Ex-Con, Juvenile Quizzed In C-City Burglary Jobs

Man Arrested at Scene of Crime

Two Big Spring police characters, an ex-convict and a teenager, were in custody Thursday as officers pushed an investigation of Colorado City and Westbrook burglaries.

Police arrested the 38-year-old armed ex-convict at 2:20 a. m. Wednesday as he attempted to drive away from Lazy Day Drive-In, apparently as burglary was in progress inside the restaurant.

Later Wednesday Big Spring police, cooperating with the burglary investigation, apprehended a 17-year-old youth whose police record includes time at State School for Boys.

Police Chief Leon Yeager and Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory went to Big Spring Thursday morning to question the youth and other suspects.

They were to check the boy and others in regard to the Wednesday burglary of the Lazy Day, an attempt Saturday night to break into Morgan's Drive-In Grocery, the recent burglary of the downtown Sports Shop and break-ins at Westbrook.

The ex-convict, who served less than 3 years of a 10-year burglary sentence in Arizona 7 years ago, was arrested at the Hickory St. drive-in restaurant by Policemen Dave Shackelford and Truman Henderson.

On a routine patrol, the policemen noticed a car parked at the east end of the Lazy Day. When they turned around the building to investigate, the driver was attempting to drive away with lights turned off.

Shackelford and Henderson took the ex-convict and his 1953 Chrysler to the police station for a thorough check.

Inside the car was a .218 high-powered rifle, fully loaded with ammunition clip and a bullet in the firing chamber, a bottle of whiskey and "yellow jackets," a form of barbiturates.

Returning to the drive-in for additional investigation, the policemen discovered the building's dining room door had been pried open and a cigarette machine looted.

Between \$7 and \$8 in currency was reported missing from the machine.

When the 16-year-old youth was arrested Wednesday in Big Spring, he had about that amount of money in quarters and dimes in a sock, according to Chief Yeager.

Big Spring police also had determined that the youth was with the ex-convict at least sometime the previous night.

A crowbar and a long screwdriver were found inside of

Danube Spots Westbrook Drilling Site

Blue Danube Company No. 2 Morrison has been staked as a new drilling site in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field.

The project will drill to 3,250 feet—5 miles northwest of Westbrook at a site 1,650 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of Section 36, Block 29, T-1-N.

R. S. Anderson & Manor Oil Company No. 2-A Elliot has been completed as a dual producer in Mitchell County's Turner Gregory Field.

The oiler was finaled with perforations between 2,430 and 2,833 feet in the Clear Fork and with perforations between 1,929 and 1,947 feet in the San Andres.

Total production was 107 barrels of 27 gravity oil daily—61 barrels from Clear Fork and 46 from San Andres.

The operator traced the Clear Fork with 43,850 gallons of fluid and the San Andres with 16,550 gallons. Total depth was 2,862 feet.

Site of the well is 330 feet from north and 2,310 feet from west lines of Section 25, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

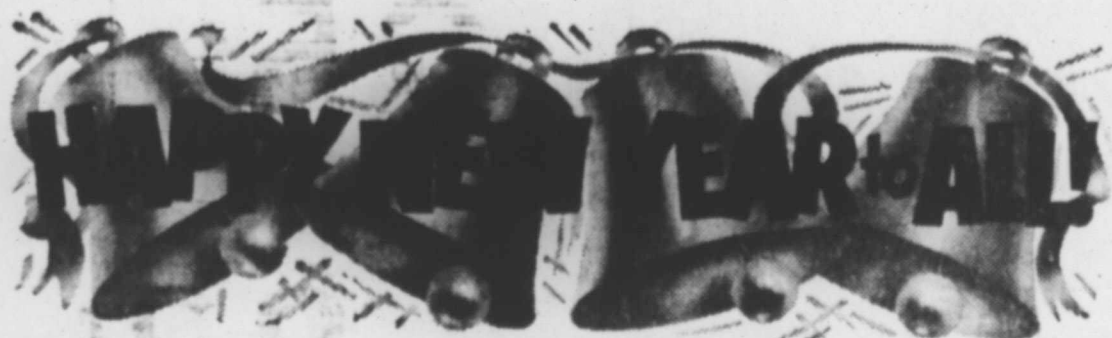

have concluded 28 years of continuous service. "My term of office is for 5 years," the silver-haired judge told the Record Thursday.

"And if my health would be as fine through a new term as now, then all would be fine. But, still you have to retire sometime and I am already beyond the retirement age."

Mauzey made it plain that he considers the judge's office a post of honor and service demanding the best of a public servant. And he indicated the decision to retire is a difficult choice for one like him.

"But I have the welfare of the public, the district and the country to consider," he continued. "And the people are entitled to an able bodied public servant at all times."

So the judge won't wait for even a chance that health might handicap his steady service. The decision not to seek reelection, however, won't mean actual retirement from court room duties even after his final term expires. Mauzey will be at the call of courts across the state, sitting as judge in special instances helping to ease crowded dockets serving in places of others.

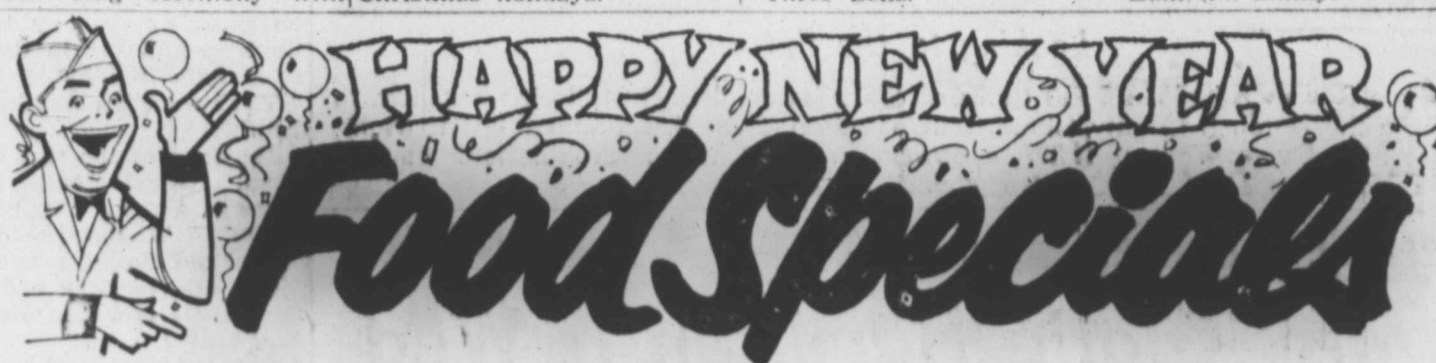

There were a lot of guns in Santa's pack this Christmas.

Manufacturers are producing many new models. And there's a big crop of youngsters coming along, who have been anxious for guns.

In the average boy's life the desire to own a good gun is most natural. It began way back there in the stone age, when Jr. got a small-size stone axe. This continued through the bow and arrow era, to the blunderbuss, and now to the highly efficient, modern firearms.

With every gun found under the Christmas tree there should be a word of warning. This warning may be trite, but it is worth repeating. When you get that new gun, treat it with care. Be sure it is never loaded, except when you actually are going to use it. Keep it out of the reach of children, and never play with it.

It is fitting that we should get guns at Christmas time, because this is the time of the year to hunt. The duck and goose season is well under way; the quail season is only half over; and a few days still remain in the deer season.

So why not plan a couple of days of good hunting.

There are many spots in Texas where the ducks and geese now abound. Perhaps the river that flows near your town offers some good flight shooting.

Or there may be a farmer friend with a good stock tank that attracts ducks. It's possible that ducks may be eating the grain in his field. Talk to him about it.

Or, if you want to take a real hunt, try one of those places on the coast where you can get either ducks or geese, or both. There are numerous rice-field spots where hunting privileges can be had for \$10 a day, or less.

If you don't know of a place to go, write to the Chamber of Commerce at some of the coastal towns. They have lists of hunting leases. In several towns there are hotels that provide package vacation trips. You get your room, meals and hunt — all for a reasonable fee.

Most of these places permit only morning shooting, but in a good spot you can get all the shooting you need during the morning. Actually, the present day limit is just about all any man can use.

Quail are everywhere this season. If you haven't already

made your contact with a farmer, take the family on a little Sunday afternoon drive. When you get out into the country, stop at a few likely looking places and ask for permission to hunt. Chances are you can line up a good place, where there are plenty of birds, and the fee is reasonable.

There still are a few good deer leases left in the Hill Country. Right now they are day leases, because the season is just about over. Some of them permit the killing of doe as well as buck.

This means that you can get some good venison for your locker.

Don't forget the Fisherman. Up to now we've been talking about what to do if you got a gun for Christmas. What if you got fishing tackle?

Lucky man! In Texas you can use fishing tackle throughout the year. Around New Year time there is excellent fishing in Texas both in inland waters and along the coast.

If you found real light tackle in your Christmas stocking this year, you might want to try the upper reaches of one of the large lakes for white bass. Some runs are on now. Many fine catches have been reported.

If your tackle is a little heavier, you may want to try for some of the big red fish, drum or trout along the Texas coast.

I really can't say enough for this Texas coastal fishing. To me it is more than just going fishing. It's a wonderful outing, for you and all the family.

More and more families are fishing or boating on the Gulf. In fact, there are many instances where mama has caught more fish than papa.

Excellent motel facilities spot the Gulf Coast of Texas. The wife and kids can enjoy nice hotel accommodations, and at very reasonable prices. Or they can fish with you.

How about a good fishing trip, or a hunting trip, during the holiday season? It will give you an opportunity to try out some of that new equipment. And you'll be glad you went. The family will enjoy it too!

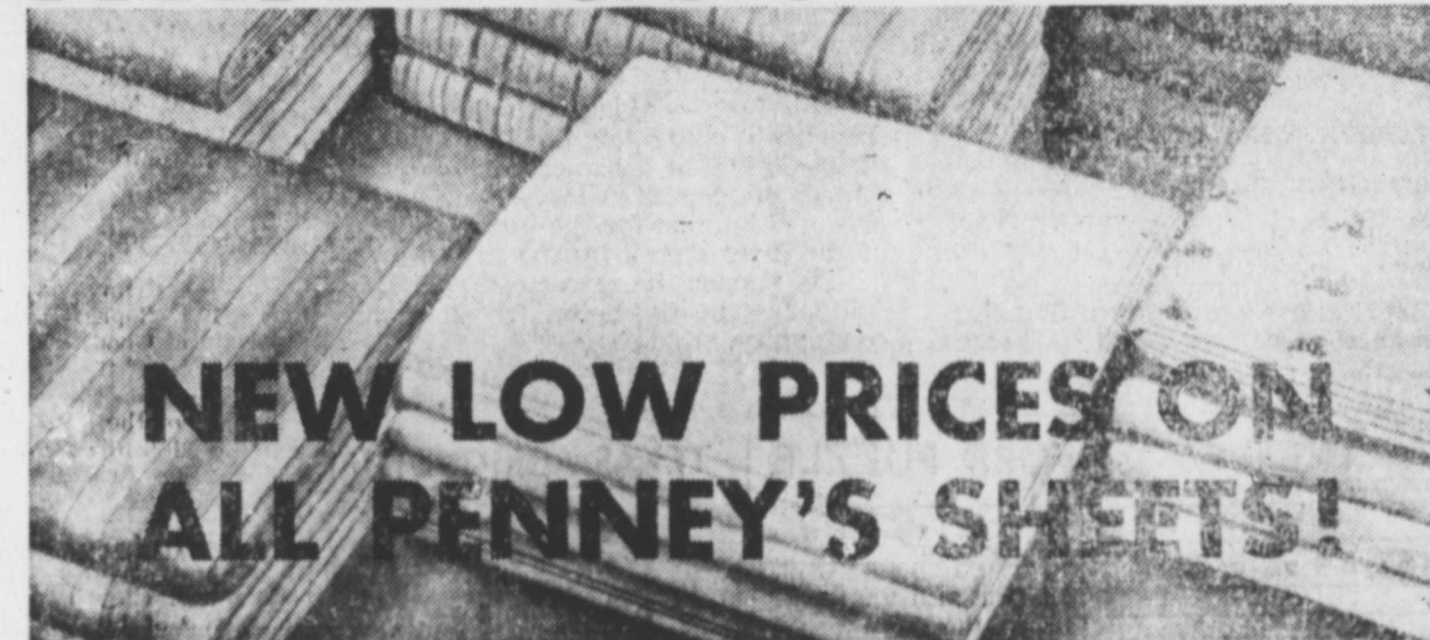

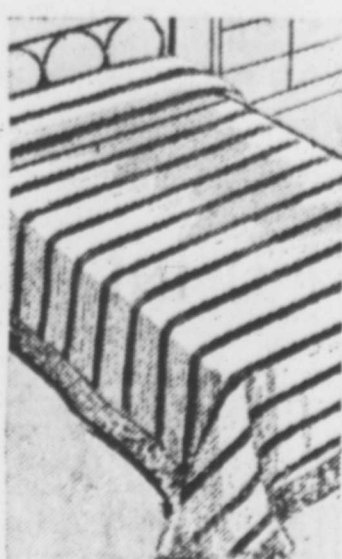

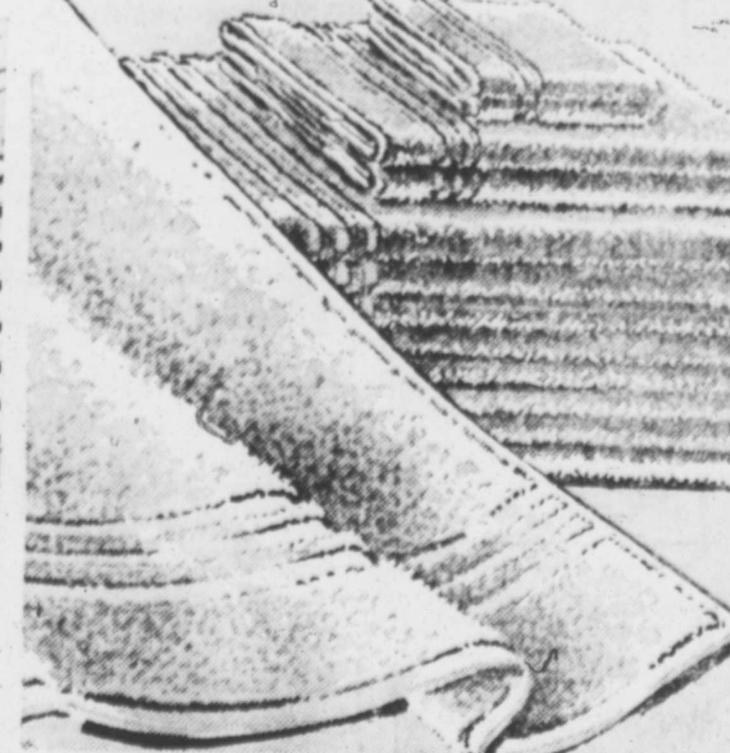

Editorially Speaking

Resolution For Responsible Citizenship

Resolutions have a habit of cropping up each New Year whether we like 'em or not.

Some come with earnest enthusiasm, some with laughs, some with mischief and some with cynicism. And, if we are truthful about it all, few are ever kept to the letter.

Although our percentage is high for breaking these Jan. 1 resolutions, the loudest critics have to admit that even the briefest pause to look toward improvement is better than nothing.

Maybe that's why the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas has prepared an impressive list of 10 New Year's resolutions for individual citizens. For the person who does no more than read the 10 will benefit in better understanding of our democracy and his responsibility to its improvement.

All of the 10 resolutions suggested by the bar committee are something of a "bill of responsibilities" sequel to the "Bill of Rights." They provide a

thoughtful approach to concerned citizenship.

One of these resolutions is especially appropriate this incoming year of 1960, a busy political year with elections on every level of government from precinct to White House. And as the candidates begin to form their platforms and campaigns, as we begin to look ahead to voting day, we could do no better than to take seriously these words of the resolution:

"It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by appointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. It shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding public office, to serve in such manner as will subordinate private or minority interests to those of the people at large."

Fire Is Loss For Whole Community

Colorado City's Volunteer Fire Department deserves credit for the manner in which it confined and brought under control the damaging downtown fire here Dec. 23. This fire fighting was accomplished despite the fact the blaze was difficult to approach and extinguish.

The blaze struck a crippling blow to the community's retail resources at the peak of late Christmas shopping and caused costly damage, in particular, to the three stores actually struck by the fire.

No matter how soon, how completely the three firms — Piggy-Wiggly, Anthony's and White's Auto Store — are able to return to their retail operations, the entire community will feel the impact of the shut-down.

This fire loss and the resulting closing of three important retail businesses

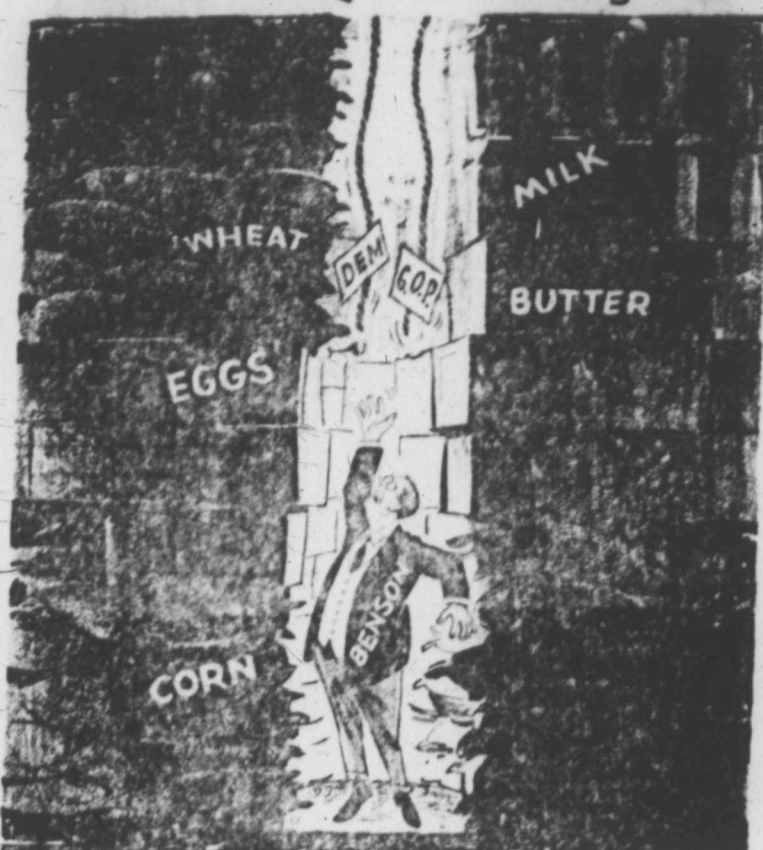
— temporary as the interruption may be — emphasizes, all the more, that an economically healthy community is close knit regardless of outward signs of sales competition. Each business within the community gains from the prestige, the attractiveness and the appeal of its neighboring firms.

That's because the citizen of today desires variety in shopping. He wants variety in kinds, types, quality, quantity and price of merchandise. And, most likely, he will go where he can best find it.

This fact — along with the sincere friendship characteristic between individuals within a companionable community of our size — increases the concern and interest for the future welfare of the firms struck by the fire loss.

The sooner the stores can return to full operation, the better for all of our community.

Eventful Headlines Sharpened Interest in Texas Government

As the year draws to a close, it's hard to look backward for looking forward to what so many are sure will be the "silver-lined sixties."

But 1959 was an eventful year. Some of the biggest Texas headlines centered on these happenings:

SPEAKER'S RACE — Suspense became almost unbearable in a hard-fought, down-to-the-wire speaker's race. Waggoner Carr won a second term, 79-71, over challenger Joe Burkett. Now the race is on again with Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Gober contending for the job in '61.

TAX BILL — It took a marathon meeting of the Legislature — from January until August — before agreement could be reached on a \$185,000,000 new tax bill. Lawmakers faced, not only the need to cover a \$2,418,000,000 budget for the 1959-61 biennium, but a dismaying \$65,000,000 deficit.

Biggest bones of contention were two of Gov. Price Daniel's key proposals: the abandoned property tax, which did not pass; and the severance beneficiary tax on natural gas, which did. Three-fourths of the new revenue comes from selective sales taxes. A number of old sales levies, on autos, cigarettes and liquor, were upped. New ones, including furs, jewelry, air conditioners, phonographs, hotel and motel rentals, were added.

SIGNALS CHANGED — Though it was primarily a "tax session," Legislature passed a number of other laws with wide public effect. Political primaries and conventions will be held in May and June, instead of July and August. Boat owners must register their craft, observed certain safety regulations. City firemen and policemen won shorter hours, and city administrative officials grudgingly juggled their budgets to meet the extra cost. Truckers finally passed a bill they'd been pushing for some years to raise the truck load limit from 58,400 to 72,000 pounds.

TEACHERS PAY — Question of whether a fourth special session should be called to raise money to increase teachers' salaries was posed but not answered in '59. Governor Daniel said he would leave it to the people to decide. Thus far the decision is not known, except that the governor said if he calls a session, it will not begin until after the Feb. 1 filing deadline for public office.

TIDELANDS — Texas officials went before the U. S. Supreme Court again to fight for state ownership of the tidelands. Texas claims it owns the submerged lands for 10 1/2 miles out. U. S. Attorney General says state ownership extends only three miles. High court's decision is awaited.

NEW BUILDING — A big part of Texas government picked up and moved this past fall from rented quarters scattered over Austin into three new state buildings. Texas Employment Commission Building, State

Office Building and State Courts Building were completed within a few months of each other. Earlier the Health Department expanded into a new building. A State Archives Building is in construction, and an Insurance Building is on the drawing board.

AUTO RATES — State Board of Insurance announced new auto insurance rates designed to put the burden of expense on the drivers who have the accidents. Plan has stirred up a beehive of controversy. But it is to go into effect, as scheduled, Jan. 1.

LEJ FOR PRESIDENT — State politics was almost swept aside after Speaker Sam Rayburn announced a Lyndon Johnson for President campaign. Texas party leaders took up the banner, and Johnson clubs spread across the state, covering, at last count, 191 counties. Senator Johnson says he is not a candidate for president. But he has criss-crossed the state in an energetic "re-election" campaign.

CAMPAIGNS — Political campaigning was rampant as the year

ended, but very few candidates have paid their filing fees for statewide offices. Some put off filing until January to avoid competing with Christmas for public attention. Others are awaiting for Governor Daniel to say whether he will seek a third term before they decide whether to stay put or try to move up.

OIL TRICKING — Texas oil wells will flow only 10 days in January. This production pattern, the same as during December, was ordered by the Railroad Commission after major purchasers' requests ranged from 9 to 11 days.

SEYDELIAN — Cities of only four other states are more self-reliant than Texas cities, according to a study by the Texas Municipal League.

State assistance to Texas cities amounts to 3.1 per cent of the expenditures of municipal government. States in which the percentage is lower are Missouri, 3 per cent; Kentucky, 1.3 per cent; Montana, 0.9 per cent; and West Virginia, 0.4 per cent. National average is 16 per cent.

WASHINGTON REPORT

Year's Inventory Good for Nation

It is the custom in Washington, between Christmas and New Years, to take inventory of where the Nation stands and to make plans for the year ahead.

To get an appraisal of 1959 and a preview of what Washington expects in the year ahead, we've talked with government officials, as well as with congressmen who are here for the session which begins next week.

Almost without exception they rate 1959 as a "good year." It has been, they agree, a year of marked economic recovery, marred only by the steel strike and sharply lower farm income.

This has been a year of unprecedented prosperity. National income has set a new all-time record, more than \$20 billion above last year. Unemployment has dropped and employment has increased by about two million.

Peace is more secure than it was a year ago. There has been at least a crack in the cold war ice. World War III seems more remote and less likely than it did a year ago. There is unanimous agreement in Washington that the year ahead offers good prospects of continued national prosperity, as well as a further thaw in the cold war.

With the exception of farmers, 1960 is expected to be a better year for almost everyone than 1959. People will have more money to spend and factories will turn out more things they can buy.

Washington expects President Eisenhower's forthcoming visit to Russia, and the

Summit Conference which is expected to follow, to lay the groundwork for peace between the great powers of the East and West.

There is hope, too, that at least a start can be made toward disarmament in 1960. Negotiations for arms reduction would be expected to follow a successful Summit Conference.

The general feeling of optimism in Washington is mixed, however, with the realization that 1960 will not be without serious problems. Some of the problems which those we talked with see ahead include:

How to keep national prosperity rolling without it turning into inflation. Prices that go up faster than incomes could leave all of us with less purchasing power.

Most officials rank farm prices and income as the No. 1 problem to be put before Congress. Farm prices now average 8% below a year ago and net farm income this year is 15% below 1958.

There is worry, too, over the possibility of crippling labor strikes. The steel strike made Washington jittery over the possible strike of railroad workers in February.

Along with its other problems, Washington will devote considerable attention to the general election next November. This is something that worries Washington more than it does the rest of the country.

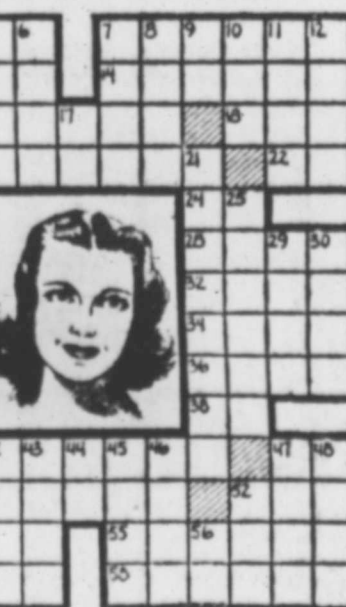
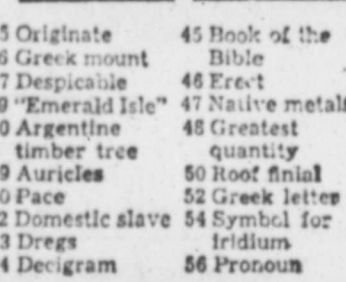
On balance, taking into consideration the good and the bad, 1960 looks like a year in which the good news should greatly outweigh the bad.

TEXAS AGRICULTURE

Farm Production Up, Income Down

So now we come to the end of one of the best production years Texas agriculture ever had — but net farm income is dropping down a full 15 per cent below 1958.

The 1959 Texas cotton crop is estimated at around 4,500,000 bales, compared with 4,308,000 bales in 1958. Sorghum grain production is figured at about 277,000,000 bushels for 1959, a little up from the 273,066,000 bushels harvested in 1958.

Rice production for the year is running at 13,136,000 hundredweight, against 11,938,000 cwt. in 1958. The corn crop is due to exceed 41,366,000 bushels, also up from 1958. The Rio Grande Valley is well under way with at least a nine million box citrus season, up two million from 1958 and the first real bumper season since the disastrous freeze in 1951.

Ranges and livestock in general are in their best condition in the past 10 years. There were an estimated 8,510,000 cattle on Texas ranges at the beginning of the year, along with 5,355,000 sheep, and there are more now.

But cotton is the cheapest

for any December in a decade. Corn is bringing \$1.12 a bushel, compared with \$1.21 a year ago.

Overproduction and cheapness of corn is going to have its effect on the vital Texas sorghum grain market — if not this year, certainly next year.

Livestock markets, seldom robust and always highly sensitive, are showing signs of weakening in the face of heavy production.

There is a drastic squeeze in the parity ratio — in relation to the prices they pay, the prices received by farmers in 1959 are the lowest in 19 years. The farmer's share of each dollar spent by the consumer has dropped to 38 cents, lowest since 1942. The most authoritative sources agree that farm income is due to fall somewhat lower next year — in other words, things are liable to get worse before they get any better.

About the only flat statement concerning the U. S. farm problem on which you can get anywhere near unanimous agreement is this: Something is wrong. Try to go any further than that and you are likely to learn at first hand just how controversial this farm problem can become.
