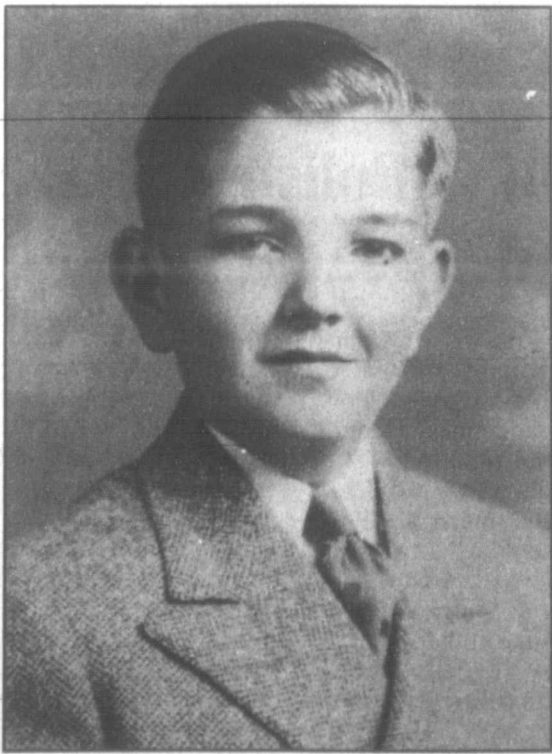

Health coverage restored to many

AUSTIN (AP) — Thousands of children who lost health benefits through the state's insurance program because of a contractor's error will have their coverage restored, officials said.

Some 6,000 children who were dropped from the Children's Health Insurance Program last month because their families weren't told about a new enrollment fee will be reinstated, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission announced late Friday.

The mistakes that led to the loss of benefits originated at a Midland call center run by Texas Access Alliance, a group of companies led by state-contracted Accenture, said commission spokeswoman Stephanie Goodman.

The problems come at the time of declining enrollment in the program — intended for families who can't afford private insurance but make too much to qualify for Medicaid.

Enrollment in CHIP has fallen nearly 9 percent since Accenture took over screening applicants three months ago.

Advocates and health care workers say some families have reported errors such as not being told about the enrollment fee or finding the state has no record of them returning their re-enrollment forms.

Bugbee area closed for road repairs

FRITCH — Superintendent Karren Brown has announced that access to the Bugbee Area of Lake Meredith National Recreation Area will be temporarily closed to the public effective Monday while road repairs are under way.

In late June of 2004, heavy rains caused a section of the only road leading into the Bugbee Campground area to wash out.

"We really needed the rain, but a microburst dropped about 8 inches of water in a short period of time, causing the road to wash out," Brown said.

Lake Meredith maintenance crews placed "Jersey Barriers" along the damaged area of the roadway in an effort to temporarily reopen the Bugbee area to visitors.

Since the event occurred, the park has been working with the National Park Service Intermountain Regional Office in Denver, Colo., and the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration to perform engineering assessments of the damage, prepare cost estimates for the repairs necessary to stabilize the roadway and to procure funds to cover the costs of the repairs to the damaged roadway.

The washout caused damage to about 420 feet of the road, completely eroded the downstream embankment, exposed the concrete culverts underneath the road and caused extensive shoulder damage.

"We have submitted emergency funding proposals to obtain the money

needed to repair this access road for the past two years," said Facility Manager Jimmy Muncy. "Engineers toured the site late summer of 2004 and again in 2005, to determine the extent of the damage and how much money it will take to restore the roadway. Bids were too high in 2004, but a successful bid was negotiated in 2005 to complete the work early 2006."

"We will be installing a barrier at Bugbee during the construction (about six weeks), for public safety and to deter vandalism of equipment," Brown said. "The barrier will be removed upon completion of this project."

Texas Tech recipient of \$2 million award

LUBBOCK — Gov. Rick Perry has announced the first state investment from the new Texas Emerging Technology Fund, an award of nearly \$2 million that will go to Texas Tech University to help it become the international leader in agriculture genomics research and development and help make the West Texas region the fiber capital of the world.

The grant will further Texas Tech's partnership with Bayer CropScience and help launch the International Center of Excellence in Agriculture Genomics and Biotechnology. In addition to the TETF award, Texas Tech is committing \$1.8 million for personnel and lab equipment, and Bayer CropScience endowed a professorship at the university.

"When I proposed the Emerging Technology Fund, it was exactly this type of investment opportunity that I had in mind," Perry said. "Local leaders had already done much of the groundwork to create the International Center. And like an expansion team in the NFL, all they needed was to draft a star quarterback to build a championship franchise."

The funding helped lure Dr. Thea Wilkins, one of the world's premiere cotton geneticists, from the University of California at Davis to become director of genomics at the International Center. Wilkins has generated millions of dollars in competitive research funding from the National Science Foundation, the

U.S. Department of Energy and the U.S. Department of Agriculture in the three years she has been the director of the Cotton Functional Genomics Center at UC-Davis. For six years, she also has worked under contract with Bayer CropScience and is in the final stages of testing several new patented products that should enter the marketplace in less than two years.

"She is, without a doubt, the ideal candidate for this position," Perry said. "Doctor Wilkins has generated more than 75 professional journal publications, is a regular featured speaker

at genomics seminars and international symposiums, and has helped secure more than \$6.5 million in competitive grants for her various research projects."

Wilkins also will bring a research team to the International Center. There, a partnership of academic researchers and private companies will use cutting edge genomics and biotechnology to develop new agriculture products that will serve as the foundation for new business ventures, Perry said.

Perry noted Wilkins' research work will bolster economic growth, noting that Bayer CropScience has

grown from four employees in Lubbock to 70 in just six years, and has contributed more than \$250 million to the state's economy.

"The innovations that occur as a result of Doctor Wilkins' work will lead to the creation of hundreds or even thousands of new Texas jobs as employers like Bayer CropScience take these new products to the marketplace," Perry said. "And Texas will also see millions of dollars in new farm-related income as growers increase production to meet higher demand."

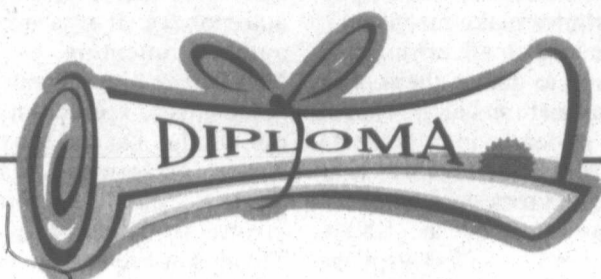

Space prohibits listing all of them, but here is a smattering of some of the best.

This correction ran in the Denver Daily News on July 27: "The Denver Daily News would like to offer a sincere apology for a typo in

Wednesday's Town Talk regarding New Jersey's proposal to ban smoking in automobiles. It was not the author's intention to call New Jersey "Jew Jersey."

Here is a correction that ran in the Dallas Morning News: "Norma Adams-Wade's June 15 column incorrectly called Mary Ann Thompson-Frenk a socialite. She is a socialite."

And this one from the Liverpool Daily Post in England: "Technology has revolutionised most of our lives in recent years and the media has particularly benefited from developments in IT and communications. But all technology should always be treated with a degree of caution. This was a lesson brought into sharp focus last

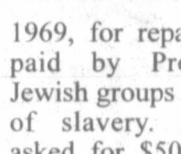
week following a review of the Welsh National Opera's double bill performance of Cavalleria Rusticana and Pagliacci at the Empire Theatre. The problem arose when the computer spell checker did not recognise the term

"WNO" (Welsh National Opera). A slip of the finger caused it to be replaced with the word 'winos.' All stories in the Daily Post go through a series of checks for error, but unfortunately this one slipped through the net. It just goes to show that it's hard to beat the good, old-fashioned dictionary."

Here is a numerical error from Reuters: "Please read in paragraph nine: 'about 27 million Soviet citizens died' ... instead of ... 'more than 27 Soviet citizens died'."

From the New York Times: "An obituary of the civil rights leader James Forman yesterday mis-

stated a word in describing his call, in 1969, for reparations to be paid by Protestant and Jewish groups for the crimes of slavery. Mr. Forman asked for \$500 million for crimes perpetrated against generations of blacks, not 'by' them."

From The Guardian: "In our G2 cover story about Hunter S Thompson yesterday we mistakenly attributed to Richard Nixon the view that Thompson represented 'that dark, venal and incurably violent side of the American character.' On the contrary, it was what Thompson said of Nixon."

The Chicago Tribune misidentified two residents as mobsters: "A graphic explaining the alleged infrastructure of the Chicago Outfit mob on Page 18 of Tuesday's main news section incorrectly used a picture of businessman Frank Calabrese instead of mobster Frank Calabrese Sr. A story explaining the mistake appears on Page 1 of today's Metro section."

"A picture caption on Page 1 Wednesday incorrectly identified a man on a bicycle as the reputed mob boss Joey 'the Clown' Lombardo. In fact, the man's name is Stanley Swieton and he has no ties to organized crime. A story explaining the mistake is on Page 1 of today's Metro section."

MSNBC picked up a spoof column on Britney Spears and published a fake quote. The Washington Post, Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, Richmond Times-Dispatch and Us Weekly subsequently picked it up.

The fake quote: "It's this reality. Like omigod, I have to tell the maid to buy diapers and get the pool boy to

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 5, 1946, Winston Churchill delivered his famous "Iron Curtain" speech at Westminster College in Fulton, Miss. Said Churchill: "From Stettin in the Baltic, to Trieste in the Adriatic, an 'iron curtain' has descended across the continent, allowing police governments to rule Eastern Europe."

On this date:

In 1770, the Boston Massacre took place as British soldiers who'd been taunted by a crowd of colonists opened fire, killing five people.

In 1849, Zachary Taylor took the oath of office at his presidential inauguration.

In 1868, the Senate was organized into a Court of Impeachment to decide charges against President Andrew Johnson.

In 1933, in German parliamentary elections, the Nazi Party won 44

percent of the vote, enabling it to join with the Nationalists to gain a slender majority in the Reichstag.

In 1953, Soviet dictator Josef Stalin died at age 73 after 29 years in power.

In 1963, country music performers Patsy Cline, "Cowboy" Copas and "Hawkshaw" Hawkins died in a plane crash near Camden, Tenn.

In 1970, a nuclear nonproliferation treaty went into effect after 43 nations ratified it.

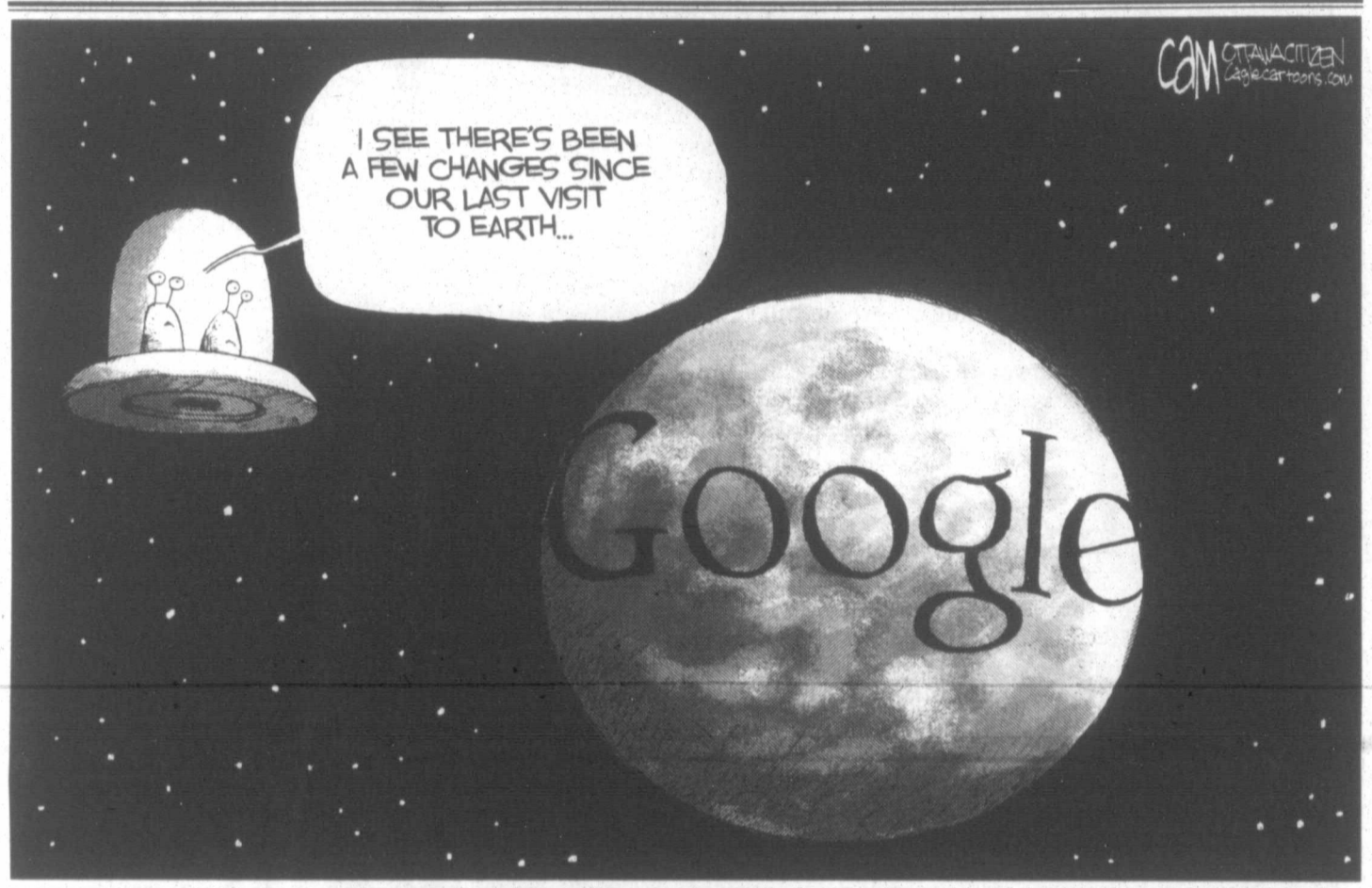
In 1982, comedian John Belushi was found dead of a drug overdose in a rented bungalow in Hollywood; he was 33.

In 1986, in Lebanon, Islamic Jihad issued a statement saying it had "executed" French hostage Michel Seurat, who had been abducted almost a year earlier.

In 2004, Martha Stewart was convicted in New York of lying to the government about a stock sale; her ex-stockbroker, Peter Bacanovic, also was found guilty in the scandal. (Each later received a five-month sentence.)

Ten years ago: Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole swept the "Junior Tuesday" primaries. U.S. Rep. Enid Greene Waldholtz, R-Utah, tangled in a financial mess that she blamed on her estranged husband, announced she would not seek a second term.

Five years ago: Vice President Dick Cheney underwent an angioplasty for a partially blocked artery after going to a hospital with chest pains. Two students at Santana High School in Santee, Calif., were shot to death, 13 other people were wounded; student shooter Charles "Andy" Williams was later sentenced to 50 years to life in prison.

The Dallas Morning News on the Health Revolution:

President Bush used part of his State of the Union address to launch his consumer-driven health care reform. The idea is that patients can better scream about expenses once they more fully understand how much a trip to the doctor or a procedure at the hospital actually costs.

The revolution is also built around exercise, diet and other smart-living measures, which companies and insurers should encourage with incentives.

Since his address, the president has been campaigning for his plan, and recent events are helping his cause: The American Medical Association

announced last week that it will create ways for patients to judge the quality of their medical care. Yeah, you read that right. The AMA, the stodgy granddaddy of all health organizations, will produce 100 or so measures of medical work. Patients and insurers then can become better shoppers for health care.

The National Governors Association held healthy living seminars this weekend at its annual Washington meeting. The sessions featured chefs and fitness experts, including Dallas' Dr. Kenneth Cooper.

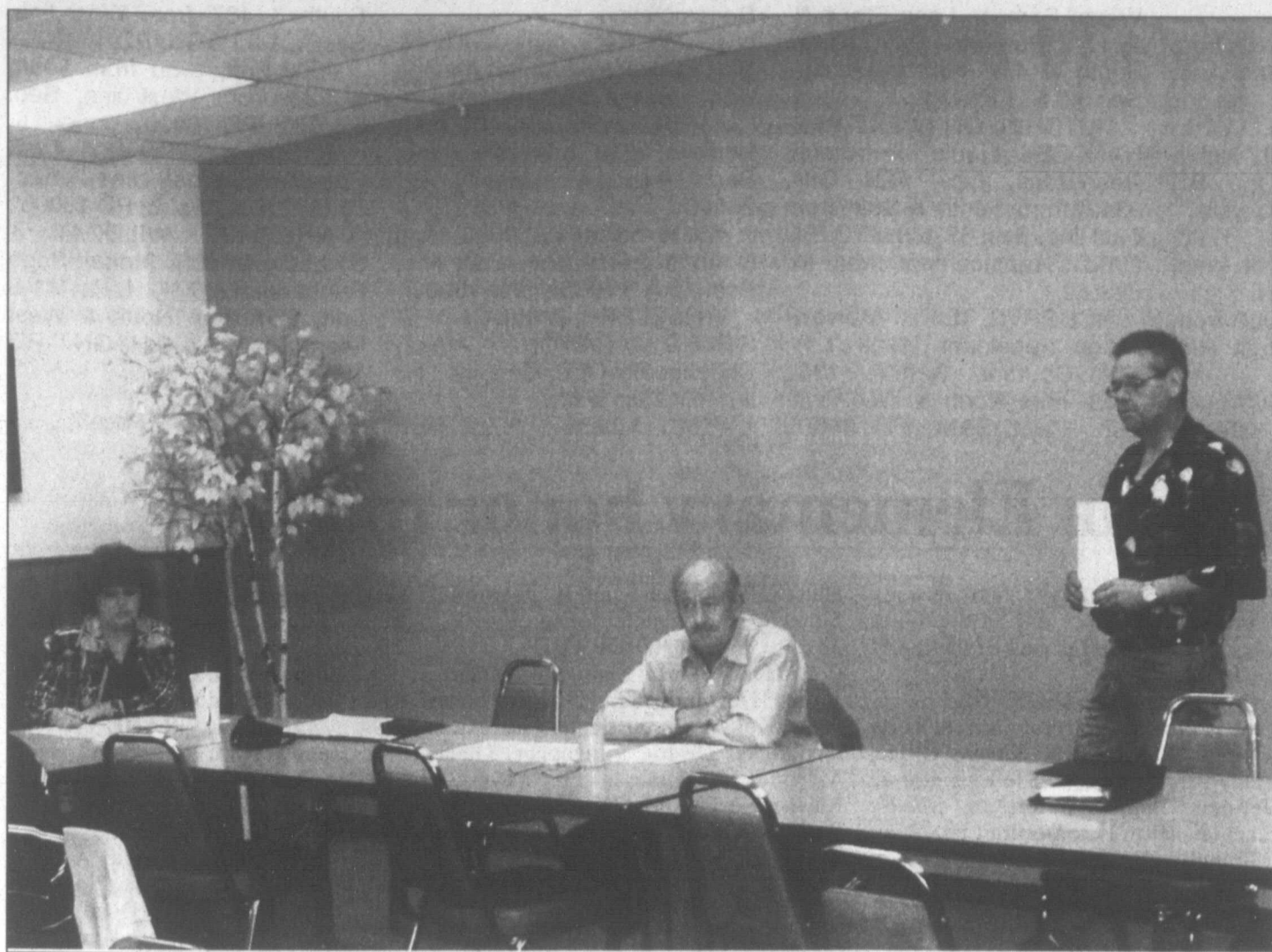
It may sound loony that governors discussed food, but several years ago, another group of them began an important movement to help parents, legislators and doctors understand how the brain develops before age 3. We hope the food-a-thon, which Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee assembled, will spur an equal wave in preventive care.

It's now time for Congress to join the revolution. Specifically, the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee should have hearings on the president's request for expanded use of health savings accounts. There was chatter about these accounts when administration officials came before the committees to talk about next year's budget. But no hearings are scheduled.

Health savings accounts are a key tool in this revolution. The sooner Washington can expand their use, by allowing employees to take their accounts with them from job to job, for example, the sooner the revolution revs up.

Given double-digit increases in health premiums, it makes little sense for legislators to wait. Read our recent editorial on health care solutions.

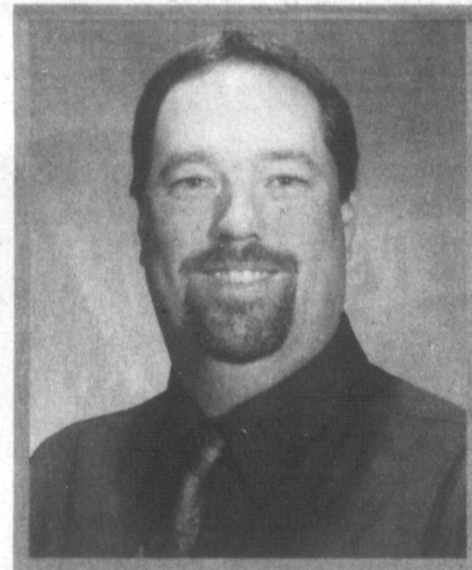

AUSTIN — The Texas average rig count as of Jan. 20 was 658, representing about 53 percent of all active land rigs in the United States.

In the last 12 months, total Texas reported production was 317 million barrels of oil and 5.7 Trillion cubic feet of natural gas. Texas natural gas production represents approximately 29 percent of total U.S. natural gas demand.

The Texas Railroad Commission's estimated final production for November 2005 is 28,757,166 barrels of crude oil and 441,807,193 Mcf of gas well gas.

Palo Duro Canyon: 'Grand Canyon' of Texas

CANYON — Humans have inhabited Palo Duro Canyon for at least 12,000 years. Today, Palo Duro Canyon State Park is one of the most popular destinations in Texas. Palo Duro Canyon: The Grand Canyon of Texas opens at the museum on March 11, and will continue through July 16.

The exhibit will spotlight five topics relating to the Canyon: natural history, Indian occupation, ranching, the state park, and the outdoor musical projects of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation. Photographs dating from the 1880s to the present, as

well as three-dimensional objects will be displayed.

Named Palo Duro (hard wood) by Spanish explorers for the juniper and mesquite prevalent in the Canyon, the region offers a variety of geological formations, plants and animal life. The Clovis and Folsom people, who hunted large herds of mammoth and giant bison, were attracted to the Canyon's warmer temperatures, the springs feeding Palo Duro Creek and the abundant game. Later, Apaches, Comanches, and Kiowas took advantage of the Canyon's protection and resources, until the Red

River War in 1874 finally forced Native Americans onto reservation.

Captain Randolph B. Marcy led the first United States expedition into the Canyon in 1852 but Euro-Americans did not occupy Palo Duro Canyon until Charles Goodnight established the JA Ranch in 1876. Several other ranches later were established in Palo Duro. Some, including the JA, still operate today.

The beauty of Palo Duro Canyon inspired the desire to create a park there during the late 19th century but Palo Duro Canyon State Park did not become a

reality until the 1930s, when the Civilian Conservation Corps began construction of the state park. In 1961, Texas Panhandle Heritage

Foundation was organized, and the well-known TEXAS Musical Drama premiered in 1966. In 2003, the outdoor performance became known as Texas Legacies.

A number of other productions have also performed in the Canyon's outdoor theater. As the second largest canyon in the United States, it remains a popular site for camping, picnicking and outdoor recreation.




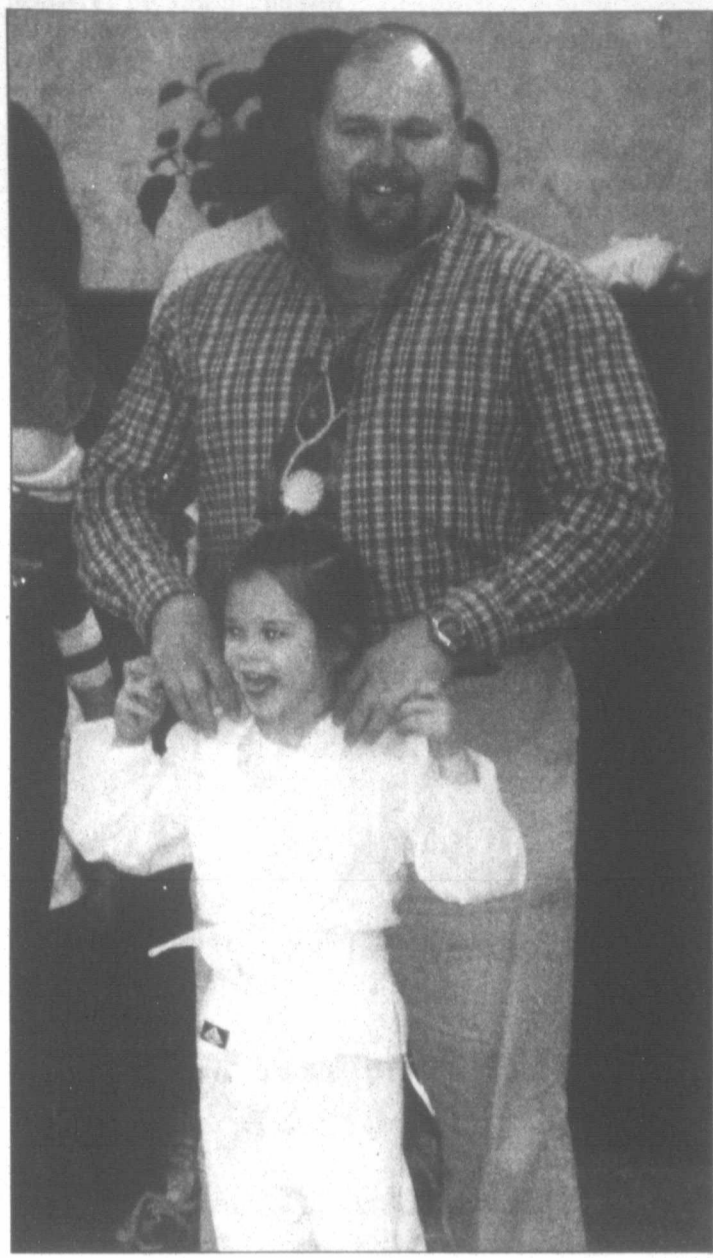

Museum receives donation of Quanah Parker rifle

CANYON — The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon has acquired a Winchester Model 1873 carbine, once owned by Comanche leader Quanah Parker. This is the only known firearm owned by Quanah Parker in a public collection. The top of the Winchester's barrel is inscribed: "Quanah Parker/Crescent/May 14, 1883."

Research indicates the Winchester was probably given to Quanah by Texas cattlemen who leased grazing lands on the Comanche reservation in the early 1880s. Among the possible presenters of the rifle are Col. B. B. Groom, representing the Francklyn Land and Cattle Co., and Samuel Burk Burnett of the 6666.

William T. Hagan, Ph.D., University of Oklahoma history professor emeritus and author of "Quanah Parker: Comanche Chief," supports these conclusions.

By 1889, the United States had outlawed grazing leases on Indian land.

Bill Voelker, de facto Parker family historian, acknowledged that Quanah sometimes received firearms as gifts and said "[He] was very generous with gifts and often [in turn] gave firearms [he had been given] away to friends."

A private collector in Oklahoma acquired the Winchester in Mexico in 1937, then it passed to collectors in Oregon and Utah before coming to Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

Richard Rattenberry, curator of history at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Center and a noted authority on Western firearms, consulted on the acquisition.

David Kennedy, curator of the Cody Firearms Museum at the Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, Wyo., also advised on the acquisition as the Winchester Arms archives are housed at the center.

PPHM director Guy C. Vanderpool underscored

the importance of the Quanah Parker Winchester: "With the largest and most important assemblage of Quanah Parker material in a public collection, we have an obligation to continue to collect and preserve Quanah-related artifacts. Consequently, when we became aware of this important firearm, we knew it belonged in our collection."

The Winchester will be exhibited in the museum's Pioneer Hall in coming weeks along with Charles Goodnight's Plains rifle. Goodnight carried the Plains rifle while he was a Texas Ranger and he used it to hunt buffalo.

The Goodnight rifle is inscribed on the top of the barrel with Matthew 6:33: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you."

The commission derives final production numbers by multiplying the preliminary November 2005 production totals of 27,108,942 barrels of crude oil and 363,358,165 Mcf of gas well gas by a production adjustment factor of 1.0608 for crude oil and

1.2159 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casing-head gas or condensate.)

Texas natural gas storage reported by the Commission for December 2005 is 290,584,338 Mcf compared to 291,884,617 Mcf in December 2004. The January 2006 gas storage estimate is 285,678,306 Mcf.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial February 2006 natural gas production allowables for prorated

fields in the state to meet market demand of 20,648,840 Mcf (thousand cubic feet).

In setting the initial February 2006 allowables, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability. These initial allowables will be adjusted after actual production for February 2006 is reported.

All Business: National security is a risk, as is knee-jerk reaction to ports deal

NEW YORK (AP) — National security is a legitimate worry, but behind the dispute over whether to let a Middle Eastern company run U.S. ports lurks the nagging discomfort Americans feel whenever the growing pains of free trade and globalization hit home.

Last year, it was a Chinese company's attempt to buy a big U.S. oil company. Before that, there was outrage over U.S. companies "outsourcing" jobs to India and other lower-wage markets. And for the better part of three decades, there's been dismay at just how open our borders

are to Japanese cars and other imports.

There was a time when our high-quality, lower-priced products were flooding other markets, generating fortunes in export revenue and a healthy dose of foreign resentment. That often led to tariffs, trade barriers and no shortage of angry protest from Washington.

Those days are long gone. Imports of foreign goods exceeded exports of U.S. goods by a record \$726 billion in 2005. This imbalance prompts frequent calls by politicians, companies and unions to retaliate against

China and other nations who they say view free trade as a one-way street, or to subsidize those segments of the U.S. economy taking the biggest hit from imports.

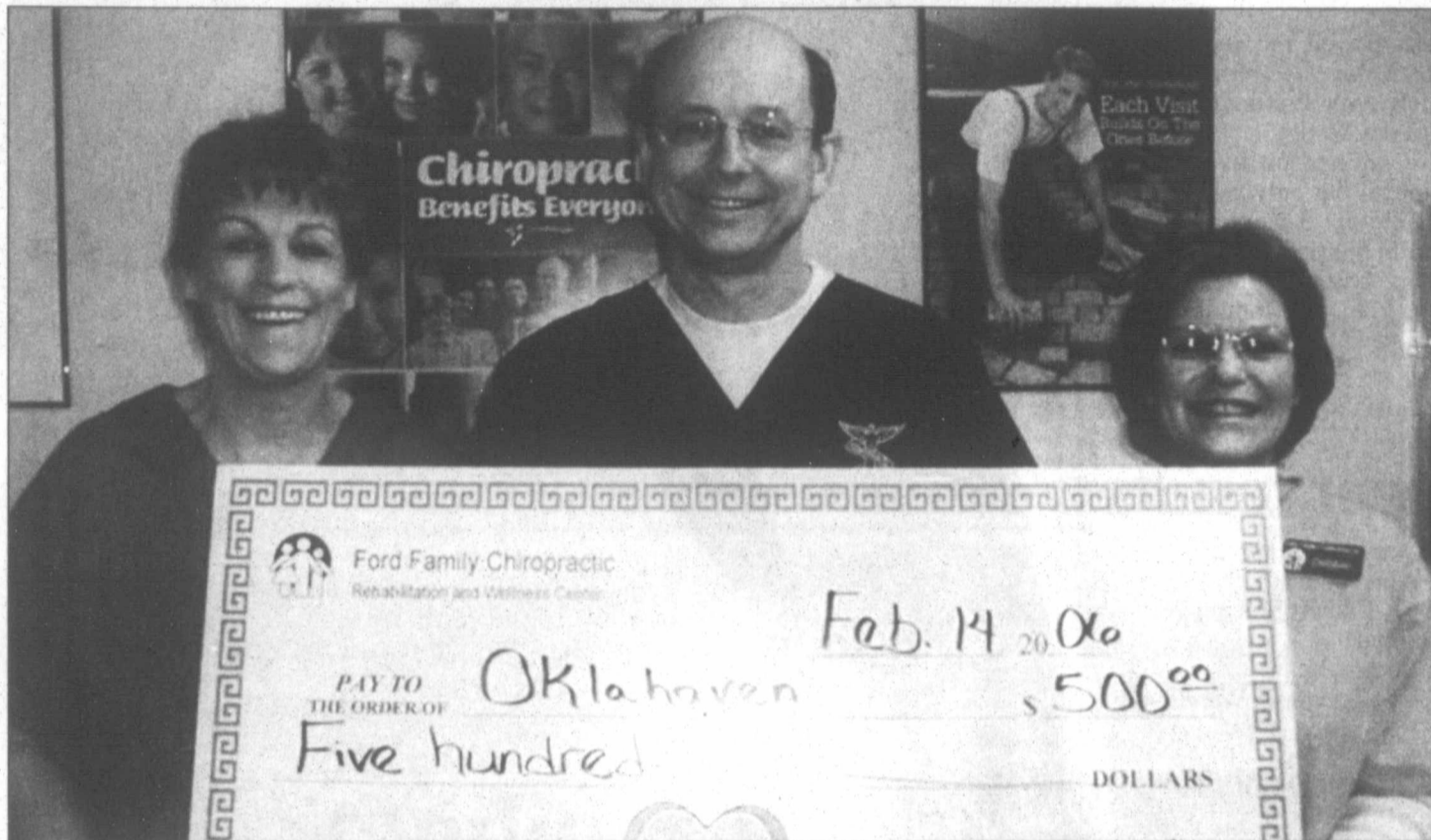

Japan, Germany, South Korea and other countries actively intervene to support their industries."

Among the unlikely "interventions" proposed by the UAW president was national health insurance. Such a massive federal program would neatly eliminate one of the most hobbling burdens for Detroit rather than forcing the automakers and UAW to come up with a sustainable business model — including health benefits much less luxuriant than autoworkers currently enjoy.

Other critics say it's naive for the United States to be so open to imports from countries that don't return the favor.



Mavericks 90, Bobcats 76

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Mavericks recovered from a listless first half just in time to beat the Charlotte Bobcats.

Dirk Nowitzki scored 26 points and the Mavericks rallied from a halftime deficit to extend their club-record home winning streak to 16 games with a 90-76 victory over the Bobcats on Friday night.

Mavericks coach Avery Johnson worried before the game that his team would overlook the Bobcats, the middle opponent in an important three-game stretch.

Dallas was beaten by San Antonio on Thursday night in a matchup of the top two teams in the Western Conference, and the Mavericks face the Phoenix Suns on Sunday.

"I wouldn't say it was expected but it's not acceptable," Johnson said of his team's sleepy start. "At the same time, these guys wanted to get it right. It was something we were able to fight through."

Jason Terry scored 10 of his 17 points in a 29-8 third-quarter run that gave Dallas a 65-45 lead. The Mavericks trailed by a point at halftime.

"Winning this game was important," said Terry, who hit a pair of 3-pointers and two mid-range jumpers during the decisive stretch. "We turned a bad night into a good night."

Dallas scored on 17 of its 21 third-quarter possessions and had an 18-point lead heading into the final period.

"We got the win, it didn't matter how ugly it was," Dallas' Adrian Griffin said. "We needed to get back on track."

Charlotte, completing a 2-4 road trip, never got closer than 10 points the rest of the way.

"The beginning of the third, we didn't get anything done," Bobcats coach Bernie Bickerstaff said. "After six games and two weeks, we didn't have the energy to get the job done."

Erick Dampier had nine points, 14 rebounds and two blocked shots for the Mavericks, who have won 20 of their last 22.

Gerald Wallace scored 14 points for the Bobcats, who have lost eight of their last 10.

The Mavericks played the second half without forwards Keith Van Horn and Josh Howard, who left with first-half injuries. Both are listed as day-to-day.

The Bobcats connected on five of their first eight 3-pointers, but only two of their first 21 from inside the 3-point arc. They shot 31.5 percent in the first half.

The Mavericks weren't much better, going 16-for-40 from the field with 10 turnovers in the first half to trail 37-36 at the break.

Japan advances

TOKYO (AP) — Japan advanced to the second round of the inaugural World Baseball Classic with a 14-3 win over Taiwan on Saturday.

Ichiro Suzuki had a hit and scored a run, and Hitoshi Tamura hit a three-run homer in the first inning. Tamura, who had 31 home runs last season for the Yokohama BayStars, connected off Taiwan starter Hsu Chu-chien for his second homer of the series.

Japan's win before a crowd of 31,047 at Tokyo Dome also ensured that South Korea advanced to the next round of the 16-nation tournament.

Japan (2-0) took an 11-1 lead in the top of the fifth with six runs. Tsuyoshi Nishioka and Akinori Iwamura each drove in a pair of runs.

With Labonte, Petty's talking turnaround

(AP) — Kyle Petty's improbable recruiting effort finally paid off.

For three years, Petty nagged Bobby Labonte to come drive the family team's famed No. 43 car.

He'd stop Labonte on the streets of their subdivision in Trinity, N.C., where Petty jogs and Labonte rides his bicycle. They'd talk on airplane rides. One day, they ran into each other getting a bite to eat at Panera.

Petty delivered the same plea every time: "Come drive that 43, man."

Petty was joking — at least he thought he was. Why would Labonte, the 2000 series champion, leave an elite team such as Joe Gibbs Racing for a once-dominant team that has fallen on two decades worth of hard times?

Turns out, the chance to help turn around Petty Enterprises proved more attractive to Labonte than Petty anticipated.

"He had people throwing money at him, fortune and fame and houses and cars and all kinds of stuff," Petty said. "But in the end, this is where he chose to come."

Labonte's move is the latest and most high-profile step in a recent talent infusion that has the Petty people talking turnaround.

Robbie Loomis, who left the Pettys to become Jeff Gordon's crew chief in 2000, has returned to become the team's executive vice president. Todd Parrott, who won a championship with Dale Jarrett in 1999, will be Labonte's crew chief. They join Paul Andrews, another championship-winning crew chief, who came to the team last season.

Petty calls the four men "cornerstones" who form the foundation for something the team hasn't had in years; hope.

"In a short period of time, morale really went through the ceiling," Petty said.

Labonte and Petty both were involved in crashes in the season-opening Daytona 500, but Labonte showed the team's potential in the middle of the race by climbing into the top 10 and staying there, weaving his way to as high as sixth.

Asked to list reasonable goals for the season, Petty talks about trying to develop

chemistry and becoming more consistent in the first half, then going after steady top-five and top-10 finishes in the second half.

And this: "I think Bobby can win races," Petty said.

A Petty car hasn't visited Victory Lane since 1999, and the team, which won 10 championships from 1954-79, has only three victories since 1984.

Richard Petty said the team lost its edge in the 1980s, when new team owners with big ideas and even bigger budgets entered NASCAR.

"A lot of them also looked a little further down the line in the future than we did," Richard Petty said. "We always did everything out of Level Cross (N.C.) in the backyard and we were fairly successful with the thing."

Then it started being a bigger and bigger business. It started going and bringing more people in, more money, more technology, that kind of stuff. We still sat there in the backyard. By the time we got ready to do something about it, we were so far behind on our money and our engineering and all that stuff it's just taken us a little time to get going."

The team widely is perceived to be at a major technological disadvantage to rival megateams such as Hendrick Motorsports, Roush Racing and Gibbs, but Labonte said the dropoff really isn't dramatic. An engine deal with another Dodge team, Evernham Motorsports, has boosted horsepower.

"They might not have the luxury stuff like some teams, but as far as having the stuff to work with, they've got it," Labonte said. "That's not a problem."

Petty suspects the chance

to help lead a team back to greatness played a key role in Labonte's decision to join the team. Labonte seems to have embraced the role.

"When I quit driving it one day, I want to see 25 guys in line wanting to drive it because it must be a great car," Labonte said. "You want people to want to drive the car. That would be better than any money you could get to have that feeling."

That's Petty's vision, too. The team's long-term goal is to become good enough to attract a hotshot young driver.

"Then we have a Kurt Busch, we have a Ryan Newman, we have somebody of that caliber and somebody who can step in and drive the second car," Petty said.

Petty's son, Adam, was supposed to be that young hotshot. But he was killed in a racing accident in 2000, sending the Petty family and the team into a spiral of grief. A talented driver who could charm the checkbook off potential sponsors, Adam was supposed to be the future of Petty Enterprises.

"If Adam was here, I probably wouldn't be driving today," Kyle Petty said.

Petty said the presence of Labonte and the other newcomers has boosted morale in the team's shop, especially among longtime employees who grieved for Adam with the family.

"The guys at the shop were here when Adam's accident happened, the majority of those guys," Kyle Petty said. "So it's huge for them to think, OK, five years ago for us, where we were at, and then where we are at this year at Daytona is a huge difference."

Glover gone, Nguyen retires

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys have released defensive tackle La'Roi Glover and announced the retirement of linebacker Dat Nguyen.

Glover, a 10-year veteran who signed with the Cowboys as a free agent in 2002, was cut Thursday. Glover made his sixth Pro Bowl last season, finishing with 26 tackles and three sacks. He has 71 1/2 career sacks, second all-time among defensive tackles behind Warren Sapp's 84 1/2.

The Cowboys would have owed Glover a \$1.5 million roster bonus had he remained on the team. He was scheduled to make \$4.5 million this season, the last of his five-year deal. He will count \$1.2 million against the team's salary cap next season.

Glover had a career-high 76 tackles in his first season with Dallas in 2002, two years after he set a New Orleans record with 17 sacks. He had 21 1/2 sacks in four seasons with the Cowboys.

Nguyen, an eight-year veteran out of Texas A&M, led the Cowboys with 172 tackles in 2001, his first full season as a starter. He was slowed by a neck injury last season, playing his last game Thanksgiving day against Denver.

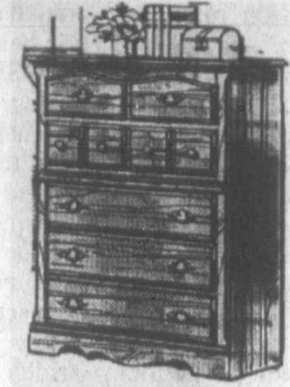

WWII Merchant Marines may benefit from proposed bill

U.S. Merchant Marine Combat Veterans along with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs are seeking Merchant Marine veterans from World War II.

U.S. Merchant Marine Combat Veterans' Just Compensation Committee has two bills before Congress — HB HR23 and SB S1271.

If this legislation passes, Merchant Marines will receive lifetime, tax-free monthly benefits of \$1,000

which, after the mariner's death, could be transferred to a surviving spouse for the remainder of that spouse's life.

Former mariners will need to apply for benefits. They will not be automatic.

In order for mariners to receive these proposed benefits, the mariner must meet all of the following criteria:

- Be living when the Senate bill is passed;

- Have a DD-214 honorable discharge from the U.S.

Coast Guard;

- Have served in "harm's way" during World War II; and

- Meet the date-of-service period and other conditions set forth in the bill.

Additionally, the surviving spouse must have been married to the mariner for no less than one year to continue receiving benefits after the mariner's death. For more information, call 1-800-545-4173.

All-State Contenders

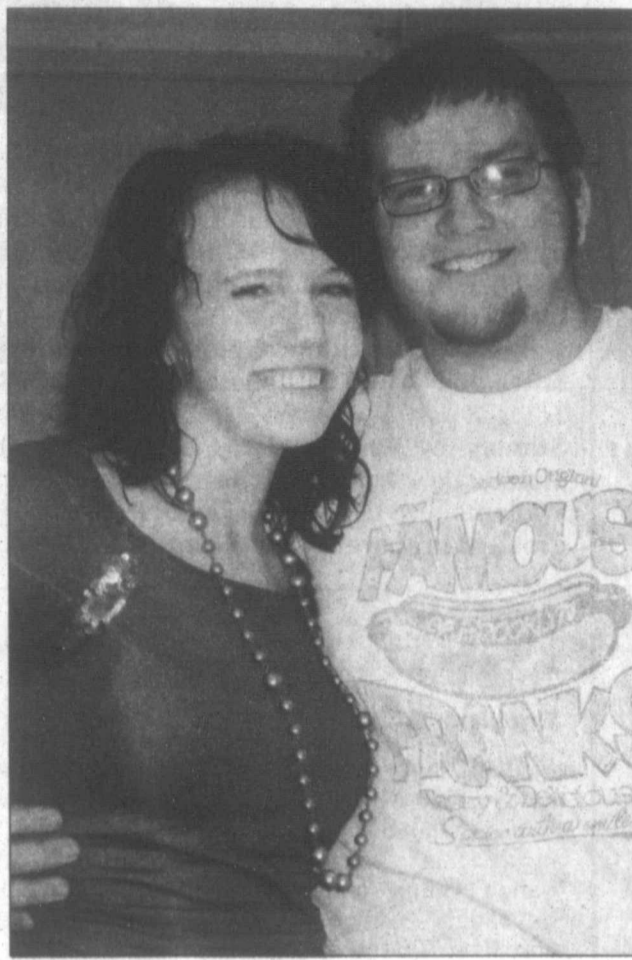

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: My mother has eight grandchildren. Four are mine; four are my sister's. One, however, is her obvious favorite. She spares no expense when it comes to my sister's oldest son, "Johnny." She buys him extravagant gifts, praises him constantly, and hands him large sums of money in front of the other children -- often making a big deal out of presenting it to him. Last Christmas, she insisted that all the children come and sit around Johnny as she presented him with a \$100 bill. When we're out together in public, she will say to perfect strangers, in front of all the children, "I love all my grandchildren, but I have special feelings for Johnny. We have a special relationship that I don't have with the others." My children are hurt by her actions and comments. When the children were younger, I could disguise her favoritism, but as my children have grown older, they are very aware of her feelings and actions. When my sister and I confronted Mother about it, she cried, said she wouldn't listen to such "hateful lies," then stormed from the room. Is there a way to help my mother see what she's doing to our family, or should I just protect my children from her abuse by staying away from her?

— PROTECTIVE MOM IN TEXAS

DEAR MOM: You and your sister should have formed a united front and put a stop to this years ago. As it stands, your mother has already alienated seven out of her eight grandchildren, and understandably so. If you're asking for my permission to protect your children from your mother's obsession with their cousin, you have it. And your sister should follow your example.

DEAR ABBY: I am the mother of two children ages 7 and 4. In a recent child development class, there was a discussion about sex education for small children.

My professor mentioned that if children aren't asking questions about sex, we should initiate talks with our children. She also said that children should have the sex talk by 8 years old. Is this correct? I can't imagine talking to my children about sex at such an early age. What's the best age to have the sex talk, and is there a limit on how much we should talk about? -- SYLVIA IN SAN DIEGO

DEAR SYLVIA: Much depends upon the level of maturity of the child, which can vary from individual to individual. Parents should certainly use correct terminology when talking about body parts. It's best to arm children with knowledge before their hormones kick in. I agree with your professor that by age 8 or 9, some discussion of puberty should be introduced. If you wait much longer, your children will hear "the facts" from their friends instead of from you, and too often, the information they receive from peers is incorrect.

DEAR ABBY: About a year ago, I found out that I am biologically unable to father a child. My wife and I looked into several options and chose to go with an anonymous donor. How would you suggest I handle comments like, "That baby looks just like you," or "She has your eyes." Because our baby will be a girl, I was thinking of something like, "I hope not -- she'll never get a date looking like me." Any other suggestions? -- FATHER-TO-BE

DEAR FATHER-TO-BE: When someone comments that the baby resembles you, stick with the tried-and-true. Smile and say, "Thank you!" It's all that's required from any proud papa.

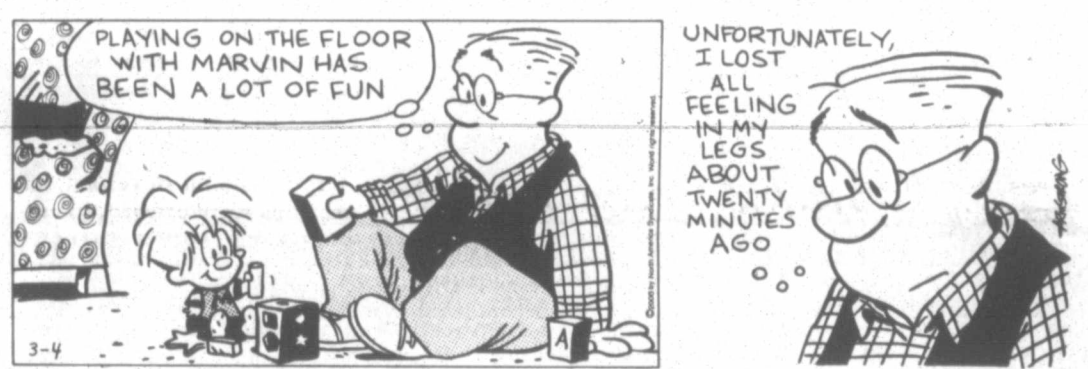

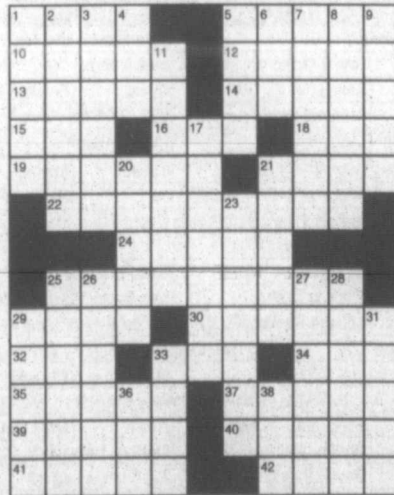

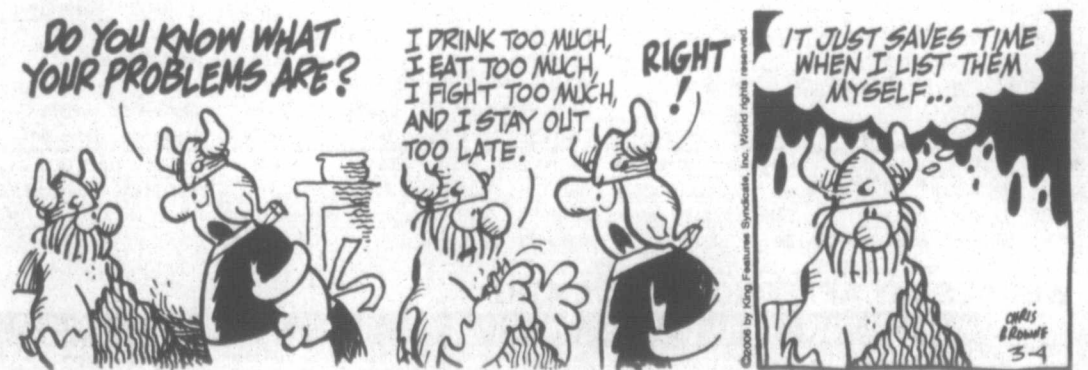
