Penalty Plagued Rebs Lose, 33-20

Several scoring threats were erased by penalties Friday night as the Rivercrest Rebels dropped a 33-20 decision to the Winnsboro Red Raiders in a District 15-AA contest at Winnsboro.

The flag was thrown against the Rebels 14 times and 141 yards in penalties were stepped off. The markers ended two threats by the Rebels in the first half when the two clubs were jockeying for the lead.

Winnsboro also had its troubles, as the Raiders were penalized eight times for 101 yards.

Early in the game the Rebels marched to the Winnsboro 14-yard line only to have red flags end the threat.

Winnsboro then took the lead on a 73-yard pass play from Post to Tips. The extra point was kicked, making it 7-0.

Early in the second quarter the Rebels again got together a good drive, going to the Winnsboro 8-yard line. But again the penalties came and the Rebels were thrown back into their own end of the field by markoffs.

Winnsboro pushed across three touchdowns in the second period. Levine Norman put the Rebels on the board when he went in from five yards out just before halftime to make it 26-7.

There was no scoring in the third period but Rivercrest struck quickly in the fourth quarter, when Norman hit Cory Minter for the touchdown.

Lynch then got off a 25-yard scoring run for the Raiders to finish the Winnsboro scoring.

The Norman to Minter combination got the Rebels their final score from 20 yards out late in the game, and Norman ran the extra points to end it at 33-20.

The loss dropped Rivercrest to 1-2 in the league standings. Winnsboro has an identical record.

The Rebels will host league-leading Clarksville Friday night for their next engagement.

Texans Vote On Six Amendments

Texas voters go to the polls on Saturday, Nov. 11 and vote on six amendments to the Constitution of Texas which the last Legislature approved.

Propositions which voters may accept or reject follow:

Amendment No. 1

Allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

Amendment No. 2

Permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services.

Amendment No. 3

Extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Vietnam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

Amendment No. 4

Permit counties to pay medical expenses for police officers injured in the line of duty if they choose to do so.

Amendment No. 5

Authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks.

Amendment No. 6

Authority for non-elected state officers and employees to hold additional non-elected jobs as long as the two roles do not conflict.

Surviving are six children: Rush Winters, Mrs. Ed Riley and Mrs. Lizzie Millam, all of Fort Towson; G. W. (Dub) Winters and Mrs. Guy Duff of Hugo, and W. B. Winters of Seminole, and 11 other descendants.

Austin. — Voter registration for the big 1968 election year is getting into full swing. Secretary of State John L. Hill already is busy sending out detailed instructions for county tax assessors.

As chief election officer, Hill discussed current problems with an advisory committee of tax officials (who are local registrars) and reviewed suggested ground rules.

He remains firm in his agreement with an attorney general's opinion that voters must bring or mail in their own registration applications or submit them through authorized members of their immediate family.

Block or bulk registrations are outlawed by an October 11 opinion. It brought critical comment from former State Sen. Franklin Spears, head of a liberal-backed drive to register five million voters.

Hill encourages house-to-house registration drives and says there is no restriction on the manner or the extent of distributing application forms. He is advising local registrars that:

• There is no limit on reproduction of sample registration forms by third parties or purchases of those ordered by official registrars.

• Solicitors may encourage individuals to register but must avoid inducing registration thru false or misleading representation.

• Assistance to the applicant is all right (including filling out forms), but the voter must supply the necessary information himself and sign the form or place his mark on it.

• Drives may furnish envelopes and even stamps to voters, but the applicant or family members must mail the form.

• Local registrars should provide blank, sample forms to all who request them but each registrar may fix his own policies as to furnishing forms in large quantities to solicitors.

Spears has called on registrars to ignore the attorney general's opinion and accept applications delivered by third party solicitors in bulk, or a group of applications sent in the same envelope. Spears claims the opinion is the result of a "plot" to keep the registrations low.

WORKMEN'S COMP. PREMIUM CUT — State Board of Insurance has approved a 4.2 per cent cut in Workmen's compensation insurance premiums effective December 1. Slash, which is based on premium and loss statistics, should mean a \$7,000,000 reduction in 1968.

Board Chairman Hunter McLean said cuts in insurance company expenses and fewer accidents made savings possible, despite rising medical costs and incomes. He said this emphasizes the importance of accident prevention programs.

Reductions by major classes included: All combined, 4.2 per cent; manufacturing classes, 3.4 per cent; contracting, 5.1 per cent; oil, 4.2 per cent; and all other classes, 4.2 per cent.

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES — Attorney General Martin clarified

the state's complex, mandatory retirement provisions for Texas judges, as set forth in the constitution, with a new lengthy opinion (M-152).

In another ruling, Martin concluded that the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has the duty and authority to provide necessary medical treatment or services to persons admitted or committed to its institutions, without obtaining consent from relatives or guardians.

SCREWORM INCREASE FEARED — Hurricane Beulah may have stirred an outbreak of the dread screwworms in Texas cattle.

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation reports 151 cases in 24 counties from South to West Texas. These are the most cases of the year and actually occurred in cooler weather when the problem usually declines. The screwworm fly is windblown.

Foundation President Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde said hurricane and floods posed an emergency situation in the screwworm eradication program. Foundation leaders are requesting the U. S. Department of Agriculture for additional funds to expand the screwworm sterilization program which faces the threat of a cutback due to recent federal spending cuts.

RETAIL RECORD DUE — While downtown Christmas decorations are being strung up, Texas retailers already are looking forward to record sales in most lines during the next two months.

Texas Bureau of Business Research reports that the 11 per cent August to September decline in durable sales and five per cent drop in non-durable sales shook retailers' confidence "more than was warranted."

More-encouraging signs point to "surprisingly strong" apparel store sales this fall, and "substantial increases" are seen in furniture and appliance store sales.

Total construction index in Texas fell to 127.1 in September from an annual high of 245.8 in August. Mark was lowest for the year except for January's 106.6 reading. Despite this decline, the September index still was 16 per cent above September 1966. Building permits totaled \$131,700,000. Value of 1967 building probably will hit an all-time record.

AIR BOARD HEARINGS SET — Texas Air Control Board scheduled hearings this week to consider adoption of revisions to its rules and regulations to bring them in line with the Clean Air Act of 1967.

Three other key regulations will be considered, namely (1) those dealing with control of outdoor burning of waste; (2) establishment of air standards for sulphur dioxide, sulfuric acid and hydrogen sulfide; and (3) supplementation of controls for pollution from vehicles (generally applicable to 1968 and later model vehicles.)

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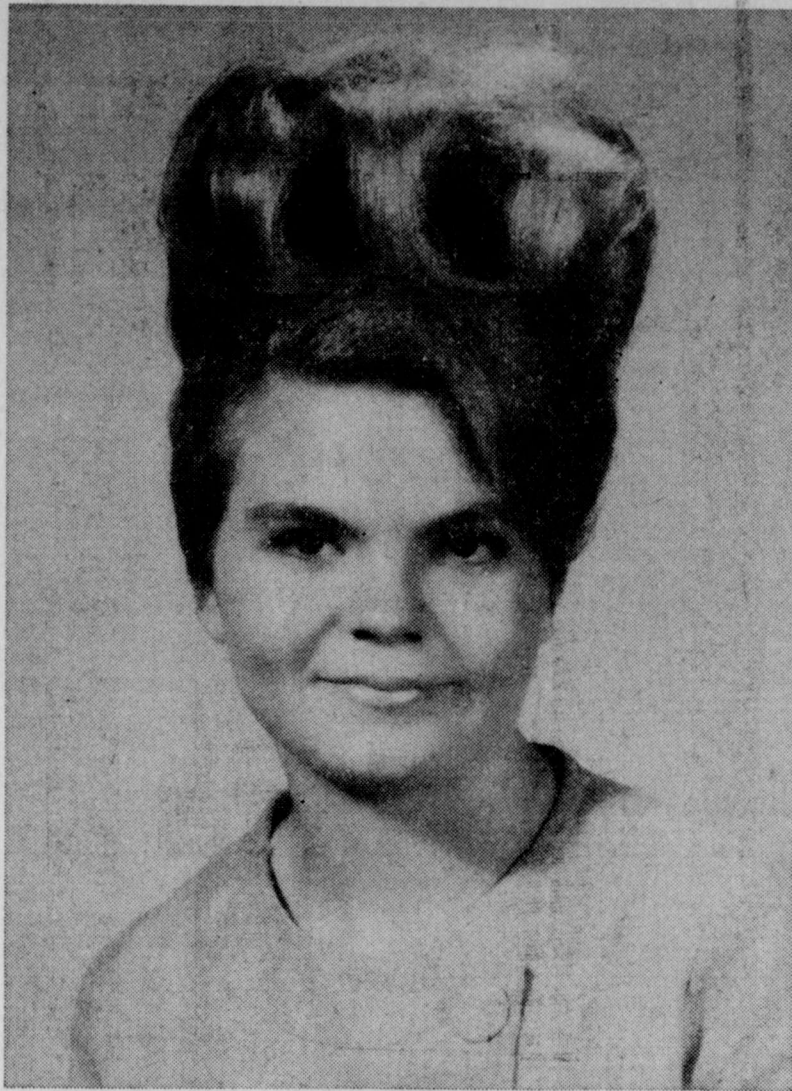
