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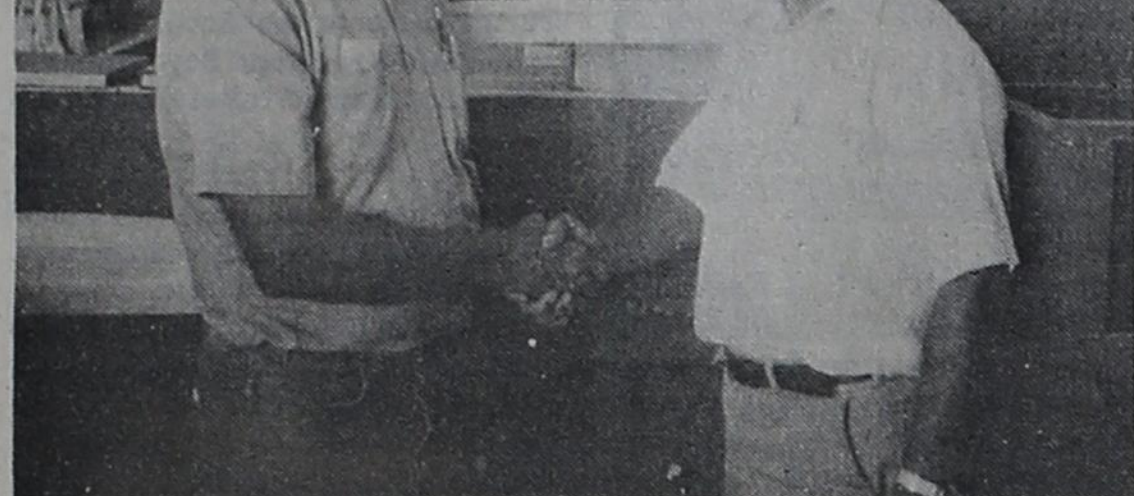
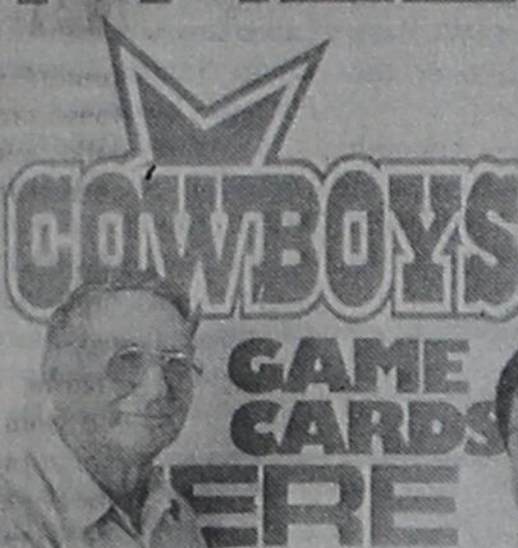
IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

MUSTANGS OPEN '84 FOOTBALL CAMPAIGN AT STINNETT FRIDAY

The Wheeler Mustangs welcomed the first week in September as cool weather rolled in and the 1984 High School season has its kickoff Friday night.

With high hopes for the season abounding in the Mustang camp, the Mustangs travel to Stinnett for an 8 P.M. contest with the strong Rattlers.

Stinnett has been picked as one of the teams in District 1-AA that might challenge the powerful Panhandle Panthers for the district championship.

On the other hand, the Mustangs are favored in all quarters to take the District 1-A crown which would give them a chance to avenge their disappointing loss in bi-district play last year.

In a poll of coaches at the annual Texas High School Coaches school, the Mustangs were tabbed as the #10 team in the state in Class A in the pre season poll.

Coach Preston Smith will be without

the services of Darren Grimes for the Stinnett opener as Grimes injured his ankle in the Mustangs impressive scrimmage last week against Clarendon.

Wheeler will counter what will be likely a strong passing game by the Rattlers with a powerful running attack led by tailback Toby Collins and fullback Dickie Salyer. Steve Snapp will once again be the quarterback. Todd Alvey gets the nod at wingback in the Mustangs I formation attack.

The Mustangs have only two non-district games this season as the

Gruver Greyhounds are now a member of District 1-A. Arch rival Shamrock will be the Mustangs other non league foe and will be at Nicholson Field next week for the Mustangs home opener.

"We think we can have a good football team this year but a lot of things can happen during the course of a season," head coach Preston Smith said this week. "Injuries are a big thing and an equalizer in football and we have already had one," Smith added. "Boomer is a real good football player and we just don't know how long he will be out."

RASHES

Rashes can be painful and annoying. Signs and symptoms of rashes include redness, blotchy skin, severe itching, scaliness, and dryness of the skin.

Ninety percent of all rashes are heat-related. If blotchy skin develops shortly after eating a food for the first time, you probably have a sensitivity to the food and should avoid it.

Benefits of 4-H Works Are Listed

Democratic process of program development in 4-H:

The program development process used in determining the content, methods of delivery and direction of 4-H has extensively involved youth and adults at all levels of participation. This has been instrumental in keeping 4-H closely tied to the individual needs and interests of youth, adults and families at the community level.

4-H helps youth improve their family and home life by encouraging family-oriented learning experiences which lead to closer parent-child relationships. Since parents are a more important influence in youth development, parent cooperation and participation in the 4-H program is given high priority.

Wearing clothes made of wool produces another common allergic reaction in the form of severe itchy skin.

If you develop a rash, try to determine the cause. Consider how long you have been in the sun, whether you have had a reaction to the sun before, what foods you have eaten for the first time, and what plants, fibers, or soaps you have come in contact with.

FIRST AID FOR RASHES

To treat a rash, do the following:
* Clean the area immediately with soap and water, especially if the rash is from poison ivy or some other plant.
* Avoid lotion. It may irritate the rash and worsen itching.
* Keep the area dry and cool to prevent the rash from spreading.
* Apply first aid cream only if the area is bleeding due to excessive scratching.

* Use an over-the-counter cream to relieve itching from poison ivy or other itching rashes.

The first place a rash usually appears is on the abdomen, but it can spread and cover the entire body. This is called a systemic rash and when it occurs you should seek medical attention immediately.

If you know you have an allergic reaction, stay away from the cause. If you come in contact with something that causes a rash, follow the first aid hints. See your doctor if the rash persists.
