### BUILDING COLLAPSES; MANY HURT

Girders Flung Across Street; Hundred At Work

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Eighteen men were reported to have fallen from the second floor of a building under construction on the midtown west side today when steel work collapsed. A hundred men were at work on the structure.

Five men were believed by police, after a hurried check, to have been killed and fifteen others to have been injured. The building was being erected at Fifty-First Street and Eleventh Avenue for a baking company, and the steelwork had reached the fourth floor. The cause of its collapse could not be quickly ascertained.

The first ambulance corps to arrive removed two bodies from the ruins.

The crash as the steel girders gave way was heard for blocks summoning crowds which found workmen entombed beneath a mass of twisted steel and timbers.

Six ambulances, a rescue squad, hook and ladder companies and police from six precincts hastened to the scene, and four priests hurried from the church of the Sacred Heart.

One great girder was flung across the street and into the side of the building of the Brannan Piano Company, testifying women workers but injuring none of them.

### Woman Drinks Disinfectant In Hotel

DALLAS, TEXAS, May 22 (AP)—Mrs. R. L. Works, 25, of Brownsville, Tex., wife of a prominent eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, was given emergency treatment at a downtown hotel and removed to a hospital in a serious condition early today after she had swallowed a liquid disinfectant.

Emergency treatment was given Mrs. Works in the room of Rene B. Creager of Brownsville, republican national committeeman, who issued this statement:

The following friends were my guests at dinner on the roof of the Adolphus Hotel Wednesday night: Mr. and Mrs. Houston Page of Dallas; Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Snipes of Dallas; Mr. G. Degraffenreid of Dallas; Mrs. C. G. Watson of Brownsville; Mrs. R. L. Works of Brownsville. Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Works were the house guests of Mrs. Page.

"Mrs. Works became indisposed at the table, and, at the suggestion of one of the other ladies, went to my suite to rest. After an interval, two of the other ladies followed her to the suite, to ascertain how she was feeling, and shortly thereafter the balance of the party followed.

In some manner unknown, Mrs. Works had obtained a small bottle of . . . (Mr. Creager named the disinfectant) and . . . in the belief of all of the other members of the party . . . through mistake, she undertook to gargle her throat, evidently swallowing a portion of the liquid.

"Mrs. Works is the wife of a prominent physician of Brownsville, and a lady of the highest standing. None of her friends believe the taking of the liquid was other than an unfortunate accident.

"I am indebted Mrs. Works, in resting easily at a local hospital, with every chance of recovery." Police attention was called when a news vendor at the corner of Akard and Commerce streets picked up a piece of a bottle and handed it to the police with a report that the bottle had crashed to the street near him from a window of the hotel.

N. D. Bailey, sergeant of police, and Patrolman Jones went to Mr. Creager's suite to investigate. First aid was administered to Mrs. Works by Dr. T. A. Kinder, emergency hospital surgeon.

The screen in the bath room had been cut or broken and the bottle hurled through. According to information given to the police and shown on their records, Mrs. Works, accompanied by two other women, came to Dallas to attend a church convention.

Mr. Creager came to Dallas on political business. He recently lost a \$500,000 libel suit against Collier's Weekly, the case being tried at Brownsville.

### SHORT ILLNESS IS FATAL TO FARMER

J. W. Meredith, 66, Knott, died at a local hospital Wednesday night, following an illness of a few hours. The Knott farmer was stricken while working Wednesday and brought to the hospital about 8 o'clock Wednesday night. He died three hours later.

Meredith moved to Knott in January from Wood County.

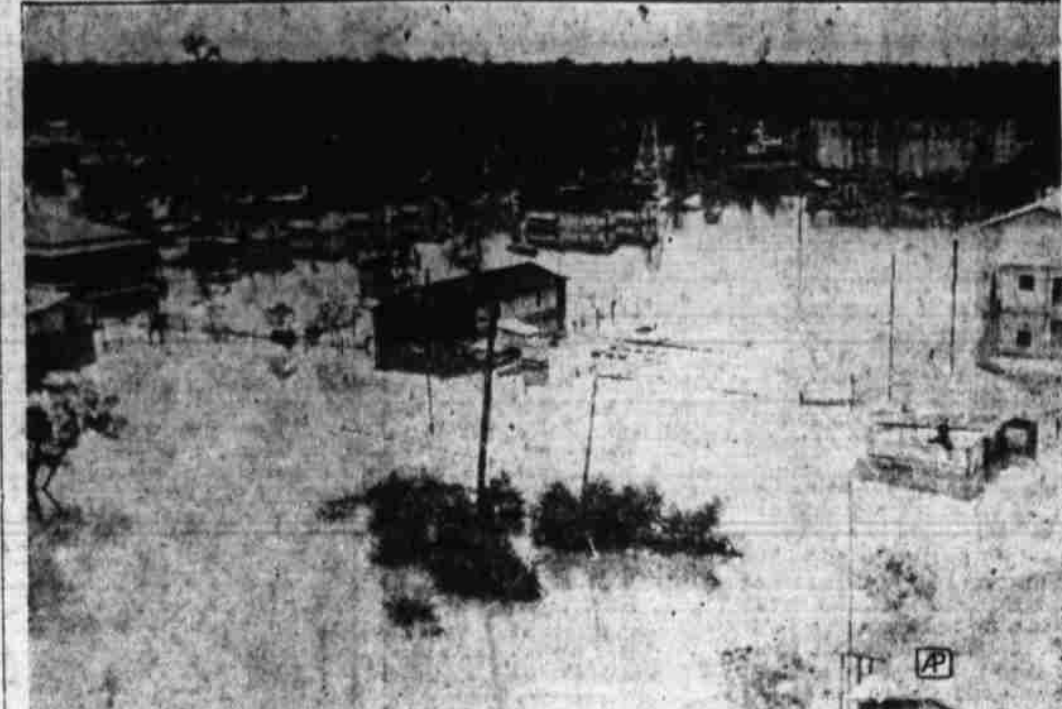
Funeral services will be held at Knott, but definite time had not been arranged this afternoon.

### STORIES OF FLOOD ARE SAD; GLAD

Stories fraught with tragedy and humor were being revealed today to Red Cross relief workers laboring in northeastern Texas and southwestern Arkansas, along the flooded bayous and farmlands bordering the Red River.

Dying in a cabin surrounded by waters from a Red River levee break in Little River county, Ark., Adie Walker, negro girl, was placed in a coffin transported by a skiff and the funeral procession journeyed to shore in boats to bury her.

At the same time, a search was being made for the body of her brother Sonny, 14, who was washed from the bare back of a horse by backwater current into a flooded creek.

Tom Hodnutt, aged Miller county fisherman, was caught unprepared without a boat, in the 1927 flood, but last week when the flood waters came, he had ready a skiff representing months of spare time work. In it he removed a total of 48 McKinney bayou drainage district refugees. The picturesque fisherman, who claimed experience with every flood in this country since 1884, gave invaluable aid in Red Cross relief workers in surveying the inundated area.

Lands which figured in the famous insurance murder plot against W. R. Pearson, confessed by Dr. Andrew Bass, awaiting trial at Bentonville, Ark. lie in the flooded drainage district. Huddled in the back yard of a farm home, a negro woman and seven children were asked whose place they came from.

"We did work for Dr. Bass, but they tell me he's in jail," was the reply. "Now I don't know just who we pay rent to."

Another relief problem was keeping refugees together, for no sooner were relief camps established than refugees would seek individual shelter, hampering the Red Cross program of typhoid inoculation. Difficulty was being experienced in

### Scenic Drive To Be Improved Before Oil Men's Jubilee

The road leading around Scenic Mountain will be put in good condition before the Oil Men's Jubilee to be held here on July 3, 4 and 5, according to E. F. Robbins, chairman of the Big Spring chamber of commerce. According to Mr. Robbins the plans are already perfected and work will begin immediately. This is one of the most attractive spots in West Texas as it affords a view of many miles from this spot the oil fields lying in the southern part of Howard county and the agricultural section lying to the north and east may be seen and it overlooks the Big Spring airport to the west. The site was donated to the state for park purposes by the Women's Federated Clubs of this city during the Neff administration, but so far has remained unimproved by the state.

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### Two Indictments Are Returned Here

### POPULATION OF DAWSON NOW 13,491

LAMESA, May 22.—Dawson county's population is 13,491, according to Irwin E. Barr, district census supervisor of Lubbock. This total shows an increase of over four thousand per cent since the first census was taken in 1900, when there were thirty-seven residents. There are 2,217 farms enumerated.

The 1920 total also shows an increase of 219 per cent for the county. In 1920 and over 200 per cent for Lamesa. The 1920 population for Dawson county was 4,309 and 1,185 for Lamesa. Lamesa's present population is 3,491.

### Mexican Quota Bill Approved By House Body

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—A revised form of the senate bill to restrict Mexican immigration was approved today by the house immigration committee, over state department opposition.

The measure would put immigration from the southern republic under the quota system, with an annual maximum of between 1,200 and 1,500.

### Three Amarillo Officers Named In Damage Suit

AMARILLO, Texas, May 22 (AP)—Edward F. Lambright of Nowata, Okla., yesterday filed suit for \$55,000 damages in federal court here against Sheriff Ed S. Graves and Deputy Sheriff Herman Watchendorf of Gray county and G. H. Parrish, constable of Pampa, charging they brutally attacked him after his arrest in Pampa on a car theft charge.

The complaint alleged that Lambright was confined in jail by the officers overnight without medical attention although badly injured.

Lambright formally was charged with theft but was released when the Gray county grand jury returned a no bill.

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### Decision Near On Ballot Plea Of "Jim"

AUSTIN, May 22 (AP)—Members of the special supreme court considering the application of former Governor James E. Ferguson for a mandamus to compel the state democratic executive committee to place his name on the primary ballots, were in conference here today.

It was reported it would hand down its opinion in the case late today or tomorrow.

The court is made up of A. H. Britain of Wichita Falls, chief justice, and C. S. Bradley of Groesbeck and William Pierson, of Austin, associate justices.

The opinion will deal with the eligibility of Ferguson to hold office again in view of his impeachment and removal from the governor's office in 1917.

The body will be taken to San Francisco for burial sometime next week.

Quann died while en route to a hospital. Relatives were finally located in California.

### Give Pampa Man Death Sentence

PAMPA, Texas, May 22 (AP)—Moncus Twitty today faced a sentence of death, assessed against him by a jury which convicted him of assault his 4-year-old niece. The sentence passed here yesterday in district court was the first death penalty on the court's records, extending back to frontier days.

Twitty, 27, was charged with the murder of a man at Cisco, and his trial has been in progress for several days.

No effort will be made to return Twitty here for trial according to county officials.

### LONG TRIP IS SUCCESS THUS FAR

Pernambuco Is First Stop; Then Rio Janeiro, Brazil

FERNANDO DO NORONHA, HA, Brazil, May 22 (AP)—The huge dirigible Graf Zeppelin, rapidly nearing the end of the South Atlantic flight from Seville, Spain, to Pernambuco, flew over the island of Fernando Do Noronha off the Brazilian coast at 1:40 p. m., today (10:40 a. m. E. S. T.).

After circling around the penal colony for fifteen minutes, the Graf Zeppelin turned her nose toward the Brazilian coast 125 miles away and started on the final lap to Pernambuco.

PERNAMBUCO, Brazil, May 22 (AP)—Northeastern Brazil and this most northerly section of the South American continent was prepared today to welcome the Graf Zeppelin, reported steadily approaching the coast from Seville, Spain.

It was not certain yet whether the Zeppelin would stop here before proceeding on to Rio Janeiro, or would wait until returning and stop as it proceeded north to Havanna and Lakehurst. An amateur radio operator at Natal intercepted a message from the craft which said: "After dinner Dr. Eckenker talked to the passengers and said he was not sure of stopping at Recife (Pernambuco) for water, or sailing on directly to Rio Janeiro. The day has been overcast, but the Cape Verde Islands frequently broke into view through the clouds—a wonderful panorama."

Previously Dr. Eckenker had radioed that he expected to land at Pernambuco and take on additional water, remaining there about three hours. He then would continue on to Rio Janeiro, a distance of about 1,250 miles, arriving Friday morning. The stop at Rio Janeiro is expected to be very short.

The only difficulty thus far reported aboard the ship was in consumption of water due to the heat, which placed the passengers on a restricted basis for personal use. A radio message received at Natal said that Dr. Mejias, personal physician to the King of Spain and a passenger aboard the ship, had been called upon to give medical aid to one of the crew who was ill. Dr. Mejias said that this proved the necessity of having a doctor aboard the ship on every trip, since many passengers never had been able to adapt themselves to travel by air.

The mooring mast constructed for the Zeppelin was painted red and white for greatest visibility, and a watchman was stationed at the highest nearby point to get the first glimpse of the visitor from over the sea. Grandstands were erected and provisions made for parking motor cars to accommodate visitors.

People gathered from all over the surrounding country to witness arrival of the Graf. Entrance fees to the field for those who wished to see the landing ranged from 90 cents to \$1.25 with higher prices for motor cars.

The Zeppelin passed the Cape Verde Islands at 12:15 p. m., e.s.t., yesterday, dropping mail at Porto Praia and at Sao Thiago by means of parachutes. Sight of the ship was said to have aroused the utmost consternation, particularly in Porto Praia, where the town's 60,000 negro inhabitants rushed into the streets, fear-stricken.

### Murder Trial Of Negro Started

Taking of testimony in the trial of George McRoberson, negro, charged with the fatal shooting of W. L. Morgan, negro, in the Dreamland Hotel Barber Shop, was started at 11 o'clock this morning, after 12 jurors were obtained in 45 minutes.

The jury is composed of J. C. Coleman, J. W. Wooten, Sid Davis, E. W. Hale, Herschel Smith, Earl Phillips, L. D. Mitchell, L. C. Dahme, G. J. Gooch, J. W. Morgan, E. W. Marion, J. Tom Rogers.

Roberson pleaded not guilty to the charge as contained in a grand jury indictment.

It is expected the hearing will be completed by late this afternoon. Eye-witnesses to the shooting were placed on the stand this morning.

## Girl, Crack Revolver Shot At 13, Beats Experts With Unerring Aim

ST. LOUIS, May 22. (AP)—Revolver instead of dolls and roller skates are the playthings of 13-year-old Ariadne Brown of St. Louis.

This brown-haired school girl has become such an accurate shot that she has beaten pistol experts and has a large collection of medals.

Ariadne has only been practicing with revolvers about a year and a half, but her eye was good from the start and her marksmanship has improved consistently. She has taken part in state and national contests and has always been among the leaders.

Many a seasoned policeman has left the range chagrined after being beaten in target shooting by her.

At Camp Perry, Ohio, last fall Ariadne, shooting in the pistol-silver match, scored 89 out of a possible 100 at 50 yards, exceeding expert qualification by four points and winning a medal.

In the National Rifle association individual pistol match she totaled 235 out of a possible 300 under difficult conditions.

Shooting in the Ohio state revolver matches the girl placed fourth with a score of 263 out of a possible 300. She competed against 75 experts from the army and police departments.

When Ariadne's father, Clyde E. Brown, placed a revolver in her hand the first time, the girl had a characteristic fear of firearms. It wasn't long, however, before it was overcome.

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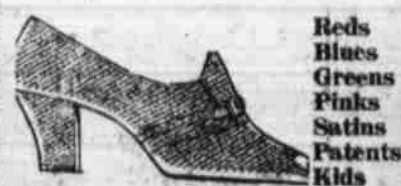

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## Our Modern Idol

MARK TWAIN remarked, in  
"Life on the Mississippi," that  
every small boy in a river town in  
the old days had but one ambition  
—to grow up and become a pilot of  
a river steamboat.

It was not only because the  
river pilot, in that era, occupied a  
position in the top strata of river-  
side society. He had, in addition,  
the glamour that goes to a man  
who is master of a difficult, pic-  
turesque and sometimes dangerous  
calling. He was an expert, almost  
an artist, in charge of a great mass  
of machinery, and his position in  
the public eye was enhanced accord-  
ingly.

Since Mark Twain's day the glam-  
our of the river pilot has faded.  
For a long time, doubtless, the rail-  
road engineer took his place; in-  
deed, even today there is a thrill  
to the sight of a huge locomotive  
that must fill vast numbers of  
youngsters with a burning ambition  
to become engineers when they  
grow up. But this modern age, if it  
has done nothing else, has at least  
furnished the small boy with an  
idol more dazzling and exciting  
than anything any former age  
could give.

The present era has produced the  
airplane pilot, and if you doubt  
that this personage is fit to put  
dreams and desires in the breast  
of youngsters, just visit an airport  
some day and watch the planes and  
the flyers come and go—and be con-  
vinced.

In the first place, there is nothing  
anywhere more supremely lovely  
and inspiring than an airplane  
in the air. The designers nowadays,  
just to make things better, have  
taken to painting their planes in  
gay colors; and when a red-cabined  
bird with bright yellow wings soars  
up from a smooth green field,  
poises itself against the blue sky

## The Brady Sentence.

Lablock Avalanche.  
ANOTHER sensational murder  
trial has ended and once again  
has been paraded, in all its futility,  
our once respected system of trial  
by jury—as a ghastly, lecherous  
corpus of jurisprudence.

After hearing sordid evidence  
and listening to the impassioned  
pleas of brilliant counsel, a Dallas  
jury has returned a guilty verdict.  
Twelve men, citizens of a modern  
Texas metropolis, have ruled that  
all books will be squared if John  
Brady spends three years in prison

for the fatal stabbing of his youth-  
ful paramour. Get that—and get it  
straight! Three years in prison, the  
jury has ruled, will be a fair ex-  
change for cons beneath the sod-  
and, in the opinion of the jurors,  
will make "even-Stephen," the ac-  
count of Society versus John Brady,  
convicted girl-slayer! The decision,  
ladies and gentlemen, represents an  
idea of justice in the State of Texas,  
edition of 1930!

Justice! Justice! Justice!  
Don't make us laugh! It's no  
laughing matter. It is one of the  
most serious matters facing Texas  
of today—an ominous warning to  
beware, for even as the Brady ver-  
dict was announced the threaten-  
ing rumble of mob violence had not  
died away in the land. Almost with-  
in a stone's throw of the Dallas bar  
were jumbled the blackened ruins  
of another Texas courthouse burn-  
ed when a mob refused to entrust  
to court and jury the administration  
of a criminal case. Failure to exact  
retribution for crime, through the  
proper channels, presents a dire  
problem which threatens the very  
civilization of a great state!

Today, from the far-flung borders  
of Texas, people are ridiculing the  
sentence in the Brady case. From  
Texline to Beaumont, from Tex-  
arkana to El Paso, dazed Texans  
are rubbing their eyes, their brains  
numbed by the stunning conception  
of justice and of the crime of mu-  
der. Four millions of people are  
thunder-struck. And four millions  
of people are asking themselves:  
"Is murder a felony in Texas—or  
is it a minor charge, to be taken  
lightly and dealt with as a mere  
misdemeanor?"

When a crimson knife loosed the  
life blood of a defenseless girl to  
plash beneath her feet, there was  
committed a murder. When that  
cruel weapon severed the life cord  
forever, there was taken a life—  
something that cannot be re-  
stored, which nothing can restore  
anywhere this side of Heaven. As  
the testimony showed, a dwarfed,  
blackened life of a loose woman—  
the battered body of Lehlia High-  
smith—was consigned to the sod as  
long as this world stands in its pre-  
sent state.

Hopes were blasted. Plans to go  
straight were rent asunder. "Fines"  
was written to a human life fore-  
ever. Yet, a jury has ruled, John  
Brady may atone, may square  
things with society, by spending  
three years in prison.

What an uneven, unfair, inade-  
quate decision! What a travesty on  
justice! What a weakening blow to  
the vitals of respect for law, for  
peace and safety in the Lone Star  
state! What an open invitation to  
others to "go thou, and do likewise!"  
What a guarantee of legal protec-  
tion to others who would ruthlessly  
take a human life!

If that Dallas jury was not con-  
vinced that John Brady committed  
the murder of Lehlia Highsmith,  
then John Brady should have been  
freed, to walk again among his fel-  
lows. But if that jury was con-  
vinced that Brady did the slaying—and  
by its verdict it must have been so  
convinced—then the punishment  
should have been drafted to fit the  
crime and should not have been  
the putrid, weakly, compromise  
that it was.

Texas had best awake from the  
lethargy which now threatens to  
exact a dastardly retribution. Jurors  
had best remember that their first  
responsibility is to society and to  
civilization, not to the sniveling,  
fawning cry of "Mercy"—when  
mercy won't fill the bill. Those  
charged with the administration of  
our courts should bend to hoist  
them back to a place of public re-  
sponsibility, and members of the bar  
should move to aid that end by  
placing a stamp of disapproval up-  
on drama and trickery which so  
often plays a leading role in the  
trial court.

Respect for law, for court and  
for justice must be maintained thru-  
out adherence to demands of the  
statutes. To further tempt fate in  
Texas is to court disaster and to  
invite shame.

## THE FLYING ENEMY

Because of its voracious ap-  
petite and its more repulsive feed-  
ing habits, the fly is a carrier and  
spreader of disease.

The female deposits her eggs in  
filth. There the baby flies come to  
life and thereafter do little more  
than travel from garbage pile to  
food plate.

The fly is filthy inside and out,  
for, in addition to carrying and  
filth-laden legs and body, it has  
the nasty habit of regurgitating  
its food. Through this disgusting  
habit, it spreads the filthy stuff it  
feeds on and, incidentally, also  
transmits many parasitic worms.

Eaton and Mason, two interested  
scientists, counted the number of  
germs carried by the average fly,  
and found them to number no few-  
er than 1,250,000 to the fly. An-  
other scientist made a similar study  
and found that on the average, the  
fly carries 4,000,000 germs on the  
outside, and 28,000,000 on the inside.  
Of course, not all of these germs  
were of the disease producing type.  
The fly will breed very rapidly in  
a suitable environment. The fe-

**SOVIET INSPECTORS MUST OBTAIN PERMITS**  
MOSCOW (INS)—Snoopers, inspectors, investigators who like flies have been in the habit of pestering managers of Soviet factories and collective and state farms to discover whether the communist party "line" or "plan" was being carried out, must now obtain special permission for their activities. The Commissariat of Workers' Peasants' Inspection, the efficient department of the government, has given managers the right to kick out all investigation committees which fail to present signed and sealed credentials from the federal or state efficiency departments.  
Commissar Ordjonikidze said investigations had become a menace to the state industries and farms. The biggest state farm "Gigant," he said, was investigated 800 times last year by federal, state, and local government or communist party commissions, excluding excursionists and guests. The Malovskovsky sugar plant, he said, was investigated 94 times last year. During the month of the harvest at the Rosa Luxemburg collective farm, the manager was compelled to furnish data and explanations about his work to seven different inspectors.  
In a few cases the commissariat issued absolute orders forbidding investigations. The iron and steel mill of the Ural mountain, and Moscow districts are not to be investigated by anyone until after October 1.

Little more could be asked of the two leaders, the surprising Washington Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics, current champions, than the pace they have been setting. They are separated only by a one game margin, the Senators having two more victories, and neither seems to be able to do anything to increase or decrease it. Washington now has won six games in a row, but the Athletics are right behind.

They both engaged in double headers yesterday and came out with two victories apiece to hold their places. Washington, with Sam Jones and Adolph Liska, carrying the pitching burden, defeated the Boston Red Sox, 10 to 2 and 6 to 1.

The Athletics got off to a very bad start against the New York Yankees when Babe Ruth hit two home runs on his first two trips to the plate and started the Yankees off to a 6-0 lead, but those six runs meant little as the world's champions cut loose with a rally that brought nine runs in the seventh and a 15 to 7 victory. Rube Walberg pitched the A's to a 4 to 1 victory in the second game, holding New York to five hits.

Ruth's feats of home run hitting stole the show at Philadelphia. In addition to the two successive homers, the Babe added a third in the same game.

These twin bills with single victories for Chicago and St. Louis, drew the second division clubs close together. Chicago in fifth place, is but 2 1/2 games ahead of the eighth place Detroit Tigers after yesterday's 9 to 3 victory over Detroit. Ted Lyons led the Sox by making three hits, and driving in three runs in addition to pitching a fine game for his seventh win of the year. The St. Louis Browns moved into sixth place by edging out a 6 to 5 victory over Cleveland, gain-

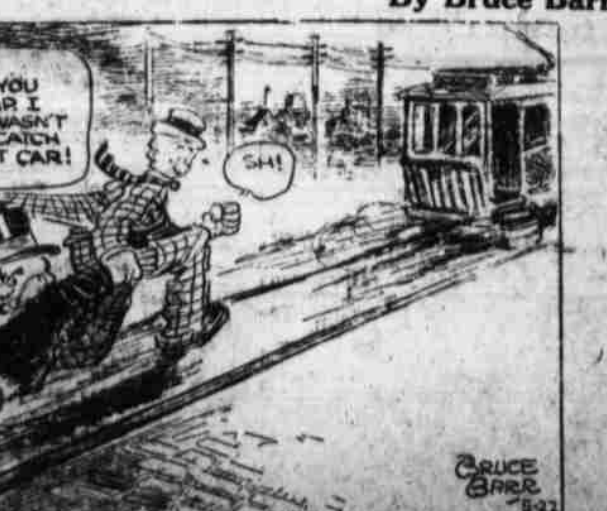

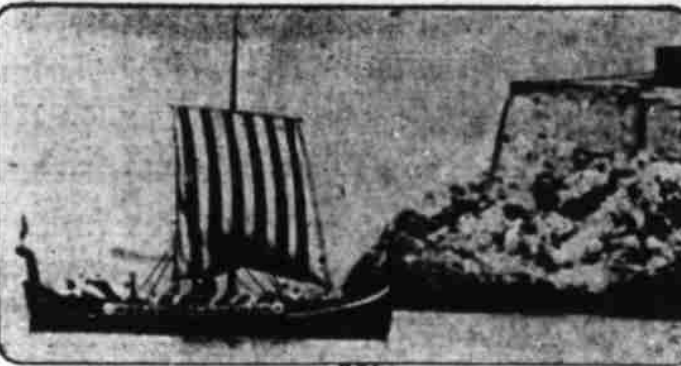
