcorta, running back Glen Johnson, and offensive lineman J. D. Caudle being named to the All-District offense. Mustang linebacker Glen Johnson

and defensive lineman Greg Gregory shared the All-District defensive list with Wildcat Turner and Hopping and outstanding gridders from Dimmitt and Friona.

Other unanimous coaches' choices for the All-District team include running back Robert Mayberry of Dimmitt, Friona's end Dale Cleveland, linemen Larry Silhan of Morton, Roy Don Rector and Kenny Stowers of Friona and Dimmitt's kicker Ricky Wright on the offensive team.

Mayberry was also named to the defense as safety along with Friona's linebacker Davy Carthel.

Besides nabbing the majority of the post-season All-South Plains honors, Mustang coach Ed Miller was named Coach of the Year and Mustang offensive and defensive All-Districter and two-way All-South Plains choice Glen Johnson was touted Player of the Year.

The Olton crew pranced to a 901 regular season without a stumble until they reached the regional playoffs Friday.

Besides Olton's Johnson, Dimmitt's running and defensive back Robert Mayberry got tabbed for two-way choices on the All-South Plains squad.

Johnson rushed 6.2 yards on his 236 attempts for 1,463 yards, ran up 16 touchdowns, caught two passes for 18 yards, snared three out of three aerial for 78 yards and another TD.

On defense, Johnson averaged 15.3 tackles a game from his linebacker berth and intercepted two passes.

Olton offensive guard Caudle was named to the All-South Plains offense, and the Littlefield Wildcat's Rick Hopping grappled one of the All-South Plains defensive linemen posts and Cat Bill Turner was named punter on the defensive team and honorable mention running back on the offense.

This project is planned by the Rotary Club to work in conjunction with the Library Fund Drive now underway and sponsored by the Lamb County Memorial Library Corporation.

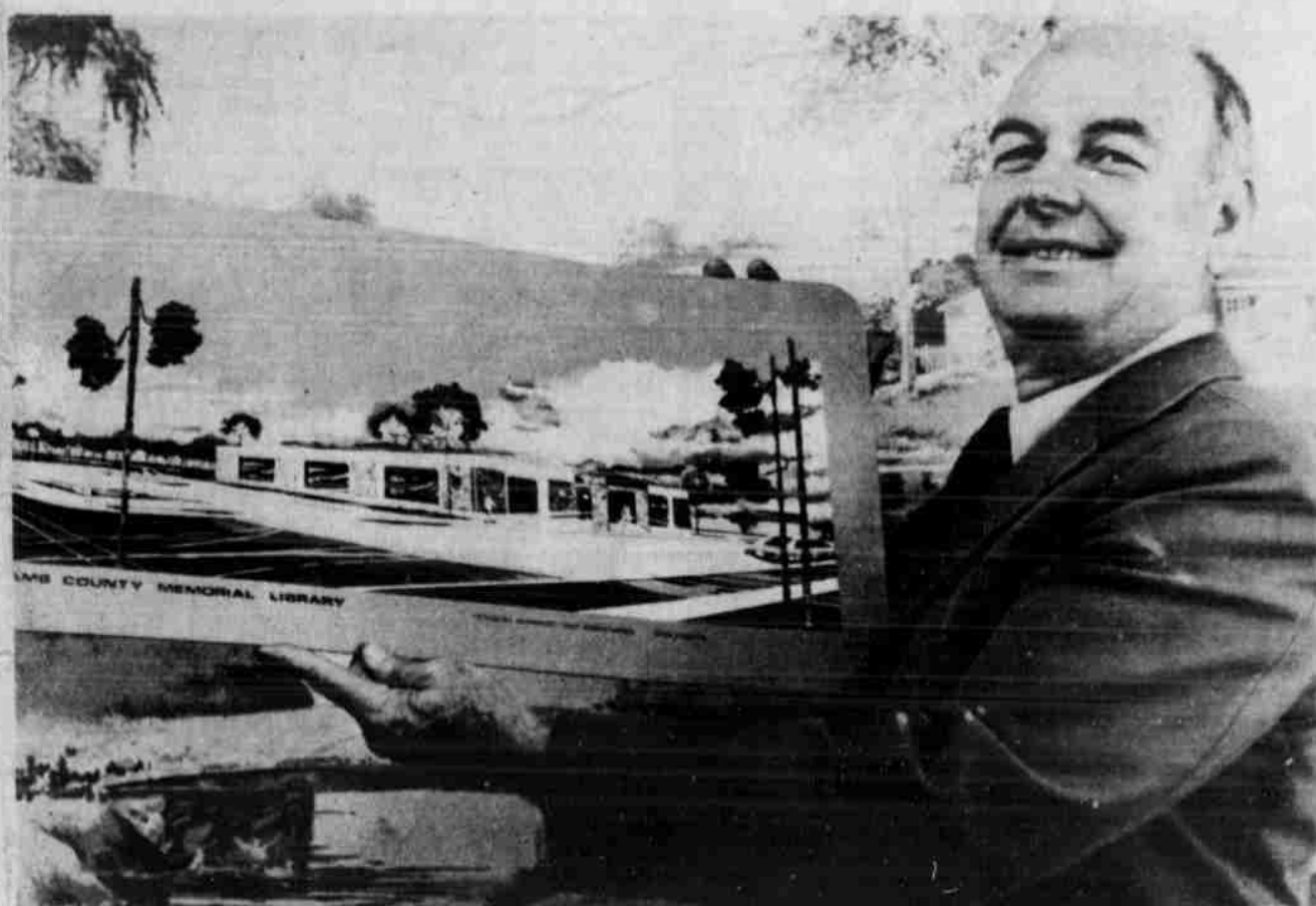
New Business Opens Today

Councilmen Purchase Vehicles, Meet Tonight

In a special called meeting at noon Wednesday, Nov. 27, Littlefield's city councilmen met to open and award bids for two new cars and a three-quarter ton pickup; and will meet again tonight at 7 p.m. in the council chamber of city hall to discuss matters of business for their regular first-of-the-month session.

On the agenda tonight are two items of business.

In matters of old business, councilmen will discuss the lease of a five-acre tract of the airport property.

New business will include a discussion on the disposal of old refuse containers.

Other areas under study or in progress include the sanitation collection system, traffic sign replacement program, food service sanitation ordinance, equipment maintenance program and cable television.

In the meeting Wednesday, Carlisle-Oldham Ford, Inc. was awarded the bids for both. Their gross bid for the two cars was \$11,492. With a discount of \$5,092, the total net price was \$6,400—the lowest bid of the four submitted. Delivery date was set at 45 days.

Other bids submitted included: Armes Chevrolet, with a gross bid of \$11,258.60, less a \$3,915.86 discount, making the total net price come to \$7,342.74.

Garland Motor Co., with a gross bid of \$11,476.80 for a 1975 Dodge, less a \$3,555 discount, making the total net price

come to \$7,921.80; and a gross bid of \$11,396.80 for a 1975 Plymouth, less a discount of \$3,606.80, making the net price come to \$7,790.00.

Carlisle-Oldham's net bid of \$4,444.40 for the three-quarter ton pickup was accepted over Armes Chevrolet's low net bid of \$4,360.82, and Garland Motor Company's net bid of \$4,834.30 and alternate bids of \$4,306.02 and \$4,473 for 1975 models, and alternate bids of \$3,959 and \$3,900 for 1974 models.

county car while being taken to the Mental Health Center in Plainview about midnight Sunday, then "went berserk" again at the Center causing some \$5,000 damages according to Central Plains Hospital authorities.

Dr. Lee began his practice of Medicine in Oklahoma after the war, and then moved to Anton in 1949 where he practiced medicine with the assistance of his wife, Letha, until his retirement in 1966.

Dr. Lee is a member of the First Baptist Church of Anton. He is a member of the Anton Lodge 1272 AF&AM and a life member of the Guymon, Okla. Lodge 335 AF&AM where he is a past master. He holds 32nd degree, York rite and a Shriner. He has been affiliated with these Masonic bodies about 75 years.

He was active in many other civic organizations until his retirement. He also has been listed in "Who's Who" of both Oklahoma and Texas.

Soviet Brutality: A Reminder

WHEN IN WASHINGTON, the Soviets may be all smiles and champagne toasts.

Back home in Moscow, however, the Communist regime remains as hard-fisted and brutal as ever with its own people.

This unfortunate fact was underscored in September at a Moscow art show that was broken up Russian-style by bulldozers, trucks and high-power water hoses manned by scores of Soviet plainclothesmen posing as workmen. Although the machinery ostensibly was on hand to begin a construction project, when the crowd of about 200 had been forcibly scattered, the equipment left also.

WASHINGTON POST correspondent Peter Osnos reports that, "Near the end of the hour-long confrontation, men who said they were members of the Kom'somol (Communist youth organization) roughed up two American correspon-

dents and threatened others in the crowd of reporters, diplomats and Russian bystanders. Veteran diplomats, journalists and Soviet onlookers said it was the nastiest scene of its kind in Moscow in years."

The "crime" of the artists, it seems, is that they had elected to exhibit their paintings, even though they didn't have specific written permission to do so.

"THE QUESTION being asked today" in Moscow, says Osnos, is "why at a time when Moscow is trying to improve its image abroad, the Soviet authorities decided to deal with the show by mounting the workers' charade instead of sending in uniformed police to stop it, if that is what they wanted to do."

Why? Because a bear that learns to bark like a dog—and even act like one on occasion—isn't a dog. It's still a bear. And, given the true nature of the beast, when you least suspect it, the bark will turn to a roar.

The Secrecy Issue

THE RECENT overwhelming vote by Congress to override President Ford's veto of amendments to the Freedom of Information Act was a stunning blow to the White House. At the same time, it was a classic victory for the people's right to know what their government is up to.

President Ford cited three primary reasons for his veto: (1) a provision authorizing Federal judges to examine agency records to see if they can properly be withheld could endanger our diplomatic relations and defense secrets; (2) the bill would permit access to sensitive law enforcement investigation files; and (3) the time limits for agencies to respond to requests for information are "unreasonable."

PROponents of the bill, however, note that its 17 amendments were hammered out in a bipartisan fashion over three years. They contend that the legislation has been carefully drafted to exempt materials that logically should be kept secret, including legitimate national defense information.

"I believe that this bill does protect those lawful sensitive areas of government," said conservative Rep. John

Roussellot (R-Calif.). Many other members of Congress also respected for their mature judgment likewise believe the amendments provide necessary safeguards for legitimate national secrets. They argue convincingly that it is needed to force government officials to abide by the provisions of the original Freedom of Information Act passed in 1966. Examples of bureaucratic thwarting of public access to information under that ACT abound.

WHILE FEELING some nervousness over the new arrangement as it affects national security information, we believe on balance the bill is a good one. Our citizens must be given the opportunity to view the work of their government wherever it will not threaten the real national interest.

A prime lesson from Watergate is that too often the mistakes and even illegality of our government have been hidden under the stamp of secrecy. Although there is a danger of now overreacting and permitting too much access to federal files, we believe it is a danger that our democracy must risk.

Mailing For Christmas

LAST YEAR one and a half million undeliverable pieces of mail ended up in the "Claims, Inquiry and Undeliverable" section in the Postal Services' office in Chicago, otherwise known as the "dead letter office."

This year Wilbur Holmes, manager of the office, expects the volume to grow by 15 percent. Manager Holmes says the increase will be due to those who think they can get their mail delivered if they don't bother to put postage on it.

"IN A COUPLE of months," Holmes says, "The unpaid mail problem should virtually disappear as people discover that this petty rip-off won't work."

So, when you start sending out your Christmas cards and packages, the first

thing you had better do is see that sufficient postage is attached. Another simple rule to get your season's greetings delivered is to put your full return address on your mail.

"IT'S A GREAT MISTAKE not to," says Holmes, "because it is the letter families send once a year that is most likely not to be delivered. If the sender doesn't know his friends have moved to another house more than a year ago, his letter won't reach them. If there is no return address the sender might wonder why his friends didn't respond to his card, not knowing that his greeting ended up in the dead letter unit."

Holmes also warns senders not to address their mail merely to a name and a building such as "William Jones, John Hancock Building, Chicago."

And last but not least, poorly wrapped packages are sure candidates for the dead letter office.

SO, IF YOU want your Christmas greetings to get to their destination, take a tip from the man who knows and takes a little extra time to see that they are carefully addressed, have the right postage, and are packaged properly. Merry Christmas.

PLAN AHEAD NOW for holiday spending.

HERE'S AN EASY recipe for gingerbread, and you can keep it in the ice box until you're ready to use it. My mother gave it to me when I visited her Thanksgiving Day.

ICE BOX GINGERBREAD

Sift together:

- 4 cups flour
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. soda
- 2 tsp. ginger
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. allspice
- 1/8 tsp. ground cloves

Cream

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs—add one at a time
- 1 cup sorghum

Add flour mixture alternately with 1 cup buttermilk.

Keep covered in refrigerator. Cook in muffin pans for individual servings or cook all together in 8"x8" square pan or baking dish. (According to desired thickness.)

I'VE HAD SEVERAL calls about this

quick and easy recipe for pie. It makes its own crust, so there's no bother there.

IMPOSSIBLE PIE

Cream together:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 stick margarine

Beat in:

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- pinch salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup coconut
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Pour into a 9-inch Pyrex or glass pie pan and bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

TIPS AND TIDBITS:

WHEN PREPARING fresh pineapple—after slicing off the outside layer, use a strawberry huller to remove the "little brown eyes" that remain in the fruit.

CHECK THE LABEL to see if meat should be "cooked before eating." Don't assume that it is fully cooked.

SPEEDY DESSERT IDEAS: Roll balls of your favorite ice cream in corn flakes. Serve with chocolate sauce... Keep a cake in your freezer for unexpected entertaining.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS are low in calories and provide a large amount of vitamin C as well as other vitamins and minerals.

ADD CHOPPED, ripe olives and minced onion to mayonnaise or salad dressing before mixing with eggs for egg salad.

MAKING HOMEMADE soup! Chicken wings, necks and backs are often priced lower than beef soup bones.

Farm Workers Survey Slated

Information about farm work done for pay during the past year and about migratory farm work will be collected by the Bureau of the Census in this area.

Rosemary McNeese of Rt. 1, Amherst will visit a sample of households here during the week of Dec. 9-13.

The farm work questions are in addition to the ones asked regularly in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor.

This ongoing survey provides a continuous measure of conditions in America's labor force. The Labor Department's report for third quarter 1974 showed that the Nation's unemployment rate averaged 5.5 percent, well above the 5.1 percent average rate of the second quarter. Employment reached a new quarterly high of 86.3 million, though the rate of growth has slowed since last year, the report states.

About 50,000 households across the country, scientifically selected to represent a cross section of U.S. households, take part in the survey each month. All information reported to the Census Bureau is confidential by law and can be published only in statistical totals so that no person or household can be identified.

Petroleum Firms To Make Refunds

Agreements on price refunds totaling \$1,512,464 were reached during October between the Federal Energy Administration and 41 petroleum firms in the five-state southwest region of FEA, according to Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, FEA regional administrator.

The refunds were the result of 80 investigations completed during October in Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Audits for the southwest region are conducted by investigators from six branch offices of FEA's compliance and enforcement division in New Orleans, San Antonio, Dallas, Oklahoma City, Houston and Little Rock.

Fowler said any individual who has a complaint on possible over-charging should contact the nearest enforcement and compliance office of FEA.

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Lights Boost Egg Production

To get top production out of laying hens, Texas poultrymen are utilizing artificial lighting programs. Natural daylight will not do the job, except for a few days each year.

Birds have a small gland located at the base of the brain, directly behind the eye, which regulates the egg forming hormones. "For this gland to function properly, at least 14 hours of light per day must reach the hen," says Dr. William O. Cawley, poultry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
