

Three Die On Curve In Bogata

Cecil Patton, 39, Kenneth Owens, 16, and Robert Patton, 17, were killed in a one-car smashup in Bogata Monday at 1:30 a.m. on the Hwy 271 curve in front of the Guy Smelser home. All were listed dead on arrival at the Red River County Hospital in Clarksville.

The 1973 4-door Dodge sedan in which they were riding was driven by Mrs. Cecil (Florine) Patton, 36, who suffered a punctured lung, several broken ribs and severe head injuries. She was taken to Red River County Hospital and transferred to Parkland Hospital in Dallas early Monday morning. Danny Patton, 13, was unconscious when taken from the wreckage, and remained unconscious while being transferred from Red River County Hospital in Clarksville to McCuiston in Paris to Parkland in Dallas. Investigating Highway Patrolman Tom Purvis said that the

Patton boy appeared to be bleeding internally.

A group of young men gathered at the blinking caution light in Bogata heard the car coming toward town, and stated that the car passed them headed west at a high rate of speed, thought to be in excess of 100 m.p.h.

The car went into a 140 foot skid in the curve, struck the curb on the west side of the parking area in front of the Continental Telephone office, and traveled 25 feet in the air to strike a tree in the Smelser lawn. The impact cut the car halfway through with the roof only inches above the level of the seats. The point of impact was behind the front seat on the center post. Robert, Danny and Mrs. Patton were in the front seat, and Cecil Patton and Kenneth Owens were in the back seat.

Patrolman Purvis said that it appeared that Mrs. Patton did not hit her brakes. More

that two hours work with wreckers, volunteer workers and other vehicles was required to remove the dead and injured from the car. The roof had to be removed with fire axes before some of the bodies could be taken out.

Robert and Danny Patton are the children of Cecil Patton by a previous marriage, and Kenneth Owens was the child of Mrs. Cecil (Florine) Patton by a previous marriage. The boys had been living with the couple for three weeks.

They were enroute to spend the night with Cecil Patton's mother, Mrs. Eula Patton, who lives in the Theford Homes in Bogata, and had just left the Gene White residence in Jolntown. Mrs. White is a sister to Cecil Patton. They had also visited with the Dean Rhoades family in Jolntown, and Mrs. Rhoades is also a sister to Patton.

The three deaths in Bogata brought the Labor Day weekend death count to 26.

Other damage connected to the crash of the Patton car occurred when the right rear tire sheared from the axle and crashed into a 1972 Ford LTD station wagon belonging to Raymond Screws of Abilene, which was parked in the Smelser driveway. All the windows on the left side of the car were broken.

Coach Dobbs thinks the chances are very good for a victory against Hughes Springs if we have few mistakes. We are both about the same type ball clubs and

the one with the fewest mistakes should have their first victory of the year. He also feels the crowd will have a big influence on the outcome. When you have a lot of fans they will naturally play harder. So he is hoping the Rebel fans will be there to support the team to victory.

Lone Star Receives Order

DALLAS, TEXAS (August 29, 1974) — Lone Star Gas Company received a Texas Railroad Commission order today authorizing an increase in the intracompany charge for gas ultimately sold to residential and commercial customers and for distribution unaccounted-for gas.

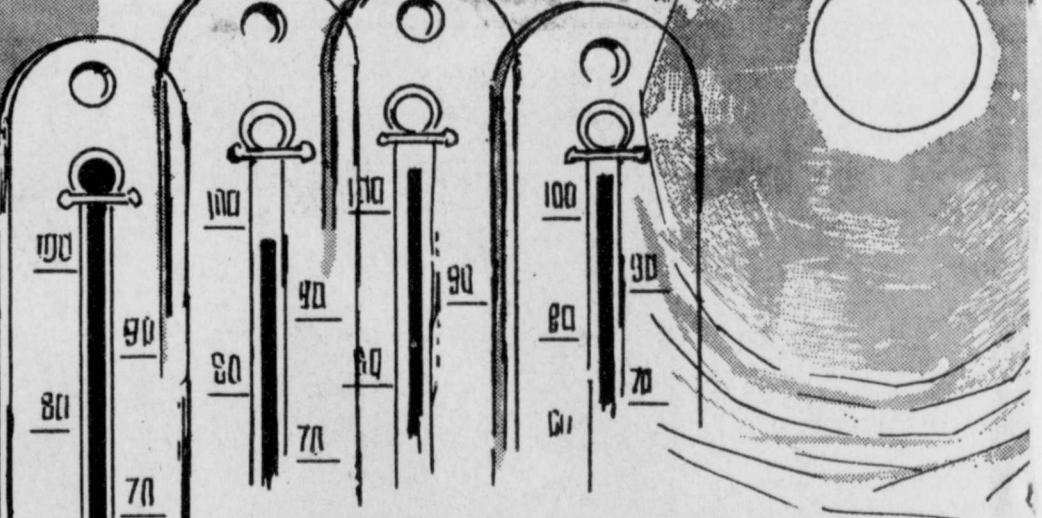
Based on a 1972 volume of 130 billion cubic feet for such gas, Lone Star requested in May of 1973, an increase of 8.1 cent per thousand cubic feet. The request was for the recovery of a return and other costs associated with the company's 400-mile West Texas pipeline, a return on \$9.6 million for advance payments and prepayments as of the date of filing to obtain new gas supplies and to recover the cost the company had incurred to purchase gas, as of the date of filing. The Commission authorized a return on the investments and recovery of the cost of purchased gas. An earlier examiner's report recommended no return on the pipeline. A 3.56 cent increase was granted by the Commission in this proceeding.

That portion of the increase which represents the increased cost of purchased gas will be flowed-through to residential and commercial customers, where authorized. Lone Star must apply to the cities and towns it serves for the approval of the balance of the increase.

The Commission also ordered a continuation of the automatic gas cost adjustment provision authorized in 1972, which permits a flow-through of 65 percent of the increase in the weighted average cost of gas on a semi-annual basis. Lone Star had requested a monthly 100 percent adjustment.

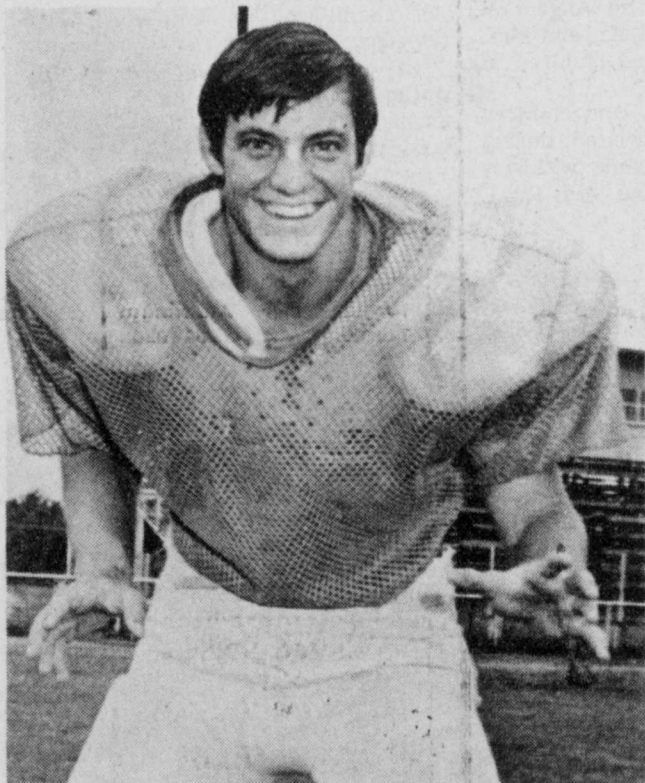

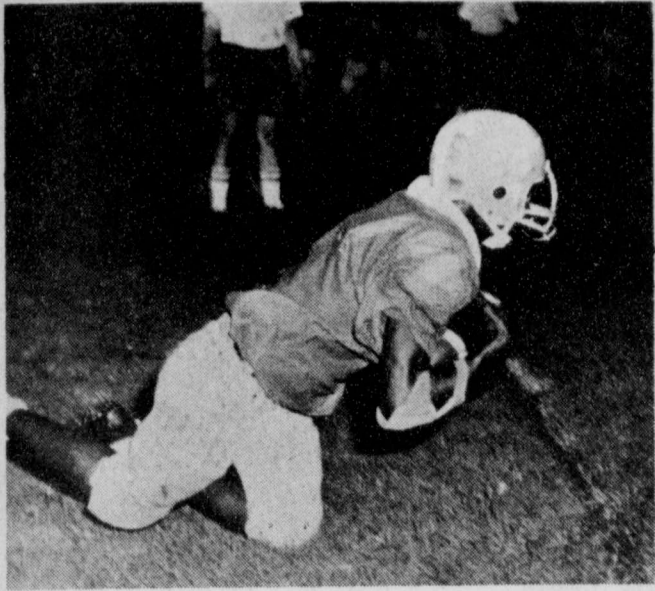

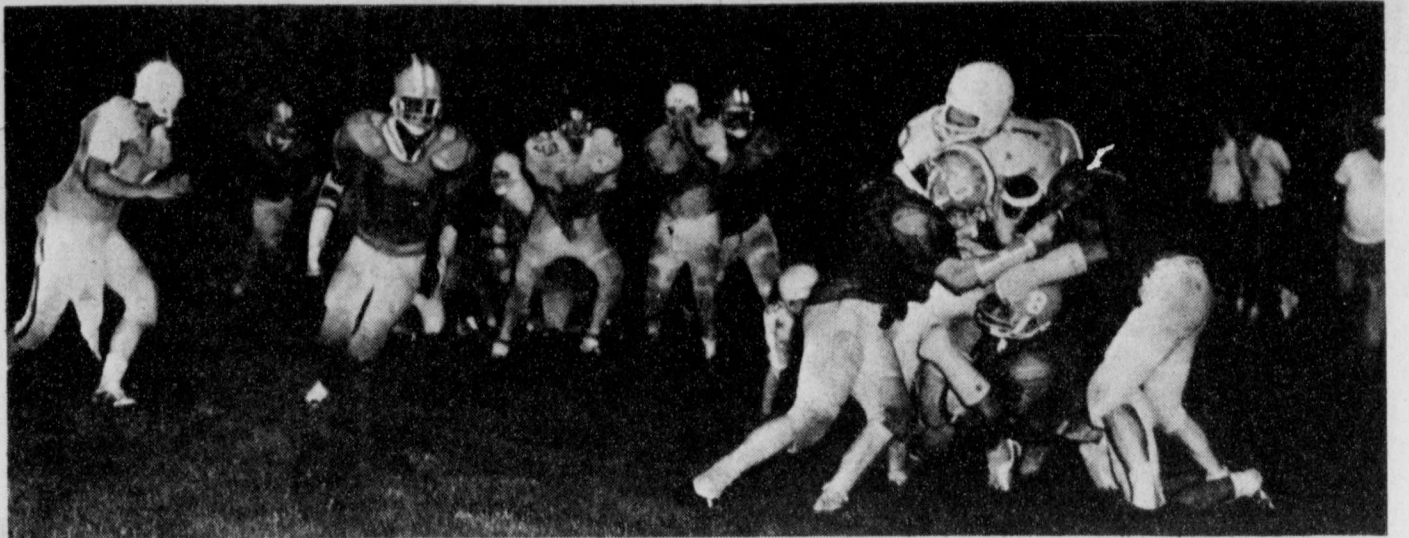
CLUTCH—Jerry Curties, a Rivercrest senior end, went to his knees to catch this pass from his brother,
