It was necessary to remove the door; this was done in record time. The jaws were then used to force the back of the seat out of the way.

Your donations made the purchase of the "jaws" possible. Fortunately they are not needed too often, but our Volunteer Firemen are to be commended on their ability to "get the job done". Your fire department meets twice a month and work to stay prepared.

The firemen were again called to the wreck on Wednesday morning, Sept. 21. At this time they had the unpleasant duty of removing the body from the wreckage.

"Thank you, fellows." I am sure it is not said often enough.

My fellow ambulance crew deserves a "Thank You" also. We have been having enough runs lately to keep us prepared.

Pat Hudson of the Briscoe community is relatively new to the ambulance service and had only had routine "sick calls" until the wreck on Sept. 17; she was the first attendant at the scene and wasn't back home for about 8 hours. You did a great job Pat.

Pam Hibler deserves recognition for her "bravery" the other afternoon she made the call and worked with the patient both at the scene and at the hospital. The patient (a friend) died. Pam has made a lot of calls and transfers with the service; this was the first patient to lose.

The scoreboard read 15-6 after a TD by Eddy O'Brien; he carried the ball 80 yards

Lee McCasland again scored for the Colts in the fourth quarter with a 17 yard touchdown run around left end. The two point pass conversion failed, making the final score 21-6 in favor of the future Mustangs.

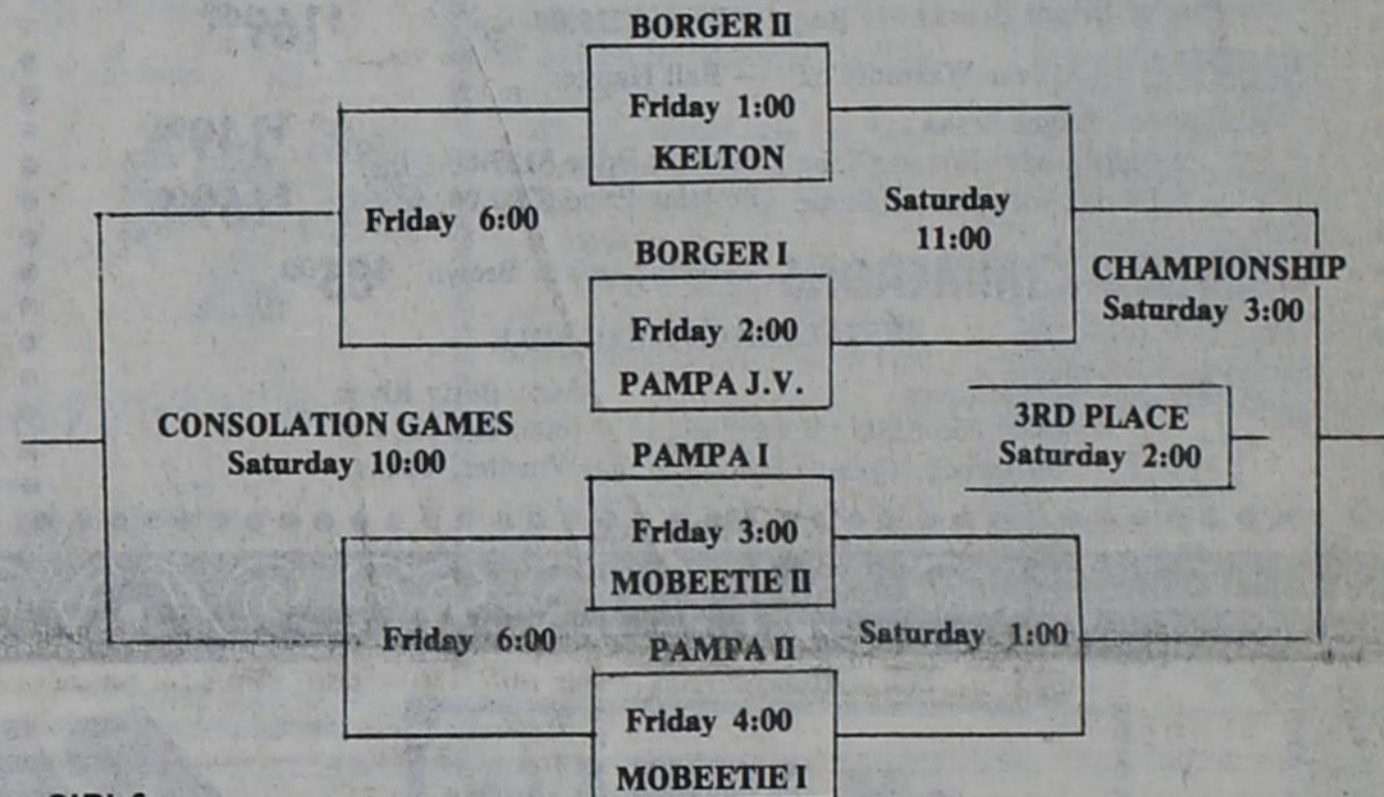

"An outstanding program

which used the resources in Lubbock and at Texas Tech were prepared," according to Mrs. Elna Richards of Port Arthur, president of the 23,000 member group.

Conference sessions were held at the Lubbock Civic Center.

Registration began at 1 p.m. September 20. Special educational activities for that afternoon included tours of the home economics college at Texas Tech and the Ranching Heritage Museum. Evening entertainment was provided by the Baker's Dozen, Kappa Pickers, and a blue grass band.

Dr. Bess Haley, dean of home economics at Texas Tech greeted the conference participants.

Key speakers included Dr. Stephen Jorgensen, associate dean of the college of home economics at Texas Tech, who discussed "Families of the Future," and Tony Brigmon, goodwill ambassador for Southwest Airlines, whose subject was "Changing and Feeling Good." Sweet potato vines are black around here, probably all feel that people thought they had 2 or 3 weeks more growth. We can not say we did not have a norther Monday night and Tuesday, 28 degrees at Canadian, Shamrock 32 degrees. Us in between so we got it. Tuesday night, Sept. 21, quite early, I'd say.

Word came to us today (Wednesday) that Glenn Rose's dad was killed this morning in a 2 truck wreck 17 miles South of Canadian. One truck was going east, the Rose truck going South, the East-bound truck hit the Rose truck broadside. Both trucks burst into fire. Rose was living in Mobeetie, TV said. His son Glen married Diana Kelley. They live South of Briscoe where D'Spains used to live. Our sympathy goes out to the relatives.

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
