Pause for Reflection

"Prior to the Civil War (less than 100 years ago), more than 50% of all the work energy used in America was furnished by horses and other animals", says Thomas K. Myer in an article, "Automation: Blessing or Curse?" contained in a recent issue of Senior Citizen. He goes on: "Human beings, with their own muscles, provided about 20%. Wind and water ac-

counted for most of the remainder."

"At present, men and animals together furnish scarcely 5% of all the work energy used in this country. The rest comes mainly from coal, petroleum, natural gas, and water power."

Seymour Melman, in an article, "Industrial Productivity," published in a recent issue of Scientific American, declares: "United States Industrial workers now produce about four times as much per man hour as they did in 1900. Their productivity is far greater than

that of workers in other countries. Indeed, output per man-hour in the United States is currently two or three times that in the industrial countries of Europe."

Why? Mainly because the United States is not, as yet, socialized to the same extent that Europe is. Private enterprise is responsible for this wholesale revolution in the sources of work energy and the consequent multiplication of production per man-hour. Why are there still some who profess to think that progress is increased by throwing the monkey wrench of government "planning" into the complex but highly efficient machinery of private enterprise?

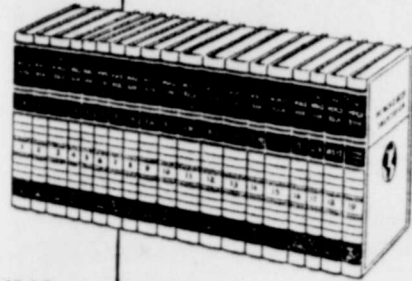

**Keep The Cocky
Jar Filled**

Cookies are in great demand these days—for the lunch box and after school snack. Here is a family favorite, a rich refrigerator type cookie with excellent keeping qualities.

Chocolate Refrigerator Cookies
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup Karo Syrup, Blue Label
1/2 cup sugar, brown or granulated
1 egg, beaten
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup nuts, chopped

Mix and sift together first three ingredients. Beat butter until soft and creamy. Add corn syrup and sugar, and beat until thoroughly blended. Add egg; blend well. Stir in melted chocolate, then vanilla and nuts. Add sifted dry ingredients; mix thoroughly. Chill dough about 1 hour. Shape into 2 rolls about 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in wax paper and chill in refrigerator at least 4 hours or overnight. With a very sharp knife, cut in thin slices. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Makes about 5 dozen.

Variations:

Butterscotch Cookies: Omit chocolate from recipe.

Orange Coconut Cookies: Follow recipe for Chocolate Refrigerator Cookies. Omit chocolate, substitute light corn syrup for dark corn syrup. Use granulated sugar. Stir in 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and 1 cup coconut, chopped, before adding sifted dry ingredients.

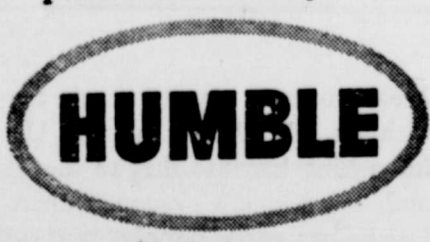

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



SMALLER CATTLE NUMBERS POSSIBLE NEXT YEAR

Fort Worth—The recent study of the livestock and meat situation released by the USDA pointed out that slaughter of cows and heifers had expanded this year, and reports from over the major market circle currently reveal larger numbers of females than a year ago.

If this trend of increased slaughter of cows and heifers is continued through the last quarter of the year some reduction in the estimate of cattle on farms in the United States is indicated.

However, expanded swine numbers and the expected larger lamb crop in the Southwest next year will likely offset any reduction in total meat animal numbers or tonnage.

CATTLE NUMBER LARGER MONDAY AT FORT WORTH

The offering of cattle and calves was the largest since mid-July at Fort Worth Monday. Drying ranges in many sections of the Southwest and the approach of Fall with the cowmen busy working to shape up herds to go into winter are credited with the bigger movement.

Most classes showed some weakness. Cows were 50 cents to \$1 lower. Steers steady. Bulls unchanged. Slaughter calves and most stockers closed lower.

Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$18.00-22.00 (quotable to \$23.50); common and medium steers and yearlings \$12.00-18.00; fat cows \$9.50-11.00; canners and cutters \$7.00-9.50; bulls \$10.00-13.50; good and choice slaughter calves \$16.00-18.50; common and medium \$11.00-15.00; culls \$9.00-11.00; stocker steer calves \$20.50 down; yearling stockers \$19.00 down; replacement cows \$8.00-12.00.

ANGUS ENTRIES LARGE FOR SHOW SEPTEMBER 9

Interest is working up to fever heat in the September Aberdeen-Angus feeder calf show and sale due in the Stockyards September 9. Secretary Glen Tole says the largest consignment to date is 160 head from one owner. Several lots of straight heifers and numerous lots of steers and heifers are reported.

Judges Marvin Couey, San Angelo, and Harris Mullin, Dalhart, will have the largest field of Angus calves to judge that have yet appeared at any of the associations show and sales at the stockyards, on the basis of these announced early intentions.

Upwards of 1,000 are expected, and with inquiries ahead of the same time on the earlier sales the number could be well above that figure. Judging starts at 6:30 A.M. and will be concluded and awards made, so selling can start by 8:30 A.M.

Last minute touches in getting the pens and scales groomed for the event are going forward under supervision of Bill Joyce, operations chief, of the market.

SHEEP AND LAMBS STEADY TO STRONG

Good and choice fat lambs topped at \$18.50 at Fort Worth Monday, and feeders sold from \$17 downward. Medium and lower

grade lambs sold from \$10 to \$16. Yearling wethers drew \$8 to \$16 Old wethers sold from \$8 to \$12. Old slaughter ewes cashed at \$4.50 to \$5.50.

Prices were steady on all classes, and high grade sorts very scarce. WOOL PROMOTION PROGRAM REPORTED OK'd.

Early and incomplete returns of the nation-wide poll of wool producers shows a majority favor the wool promotion program. However, it will be some time before tabulation is completed.
