"Jim Ferguson Highway" In Full Use Again

During the term of James E. Ferguson, (1915-1917), as governor of the State of Texas, a hard-surfaced road, the first for Martin County, was built through Stanton. This road was the main traveled highway for several years until the Broadway of American (Highway 80) loomed, coming through on Front Street, its present route.

The original road was known as the "Jim Ferguson" highway for no reason except it was built during Gov. Ferguson's first administration.

When the Broadway of America brought a new paved highway through Stanton on Front Street, "Jim Ferguson" was abandoned as the main artery of travel. Now it is used only to accommodate local traffic and traffic that might want to detour off Broadway of America through Stanton.

"Jim Ferguson" has given valuable service to Stanton since Highway 80 was built. "Believe It or Not", it has served to accommodate traffic through town after a downpour of rain had visited the community and sent water over Highway 80 at a depth that submerged automobiles to their fenders. We hope this situation will happen again today or tomorrow.

At present "Jim Ferguson" is caring for traffic routed off Front Street on Highway 80, due to construction work on the new four-lane highway. St. Anna Street, the "Jim Ferguson" location, is the scene of an almost continuous flow of motor vehicle traffic, coming from both east and west.

Due to this fact, the local motorist has his eye-balls almost bulging out of their sockets watching traffic lights and making the proper turn at the proper time.

St. Anna Street is a busy thoroughfare, accommodating huge trucks, moving vans, busses, and long trailer-houses pulled by automobiles, not to mention hundreds of passenger cars and pickup trucks.

If all these tourists from the east and west coasts, and truck, van and bus drivers only knew it, when they travel through on "Jim Ferguson", they are passing through the center of a town that has had its name heralded in most of the cities of the effete East as the home of "3,000 Friendly People and A Few Old Soreheads."

Schools Are Holding Open House Next Week

Take a peep back into the days when you attended school and took a red apple to the teacher, or the first flowers from mother's garden. Yes, those were the good old days, but to the youngsters of today they are the "same days"—only different in individual perspective.

You can join with the youngsters of your neighborhood and visit the nearby public school during the state-wide observance of Public Schools Week, March 1 through 6. You will be welcome. It will be not only fun but a privilege to see how the schools of today are meeting the changed responsibilities of our times.

The education committee of the Chamber of Commerce has just about collected all the "loose ends" to carry out a program to be staged in the schools of the county during Public Schools Week.

Prizes are to be given the rooms that have the highest percentage of attendance. The awards for first, second and third places will be \$10, \$7.50, and \$5.

AUSTIN--The University of Texas committee on loans and scholarship information has sent announcements concerning three types of freshman scholarships to more than 900 Texas high school principals.

Five new scholarships of \$200 each are available for first-year students intending to major in journalism. They are the George W. Brackenridge Scholarships in Journalism, to be awarded for the first time next year. Applications should be filed by March 15.

Tuition scholarships for the first year of attendance at the University are available to the graduating first-honor student of each accredited Texas high school. Known as Accredited-School Scholarships, they may be obtained by applying to the registrar before or at registration.

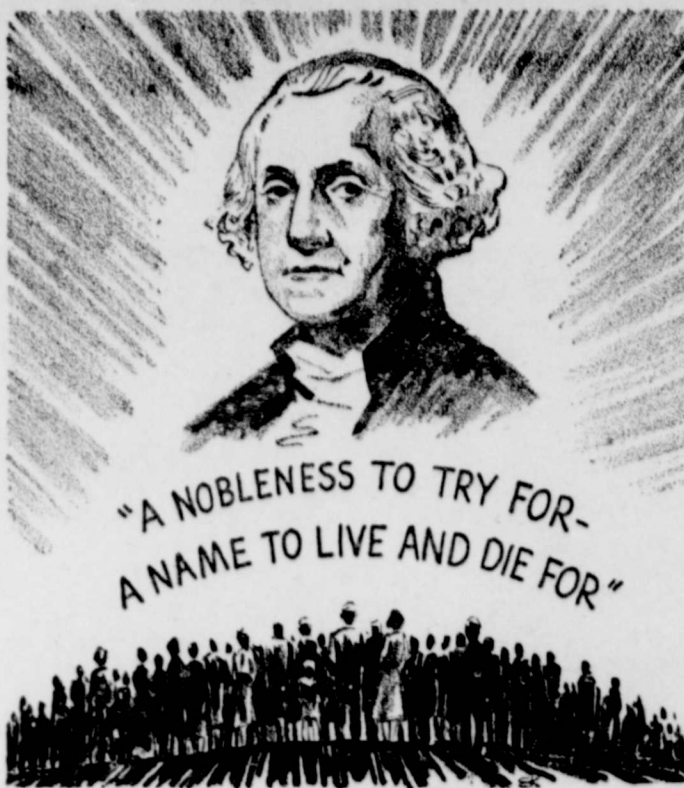

The Meaning Of Glorifying God Is Clear When We Learn To Honor And Accept Him

What does it mean to glorify God and live in His glory?

One dictionary says glory is "distinguished honor or ornamentation; exalted reputation; praise; splendor of state; the quality of being radiant; luster; the bliss of heaven; a halo."

These dictionary definitions seem to be derived from the Bible. In the glorifying of God almost all the dictionary meanings are present, but chief among them is the quality of honor.

To glorify God is to honor Him. And what does honoring God mean? It is quite possible that honor means very much in relation to God what it means in the lesser things of life.

In ordinary, mundane matters we speak of "honoring" a check, or a note. This implies full responsibility for it as ours.

To honor God is to accept Him, to take His love and His will into our lives, to become responsible to Him for our character and ways.

Honoring God is something more than reverence or obedience. It is a false notion that represents God as a great potentate, sitting on a throne in gorgeous garments.

It is false to represent God as being ready to wreak His vengeance and authority upon His subjects if they do not fall down and offer their abject devotion. The likeness of God to earthly sovereigns has been overdone. It

is a false and misleading conception.

To glorify God is to accept Him and what He offers, and to become like Him in creative life and acts of love and good will.

"Here is my Father glorified," said Jesus, "that ye bear much fruit, so shall ye be my disciples."

What Was The News Of Note?—Twenty-Five Years Ago—

(The following items were taken from the Stanton Reporter issue of Feb. 22, 1929).

The scare headline across the top of Page One in The Stanton Reporter of Feb. 22, 1929, read "MILK PLANT OFFERED US." A subhead carried the information, "Stanton Given Option On \$200,000 Enterprise."

The first paragraph of the story read: "Stanton and Martin County had the biggest proposition offered them of any town this size in West Texas when they were given a 30-day option on a \$200,000 Powdered Milk plant."

The offer came from J. T. King of Brady, a representative of the Douthitt Engineering Company of Chicago.

J. S. Lamar was president of the Chamber of Commerce, and he went into action immediately to secure the project by calling together the board of directors.

That the powdered milk project was a going concern was brought out in the board meeting when it was stated that a plant in Indiana had been operating six and one-half months, and it cleared \$22,513 above all expenses.

The board of directors, in special session Monday night, voted to employ a full-time secretary for the chamber of commerce. Mrs. John F. Priddy was the temporary secretary, and the Chamber board of directors highly complimented her "on the work she has done for this county and trade territory during her term in office."

Up until Wednesday 8,800 bales of cotton had been ginned here by the three gins.

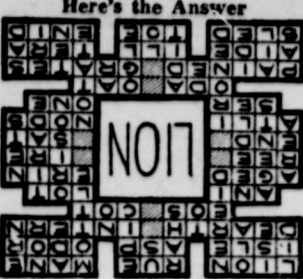

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. — Major Pat N. Howard instructor pilot and commander of a B-47 Stratojet here, gave General Nathan F. Twining, Chief of Staff for the Air Force, his first jet ride last Wednesday.

Major Howard is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Howard of Stanton.

He piloted General Twining in the B-47 jet from Barksdale Air Force Base to Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C. Captain Marvin Watkins flew as navigator, while General Twining flew as the observer, thus making up the crew for the B-47.

outstanding star in track and basketball. After finishing high school, he attended Texas Technological College at Lubbock.

Major Howard was with the 8th Air Force, 385th Bomb Group, in the European theater during World War II. He flew 29 combat missions in B-17 bombers. 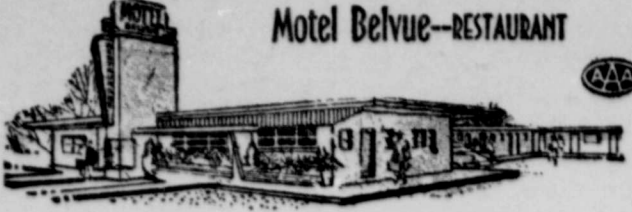

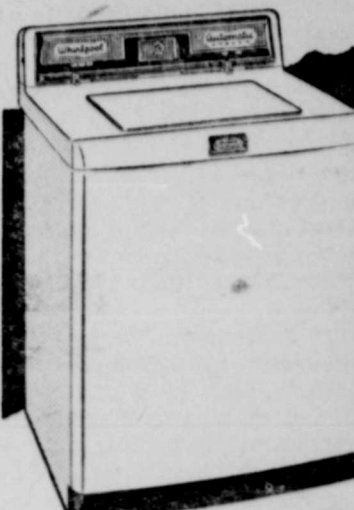

Oil Field Worker Dies In Hospital Here After Crash

Homer Lee Arrington, 56, oil field worker from Monahans, was fatally injured early Sunday morning when his automobile overturned about 15 miles south of Stanton on the road to Garden City.

Arrington was found some 10 feet from his demolished car about 3 a. m. Sunday by R. W. Hamlin of Midland, who was driving a Midland Reporter-Telegram delivery truck.

Hamlin said he was coming around a curve on the lonely road when he saw the wrecked automobile and stopped to investigate. He found the victim still alive, but unconscious.

"He must have been there an hour or so," Hamlin reported, "as the blood had dried on him."

Hamlin immediately summoned aid from Stanton, and the victim was taken to the hospital in an Arrington Funeral Home ambulance. He died about 12 hours later without regaining consciousness.

Arrington's survivors include his widow, two sons—both in service—and a daughter, Mrs. Joe Wright of Wickett.

The body was taken to Monahans for funeral services and interment.

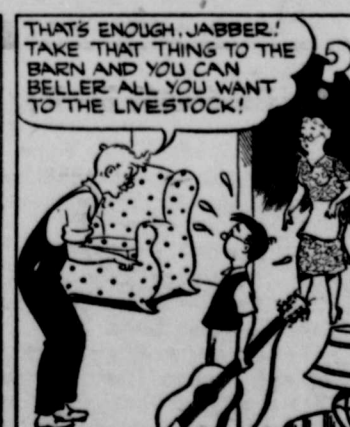

Does this community need a youth center? What do you think? That is a subject that has come up and been put into the background several times in past years. There always have been some for and some against and always the problem of finances. It has been discussed among grown-ups some and among the young people quite a bit.

I am in favor of a youth center, as are most of the students in high school and grade school. Always the young people of Stanton have had to go out of town for almost any activity they planned.

Here we have one drive-in theater and one indoor theater which stays open four nights a week, and who wants to go to the show constantly?

Few homes are large enough for large groups such as class parties or club socials. A swimming pool, tennis courts, table tennis and other activities would add a great deal to the enjoyment of growing up at home.

Of course, it would cost money but it would pay in other ways. A well supervised youth center would keep kids out of cars and off highways. It would give them a means of entertainment without having to look for it in other ways. Weigh the sides of the question and give it careful thought. Do you think Stanton needs a youth center?

RESULTS OF THE RECENT BREAKFAST SURVEY

Recently my freshman homemaking class helped me conduct a breakfast survey throughout the entire school, grades 1-12.

Maybe your child or your little brother or sister came home saying "Mommie, they asked me if I had orange juice for breakfast." Or "Mommie, why did they ask me what I had for breakfast?"

Maybe you, too, have been wondering just why we did this.

The purpose of the survey was to find out how many children are getting a well balanced breakfast to form the good breakfast habit. The questionnaires each student filled out were carefully checked by students and by myself.

Suggestions were offered for improving inadequate breakfasts. Encouragement and a good check mark were given those who had eaten good breakfasts. These questionnaires were returned to the teachers to be studied and returned to the children. The teachers also were given the percentage who did not eat breakfast, the percentage who ate inadequate breakfasts, and the percentage who had good breakfasts.

The total of the various rooms were compiled and figured on a percentage basis. I would like to give you these figures now:

Did not eat: Grade School, 5.8 per cent; High School, 11.5 per cent.

Had adequate breakfast: Grade School, 32.2 per cent; High School, 27.3 per cent.

Had good breakfast: Grade School, 62 per cent; High School, 61.2 per cent.

Thirty-eight per cent of the Grade School children questioned did not have the food their bodies need for proper functioning! Very few children were getting citrus fruit or juice. This is one of our best sources of Vitamin C, the vitamin which prevents scurvy.

Vitamin C cannot be stored in the body and should be included in the diet everyday.

Also, some of the children were drinking coffee—which is not recommended. One child said she had a piece of cake and a coke for breakfast.

In the High School, 38.8 per cent of those questioned had had inadequate breakfasts or no breakfast at all! The majority of those not eating were girls, but there were a few boys. Reasons given for not eating were "Not hungry," "Not enough time," and a few boys said they "Had no one to prepare it."

Breakfast comes from the two words "break" and "fast." And we should do just that! After sleeping and going without food for 8-12 hours, our bodies need refueling.

Breakfast should provide one-fourth of the calories required for the entire day. A good breakfast can decrease "10 o'clock

blues." It can increase learning ability and put sparkle in one's personality.

Here is a suggested breakfast pattern that might help you to prepare or select a more balanced breakfast:

Fruit or fruit juice or tomato juice; cereal and/or egg; breakfast bread and butter; beverage (milk or cocoa for children).

To the above pattern can be added breakfast meats and sweets, but do not add these and leave off the fruit juice and milk (for children) which is so essential for health.

National surveys show that the teen-age girl leads all the others in being undernourished. This very often is because these girls do not get up early enough in the morning or do enough in the morning to create an appetite.

Also, many teen-age girls feel that they are overweight and diet—in their own manner and at the expense of their health.

Boys usually eat plenty of food if it is prepared temptingly for them. The boys and girls of today are the adults of tomorrow. Let's make them strong and healthy for the good of the family, home, community, and nation.

It's quite possible that by the time groundwork now in progress on Martin County's end reaches the west boundary line, Midland County will be ready to take on and complete the project, ready for concrete and curbing to follow.

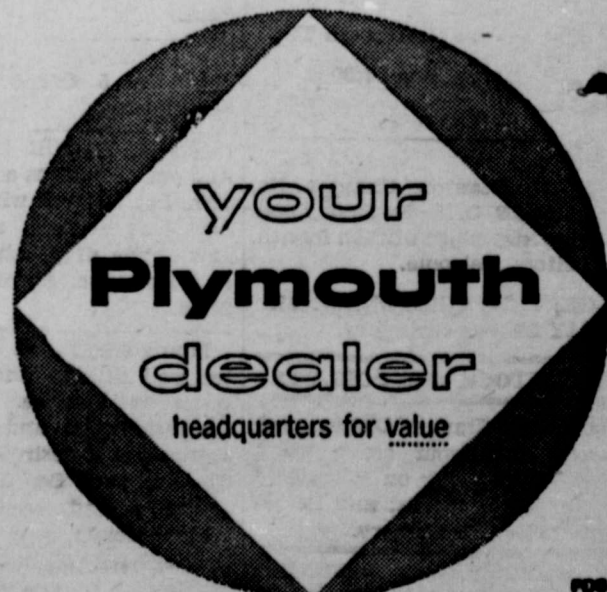

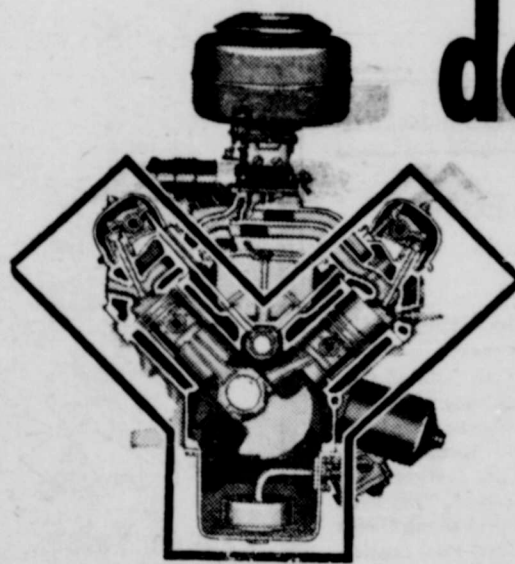

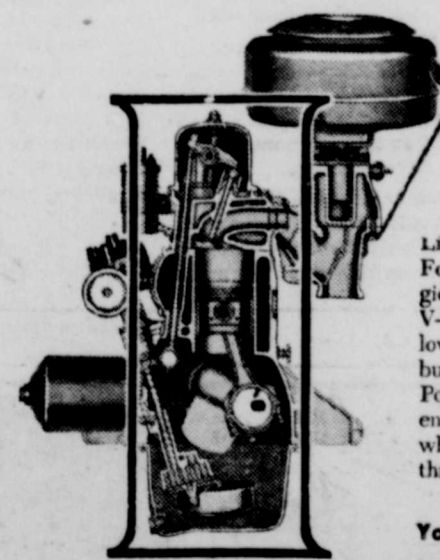

to start drilling at once on a southeast outcrop to production in the Block 7 (Devonian) field of Northwest Martin County, 30 miles northeast of Stanton.

It is No. 1 Texas University, 660 feet from north and west lines of section 27, block 7, University survey. It is to drill to 12,500 feet.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 1 B. R. Parker, wildcat in Southeast Martin County, is drilling below 7,555 feet in lime, shale and sand after a drillstem test from 7,100 to 7,180 feet in the Spraberry.

Tool was open one hour and 15 minutes. There was a blow of air at intervals during the test. Recovery was 242 feet of drilling mud with no show of oil or gas or water and 450 feet of slightly gas cut drilling mud and 637 feet of heavily gas cut drilling mud.
