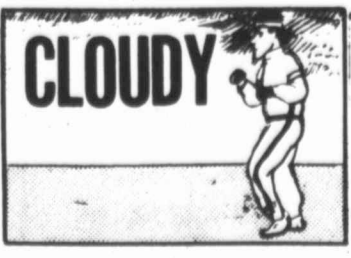

6 injured in two area wrecks

ACKERLY — A Post man and woman were injured Friday evening when their multi-colored 1973 Volkswagen Beetle went off Highway 87 south of here and rolled 1½ times.

Both persons were admitted to the emergency room at Malone-Hogan Hospital after the accident, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

Deborah Ann Dissinger, 27, suffered a neck injury and was transported to the hospital by Shaffer Ambulance, according to Department of Public Safety trooper Glen Redmon.

Leo Romero Lopez, 40, suffered a back injury and lacerations and was transported by an Ackerly ambulance, Redmon said.

The hospital said they could not release statements on the extent of the injuries until primary examinations were completed.

The accident occurred around 6:30 p.m. about 17 miles north of Big Spring, 5 miles south of Ackerly and about 3 miles north of the Knott cut-off.

The couple was lying on the ground when Redmon arrived at the scene, he said. Ms. Dissinger was thrown out of the car, and Lopez crawled out, Redmon said.

The couple's car was traveling south on Highway 87 when they went off the west side of the road, through a barbed-wire fence and overturned 1½ times before resting on its roof, Redmon said. The roof was badly smashed and was covered with blood.

Redmon said he was unsure who was driving the car, but

thought the woman might have been the driver. Both persons

said the other was driving, he said.

Earlier Friday, four persons were slightly injured when two vehicles collided at the intersection of Johnson and 15th streets in Big Spring.

Police said Debbie Wiley, the driver of a Jeep that overturned, and her son, Jimmy Wiley, a passenger, were taken to Hall-Bennett Hospital, where they were treated and released.

The Jeep collided about 3:30 p.m. with a Vega driven by Catrina Delene Williams, 23, of Route 3 at the intersection, police said.

Ms. Williams and a young boy passenger, whose name was not released, were also taken to Hall-Bennett Hospital by Shaffer Ambulance. Both were treated and released, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

United Way fund dips from 1983

The United Way Big Spring board of directors Friday afternoon adopted a \$202,000 budget for 1984-85.

The proposed budget, which is \$20,000 less than the 1983 budget, denied agency membership to the North Side Community Center, which requested \$13,920.

"Last year we were only able to raise \$160,000 of our proposed budget of \$220,000," said campaign chairman Hooper Sanders. "The agencies that we denied were all worthy causes, and although they have good programs I think that we have to be realistic about how much money we can raise in the county this year."

The group also adopted a budget committee suggestion that all member agencies requests be reduced by 15½ percent. The operation budget also was reduced 15½.

Requests from Texans for Child Support, Travelers Aid Association of America, American Social Health Association, the Texas Society for Autistic Citizens and the Camp Sweeney-Diabetic Foundation were also rejected.

The Howard County American Red Cross, dropped from the agency last year, was reinstated. The group requested \$6,558 and received a proposed \$4,000.

The largest single grant — \$42,000 — was requested by the Salvation Army. The group received \$35,552. The Boys Club asked for the second largest amount — \$39,826 — and received \$33,653.

The Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center will receive \$23,268; West Side Community Center, \$22,528; Girl Scouts, \$9,295; Boy Scouts, \$17,660; YMCA \$10,140; West Side Day Care Center, \$8,028; the

Two suits filed in Fiberflex takeover bid

Two civil suits involving parties in the local Fiberflex Products Inc. court battle for control of the Big Spring-based company were filed recently in federal district courts in Midland and Dallas.

Charles "Chris" Christopher, former OIL president and manager, filed suit May 31 in Dallas federal district court against Fiberflex patent attorney Guy Matthews of Houston.

In the suit, Christopher alleges that Matthews violated the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 when Matthews agreed to sell 20,000 shares of Fiberflex stock to Christopher for \$20 a share.

Christopher said he agreed to pay for the stock by assuming a \$400,000 note to the First City National Bank of Hobbs, N.M., now known as Moncor.

At issue in the case is whether Matthews defrauded Christopher by agreeing to the sale of the stock, which would have given Christopher controlling interest in the company, by failing to inform Christopher of a previous agreement involving the stock.

According to papers filed in civil action in the 118th state District Court in Big Spring, Matthews had previously signed voting rights to the stock over to company president Tom Rutledge, and his brother, Russ Rutledge, a vice president with Fiberflex.

Christopher claims that before Matthews told him the sale would

not be completed because of the voting rights agreement, Christopher had purchased other shares of stock. The failure of the deal reduced the value of Christopher's other stock purchases by about \$1 million, according to the suit.

Christopher's Dallas attorney, Tom Thomas, said Friday, "It looks like the deal (between Matthews and the Rutledges) was done later (after Matthews' agreement with Christopher)."

However, Matthews has alleged in a 118th District Court suit against Christopher that Christopher defrauded him by claiming the stock was not the swing stock in the battle for control.

In the federal suit, Christopher is asking for \$1 million in damages, or an injunction forcing Matthews to perform the contract and honor the voting agreement with Christopher. He also seeks a declaratory judgment stating he owns the stock free of all competing proxies or voting agreements.

In addition, he is asking that Matthews pay court costs.

• In a second federal civil suit, a member of Christopher's group of stockholders, Robert Wigington of Martin County, filed suit this week in Midland against both Rutledge brothers, their father, W.T. Rutledge Sr. of Llano County, and Ted Grobel of Big Spring, who are seeking to retain control of the company.

Weather

Hot weekend in store

Thunderstorms rumbled over scattered parts of Texas late Friday, as the National Weather Service predicted a hot and mostly fair weekend for the state.

Isolated storms were reported Friday evening in the Panhandle, High Plains and Far West Texas, with some heavier storms developing in East Texas and the coastal bend. Some heavy storms were reported in Southeast Texas between Wharton and Victoria, and in Northeast Texas south of Longview.

The weather service said the shower and thunderstorm activity developed because moist unstable air was heated by the afternoon sun, and similar conditions were expected through Saturday.

Skies were partly cloudy over most of the state, with south to southeast winds of 10 to 20 mph bringing the moist air from the Gulf of Mexico.

Afternoon highs Friday were in the 80s and 90s over most of the state, with a few 70s in West Texas.

The weather service predicted mostly partly cloudy skies with a few scattered thunderstorms through Saturday.

Flash flood watches were posted Friday from South Dakota to Missouri as thunderstorms dumped more rain on swollen rivers that have already swamped fields, washed over city streets and forced hundreds of people from their homes.

The rains pushed the Missouri River to near-record levels. South of Omaha, the river was at its highest since record floods of 1952.

More than 3 inches of rain fell overnight in parts of Nebraska, Missouri and Iowa, and 2 inches fell in 20 minutes in Eagle Butte, S.D. As some residents ran out of sandbags, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers flew in pumps to help keep back the rising waters in Kansas and Missouri.

Residents in parts of Missouri and Iowa were warned to leave their homes.

In the Northeast, meanwhile, cool air broke a punishing heat wave blamed for the deaths of at least 14 people in the past week. Four other people died Tuesday in the violent weather in the Midwest.

The National Weather Service issued flash flood watches for northern Missouri, northeastern Kansas, southwestern Minnesota and all of South Dakota.

About a third of Freemont County, Iowa, was under water Friday, most of it cropland, said Civil Defense Director Donald Bartholomew.

West Texas - Scattered thunderstorms and showers through Sunday, more numerous in mountains afternoons and evenings, otherwise partly cloudy. Lows Saturday night 60s except upper 50s mountains. Highs Saturday 80s north and 90s south. Highs Sunday 90s except upper mid 80s mountains and upper 80s Panhandle.

Ginnetti found in default *Fiberflex* in deal with a Tulia bank

Former Big Spring car dealer Anthony "Tony" Ginnetti, wanted on an FBI fugitive flight warrant in connection with a fraud scheme involving the Coahoma State Bank, was found in default in a civil case this week.

Ginnetti failed to appear in 118th District Court to answer claims by Howard Wright Motor Co. of Tulia of failure to pay for a Corvette Ginnetti agreed to purchase.

118th District Court Judge Jim Gregg found Ginnetti indebted to the Tulia dealership for the \$24,519.97 agreed purchase price of the car, for \$367.79 interest, 10 percent interest on the original cost from the date of judgment and court costs.

The same incident, where Gin-

netti purchased the Corvette with a check returned for insufficient funds, formed the basis for a complaint on a Swisher County warrant for felony theft of more than \$20,000.

Ginnetti also is wanted on two Howard County warrants for felony theft of more than \$20,000 in connection with a fraud scheme against Coahoma State Bank involving fake car titles.

Ginnetti's partner in the Car City Auto Sales and Service dealership, Jimmy Stewart, also has been cited in the court case, but was not required to appear in court, according to the judgment.

No action was taken against Stewart.

the Rutledges and Grobel's "individual and conspiratorial conduct" constituted common law fraud. Wigington refers specifically to a Dec. 14, 1983, agreement to sell the Rutledges 32,100 shares of Fiberflex stock.

Wigington claims Russ Rutledge and W.T. Rutledge Sr. said they already had purchased other shares of the stock giving them control of the stock and wanted to purchase his out of friendship and a long-standing relationship between himself and the defendants.

Wigington also claimed the Rutledges told him his stock would be worthless if he did not sell his stock that day because the Rutledges intended to shut the company down.

The suit maintains that the Rutledges, then in a minority group of shareholders, did not then possess enough stock to control the company and that they had no intention of closing the company.

Also, the suit alleges that although he was told the Rutledges would be the purchasers of the stock, Grobel was the actual

purchaser.

Wigington is seeking cancellation of the purchase and consequential damages, or actual damages of at least \$275,000 plus exemplary damages. He sold his shares of stock for \$278,000, an amount the suit alleges is less than its value as control stock.

In 118th District Court in Big Spring this week, Sam Spikes, a former director who is a member of the Christopher Group, was dropped as a party to the suit by a court order.

According to court records, Spikes, who was involved in the Matthews stock sale, took the Fifth Amendment repeatedly during questioning on a deposition. He claimed that although he knew of no criminal investigation of his actions, he said he heard rumors that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was investigating him. Spikes owned banks throughout West Texas that have failed.

Christopher's Big Spring attorney, Gil Jones, said earlier that he intended to call Spikes as a witness in the case.

Fiberflex attorney John Burgess declined to comment on the cases.

Fiber Glass merges with Delaware firm

Stockholders of Fiber Glass Systems of San Antonio, originally organized in Big Spring, this week will begin selling their stock in an \$8 million merger with a Delaware corporation.

According to company secretary-treasurer Carl Ritter of San Antonio, stockholders agreed to the merger with FGS Inc., a Delaware corporation formed by Kusan Inc. with the merger. As a result of the merger, the current company will be liquidated and a new company, Fiber Glass Systems Inc., will be formed.

Kusan Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Bethlehem Steel, is a Delaware corporation that specializes in the manufacture and fabrication of home building materials, custom-molded plastic building products, and toys and games. One of its companies includes Mastic, the nation's largest supplier of vinyl siding for homes, Ritter said.

Shareholders made their decision at a meeting last Friday, and the merger became effective Monday. Letters of transmittal were scheduled to be mailed yesterday, he said.

The decision follows detailed negotiations with Kusan that began back in January or February, Ritter said. However, Fiber Glass officials had discussed the possibility of a merger with Kusan "off and on for several years," he said.

The company has issued approximately 162,000 shares of stock, which will be sold for \$50 a share with the merger, Ritter said. Current stockholders are primarily the original testers and company employees, he said.

The stock "never has been very active," Ritter said. "It's traded primarily in Big Spring."

In the last two years, stock sold for a low of \$35 and for a high of \$50, Ritter said.

During the last two years, Fiber Glass has paid dividends of \$1 a share. Prior to then, the stock paid a high of \$2.10, Ritter said.

Fiber Glass Systems was founded in 1968 by company president V.F. Michael, a Big Spring High School graduate, and his wife, Margaret Michael, to market a fiberglass pipe patented by Michael, who received a degree in chemical engineering from the University of Texas. Michael will retain his present position as president and chief executive officer, while Mrs. Michael will retire from her post as vice president.

The company employs 120 people at its Big Spring plant and another 120 at the San Antonio plant, both of which manufacture fiberglass tubing, pipes, casings, fittings and injection lines for oil wells. Corporate headquarters were moved in 1981 to San Antonio when the plant there was opened.

Honey, coke don't mix

FRANKFURT — British pop singer Geraldine Blecker, known as "Honey Brown," was freed from jail Friday after a 2½-year investigation of cocaine smuggling.

A Frankfurt state court ruled that a verdict in the case was long overdue and released the 38-year-old entertainer from investigative custody.

The court ruled Ms. Blecker's right to freedom outweighed the state's interest in obtaining a verdict in the case.

She still faces charges of smuggling 11 pounds of cocaine from Lima, Peru, to London via Frankfurt in 1980-81 and distributing counterfeit U.S. dollars. A mistrial was declared May 8 in the 20-month trial after her defense attorney claimed the court was biased because it refused to hear testimony from key defense witnesses in the United States and Britain. No new trial date has been set.

Not quite the Yangtze

VENICE — Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang sailed the Grand Canal in a 60-boat flotilla Friday on the third day of his four-day tour of Italy.

"The Venetians had the wisdom and intelligence ... because they were the first ones to reap the great benefit of trade with China," Zhao told reporters on a motorboat.

Zhao and his 20-member entourage were welcomed by national and local government officials when he arrived from Rome in this lagoon city, the home of Marco Polo who introduced Western culture and opened a trade route to China in the late 13th century.

The Chinese premier flies to Milan on Saturday, winding up his 17-day West European tour.

Rats are real beach bums

MALIBU — Wharf rats have invaded at least six exclusive homes, so actor Michael Landon and some of his neighbors are trying to scare away the pests. But at first they didn't try anything like rat poison; they used noise-makers.

Brown and spotted Norway rats, weighing an average 11 ounces, have barged into homes in Malibu Colony, the legendary seaside enclave for movie stars and moguls.

Some residents were hesitant to discuss the unwelcome guests, but Landon laughed about the situation and bought "little noise-making devices" to scare the pests away. Through his publicist, Harry Flynn, Landon said the devices were supposed to make the rats "come out and dance."

"It swept through the colony. Everyone bought one," said Flynn. But the noise didn't faze the critters, he said.

So the stars and the star-makers have turned to such businessmen as Oscar Mariano of Ace Pest and Termite Control in nearby Santa Monica.

"They call us and want us to come right away," he said.

She came, saw, won

SANTA CRUZ — One contestant for the Miss California title will have to read the announcer's lips to find out if she wins.

That's what 21-year-old Deirdre Hamilton did when she won the Miss Tulare County title — making her the first deaf woman to win a pageant in California.

"I want to be a role model," Ms. Hamilton said. "After a while, people will see there is some depth in me besides my deafness."

At the Miss California pageant, which begins Saturday with the first of two preliminary rounds, the Visalia resident will demonstrate sign language to the song "Memories" as her talent selection. Although she can't hear the music, the vibrations and constant practice helped her perfect the timing.

Gulf stand-off

Iran, Iraq trade promises on tanker attacks

Iran announced Friday that it would not attack oil tankers in the Persian Gulf if Iraq stops its raids, and that it would welcome a U.N. effort to halt the attacks on commercial shipping.

In Baghdad, Iraq's air force commander warned against "any foolish adventure by the Iranian regime" and said his pilots could crush any aggression.

Iranian Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani declared in a Friday prayer sermon in Tehran that, "We will not fire a single bullet in the gulf if Iraq stopped attacking oil tankers in the area."

He said his government would welcome an appeal by U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar for a halt to attacks on commercial shipping.

Rafsanjani said such a U.N. move could be patterned after the U.N. leader's successful bid last weekend for a halt to attacks on Iranian and Iraqi civilian targets.

Rafsanjani said the same thing could happen in the gulf, where the threat to shipping during the past few months has caused concern in oil markets around the world.

Iran denies its planes have attacked ships, despite repeated accusations by Iraq and the Arab countries that support Iraq in its 3½-year-old war with non-Arab Iran.

The Iraqis, attempting to cut off Iranian oil revenues, have attacked tankers approaching Iran's main oil terminal at Kharg Island. The Iraqis have vowed never to allow their oil flow to be cut off.

In his speech Friday, Rafsanjani said Iran would resume its attacks on civilian targets in Iraq if Iraq ever attacks Iranian non-military areas.

His sermon was broadcast in Persian by the Iranian state radio, which carried a summary of it in Arabic in a later commentary. An account of the sermon was distributed by the official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Cyprus.

Iraq, meanwhile, warned that it will crush any new Iranian aggression.

The unidentified commander of the air force told a group of Iraqi journalists in Baghdad that the blockade on Kharg Island was "but the harbinger of a broader operation against Iran, should the Tehran regime persist in pursuing the war and threaten Iraqi and gulf interests."

He said Iraqi air force pilots were "perfectly capable of defending the security of the whole gulf

region against any foolish adventure by the Iranian regime" of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, and that "Iranian forces will suffer a massive defeat if they tried to mount a new adventurous aggression."

Largely because of Iran's control of the Shatt-al-Arab estuary, Iraq has been unable to ship its oil through gulf sea lanes. It has been using a pipeline from northern Iraqi oilfields to the Turkish Doryol terminal.

Syria, which supports Iran, has prevented the Iraqis from using their own oil pipeline, which runs across Syrian territory to Mediterranean terminals.

Iraq is asking Saudi Arabia for help to build a new pipeline that would take Iraqi crude to the Jordanian Red Sea port of Aqaba.

The Gulf Cooperation Council member countries — Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Qatar and Oman — have been considering the feasibility of building a pipeline that would pump their crude through Oman to the Arabian Sea and bypass the threatened Strait of Hormuz.

Iranian leaders have stressed that the moratorium on attacking civilians was by no means applicable to the battlefield, where Iran reportedly has massed an estimated 400,000 troops for a major offensive into the southern Iraqi Basra region.

The offensive had been expected June 5, the 21st anniversary of the peasant upheaval against the late Shah of Iran that triggered the revolution.

Arab diplomatic sources here said that one factor accounting for the delay of the Basra offensive was Iraq's recent acquisition of two new types of Soviet-made air-to-surface missiles — the AS-6 and the AS-4.

In Dubai, one of the United Arab Emirates, Western diplomatic sources with good Tehran connections cautioned against speculation that Iran would seek a general cease-fire.

The sources, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said the Basra offensive was still likely to take place, noting that banners at Rafsanjani's sermon urged foreign reporters not to believe Iran was interested in such a settlement.

Sources in Tehran reached by telephone from Dubai said the banners read "Listen to us, we don't want a cease-fire," and "We want war to victory."

News in brief

Bomb set off in S. Africa

SOWETO — A car bomb explosion tore through a used-car lot on a crowded Johannesburg street Friday, the eve of the anniversary of 1976 race riots in which hundreds of blacks died.

A man on the sidewalk was seriously wounded and four others suffered bruises in the blast that went off under a car.

Police Lt. Pierre Louw said about three hours after the blast that it was caused by explosives. No one claimed responsibility.

"It's the June 16th weekend, and that means terrorism," said Hilton Kaplan, 25, a merchant who was first on the scene.

Trucks hijacked in Beirut

BEIRUT — Christian and Moslem militiamen seized 19 semi-trailer trucks at the only crossing point between east and west Beirut Tuesday morning but then released them without a fight.

Officials were uncertain about which side began the "hijackings" of the trucks, which were taken over at opposite ends of the mid-city museum crossing between Moslem west Beirut and Christian east Beirut.

Police and French truce observers closed the crossing for more than an hour, fearing a new outbreak of fighting between the rival militias. There was no shooting during the tense standoff, but four civilians were wounded by scattered sniper fire across the Green Line that divides the two sectors of the battle-scarred city.

Representatives of the rival militia groups met and first agreed to release the truck drivers. Police Chief Othman Othman then intervened and the trucks were turned back to their owners in the afternoon.

Algeria reports clash

ALGIERS — Algeria said Friday that its troops intercepted a 60-man Moroccan contingent inside Algerian territory and killed two Moroccan soldiers, wounded two and captured 31 in the fight that ensued.

A Defense Ministry communique said the rest of the Moroccan detachment fled to their side of the border in the encounter Thursday.

The communique, read over state radio and television, said the incident occurred when an Algerian army unit spotted the Moroccans south of the town of Bechar. Bechar lies north of the Sahara Desert on Algeria's western coast.

Morocco was silent about the reported clash, and no further information was immediately available.

3 killed in tanker blast

MIFORD HAVEN — Three explosions ripped through a coastal tanker as it was being repaired in this western Wales port Friday, killing three crewmen and injuring 17 other people, police reported.

A police spokesman, who declined to be identified, said five of the injured were in serious condition with severe burns.

Ten of the wounded were firemen, including divisional commander Mike George, fire service officials reported.

The firemen were called in after the first blast in the engine room of the 2,886-ton British tanker Pointsman, where five crewmen were working on a defective pump.

Soon after the firemen arrived there was a second explosion, which burned several firemen and ripped the uniforms off their bodies.

Salvador hunting rebels

SAN SALVADOR — About 3,000 government troops spearheaded by a special U.S.-trained battalion have launched a major offensive into Morazan province, where leftist guerrillas have been entrenched for years, a high-ranking military officer said Friday.

The officer, who asked not to be identified for security reasons, said the anti-rebel sweep began late Thursday when government troops crossed the Torola River, 120 miles northeast of the capital, meeting little resistance.

Vermont nuclear plant goes on four-hour alert

VERNON, Vt. (AP) — A tiny radioactive probe used to monitor the reactor core at the Vermont Yankee nuclear reactor plant popped out of its protective room Friday, prompting officials to declare a four-hour alert.

Nine workers were near the probe when it was reeled out of the shielded room into the plant building, but "there was no overexposure," said plant spokesman Stephen Bravar. "No individual received overexposure."

No radioactive material was released into the air and there was no danger to the public in the alert, declared at 9:20 a.m. and ended at

1:20 p.m., said Vermont Yankee spokeswoman Mary Schneider.

It was the first alert ever issued at the 12-year-old reactor, according to officials. An alert is the second of four levels of federal emergency designations at nuclear power plants.

"It's a danger to anybody who is right there, but it's not a danger to people away from the immediate area," said Vermont Public Service Commissioner Richard Saudek.

The plant continued to operate at 92 percent of full power, said Brian Norris, a federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission

spokesman at the agency's regional headquarters in King of Prussia, Pa. He said plant operators planned to shut the reactor down later in the day, as previously scheduled, for eight weeks of regular maintenance.

Saudek said the probe, the size of a pencil eraser, was being pulled up from inside the reactor on a cable into an isolated area when

the cable failed to stop. "When they reeled it back, the probe kept coming and didn't stop in its isolation area," said Saudek.

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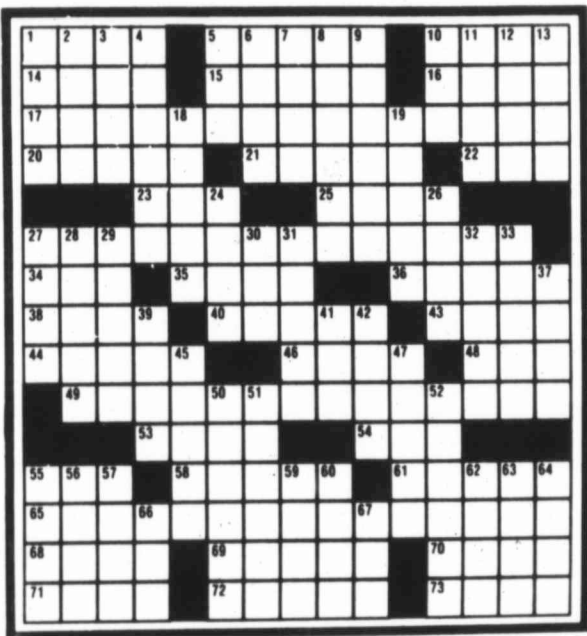

Zoeller shoots record round

Irwin edges to one stroke lead in U.S. Open

MAMARONECK, N.Y. (AP) — Hale Irwin carded "amazing birdies" on the last three holes for another 68 and a one-stroke lead Friday in the second round of the 84th United States Open Golf Championship.

"Patience was very much a virtue today," said Irwin, who three-putted for bogey on his first two holes, said he was "sweating bullets," and then bided his time until the putts began to fall on those last three, difficult holes at the Winged Foot Golf Club.

"After a start like that, there is a tendency to get too aggressive. But the key to Winged Foot is patience. You want to be somewhat aggressive, but at the same time be realistic, keep in mind that at the end of the round a total score of par will be a very good score."

At the end of his round, it was even better than that — two under par for the day and, at 136, four under for the championship he has won twice. The first one came 10 years ago on this same tough layout in the northern New York suburbs.

But, at the halfway point of the American national championship, his lead was far from secure.

The chief challengers were two of the game's longest hitters, former Masters champion Fuzzy Zoeller and Greg Nor-

man, the Australian import known as "the Great White Shark."

The happy-go-lucky Zoeller did not make a bogey in his late-afternoon round of 66, by two strokes the best of the tournament. It was the lowest round ever shot in this tournament on this course.

An approach to within two feet of the flag on the 16th, his fourth and last birdie of the mild, sunny day, lifted him into second alone at 137, three under par.

Norman, too, got around the difficult course without a bogey. He had a 68 that included a brilliant save from the trees on the 18th — "the best shot I've hit in a long time," he said — and a 30-foot birdie putt on the 17th.

His playing partners, Jack Nicklaus and Ray Floyd, also birdied the 17th and the three veterans delighted their huge gallery by performing a leaping, "high-five" mutually-congratulatory hand-slap as they walked off the green.

Norman was tied at 138 with longshot David Canipe, a refugee from the Florida mini-tours who attempted — and failed — three times to play the PGA Tour. He had a second consecutive 69.

"My goal was to make the cut," Canipe said. "I've made it. Now my goal is to make as much money as I can. The

thought of winning hasn't crossed my mind."

Jim Thorpe and Curtis Strange were at 139. Thorpe held a 30-yard bunker shot for an eagle-3 on his way to a 71. Strange holed out two shots from the fairway — a 97-yard wedge for birdie and a 159-yard 5-iron shot for eagle-2 — in his round of 70.

Fred Couples, winner of the important Tournament Players Championship earlier this season, was next at 71-140.

Nicklaus, the 44-year-old Golden Bear, had to rally from a bogey-bogey start to salvage another 71. He finished 36 holes at 142, two over par and six off the pace in his quest for a record fifth Open crown.

Seve Ballesteros, twice a Masters champion, and Johnny Miller, former holder of both the U.S. and British Open titles, were in the group at 142. Ballesteros, of Spain, had a second-round 73 and Miller shot 68 despite a bogey-bogey finish.

PGA title-holder Hal Sutton and five-time British Open champion Tom Watson each had another 72 and were four over par. Sutton was making a run at the leaders until he bogeyed the last three. Watson included an eagle-3 in his effort.

Lee Trevino was 72-143. Mike Donald and former Open champion Hubert Green, who

were involved in a four-way tie for the first-round lead, drifted back in the pack. Green lost three shots to par over the last three holes and was 75-143. Donald went 10 shots higher than his opening round in 78-146.

Defending title-holder Larry Nelson and Masters champ Ben Crenshaw could not recover from poor first-round scores and were victims of the cut. Crenshaw was 71-151 and Nelson 76-158.

Craig Stadler, after a 42 on the front side, whiffed his tee shot on the 16th, kicked the ball down the fairway and walked in.

Irwin, 38, winner of 16 titles — including two U.S. Opens — in a 17-year tour career, put on a remarkable exhibition of shot-making over the course he said "will always have a special place in my heart."

He missed only one green and two fairways.

But he found himself two over par after two holes.

He had to make a 5-footer for his third putt on the opening hole "and I was sweating bullets. It looked like I could be there all day," he said. "I kept remembering Jack Nicklaus four-putting that hole in '74."

Irwin also three-putted the second, then missed the green on the third but managed to save par.

Olympic track trials will kick off today

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Carl Lewis begins a quest that he hopes will carry him to four Olympic gold medals and Edwin Moses shoots for his 100th consecutive victory Saturday in the opening session of the U.S. Olympic track and field trials.

The meet will determine the American team that will participate in the Games for the first time since 1976 — a team with the possibility of reaping the biggest gold medal harvest in U.S. history.

The most golds ever won by a U.S. track and field team in Olympic history were 17, in the 1932 Games at Los Angeles — also the site of this year's Trials and this year's Games.

With the Soviet-led boycott stripping the 1984 Games of such world track and field powers as the Soviet Union, East Germany, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Cuba, the United States realistically has a chance of capturing 18 gold medals in the Games, beginning July 28.

The leader of the American contingent is the ebullient Lewis, considered the finest American track and field athlete since the late Jesse Owens competed during the 1930s.

Lewis, a 22-year-old from Willingboro, N.J., is trying to match the accomplishment of Owens, winner of gold medals in the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash, 400-meter relay and long jump in the 1936

Lewis has been ranked No. 1 in the world in the 100 for three consecutive years, he led a 1-2-3 U.S.

sweep in last year's World Championships and he owns the second-fastest clocking ever at sea level, 9.97 seconds.

NCAA upholds charges against Tarkanian

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The NCAA upheld charges against the University of Nevada-Las Vegas and basketball Coach Jerry Tarkanian despite having only the recollections of its investigators as evidence, a former university attorney testified Friday.

K. Michael Leavitt, who was hired by UNLV to answer allegations in 1976, said the NCAA Infractions Committee ruled against the school despite the fact the institu-

tion had a preponderance of evidence refuting the charges.

"We asked why the (NCAA) staff was able to present this recollectible information as opposed to documents," Leavitt said. "They said those were the policies they had and that's the way they did things."

Leavitt's testimony came at the end of the first week of Tarkanian's district court civil suit — a suit that could have an impact on the

NCAA's enforcement procedures. Tarkanian is claiming the NCAA violated due process in demanding he be suspended for two years in 1977 after his UNLV basketball program was slapped with a two-year probation for 38 alleged recruiting violations.

Tarkanian obtained a court injunction prohibiting the suspension and the case has been snaggled in the courts for seven years while he compiled one of the best records in college basketball.

Leavitt, responding to questioning by attorneys for Tarkanian, cited two allegations the NCAA upheld against the university in backing up his contention.

One of those, Leavitt said, was an allegation that Tarkanian arranged for former player Robert "Jeep" Kelly to fly free on a charter plane back to his hometown of Pittsburgh and that Tarkanian also reimbursed Kelly for a return flight to Las Vegas.

'Hitman' wins in two

Hearns makes quick work of Duran

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Thomas "Hit Man" Hearns knocked down Roberto Duran three times and stopped him in the second round Friday night to retain the World Boxing Council super welterweight championship.

Hearns, who had won his last three fights by decision, said he wanted to be known as the "Hit Man" for this fight, and the hit man he was. His power was awesome.

Duran, who will be 33 Saturday, had been knocked down only twice and never knocked out in 81 previous fights. But on this hot desert evening he was battered unmercifully.

The crushing defeat most likely ended Duran's illustrious and often controversial career. It certainly ends Duran's career as a major boxing figure.

The 6-foot-1 Hearns, who had an 11-inch reach advantage over the 5-7½, came out jabbing. But with about 40 seconds left in the first round, Hearns dropped Duran with a savage left hook to the jaw. Duran struggled up at four and took an eight-count from referee Carlos Padilla.

Hearns jumped to the attack and a barrage of head punches put Duran down with seven seconds

left. He got up immediately and lasted the round with blood dripping from a cut along the right eye.

Hearns was not about to let Duran off the hook, and he didn't. Early in the second round Hearns hurt Duran with a flurry of

punches in Duran's corner. Duran escaped, but then was trapped along the ropes where he received another battering until a tremendous right dropped him face down.

Padilla ruled the fight was over at 1:07 of the round as manager

Luis Spada jumped into the ring and went to the aid of his stricken fighter.

Duran has held three world titles in his career, the last one was the World Boxing Association's junior middleweight.

Mahler hits and pitches Braves to win over Reds

ATLANTA (AP) — Rick Mahler hurled a three-hitter and had three hits of his own, including a two-run double, as the Atlanta Braves continued their domination of Cincinnati with a 6-1 victory over the Reds Friday night.

It was the Braves' eighth consecutive triumph over the Reds and lifted their advantage to 10-1 in the season series between the two teams.

It was also the fifth victory in a row for Mahler, 5-1, who walked one and struck out four. He also raised his batting average to .450 — 9 for 20 — on the season.

Mahler slapped his two-run double over right fielder Dave Parker's head in the fourth following a double by Glenn Hubbard and a walk to Bruce Benedict to make the score 4-0. He also doubled to right in the seventh and scored on Randy Johnson's third single of the game.

After Eddie Milner opened the game with a single for the Reds, Mahler retired 13 batters in a row.

Mahler lost his bid for a shutout in the seventh when Parker drilled a 1-0 pitch over the center field fence, his fourth homer of the year.

The year I buy the Texas Rangers, I'm going to hire Cliff Gustafson as manager.

However, by the time I can afford it, there's no telling how many skippers the annual American League losers will have gone through.

Gus can name his price because he doesn't have to persuade me that he can turn bologna into sirloin. As coach of the Texas Longhorns, Gustafson has worked wonders once again.

Gustafson nursed a team into the College World Series championship game with 16 freshmen and 15 sophomores on a 42-man roster.

Texas had only five seniors and one starter returning from its

championship club a year ago. Yet, the Longhorns lasted until the title game, losing 3-1 to Cal State-Fullerton, a veteran outfit that had 13 players drafted by big-league teams.

How does Gustafson do it? Can someone please bottle his secret and serve daily to occupants of the manager's office in the Rangers' Arlington Stadium?

Second baseman Bill Bates was the only starter from last year's talented Texas team. But the 'Horns hustled and played "Gusball" and there they were again back in Omaha, playing the Arizona States of the NCAA elite.

What's your secret, Gus?

"Players on our team feel they are supposed to win," Gustafson says. "We have a ton of tradition."

Fine, Gus, but you pulled all the

right strings, didn't you?

"Not really. I didn't have to prod this team on this year like I did last year. That's all," Gustafson says.

The modest Gustafson did make some subtle changes.

He let the Longhorns become more of a free swinging team. He also worked and worked and worked with young pitchers like Greg Swindell to replace last year's staff, which sent four pitchers to the pros in 1983.

In the end, the Longhorns were not as fundamentally sound as they were last year, but few young teams are. Which made Gustafson's job even more amazing.

"Oh, tradition helps a lot," Gustafson repeats.

Perhaps, but tradition never hit a bases-loaded homer or fielded a hot grounder in the hole at shortstop.

Employers receive tax break for hiring veterans

A program administered locally that offers businesses tax breaks for hiring and training war veterans is completing its first year here, according to Joe Wallis, office manager of Texas Employment Commission, 310 Owens St.

Four people have been placed locally, two as mechanics and two in production jobs, he said. The incentive program is administered by Kenneth Green, disabled veterans outreach program representative, and Pat Carnahan, veteran's employment representative.

Gov. Mark White took the occasion of "Hire a Veteran" month to laud the federal program which provides eligible employers with reimbursement of 50 percent of the

wages paid to eligible Korean and Vietnam war veterans if employers provide on-the-job training. Reimbursement is limited to \$10,000.

Participation in the program requires certification by the Veterans Administration or the Department of Labor. Wallis said local applications are approved through the VA office in Waco.

Employers must certify their intentions to employ the veteran on a permanent basis after training is completed and must guarantee that the wages paid will be comparable to those normally paid to trainees. To be eligible, the veterans must have been unemployed 15 of the 20 weeks prior to application.

According to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace, 60 refineries in Texas processed 129,532,853 barrels of crude oil and hydrocarbon blends during February.

The February volume compares to 129,908,327 barrels in January and 110,563,647 barrels in February 1983.

Texas refineries ran 100,507,368 barrels of crude oil in February compared to 99,827,286 barrels in January and 86,195,119 barrels in February 1983.

Products manufactured in February totaled 129,103,117 barrels, down 129,282,926 barrels in January and up from 110,694,092 barrels in February 1983.

February manufacture of motor gasoline totaled 53,530,685 barrels, compared to 54,650,733 barrels in January and 48,358,290 in February 1983.

Texas refineries manufactured 12,116,590 barrels of home heating oil in February—and increase of 915,128 barrels from the January volume. February 1983 output was 9,146,573 barrels.

A total of 1,582 permits to drill wells for oil and gas were issued in the United States for the week en-

ding June 1, according to Petroleum Information Corporation.

The total was lower than the 2,216 permits issued the previous week. The decrease is partly a result of the four-day work week in observance of Memorial Day. It was higher than the same week one year ago, also a four-day work week, when 1,394 permits to drill were issued.

Permits to drill, obtained by PI from government agencies, are a measure of the drilling intentions of the nation's oil operators.

New field wildcat permits totaled 169 for the week, compared to 144 permits one year ago.

Increases in the number of permits issued from the previous year were reported for these regions: Rocky Mountain; Appalachian Basin; Mid-Continent; and Gulf of Mexico.

The weekly total brings to 41,920 the cumulative total of permits issued in the U.S. during 1984. That is an increase of 7.0 percent from the previous year.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff issued an order June 6, effective immediately, suspending the byproduct material license of Superior Production Logging, Inc., of Snyder, and directing the company to show cause why their license should not be revoked.

According to the suspension order, "...the licensee has not demonstrated that they have been complying with, nor are they currently capable of complying with, NRC requirements, including those associated with basic radiation safety. Accordingly, public health and safety require issuance of an Order to Show Cause why the license should not be revoked."

During a routine NRC safety inspection at the licensee's field office in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma April 9, and their corporate office in Snyder April 30, the NRC inspector found that one person had received an apparent radiation exposure in excess of NRC requirements in two quarters of 1981. The inspector also found the licensee failed to conduct adequate evaluations of radiation exposures of an employee; failed to use their licensed material in accordance with statements, representations, and procedures contained in their October, 1980 application; failed to post documents as required by NRC regulations; failed to conspicuously identify a radioactive material storage area as required; and transported radioactive material on public highways in an unauthorized container.

The licensee's activities in Oklahoma and Wyoming are licensed by the NRC while their Texas activities are licensed by the State of Texas. The NRC action affects only their NRC licensed activities.
