EDUCATION CONFERENCE CANYON

SUPERINTENDENT W. B. IRVIN OF PERRYTON SCHOOLS RETIRES AS CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Canyon, Texas, March 7.—The Northwest Texas Conference for Education closed at noon today after a two-day session on the campus of the West Texas State Teachers College. 3400 people representing teaching profession and friends of education in northwest Texas registered at the conference. W. B. Irvin, superintendent of the Perryton schools and president of the conference, presided at the two-day meeting.

The program of Friday night included speeches and musical entertainment. J. C. Parker, Director of Research and Curriculum Revision of Fort Worth, Texas, public schools, gave an address: "Obstacles I have met in curriculum revision." Mr. Parker said with the administrative phase and cited problems in teacher management. "I have resorted to generalities," said Mr. Parker. "In preference to specific directions to teachers in my situation."

D. M. Wiggins, president of Texas school of Mines and Metallurgy, El Paso, discussed the opportunities and disadvantages of this period of educational unrest in his address: "The Challenge of Confusion." Frank W. Hart, Professor of Education, University of California, Berkeley, asked "May We Have Faith in the Rising Generation?" He read illuminating answers to questionnaires distributed to high school seniors.

"They know the qualities of their teachers better than we," said Mr. Hart in praising the intelligence of high school youth.

Business Session Saturday
Saturday's session consisted of a business session and additional speeches.

L. A. Woods, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, spoke on "The State Department's Place in Building the New School." Mr. Woods pointed out the slow progress of Texas educational system in finances and in policy and urged those in teaching profession to "sell the needs of the system to the public" at aid might come.

Frank W. Hart spoke on "The Role of Civic Complicity." He attempted to analyze the cause of progress in the teaching of social sciences. Said Mr. Hart: "We don't account for teachers' low score knowledge about the subject matter, but at that they seem to know more times as much as their grade school students."

Willard W. Beatty, United States Director of Indian Education and President, Progressive Education Association, gave the final conference address, "Human Understanding—A New Era for Secondary Education." Mr. Beatty dealt with the comparatively new field of adolescent psychology as an important factor in determining needs of secondary education. Pears of abnormality, anxiety about family and social status, and worry about their life work distress high school and junior college students, according to Mr. Beatty.

Libby Carruth, superintendent of the Canyon public high school, was chosen next president of the conference.

Perryton Musicians Appear
Fifty high school students from Perryton joined a like number from Amarillo, Pampa, Plainview and other high schools in a mass, vocal and instrumental concert given in costume before the Northwest Texas conference Friday night session. O. Bush was director of the Perryton band and Miss Ruby Neufeld, accompanist. The chorus presented Texas Centennial songs. The Perryton high school band also appeared in the program.

Pigs Show Good Profit

Percy Powers Makes Profit of Almost Hundred Dollars on Feeding 20 Pigs

Several months ago, Percy Powers, enterprising young farmer of this community, found himself in possession of 20 pigs of weaning age that he was very anxious to dispose of at the price of \$5.00 per head. After trying in vain to sell the pigs which were a cross breed of Chester-white and Hampshire, Powers just decided that he would invoice them to himself at \$5.00 a head and feed them out.

He fed the pigs a slop, three or four times daily, made of shorts, and kept the self feeder bins full of whole kafir corn. A careful accounting was made of the cost of all feeds. Eight of the pigs were sold at the age of 5 months and 10 days, with an average weight of 186 lbs. The other 12 pigs averaged 175 lbs. each when they went on the market at the age of 5 months and 20 days. The pigs made a gain in weight of 100 lbs. for every 450 lbs. of feed and when the cost of the pigs at \$5.00 each and the cost of the feed was deducted from the selling price, Mr. Powers found that he had realized a profit of \$94.00. Rather good wages for feeding 20 pigs for a little over four months.

TO ADMINISTER WIND EROSION

COUNTY COMMUNITY CHAIRMEN APPOINTED TO DIRECT EMERGENCY WIND EROSION PROGRAM

At a meeting of the Ochiltree County Agricultural Council at the courthouse Wednesday afternoon details of administering the emergency wind erosion program in Ochiltree county were perfected and county-wide and community set-ups made. W. M. Deck, president of the County Council, presided at the meeting.

Details of the program that is to be handled by the Farm Extension Service, the county agent and local committees, was explained by County Agent J. T. Stovall.

The county committee is composed of O. A. Schuster, chairman; Percy Powers, W. R. Norris, J. T. Stovall, secretary; and Carl Ellis, treasurer.

Community committeemen are as follows: R. S. Roberts, Lone Tree; Harry Mountcastle, Huntoon; W. M. Good, Netia; Ollie Morris, East Perryton; Roy Johnson, West Perryton; B. H. Peckenpaugh, New Hope; Herman Hargrave, Farnsworth; Knox Pipkin, Black; Earl Waide, McMillen; T. C. Lott, Taz; and Sam Handly, Alfalfa.

Individuals whose land is blowing should notify the committeeman for the community in which the land is located. The committeeman, working in conjunction with the county committee and the county agent will determine the nature of treatment best suited to stop the land from blowing and will authorize either listing or chiseling. Emergency grants of 20 cents per acre will be allowed for treatment, 60 percent of this amount to be available when application is approved, and the remaining 40 percent to be paid when work is completed and it has passed inspection.

Council Meets Tuesday
The county council voted to hold their regular monthly meeting on the first Tuesday in each month at 10:00 a. m. The date was set for this day due to the fact that many members of the council were in Perryton on that day to attend the public auction sale at the sales pavilion and Perryton Merchants' Dollar Day.

Endorse Assistant Agent
Without a single dissenting vote, the council passed a resolution requesting the county commissioners to make arrangements for the employment of an assistant county agent for wind erosion and soil conservation work. One-fourth of an assistant county agent's salary can be paid by the county from the special wind erosion fund that is provided by tax remissions from the state. Another one-fourth is paid by the state extension service and one-half is paid by the Federal Soil Conservation Service.

Vegetables and fruits in the proper quantity and variety, together with milk and eggs, furnish important substances which are sure to be lacking in a diet which consists mostly of meats, bread stuffs, sweets and fats. Children grow better and have more resistance to infection, and adults keep in better health when the diet contains an abundance of vegetables, fruit and milk, stated Miss Marie Ludwick, Ochiltree Home Demonstration Agent, to the members of the Wolf Creek Club, which met in the home of Mrs. S. J. Handly, Thursday afternoon, March 5.
Plan your garden and prepare the soil well that you may grow the essential vegetables that will be adequate for your family for summer consumption and for canning, further stated Miss Ludwick.
A device was exhibited by Miss Ludwick for sifting a preparation consisting of twenty ounces of lime mixed with a few drops of Black Leaf 40 on vegetable leaves infested with lice. The suggestion was made to soak seeds before planting in order to secure germination more quickly.
A short business meeting was held, after which refreshments were served by the hostess.

"A home made duster can be made at home for mixing and sprinkling nicotine dust on vegetables to prevent insects," stated Miss Marie Ludwick at the meeting of the New Hope home demonstration club held in the home of Mrs. Fred Furnish March 4th, at 1:30 P. M.
Both ends of a number 2 can are removed, the can is tacked lengthwise on a paddle of convenient length. Just above the can a bag is tied to the handle which holds the poison dust and hangs down in the can. The handle is shaken up and down or sidewise thus directing the dust cloud more effectively," further stated Miss Ludwick.

Employ 660 Women

Sewing Rooms in Texas Panhandle Have Monthly Payroll of Twenty Thousand

The fifteen sewing rooms in the Amarillo district provide work for 660 women at a combined monthly payroll of \$20,000, so reports Mrs. E. Kay, district supervisor of WPA women's projects.

The purpose of the sewing room project, it was explained, is to permit the women, many of them nominal family heads and many of whom are sole breadwinners for sizeable families, to earn their livelihood, and training in sewing work, the project provides garments for distribution to needy persons in this area.

Sturdy school clothing for children, garments for men, and warm, comfortable clothing for women are produced by the busy hands of workers in the sewing rooms. During the past three weeks, school children in relief families in this district have been provided with more than one thousand garments from the sewing rooms. WPA officials estimated. Distribution to underprivileged persons incapacitated for work and to children of WPA employees is accomplished through Texas Relief Commission facilities. Commodities and garments processed in these sewing rooms has resulted in furnishing Texas Relief Commission clothing at a cost price to the government comparable to established retail prices of the goods produced and thus provided employment for the large number of women at a minimum cost to the government, officials declared.

Sewing room locations, with the average number of women employed in each, follow: Panhandle, Carson county, 17; Wellington, Collingsworth county, 41; Hereford, Deaf Smith county, 26; Pampa, Gray county, 31; McLean, Gray county, 10; Canadian, Hemphill county, 14; Higgins, Lipscomb county, 21; Perryton, Ochiltree county, 21; Canyon, Randall county, 10; Dalhart, Dallam county, 26; Shamrock, Wheeler county, 19; Wheeler, Wheeler county, 12; Spearman, Garfield county, 20; Borger, Hutchinson county, 26; Amarillo, Potter county, 339.

Projects other than sewing rooms employ 142 other women on Amarillo district WPA payrolls. Mrs. Kay stated. Canning plants at Clarendon and Perryton employ 26 women. 29 are engaged in library work, 21 are teaching in emergency education centers, and the remainder work on various survey and clerical projects.

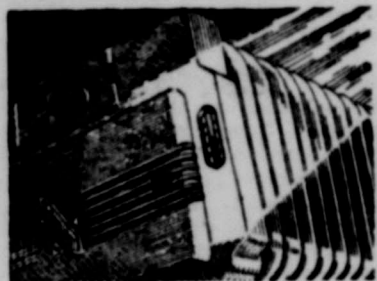
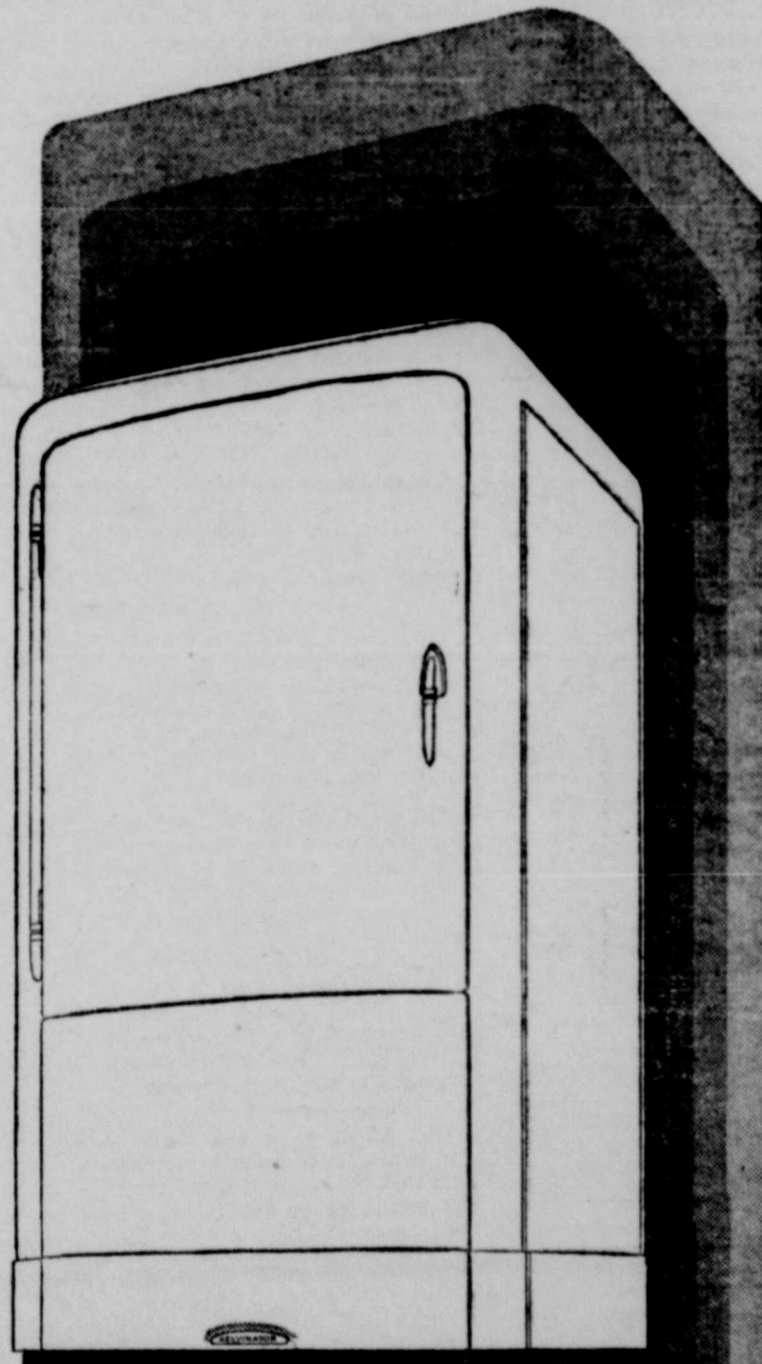

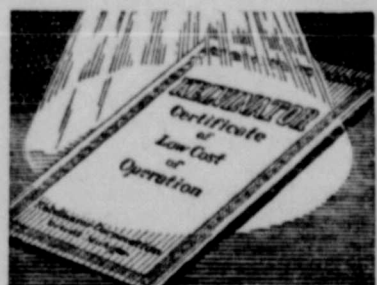

TAKING BUSINESS CENSUS

CALDWELL APPOINTED ENUMERATOR FOR OCHILTREE COUNTY; INFORMATION IS CONFIDENTIAL

Roy D. Chase, Amarillo District Supervisor of the Census of Business, has announced that one enumerator has been appointed in Ochiltree county to present the census forms to business houses and help them fill out the necessary information. He is W. G. Caldwell, Perryton.

Mr. Chase stressed the fact that information given enumerators will be held in strict confidence. All enumerators and other persons connected with the census, work under a drastic census oath not to disclose or discuss any information submitted for census purposes. He stated that under the census law it is a criminal offense to violate this confidence; that no access to individual reports is permitted, not even to other Governmental state or local agencies, and no information will be disclosed which would reveal any of the facts or figures in the returns. The census is the oldest bureau of the government, established nearly 150 years ago, and never has it been convicted of a violation of confidence.

He is asking all business concerns to cooperate with the enumerators who call upon them for business census data.

Describing the value of the census, Mr. Chase said that from the results, banks and financial agencies are enabled to extend commercial credit more freely because of more accurate knowledge of what constitutes sound operating expenses and stock ratios; newspapers are enabled to establish the consumer market in their immediate and potential trade territories and thus avoid unproductive expense; advertising agencies can determine comprehensive and accurate markets for various products; retailers are supplied with needed data on their competitive situation, not only in their particular field but also regarding the extent of other kinds of competitive business. Real estate values, proper rentals and the basis for percentage leases are frequently determined from business census data, which have great weight because they are strictly factual statements without prejudice.

As fast as reports are received they are sent to Philadelphia by registered mail, where they are carefully guarded. Five to eight tabulating cards are punched to record the information on each report and no names or addresses appear on these cards. The cards are tabulated with other cards to produce the figures which are published and become the recognized basic statistics of business.

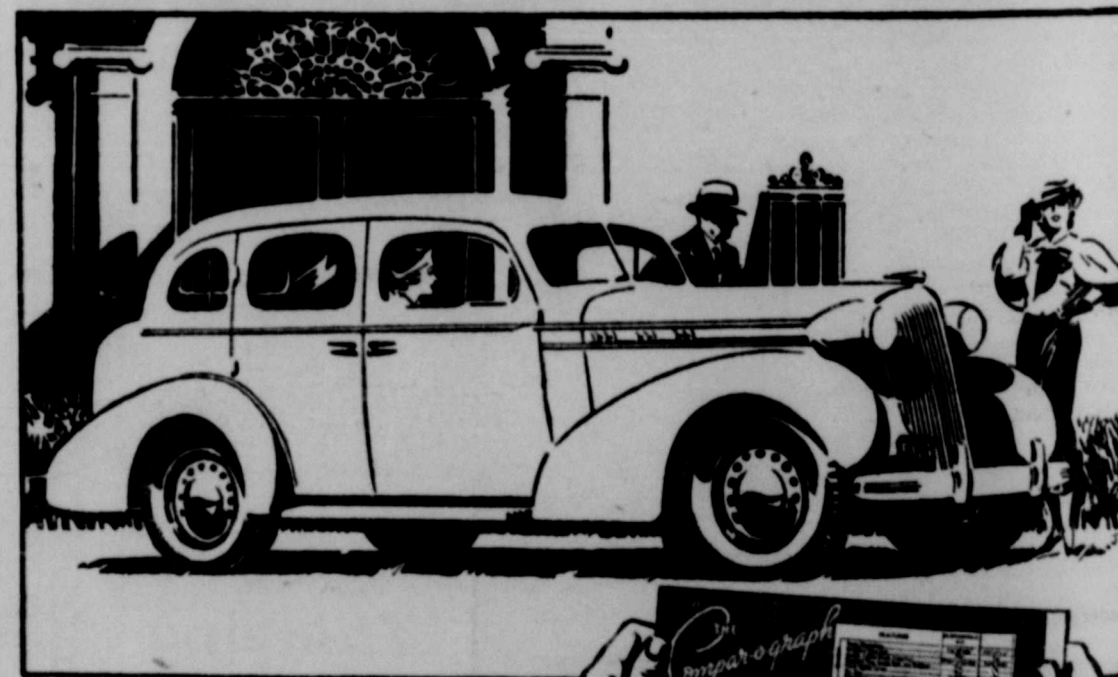

BETTER ROADS IN THIS AREA

\$292,387 ALLOCATED FROM WPA FUNDS FOR HIGHWAY PROJECTS IN THIS DISTRICT

Amarillo, March 3.—Safer and faster driving conditions over approximately one hundred sixty miles farm-to-market roads will result from the activities of the Works Progress Administration laborers in the Amarillo District, Director A. A. Meredith, estimated today. "Discomfort and uncertainty of travel in this area will be greatly diminished by the hard-surfaced roads which are being installed through nineteen projects now operating in this district," Meredith said. "State WPA officials have allocated \$292,387, for the improvement of roads in the counties comprising the Amarillo district and sponsors have indicated their enthusiasm by pledging expenditures of \$113,141, to aid in completing the work."

Now employed on WPA road work in the Amarillo district are 936 men formerly on relief rolls, district officials disclosed. Representative of the road projects being undertaken in this area is improvement now under way of the Wheeler county road which extends from five miles east of Wheeler to the Oklahoma state line. Shifting sands in this section of the Panhandle are being spanned with a ten mile hard surfaced road which will serve rural residents in that thickly populated area and through

travelers entering Texas from the neighboring state. Wheeler county officials have indicated that this is considered the outstanding WPA project in that section of the district. Cutting away the sand dunes and surfacing over hills and valleys of "creep" sand will shorten driving time to market areas, facilitate safer and quicker school bus travel and expedite the delivery of rural mail, sponsors assert. The project employing 141 men, is being financed by WPA expenditure of \$45,500, and by sponsors contribution of \$19,500. Among other outstanding road projects included in the WPA program are: The Potter county farm-to-market road jobs in four precincts; the Roberts county road extending northwest from Miami; the Magic City Road; the Moore county road from Dumas to Highway Number 41; the road from Lipscomb to Darrington, connecting Highway Number 213 and 117; Ochiltree County's Precinct 3 road traversing a thickly populated diversified farming section; the McLean-Hedley and Alameda-LeFors roads in Gray County, slicing off many miles of travel between these points and serving school and mail transportation systems; the road going north from Spearman, affording relief from muddy roads to thousands of habitual users of the route; Hemphill county's fourteen mile road extending north from Highway Number 60 through a well populated area; the Fresno road in Collingsworth county, extending south from Highway 83 to Dodsonville; Dallam county's farm-to-market road.

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International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister, Perryton Church of Christ

Lesson 11 March 15 1936

The Disciples Prayer
Luke 11:1-13

I. A Prayer Desired

There is power in prayer. Even the Son of God found it a strengthening factor in his earthly ministry to go often to His Father in quiet and intimate converse. Hand in hand Jesus walked with the great I Am. The strenuous hours of teaching and toil demanded deep draughts from Heaven's springs. Only the Father understood the heart burdens of the Son. So to the Father Jesus went for rest, sympathy and consolation. It must have been a wonderful experience for the disciples to behold their Master in the attitude of prayer, talking to God with that intimacy hitherto unknown in all history's pages. How their hearts must have yearned to draw close to this Father and nestle within his everlasting arms. No wonder we find them, after one of Jesus' prayers, asking him to teach them to pray.

The disciples realized that to pray acceptably, one must know how. Often selfishness, ignorance, short vision, or disobedience prevent prayers from being answered. An acceptable prayer must be offered in faith (Rom. 14:23) else the prayer itself would be a sin. This faith does not come abstractly through prayer, but by hearing the word of God (Rom. 10:17). Then people must learn from heavenly sources how to pray.

II. A Prayer Itemized

1. Its Brevity. Jesus condemned long, pretentious, repetitious harangues in prayer. It isn't necessary to "preach" to God and remind him of all his promises. He knows more than we do about our needs (Matt. 6:8). Some prayers remind us of a talking marathon!

2. Its Calmness. No bombast about it. Decency and order (1 Cor. 14:40) were ever the qualities of genuine worship. Contrast the wild, boisterous ranting of the Baal worshippers with Elijah's quiet approach to God (1 Kings 18:25-38). Humbly, like children, the disciples were to approach Jehovah as "our Father."

3. Its Definition. Jesus did not pray himself (in its entirety), hence it was not "The Lord's Prayer." Rather it was a prayer for the DISCIPLES, not Jesus. To find the Lord's Prayer, we should read John 17th chapter which gives the items of Christ's own petition on the night of his betrayal.

4. Its Spirit.

a. The form of the petition is filial, "Father."

b. The universal spirit, "Our Father."

c. A reverential spirit, "Hallowed be thy name."

d. A missionary spirit, "Thy kingdom come." This petition was in harmony with the teaching of John the Baptist who told the Jews the kingdom was near (Matt. 3:2), also Jesus' language (Matt. 4:17), and the Master's own pledge to establish the church or kingdom (Mark 9:1; Matt. 16:18, 19; when he went into the "far country" (Luke 9:12), "with the clouds of heaven" (Daniel 7:13-14; Acts 1:9-11). The prayer for the kingdom to come was answered on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2), and since that time the church has been an established institution. For us to continue to pray for the kingdom to come would be to fail in recognition of God's fulfilled promise. Let us now thank God that the kingdom has come, and is extending its gospel influence in behalf of men.

e. An Obedient Spirit, "Thy will be done."

f. A Dependent Spirit, "Give us this day our daily bread." Of course we must work for our bread, but it is God-given nevertheless. The use of means to bring us blessings does not make them any the less Provi-

dential. A sick man who uses sensible remedies shows more trust in God than the one who folds his hands, rebelliously refuses to do any thing to help himself, and demands that God cleave the heavens with a miraculous demonstration of "healing."

g. An humble Spirit, "And forgive us our trespasses." We must never claim to be without sin, for "if we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). Regardless of a previous life of purity, a claim to sinlessness would condemn us.

h. A Forgiving Spirit, "We also forgive." We must forgive others if we would be forgiven. He who harbors malice will never enter the pearly gates.

i. A Cautious Spirit, "Lead us not into temptation."

j. A Confidential and adoring Spirit, "For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen."

A Petition Rewarded

Jesus pictures a midnight borrowing of three loaves of bread. But God is more merciful than this lender. The heavenly Father will be more generous to his own than parents are to their children. Jesus said, "Ask and it shall be given unto you; seek and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." Of course we must ask, seek, and knock according to God's will. He has not promised to grant our selfish whims, nor bestow upon us any favors contrary to his revealed message, the gospel.
