Austin. — Fate of Texas' 63-year-old poll tax as a voting requirement rests in the hands of a three-judge federal court. They heard four hours of arguments here last week in an historic case to abolish the levy.

Judges announced that no immediate ruling would be made. They advised Texans who want to be eligible to vote next year to pay the \$1.75 fee before the January 31 deadline.

In frequent questions during the arguments, the judges indicated the case was over several complex legal points.

Circuit Judge John R. Brown repeatedly speculated on the court's earlier position, in assessing an apparently - unsupported congressional finding in the 1965 voting rights act, that the Texas levy discriminates against Negroes.

"How do we go about reviewing the basis for a congressional finding?" Brown wondered aloud. "Or does the case come to us as though Congress had not made these findings? This is a very unusual point of law."

Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr maintained that Congress had made its finding "without so much as a scintilla of evidence." He pointed out that U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach himself had testified before a Senate committee that he had no complaints of voter discrimination in this state. Katzenbach later filed the suit under terms of the voting rights act.

U. S. Justice Department Atty. Stephen J. Pollack, acknowledging that there is no overt refusal to give Texas Negroes voting rights, argued that due to basically inferior education, income of Negroes is lower and the tax, therefore, falls heavier on them.

One judge wondered, perhaps hopefully, if the U. S. Supreme Court might rule on some of the questions submitted in an earlier Virginia case before federal judges in Texas have to hand down their decision.

Hearing here was the first of four cases brought by the justice department, under congressional direction, to challenge poll tax validity head-on. Others will be held in Mississippi on Dec. 10; Alabama on Dec. 20; and Virginia on January 17.

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Doctors Hope New Device To Help Blind

Mexico City. — A Mexican team has invented an electronic device that bypasses the eye and sends light signals directly to the brain. The team hopes it may eventually be developed to help the hopelessly blind.

Dr. Armando del Campo, a professor at the National University, says the device now is in the experimental stage and is too large and bulky.

In time, he said, it may be possible to refine the machine down to a portable size, to be used much as the deaf use hearing aids.

He and four aides developed the device recently after years of work. The machine is called an amauroscope, from the Greek "amaurosis," meaning blindness, and "skopeo"—to see.

Acorn Figures If All Nations Launch Satellites, Million Up In 20 Years

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, takes a look at the satellite situation this week. His vision may be limited.

Dear Editor: According to an article I read last night in a newspaper which showed up in my mail box as a sample copy, France has put a satellite in orbit, not a very big one but still a satellite, and this has got me to thinking.

Now off hand I don't know exactly how many countries there are on earth, do you, but say there are around 250 on any given day, allowing for unreported earthquakes, revolutions, typographical errors and the inability of anybody to spell some of the lesser-known.

Also, I don't know how many satellites Russia and the United States have already launched, but it must be in the hundreds.

Furthermore, assuming that the secret of launching one will eventually develop along the lines of the secret of the bicycle—anybody can build one if he has the time and the money—and assuming that all 250 countries will sooner or later

feel their national pride demands that they get in the business too, have you ever stopped to think how many satellites outer space is going to be swamped with?

Figuring the bigger countries will put them up at the rate of about 50 to 1 over the smaller countries, I estimate that 20 years there will be over 1,000,000 satellites sailing around out there, requiring 50,000 tracking stations on earth keeping up with their radio messages.

And that only takes in countries. Supposing private individuals, knowing a good thing when they see it, horn in on the business too?

There'll be so many satellites hurtling around up there a man will be taking his life in his own hands when he takes off for the moon.

On the other hand, maybe it's just a passing fad and will disappear like the hoola-hoop.

I've had the notion for some time that the secrets of outer space may be like the secrets of the Sahara Desert, hardly worth the trouble it takes to uncover them.

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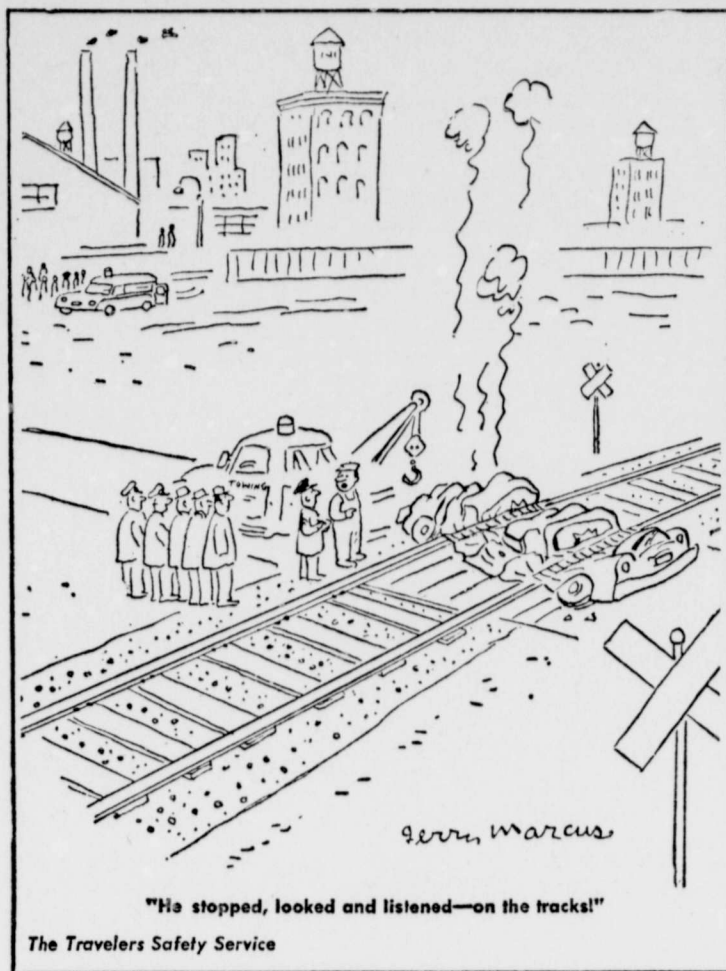

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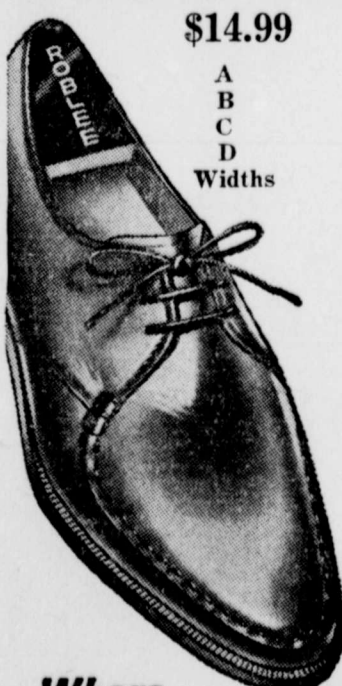
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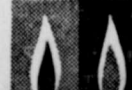

Pet Turtles Spread Intestinal Disease

Minneapolis, Minn.—Two Minnesota Department of Health researchers reported recently that turtles, heretofore considered almost perfect household pets (they're cheap, don't bite, are noiseless, require little care,) can be the source of a serious intestinal disease, salmonellosis.

They urge everyone with pet turtles to wash their hands after handling the creatures or their bowls, or the pebbles often kept in them. No one, including other household pets, should eat or drink from the turtle's bowl. They also caution that the water in which the turtle lives should never be emptied in the kitchen sink where it might contaminate food.

Dr. Craddock Does Heart Research

Dr. Lane D. Craddock, acting director of the Cardio-Pulmonary Laboratory Department of the General Rose Memorial Hospital, Denver, Colo., has done extensive research in heart diseases since arriving there in 1963. His article on "direct coronary arteriography," which appeared recently in the "Rocky Mountain Medical Journal," gives a new and interesting method of study of coronary circulation, is illustrated and discussed on Clinical Application of Cineangiographic methods.

The heart-lung machine, acquired in 1963, has been useful at Rose Hospital in the complete treatment of cardiac patients to include open heart surgery. Also in repairing or even replacement of heart valves damaged by rheumatic diseases. Because of the extensive program, Rose Hospital has the reputation of a cardiac center.

The Heart Sound Simulator, a newly developed machine designed to teach medical students and physicians to identify various sounds produced by a diseased heart, was created by the staff of cardio-pulmonary laboratory, headed by Dr. Abe Rabin, Chief of Staff. Dr. Craddock was a member of the team who began assembling the complicated device in 1964. It won the Grand Award at Colorado Medical Society convention. Dr. Craddock and associate exhibited the machine in Boston with great success. At the annual American Medical Association held in New York, "Certificates of Merit" were awarded to Doctors Abe Rabin, Lane D. Craddock, C. E. Tucker and Luis de la Fuente, Rose Memorial, and Colorado Heart Association, Denver, for their exhibit on New Techniques for Teaching Cardiac Auscultation. At the center of the machine is an oscilloscope which allows users to both hear and "see" heart sounds, and is equipped with a number of earphones to accommodate several persons at one time. The oscilloscope flashes tracings on a screen as they would appear on an electrocardiograph, or on a phonocardiograph record. The patient aspects are being investigated, being the only machine like it.

Craddock is the son of Mrs. Amy Craddock of Bogata, and the late Marvin Craddock. He and wife, Jean and two daughters, Elaine and Susan Leigh, reside at 2316 Holly, Denver, Colo.

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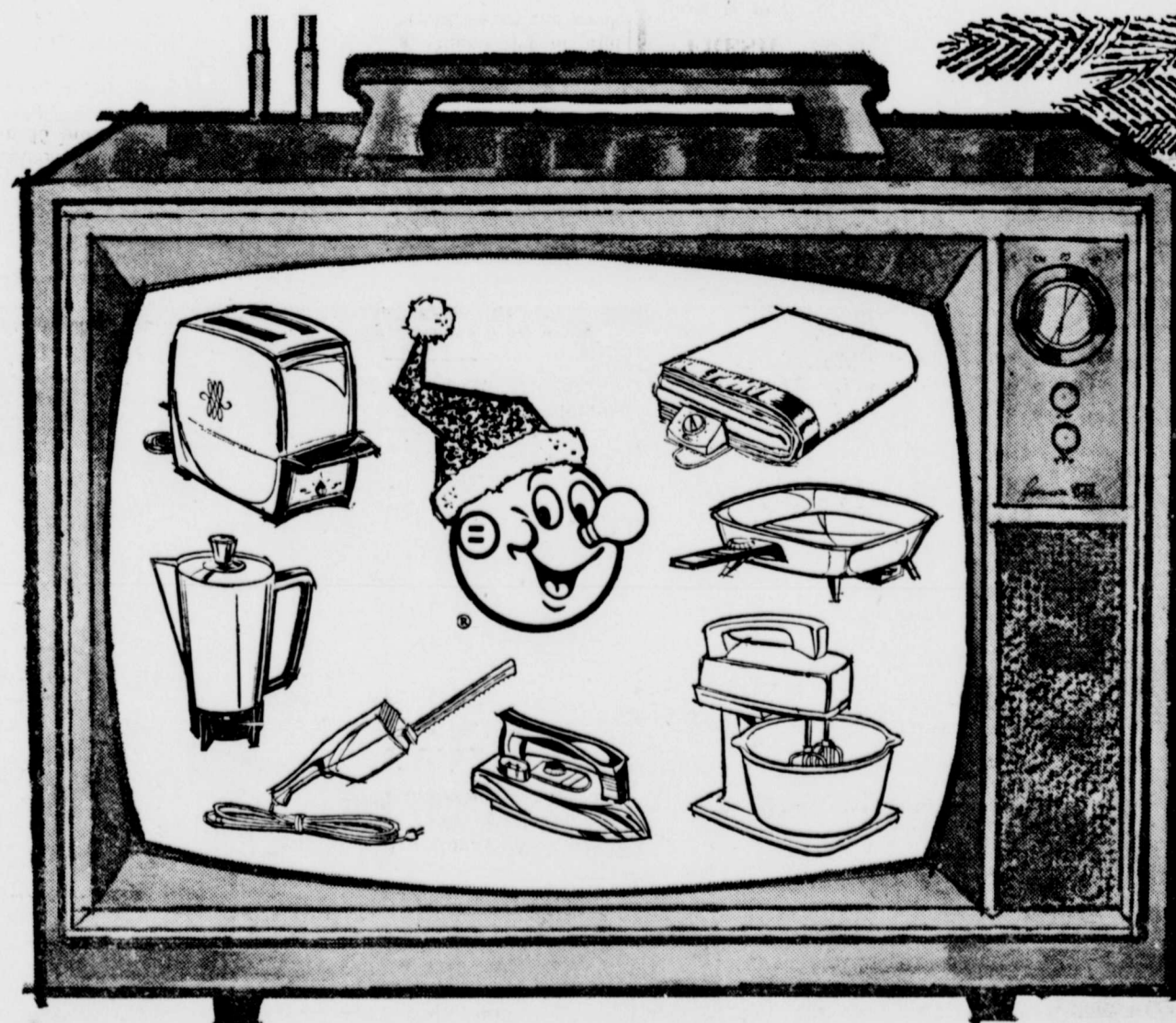
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
