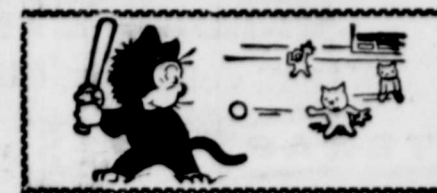


The average automobile traveler party drove a total of 1,117 miles while spending 5.8 days touring the State. This was an increase of 88 miles or 8.5% over 1965.

Airmail Rate To Increase By May 1

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail — averaging 13% — were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, the Postmaster said.

This was the first general increase in international rates since July, 1961.

The increases are:

1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13c a half ounce to 15c.
2. Airmail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15c a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.
3. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15c a half ounce to 20c.
4. Airmail letter rates to the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25c a half ounce.
5. Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2c each from 11c to 13c.
6. Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10c per piece to all countries except Canada.
7. Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11c to 13c. Post cards raised from 7c to 8c.
8. Most printer matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for six months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canadian post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.
9. Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20c a parcel, an average of 7%.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface 3rd class type printed matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U.S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and we are not being changed at this time," Postmaster Zimmerman said.

The Community Action Committee met, with tohers interested in the Community Service Center, Tuesday, April 25, in the Texas Electric Reddy Room. Rev. Don Youngblood, chairman, presided.

Mrs. Ken Blankenship, director of the Center and her assistants, Mrs. Annabelle Harris and Mrs. Ruth Hadaway, have been attending training sessions the past week, to learn the services offered by the County, State and Federal governments.

"Their first duty," explained Rev. Youngblood, "will be to survey the depressed areas of our town, learn where needs are the greatest and what they are."

After compiling this information, it will be given to the Service Center's Board of Directors for evaluation and determination of a course of action. Those deciding will be Rev. Youngblood, Mrs. D. C. Dodson, Mrs. Hugh Preston, Joe Salter, John Larson, Mrs. Edith Norman and Mrs. Lillian Prince.

The purpose of the Center is to help the lower-income families better their lives, by teaching skills to the wage earners, enabling them to secure better jobs.

Classes, which will be taught by volunteers, will be established. Some of the subjects to be taught include small appliance repairs; agribusiness, how to grow products and sell them; tree and yard care, (for which there is a great demand) home gardening and photography. If enough are interested, there will also be a typing class.

It is hoped a recreation program may be devised for the aged.

The Community Service Center will open May 8th. Those requiring assistance or information may telephone 569-1831 beginning on that date.

Persons seeking help for disabled or retarded children, or with other personal problems, will receive direction to the proper organization for the type aid they require.

The more interest shown by local citizens, the more the Government will be inclined to show approval and generosity.

The Government has not yet allotted money for a child development program, but when it does, "An application from the Burkburnett Action Committee will be first on the desk of the right man!" said Rev. Youngblood.

This program, the most desired, would make it possible for mothers in the depressed areas, to go to work, adding to the family income. This would, in turn, assure the children a brighter future and a more abundant life.

Mrs. Geraldine Nolan, field representative of the Community Action Corporation of the North Texas Area, was present and assisted with describing the functions of the Center.

Members of the North Texas Area Board are A. R. Hill, W. M. Norman and Howard Locklin.

Applications for a part-time secretary and a custodian for the Center are ready. Interested persons may write to Box 896 for interviews.

It was voted to meet again May 5th, in the Service Center and every third Monday thereafter.

USELESS AS UNLAI D EGGS

As one reads forecasts of the demand for oil prod-
ucts in the next 25 years, one wonders where such astron-
omical supplies will come from. Fortunately, the oil com-
panies are planning far in advance of today's demands.
Their research and exploration activities circle the globe
and probe beneath the oceans.

Secretary of Interior Udall recognizing the need for
developing domestic reserves of crude oil recently
recommended leasing to private companies government
owned oil shale land in Colorado, Utah and Wyoming.
It is estimated that more than a trillion barrels of oil
are locked in these lands. Tremendous amounts of cap-
ital and ingenuity will be required to transform it into
useful petroleum products required by modern civiliza-
tion.

Secretary Udall recognized that undeveloped oil
reserves on public land are as useless to the people as
an unlaid egg. Cooperation between government and pri-
vate enterprise in developing such locked-in resources
is vital to life and security in a changing world.

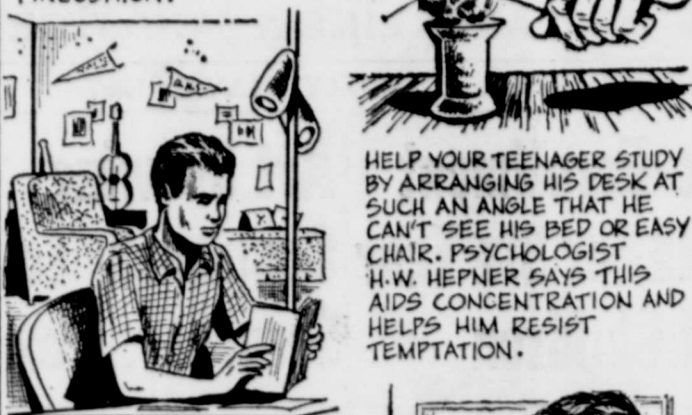
In ceremonies commissioning the Navy's \$130 mil-
lion Atlantic Undersea Test and Evaluation Center at
West Palm Beach, Florida, Vice President Hubert H.
Humphrey said: "This center has been established pri-
marily for purposes of national security. But the knowl-
edge we gain here will help us in other ways. . . . per-
haps the greatest promise of all lies in food from the
sea."

The South African Minister of Economic Affairs,
Dr. Nico Diederichs, said in West Germany in January,
1967, that South Africa, almost the sole supplier of the
western world's gold, wanted the see the price of gold
at least doubled. The Minister warned that all but a
handful of South Africa's gold mines would be forced
to close down over the next 20 years if the gold price
were not noticeably raised.

According to a news report from Atlantic City, N.
J., a survey of more than 16,000 school children in Atlan-

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JAVELINA

By Vern Sanford

To hear some people tell it, the javelina stands ten feet tall and has a temper like a short-fused stick of dynamite, ready to go off at the slightest provocation.

Probably no other animal, certainly none in Texas, has a reputation that is blown so far out of proportion to its actual character. Actually javelina, is a fairly small creature weighing 40 pounds or less that will flee at the first hint of danger. There are some people like August Timmerman, game warden at Hondo, who actually run the pigs down with dogs and catch them alive.

Probably much of this talk can be attributed to the javelina's poor eyesight. Often when one whiffs human scent, it will take off through the brush, running right at the hunter. This is because it can't distinguish the human. Naturally, the hunter believes the little animal to be "charging" him. Thus the overblown reputation of the javelina gets another follower.

But despite its dubious reputation the javelina gets another follower.

But despite its dubious reputation, the javelina is a sporting game animal. They are quite plentiful in the brush country of South Texas and it is fascinating to hunt them in this thorny environment.

One of the favorite ways to hunt javelinas is with dogs. Since a javelina leaves a distinctive odor behind, from the musk bag on its hip, it can be easily trailed by dogs.

This is about as sure-fire as any hunting in Texas. There are people like Timmerman at Hondo who can line up hunts, for \$50 per hunter, with two javelinas guaranteed.

This type of hunting requires a trained dog pack, of course, and that's the secret. It doesn't take an experienced dog long to get on the track and bring the pigs to bay.

Although the javelina season runs concurrently with the deer season, Nov. 16-Dec. 31, there are many counties where there is no closed season on the pigs and there is no limit on the number you can kill. Winter, after deer season has closed, is the favorite hunting time. Then the weather is cold, which makes for good dog hunting, and there is no danger of snakes.

Counties that have no closed season and no specified bag limit include Crockett, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, Edwards, Uvalde, Medina, Frio, Zavala, Dimmit and Webb, with the latter six being the best possibility. Karnes, Zapata, Jim Hogg and Brooks, all prime javelina counties, have no closed season but do have a

hunter bag limit of two per year.

There are several ways to hunt javelina. One of the most convenient is to hunt them just as you would deer, from an elevated stand.

Get up on one of these windmill structures scattered through the brush country and wait and look. Sooner or later, you'll probably glimpse two or more of the pigs stealing into the open.

Another method is stalk hunting.

To me, this is the most fascinating method of all. You creep stealthily through the brush, always looking, listening and smelling. This is one kind of hunting where your nose is a definite asset. Often you can smell the pigs or hear them grunting and clicking their teeth long before you see them.

Probably more javelinas are bagged with deer rifles, by hunters out after deer, than by any other weapon. But actually, this is far too much firepower. The javelina isn't a tough animal and it doesn't require much bullet to bring one down.

When chasing them with dogs, most hunters prefer the ordinary .22 rimfire pistol. They move in close after the pigs have been brought to bay and shoot them in the head.

For stalk hunting, the .22 Magnum is a suitable cartridge. Also quite good is the .30 30 carbine, since most shots will be at close range and must be made quickly, before the pigs are swallowed by the dense brush.

The javelina is very quick on its feet, for short distances, but it doesn't travel very far in one spurt. Often you can stay on the trail of a herd and soon come upon them again. Traditionally, javelinas are gregarious animals. Usually they'll wander in bands of five or more.

Despite what you might have heard to the contrary, the javelina isn't bad to eat. An old boar has a strong taste, but the younger ones are quite delectable.

A javelina is best barbecued. Its meat tends to be dry, as does the flesh of most wild game, so apply a liberal amount of barbecue sauce as you cook.

Plastics require special cleaning treatment, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Plastics should never be cleaned with a solvent. To remove dirt and grime, sponge with warm water and mild detergent, allow to soak for a few minutes so the dirt will loosen, then rub briskly. Rinse and wipe with a damp cloth until nearly dry. Wax to restore luster.

Nail polish and remover, shoe polish, and ball point pen ink will cause permanent damage to plastics and should be removed as quickly as possible with a clean cloth.

To remove paint, wipe off with a clean white cloth dampened with turpentine or kerosene. Do not use paint remover on plastics. Use care when using turpentine and pretest it on a small inconspicuous area.

Sulphide stains, from direct contact with hard boiled eggs, permanent hair wave solution, and other sulphur solutions, use six per cent hydrogen peroxide. Place a clean white cloth over the spotted area and pour a liberal amount of the peroxide, available at drug stores, on the cloth. Allow it to remain on the spot for 30 minutes to an hour. If the spot persists, allow the cloth to remain overnight. Do not let the hydrogen peroxide solution come in contact with stained or laquered wood, or permit it to seep into the seams of upholstery, since it will weaken cotton thread.

To remove tar, asphalt and creosote, wipe off as quickly as possible with a cloth dampened with kerosene or naphtha. Tar left for any length of time will produce an indelible, yellow-brown stain.

WASHINGTON AND

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Businessmen were formerly urged to mail early for Christmas delivery, but now according to National Federation of Independent Business members, it's advisable to mail early merely to send mail a short distance—even in the same city!

Business Week Magazine recently conducted a report on the situation. They found that the Chicago office because of its central location is swamped with mail all year around, and has been forced to divert truckloads of mail to far distant cities like St. Louis, New York, and Buffalo for sorting and shipment to sectional centers.

The San Francisco post office which also handles all military mail going to the Pacific, has had an annual volume percentage rise of 11%. Volume in Manhattan has risen 8.5%.

In Boston, officials report a deluge of mail, and reveal that at the present rate of increase, everyone in the U.S. will have to work for the Post Office by the year 2000 in order to deliver mail on time.

National Cash Register, Dayton, Ohio, reports they mailed tickets to their Business Equipment Show in early September, but were not received till late October by angry recipients who missed the event.

Similar complaints are made by firms announcing sales by mail, claiming customers "not

get the notices until after the sales are completed.

Post Office officials, in turn, blame business for their own gripes. Second and Third class mail, they say, is a major hindrance, does not cover its own mailing costs, and is blamed for the record 1966 deficit.

Direct mail, is a \$2.4-billion a year industry, and growing. Denver Postmaster George Cavender reveals that in a typical week, "We got in 200,000 pieces of sample toothpaste, while trying to get out 200,000 mouthwash samples. This stuff is heavy, and a carrier just can't carry all of it in one day."

Why can't the P.O. handle mail efficiently, whatever the volume? Lack of personnel appears to be a major factor. Pat Niland, legislative director of the United Federation of Postal Clerks blames the P.O.'s failure to add to its present staff of 700,000, and for limiting overtime work.

Other reasons given are increasing numbers of uneducated foreign-speaking clerks.

In an effort to remedy this crisis, a supplemental appropriation of \$400-million, has been asked.

Over 180,000 employees have been added since July, 1966.

A \$100-million automation program is started to have 75 major post offices mechanized in two years.

Since time and expense is needed to train workers on the new equipment, a full-scale investigation of the national Post Office is urged, posthaste.

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THE ANNUAL DISAPPEARING ACT

Despite the way it may seem, fish really don't disappear during winter.

They're still in the same water they inhabited last fall, but are less concerned about food. If they don't turn up too often, the blame is not entirely on the fish; anglers don't turn up too often these days either.

However, game fish are present, feeding on a limited scale, and they can be caught, say the fishing authorities at Mercury Outdoors. Particularly, they add, by fishermen with the necessary fortitude and knowledge of cold weather aquatic conditions to get the job done.

In deep bodies of water which have a heavy coating of ice, the warmest temperatures will be found near the bottom. This is because water is most heavy (dense) at 39.2 degrees. For some fish, notably lake trout, this is only a shade below what they prefer. Other species will forage upward into the colder levels, but usually can be found hugging the bottom.

In mid-continent and southern regions where shoreline skim ice forms only occasionally, temperature levels are not so marked. In such waters, the key spots are tributaries that introduce a high supply of fresh oxygen. Other locations that attract a congregation of fish are underwater springs that form local "hot" spots.

Work baits and lures as if fish are nearly asleep, advise the Mercury folks, so the sluggish lunkers can catch up if they want.

The solution to the winter release, it appears, lies with the fisherman, not the fish, and a good, warm coat can overcome that.
